Women who do not have children, do not breastfeed and do not use birth control are often at greater risk for certain types of cancer including breast cancer, endometrial cancer and ovarian cancer, she said.

These issues pose risks for alcohol abuse, substance abuse and obesity. Woodrum said.

Woodrum also focused on destroying myths that surround female homosexuality, such as the idea that a person's sexuality is not important in treating them.

"While it can be more difficult and uncomfortable for both the patient and the doctor, a person's sexual history is incredibly important in looking at a person's overall health," Woodrum said.



UK police say crime disclosure law working well

Law: Minger Act requires colleges to give prompt disclosure of crime, fire

FRANKFORT, Ky. — A law requiring prompt, public disclosure of fires and crimes on campus has been fairly smoothly implemented, the University of Kentucky's police chief said Monday.

"Overall, it's not been overly problematic, as some of us expected it would be," Capt. Rebecca Langston told the General Assembly's interim Education Committee.

A woman who lobbled for the law after her son died in a dorm fire said Langston's statement represented a significant turnabout by UK officials.

"Their attitude is one of the best," Gail Minger told reporters outside the meeting.

"They were fighting this bill hard when

first came up" two years ago. "They ought it was going to be a lot harder than it

in essence requires Kentucky's public and private colleges and universities to let the public know about campus crimes and all rives, whether accidental or intentionally set. That includes maintaining a daily, public log of crimes. A fire on campus is to be immediately reported to the state fire marshal. A fire scene on campus cannot be cleared or cleaned up without the fire marshal's permission.

Michael Minger, 19, of Niceville, Fla. died in an alleged arson fire in a dormitory at Murray State University on Sept. 19, 1988. His family alleged that an arson fire in the same dormitory less than a week earlier was contained and hushed up by the university. Had he known about it, Minger would have moved out, his mother said.

Gail Minger lobbied for a disclosure law and the General Assembly enacted it in 2000. The law was amended this year to add sone fine details, such as defining "immediately" to mean that the fire marshal must be notified, at the latest, within two hours of a fire or threat of fire being discovered.

The amendments, made at the behest of at least two schools she would not identify,

rankled Gail Minger.

"I've come to understand you cannot legislate attitude," she told the Education Committee.

Another result of the Murray State fire was the launching of an effort to get student housing up to modern fire-safety standards statewide, including installation of sprinklers. The last of the projects — the Cooperstown and Shawneetown complexes for married students at UK — are scheduled for completion in 2004, according to the Council on Postsecondary Education.

Until this fall, several UK residence halls were still without sprinklers.

Holmes Hall, Blazer Hall, Keeneland Hall, and all of the Blanding and Kirwan low-rise structures were not armed against flames.

That means that about 2,100 undergradu-

That means that about 2,100 undergraduate-occupied spaces could not have deterred any hazardous fires.

During the summer, UK installed sprinkler systems in residence halls.

Also each entrance door in the hallways of dorns has been replaced to stop the spread of smoke.

Stephanie Simms, an intregrated strate-gic communication junior and house manag-er at the Kappa Delta sorority house, said she's reassured knowing her house now has

she's reassured knowing her house now has sprinklers.

"It's been a hassle having them put it in during the summer, but I know it's good in the long run," she said. "It's there to protect us."

FBI warns of anniversary attacks

WASHINGTON — The FBI is warning local police and the U.S. utility, banking and transportation industries of a steady stream of threats mentioning New York, Washington and the anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks. U.S. military bases and diplomatic missions worldwide are also being placed on high alert for the week, officials said. The flurry of incoming threats picked up by intelligence sources is challenging the FBI to determine which might be credible. While officials say they have no specific details of an impending attack, the government is taking no chances. White House press secretary Ari Fliescher said Monday the threat of new attacks remains a worry to U.S. officials. "Anniversaries on the control of the contr

Military deploys additional troops

ZAMBOANGA, Philippines —
About 1.000 more troops will be deployed to battle al-Qaida linked rebels on a southern Philippine island where at least 22 soldiers and guerrillas died in a clash last week, officials said Monday The offensive aimed at wiping out an Abu Sayyaf rebel group on Sulu Island was focused on a jungle region near the coastal town of Patikul, said Southern Philippine military forces chief Lt. Gen. Ernesto Carolina. "This will be the Last fight." he predicted. Abu Sayyaf rebels have been loosely linked to Osama bin-Laden's al-Qaida terror network.



Merger won't affect all of College of HES

In reference to a story regarding the merging of Interior Design and the College of Architecture in the Sept. 5 issue of the Kernel, readers should be aware that the proposal mentioned in Josh Thomas' article would only apply to this single department. The other units in the College of Human Environmental Sciences may develop their own proposals in the future for alignment with other colleges and/or renaming, but those will be separate and distinct from the one involving interior design. In fact, at this stage I am not aware of a consensus among HES faculty with regard to restructuring, but I am certain many active and interesting discussions among HES faculty will be occurring over the semester.


