Eight different UK pitchers took the mound Tuesday as the UK baseball team defeated Marshall 14-4 at Cliff Hagan Stadium.

UK coach Keith Madison used four freshman pitchers, including James Rodriquez — who made his second start of the season. "Those guys really need some experience." Madison said.

"We've got some freshman that have good arms. We want them to grow and in order for them to grow they've got to get experience."

Many of the mid-week games the Cats (14-17, 39 Southeastern Conference) Scheduled early in the season against non-conference teams were rained out. Madison said he uses these games to get some of his younger pitchers." he said. "That way I can feel more confortable of the game of the start against the season of the season of the season." The Thundering Herd (10-15, 3-2 Mid-American Conference) got off to a fast start against Rodriquez. Senior left fielder Matt White led off the game with a double. The first three batters reached base in the Cats' half of the first inning. Junior shortstop Brad Pickrell scored the Cats' Inst run on a single by senior first baseman Robert Newton. The Cats added two more runs in the inning and outsored the Herd tolder Seth Morris highlighted the onslaught with a three-run triple in the bottom of the 8th inning. The blast came within a few feet of clearing the wall in center field, and Morris thought he had a home run. "I drought it was going out," Morris said with a grin.

"I catually started jogging a little bit."

Morris wasn't doing a lot of jogging in center field. In the first few innings, Morris snared several line drives that were headed for the gap in right-center field.

"A lot of people don't realize how much ground he can cover," Madison said.
