At Medical School Bill seeks in-state service

"There is a severe shortage of doctors in Kentucky. We have to protect the people first." Sen. Tom Easterly, D—Franfort, said this is the reason he proposed a bill to the state legislature that will tighten the ions to Kentucky medical

Graduates wouldhave to practice Graduates wouldhave to practice in Kentucky one year for each year of medical school or repay the state for the cost of their education. Any student failing to sign this agreement would be denied admission to UL or UK medical

agreement would be denied admission to UL or UK medical schools.

Easterly said, "The proof there is a shortage of doctors is the fact that one outoff five newly licensed doctors in the US are from a foreign grountry. One out of three doctors in Kertucky is foreign."

Currently in Kentucky, there is a much success."

Stearns coal miners plead strikers' case

The striking miners at the Justus mine in Stearns, Ky, 's are "stronger than when they started," said Linited Mine Workers organizer Jay Kolenz last night. "It's been a hardfought strike, but I beleive they're going to fightthis one throughto the end."

end."

Kolenz, who was accompanied by four of the miners and their wives, spoke before a audience of about 50 at the Student Center small Ballroom last night. He accused the Blue Diamond Coal Co., which owns the mine, of inviting the strike by refusing to observe safety lawsin its mines.

mines.

Miner Carlos Taylor said it was a policy of the mine operators to ignore complaints about safety hazards.

lazards.

"We would report something to the company and they would write notes to their mine supervisors," he said. "The supervisors would look at the notes and just tell each other to ignore them."

Taylor was one of 19 miners who were injured in the Justus mine when the engine on a mantrip that was transporting them to their section of the mine to work failed, sending them plunging down an

section of the mine to work failed, sending them plunging down an inderground slope in a brakeless transport car.

"Those mantrips are supposed to have two engines and this one had been operating on one for a long time. We reported it several times. The mine inspectors even wrote up a citation for it one time, but the company never fixed it," he ex-plained.
When the one functioning engine

When the one functioning engine on the mantrip failed, there was no second engine to power it. The resulting mishapresulted in serious

resulting mishapresulted in serious injuries to many of the miners, actuding one who was totally paralyzed. The mine was operated by the Stearns Mining Company until December 1975, when it was purchased by Blue Diamond. At that time, the miners were represented by the McCreary County Miner's Union, which Taylor said "did almost nothing" to help improve the safety conditions of the mine.

safety conditions of the mine. In January 1976, Taylor and several other miners went to one of the UMW's organizers for help. On

"We went to those people beause we needed them,"Taylor said. "We have to have better conditions in that mine."

Taylor and the other men who helped get the UMW organizers in touch with the miners have since been fired by the company. Kolenz said this is a common practice of coal companies

"They dismiss the men whenthey find out that they helped get the union into a mine. They don't give them a reason, but the men know what it was for," he said.

"The miners were sitting on a powder keg down there," he added. "That mine was in disastrous shape that's why they wanted the union brought in. They wanted a say in their own safety. They didn't want another Scotia."

(The Scotia mine in Oven Fork, Ky., also owned by Blue Diamond, was the scene of twin explosions in March, 1976 which killed 21 miners and five mine safety inspectors. Some of the safety violations cited in the Justusmine were similar to the conditions which resulted in the Scotia explosions.)

Negotiators for Blue Diamond have refused to accept demands

January 31, the miners voted 126-47 from UMW negotiators that mine to bave the UMW certified as their bargaining agent.

Blae Diamond's negotiatorsclaim that the stumbling block has been the UMW's refusal to accept a "no strike" clause in the contract.
The strikehas been going on for 15 months, amid sporadic outbreaks of violence. Blue Diamond has hired a team of armed security guardisfrom the Storm Security Agency to guard the entrances to the mine. They initially carried submachine guns and automatic rifles.

A recent court injunction limits A recent coart injunction impacts and sugards to carrying only shotguns and handguns. The same court injunction also limits the number of pickets at the mine to six at the clevator entrance and four at the typic entrance. The pickets are not permitted to carry weapons.

Since the arrival, of the armed guards on the strike lines, there have been several outbreaks of volence. Five guards have been shot in exchanges ofgunfire, as well as two picketers.

At the question-and-answer sessionfollowing last night's forum, several heated exchanges tookplace between the miners on the podium and hecklers in the audience.

On Wednesday, about 100 of the 150 strikers gathered at the main picket line to confront three miners who apparently decided they wanted to end their participation in the 5 month-old strike, Circuit Judge J.B. Johnson, Jr. and Etate Police

Circuit stugge J.B. Journals, M. Land Exact Said.
16 strikers were arraigned in Williamsburg on contempt of court charges six weeks after Johnson had issued an injunction at the mine. The strikers were accused of violating Johnson's restraining order, which limits to six the number of miners on the main picket line.



and came up with \$500,000, contributed to a private corporation called the Wildcat Foundation by barons from the eastern Kentucky coal fields.

Thishousing hoopla is a reflection of what America has done to sports. It's been packaged and marketed, painted and tainted, analyzed and explained, worshipped and con-demned. But the fan prevails.

So coaches are hired with an assuring word and given a vote of confidence every time the season looks grim. But long-term contracts can be bought up and no mentor is so naived think that he is above it. This is called pressure—pressure to produce.

Admittedly, basketball departures willopen only about 15 spaces. But think about the rooms occupied by football players-practically ar


Tace it—they re special people.





Volunteers learn nursing in Kentucky communities

Eighteen senior UK nursing students spend most of each week off-campus. As volunteers, they're spending their community health semester in Prestonsburg semester in Prestonsburg and Hazard, Ky. Senior nursing students have one semester in community health and another in medical-surgical. Eight students travel each week to Prestonsburg and/o to Hazard for their training experience. The American

experience. The American Health Educational Systems asked the University for students volunteers in the communities. The students' expenses are financed by the

state.
Judi Currier and Stephanie
Stone are two of the nursing
students who go to students who go to Prestonsburg Currier, from Northern Ohio, said that it gives her a different cultural environment in which to learn

Stone, from Cincinnati, said Stone, from Cincinnati, said they are made more aware of the health care needs in Appalachia, "and we know that we could go there and get jobs. Their ideas are dif-ferent, it's a completely different social values system. To them, more of the simple things are imsimple things are important," Stone said.

portant," Stone said.

There are nursing classes on Monday and Friday, so the students leave on Monday around dinner time and return Thursday about noon. Stone mentioned that she doesn't especially like the two-and-a-half hour drive, "but the University does provide us with a car and gas money."

money."
The students have two trailers in which the eight of them live. The students are also given \$6 a day for food. Every evening the group holds a post conference, to discuss the clinics.
In Prestonsburg, the students are divided into four groups of two and sent to

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what are called their home bases, local health clinics. Currier and Stonego to the Magoffin County Clinic in Saylorsville, population 1,200. The main health problems there, they say, are immunization, pre-natal care, child abuse, and wife abuse. Currier said they have one doctor in four counties to dediver all babies. "At the clinic, we go through the routine nursing process," said Stone. "The most basic thing we do isto educate the patients onhow take care of themselves, while we get to see the inneworkings of the social services system. We've seen how the different health agencies work together and how the different health agencies work together and how the different health agencies work together and how the clinics refer people to the agencies and services."

"There is a scarcity opersonned in the clinic, but you can tell that everyone there really cares about helping people," Currier said. The groups also make home family in which the father land to have a food amputated. Agent 007, the number assigned to Bond after he received a license to kill from Britain's Secret Service. now all the action and intrique behind the James Bond phenomenon comes to the Student Center Theatre with their presentation of the entire series of films adapted from Ian Fleming's famous novels. From now until the novels. From now until the end of thesemester, the films will be shown on consecutive Mondays beginning October

In the middle 1960's James Bond was so immensely popular worldwide that the oks were selling at the rate of over five million a year, and the films were breaking box office records. During 1965, one New York theatre, showed Goldfinger around the clock to accomodate the masses, with only a few breaks to clean up the popseveral inche

The Aston-Martin car Bond used in that movie was nearly ripped apart by overripped apart by over-enthusiastic fans trying to get souvenir accessories and handles as the car was on display in Milan, Italy.

Dr. No (to be show Monday night) was the first James Bond flick ever produced with Sean Connery being the first of the three Bonds. Connery was selected from a group of over 100 candidate survey conducted by United

In this first film, Bond discovers a plot to wreck the American aerospace program while he is in the Caribbean investigating the death of another British agent. This is theintroduction to the worldwide criminal organization SPECTRE and its mastermind, Dr. No.

Establishing the trend for all the future flicks, Bond meets beautiful women, risks his life several times and eventually kills Dr. No, all of which keeps the viewers constantly happy. In From Russia With Love

(Oct. 24), SPECTRE attempts to avenge the death of

corn and trash, which had accumulated to a depth of securing a Soviet coding securing a Soviet coding device, only to have him killed as soon as he crosses the border. Most of the ex-citement is a result of his trying to escape from SPECTRE.

Goldfinger (Oct. 31) was nextin line. One of the most popular Bond films ever, even the soundtrack became famous as it made it to the top of the music charts. The plot centers around "Bad guy" Ernest Goldfinger attempts to rob Ft. Knox. This one premiered the famous Aston-Martin, a car for theman who has everything, complete

with ejection seat.

Ernst Starvo Blofeld is introduced as the new evildoer, along with Emilio Largo in Thunderball (Nov. 7). Blofeld is characterized by ears with no lobes, and appears again in two later Bond films. In Thunderbal, SPECTRE hijacks a NATO bomber and threatens to bomb a Western European city if its demands are not met. The highlight of this one is an exciting underwater fight between Bond, his soldiers, and SPECTRE. his

You Only Live Twice (Nov. 14) involves a near world war. As Bond travels to Japan he discovers that SPECTRE and Blofeld are behind it, destroying aerospace vehicles. In this story Bond often gets advice from a friend named Tiger Tanaka, a Japanese agent. Twice is the ideal Bond flick-full of suspense, action and sexy women.

On Her Majesty's Secret Service (Nov. 21), in which Agent 007 role is taken over by George Lazenby, is the only film in which Bond gets married. He pops the

Controversial 'Oh! Calcutta!' to play Lexington

Critic Kenneth Tyson began his review of Oh! Calcutta! by recalling a sex manual he had read as a teenager.

The preface to the book, according to Tyson, began something like this; "You may, as you turn these pages, find your fingers beginning to tremble a bit—your heart start to race. Don't be worried about this, it is quite natural as the very subject of sex is apt to set the whole man aquiver."

Ever since Oh! - Calcutta! first hit New York in 1969, it has been setting men, and women, aquiver. And since Lexington quivers over more things than most cities (with the possible exception of Cincinnati), Calcutta! threatened to set the town on its collective ear.

question while hiding from Blofeld in a barn with his future bride. Blofeld attempts to wipe out a good portion of the world through germ warfare (believe it or not), but of course, Bond steps into save the day. The film, set in the mountains of Germany, ends abruptly and more sadly than most in the series, although 007 successfully attacks Blofelds' fortress.

But, according to LCC Executive Director Tom Minter, his hands were tied by the law.

"The bottom line is thatthe production of Oh! Calcutta! is permitted by law and the LCC is prohibited by law from keeping out such productions," Minter said at the time.

Broadway Productions has already fought, and won, several courtroom battles. In Cleveland, Ohio a permanent in junction was issued against Mayor Perk's attempt to deny use of the Cleveland Music Hall to the show and a similar battle had the same outcome in Erie, Pennsylvania.

The company is currently experiencing problems with the courts in Cincinnati, where city officals are seeking to keep the musical from playing in Music Hall.

Oh! Calcutta!, opened off-Broadway in June, 1969 and despite being universally panned by the critics, played for over three years—a total of 1,314 performances. This past spring, the show was revived on Broadway where it is still playing.

The musical, a series of skits saterizing attitudes

toward sex, has enjoyed a great deal of success and caused a great deal of commotion because of the several nude scenes per-

formed on stage. However, most critics have said that the only thing the scenes have added to the play was novelty.

A few tickets are still available for both the 8 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. showings at the Opera House.

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
