physics, chemistry, geology, et alia), (d) biological sciences (botany, zoology, physiology, bacteriology, pathology, et alia); (e) the professional schools, to which the student who has passed through the college with distinction, or who has received a degree, may be admitted.

IN the college, the student will not be required to attend classes unless so moved (unless he wants to) out now he is progressing, until he is ready to take a comprehensive examination. If he fails in this he may stay in the college or leave it; if he passes he may leave the university honorably, leaving no degree, or go into a division where he will take narrow courses in small seminar groups in preparation for a degree.

TO those who understand the new system at Chicago, the outstanding features of the plan are the reward of industry and the placing of stress on knowledge rather than on attendance, attitude toward the professor, et alia. And those who understand it are rejoicing that United States institutions of higher education are becoming educated within themselves.

 Sigma Chi, fraternity champions, won the intramural midwinter football championship by defeating the Wrecking Crew. The final score was six first downs to two first downs for the Wrecking Crew. Sigma Chi reached the four yard line once, but the Wrecks held, and bled out of danger. From then on, the game developed into a punting duel, with Wallace, of the Wrecks, outpunting the Sigma Chi boys with each attempt at punting. Sigma Chi presented a capable fullback in Davison who turned out to be a real, actual battering ram for the champs. The two teams displayed good football, considering the time that the coaches were allowed in teaching fundamentals and few signs that the game was a struggle. For the rambling Wrecks, Louis Toth, versatile varsity backfield star, and Frank Seale, former All-Virginia center and probable center on the 1931 Kentucky varsity, attempted to round the "dorm" into condition.
