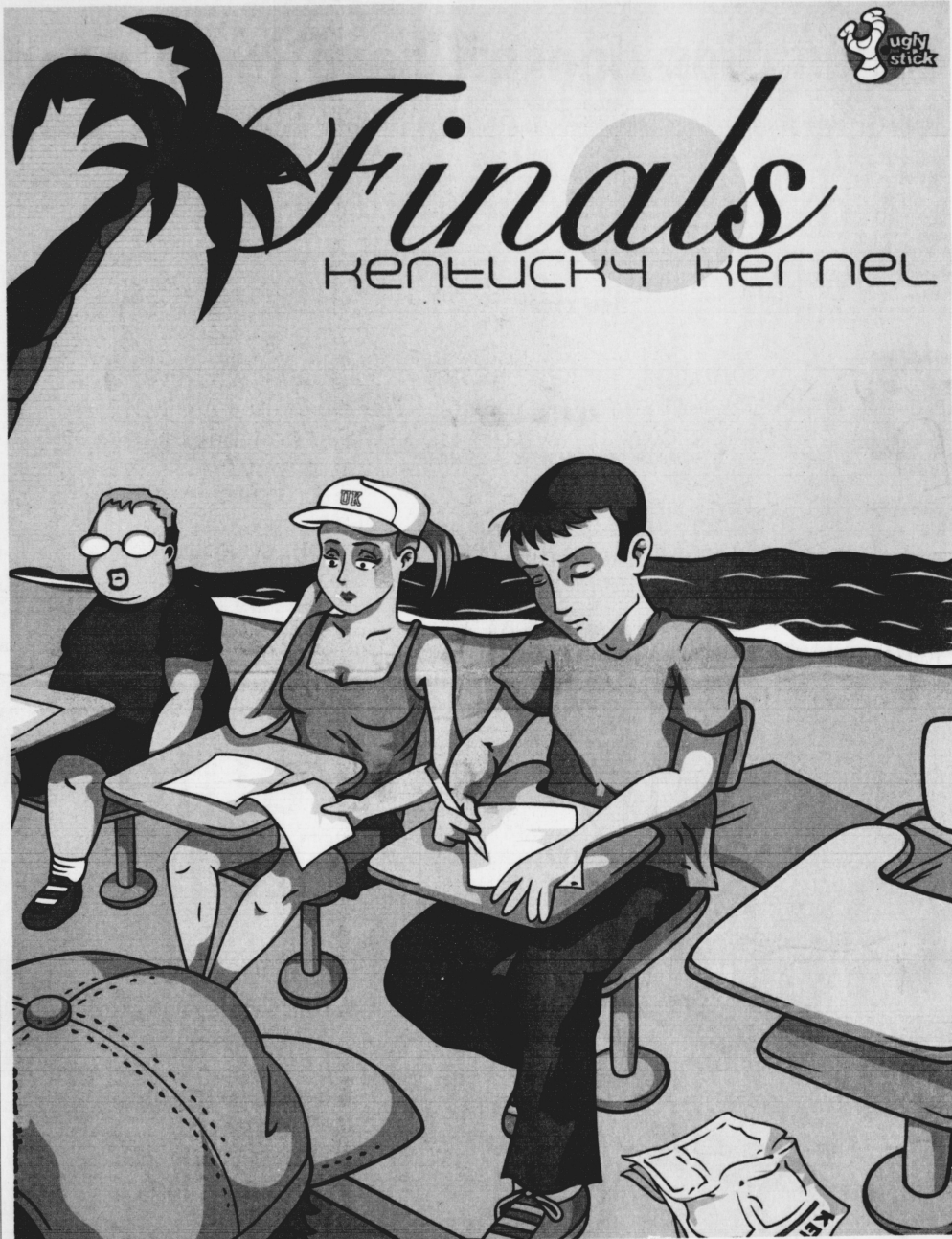

Time to prepare for the rest of life

Planning: The "p" words will help graduating students see the big picture, get a better job and be happier in the long run

To a senior, graduation day signals the end of a long journey, and the beginning of an even longer one.

Some are finding it hard to begin the journey after college because they do not have jobs lined up.

Larry Grabau, an agronomy professor and advisor for the College of Agriculture, said that if a person starts a job search after graduation, they might not find a job for two to six months.

"The biggest advantage to doing a pre-graduation job search is the overlap of all the built-in

waiting periods it takes to get hired," he said.

Unfortunately, the wait for a job is usually unpaid.

"Many people do not have the financial luxury to go without income," said Ashley Moore, assistant director of the Career Center.

Bob Heath, associate professor and advisor in electrical engineering, said that he normally advises his students to begin their job search at the beginning of the semester they are to graduate.

"Most students, from a financial standpoint, want a job so they can go ahead and start earning an income," he said.

Heath added that a first job is

not the end of life — one can always find another job after having a little experience under their belt.

"Go out, get your first job, and after a few years look around at your options. See if something else will suit you better," he said.

A person should keep in mind, however, that a history of too many moves looks bad on resumes, Heath cautioned.

Some new graduates are not worried about finding what they want to do, but rather where they can find a job doing it.

"If you know what you want to do, perhaps it is more important to go somewhere where they do that, rather than set geograph-

ical boundaries for yourself," Grabau said.

Though advisors and career counselors all agree that a graduate would be better off to find a job before graduation, some students disagree.

"There is so much to explore of what you want," said Rob Bricken, an English and secondary education senior. "There are so many opportunities out there, jobs are not immediately necessary."

Sharon Childs, assistant director of the Career Center, said that many graduates seem to think that there is plenty of time after graduation to get a job.

"They have to remember that it

is still a competitive job market out there," she said. "There are numerous applicants for a job, and the person who is more aggressive is the one who will get the job."

Beat stress before stress beats you

Crunch time: Take this advice and give the stress of finals a swift kick in the rear end

As the school year draws to a close, many students find dead week and finals week to be a continuous nightmare filled with blurred vision and endless worries about grades.

Dead week is supposed to mean downtime from classes so students can study and reduce the pressure they feel during finals.

Yet, many students find themselves with presentations, papers and semester projects all due during dead week, leaving no time to study for finals in advance.

Engineering senior Matt Thompson knows the feeling well. "At the end of dead week I have a 50-hour project due, then I turn around and have a whole week of finals," he said.

"I end up feeling overwhelmed and like I am not going to get everything done," Thompson said.

There are a lot of presentations and studying for a lot of finals during the last two weeks," said Katrina St. Clair, a biology senior.

The stress caused by the sometimes-overwhelming workload can cause more than just mental anguish.

Dr. Scott VanMeter, a family practice physician at Good Samaritan Hospital, said stressed students may experience symptoms such as fatigue, sleeplessness, upset stomach, short emotional fuse, lack of hunger and irritability.

For students who are feeling the tension as the semester draws to a close, VanMeter offered ways of dealing with the pressure.

Relaxation techniques like exercise and soothing music work. Plus, identifying the problem, breaking it down, and dealing with it one part at a time is also helpful, he said.

Taking periodic breaks from work helps to clear the mind and cut down on stress, VanMeter said.

It is also a good idea to talk problems out, said VanMeter. "Students can talk to family, friends, student health at UK, or even professional counselors," he said.

However, VanMeter warns that students should not turn to alcohol or drugs as an answer to stress.

"Many times, these things will make the problems worse because you are not getting anything done, you're just putting off

the inevitable," he said. Many students at UK have their own methods of dealing with the stress of finals.

"Instead of staying up all night and trying to study, it's better if I go to sleep for at least a couple of hours," Thompson said. "My mind is more clear after a few hours of sleep."

For others, having a little bit of fun helps when trying to relax. "I find that escaping for a few hours by going to the movies with a friend is helpful in clearing my mind," St. Clair said.

No matter what methods students decide to take in relieving their stress, they can keep in mind that it will all be over in one short week.

Keeping your cool

How to relax

1. Identify the problem and deal with it.
2. Use common relaxation techniques (exercise, yoga).
3. Talk about your problems with someone.
4. Have self-confidence and self-esteem.
5. Study more; allow more time for studying.
6. Have breaks in your studying; get away from it for a while.

Seniors shared experiences

Bye-bye: UK's senior basketball players take Memorial Coliseum's floor for the last time

They came into a program that had fallen on hard times. Along the way, they've shared memories, heartbreak, wedding plans (for one player anyway), and some victories.

And now, they'll be suiting up for the last time at Memorial Coliseum this Sunday at 2 p.m., as No. 17 Mississippi State comes calling in UK's last regular-season game. But for seniors Erica Jackson, Tiffany Wait, Shantia Owens, Natalie Martinez and Katie Vieth, this will be their last chance to play at home in front of their fans, not to mention their friends and family.

"I'll have about 20 or 25 family members there," Vieth said of her delegation, which includes her six brothers and sisters. "All my aunts and uncles are coming. My grandparents are coming. It will be special. A lot of them have never seen me play. My grandmother gets so nervous she gets sick. She just wants us to do so well that she starts worrying about us."

For Martinez, Sunday's game marks the first time her mother and father, who live in Albuquerque, N.M., have seen her play this year. Martinez admits getting a little more pumped to play in front of family members.

"It's always fun to play in front of my mom and dad," she said. "I would love to do well in front of my parents and give them a good show, especially while they're watching their daughter play out there for the last time."

Martinez, Vieth (who's battled nagging injuries this season) and Wait form the backbone of this year's senior class, each playing during head coach Bernadette Mattox's second season, struggling to a 8-19 record (Wait redshirted during the 1995-1996 season). The team welcomed Jackson and Owens in the spring of 1998, with both transferring to UK after successful junior college careers.

It was during those times that the three original seniors forged a common bond together, enduring through tough

times with the promise of success ahead.

"We've been through so many ups and downs," Martinez said. "We came in during Coach's second season, so we were pretty much her original recruiting class. It's going to be a sad thing when we have to leave."

"It's kind of like, 'Oh my God! I can't believe my career is over,'" Wait said. "It's always a plus playing in front of your family. It's your last game, so you're going to give like 150 percent or something."

UK really began to experience winning when Jackson and Owens jumped aboard last season, helping the Cats to their first NCAA tournament appearance since 1990. And with time running out on a repeat appearance, it's the will to win that has driven this group of seniors closer during this up-and-down season.

"I just want to have the best season possible," Owens said of the few games remaining on the schedule in her senior year. "Even if it was my sophomore year, I still wouldn't want it to end on a losing streak or a bad note."

"We all have a great bond with each other," Martinez said of the five seniors. "I think that's going to be the saddest thing about leaving."

But it seems as if the bond will continue on long after graduation, as several members of the class will participate in Wait's summer wedding. Martinez will stick around UK to pursue a graduate degree in social studies. And Owens, Jackson and Wait will probably attempt to continue playing professionally.

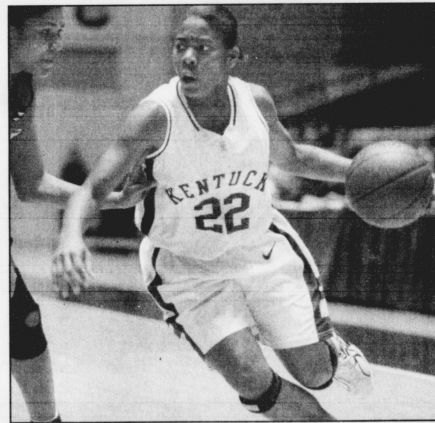
But before the seniors will celebrate their accomplishments as a class, they'd like to add a win over a nationally-ranked opponent led by ex-UK coach Sharon Fanning to their resume.

"I think it's very important, especially since it's our last game," Vieth said. "Winning three games in a row would be a great way to close our careers. Plus, it would give us some good momentum heading into the SEC tournament."

"The young guys saw us here every day in the summer, never missing a workout. Hopefully, that set an example for them."

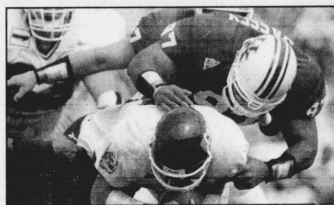
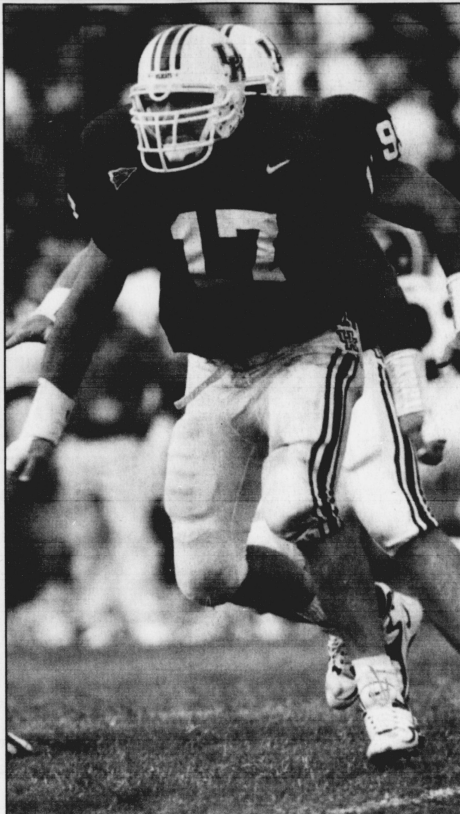
Defensive tackle Massey said it started with last year's group. "We did lay a foundation," he said. "With last year and this year, we have tried to start a tradition here."

To the men of Sigma Pi social fraternity, who had their house burn down due to a space heater which had been left on. To make matters worse, the house wasn't even fully paid for.

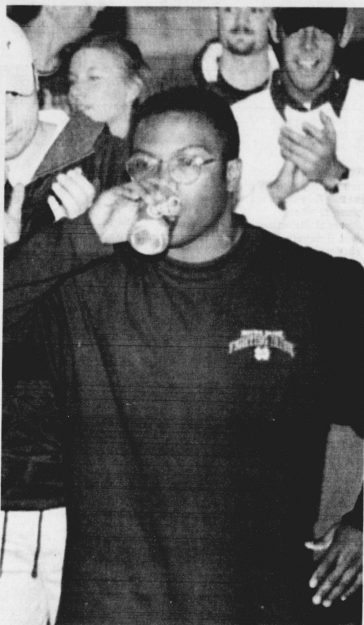
The "Really, Really, Really Bad Planning" Award

Thank God: Despite disliking writing, a humor columnist uses his skills to spread the message of God's love



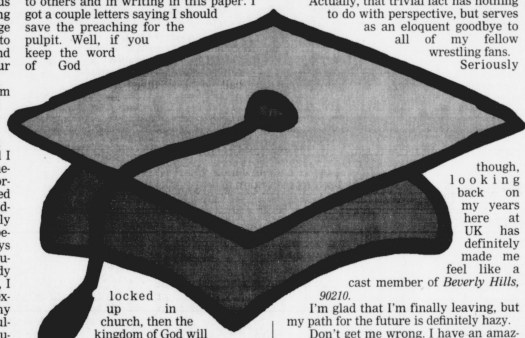

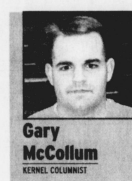
And I didn't do it to get my picture in the paper (they're not even supposed to put it in there, but sometimes they forget).

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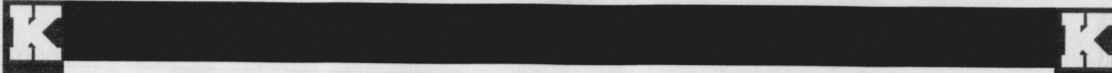
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
