Moveable Feast delivers hot, nutritious meals to people in Fayette County with HIV disease or those on Hospice care for any reason, their caregiver, and any dependant children in the home. For example, a local man moved to Knoxville and met a partner he has been with for 20 years. His mother was diagnosed with Alzheimers and he returned to care for her. His partner stayed in Knoxville for his job.

Unfortunately, as soon as he moved back he was diagnosed with an AIDS related cancer and became very ill. His partner quit his job and moved here to care for them both. They had only a little money from social security for housing, utilities and food. Thanks to Moveable Feast, there will be food on the table.

Another recipient is an elderly mother, who has a myriad of medical problems herself, and is taking care of her daughter who has terminal breast cancer. They are both too ill to prepare dinner every night so Moveable Feast takes that burden off of their plate (so to speak).

Moveable Feast will be serving its 200,000th meal in June and we are throwing the Belmont BBQ to celebrate. By coming and celebrating with us you can help launch us on the way to the next 200,000. 



Transgender Activism by mary crone

If you don't read this entire article, do read the part about the Compton's Cafeteria Riot and the "Screeming Queens" on pages 16-17.

There are a variety of terms to refer to gender orientation including male, female, trans, transgender, genderqueer, intersexual, and transsexual. I am using the term transgender to include everyone that transgresses gender norms including all the labels above and more. The term transsexual indicates those of us who live (or want to live) a good part of their lives as the gender other than the one assigned at birth.

Historically, trans people have been a part of world cultures in many ways not covered in this article. This article focuses on European and American transgender activism in the last 150 years.

I have had the mistaken impression that transgender activism has been a relatively new endeavor, following in the footsteps of gay-lesbian activism. I knew that the 1969 Stonewall riots were instigated largely by drag queens, but I did not understand this event as a part of a longer history of trans activism. I have learned that transgender activism has a long history.

Magnus Hirschfeld: First GLBT Political Organization and First Sex Reassignment Surgeries

Individuals have worked to decrease the oppression and discrimination against people who do not fit into the gender norms of western culture since the late nineteenth century. In 1897, physician Magnus Hirschfeld joined with others in founding the Scientific-Humanitarian Committee, the first political organization in the world dedicated to what we would now consider GLBT rights. They worked unsuccessfully for several decades to persuade the

German Parliament to repeal the anti- gay Paragraph 175 of the Penal Code.

Hirschfeld founded the Institute of Sexology in Berlin in 1919. One of his goals was to improve the treatment of sexual minorities including transgender people He employed transgender individuals on the staff of his Institute and worked with Berlin's police department to curtail the arrest of cross-dressed individuals on suspicion of prostitution.

He promoted enocrinological (hormone treatments) and surgical services for transgender people who wished to change the gendered appearance of their bodies. The first modern "sex-change" surgeries were carried out in collaboration with Hirschfeld and his medical staff in the early 1930s.

There is a docudrama film about Hirschfeld, *The Einstein of Sex*, that will be shown during Pride Month.

Louise Lawrence: MTF Trans Activist

Little information is available concerning trans political activity in the United States in the first half of the twentieth century. A central yet virtually unknown figure in the history of transgender community formation was Louise Lawrence, a male-to-female transgender person who began living fulltime as a woman in San Francisco in the 1940s.

Lawrence developed a widespread correspondence network with transgender people throughout Europe and the United States by the 1950s, and worked closely with Alfred Kinsey to bring the needs of transgender people to the attention of social scientists and sex reformers.

Virginia Prince: First Peer Support and Advocacy Groups

Lawrence was also a mentor to Virginia Prince, who founded the first peer support and advocacy groups for male cross-dressers in the United States.

Prince believed that the binary gender system harmed both men and women by alienating them from their full human potential, and she considered cross-dressing to be one means of redressing this perceived social ill.

In 1952, Prince and a handful of other transgender people in Southern California published *Transvestia: The Journal of the American Society for Equality in Dress.* Though it lasted only two issues, this publication marks the beginning of the transgender rights movement in the United States.

Also in 1952, Christine Jorgensen had a widely publicized "sex-change" operation that made her an international celebrity and brought transgender issues to public attention. In 1960, Virginia Prince again tried publishing a journal, also called Transvestia. This time it became a success and provided information about transgender issues for many years. In 1962, she founded the

Hose and Heels Club, one of the first support groups for cross dressers and transsexual individuals. Support organizations for male cross-dressers proliferated in the 1970s and 1980s, most traced their roots Prince's pioneering organizations.

Compton's Cafeteria: "Screaming Queens" The pre-Stonewall Riot

Militant transsexual resistance first occurred in San Francisco in 1966, on a hot August night at a popular all-night restaurant, Compton's Cafeteria, in the seedy Tenderloin district. Compton's Cafeteria was one of the few places where trans people could congregate publicly in the city. They were not always welcome in gay bars at that time because cross-dressing was illegal. Police could use the presence of cross dressed people in a bar as a pretext for making a raid and closing it down. Hustlers, street people, cross dressers, drag queens, gays, lesbians and other continued on next page



gender queer folks frequented this restaurant until early morning hours.

On this particular night, a belligerent cop accustomed to manhandling Compton's clientele, attempted to arrest one of the queens. Instead of going quietly, she threw her coffee in his face. The crowd erupted, cups, saucers, and travs began flying through the air. The police retreated outside and called in reinforcements. The Compton's management ordered the place closed, and those still inside began breaking windows. Police reinforcements arrived, and the fighting became serious. For the first time, drag queens and trans people fought back. A number of policemen were injured, stomped by size 10 high-heeled shoes or hit in the face with a heavy purse.

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The next night, more transgender people, hustlers, Tenderloin street people, as well as middle class gays and lesbians joined in a picket line outside the cafeteria, which would not allow transgender people back in. The demonstration ended with the

newly installed plate-glass windows being smashed again.

This act of resistance was a dramatic turning point for the transgender community. A network of transgender social, psychological, and medical support services was established. Activists worked with Harry Benjamin who set the "standards for care" for medical treatment including "sex change" or, what is now called sexual reassignment surgery for transsexuals. They also received support and money from the Erickson Educational Foundation and in 1968 created the National Transsexual Counseling Unit, the first peer-run support and advocacy organization in the world.

Not only did trans people receive recognition, services, and hope from the Compton resistance, gay, lesbian, and bisexual people also were encouraged to work for an end to oppression. Stonewall occurred three years after Compton and was another event led by trans people.

An examination of our history tells me that Stonewall was not the start of our resistance or our civil rights movement. GLBT people have been working steadily and will continue to do so untill all oppression ends. See related article pg 21.





The Positive View By Dr. Sherry and Dr. Skippy

Part 4: Emotional connections

Strong emotional connections with others are an important aspect of positive well-being. Many of the participants in our study wrote about how their identity as a gay man or lesbian helped them to make stronger emotional connections with other people.

Gay men and lesbians wrote about connections with straight men and women as well as members of the GLBT community. For example, one gay man wrote, "Living outside of many of society's expectations for male-female interactions, gay men are free to have closer, nonsexual friendships with women (lesbian or heterosexual)."

Another gay man wrote about how being gay facilitated his relationships with straight men, "I also like how I've served as a bridge for some straight men who are attracted to my masculinity yet my not being competitive with them in certain ways. They often feel free to open up to me because I'll understand and yet not put them down for being fallible or vulnerable as their straight male friends might."

Lesbian responses included, "I tend to get along well with straight men because they see me as an ally," and, "I am able to have close friendships with both straight and gay men without any concerns or confusion over whether there is any sexual component to our relationships. I am also able to have close friendships with both straight and gay women, because straight women seem unconcerned about my sexuality and other gay women are obviously comfortable with it."

Many survey participants also indicated being gay or lesbian created opportunities to have stronger connections with a same-sex partner. For example, one gay man wrote, "As a gay man, I have insider knowledge about the very group of people I am attracted to ... I always have a keen understanding about what I am dealing with, positive and negative, when I am interacting with another man in a friendship or relationship."

Another gay man wrote, "An advantage of dating a man is that we can do 'guy stuff' together ... it's like having a best friend and a

lover in the same person."

A lesbian wrote, "Another positive thing about being a lesbian is that I am able to not only relate to my partner, but understand her as well. We understand each other's emotions and feelings." Another lesbian responded, "I feel women are capable of a deeper, different kind of love... Sex with women is great because they have the same parts and have a better idea of what to do."

Think for a moment: how has being a gay man or lesbian facilitated your emotional connections with others? strong emotional connections with a partner or good friend? How have these strong connections

contributed to your well-being?

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Transactivism Today Pat Califia

The following is selected from the final chapters of <u>Sex Changes: The Politics of Transgenderism</u> by Pat Califia. This book has been called "a meticulously researched analysis of the contemporary history of transsexuality."

I suspect that much of the hatred and fear of transsexuals is based on the discomfort that others experience when they are forced to recall the pain of involuntary gender conditioning. It is easier to believe we never had a choice about something so fundamental than to process and accept the fact that the choice was taken away from us and ruthlessly suppressed.

What was done to us in the name of manhood and womanhood, and why? What doors were closed to us? What selves where murdered? What pleasures and possibilities were stilled? And why was it so important for the entire process to exist in the first place? Whose interests did it serve? Certainly not the needs of the individual child, the adolescent, the adult.

Gender tyranny is virtually invisible. We have to learn to see it in action if we are going to understand it and put a stop to it. Who would you be if you had never been punished for gender-inappropriate behavior, or seen another child punished for deviation from masculine or feminine norms, or participated in dishing out such punishment? What would it be like to grow up in a society where gender was truly consensual? If the rite of passage was to name your own gender at adolescence, or upon your transition into adulthood?

What would it be like to walk down the street, go to work, or attend a party and take it for granted that the gender of the people you met would not be the first thing you ascertained about them? What impact would that have on how you treated them? Or on how they treated you? What if gender

was no longer a marker for privilege, certain personality traits, or roles in the family?

If you could change your sex as effortlessly in reality as you can in virtual reality, and change it back again, wouldn't you like to try it at least once? Who do you think you might become? What is that person able to do that you don't think you can do now? What would change about your politics, clothing, food preference, sexual desires, social habits, driving style, job, body language, or behavior on the street? Are you able to imagine becoming a hybrid of your male and female self, keeping the traits that you value and abandoning the ones that are harmful?

What would it be like to live in a society where you could take a vacation from gender, Or (even more importantly) from other people's gender. Imagine the creation of Gender Free Zones. What if we all helped each other to manifest our most beautiful, sexy, intelligent, creative, and adventurous inner selves, instead of cooperating to suppress them?

If these questions frighten, offend, or annoy you, you are one of the people who stand to benefit from transactivism although it probably doesn't fee like your benefactor. And if these questions amuse, engage, and challenge you, you're probably a tranativist already. Welcome to the genderevolution, indeed.


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
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
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
