

#### Leave No Child Alone

There are thousands of children in need of homes and loving parents. No, not a lot of healthy babies, but children who are not newborns, who have been removed from abusive homes, who have health problems, or for other reasons are not quickly snapped up by couples wanting to parent them.

In order to reach out and find more and better parents for these children, adoption and foster care policies have become increasingly inclusive over the past two decades. Single individuals - male and female, older couples, individuals with physical disabilities, gay and lesbian couples and singles, and families across a broad economic range are now accepted as potential parents. And there are still children waiting.

And yet, in 2006, state legislators across the country will be considering bills to make it illegal for GLBT people to be adoptive or foster parents. Kentucky's legislature is likely to be asked to consider such legislation. (See next page)

It is not that we do not have support. Among the national groups that support parenting by gay and lesbian people are the American Medical Association, the Child Welfare League of America, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Psychological Association and the North American Council on Adoptable Children. These national organizations as well as state child advocacy and mental health organizations oppose policies that ban lesbians and gay men from fostering or adopting children because such bans hurt children who need homes.

But that will not stop the right wing theocrats from using Gay Lesbian parenting as a wedge issue in the buildup to the 2006 elections. The KY Fairness Alliance is preparing for another fight to try to stop the KY legislature from passing a ban on gay/lesbian parenting. We may have to work to defeat another amendment at the polls in November

As part of our strategy, I believe that we need to emphasize the fundamental need of children for loving homes. Thus the title of this opinion piece: Leave No Child Alone. I believe the needs of children will make sense to voters.

There are literally thousands of children in need of adoptive and foster parents. Gay and Lesbians should have the right to be considered as parents, going through the same evaluation process as other couples and we have that right in a majority of states. But our desire for children and our rights are not the only consideration.

In this case as in many others, we are working for the benefit of our society as a whole, not just for our individual rights. For example, we are working for a just and fair society for all, which is one reason the word "fairness" works so well. In regards to adoption and foster parenting, the goal is for the healthy nurturance of those children in greatest need of parents. Good parenting will benefit the children and our society as a whole. If we think we are fighting only for ourselves, particularly if we convey this belief, the opposition's rhetoric may sound more convincing

Of course the right wing will claim that we are not fit parents. We will need to become conversant with the issues involved, consider a variety of ways to refute our attackers, and be able to quote the studies that support our claims. We will need to once again have many conversations with people we know and those we don't.

Saying that we have the right to be parents will be one of our arguments. But emphasizing that children have the right to loving families is an even more fundamental argument. Without us, there will be more children with out homes, which will be damaging for those children and for the communities they grow up within. "Leave No Child Alone", a slogan and a concept that will gain the support of many Americans.

#### Right Wing Agenda by mary crone

The political agenda of the right wing theocrats for 2006 is becoming clear. (Theocrats: those who believe that the United States should be a Theocracy, a country based on their definition of fundamentalist Christian beliefs and ruled by fundamentalist Christians.)

The Louisville based American Family Association, of which Frank G. Simon is the Director, mailed out a fund raising letter in July that includes their "petition" to our state legislators. (My father got on Simon's mailing list by accident a dozen or so years ago so now I get to see first hand what they are sending to their mailing list.)

In the July mailing, they call for a "Marriage Harmony Amendment" that will make clear their "position on marriage and its associated morality." Their suggested amendment states: "Sodomy, polygamy,

bestiality, pedophilia, prostitution and public indecency, herein noted as "deviant sex", shall NOT be given any extraordinary protection such as found in the Civil Rights statutes of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky."

They say that such an amendment is necessary because of the Fairness Ordinances which they call "Gay Rights laws", and which they say will "give homosexuals Special Rights (to) teach in our public schools and day care centers and adopt helpless little children." (Their emphasis) This is their only reference to adoption.

Of course, we have been teaching in public schools since public schools existed but that doesn't stop Simon from saying that Ky lawmakers need to "protect our Children and Grandchildren from this horrible threat."

Joint Statement in Opposition to the Nomination of John G. Roberts, Jr. Human Rights Campaign, National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, National Center for Lesbian Rights, and PFLAG

As organizations working to advance civil rights for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender ("LGBT") people, we work in varied spheres — in Congress, in the courts, before our state legislatures, and within our families. In the realm of civil rights, we know of no more significant event than the appointment of a Supreme Court justice.

Together, because of our shared commitment to LGBT rights, we announce our opposition to the nomination of John G. Roberts, Jr. to the Supreme Court of the United States.

History has shown us that the Supreme Court is a bulwark of protection for minorities from the tyranny of sometimes misguided majorities. That was true in 2003 when the court ruled that mere disapproval was not a rational reason to brand us as criminals, just as it was true in 1968 when the court struck down bans on interracial marriage — although 72% of Americans disagreed.

Since President Bush nominated John Roberts on July 19, disturbing evidence has emerged about the kind of justice that he would be. His writings as a lawyer, his rulings as a judge, and his statements as a policymaker all lead us to the unfortunate conclusion that Judge

Roberts would not vote to protect our civil rights from those who are, at this moment, fighting so hard to take them away. Instead, his record indicates that Judge Roberts would vote to roll back the constitutional protections upon which our community — and all Americans — rely.

We are particularly troubled that the Senate has had no access to relevant documents relating to Judge Roberts' service as principal deputy solicitor general from 1989 to 1993. These documents include Roberts' writings about cases involving voting rights, choice, the separation of church and state, and many other subjects of critical importance.

The Senate's constitutional duty of "advice and consent" depends upon full disclosure of the nominee's record — something that the American people deserve, especially in light of the troubling record revealed thus far. The administration's claim that these documents are shielded by attorney-client privilege is without basis. The American people, not the White House, were Roberts' true client when he was in the Solicitor General's office.

Just two years ago, the court finally recognized that the constitutional guarantee of liberty protects our community and our relationships. The basis for the landmark case of Lawrence v. Texas was the idea that the Constitution draws a line beyond which the government cannot go. Roberts' writings clearly indicate that he does not agree with the cases and constitutional foundations of Lawrence. He has criticized the court for what he claims is an intrusion into areas belonging to legislatures and dismissed what he calls the "so-called right to privacy."

We are mindful that Judge Roberts provided a few hours of pro bono help to the attorneys in Romer v. Evans - a landmark case for our community. Some have said that this work demonstrates that Roberts is not personally anti-gay. This theory is not relevant to the important issue for our community: how Roberts would vote as a Supreme Court justice. Roberts has repeatedly written that the court should not stand up for civil rights, but rather allow legislatures to enact such laws as they wish - even those that deny the rights that Americans understand to be fundamental.

# Mary Was a Tom-Boy: A Brief Biography of Dusty Springfield

In 1965, the British music magazine New Musical Express featured an article about singer Dusty Springfield entitled "Mary was a Tom-Boy" in which Dusty's parents had described her as a tomboy when she was young. Little did they (or music fans) know that Mary was more than just a tomboy. She was a lesbian with a strong sexual appetite who would later describe herself as "a dyke and a whore."

Dusty Springfield was born Mary I Sobel Catherine Bernadette O'Brien on April 16, 1939, in London, England. She began a life as an overweight, near-sighted outcast who spent most of her time listening obsessively to her father's jazz, blues, and pop records. Her mother was alcoholic and her father frequently beat her. A verbally abusive older brother once told her: "You're a tub – who would want to hear you sing about love?"

Yet, Dusty's love of music transcended the attacks on her self-esteem. Educated in a Roman Catholic convent, she announced to the nuns that she wanted to be a jazz singer when she grew up, like her favorite singers Ella Fitzgerald and Peggy Lee. In her teens, Dusty transformed her looks and began her music career with the girl group the Lana Sisters. In 1960, she joined her brother Tom's folk band, the Springfields, who had a Top 20 hit in the U.S. with "Silver Threads and Golden Needles" in 1962.

Springfield became interested in the Motown sound and girl groups while touring in America and soon embarked on a solo career. She went from a "wholesome" look to "Queen of the Mods" with a style that would become her trademark: blonde beehive, heavy black mascara, and fashionable clothing. In 1964, Dusty had a hit with "I Only Want to Be With You" and later garnered more

success with "You Don't Have To Say You Love Me," "Wishin' and Hopin'," "Anyone Who Had A Heart," and "The Look of Love." Her classic album, *Dusty in Memphis*, was released in 1969 to critical acclaim but to commercial disappointment.

The album is considered a masterpiece of sophisticated and sexy "white soul" music and solidified her position as a skillful and emotionally honest vocalist whom few could surpass.

Writer Rob Hoerburger described Dusty's performance: "She rippled over and curled around the songs of carnality, of love's psychosis (the hypnotic "Windmills of Your Mind") and mostly, of love's memory, love in exile, love as asymptote. It was some of the most emotionally literate music ever put to vinyl; while other pop singers were still wondering who wrote the book of love, Springfield was teaching a course in comparative literature."

In 1970, Springfield openly admitted she liked women as well as men, telling an interviewer for London's *Evening Standard*, "I know I'm as perfectly capable of being swayed by a girl as by a boy. More and more people feel that way and I don't see why I shouldn't."

Recently, her friend Penny Valentine and longtime manager Vicki Wickham wrote Dancing With Demons: The Authorized Biography of Dusty Springfield in which the singer's lesbian sexuality was clearly confirmed. Still, Dusty remained reluctant to publicly label her sexual preference.

In 1995, she told *The New York Times Magazine*: "My relationships have been pretty mixed. And I'm fine with that. Who's to say what you are... It's other people who want you to be something or other—this or that. I'm none of the above. I've never used my relationships or illnesses to be fashionable, and I don't intend to start now."

In the 1970s, she moved to Los Angeles but didn't perform or record again until 1986 when the British duo the Pet

Shop Boys invited her to record "What Have I Done To Deserve This," which became a worldwide hit.

Despite her abundant talent and success, Dusty remained a vulnerable woman and was plagued by insecurity throughout her life, which manifested in her perfectionism, stormy relationships, self-mutilation, and abuse of drugs and alcohol.

In 1995, she was diagnosed with breast cancer and though treatment brought a brief remission, she succumbed to cancer on March 2, 1999. Shortly before her death, she was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and was awarded the Order of the British Empire by Queen Elizabeth II.

Recently, Universal Pictures announced plans to film a biopic of Springfield to be directed by Jessica Sharzer and starring Kristen Chenoweth (of The West Wing). Although the film will focus on Dusty's early career when she was not publicly out, the project's director has implied that Springfield's lesbianism will be addressed.

Their video is said to excerpts of the homosexual video for kindergarten children. They say they will send out several copies of this DVD to anyone that donates a little money so that "every concerned pastor in your county" can have one. (I can't bring myself to send them money, but for \$5 it might be worth it. Anyone else want to be on their mailing list?)

How can we fight back against these lies and rhetoric? We can educate ourselves, come out to and talk to people we know about these issues, and support Fairness in the upcoming fight in whatever form it takes this coming year. The American people are slowly getting to know us personally, as co workers, as family members, and as parents. People who know us are liikely to support us.
