If the tax bill is made into law, users of tobacco and alcohol products would pay more under the bill's current structure. Cigarettes would receive a one-time tax increase of 26 cents per pack, raising the cost of a carron an additional \$5.20. Cigars and rolling tobacco would get a 7.5 percent increase at the wholesale level, and a 5-cent-per-unit tax would be placed on smokeles tobacco, such as snuff.

A 2 percent increase would be applied to alcohol at the wholesale level, increasing its overall tax to 11 percent — a 40-cent

Many of UK's scoring opportunities during that stretch came off Buildog turnovers. Freshman guard Rajon Rondo had seven of his school-record-tying eight steals in the second half, and Mississippi State committed a season-high 23 "Once that dam opened up a little bit—and started a little leak—it started leaking more and more." said Buildogs head coach Rick Stansbury. Shakespeare satire shines onstage

The classic tragedies of Shakespeare are known and beloved throughout the world. As loved as they are, it's hard to watch such stupid mistakes when the audience has full knowledge of the situation. You just want to expose lago to Othello and tell Tybalt of the new marriage before everything goes awry. Good Night Desdemona, Good Morning Juliet opens with Constance Ledbelly, played by Dana Chester, postulating on the possibility that these ersatz tragedies are actually comedies that Shakespeare stole and twister lectures to the audience as if it was a group of students, and her confidence in her theory makes the logic plausible.

Constance is working on

theory makes the logic plausible.
Constance is working on Port dectorate, which hinges on the decryption of the Gustav manuscript. All of this hard work for so long has left Constance socially insecure. Chester plays this particularly well when the love of Constance's life — and boss — delivers the news of his new post at Oxford. Her inability to act cool around Claude Night (Terrence Tucker) is reminiscent of middle school self-consciousness.

Last week, approximately 450 students from colleges and universities around and universities around Kentucky gathered in the Capitol to petition legislator for more funding for higher education. The attendance a education. The attendance at this year's rally though up from 25 last year, is still a dis-mal showing for UK college students. For its part, UK Student Government provid-ed free transportation to the rally. President Rachel Watts and presidential candidate Becky Ellingsworth met with state legislators to discuss tuition hikes, it was nice to see SG officials in Frankfort petitioning state leaders. see SG officials in Frankfort petitioning state leaders. Even though spending \$1,700 on two charter buses to ferry students to Frankfort is less than cost-effective, providing student representation on issues such as tuition is central to SG's true mission.

Last week, the Town and Gown Commission gathered to talk about problems with streets and neighborhoods surrounding campus — too many beer bottles and cars parked in the yard, as well as insufficient extract lightling. parked in the yard, as well as insufficient street lighting. Local residents claim students engage in unruly behavior and landlords are reluctant to do anything about it. "It looks like Bourbon Street in the middle of Marid Gras," said David Stevens, councilman at large, referring to the condition of Elizabeth Street. Hyperbole for sure, but Stevens and the commission are serious. They are planning a door-to-door initiative to get students and families living around campus to come together.

campus to come together. While it's safe to assume While it's sale to assume that students and residents are probably guilty of causing tension in neighborhoods surrounding UK, it's pathetic that a municipal organization has to attempt to teach people how to be good neighbors.

Condemnation donation

Mayor Teresa Isaac, who appeared on "Live with Lee" last week, is encouraging people to make donations the law firm prosecuting the case against the Kentucky case against the KentuckyAmerican Water Co. The
Lexington-Fayette Urban
County Council has restricted further spending in the
Fayette Circuit Court, except
for fees related to drawing up
papers that would end the
condemnation. Isaac said she
was going to use private
funds to go forth with public
condemnation of a private
company. Does anyone see
the irony here?

Meanwhile, the council
tabled a motion that would

tabled a motion that would tabled a motion that would rescind Isaac's negotiating ability and replace her with a panel of three to seven council members, which would be selected by Vice Mayor Mike Scanlon. Political opponents of Scanlon will charge that he is usurping power and doing little to build a coalition, but Isaac has already shown that she is completely unwilling to compromise on this issue.

Tax legislation passed

Tax legislation passed

The Kentucky House passed a tax overhaul bill 964 Friday that included most of Gov. Ernie Fletcher's provisions. The tax takes 300,000 low-income workers off the rolls and lowers state payroll taxes from 6 percent to 5.8 percent of income for everyone making less than \$75,000 per year. Although the GOP-controlled Senate will now have to approve the bill, the nearly unanimous support in the heavily Democratic House is a nice but rare event in Frankfort these days. Silence on tuition hike unacceptable
