Dr. W. D. Funkhouser, Chairman of the Committee on University Extension, reported to the Senate that the State Superintendent of Public Instruction had requested the Department of University Extension to conduct class instruction in high school subjects in centers over the State as an emergency measure, to aid the teachers in complying with the provisions of the new law. Whereupon it was moved and carried that the Senate approve of the plan wholly as an emergency measure in the interest of service to the State and that the details of the execution of the plan be left to the Committee on University Extension.

MINUTES OF THE SENATE MONDAY FEBRUARY 14, 1921

The Senate met in the Little Theater Monday, February 14, President MoVey presiding.

The minutes of January 10 and Council minutes of January 7, 14, 21 and 28 read and approved.

The following recommendation of the Discipline Committee, in regard to the Senior Court, was read and approved:

"After a thorough and rather prolonged investigation into the origin, function and operation of the "Senior Court" and its relations with W. K. Berryman, and after hearing all witnesses suggested by the parties concerned and a careful consideration of the whole affair, the Discipline Committee desires to make the following recommendations:

1. That the Senior Court be abolished
2. That Mr. Berryman be placed on probation for one semester
3. That, if there be a real desire expressed on the part of the student body for a representative council which would act under faculty supervision, as is done at many institutions, the faculty show itself sympathetic and ready to cooperate."

The following recommendation of the Social Committee, in regard to the organization of a chapter of the Scabbard and Blade, was read and approved:

"In compliance with your request of February 10, 1921, the Social Committee has investigated the plans and purposes of the Scabbard and Blade Society and desires to recommend to the Council its approval of the organization.

Senate, Feb. 14 -2

The request of the Home Economics Department to change the credit of Home Economics 62 from three to six credits was approved. The course under the new plan will consist of one lecture and two conferences, practice teaching for the whole semester in foods of one recitation and one laboratory period each week.

The following recommendations from the Engineering College were approved:

1. Course in Health and Hygiene for freshmen in College of Engineering, for year 1921-22, One hour a week throughout the year. To be given at the eighth hour on some day to be determined later by the faculty of the College of Engineering.

Permission to be excused from the course in health and hygiene may be given to certain worthy students, who in the judgment of a committee, composed of Doctor Holmes and another person selected by the faculty of the College of Engineering."

2. Drawing, primarily for Industrial Chemists;

Drawing 2a (4 hours per week, 1.3 credits for the first semester of the freshman year) and Drawing 2b (4 hours per week, 1.3 credits for the first semester of the sophomore year).

The following recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences were approved:

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| A rt 12 | - Clay Modeling. Four hours laboratory a week. Two credits. Miss Bates. |
| English 29 | - Evaluation of Magazines. Discussion of the material published at various periods in a few of the most important periodicals. One hour a week. First semester. Miss Allen. |
| English 119a | - Literature for Engineers. A study of the master pieces of literature with the special aim of relating the results of science "to the need in man for conduct and the need in him for beauty." Some technical appreciation required in theme work. Three hours a week. Two credits. First semester. Professor Farquhar. |
| English 119b | - Literature for Engineers. Continuation of 119a. Three hours a week. Two credits. Second semester. Professor Farquhar. |

- ↓ Mathematics 108 - Higher Algebra. Three hours a week.
- ↓ Econ. & Soc. 159 - Applied Sociology. Family Welfare. Three lectures a week. Three credits.
- ↓ Econ. & Soc. 160 - Applied Sociology. Family case work. Six hours field or laboratory work per week. Two credits.
- ↓ Econ. & Soc. 161 - Applied Sociology. Community Organization. Three lectures a week. Three credits.
- ↓ Econ. & Soc. 162 - Applied Sociology. Community Field Work. Six hours per week. Two credits."

The Senate approved the recommendation of the Committee on Rules that that part of the Senate Rules which specifies that drill be held the fifth hour be repealed, the understanding being that the work of the department of Military Science will be distributed to suit the needs of the various colleges.

After a general discussion of the automatic rule eliminating delinquent students, it was voted to authorize the President and the Registrar for this semester to review the cases of students who have been sick ~~or who had to~~ * ~~work their way through school~~ and allow the students to continue in school if in their judgment it is thought best; also to allow those students having an 'I' or an 'X' the privilege of an examination.
