State comes down on alcohol

Blood-alcohol limit lowered: State makes it 0.08 percent

Kentucky's legal blood-alcohol limit dropped from 0.10 percent to 0.08 percent Sunday and some UK students said they are supported by the support of the sup

While in middle school, Lewis said she watched the family of a boy in her class destroyed by a brother's obsession with alcohol.

alcohol.

"One day he snapped, and pulled out a gun during dinner." she said.

Her negative experiences with alcohol continued through important people in her life. Lewis' best friend, Jessica Martin, who is a student at Morehead State University, lost an aunt to drinking and driving. Lewis said her friend's mother, Mary, still has problems coping with the death of her sister even though the accident happened almost 20 years ago.

"It still haunts her today," she said.
It is experiences like these that experts hope to reduce by lowering the limit. Kentucky will become the 18th state to enact the 0.08 standard.

"I will tell you it will mean improvements in the alcohol fatality rates in the state," said Bill Kotsikas, the regional alcohol coordinator for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration in Atlanta.

The reduction is part of a new law that also cracks down on people who have open containers of alcohol in their cars and stiffens penalties for repeat offenders.

Opponents of the new law have argued that it will punish social drinkers rather than the hard-core drunken drivers they

say cause the most problems.

But Lewis said she sees no difference between having one drink or five.

"Even social drinking and driving is wrong, and many people can suffer from one drink as much as they can three," she said

said.

The new law does include some protection for those arrested for drunken driving. Those accused will now be allowed to call a lawyer before submitting to a blood-alcohol test and will be allowed to have an independent blood-alcohol test performed to aid in their defense. Previously, the law provided no such rights.

But Lewis said drunk drivers don't deserve any protection.

"It is very irresponsible."

FDA approves abortion pill

Women have a choice: New drug allows women an option to surgical abortion with rare complications, FDA says

The controversial abortion drug RU486 gained approval from the Food and Drug Administration Friday, but its approval among UK students varies.

The decision gives American women, for the first time, an option to
surgical abortion. The pill will allow
women to abort a pregnancy in their
own homes.

The pill will first be available in
about a month at clinics that have received special training but eventually
through any doctor who can ensure that
a standard abortion will be available in
the rare instances that the pill fails.

.

It should cost about as much as a surgical abortion, according to the Washington Post.

Elizabeth Glaser, a secondary education freshman, is prolife and disagrees with the FDA's decision.

"It shouldn't be made easier to have an abortion," she said.

Ryan Sumpter, a biology senior, like Glaser, said he is uncomfortable with the ease the pill brings to having an abortion, but figures that as long as abortion is legal, there is nothing wrong with the decision.

ed," Sumpter said.

The pill blocks action of a hormone essential for maintaining pregnancy. It has been used by millions of European women since it was approved nearly a decade ago. Anti-abortion advocates have fought hard to keep the drug out of the United States since it first appeared in France.

FDA Commissioner Jane Henney approved mifepristone based on studies that found it 92 percent to 95 percent effective in causing abortion.

Complications are rare; serious bleeding occurs in 1 percent of women. But the pill-caused abortion requires three doctor visits and, to ensure it is performed accurately, the FDA restricted its use to doctors with certain training and mandated that detailed patient-information brochures be given to every woman.

"Everyone was so impressed with the college students and young people," Broughton said.

UK's Panhellenic team won the award of the team with the most participants with 84. Awards were also given for the team with the most participants and largest donations

Every year in Kentucky there are 2,700 new cases of breast cancer. Six hundred deaths result from those cases.

While breast cancer is sometimes re-garded as an issue for older women, the number of cases hitting women in their 20s is increasing. Broughton said.

Nikki Martin, an accounting junior, had two lumps removed from her breast when she was 16-years-old.
"It really brought the issue close to home with me, it showed me that it can happen to me." Martin said.

Hundreds die in India Floods

NARPUL, India — Fresh flooding submerged
new areas in India and Bangladesh Sunday, forcing thousands more residents to flee in a region
where 20 million people have already been effected and more than 1,040 people have been killed,
officials said. At least 10,000 people displaced by

cars, rooftops of buildings, movie theaters or
gathered along roadsides in the North 24 Parganas district, 40 miles east of Calcutta. Officials
in India's West Bengal state said that 97 people
had died in flooding over the past three weeks.

Rebels romp on Wildcats

Simply 'phenomenal': Ole Miss grounds UK pass attack, puts on its own aerial display

OXFORD, Miss. — Romaro Miller threw for 238 yards and two touchdowns as Mississippi beat Kentucky 35-17 on Saturday night.

Miller, who was 15-of-25, threw a 36-yard scoring pass to Chris Collins and a 23-yarder to Grant Heard.

Ole Miss (3-1, 2-1 SEC) built a 32-point cushion in the third quarter before the Wildcats (2-3, 1-2) scored two touchdowns in the final nine minutes.

Kentucky did not penetrate the Ole Miss 10 until the fourth quarter and was held to a season-low 231 yards in total offense.

enal," Ole Miss coach David Cutcliffe said. "Getting the lead from the beginning was critical and I was really pleased with our physical play on both sides of the ball."

The Rebels limited Kentucky's Jared Lorenzen to 17-0-f-2 passing for 192 yards and three interceptions. Lorenzen entered the game averaging an SEC-leading 351 yards.

"You've got to come out and be ready to play and we didn't." Kentucky coach Hal Mumme said. "Ole Miss whipped us physically and they aren't that much better than us physically."

"Bring back the rings," screamed Malena Cordera, a law clerk who watched in rapt amazement Sunday night with a more than a million others. "I miss them already."

Across the water, real estate mogul Peter Kampfer beamed with pride when Juan Antonio Samaranch pronounced Sydney 2000 the "best games ever." This time, he knew, the venerable Olympics czar was not exaggerating.

"I'm speechless," said





Abortion pill, a safer alternative

Women's health is protected by a method of abortion far safer than the traditional surgery

Last Friday the Food and Drug Administration decided to give American women the right to have an alternative to surgical abortion. The controversial abortion pill also known a RU-486 is

abortion. The controversial abortion pill also known a RU-486 is expected to be available to women in the United States sometime within the next month. The price is expected to be comparable to a surgical abortion, roughly \$300 to \$500.

RU-486, better known to the public as Mifeprex, has been debated as a safer, more effective alternative to that of surgical abortion. The pill is expected to transform the experience of abortion for woman with the possibility of demonstrating personal rights while avoiding hostile environments outside of clinics.

Advocates of the drug had hoped to place greater restrictions on the drug's availability. However, such limits as certain doctor

on the drug's availability. However, such limits as certain doctor

all requirements were dropped.

Thus the outcome of RU-486's use is in the fact that although it will not be available by-way of pharmacy, doctors are not required to be on a set registry.

This also includes that doctors are not required to be licensed in the area of performing surgical abortions

Evidence shows that RU-486 is the most effective form of abor-tion known to date. It has also proven to be far safer for women than surgi-cal abortions. This is due to the fact that surgical abortions can cause ster

ilization, possible disfigurement and even death if infection is not treated properly after the abortion takes place. RU-486 has showed positive effects in its

current use in Europe as well as China and Israel.

Palestinian death toll continues to rise

JERUSALEM — Palestinian gunmen, cheered by rioters, fired on Israeli troops from rooftops and abandoned buildings Sunday in clashes across the West Bank and Gaza Strip. Nine Palestinians were killed when Israelis returned fire, for a total of 29 in three days of blood-shed over a contested Jerusalem shrine.

An Israeli border policeman was critically wounded and lay trapped for hours in a tiny Israeli enclave in the West Bank town of Nablus. Medics eventually got through, but the officer died Sunday night.

The latest fighting came as Israeli and Palestinian peace negotiators traded harsh accusations instead of new ideas on how to solve their disputes.

The deadline shart and Gaza Strip, Israeli troops fired anti-tank missles, hurled grenades and shot from helicopter gunships.

The deadliest battle was waged in Nablus over Joseph's Tomb, a tiny Israeli-controlled enclave smaller than a city block. An Israeli soldier shot from a lookout post, with only the top of his helmet and his weapon visible. Palestinian gumen, some in black ski masks, raced up to the wall and fired into the compound where some Jews believe the biblical patrianch and the proposed of the palestinian fleeing for cover. The army said the helicopters were brought in to rescue the wounded Israeli officer.

"This is a holy struggle," aid Mahmoud Jamal, one of the Palestinian demonstrators who was injured in the face as he and others tried to break down the gate of Joseph's Tomb, which was retained by Israel after it withdraw its troops from the city and other Palestinian towns in 1986.

in 1985. Three Palestinians were killed in the fight, including a 12-year-old boy. Six more Palestinians died in clashes elsewhere in the West Bank and Gaza. The Palestinian Health Ministry said 223 Palestinians were wounded, including five who were in critical condition.




