HIV Testing

On Thursday, May 7 there will be free HIV testing between 6 pm and 8pm at the Pride Center. The oraquick mouth swab technique will be used. This test gives a result in about twenty minutes. If the test is reactive, a blood sample will be taken. The results are back in two weeks for the confirmatory blood tests. Testing is available at the Pride Center on the first Thursday of each month.

Kroger Cards


GLSO has received it's first check from the Kroger Company for \$220. We now have almost 60 cards distributed. If everyone recharges their cards once a month for \$100 or more, we will receive \$300 or more a month.

The Kroger cards work this way: we put \$5 on each card. We then give them to supporters for \$5. You recharge the card at any Kroger store and use it for food, prescription drugs, flowers, cigarettes, and Kroger gas. It works as a debit card. GLSO will receive 4% of the money you put on your card. Cards are available through board members and at the Pride Center.

The Race Is On

Lexington Fairness

In mid-April, Iowa rocked the nation. Word quickly spread when the Iowa Supreme Court struck down an earlier statewide ban on same-sex marriage. No one in the other 49 states saw it coming. Who'd believe this small, typically conservative state in the Midwest would be one of the first to legalize gay marriage?

Camilla Taylor, that's who. According to a Washington Post article, Taylor began laying the ground work in 2002 when she joined Lambda Legal's Midwest office. In the beginning of her battle, progressives doubted her. In the end, this straight ally was the key to achieving what everyone else believed to be nearly impossible.

Just days later, Vermont voted to override Republican governor Jim Douglas's veto of the same-sex marriage bill. This made the Northeast state the fourth in the nation to allow gays to marry, and the third in that region to do so. Not too long after that, the District of Columbia approved a measure to recognize same-sex marriages that occurred elsewhere. And then, Governor David Paterson of New York introduced a measure into the legislature that would legalize gay marriage in his state.

Is your head spinning yet? Was this a dream? Are states, particularly those in the Northeast (three other states in the region are considering similar bills), competing to see who can legalize gay marriage the quickest? By court or by General Assembly, there seems to be a race to the finish line.

Will there be another surprise state to emerge in the competition?

Mississippi? Just kidding. Texas? Nah, don't mess with Texas.

Utah Governor Jon Huntsman, a Republican and a 2012 Presidential prospect, is in favor of civil unions. Could he be swayed to advocate for marriage instead?

Hey, New Mexico, you've got a steadily growing progressive base and are considered a swing state with your five awesome electoral votes. Want to freak out the rest of the Southwest?

Oregon, or Washington, care to show up your West Coast counterpart California?

It doesn't matter which state is next. The important thing is that there will be a next state. There has been some debate about whether these rapid developments will backfire on the gay community. Conservative groups have already begun their media blitz against equality. LGBT know that we can't win them all; in the past, we've lost far more than we have won. The bottom line, though, is that positive things are happening across the country, and legions of Americans don't seem to be rising up the way they did in 2004.

Mark Twain once said, "When the end of the world comes, I want to be in Kentucky, because everything there happens 20 years after it happens anywhere else."

Okay, so it's not a glowing recommendation from one of our nation's greatest authors. But it means there will come a day when an LGBT couple can walk confidently into a Kentucky courthouse and ask for a marriage license without rejection. Forty years after the Stonewall riots, the LGBT has come a long, even in Kentucky. We may be the last to cross this finish line, but even the last place finisher feels a sense of accomplishment and pride when the race is done.

Stonewall 1969

This Pride Month we are honoring the Stonewall uprising which started in the early morning hours of June 28, 1969 at the Stonewall Inn in New York City. This event is frequently cited as one of the first times gays and lesbians fought back against the sanctioned oppression of GLBT Americans.

Very few bars welcomed openly gay people in the 1950s and 1960s. The bars we frequented were not owned or managed by GLBT individuals. Stonewall Inn, at the time, was owned by the Mafia. It was known to be popular with marginalized people in the gay community: drag queens, hustlers, crossdressers/trans and homeless youth.

Police raids were routine in the 1960s and often included rough treatment designed to humiliate and degrade. It was common for laws about cross dressing to be used as a reason to arrest people. Sometimes butch dykes were raped and people were often beaten. Arrests were made public and some people lost their jobs

some people lost their jobs.

On this particular night in June, the police raid did not go as usual. Seven plain-clothes detectives and a uniformed officer entered and demanded identification papers from the customers The bar staff stopped serving the watered-down, overpriced drinks, while their Mafia bosses swiftly removed any money within their reach. The police took patrons outside, throwing some into a waiting paddy-wagon and pushing others to the ground.

Then something new happened: bar patrons began to fight back. There is disagreement about which incident sparked the riot. Was it a 'butch' lesbian dressed in man's clothes who resisted arrest, or a male drag queen who stopped in the doorway between the officers and posed defiantly?

The crowd started to throw coins at the officers in mockery of the notorious system of payoffs, "gayola", through which police chiefs took huge sums from bars used by gay people and then conducted "public morals" raids to regulate their racket. Soon, coins were followed by bottles, rocks, and other items. Cheers rang out as the prisoners in the van were liberated. Detective Inspector Pine later recalled, "I had been in combat situations, but there was never any time that I felt more scared than then."

People in the crowd started shouting "Gay Power!" As word spread through Greenwich Village and across the city, hundreds of gay men and lesbians, black, white, Hispanic, and predominantly working class, converged on the Christopher Street area around the Stonewall

Inn to join the fray

The cops took refuge inside the bar and called for reinforcements. A crack riot-control squad, the Tactical Patrol Force trained to confront the anti war movement of that time, arrived and began to march down the street with linked arms and billy-clubs. The crowd did not disperse as expected but used side streets to return behind the marching police. They formed dance lines, kicked their legs high and sang

'We are the Stonewall girls We wear our hair in curls We wear our dungarees Above our nelly knees!'

We do have a way of using humor to

confront oppression.

Over several nights thousands of demonstrators took to the streets. Leaflets were handed out, titled "Get the Mafia and cops out of gay bars!" Within weeks, Village residents organized activist groups to and worked on establishing places for gays and lesbians to be open about their sexual orientation without fear of being arrested.

Within six months, three newspapers were established to promote LGBT rights. Within a few years, gay rights organizations were founded across the U.S. The time of low key demonstrations was over.

On the first anniversary of Stonewall, June 28, 1970, the first Gay Pride marches took place in New York City and Los Angeles. Gay Pride events are now held annually throughout the world toward the end of June to mark the Stonewall riots. A Permanent Home for Moveable Feast

Moveable Feast is going to move one more time, and this will definitely be the last move for a long time. On Thursday April 16th they purchased their own building in downtown Lexington. They now own the old Nannies Soul Food Restaurant on the corner of Silver Maple Way and 5th St., across from Shiloh Baptist Church. The address is 474 & 476 Silver Maple Way.

There is a lot of work to be done to the place before they can move in but "if the remodeling goes as planned" (it never does) we will be operating out of that location by July 1st" says the director Terry Mullins.

The building was a small restaurant and three small apartments. That has to be turned into a large kitchen and office space. "Walls have to be torn out, plumbing & electric put in, new flooring and painting inside and out. It is a lot of work and a lot of money but with continued community support it will get done and be well worth the effort," Terry says.

From its humble roots in Spain, Sangria has grown to become a popular, refreshing party drink around the world. In the US, Sangria was first tasted at the 1964 World's Fair in New York. The Spanish World area served this fruity wine punch to its visitors, and history was made!

Sangria is based on the traditional red wine punch popular across Europe for hundreds of years. The punch base would be claret, i.e. Bordeaux wine from France. Brandy and fruit would be added to the punch for flavor. In the 1700s and 1800s, Claret Cup Punch could be found at parties of all sizes.

Don't just buy a mix at the store have fun and create your own! Sangria's appeal is all about taking your favorite red wine, your favorite fruits, and experimenting with them.

Sangria is typically a red wine punch, although it can also be made with white wine - it is then known as 'Sangria Blanco'. When making your own Sangria, use a good quality red wine, and be sure to let it chill overnight. Use Rioja to get the authentic Spanish flavor, but definitely choose something you like - you're the one drinking it! In the morning, pour into a pitcher full of ice cubes, garnish with fresh fruit, and enjoy.

With Memorial Day later this month and summer fast approaching, try one of the recipes below for your next gathering.

SANGRIA

3 cups dry red wine

1 1/2 cups carbonated lemon-lime beverage (such as 7-UP)

1 1/2 cups orange juice

16 lime slices

16 lemon slices

8 orange slices

1/2 cup brandy

1/4 cup sugar

2 tablespoons Cointreau liqueur or orange liqueur

2 tablespoons grenadine

2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice

2 tablespoons fresh lime juice ice cubes

Stir wine, soda and orange juice, 8 lime slices, 8 lemon slices, orange slices, brandy, sugar, Cointreau, grenadine, lemon juice and lime juice in a large pitcher to combine. Let stand 30 minutes.

Fill 8 large wineglasses with ice cubes. Divide sangria among glasses. Garnish each with remaining lime and lemon slices and serve.


