

WORKING TICKETS—Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. Tickets will not be mailed unless requested and will be held at the Press Entrance of Rupp Arena for pickup on game night.

PRESS DOOR—Entrance to the area set aside for press, radio and TV is Gate No. 5 on the Patterson Street side of Rupp Arena.

PRESS PARKING—At the time of publication, no reserved parking for press has been allotted by the Lexington Center. It is recommended those with heavy equipment arrive early, unload at Gate No. 5, and then find parking at the nearest available location. A public parking lot is located on High Street immediately across from the Arena.

PRESS ROOM—Located on floor level under stands behind visitors' bench area. Will feature work space with necessary electrical outlets and telephone service.

COMPS-No individual game allotment.

TELECOPIERS—Those persons desiring telecopier usage should supply their own equipment and advise the Sports Information Office of their intention so proper coordination may be made with the General Telephone Co.

RADIO BROADCASTS—Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the Jim Host and Associates, 512 E. Main, Lexington, Ky., 40508 (Telephone 606/252-5696). One free reciprocal outlet is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through Jim Host and Associates and the UK Director of Broadcasting, Mr. Pete Manchikes (257-2655). Working passes will be supplied approved stations by Sports Information Office.

SERVICES—Working press, radio and TV will be furnished game programs, brochures, running play-by-play, halftime quickie box and final statistics in the form of a complete, 12-column dittoed box score.

ARENA LIGHTING—Rupp Arena Lighting will provide 250-275 foot candle on playing floor with a mixture of incandescent and metal halide lights.

WILDCATS CARVE INCREDIBLE POST-SEASON TOURNAMENT RECORD

Since Kentucky made its first appearance in a major post season basketball tournament in 1942, no graduating class has ever missed the opportunity to play in either the NCAA or National Invitation Tournaments.

In fact, the Wildcats have an incredible record which has seen them miss only seven times (1943, '53, '54, '60, '63, '65, '67 and '74) in the past 32 years. Two of those misses were in 1953, when they sat out a season, and '54, when the undefeated National Champions won an automatic NCAA berth but declined the bid.

* * * * * *

The University has had only two undefeated seasons in its illustrious basketball history. The first was 9-0 in 1911-12, the other 25-0 in 1953-54.



DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY

President, University of Kentucky

Established in 1865 under provisions of the Morrill Act of 1862 as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky University, the University of Kentucky today has approximately 37,500 students in the 15 academic colleges and Graduate School on the central campus in Lexington and in its 13 community colleges.

In 1878, the school separated from Kentucky University and became an independent institution supported by the state, and since 1916 has been known as the University of Kentucky, embodying the functions of teaching, public service and research.

Situated in the famed Blue Grass region of Central Kentucky, the University maintains several research institutes whose work increasingly affects state and nation: the Tobacco and Health Research Institute, the Office of Business Development and Government Services, the Institute for Mining and Minerals Research, and the Water Resources Institute.

It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

President since 1969 has been Dr. Otis A. Singletary, who came from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs. He earlier had been director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity, and chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

He is the eighth president of the University. Unique recognition of his service to the institution came recently from the UK Alumni Association, which presented him its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.



CLIFF HAGAN Director of Athletics

The University of Kentucky basketball team's move into the new 23,000-seat Rupp Arena must be viewed with pride and sentiment by Cliff Hagan, who was a sophomore member of the Wildcat varsity that dedicated Memorial Coliseum in 1950 and who is now UK director of athletics.

After earning All-American acclaim and setting various school scoring and rebounding records, Hagan was an all-pro player, a radio color announcer, a pro coach and a bank executive before returning to his alma mater as assistant director of athletics in 1972 and then taking over the directorship in 1975.

The move into Rupp Arena complements the football team's move into beautiful Commonwealth Stadium during Hagan's first year as assistant AD and gives the University two of the nation's finest facilities in which to display its major sports teams.

This goes along with Hagan's primary aim of upgrading the UK athletic facilities, but he has gone beyond the two "revenue" sports, adding a press box to the baseball field, completing plans to enlarge Shively Sports Center and looking to the day when he can put on the drawing boards an Olympic swimming pool and a field house, which he says are "desperately needed for our program and our students."

Under Hagan's direct supervision, the Athletics Association, through the Blue & White Fund, has received more than a million dollars in contributions to keep the program operating in the black by carrying the burden of its grants-in-aid.

Part of those funds have financed a 110-yard Astro-Turf practice field in the Shively Sports Center complex. Other improvements at the Center include installation of open-air type lockers in the dressing rooms, and a planned expansion of the main building, with the size of training and conditioning rooms to be increased.

In his strong dedication to the scholar-athlete, Hagan continues to give the academic program support and emphasis. "I feel a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with an education and a degree," he said.

On the games side of the ledger during Hagan's first year as AD, Wildcat wrestling and rifle teams won SEC titles, the basketball team won the NIT, the baseball team won the SEC Eastern Division and the tennis team finished fourth in the conference. And the 1976 football team was a pleasant surprise, filling Commonwealth Stadium game after game.

Kentucky's overall total of 43½ points placed the Wildcats fifth in the tough

SEC all-sports standing, their highest finish in several years.

Hagan joined the Wildcat athletics staff as assistant to Harry Lancaster, with varied administrative duties, including creation and implementation of the Blue & White Fund for the then-new Commonwealth Stadium. He was named director of athletics in July 1975 while Lancaster, whose retirement was not effective until February of 1976, remained as a special assistant to Hagan.

Hagan's path to the athletics directorship began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafayette in the championship game of the

1949 state high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to

participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and scored a UK record of 51 points against Temple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among

the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world champion-

ship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

During his 11th year in St. Louis, Hagan did radio and television commen-

tary for the Hawks' basketball team and for Anheuser Busch.

He then joined the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate

player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Lisa, 20, Laurie, 18, Amy, 14, and Kip, 12.

FRANK HAM, Assistant Director of Athletics



Frank Ham became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as Administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Mich., and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet College. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached high school football and track at John Adams High in South Bend in 1944-46 and then returned to Olivet as athletic director and head football and basketball coach.

In 1962, he became assistant to the president at Olivet, with responsibilities in public and alumni relations. He was in private business from 1954 until 1968.

He is married to the former Rosemary Woods of Niles, Mich. They have two sons, Michael, of Raleigh, N.C., and Craig, a U.S. Army Captain, and two daughters, Mrs. Andy Hunsberger of Cassopolis, Mich., and Jennifer, a junior at UK.

Ham is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert B. Ham of Edwardsburg, Michigan.

LARRY IVY, Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance



Adding a new dimension to UK athletics was the September appointment of Larry Ivy as Assistant Director of Athletics for Finance.

Ivy, who came to the University as Director of Housing in 1969, will be involved primarily with the administration and management of financial aspects, and will help develop and initiate policies for accounting procedures and related business management activities of the department.

A native of Alabama, Ivy graduated in 1961 from Huntsville High School, where he lettered in four sports. He is a 1967 graduate of the University of Alabama, and earned his M.B.A. from Alabama in 1968.

He is married to the former Barbara Foster of Huntsville. They have one daughter, Kim, 6.

ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in ten different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the South-

eastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic pro-

gram.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Seventeen other members, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as do two student representatives.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic

program is Director of Athletics Cliff Hagan.

KENTUCKY BASKETBALL OUTLOOK, 1976-77

The Kentucky Wildcats are looking forward to the 1977 season with an eagerness matched only by the confidence they gained from a super finish last year which saw them run off 10 consecutive wins and capture the NIT championship.

From that grand finish has spawned a dual goal-to recapture the South-

eastern Conference crown and shoot for post season honors.

"Our future has to be bright," said Coach Joe B. Hall. "We start the season with a 10-game win streak and the NIT crown and we return almost intact from last year. The experience gained by an extremely young team- (youngest in modern UK history), along with our recruits, will go a long way in solving some problem areas we had last year. And a healthy (Rick) Robey could make us a contender for just about anything."

Analyze the experience—the most intensifying pressure found in amateur basketball—and you find Kentucky is unique to any other team in the nation.

In the past two years, the Wildcats have played in the NCAA finals and won the NIT, the country's oldest basketball tournament. What better experience could be found for a team whose nucleus is four juniors?

Hall will greet eight lettermen (four starters), while losing only three.

Heading the list is All-American and All-SEC forward Jack Givens, a silky smooth 6-foot-4 junior southpaw who led the Cats with a 20.1 ppg average while grabbing 7.2 rebounds. Givens scored in the 30's three times and was out of double figures only three times. He became UK's second leading sophomore scorer (602), and was named to the All-NIT team.

Holding down the center slot is mammoth 6-10 Mike Phillips, whose overall play showed vast improvement while scoring 15.6 ppg and leading the team in rebounding with 9.8. Phillips' single game highs were 35 points and 28 rebounds. He was selected to the All-NIT team, MVP in the Kentucky Invitational, and

second team All-SEC.

Back for his final year is 6-3 guard Larry Johnson, whose dazzling speed and ball handling made the press very ineffective against the Cats. The willowy but strong Johnson was at his best under extreme pressure and won three games with final second heroics, including a last second shot to down Providence in the NIT semi-finals. Johnson averaged 11.2 ppg and led the team with 98 assists. He was named to the AII-NIT second team.

The big question mark Hall alluded to—a healthy Robey—is the 6-10 fiery junior competitor who averaged 15.6 ppg and 7.5 rebounds at forward before missing the last half of the season with a knee injury. However, the knee has fully mended without surgery and Robey has been declared 100 per cent recovered.

Filling in for Robey last year was James Lee, a junior-to-be whose speed and quickness belies his solid 6-5, 230 lb. frame. Lee started 20 games and after a slow transition, blossomed into the powerful, explosive type player which was predicted of him from prep days. His best performance came when he scored 21 points and grabbed 11 rebounds as the Wildcats upset sixth-ranked Alabama 90-85 on national television. He finished with a 9.3 ppg and 7.3 rebounding mean, and was named to the All-NIT second team.

Merion Haskins, a 6-4 senior forward who saw considerable playing time, including two starts, is a solid fundamentalist and proven defensive player. Despite scoring only 2.3 ppg in 29 games, Haskins' leadership will play an

important role in the success story of the '77 Cats.

Rounding out the lettermen are two sophomore guards-6-1 Truman Clay-

tor, 6.0 ppg, and 6-2 Dwane Casey, 1.3 ppg.

Claytor capped a fine early season performance by winning Co-MVP game honors with Adrian Dantley in the annual Notre Dame shootout in Louisville. After starting eight games, he fell prey to a series of nagging injuries which

seriously reduced his effectiveness. However, he returned to form and had a good NIT. His future was clouded again with the injury bug, suffering twice from broken bones in his right hand during summer playground activity. However, "T. C." seems to have recovered and has been impressive during pre-season practice.

Casey saw action in 20 games and showed steady improvement throughout the year. He played a vital role in the NIT when he hit three quick baskets in the

championship game against UNCC.

The Wildcats' three losses are senior guard Reggie Warford, who started the final 20 games, averaging 6.5 ppg, freshman 6-4 forward Bob Fowler, who transferred to Iowa State, and 6-1 Joey Holland, who passed up his final year of

eligibility.

The newcomers to Wildcat camp are 6-3 forward-guard Tim Stephens of Stearns, Ky., the state's leading scorer at 35.6 ppg and 18 rebounds, 6-1 guard Jay Shidler of Lawrenceville, Ill., the state's top scorer at 32.7 and nine rebounds, and 6-6 forward-center LaVon Williams of Denver, Colo., the state's top player who averaged 19.1 ppg and 19 rebounds.

"Shidler is a true guard—an exciting player who will need little seasoning," said Hall. "He plays the type defense effective in college basketball, is physically

mature and has the skills to render an early contribution to our team.

"Stephens is a potential guard—and one who can play the big guard. He is a proven quick forward and will have the opportunity to swing both positions next year.

"These two players will give us the outside shooting potential we lacked last year. They should reopen our inside game by taking the pressure off our big

"Williams is a player who thrives on competitive situations. He enjoys making solid team contributions through his defensive and rebounding ability. He is a capable scorer, but contributions through other phases of his game seem more important to him."

With the emergence of Lee, the return of Robey and the addition of Williams, Hall will have a much more versatile front line than last year, when he was pressed at times to use a unit which measured no taller than 6-4 (Haskins,

Givens and Fowler).

"There will be times we will utilize both big men (Phillips and Robey) together, but we still can maintain quickness and flexibility with the experience of Lee and Givens and the competitiveness of Williams," said Hall.

JOE B. HALL Head Basketball Coach

Now in his fifth year as head coach of the Wildcats, Joe B. Hall stands tall as keeper of a tradition that began three-quarters of a century ago and has put the Wildcats at the head of the collegiate basketball field in number of games won.

Although he garnered no nationally ranked personal coaching honors last year, it was generally agreed that Hall did perhaps his best coaching job, guiding one of the youngest Wildcat teams in history to the National Invitation Tournament championship.

During his previous three years as Wildcat coach, Hall had received such honors as two-time SEC and two-time Coach & Athlete "Coach of the Year" awards; nominee for Kodak's 1975 "Coach of the Year" award; coach of three consecutive UKIT champions; coach of SEC champion and co-championship teams, and coach of the 1973 Mid-East Finalists and the 1975 NCAA championship finalists Wildcats.

He started last season without four senior starters—Jimmy Dan Conner, Kevin Grevey, Bob Guyette and Mike Flynn—who had led the Wildcats to the National finals. In fact, the only returning starter was Rick Robey, a 6-foot-10 sophomore center who scored over 10 points a game. Robey, who was to be shifted to forward, suffered a knee injury and missed 18 games. The other starters were a senior who played only 51 minutes in 14 games the preceding year, a junior, and either two sophomores and a freshman, or three sophomores.

As inexperience, a tough schedule, Robey's injury and lack of depth took their toll, the Wildcats dropped to 10-10 in late February. Out of the SEC race, they rallied to win all their remaining games, including a victory over conference champion Alabama on national television, before sweeping the NIT.

The secret of the 1976 Wildcats was a teamwork that included every player on the bench. Throughout the stretch run, Hall kept calling on different players

in key situations and each responded accordingly. This was true especially in the final regular season game, played in Memorial Coliseum, where subs rallied the Wildcats in a come-from-behind overtime victory over Mississippi State that allowed them to bow out of the Memorial Coliseum era with a victory.

And throughout the NIT, different players kept stepping to the forefront to take up the slack for the Wildcats, who were in an unaccustomed underdog role. That squad was the epitome of a Hall-coached team: a hustling, rugged defended

sive, driving offensive unit that refused to buckle under pressure.

With only Warford gone from that team and with Robey hopefully recovered from his injuries, Hall faces the ensuing season with a little more ammunition than he had a year ago; however, the schedule is difficult and the challenge in the conference is greater than ever.

Such challenges are second nature to a person who stepped into the shoes of the nation's winningest basketball coach (Adolph Rupp) and has kept the

Wildcats in the limelight ever since.

Entering this season, Hall's 10-year record stood at 155-92, excluding a 17-2 record on a 1974 tour of Australia, and that record was compiled against nationally ranked non-conference teams and teams in a conference that fast is becoming recognized among the toughest in the nation. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five-year mark at Regis, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 79-36 four-year record at Kentucky.

four-year record at Kentucky.

Hall began his tour as UK head coach in rather auspicious fashion, becoming in 1973 the first rookie coach in the SEC to be designated Coach of the Year by

his fellow coaches and by Coach and Athlete Magazine.

Gathering such honors has been one of Hall's trademarks during a coaching career that began at Shepherdsville (Ky.) High School in 1956 and continued through Regis College and Central Missouri State College before he returned to LIK July 1, 1965, as an assistant to his former coach. Adolph Rupp

During Hall's two years at Shepherdsville, the Cougars won a Mid-Kentucky Conference title and he was named "Coach of the Year" in 1958. He then served one year as a freshman coach and five years as head basketball coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo., where he was also athletic director and earned special recognition as coach of the champion independent team in the area.

While in Denver, he also coached the Capital Federal host team in the 1964 AAU tournament and was selected as head coach of the AAU Stripes in the

Olympic trials at Jamaica, N. Y.

His next move was to Central Missouri, where he coached the Mules (19-6) to their first MIAA Conference championship since 1951 and their first Christmas Tournament title in history. He was named MIAA "Coach of the Year" (1964-65).

A three-letter winner and team captain in both sports in high school at Cynthiana, Ky., he played freshman basketball and one year of varsity basketball in the "Fabulous Five" era at the University before transferring to the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., where he set a school single game scoring record and was team captain. Coach Lon Varnell, upon retirement, rated Hall as No. 1 of the three best players he ever coached.

After touring Europe with the Globetrotters in 1951, Hall returned to U.K. in 1955 to complete requirements for his B.A. and later (1964) received his M.A.

at Colorado State University.

Returning to U.K. again in 1965 as assistant coach and head recruiter, he was instrumental in adopting a running-conditioning program which obviously paid huge dividends as the Wildcats capitalized on speed and endurance to offset a lack of size and advance to the championship game of the NCAA Finals. Hall then successfully recruited six prep All-Americans, including all-time U.K. scoring leader Dan Issel, to form the nucleus of a varsity team that won three straight conference championships and was followed by a team that won three more consecutive SEC titles.

Hall became No. 1 varsity assistant and head freshman Coach to Rupp after Harry C. Lancaster was named permanent athletic director Feb. 1, 1969. His record with the freshmen was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshman Champions by the Basketball News.

During his first season as head coach, the Wildcats won their last nine

conference games to sew up the SEC title.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U.S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under Hank Iba at the Air Force Academy in July 1972 and is a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee.

He is married to the former Katharine Dennis of Harrison County, Ky. They have three children—Mrs. Rick Derrickson of Lexington; Kathy, 20, and Steve, 16.

DICK PARSONS, Assistant Coach

Entering his fifth year as Joe Hall's top assistant is Dick Parsons, a native Kentuckian who gained academic and athletic distinction at both the University and Harlan High School.

An organizer who goes about his duties with a flair for efficient productivity, Parsons is in charge of the pre-season conditioning program as well as handling scouting assignments and purchasing equipment.

Parsons returned to the University in 1969 as head baseball coach and before giving up that position to join basketball on a full time basis, molded a team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records.

He first came to UK in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan where he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

A consistent player who made few mistakes at UK, Parsons was known as a fine outside shooter and for his aggressive defense during three years as a starting guard. He scored a career high 21 points against Mississippi as a sophomore.

He holds the distinction of captaining two varsity sports at UK—basketball and baseball.

He was a two-time (1960, '61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler

award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

Holding more Wildcat baseball records than any other player, he was an All-Conference shortstop in 1959 and 1961, All-NCAA District 1960, '61, and All-American '61. He hit .400 his senior year.

He was an assistant football coach at Glasgow High School two years and baseball and basketball coach at Boyle County High from 1963 to 1968.

While working on his Master's Degree at the University in 1968-69, he scouted, recruited and helped with the Wildcat freshmen, later accepting a part-time assistantship in basketball in addition to his baseball job.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, 10, and a son, Ed, 13.

LEONARD HAMILTON, Assistant Coach

An energetic young coach on the move is Leonard Hamilton, who begins his third year at the University after a three-year tenure at Austin Peay State University.

A defensive coaching specialist who can demonstrate on the court as well as illustrate on the blackboard, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive philosophy.

A native of Gastonia, N. C. he lettered three-years in football and twice in basketball as a prepster. He was basketball team captain two years at Gaston Community College in Dallas, N. C. where he scored 54 points in one game, set a record for most field goals in a season, and was All-Region and All-Tournament.

He graduated from University of Tennessee-Martin in 1970, where he was team captain, led in assists and steals, most valuable defensive player, and All-Conference and All-Tournament. He was elected "Mr. Volunteer" by the student body and played in the Kentucky-Tennessee All-Star game.

At Austin Peay, he coached the freshman team, scouted and recruited. During his three years there, the Governors went from last place to first in the OVC, appeared in two NCAA tournaments and were nationally ranked in scoring.

He is married to the former Claudette Hale. They have a son, Lenny, 6.

JIM LONG, Assistant Coach

A native of Detroit, Mich., Jim Long joined the UK staff last year as junior varsity coach and scout on a part-time basis.

A 1965 graduate of Notre Dame High School in Harper Woods, Mich., he won two letters in basketball and three in tennis.

He completed requirements for a B.S. degree in Foreign Language (German) and a teaching certificate from the University of Michigan in 1970.

After a three year teaching stint at Grand Haven, where he was head junior high and assistant varsity coach, he returned to Michigan to earn a Master's degree in Secondary Education in 1974. While working on his Masters degree, he was junior varsity coach at Saline High School.

A veteran organizer of summer basketball camps, Long worked three years at Michigan's camp and twice at Kentucky's, serving last summer as UK's camp director.

In addition to his coaching duties, Long will lend his talents to recruiting and scouting.

A native of Lawrenceburg, he graduated from Kavanaugh High School where he played basketball for Ralph Carlisle and Fox DeMoisey. A mail carrier for U.S. Postal Services, he served in the U.S. Marines in World War II. He is married to the former Hazel Robinson of Lawrenceburg. They have a daughter, Karen 14.

JANE ROLLINS, Administrative Secretary—Handling the complex duties of the basketball office is nothing new to Jane Rollins—she has been doing it for over 21 years. A native of Lexington, she attended Sacred Heart Academy, Atherton High School and Bryan-Stratton College in Louisville, and the University of Kentucky.

He authored "The Wildcats: A Story of Kentucky Football," last year and "The Big Blue Machine: A Story of Kentucky Basketball" this year. He edits the K-Mens Newsletter and has been honored by that organization for outstanding service. He also was honored recently by WAVE-TV for "Outstanding Contribution to Televised Sports." WILDCATS FEATURED IN THREE GAMES ON SEC TV SERIES

The Kentucky Wildcats will appear in three games on the Southeastern Conference Television series, which enters its 13th season, and only the Wildcats can boast of having been featured at least three times each year.

Appropriately enough, the Wildcats open the series Jan. 8 against Vanderbilt at Nashville, and close the series the final two weeks, hosting Alabama Feb. 26,

and traveling to Knoxville to meet Tennessee, Mar. 5.

Alabama and Tennessee are featured three times, while four teams—Auburn, Georgia, Mississippi State and Vanderbilt will appear twice. Florida, LSU and Mississippi appear only once.

The nine-week series over a regional network again will be produced by TVS Television of New York. All games will be played on Saturday afternoons.

A double-header Jan. 15 will feature Vanderbilt-Florida and Alabama-Missis-

sippi State.

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Kentucky has won 28 and lost only 14, for a 66.7 per cent win average during the past 12-years. The year-by-year breakdown: Won one of three games in '65, three of four in '66, two of four in both '67 and '68, three of five in '69, all four in '70, three of four in '71, two of three in both '72 and '73, one of three in '74, all three in '75, and two of three in '76.

KENTUCKY IN THE SEC

Perhaps the greatest supremacy enjoyed by any team in any sport is reflected by Kentucky's basketball success in the Southeastern Conference since 1933. Against SEC teams in regular season, tournaments and playoffs, UK has annexed a record of 506 victories and lost only 104—a winning average of 83.0 per cent. The 'Cats have won 29 league championships and won over 60 team and individual records from regular season and tournament play. Only Tennessee, Vanderbilt, Alabama and Florida can boast of beating the Wildcats two in a row in the same season and only Mississippi State, Vanderbilt and Alabama are added to the exclusive club when the basis is widened to consecutive wins over two or more seasons. Kentucky's record against SEC teams since 1933, including non-conference games, is shown below.

Recalling the glory years of the UKIT is the return of two teams—Utah and West Virginia—which helped establish the Invitational as one of the country's top classics.

A highly ranked Utah team appeared in the second and third UKIT, losing three games by only 11 points. Kentucky defeated the Utes, 70-65, in '54 and

split two NIT games in '44 and '47 to lead the series 2-1.

Probably more excitement than any UK opponent ever has created occurred when Jerry West led West Virginia into the UKIT for a three year stretch, with the Mountaineers winning the title in 1957 and '59, and losing to the Cats in '58. The Mountaineers lost to Kentucky in the '62 and '64 tournaments also, and trail in the series 10-4.

Bowling Green is a newcomer to the tournament and has played Kentucky only once - a 63-61 loss in 1949 at Cleveland.

Basil Hayden, who became the University of Kentucky's first basketball All-American in 1921, coached the Wildcats during the 1926-27 season, becoming the first UK alumnus to return as coach. Forty-six years later, Joe B. Hall, who was on the 1948-49 UK squad, became the second alumnus coach at UK.

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James Park, who coached the 1916 UK basketball team for athletic director J. J. Tigert, was a three-sport star at UK, earning letters in football, basketball and baseball. He scored five touchdowns rushing against Earlham in 1914 for a UK record that still stands. Park played major baseball after graduating from UK and later was a noted judge and attorney.

RUPP ARENA-WILDCATS NEW HOME

Rupp Arena will afford the University of Kentucky its third basketball home in 52 years, and with its 23,000 seat capacity, brings a distinction as the nation's largest basketball facility.

An awesome structure in sight and scope, the arena is divided in two seating areas—the lower level features 10,000 fully cushioned, theater seats in block coloring of blue, red, orange and purple, offering a spectacular splash of color—and a upper level of 13,000 seats on epoxy-coated metal bleachers. The latter can be visually isolated to provide a more natural setting for small shows.

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Built by the City of Lexington, the Arena is named in honor of Kentucky's legendary retired coach, Adolph Rupp, and is the major portion of a \$53 million Lexington Center complex which includes a convention-exhibition hall, a 50-store tri-level enclosed shopping mall, a luxury Hyatt Regency Hotel, and a block away, the historic 1,200 seat Lexington Opera House, which was recently renovated.

The arena is fully air-conditioned, equipped with a specially designed, high quality sound system appropriately named "Big Bertha," and complete lighting for events and color television coverage. Special attention has been paid to such facilities as dressing rooms, service entrances and storage areas.

The Wildcats will command an exclusive dressing room 365 days a year, while other facilities include six team size and eight smaller units.

The portable basketball court, which lies on a concrete sub-flooring 118' beneath the ceiling, is $60' \times 120'$ and is made of a light shade of northern maple trimmed in Kentucky blue. The floor was specially designed to convert from the 94' length required for college and professional basketball to the 84' length for high school by simply removing two panels.


Four $35' \times 4'$ custom-made scoreboards are placed so spectators can see at least three of the boards from any seat in the arena.

The solid state, electronic scoreboards can be used for basketball, rodeos, wrestling, boxing, and track and field. For track and field events, they can record times to 1/100th of a second. Lighted information on the boards is colored balanced for television.

Four portable goals are on hand, with the two extras for practice and emergency backup during game situations.

Access to the Arena is by High Street, and from Main-Vine, through the Mall area and up to the High Street entrance by escalators. One main concourse contains all public facilities—concessions, telephones, water fountains, rest rooms, first aid rooms and security command post.


The concourse is color-coded with the arena being divided into four quadrants for easy seat location. The colors are red, blue, amethyst and green. The concourse is at mid-level, dividing the lower seating area from the upper level bleacher seating.

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



Coach Hall: "Kyle is a coach on the floor who can shoot the lights out. A year of practice and observing our system will season him like a two-year old Kentucky ham."

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
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MIKE PHILLIPS, 6-10, 235 Junior Center Manchester, Ohio (3/24/56)

The hustling crowd pleaser earned 11 letters in four sports-four in basketball, three each in baseball and track, and one in football . . . The muscular Shidler holds school records with a 21'21/2" long jump, and a 6'5" high jump . . . Named to Parade Magazine's and Coach and Athlete's prep All-American basketball teams, he led Lawrenceville to a 29-2 record last year and to a third-place state tourney finish . . . The Indians won the state championship when he was a sophomore, beating former Wildcat star Bob Guyette's alma mater, Ottawa . . . Set three state tournament records last season-48 points in one game; total of 157 points, which broke former 152 mark set by Dave Robisch in 1967, and hitting 48.8 per cent of his shots ... Tied school single game record 55 points set by his brother, Dennis, in 1970 . . . Led Lawrenceville to 103-15 three year record, scoring 2,183 points . . . His scoring-rebounding averages for that period were: 13.9-4, 27.0-10, and 32.7-9 . . . Twice All-State, he was named to no less than nine honor teams last year in addition to being selected the state's Player-of-the-Year by two major dailies . . . Named to the Louisville national Courier-Journal's "Super-5" team . . . Twice All-State Tournament . . . Selected MVP in the Dapper Dan Classic, hitting 8 of 11 shots and scoring 20 points . . . Scored 14 points in the Midwest Classic at

Currently waging a torrid battle with sophomores Casey and Claytor for starting berth... Coach Ron Felling... Arts and Sciences.

Coach Hall: "Jay is only a freshman, but don't expect him to play like one. He is a real hustler who will contribute offensively with his outside shooting and excellent team concept, and defensively with his strength and pride in doing a good job."

TIM STEPHENS, 6-3, 175 Freshman Guard-Forward Stearns, Ky. (6/16/58)

Recruiting the state of Kentucky's top prep scorer, Tim Stephens (who led McCreary County High School to a 30-5 record with 35.6 ppg) was no big hassle, because by Stephens' own admission, he "has wanted to play for Kentucky ever since I was big enough to play basketball" . . . Which all adds up to pluses for Kentucky fans and the Wildcat basketball program . . . A southpaw shooter who has an uncanny quick release, he is one of the finer percentage shooters to hit UK in some time...Played all positions in high school, but will be used primarily as a quick-forward and big-guard . . . A four-year letterman at McCreary County, he was twice All-State and a four-time All-District and All-Regional performer . . . He captained the Indians as a junior and senior . . . His four-year scoring-rebounding averages were-15-14; 18-15; 25.3-16 and 25.7-18-career totals of 3,211-2,157 and career averages 23.4-15.8 . . . Single game highs were 54 points and 26 rebounds . . . Scored in the 50's three times in the 40's 13 times...Scored 18 points in the Derby Classic, and played in the Kentucky-Indiana All-Star series . . . Joined a Central Kentucky High School All-Star group which toured Spain and Russia, winning tournament MVP honors in Spain . . . Coach Ralph Roberts . . . Arts and Sciences.

Coach Hall: "Tim is a perpetual motion scrapper with the marksmanship of a Kentucky squirrel hunter. He will play both guard and forward and will enjoy it the most when our opponents zone us."

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LAVON WILLIAMS, 6-6, 200 Freshman Forward-Center Denver, Colo. (6/10/58)

Perhaps the "quickest" jumper on the team is freshman LaVon Williams, who is above the basket at the blink of an eye . . . A dedicated player who thrives on defensive competitive situations, Williams has indicated in early practices he knows where the basket is as well . . . Overall ability and size will give the Cats a wealth of depth at forward they lacked last year ... Groomed into swinging at forward and center to give the bench more latitude, he is a dangergous outside shooter, but his real strength lies with his board game . . . Will shoot right handed in action, but can jump shoot with either hand . . . A first team Parade Magazine prep All-American, he also was named to Coach & Athlete and Coach and Scholastic honor teams . . . A threeyear All-Stater at Manual High School in Denver where he averaged 19.1 ppg and 19 rebounds as a senior, and 24.5 ppg and 15 rebounds as a junior... Led Manual to a 60-5 three-year record and to the 1976 state championship with a 22-0 record . . . Selected 1976 Four-Corners Player-of-the-Year (Utah, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico) . . . Won All-Tournament honors while playing on the championship team in the Sharon (Pa.) Classic, and played in the Midwest Classic at Dayton . . . Scored 28 points and hauled down 15 rebounds to win MVP honors in the Colorado North-South All-Star game . . . A graceful and swift runner, he lettered in track in the 440 . . . Coach Ed Calloway . . . Arts and Sciences.

Coach Hall: "LaVon is slightly built for a forward, but he has adapted to

the Kentucky style of basketball very well. We like his attitude on the floor—he plays to win and contributes in all phases of the game."



In a 10-year period from 1963-1973, Kentucky's 87.88 point scoring average ranked third nationally, topped only by Houston's 88.36 and Oklahoma City's 87.89. The Wildcats' 48.2 per cent marksmanship for the same period ranked fourth behind North Carolina's 49.2, Davidson's 48.7, and UCLA's 48.6.

ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

WHO WERE THE 'FABULOUS FIVE'?

The most frequently asked question tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), Wah Wah Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1948 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA title and went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games—helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the '48 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 on a record of 36-2.

WILDCAT MASCOTS HAD COLORFUL NAMES

Over the years, Kentucky athletic teams have been spurred on in efforts toward victory by numerous colorfully-named wildcat mascots. Records indicate the first animal was given to the University in 1921. Named "Tom," this live Kentucky wildcat died quickly from being in captivity and was replaced with "TNT." Other live mascots followed—including "Whiskers," "Hot Tamale," and "Colonel"—only to pass from the scene due to death or being turned loose in the mountains after they did not thrive out of their native habitat.

WILDCATS ADD TO A GREAT TRADITION WITH NIT WIN

Celebrating the nation's Bicentennial Year in grand style was the University of Kentucky Wildcat basketball team, which battled from obscurity in mid-February to capture the country's oldest basketball prize—the 39th annual National Invitation Tournament in New York City.

By downing UNC-Charlotte 71-67 for the title, the Wildcats extended a fantastic win streak to 10, enabling them to finish the season with a 20-10

record.

While the Cats were putting together their second straight 20-game win season, it was the third such accomplishment in four years for head coach Joe B. Hall, who without doubt, fashioned his finest coaching job as he increased his 10-year career winning total to 155.

Beset with injuries, a critical lack of depth, and a fuzzy-cheeked, inexperienced team, Hall juggled personnel with a slight-of-hand artistry normally

associated with a con man's "shell game."

After 6-foot-10 sophomore Rick Robey reinjured his knee Jan. 29 and was declared out for the season, Hall had only one player over 6-5—6-10 center Mike

Phillips.

Several times during the remainder of the year, Hall was to floor a frontline which averaged only 6-4. But by juggling starters Jack Givens and James Lee (Robey's replacement) with reserves Merion Haskins and Bob Fowler, he put together a group which scrapped and took the fight to larger opponents.

By stressing a tough defensive philosophy and demanding run-outs at every opportunity, the Wildcats gradually began to get the feel of cohesiveness, a vital

ingredient which was to bring them much happiness in the long run.

When Phillips suffered a sprained ankle in the NIT quarterfinals against Kansas State, Hall commented, "We'll just have to get out the bailing wire and

put him back together like we've been doing everyone all year.'

It was this type of doggedness plus a large portion of old fashioned discipline which produced an inner toughness that paid off so handsomely for the Wildcats—a toughness which turned them into an "alley-cat" type aggressor when their backs were to the wall.

A classic example of Kentucky's toughness and preparation came in the NIT semi-finals when Providence came from nowhere to take a 78-77 lead with only

seven seconds left in the game.

When the Wildcats huddled on the bench during the ensuing time-out, Hall took a deep breath, kneeled before them and calmly explained three options he set up for them. The pressure was unbelievably intense, but Hall's quiet confidence had a settling effect on his players as they returned to battle.

When Larry Johnson threw the ball inbounds to Phillips and took a return pass as he dashed upcourt, he was executing one of the options his coach had

laid out. It proved to be the right one.

Of course, Johnson's last second shot which won the game is history, but the Morganfield native further endeared himself to Wildcat fans who were tuned in on the UK Television Network when he described his length of the court dash and subsequent two-handed shot in a post game interview.

"When I was dribbling downcourt, I broke to the left of the free throw lane and I couldn't decide whether to shoot with my left or right hand, so I just used

both of them," he said.

Winning games in spectacular fashion is nothing new to Johnson, who beat Vanderbilt on national television earlier in the year with a 15-foot jump shot, and who scored critical points in the NIT wins over Niagara, Kansas State and UNCC. A strong (205 lbs.) and durable player, he led the Wildcats in time played (1,072 minutes) and has firmly established himself as one of the South's premier guards.

After the NIT awards presentation, a gleeful bunch of Wildcats were silenced as Hall entered the dressing room and held up his hand for attention.

"I have never been in a position like this before in my life," he said. "You have exceeded everyone's wildest dreams and it is a time for celebrating. But I want you to remember NOW that we got here because of discipline. If we are to continue the Kentucky tradition, it will be a disciplined one—that is my belief and I will never waver from that belief. When we get back home, your studies must be placed as top priority so we can be ready for next year.

"Some people have said this was a great ending. They are wrong. It is a great

beginning because the NIT championship IS only the beginning for you.

"Fellas, there is one person in this room we all owe more to than we can ever repay. Will our only senior, Reggie (Warford), stand up, and let's show him what we feel for him."

An explosion of shouts and back slaps resulted for several moments as Warford tearfully accepted the accolades of his teammates.

"Coach, I have the game ball for Reggie," said Givens, who passed it around

for team autographs.

It was an emotional but fitting climax for Warford's career, which saw him play only 22 minutes in three years. But his final year was to be quite different.

He shucked his bench status when he started his first ever game Jan. 5 at Alabama, and with the exception of the Providence game when he injured himself in pre-game warmups, started every one after that, with the Wildcats winning 14 of 20 games. But the gritty little southpaw saved the best for last, hitting seven of 10 shots to spark the Cats to the NIT title over UNCC.

Sitting alone on a bench, drained of strength and emotion, Warford looked up and said to no one in particular, "Now maybe they will remember me as a basketball player instead of a piano player," alluding to his reputation as a fine

pianist.

The nine day visit to New York proved to be an educational venture as well as an athletic winner. Members of the team and official party were treated to the usual sight seeing spectacles of the nation's largest city, including museums, cathedrals, skyscrapers, etc. But the most awe inspiring trip had to be the visit to the Statue of Liberty Friday after the big semi-final win over Providence. Other highlights included Broadway plays, an ice hockey game in the Garden, and the finals of the Golden Gloves, rated as one of New York's biggest drawing cards.

KENTUCKY RADIO, TELEVISION NETWORKS RANK WITH BEST IN NATION

Kentucky basketball has captured the imagination of fans throughout the country for years and the UK Radio Network deserves a large share of credit for popularizing Wildcat basketball into the far reaches of the East, Midwest and South.

Synonymous with the Wildcats is sportscaster Cawood Ledford, Sports Director of WHAS-Radio-TV, Louisville, who enters his 10th year with the network and 23rd year of covering Kentucky.

Assisting Ledford is Ralph Hacker, station manager of WVLK Radio in Lexington, who enters his third year as color commentator for the network after having covered the Wildcats for 10 years. Together, this broadcasting team brings all the excitement and color of UK basketball, both on and off the court, to a large radio audience.

Co-originating stations for the Lexington based firm of Jim Host and Associates, Inc., which owns broadcast rights to the network, are WHAS (840kc) and WVLK (590kc). Now entering its third year of a three-year contract, the Host firm has built up the network from 27 stations to a record total of 73 stations, one of the nation's largest collegiate basketball networks.

The UK Television Network enters its sixth year with WKYT-TV of Lexington as the Coordinator.

The Network, which handles delayed telecasts of Wildcat games in Rupp Arena and Freedom Hall in Louisville, covers a three-state area this year, including WOWK-TV in Huntington, W. Va., and WEHT-TV of Evansville, Ind.

Games in the University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament will be telecast live if both sessions are sellouts; otherwise, it will be on a delayed basis.

Tipoff time for regular season delayed games is 11:30 p.m., EST.

UKIT tipoff is approximately 9:00 p.m. Dec. 17, and the same time Dec. 18 if UK wins their first game. A loss would put them in the consolation game at
