Dear Mamma:-

Your two letters here and I had better begin answering them, or you will think that I have gone to join Villa.

I am sure that I wrote you that I had received the fruit the same day it came, or the next. I did not find the stockings and trouters until a days or so after. When the fruit came, I thought it was all fruit and so did not fully unpack it until your letter came with the list of things contained.

I could get up and hunt up the exact date, but had better take advantage of not having to do anything and write as much as I can before I am interrupted by something or other. I do not think the circulating library would appeal to the members of the Club. Personnaly I would not want to join because I would rather put in my spare time on Spanish.

We are well stocked up on night gowns, stockings, and I have plenty of everyday dresses which I am going to wear out this winter. I get a half dozen Holeproof stockings at a time and they last me six months without darning and six months with darning, making a year in all.

I think the best way to run your illusive grandfather to earth, is to put the matter in the hands of someone who makes a business of hunting up such things.
