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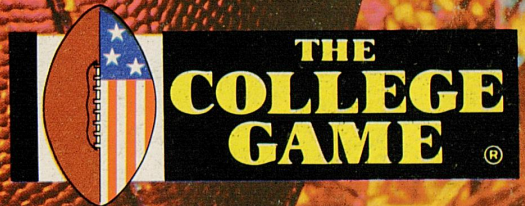

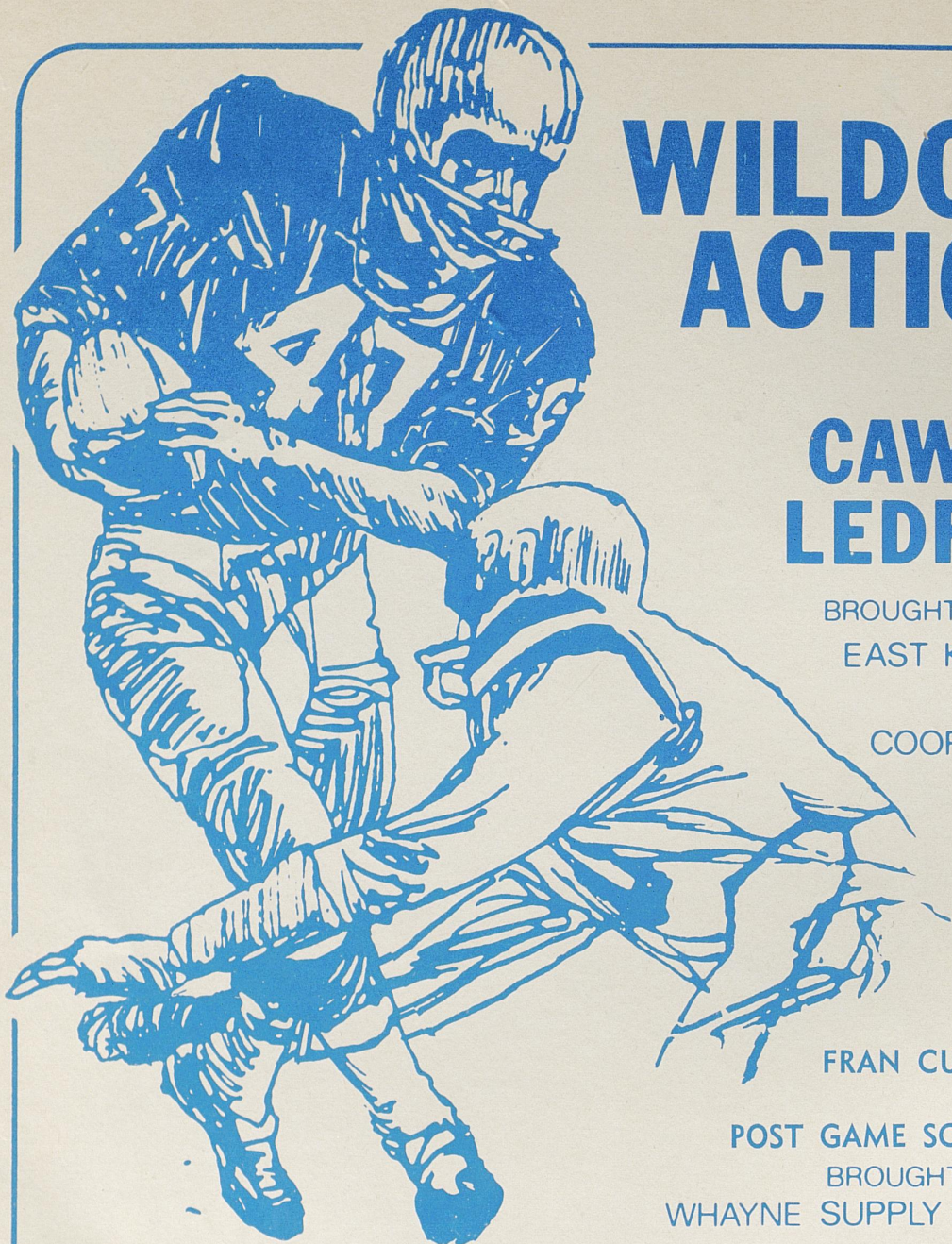

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For the old Kentucky home, far away.

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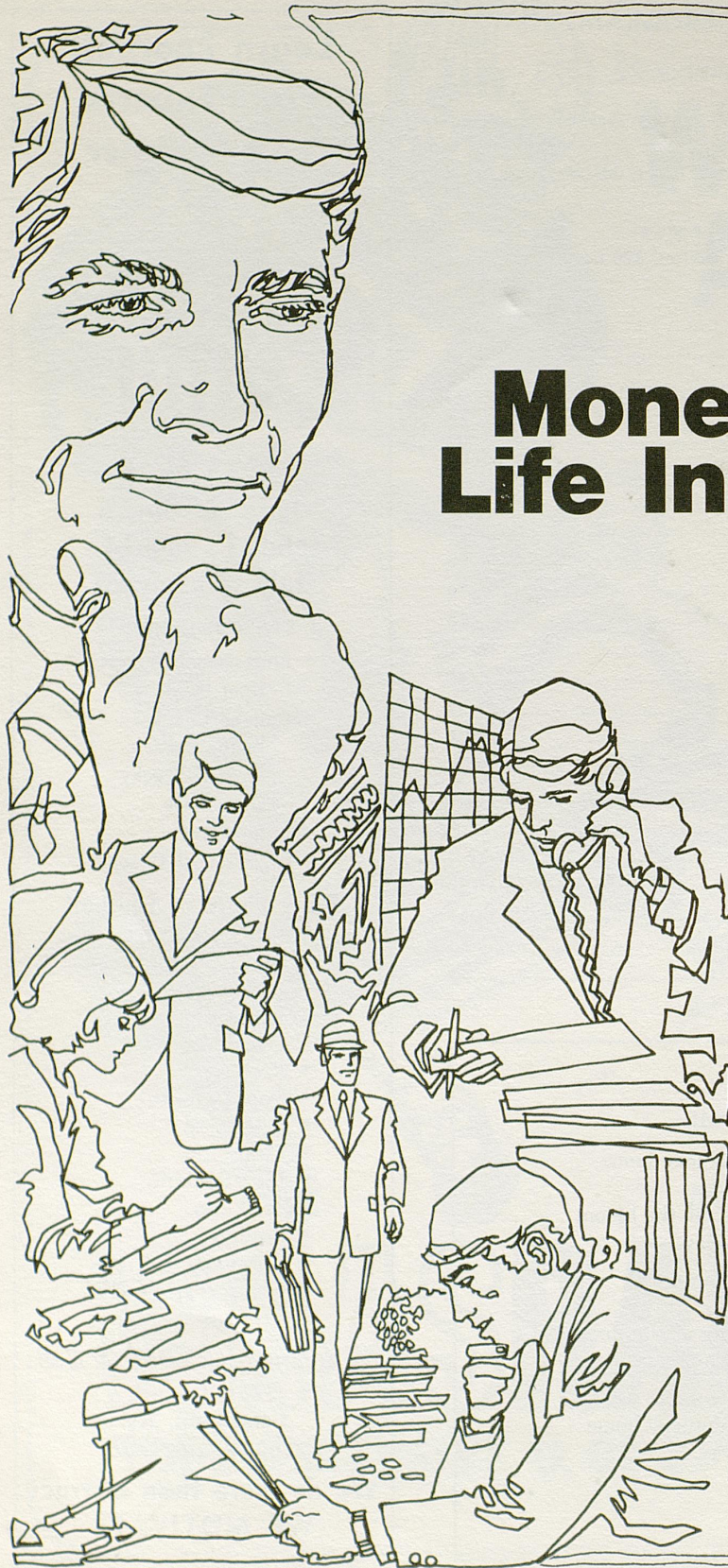
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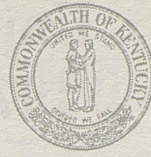
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WENDELL H. FORD
Governor of Kentucky

Kentucky's 57th governor was a prime mover, as lieutenant governor and a member of the State Property and Buildings Commission last year, of the drive to provide a new football stadium for the University of Kentucky. A native of Owensboro, he is a veteran of World War II and attended the University of Kentucky before graduating from the Maryland School of Insurance. He has been a member of the President's Council on Youth Fitness, National Council for Religion in American Life, Kentucky Council of Education and the Second Army Advisory Committee. An active Jaycee in his earlier years, he was director, vice president and president of the Owensboro Jaycees and vice president and president of the National Jaycees and vice president of the North American Jaycees. He has represented the Eighth District in the Kentucky Senate and was chief assistant to Gov. Bert Combs in 1959-61.

Scouting Report

Game Two ALABAMA

UNIVERSITY OF ALABAMA—Tuscaloosa, Ala. Crimson Tide. Crimson and White. Campus Enrollment 13,564. President—Dr. David Mathews. Athletic Director and head football coach Paul Bryant. Publicity—Asst. Athletic Director Charley Thornton (205) 348-6084.

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats have managed only one victory and a tie in 27 games since the series with Alabama began in 1917. The Tide got off to a fine start then, blasting the 'Cats, 28-0, on old Stoll Field. Kentucky came back five years later with a 7-0 decision at home. Alabama won 16 consecutive games before U.K. gained a 7-7 tie in 1939 at Birmingham. The Tide won seven more consecutive games before the series was interrupted in 1947, and then started the renewal off with a 35-0 victory last year.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 23, 1972 (Birmingham) UA 35, UK 0—Two glaring U.K. mistakes—a fumble and a pass interception—before 71,433 fans at Legion Field had hardly settled in their seats sparked the Tide. The Wildcats turned the ball over on their first two series, with Bama converting both mistakes into touchdowns. Terry Davis ran the option to perfection, passing for two TDs and running for another. Fullback Steve Bisceglia scored twice, once on a pass from Davis and again on a 10-yard run. Gary Rutledge, Davis' understudy, passed to Ralph Stokes for the final TD late in the game.

THE TIDE: Selected in all pre-season polls as one of the favorites for the Southeastern Conference crown, Alabama got off to a roaring start Saturday by defeating California, 66-0, equaling the Tide's previous high victory margin set in a 1961 rout of Richmond.

The big surprise was the utilization of the Wishbone as a passing offense, stunning California with scoring plays of 32, 16, 46 and 86 yards. Quarterback Richard Todd, handling the option to perfection, rushed for 105 yards in seven carries and threw two TD passes. Gary

Rutledge threw the other two. Sophomore Joe Dale Harris caught the two longer ones.

California's heralded quarterback Vince Ferragamo was effective at times passing, but each mini-drive was halted on interceptions and the Tide defense, led by linebacker Woodrow Lowe, almost completely shackled the Golden Bears.

In utilizing 73 men, Coach Paul Bryant also displayed tremendous depth as the subs continued to run up the score.

On each of the Tide's scoring passes, the pass catcher was wide open—three times in the end zone. In addition to Harris, scoring tosses were caught by Johnny Sharpless and George Pugh.

TODAY'S GAME: Kentucky will have its hands full in defending Alabama's Wishbone, which in essence is a four-back offense built around fine personnel.

The first task is to stop fullback Wilbur Jackson, who is the beginning of each play off the formation.

Known basically as a non-passing option, the Wishbone was turned into an impressive aerial formation in the Tide's rout of California, posing another big headache for the Wildcats, who gave up 185 passing yards (17 of 38) and two TD passes to aerial-minded VPI.

The Tide will gear its defense to stop premium Wildcat runner Sonny Collins, who gained 80 yards in 11 carries and scored a TD against VPI. Quarterback Ernie Lewis had a fine day against the Gobblers, gaining 83 yards rushing and 125 passing, while Doug Kotar showed flashes of brilliance in gaining 53 yards.

James (Bubba) McCollum is a formidable problem for Bama to solve at nose-guard and Darryl Bishop comes off a good game at safety against Tech.

Alabama undoubtedly will be favored heavily, but the Wildcats also are coming off a fine performance and should correct their opening game mistakes.

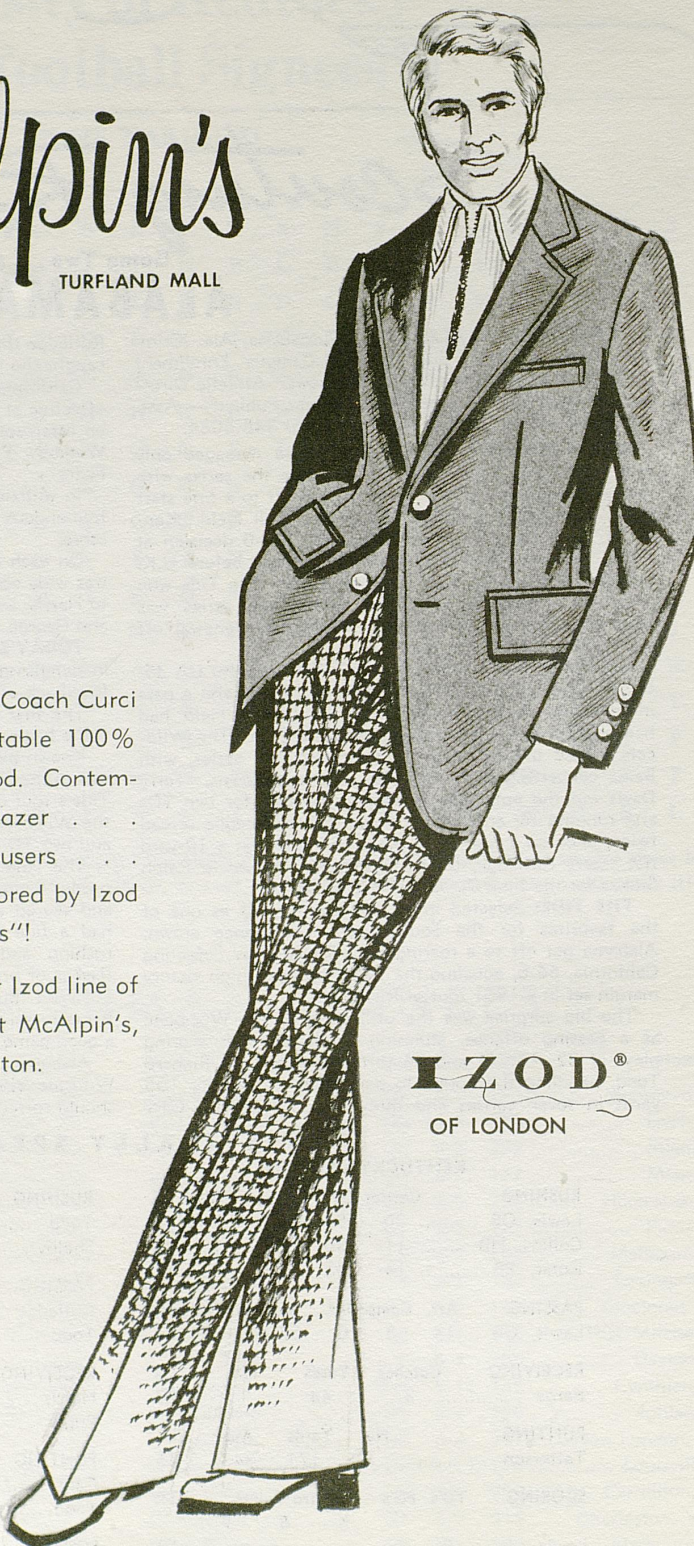

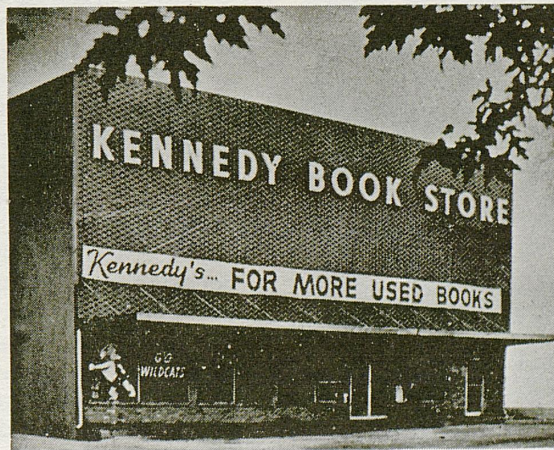

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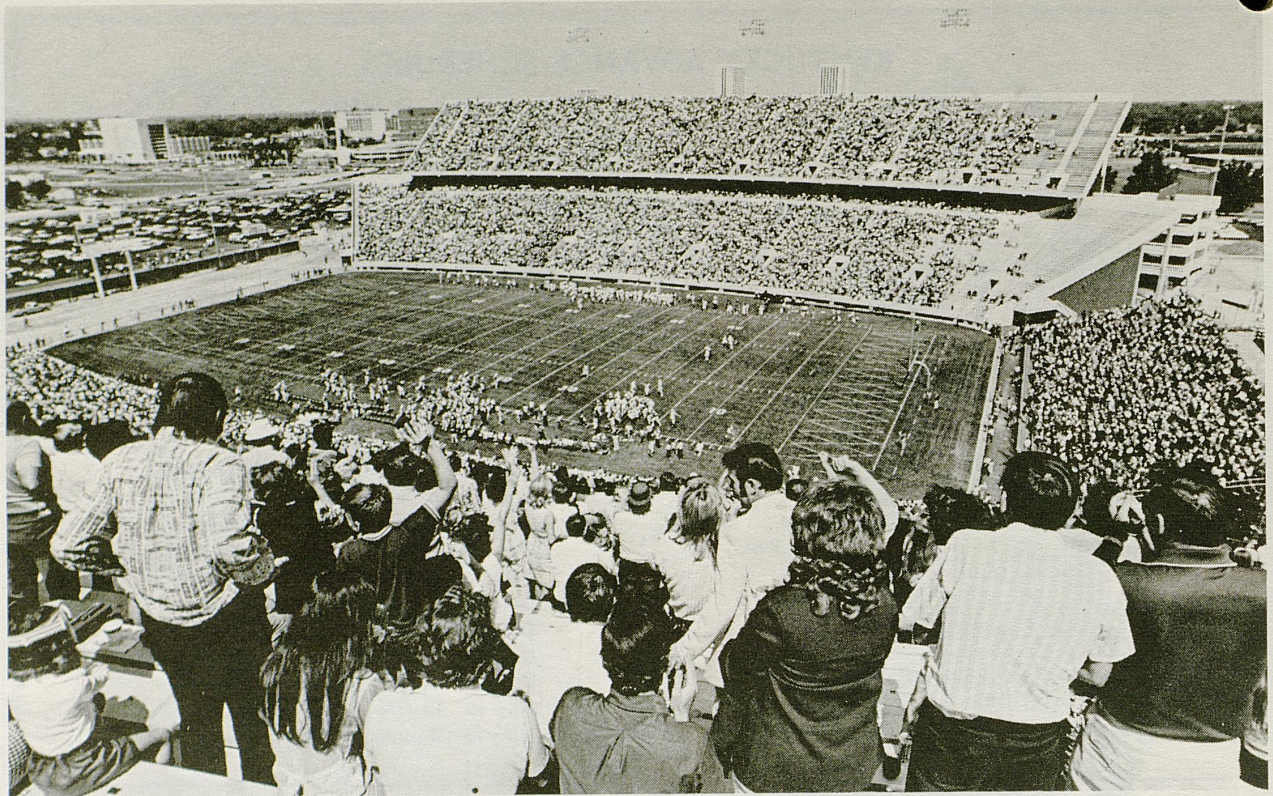


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OPENING GAME—48,000 fans watch as the Wildcats defeat Virginia Tech, 31-26, in the first game played in Commonwealth Stadium.

COMMONWEALTH STADIUM

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's new football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus and east of Nicholasville Road. A concrete and steel structure with two cantilevered decks along each sideline, it replaces Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams have played since 1924.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt & Nichols, Inc., the new facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000. The lower stands are so constructed that the seating can be increased to 68,000 later when needed.

Bids for the stadium were opened in mid-July 1972 and construction began a short while later.

The pressbox, located between the two levels on the south side of the playing field, is serviced by two elevators and contains a main working area, radio booths, food service areas, private booths and a camera deck extending along the entire front of the box.

Thirty-four concession areas and 30 restrooms are located conveniently throughout the facility. Four first aid stations with emergency health equipment also are provided. There are four major pedestrian ramps at each corner of the stadium and 40 ramp exits to seats.

The area immediately surrounding the stadium contains 6,000 parking spaces, with half of those paved and the other half in grass with gravel driveways. Another 8,500 parking spaces are located within a mile, all north, of the stadium. Five exits, all leading to four-lane highways, serve the facility.

The playing surface was sodded in Kentucky bluegrass in July. A fairly new scoreboard was moved from Stoll Field and installed with a similar scoreboard at the new stadium.

Due to almost daily rainfall during the spring and early summer months, construction was behind schedule on some parts of the stadium. First priority was given to seating, pressbox and elevators, concessions, toilets and other conveniences, with offices and other improvements to be completed later.

The new stadium does away with the seeming duplication of titles—Stoll Field and McLean Stadium—that caused much confusion among the general public and sports-writing fraternity.

By action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the old Wildcat playing field, located first on what is now an intramural field, was dedicated Oct. 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll.



DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY
University President

President of the University since 1969 has been Dr. Otis A. Singletary, who came from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs. He earlier had been director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity, and chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

He is the eighth president of the University. Unique recognition of his service to the institution came recently from the UK Alumni Association, which presented him its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

HARRY C. LANCASTER
Director of Athletics

Named athletic director in 1968, Harry C. Lancaster has been connected with UK athletics since 1942, when he was a full-time instructor in physical education and part-time basketball coach. A native of Paris, Ky., he lettered in football, basketball and baseball at Paris High. He was an All-Conference halfback three years and captain two years at Georgetown College. He also won three All-Conference nominations and was twice captain of Tiger basketball teams.

He served as an assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High (1933-34); head basketball coach at Bagdad High (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High (1936-42). He was assistant basketball coach at U.K. 22 years and baseball coach 16 years.



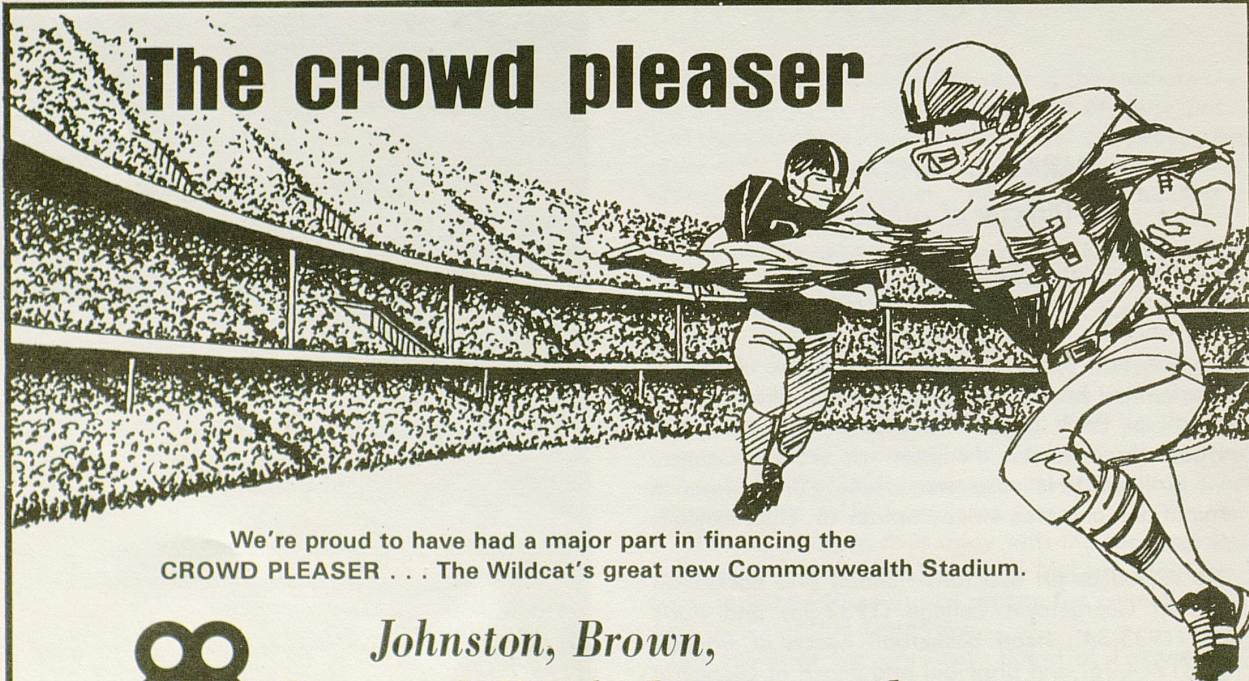
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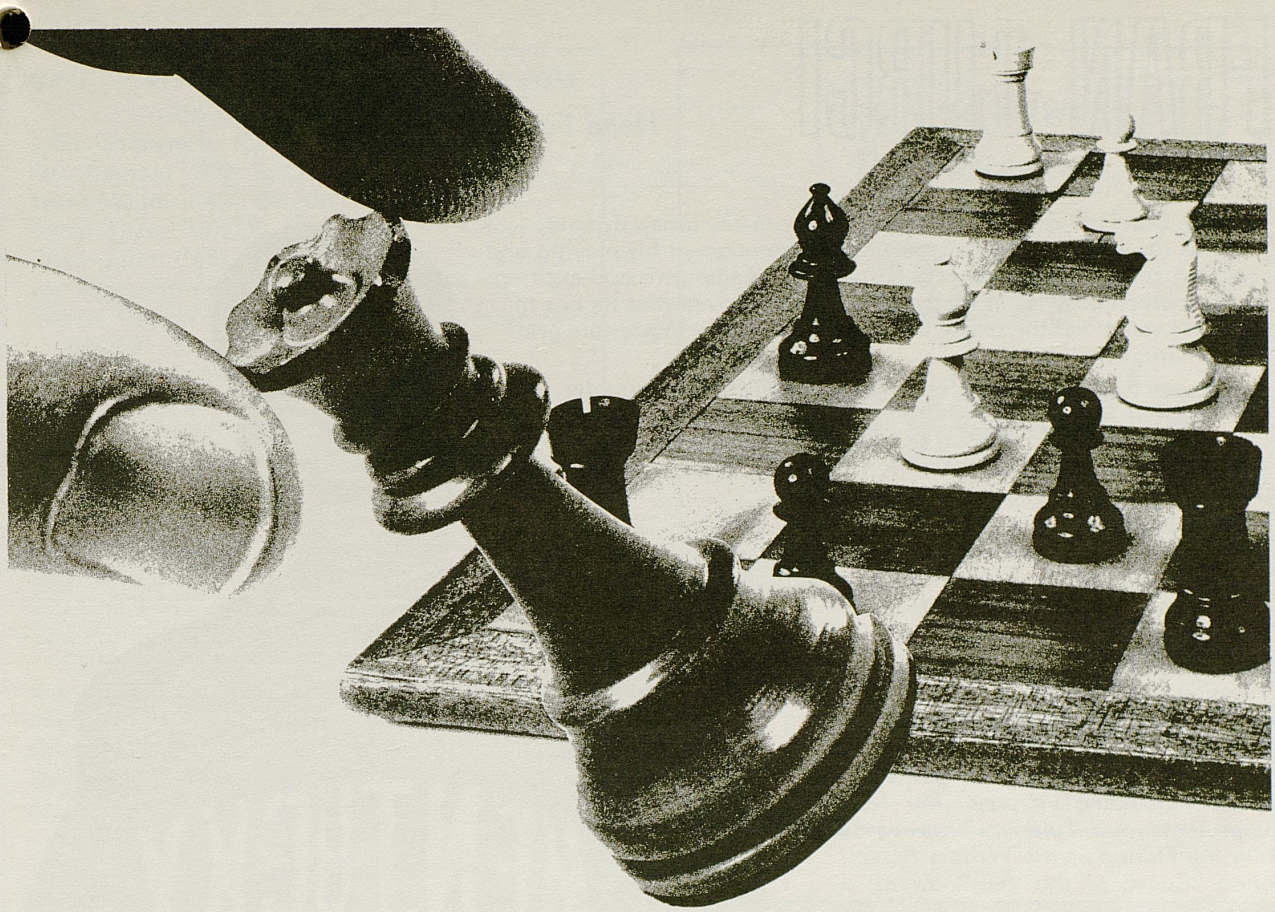


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FRAN CURCI

Head Football Coach

Fran Curci brings to the University of Kentucky a new dynamic look that has resulted in a winning atmosphere throughout his playing and coaching career. Known as one of the most imaginative and exciting young football coaches in the country, he has proved that he has the tools, the spirit and the desire to conquer seemingly impossible grid-iron situations.

He came to U.K. in December 1972 from his alma mater, the University of Miami, Fla., where he was head coach two years. He started his career as freshman coach there in 1962 after making All-America and playing as a 5-foot-9, 153 lb. quarterback for the old Dallas Texans of the AFL.

In four years, his Hurricane freshman teams won 12 and lost two games. He then served as a varsity assistant two years (1966-1967), and the Hurricanes participated in bowl games both those years.

Curci was tapped by the University of Tampa in 1968 to see what he could do about a faltering football program; in three campaigns, he wrote one of the most amazing success stories in college football.

In his first year, he put together a 7-3 season, including victories over Mississippi State and Tulane. That earned him the Florida Sports Writers Association "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970.

His 10-1 record in 1970 also included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking as well as bringing Curci College Division "Coach of the Year" runner-up honors.

Curci has been selected four times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game three years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charley McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America football game at Lubbock, Texas, two summers ago and was co-South coach with Bill Battle of Tennessee in Miami's Shrine North-South game last year.

Curci took over as Miami grid boss Dec. 19, 1970, and left the program there in good shape for his successor, Pete Elliott.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Curci played his high school ball in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At the University of Miami, he was known as the "Mite-y Magician." Playing at 152 pounds, he par-



played intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving honorable mention All-America and winning acclaim as one of the foremost sophomore football stars in the country in 1957.

His record-shattering feats at Miami included breaking of seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained on passing. He also was co-holder of the record for most TD passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades.

As a senior, he captained Miami and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset (18-23) over Big Ten champion Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year with the Dallas Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

He is married to the former Miss Patricia Ann Taylor of Louisville. They have four children, Angela 12, Frankie 10, Mary Teresa 9 and Jimmie 7.

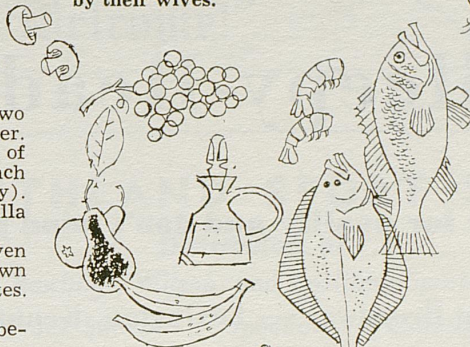
- 2 pounds ground beef

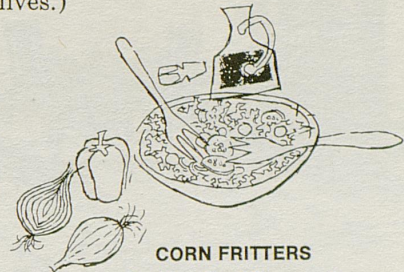

- 1½ teaspoons baking powder
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 scant teaspoon salt
- 1 egg
- 1¼ cup milk
- ½ cup whole kernel corn
- fat for deep frying or pan frying

Resift flour, baking powder, sugar and salt together. Add egg, milk and corn. Stir until blended. Drop batter into fat a teaspoonful at a time. Fry until golden brown, turning to cook evenly. Drain on paper towel and sprinkle with confectionary sugar before serving.

OATMEAL ANGEL COOKIES (Swedish)

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup oatmeal
- ¼ cup whipping cream
- ¼ cup white corn syrup
- ⅔ cup butter
- 1 cup flour (little less)
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Put sugar and oatmeal together add melted butter, cream and corn syrup. Stir mixture then add flour and baking powder, and vanilla. Put a teaspoon at a time onto a greased cooking sheet. Bake about 9 minutes at 375°. Remove—stand for a minute on cookie sheet then place warm cookie on a rolling pin or a rounded object to form in the curled shape of an angel wing. The cookie should be a light colored brown around the edge before placing on the rolling pin.

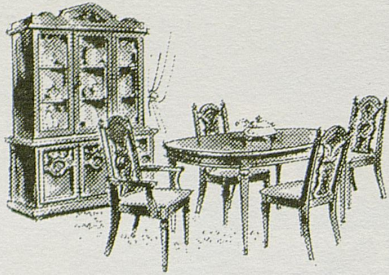

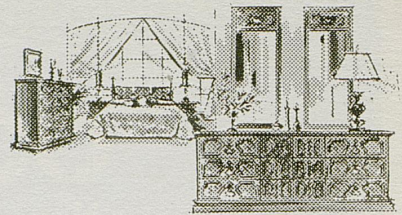

Great for after a football game, as it can be done up beforehand.



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

DAYS OF THORNS & ROSES

Thousands of stories have been written about University of Kentucky football in its nearly 100 years of peaks and valleys, days of thorns and days of roses.

On the occasion of the opening season in Commonwealth Stadium we can recall a few of them, as space permits. . . .

From *The Lexington Transcript*, April 10, 1880, comment on the first game ever played on the old Stoll Field, then known as City Park, a game between Transylvania College and Centre College:

"A large crowd of ladies and gentlemen, estimated at 500, witnessed the game. It was pronounced that football had the decided advantage of baseball as a means of amusement for spectators."

This was the story. No long boring passages about who carried the ball where and how. Superfluous material was culled by the editor, leaving, of course, only the bare essentials.

Or this, from *The Lexington Press*, December 5, 1880:

"On Tuesday evening as some of the students of the A. & M. College were playing football, a man, who afterwards gave

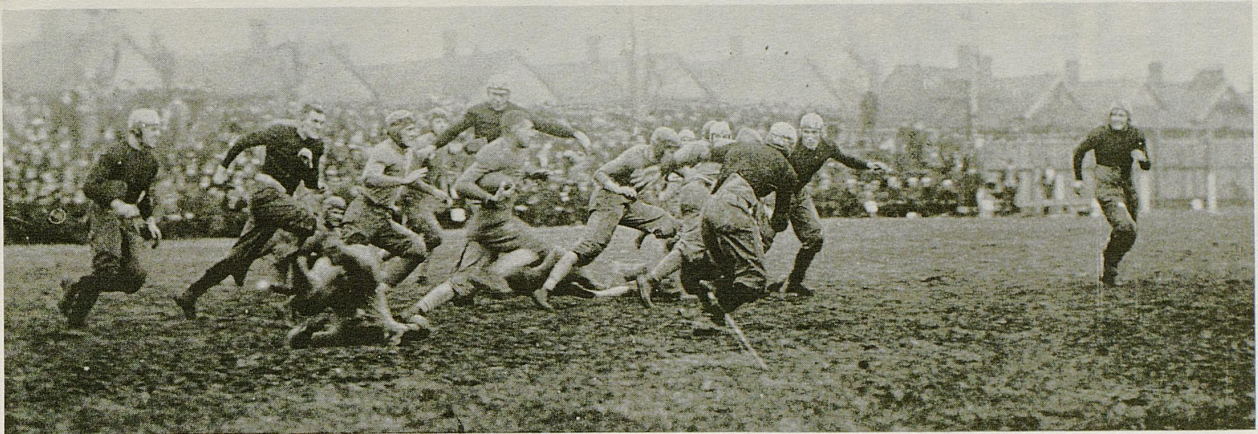
his name as White, came riding by, and not liking the noise the students were making, commenced firing a pistol at them. They all ran and were followed by this fellow, who repeatedly loaded and fired whenever anyone appeared in sight. This continued for about an hour, when two or three of the more courageous approached near enough to knock the pistol from his hand, when they all pitched in and gave him a severe drubbing. They then took his cartridges from him and started him home."

There is a strong suspicion that even today, in the enlightened 1970's, some people still feel that way about football.

It hasn't always been this serious, however. The game at Kentucky attracted stories on the lighter side, indicating that there is, too, a human element in the game.

From *Kentucky Alumnus*, publication of the University of Kentucky Alumni Association, comes this story (issue of June, 1929):

"Will Ed Covington, the thin blonde pine from Mayfield, almost realized the ambition of his life last season down in



Kentucky beat Purdue 7-0 in this game on old Stoll Field. That 1915 season, with J. J. Tigert as coach, posted a respectable 6-1-1 record.

Nashville when he broke around the great Abernathy's end and raced fifty yards through the Vanderbilt second-line defense and finding himself in a clear field behind perfect interference proceeded to 'faw down and go boom.' the Vandy safety falling on him before he could rise again. As Covy played a great game that day his mind must have been on the game, but after his great effort was finished his thoughts turned back to the old home town down in Western Kentucky, where a girl was waiting for her hero's triumphant return. That day Covington presented himself to Gloomy Gamage with pitiful mien and requested a belated visit to his 'family.' Departing from his usual procedure the coach granted the request and now—oh, well it happens in the best of families. Our handsome football captain was secretly married for five months. Now the news is out, but Covington is still going to play football for Kentucky next fall."

Days of heroes and days of . . . roses?

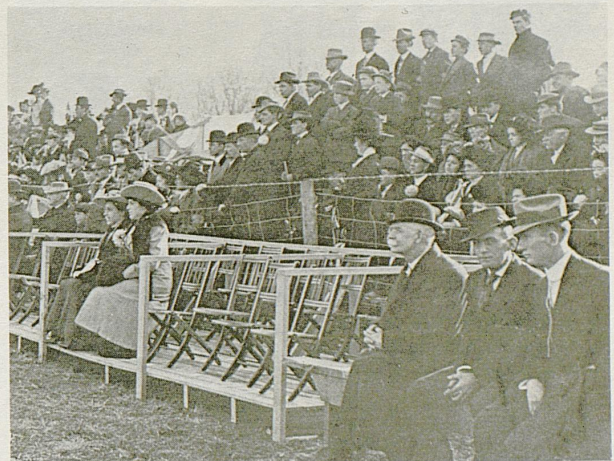
There were historic moments. From *Kentucky Alumnus*, September, 1929:

"Alumni! The Washington & Lee-Kentucky football game, scheduled for Saturday afternoon, October 12, will be broadcast play by play from the press box on the University of Kentucky stadium, through remote control connection with station WHAS of the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times at Louisville.

"Think of it! One of the two big games of the 1929 football season at the University of Kentucky will be sent out over WHAS' 10,000-watt station, and all Kentuckians, whether in the state or beyond its borders, will be able to follow the big blue Kentucky team up and down its own Blue Grass gridiron with the Generals of Washington & Lee."

Days of heroes and snowstorms and influenza epidemics and war and the draft.

Like the Thanksgiving Day game in 1929 when 20,000 fans, the largest crowd ever at a football game in Kentucky, sat through what the press called a blinding snowstorm to see the Wildcats tie the Tennessee Volunteers six to six. Seats were in such demand that bleacher seats from miles around were

borrowed, begged and rented and 3,000 were shipped here from the University of Tennessee just for this game.

Or like the 1918 football season, which never really got out of the summer. The influenza epidemic that swept the campus that year so depleted the ranks of the football squad that all games were cancelled and the squad disbanded after the first three games.

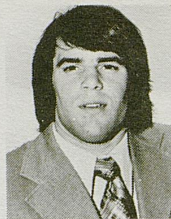
But the football story of 1973 has been neither on the playing field, the garden paths of a small town in Western Kentucky, nor in a blinding snowstorm on Thanksgiving Day.

It has been in a race with the calendar, with a huge circle around the date, September 15. Commonwealth Stadium was the scene that day of Kentucky's first game in the new 58,000-seat arena.

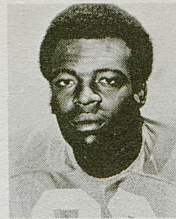

The answer . . . a day of roses.

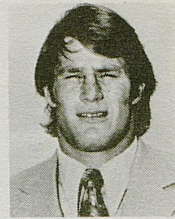

College Rules Keep Pace with Game

There are some sports watchers who believe that the NCAA has a two-front offensive underway, one with the AAU and the other with professional sports. The offensive aimed at the pros is based on the NCAA constitutional provision that there must be a clear demarcation between college athletics and professional sports. Nowhere does the demarcation stand out more than in the differences in the football rules of the two groups.

Many Changes

The college game continues to be a dynamic, exciting contest catalyzed by rules changes that adapt to the cycles of the sport which are created by the increased speed, size and greater skills of the players. There are 180 changes listed for the last 15 years, covering everything from the scoring (two-point conversion), the size of the goal posts (23' 4"), the timing of the game (starting and stopping the clock), a prohibition against blocking below the waist and at least one adjustment in each of the ten basic rules.

While keeping the game alive with innovative changes the NCAA and the National High School Federation have marched to the same drummer, making 73 changes in the last seven years to bring the two codes closer together. There have been very few rule changes in professional football since 1959. The only significant ones in 13 years were (1) the prohibition against grabbing the face mask, (2) the addition of the sixth official and (3) moving the hash marks 20 yards from the sideline. The demarcation between professional football and the college game was dramatically demonstrated by three games played on the West Coast last season. Take a look at the best of the two football worlds and see where the action is:

The National High School Federation and college football are not resting on their laurels and are annually adjusting their rules to the modern game. On the opposite page are the major NCAA changes in order of importance with capsule summaries in the turf handicapper's style.

The two most significant changes for 1973 are the substitution change and the permission given for each team to use its own ball. The change in the substitution rule to permit as many as eleven substitutes to enter the game while the ball is dead originated with the AFCA Football Rules Committee at their meeting in Chicago last January. The coaches have been clamoring for this completely free rule since 1965 when Rule 3-5-1 was changed to permit "platoon football."

Pleasant Surprise

After attempting without success for several years to get a more liberal rule, the coaches forgot about it. The sudden change came as a pleasant surprise to the coaching fraternity. The change will permit faster and smaller players to cover punts and will also permit faster, more agile players to rush the punt.

The officials will "burn a few barns" because they no longer have to check substitutes during the downs other than those where team possession changed. The Rules Committee was elated because three pages of nit-picking interpretations were deleted from the Official Rules Interpretations Book. Everybody seems happy, so the Rules Committee might have done something right for a change.

A change in the rule governing the type of ball that may be used in the game is another amendment that originated with the AFCA. Prior to the 1973 adjustment governing the type of ball used in the game, one brand or manufacture of ball meeting the rule specifications had to be used for the entire game. Coaches complained that one brand either felt different, spiraled differently, looked different, or had a peculiar odor; and these little things upset the passers and kickers so much they gave sub-par performances on the road. Previously, the home team had the choice of the ball to be used in a game.

Helium-Filled Ball?

The new rule raises several interesting questions including the violation of the old adage that you never allow an opponent to use his own ball,

dice or cards. Also, it will be difficult to determine how many balls to take to a road game, especially if the visiting team scores six or seven touchdowns and kicks the conversions into the stands. Then there is the problem of handing a team a different ball when they are kicking out of their own end zone. This is the place you might get the one filled with helium or sand.

The Rules Committee is two for two with the coaches because of these changes. It pays to listen to the coaches who are usually right about one thing, i. e., how the game of football should be played.

The Latest Changes . . .

Rule Description

1-2-4 It is recommended that the area between the sideline and the limit line (6 feet) in the team area be marked solid white throughout.



Comment

This rule should keep people at the sideline from "stepping on the coaches' toes."

1-2-6 Eight flexible pylons of red or orange color (4" x 4" square x 18" high) must be used at the intersections of sidelines with goal lines and end lines (effective 1974 season).



With eight red pylons on the field, the dog who gets on the field will think he is in fire hydrant heaven.

1-3-2 During the entire game, either team may use a ball of their choice when they are in possession. Int. Book



Using your own ball is almost as good as using your own dice or cards but you can't take your ball and go home.

1-4-4 Numbers at least 8 inches high on the front and 10 inches on the back of the jersey respectively must be worn. Ten inches in front and 12 inches in back are now legal.



Putting 12 inch numbers on 5'8" players is like putting Dick Butkus's jersey on Eddie LeBaron.

1-4-4 All players must wear securely fastened chin straps on their helmets.



This means the helmet can no longer go off without the head going with it and players won't lose their heads.

1-4-4 All players shall use an intraoral mouth protector composed of at least two portions, one an interocclusion portion and the other a labial portion.



There will be no evidence of teeth marks if a player bites an opponent.

1-4-5 Players with artificial arms, legs, or hands are (d) prohibited from playing.



Passers with glass arms are still legal and they get a break.

2-7-2 A valid fair catch signal is extending one hand and one arm above the head and waving them from side to side. (Interpretation: Shading the eyes is an invalid signal unless given before or after a valid fair catch signal.)



What happens if the signal is given from side to side with one hand while shading the eyes with the other?

3-5-1 Any number of eligible substitutes may enter the game between periods, after a score or try, or when the ball is dead during an interval between downs.



With this change, substitutes and officials will no longer be waving at each other during substitutions.

3-5-2 An incoming substitute must enter the game from (c) his team area, and a replaced player must leave the game at the sideline of his team area.



If you want to join the opposing team at their bench when things get rough, it can't be done.

4-1-3 When Team A catches an illegal forward pass in (c) Team B's end zone, or when Team A completes a pass in Team B's end zone to an ineligible player, the ball is dead.



This makes legal what officials have done for years and have been telling the Rules Committee to get it in the Rules.

4-1-2 If a whistle is sounded inadvertently when the ball is free on a fumble, the ball is returned to the Int. spot of last possession and given to the team that Book had possession of the ball at that spot.



Gives the official an escape clause, so he does not have to swallow his whistle when he has blown it inadvertently.

5-1-3 The ball shall always be spotted with its length axis parallel to the sideline before measuring. The ball will be placed parallel with the sideline.



This means there will be no more measurements that are on the bias.

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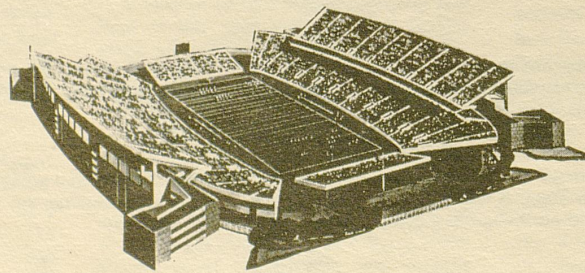
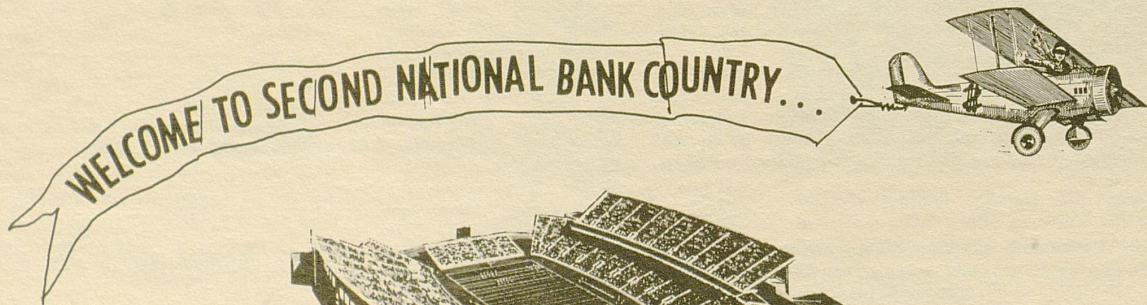
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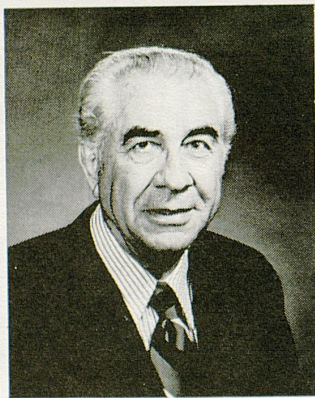
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Alumni Association Says Hello

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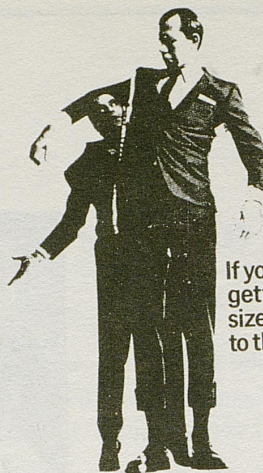
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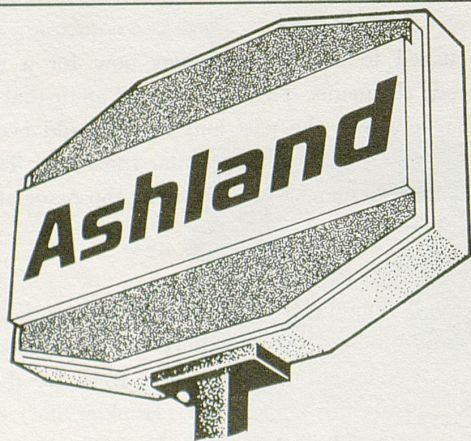
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KENTUCKY BASKETBALL OUTLOOK, 1973-74

Kentucky's 1973 Southeastern Conference champions return four starters, including SEC Player of the Year Kevin Grevey, and six other lettermen, but filling the shoes of Jim Andrews, a 6-foot-11 two-time All-SEC center, is a major concern of coach Joe B. Hall, who won 1973 SEC Coach of the Year honors in his rookie year.

Larry Stamper, a 6-6 part-time starter at forward, is the only other loss from the team, which ran up a 20-8 overall and 14-4 SEC record and advanced to the finals of the NCAA Mideast Regional.

Expected to man the center post vacated by Andrews are Bob Guyette, a 6-8, 220 lb. junior who played forward last year, and Steve Lochmueller, a 6-7, 220 lb. junior battler who saw relief duty in 26 games.

Guyette started nine games early last year, and performed well in clutch situations, but he is happy to return to the position he has played throughout his career. He averaged 5.9 points and 4.7 rebounds while playing only 16 minutes per game in 27 contests.

Lochmueller, a competitive, physical type player, had a great effort against Alabama when he scored 18 points in a crucial late-season game. The strongboy, who can hook consistently with either hand, averaged 3.3 points and hit 53.1 per cent from the field. He led the team with 86.8 per cent from the charity line.

With either man, though, he Wildcats will face an imposing height deficiency.

"We will be a small team this year," said Hall. "We'll have to rely on speed, outside shooting and a pressure defense to carry us through a tough schedule."

Much of the scoring load will fall on the muscular shoulders of Grevey, a southpaw whose scoring binge in the last six games of the season lifted the Wildcats off the ropes to the conference championship.

Grevey averaged over 30 points a game during that stretch, including a 40 point effort against Georgia, the high individual performance of the year in the SEC. Despite shooting mainly from the outside, Grevey's percentage zoomed to 53.5 at season's end.

For his pressure performance, Grevey won first team All-SEC and SEC Sophomore-of-the-Year honors and led voting on both Alabama's and Tennessee's All-Opponent teams. The 6-5 junior was second leading Wildcat scorer with an 18.7 average.

Other starters are Jimmy Dan Conner, a 6-4 junior forward-guard who showed flashes of brilliance (11.2), Ronnie Lyons, a 5-10 senior who excels as a playmaker (9.2), and Mike Flynn, a 6-3 junior guard, who regained a starting slot the last 14 games and won defensive honors as well as scoring at a 13 point clip during that stretch.



Joe B. Hall, the first rookie coach in the history of the Southeastern Conference to win Coach-of-the-Year honors, begins his second year as Wildcat coach with a group which lacks a great deal of size, but one he terms as "lean and mean."

"We should get a good offensive punch from Grevey, who played great the last part of the season," said Hall. "But we feel we'll still be a balanced scoring team. Lyons, who had a somewhat off season last year, and Conner showed they have scoring ability, and so does Flynn, who emerged as a top defensive player."

The Wildcats should benefit from an experienced bench with all players seeing a considerable amount of playing time. Back from reserve roles, in addition to Guyette and Lochmueller, are seniors Ray Edelman (started one game), a 6-2 guard, and Rich Drewitz, a 6-7 forward, and juniors Jerry Hale, a 6-1 guard, and G. J. Smith, a 6-7 forward who missed much of the season with a knee injury.

"We hope to be improved from an experience standpoint," said Hall. "We feel we have 10 players returning who all gave good accounts of themselves at one time or another last year, and we look for this to offset the loss of our only big man, Jim Andrews." Up from the freshman team are sophomores Reggie Warford, a 6-1 guard who led the frosh with 17.5 points, David Miller, a 6-6 forward who averaged 15.5 points and 12.8 rebounds, and Roger Wood, a 6-11 center, who although was sick much of the season, averaged 12.8 points and 8.8 rebounds.

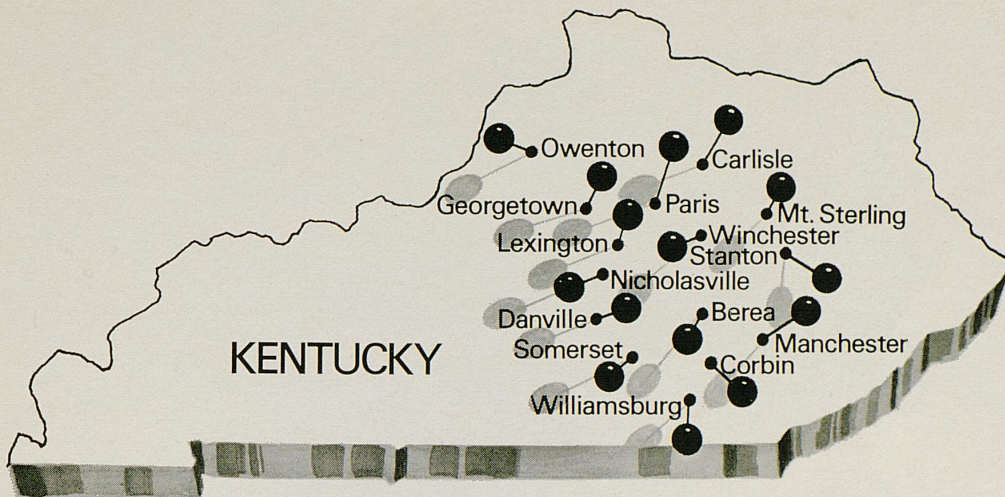
Incoming freshmen are Robert Mayhall, 6-8, of Middlesboro; Ernie Whitus, 6-8, Louisville; Gary Utz, 6-3, New Salisbury, Ind.; Larry Johnson, 6-3, Morganfield; Merion Haskins, 6-4, Campbells-ville, and Joey Holland, 6-3, Charleston, W. Va.

Offensively, Hall will employ the single post and fast break as basics, but will include the stack and high-low post also. The basic defense will be man-to-man, with the 1-3-1 and pressure defense also utilized.

Hall feels the December schedule, which will severely test the Wildcats physically with a number of back-to-back away games against some of the nation's top teams, is a good one "which should get us ready for the conference schedule."
