# **Board of Trustees** allots more money for neonatal units

A recommendation to spend \$1.29 million to increase the number of beds to 45 in the Albert Chandler Medical Center's neonatal care unit was approved by the Board of Trustees yesterday. The recomendation goes to the Council on Higher Education for

the Council on Higher Education for approval.

The renovation of the unit is in its fourth and final phase. Initially holding 17 beds, the neonatal unit now has 39 beds. Renovation increased the number of beds from 17 to 22 in the first phase, from 22 to 31 in the second and from 31 to 39 in the third phase.

The Board also approved a \$978,300 project in the Hospital to expand the capacity of utilities, emergency power, central air, vacuum and oxygen and renovating space. The recomendation goes to the CHE for approval.

# Farm life an alternative to dorms

"I couldn't live in a dorm. There are to many rules to follow and a confined feeling about it," Dennis Parret, a junior majoring in agriculture economics, said.

Parret lives and works at UK's
Coldstream Farm, one of three UK
research farms which together
compromise about 2,400 acres north
of Lexington. The other two farms are
the Main Chance crop farm and the
Spindeltop horse farm.
However, Coldstream is the only
farm which houses student tenants, as
it has since the early 1960s.

The 16 students living at Coldstream attend classes in the morning and must work 20 hours a week on the farm. According to Parret, the pay is minimal, but the benefits are many.

"We have a nice place to live and it is relatively inexpensive, Parret said. But I think my biggest benefit is the experience I am receiving."

According to Dr. Tim Stahly, an animal science professor at UK, working on the farm not only gives the students experience but also helps

animals," Stahly said. "The farm provides a great opportunity for them to learn."

The purpose of Coldstream Farm is to help animal science students become familiar with the handling and studying of livestock. Coldstream is divided into four smaller farms — Dairy, Swine, Beef and Sheep. Each farm is equipped with student living quarters which houses four to six students and contains a completely furnished kitchen.

"We supply things you would find in a regular dorm room - bed, desk, chair, closet and dresser," Stahly said.

KENTUCKY'S PROPOSED PERMANENT STRIP

KENTUCKY'S PROPOSED PERMANENT STRIP MINE plan will meet the requirements of the 1977 federal Surface Mining Act but worn 'imror federal regulations, the state's chief environmental official said yesterday.

"We expect to negotiate out any odifferences," said Frank Harscher, secretary of natural resources and environmental protection. Kentucky has not yet filed its permanent regulations, taking advantage of a seven-month extension of the original Aug. 3 federal deadline. A federal judge in Washington ordered the deadline extended to March 3, and a proposal is before Congress to extend it for another five months, to Aug. 3, 1980.

The state will take advantage of the full extension "it it proves beneficial to us and doesn't make us forge the advantages we have." Harscher said in an interview, "We are taking the time to produce a quality product."

"We have no alternative at this point but to propose it," Frank Harscher, secretary of the state Department for

Harscher told the Interim Joint Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources that 50 percent of Kentucky's air pollutants come from automobile emissions.

White added that Catter is under some pressure to officially declare his candidacy soon, a formatily that would allow Carter to get commitments of support from important groups before Kennedy can present himself as an option. O'Neill's statement represented a quick turnabout from his earlier predictions that Kennedy would not seek the Democratic nomination. Over the weekend, O'Neill said had "strong feelings" that Kennedy would not run.

# Tests teach students the art of test-taking

Recently, newspapers have featured accounts of the growing controversy swirling around "standardized" tests Anyone wishing to enter college, and Anyone wishing to enter college, and later professional and graduate school, is subjected to terse marathon examinations, which presumably measure ability in subject-matter, levels of native intelligence, and somehow reveal what is termed "potential." What is ignored in the continuing debate is the central talent: taking tests. Beginning in the first taking tests. Beginning in the first grade, American students become extremely skilled in the nuances and

Students learn quickly that society's rewards are based on test scores, not upon command of subject matter upon command of subject matter upon come students catch on the the rules of this game, they realize that one does not have to "know" much, as long as test scores are high. Thus our society now has nhistigans who cannot tell the now has physicians who cannot tell the now has physicians who cannot tell the difference between a humerus and a tibia, lawyers ingorant of torts, teachers of "language arts" who cannot spell or read well, mathematicians who cannot count and who never learned the beauty of their abstract language — every facet of intellectual expertise can boast of to own lack of internal commitment. If pre-med college students soon realize that cheating can achieve the straight-A record supposedly necessary for admission into medical school, they will concentrate on the techniques of padding laboratory results, micro-sized crib sheets, learning the professor's quirks and weaknesses, and (perhaps) cramming

show the "best" medical students make the poorest physicians. Probing beneath the sorry product of our vaunted educational system may reveal a few assumptions that doom our efforts from the beginning. For example, we say that once a student has completed such-and-such acourse, he will "know" this and-that. What do we mean? On the surface, the statement says that a student will achieve mastery of something. Mastery of what? We have a habit of saying that Professor Kopfstercus "knows" his Swahili, or his physics, or his Egyptian archaeology, or his anatomy, or his American Civil War history. Knows? Does this mean mastery? Do teachers make the common mistake of saying sotto voce that students should attain a like mastery? Or, put another way, do that students should attain a like mastery? Or, put another way, do teachers intend students should become carbon copies, once students achieve this assumed command of the subject? This is, if true, an Impossible Demand, which students can easily fake, if they have learned the rules of the testing game. It is quite impossible for any student, no matter how bright, to gain anything more than a vague notion of a subject from one or two courses. Do our tests measure vague motions?

Then there are the scholars we read about from time to time. They appear to live in our world, yet live also in a world of their own. Their talk is

These are the people who function as professors in the larger universities; these are the teachers who give tests and issue grades. How do we deal with this paradox? Research scholars bubble about their own discoveries, but teach according to the system: they will rarely claim "mastery" even of their own specialties. So why do we teach as if we expect students to "know" a subject at the end of a course?



Arguments in the West about "education" began with Greek thinkers, some of whom believed (5th and 4th centuries B.C.) that an "education" prepared a person for participation in public life.

Speaking ability was important, if one was to have influence in democratic Athens. One also learned


some logic by studying geometry; and Plato advocated astronomy and mathematics as parts of what we would call "higher" learning. Aristotle taught that careful exposition was essential for clear thinking and communication (his Rhetoric remains a model textbook) and that one seeks an order in the natural world. One assumes that there is an order, and man's task is to perceive that order. an order in the natural world. One assumes that there is an order, and man's task is to perceive that order. Approaches to that charge still have Platonic and Aristotelian overtones: Plato sought what he called the Idea, Aristotle gathered data to formulate what we still call general laws of nature. After the Romans became infused with many Greek intellectual ideals, they too attempted to define an educational "methodology." Quintilian's Institutio Oratoria also remains a model text. Even in antiquity, one part of education was recognized as crucial, but impossible to classify, and for which one cannot provide a "method" — a student's initial interest. Why should a student seek wisdom, when Plato grunted that there is "no royal road to mathematics?" Yet, if a student has

Yet, if a student has been lucky enough to have learned his beginning entomology from a teacher who absolutely delights in the intriguing mysteries of insects, that students may find himself "caught" for he rest of his life in the never-ending search for wisdom in understanding the universe of beetles, leafhoppers, spiders, millipedes, and the like. 

He terms it a battle between the "super gung-ho macho Chamber of Commerce type" and "the guy who mats 1,000 acres and to be living right in the middle of it."

Boucher came to the coal states, including Kentucky, West Virginia and Tennessee, in July as part of a public relations continental trek for Alaska. His trip is part of a \$2 million campaign to "put the legislature and the governor on the road."

Alaska's Gov. Jay Hammond, the biologist and bush pilot who defeated a building contractor to win re-election in 1978, appointed Boucher to what the Alaskan political activist for 21 years termed "a public relations consultant position."

Boucher spent his time talking to editors of newspapers and learning about problems other states face. He

even stopped in Paradise, Ky., to have a look around. The main argument for self determination affects all states, Boucher said. The Alaskan mistakes, you will not repeat them. We in Alaska have government favors "balanced views" on the need for land development and environmental safety without sacrificing either one. Boucher's position,

them. We in Alaska have profitted from the mistake of others," he said. "And Alaska already protects itself with strong laws."

But the likening of the Kentucky coal country stripmining woes with those imposed on oil-rich Alaska, Boucher said, also creates a problem.

This troplem results because.

This problem results because This problem results because residents of coal producing areas favor stringent federal control over Alaskan development in order to protecet the land from the same fate.

Consequently, when industrial interests want to set The bill the Alaskan government opposes affects 155 million acres of Alaskan lands. It creates 27 million acres of parks and monuments, 17 million acres of preserves, 79 million acres of wildlife refuges, two million acres of "wild and seenie rivers," and adds 2.5 million acres to existing forests. That leaves 2.7 million acres to be re-classified as "wilderness areas."

The vast environmental

industrial interests want to set up shop in Alaska, Boucher said, they have to face a government which demands that the development "pays its way and is environmentally sound.

"We find ourselves caught in

"We find ourselves caught in motionalism - (between) utilizing energy and then the protection of the environment," Boucher said. However, Boucher added, Alaska has a good record for high environmental standards. One example of these high standards include high taxes that developers must pay before they began any construction or mining.




The Lady Kat tennis team traveled to Northern Kentucky University yesterday and defeated the Norsewomen 8-1.

The Lady Kats get a week off before hosting Louisville's Lady Cardinals next Tuesday at 3 p.m. at the complex courts.





# 65 or 70?

### **Board amends retirement policy**

By DEBBIE MCDANIEL

All UK employees, except executives, have a choice between retiring at age 65 or 70, the Board of Trustees decided

yesterday.

And although employees can decide when to retire, either at 65 or 70, they must do so at the end of the fiscal year their birth date falls on. The fiscal year ends July I at UK.

ends July 1 at UK.

The Board established 65 as the general, or normal retirement date for employees hired after June 30, 1964. This also applies to people already employed by June 30, 1964, who reached age 65 after this date.

date.
Or, if employees want to

Or, if employees want to retire during the month they reach age 65, they must have approval from their administrator at least three months before their birth date. The Board's action brings the University's retirement regulations into compliance with the Age Discrimination in Employment Act Employment Act.

Employment Act.
Employees in executive or policy-making positions for two or more years before they creach age 65 must retire on July 1 of the year they turn 65. To be in this category, these employees must also be entitled to an immediate nonforfeitable annual retirement benefit from to an immediate nonforfeitable annual retirement benefit from UK which equals or exceeds \$27,000 per year.

Another change in the policy states that employees who decide to continue to work

after their normal retirement date may be required to retire before reaching age 70. According to the amendment, this will occur if the employee's health condition prevents the "discharge of assigned duties and responsibilities."

Other changes are:

— Retirement contracts issued by the Teachers Insurance and narrotificate size by the College Retirement Equities Fund (CREF).

— No one who is over 70 years old will be hirred as a University employee unless the Doard of Trustes approves the papointment in advance, or if present guarantee of 60 percent of their salary to a defined contribution plan.


