Fine Accomplishment

Next year's program sponsored jointly by the University, the Lexington Public Forum and the Central Kentucky Community Concert Association is by far the most ambitious cultural advance

Concert Association is by far the most ambitious cultural advance made here in many years.

Bringing such famous persons as Jascha Helfetz, Arthur Rubenstein, Charles Laughton, James Melton and Eleanor Roosevelt to the Memorial Coliseum is not its only advantage. The admission prices offered the general public, and especially the students of the University, are almost unbelievable. In addition, the program should serve to prove to skepties who have frowned upon such a large espenditure as that made on the fieldhouse for athletics that the building will in the future be of great importance in other activities as well.

Besides the important personalities which the group has engaged for next season, three famous musical organizations of large size will also appear. The London Phillarmonic orchestra is probably the best-known in the world and is certainly one of the best. The Don Cossack chorus has become famous for its recordings of Meadowlands' and other songs, and the Dallas Symphony has aroused nation-wide attention because of its unprecedented success.

A community concert, at which the program was announced, chuckled appreciatively when UK's most popular professor, R. D. McIntyre, said the admission price for each performance would amount to about 66c. But he referred to general admission season tickets at \$7:20 each. UK students will be admitted free upon presentation of student activity books or identification cards, the cost of which is covered by registration fees.

Certainly the three organizations which have co-operated so well in preparing this program are to be congratulated and sincerely thanked by every University student.

Time To Quit

Nore and more students are bringing it to our attention that the furniture and interior woodwork and walls of campus buildings are being defaced with alarming indifference.

Since there is practically no way in which such action can be suppressed, short of actually catching the person in the act of whitting, writing or generally messing up the property, the only way to improve the situation would seem to be an appeal to common sense.
