A statement was made in regard to condition in Philosophy standing against Miss Lena May Kerswill, a senior in the College of Arts and Science, and it was voted that if Miss Kerswill satisfactorily met the requirements before June 5, that she be granted her degree. (This condition was removed in the afternoon of June 1).

On recommendation of Dean Cooper, the Senate voted to adopt the recommendation with reference to shortening the year in the College of Agriculture.

Mr. Karraker made a statement in regard to a condition in Agronomy I standing against Mr. Harry Houchell who had recently entered military service. Mr. Houchell failed on the condition examination and asked the Senate to authorize a third examination which was granted.

The following report from a special committee appointed by the Council composed of President McVey and the Registrar was adopted:

1. "That the Senate be authorized to confer an honorary degree, Honoris Causa, upon students who have entered the army or navy service of the United States at the end of their junior year or during their senior year. This degree differs from the regular bachelor degree in that it is a recognition of services to our Country in time of need.
2. Students who have completed all of their work up to the middle of the second semester in the senior year and who have been called to the service of their Country, will be granted a bachelor's degree on the basis of the completed course of study. An exception is made to this arrangement in case of students who are candidates for professional degrees. It is felt by the members of the Senate that students who are candidates for professional degrees should complete the work on account of the standards and requirements of professional training.
