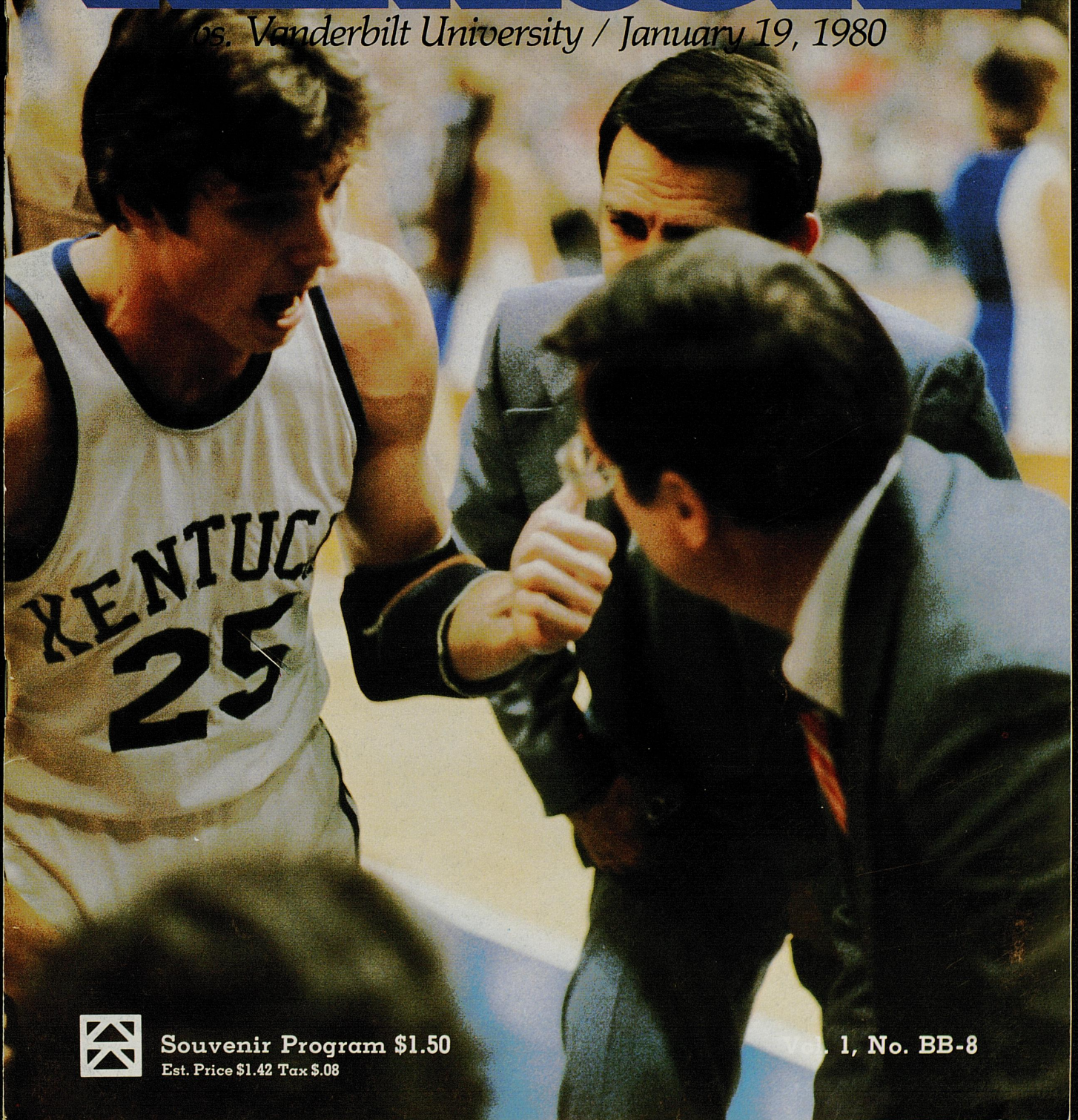

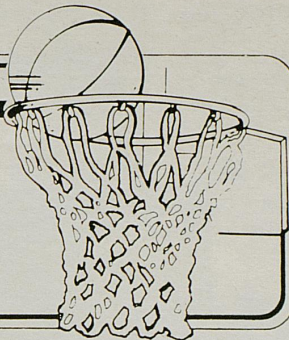

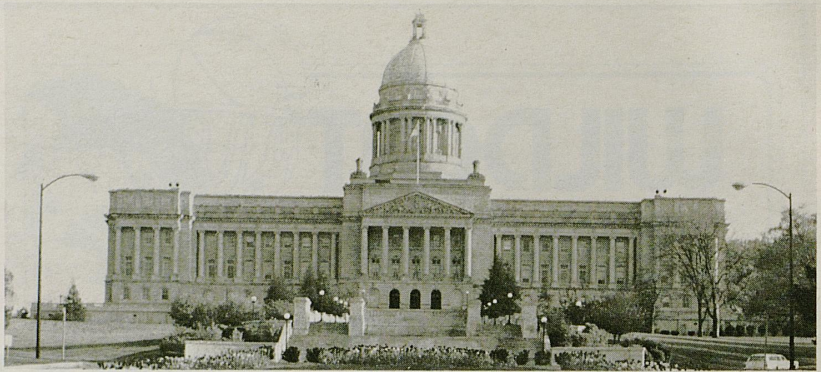

Governor of Kentucky**



JOHN Y. BROWN, JR., became Kentucky's 55th governor on December 11, 1979, succeeding Julian M. Carroll.

Born on December 28, 1933, Governor Brown graduated from Lafayette High School in his hometown, Lexington, and obtained a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Kentucky in 1957. He graduated from the UK College of Law in 1960.

The Governor served in the U. S. Army from 1959-1965.

He has been named the Outstanding Young Man of America by the National

Junior Chamber of Commerce (1965), as one of the Outstanding Civic Leaders of America (1967) and Louisville's Outstanding Young Man by the same group. Lions Club International named him to a recipient of the Outstanding American Award (1974) and he is the youngest person to be named to the University of Kentucky Hall of Fame.

He has three children, John Y. Brown, III (16), Eleanore (14) and Sandra (13). He is married to the former Phyllis George. They attend the Walnut Street Church, Louisville.

**JAMES G. AMATO
Mayor
Lexington-Fayette
Urban County Government**

JAMES G. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

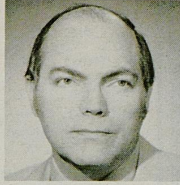
As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY President, University of Kentucky

The University of Kentucky has become one of the major institutions of higher learning in the United States under the leadership of Dr. Otis Singletary, the eighth president of the University.

Dr. Singletary was named president

of the University in August, 1969. He had previously served as executive vice-chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institu-

tion of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the nine years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 22,000 students on the Lexington campus and more than 17,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association, which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

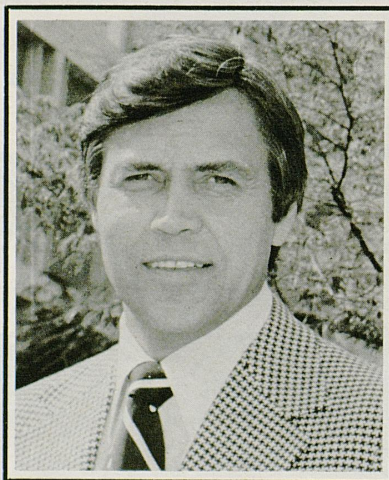
The Singletarys live at Maxwell Place, traditional home of UK presidents.

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Director

Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful player's lounge at Shively Sports Center, new carpeting in the stadium football offices, a new basketball office complex in Memorial Coliseum, re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a new surface for the running track are just a few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics since Cliff Hagan joined the Wildcat Staff seven years ago.

Recognized nationally as a progressive, business-oriented and promotion-minded administrator, Hagan has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of an ever-expanding operation that has encompassed 16 sports since the men's and



women's programs were merged in July of last year.

The merger, under Hagan's direction, has been orderly, with office space remodeled and in some cases created to make room for the women's coaching and administrative staff.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure

came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. The fruits of his labors in this area have provided the additional financial support that has elevated the UK athletics program into a first class operation.

Hagan was named Athletics Director in July 1975 following Lancaster's retirement.

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors last May when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, Laurie, Amy, and Kip.

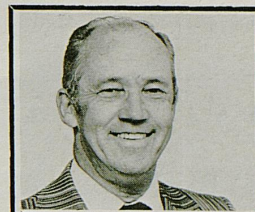
FRANK HAM
Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Michigan, and completed his undergraduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1951, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.



SUE FEAMSTER
Assistant Director of Athletics

SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1, 1978, with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the University as a graduate student in 1970, was named assistant director of campus

recreation in 1972 and director of women's athletics in 1974.

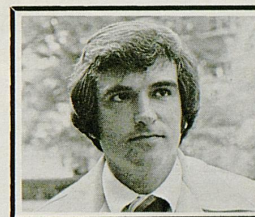
Feamster graduated from Franklin County High School where she was an outstanding tennis player and athlete. While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.



LARRY IVY
Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance

Adding a new dimension to UK athletics was the appointment three years ago of LARRY IVY as Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance.

Ivy, who came to the University as Director of Housing in 1969, is involved primarily with the administration and management of financial aspects, and develops and initiates policies for accounting procedures and related business management activities of the department.

JOE B. HALL Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his eighth season as coach of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which he took a team depleted through graduations and molding them into a contender for the SEC title and receiving an invitation to enter the National Invitation Tournament. The team finished with 19 wins and 12 losses.

Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 154 wins and 54 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 230-110. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6



LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his sixth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base, in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under

DICK PARSONS, in his eighth year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where

Three officials are here to stay

Three-man officiating teams for Division I college basketball was still under discussion two years ago despite having been around in some leagues for nearly ten years. Now, it seems strange indeed when a game is called by two officials.

The concept was begun experimentally to see if it would help the officials to stay on top of modern, high-speed college basketball. The results were positive so in 1979 the NCAA Division I Basketball Committee recommended its adoption for the NCAA tournament after a unanimous endorsement by the board of directors and officers of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. The NABC board is considered by the NCAA as being a representative of a cross section of the nation's leading basketball coaches and therefore a good sounding-board.

A survey taken a year ago showed that

nearly 100 Division I teams used the three-official concept during 1978-'79. Last season the concept was used by these major conferences — Atlantic Coast, Big Ten, Big Five (Philadelphia), Ivy, Metro, Pacific Ten, Southeastern, and Southwest. In addition, 20 major midwest independents used the three-man crew.

The Big Ten pioneered the three-man officiating concept on the collegiate level, conducting a limited experimental program in non-conference games in the 1967 season. The Big Ten conference has utilized the three-man format for over ten years with the exception of the 1974-'75 season. The Atlantic Coast introduced the three-man system in 1977-'78 and the other conferences mentioned adopted it in 1978-'79.

College basketball administrators, coaches and game officials have offered

several reasons for the rationale behind the three-man concept. Included are:

—It provides the coverage necessary for fouls, lane violations and sideline jump ball situations behind the tosser.

—Acts as a deterrent for hand checking and illegal use of hands by either the offense or defense.

—Provides the demanded coverage for a full-court press.

—All sidelines and baselines are covered.

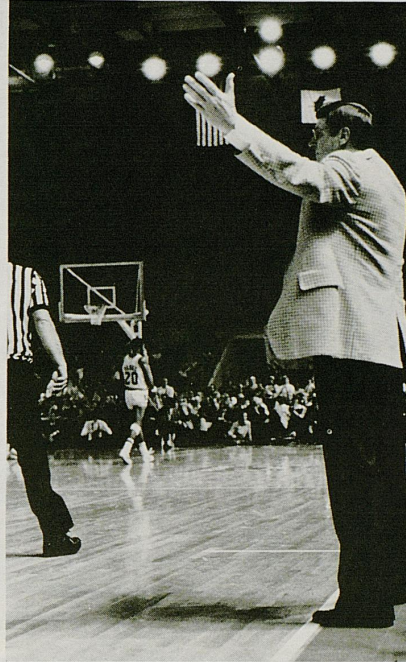
—Officials are not physically exhausted during the important closing stages of the game.

—And provides more effective bench and crowd control.

When the Wildcats and Notre Dame battled last month in Louisville, two officials were used, one from the Southeastern Conference and one from the midwest. Fans and journalists had grown so accustomed to seeing three-man teams that seeing only two men in striped shirts drew immediate comment. Television announcers for the game, discussed the situation throughout the game and caused the fans to wonder if the game would not have been played as physically had there been another official.

The three-man concept is here to stay. It was given long and careful consideration and evaluation and generally was

felt to be an improvement for the game. It is an improvement that has come to fit so comfortably that it is difficult for fans and participants to remember when it wasn't in use.

Expanding TV Services

It looks like a plumber's friend with its handle stuck in the ground. Some future civilization, puzzling over its function, might even surmise it was built as a bird bath for a pterodactyl.

Sitting in a land depression on Coldstream Farm, the 10-meter parabolic dish beams Appalachian Community Service Network (ACSN) programs originating at the University of Kentucky to RCA's Satcom I satellite. The signals in turn are reflected to cable systems and community sites throughout the continental United States.

It used to be known, until October 15, as the Appalachian Education Satellite Program (AESP) and confined in its service area to the 13 states of Appalachia. Now, the agency not only has changed its name to reflect its new role, but its services have been expanded "to meet the cultural and educational needs of communities throughout the country," according to ACSN program operations director Nofflet D. Williams.

UK Vice President Lewis W. Cochran recently praised the six-year-old UK television experiment "as the best broadcast instruction program that I know about." Although begun in 1972 as an experiment designed to test the effectiveness of satellite systems in delivering training and educational programs to 15 (later 45) locations in Appalachia, UK did not get involved until a year later.

UK received a \$1 million grant in 1973 from the Appalachian Regional Commission to develop an educational project using television to beam innovative ideas to teachers. Since then other programs have been developed, and ACSN currently telecasts a series of academic courses for credit in addition to a number of workshops and community service programs.

Williams says that ACSN "is serving as a leader and national catalyst in the planning, development and implementation of new approaches to public services and post-secondary education programs."

Access to cable systems came with the conversion from the NASA-supported satellite to the RCA (commercial) satellite. Many people seeking to participate in the classes or otherwise further their education can now receive the signal in their homes either through cable or through re-telecast by about 30 (four in Kentucky) site stations.

Instructional programs range from graduate, undergraduate and continuing education credit for professionals and paraprofessionals to specialized programs for parents, senior citizens, emergency medical and volunteer firefighters and owners of small businesses. College credit for successful completion of the telecourses is awarded by UK and 50 other colleges and universities depending on the type of program and mission of each school.

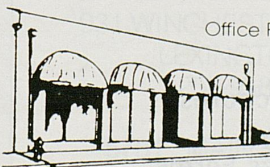
Workshops are designed to provide timely information or training for specific groups, and topics have ranged from home winterization to developing a small business. Workshop content is planned with experts at the federal, state and local levels who appear on the programs to answer questions on a toll free call-in system. Curriculum materials developed for the workshop also are available.

Telecourses have been offered for engineers, for teachers involved in mainstreaming handicapped children and for nurses working with older patients.

According to Cathy Hensley, who has been with the program since 1974 and is in charge of instructional design, the courses are augmented by a study guide, textbook and related readings. The study guide includes individual, group and field-based assignments thereby accommodating both home-based and classroom instruction.

Seminars, conducted four times during each course, provide a means of interac-

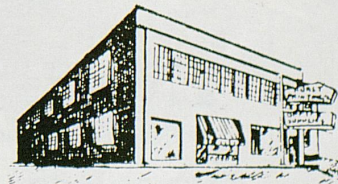

tion with the instructor and an opportunity to question visiting experts and practitioners.

Persons participating in the telecourses at home meet at a central location, usually at a regional institution, three to five times during the semester for required activities and testing purposes. Students meeting at a community site view an hour-long televised program and take part in two hours of on-site learning activities.

During the class organizational meeting, students register, purchase class materials and take a pretest. The classes are set up in cooperation with the academic departments and institutions involved, and with Jim Brown of the UK Off-Campus Office, if credit is desired through UK. Broadcast and taping facilities are provided by the UK Office of Instructional Resources.

A new programming feature is the community service segment which is intended to provide information on a variety of topics. Some of the subject areas to be explored include energy, inflation, the economy, arts and travel.

Presently telecasting each weekday from 7 to 11:30 a.m., next March 15 the service will go to 35 hours a week, encompassing the weekend. In September 1980 programming expands to 60 hours a week and telecasting will be seven days a week from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

With funding from UK, the National Institute of Education, the Appalachian Regional Commission and local sponsoring agencies which include community colleges, universities, technical institutes, educational cooperatives and other community agencies, there are more than 50 collaborating institutions in all.

Williams say that the overall management and administration of the network's

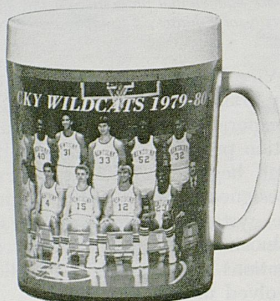
operation comes from Washington, but that much authority and responsibility is delegated to program operations at UK and to other universities and colleges. He adds that ACSN has shown how television can be used as an educational tool to reach people over a wide geographic area.

Among the program's successes which are cited by Williams is a workshop for volunteer firefighters and emergency personnel on dealing with hazardous ma-

terials which helped one Mississippi community avert a potential disaster.

Another is a program presented a few months ago that featured Dr. Michael E. DeBakey, the well-known Texas surgeon. He and Dr. Antonio M. Gotto Jr. were in the UK studios while viewers throughout Appalachia gathered in college classrooms, hospitals and other sites. Both groups were linked in a question and answer session by two-way audio communication.

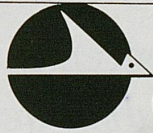

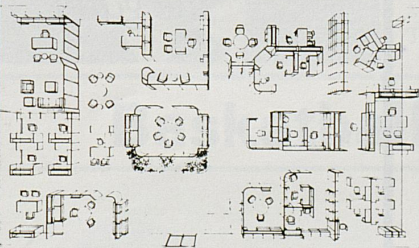

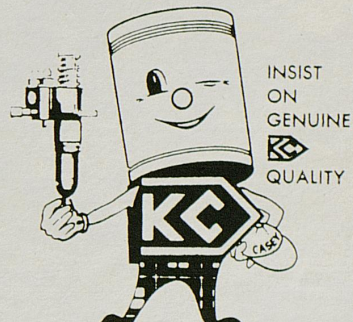
Basketball Trainer

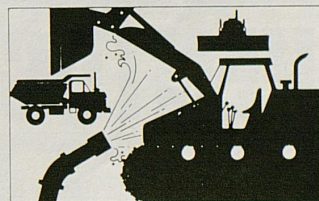

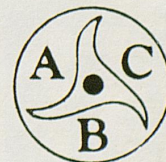

Arena Information

FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Pass-out" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all foods and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.

SIGNS

Signs and barriers are restricted in Rupp Arena in accordance with policies established by arena management and public safety officials.

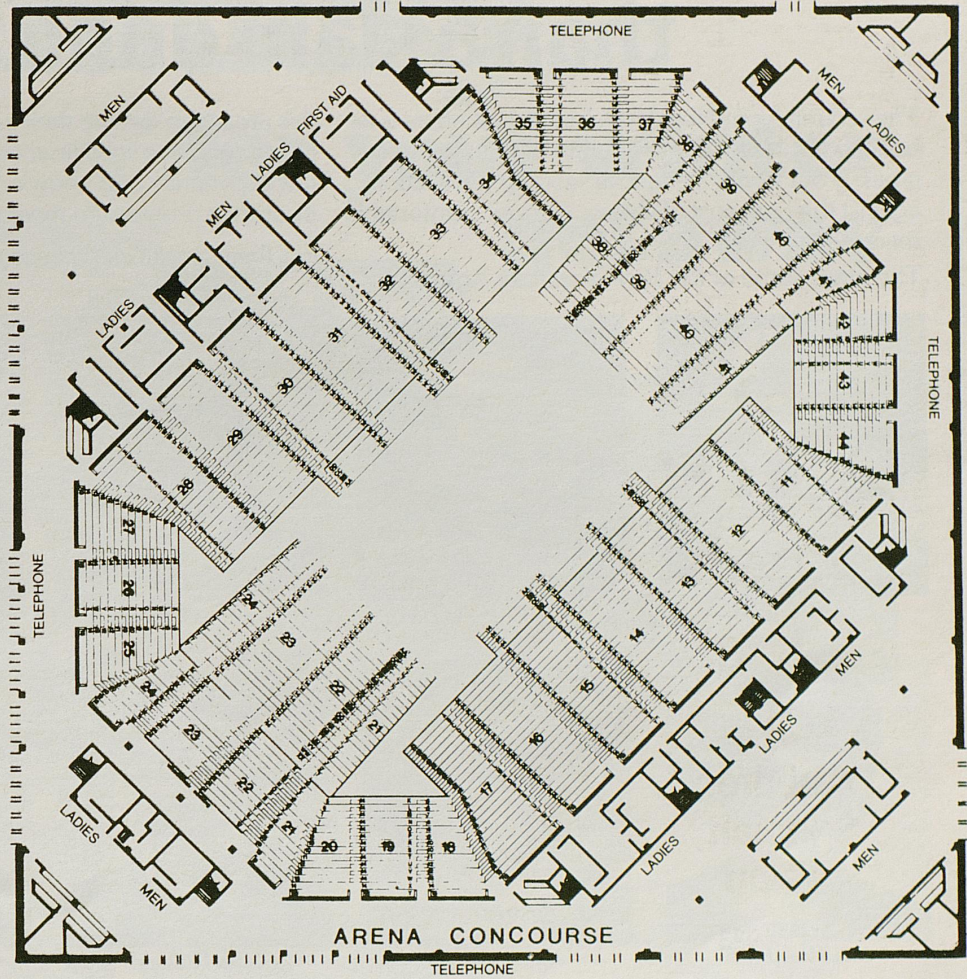
UK Student Code Of Sportsmanship

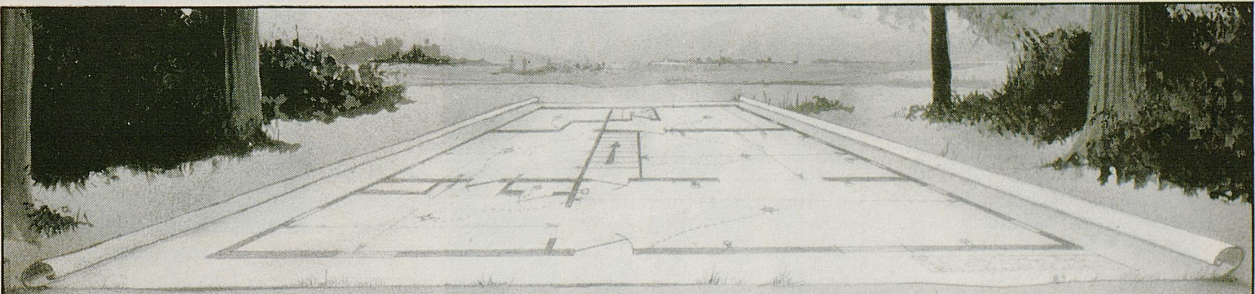
- (1) Winning or losing, an athletic team of the University of Kentucky will have our continued and wholehearted support.
