

SAN ANTONIO — So you see this Utah team which has gone 30-5 this season: tall guys, good passers, good grasp of the 'team defense' concept, patient, well-coached.

"If the fans or media ... if they don't think we are a good team by now, then they just never would," shooting guard Drew Hansen said. "Kentucky is playing the best ball in the country right now and we have to rise to that challenge.

"I think we are capable of doing it."

The test comes tonight as UK (3+4) plays the upstart Utes for the NCAA Championship.

Making the trip to the Final Four this season has been a big surprise for Utah, a team tagged with low pre-season expectations after losing consensus All-American Keith Van Horn to graduation.

But the 1998 Utes relied on a roster of non-marquee players to move through the

But the 1998 Utes relied on a roster of non-marquee players to move through the season with just three losses and capture the Western Athletic Conference regular-season Championship, After an unexpected loss to UNLV in the WAC Tournament, the Utes have used a balanced attack and a slick stash of thoughtful defensive schemes to slide into the championship game.

Utah, which typically plays a man-to-man defense, used a 'triangle-and-two' defense



"We are able to use several dif-ferent alignments," Utah head coach Rick Majerus said of his team's defensive strategy. "I think it is difficult for you to say we'll do 'this,' because we have so many different looks."

UK head coach Tubby Smith has been impressed.

"I think Majerus has done a good job on his role, changing defenses," Smith said. "I can see (Urah changing defenses against UK). They do what's effective."

Also effective for the Utes of late has been junior point guard Andre Miller, who was named Most Valuable Player in the NCAA's West Region. He came to Salt Lake City from Compton, Calif., after receiving only a handful of scholarship offers, most of which were from so-called "mid-major" colleges like Oregon and San Diego State.

Though beset by test scores

which forced him to sit out his first season for the Utes via Prop 48, Majerus knew early on that Miller would succeed.

"This is a very bright young man and a hard worker who has demonstrated the fact that he will graduate," Majerus said. "He loves the game and loves to compete. I think (sitting out a year) gave him a deeper appreciation for the game — for life without basketball."

That numillingness to fail has

That unwillingness to fail has prompted Miller to become both a good student and a thoughtful floor leader who has been instrumental in his team's tournament run. He scored 18 points, 14 rebounds and 13 assits against Arizona and turned in 16 points and 14 rebounds against the Tar Heels Saturday night.

UK's recent tournament history.
For the past two seasons, Big Blue used the Utes to advance in the NCAA Tournament.
In 1996, the championship-bound Cars abused Utah 101-70 in Minneapolis to move into the Elize Eight. Last season, the Utes were more competitive but nonetheless lost to the Wildcats, 72-59 to advance to the Final Four.

# SGA Election complaint filed

Josh Robinson couldn't believe

Josh Robinson couldn't beneve his eyes.

As he passed a Student Government Association voting booth at the Taylor Education Building, he watched a would-be voter walk away without casting his ballot. The student was turned away five minutes before the site was set to elose.

The student was turned away five minutes before the site was set to close.

Robinson walked over to the pollworker and asked why the potential voter was denied. Robinson said the worker told him 3GA didn't have enough poll workers to continue operating the poll site.

At first, he thought the denial was an anomaly, but he got a rude swakening Friday morning.

News of the lowest voter turnout in a decade and four closed polling places pushed Robinson to the brink of action.

Now, the political science senior with no SGA ties is leading a charge to have the 1998 election results thrown out and force the organization to hold a second election. Robinson is filing a complaint petition with the SGA Elections Board of Claims today.

In a copy of the complaint obtained by the Kentucky Kernel, Robinson claims the election should be nullified because students rights were violated and provisions of both the SGA

students rights were violated and provisions of both the SGA and U.S. constitutions were ignored. Robinson's complaint cites a

ngnored.

Robinson's complaint cites a stipulation in the SGA Constitution that requires elections to be held on the eighth and ninth working days following Spring

Break as his primary argument against the legitimacy of the election.

The UK Office of the Registrar defines Spring Break as the 10th week of the spring semester.
Therefore, the Robinson argues that Tuesday was the second working day following Spring Break.

"Someone looked at the constitution and interpreted it to fit their purpose,"

stitution and interpret their purpose," Robinson said. "It's just ridiculous." In an emergency Senate meeting called to approve polling times and places earli-er this month, SGA senators and execu-tives debated two dif-ferent interpretations

senators and executives debated two different interpretations of the clause.

Graduate School Senator Michael Tomblyn attended that meeting and said SGA was forced to choose the lesser of two evils.

One side fought for the strict definition of 'following Spring Break,' which would have placed elections this week. Tomblyn said the strict interpretationalists expressed concern about voter turnout.

The winning side argued that Spring Break begins when classes end on Friday and used the fact that the SGA office operates during break to interpret last week's elections as constitutional. Their

argument was bolstered by a scheduling conflict.

The voting booths used to tally SGA elections were not available this week and would not have been available again until mid-April.

"I think it was a stretch to suggest that Spring Break started when classes let out on Friday, but I understand that it was not possible to put the election together in the week it should have been," Tomblyn said. Supreme Court case law to make its case that students were unfairly discriminated against on the basis of where their college is located or where they attempted

vote. Former SGA presidential can-

didate and College of Engineering Sen. Kim Glenn said Robinson's argument is valid. Glenn said the students' right to vote was completely ignored.

Glenn denied any personal reasons for agreeing with Robinson.

"I'm standing up for the students to protect the integrity of SGA and the election process as a whole," Glenn said. "(Yoting rights) are what this country was founded on, and if we lose them, we have nothing."

Voting booths at the College of Education, Blazer Hall and the Chandler Medical Center were closed for parts of the election. The UK Law School booth never opened.

Robinson's complaint blames the timing of the election for the mechanical miscues and personnel shortages that led to many of the closings.

Tomblyn said he's never seen an election go uncontested. But he said Robinson's complaint is the first one he's seen that stands a chance of overturning the election.

"My gut feeling is that for whatever reason, there were at My gut retening is that ror whatever reason, there were at least six colleges whose members were denied the right and the opportunity to participate in the electoral process," he said. "And what's really bad is these happen to be the colleges that are least represented and need a voice."

Robinson said his petition is not an attack on SGA officials or last week's election winners. "It has to do with following the rules," he said. "If they don't fol-low these rules, what's next?"




