Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, April 7, 1981.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular statutory session at 2 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time) on Tuesday, April 7, 1981 in the Board Room on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the Lexington campus.

A. Meeting Opened and Acting Secretary Appointed

Mr. Sturgill, Chairman, called the meeting to order at 2 p.m. and the invocation was pronounced by Mr. McBrayer. The Chairman, in the absence of the Secretary of the Board of Trustees, Mrs. Betty Pace Clark, appointed Professor Constance P. Wilson as Acting Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

B. Oath of Office Administered

Mr. Sturgill welcomed the new members of the Board of Trustees and requested Mr. John Darsie, General Counsel, to administer the oath of office to the following:

- Mr. William R. Black, alumni representative, reappointed by Governor John Y. Brown, Jr. for a term expiring December 31, 1986,
- Mr. Albert G. Clay, reappointed by Governor Brown for a term expiring December 31, 1986,
- Mr. Robert T. McCowan, appointed by Governor Brown to replace Dr. David A. Hull, for a term expiring December 31, 1986,
- Professor William F. Wagner, faculty representative elected to replace Professor Michael Adelstein, for a term expiring June 30, 1983,
- Professor Constance P. Wilson, faculty representative reelected for a term expiring June 30, 1984.

C. Roll Call

The following members of the Board of Trustees answered the call of the roll: Mr. William B. Sturgill, Chairman, Mr. William R. Black, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Professor Opal Skaggs Conley, Mr. Tracy Farmer, Mrs. Edythe Jones Hayes, Mrs. Sally Hermansdorfer, Mr. Thomas B. Kessinger, Mr. W. Terry McBrayer, Mr. Robert T. McCowan, Mr. Frank Ramsey, Mr. Homer W. Ramsey, Mr. Brad Sturgeon, Professor William F. Wagner, Professor Constance P. Wilson, and Mr. William T. Young. Absent from the meeting were: Governor Albert Benjamin Chandler, Mrs. Betty Pace Clark, Mr. A. Stevens Miles, and Mr. W. B. Terry. The University administration was represented by President Otis A. Singletary; Vice Presidents Peter P. Bosomworth, Donald B. Clapp, Lewis W. Cochran, Raymond R. Hornback, John T. Smith, Charles T. Wethington, and Robert G. Zumwinkle; Dr. Art Gallaher, Vice President-

Designate; Dr. Wimberly C. Royster, Dean of the Graduate School and Coordinator of Research; and Mr. John C. Darsie, General Counsel. Members of the various news media were also in attendance. The Secretary reported a quorum present and the Chairman declared the meeting officially open for the conduct of business at 2:03 p.m.

D. Minutes Approved

The Minutes of the March 10, 1981 meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees were approved without objection.

E. President's Report to the Trustees (PR 1)

President Singletary reviewed some of the items in his monthly report to the Trustees, calling particular attention to: the five faculty members (Professors Charles W. Ellinger, William C. Lubawy, Robert K. Berry, Alice A. Cleveland, and Michael B. Coyle) who have been selected as the 1981 Great Teachers; the retirement dinner and symposium on April 9 and 10 in honor of Dr. Lewis W. Cochran; the second annual UK Day scheduled for Sunday, April 26; and the 17 distinguished journalists who will be honored as the first inductees into the new Kentucky Journalism Hall of Fame next Monday, April 13. Upon the recommendation of President Singletary, the Chairman received the report and ordered it filed.

F. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

Although most of the items in PR 2 were routine in nature, President Singletary did call attention to the appointment of Mr. Shirley H. Phillips as Associate Director of the Cooperative Extension Service in the College of Agriculture, and the appointment of Richard C. Domek, Associate Professor in the Department of Music, as Acting Dean of the College of Fine Arts. With President Singletary so recommending, on motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Homer Ramsey and passed, PR 2 was approved. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

G. Supplemental Recommendations of the President (PR 3)

Noting that PR 3 contained the appointment of John N. Walker, Professor in the Department of Agricultural Engineering, as Acting Director of the Institute of Mining and Minerals Research, President Singletary recommended its approval. On motion by Mr. Clay, seconded by Mr. Sturgeon and passed, PR 3 was approved. (See PR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

H. 1980-81 Budget Revisions (PR 4)

On motion by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Kessinger and passed, the budget revisions, as recommended in PR 4, were authorized and approved. (See PR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Patent Assignment (PR 5)

The recommendation in PR 5 regarding patent assignment being of a routine nature, President Singletary recommended approval. On motion by Mrs. Hermansdorfer, seconded by Mr. McBrayer, and passed, PR 5 was approved. (See PR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Proposed Amendments to the Governing Regulations (PR 6)

President Singletary recommended that the proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations which were received and tabled at the February 9, 1981 meeting of the Board be removed from the table and approved. The proposed amendments will provide consistency between the Governing Regulations of the University and the University's current practice. Mrs. Hayes so moved. Her motion was seconded by Professor Conley and passed. (See PR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Reestablishment of Department of Telecommunications (PR 7)

President Singletary recommended that the Board approve the reestablishment of the Department of Telecommunications as an educational unit in the College of Communications, effective with the appointment of a chairperson or acting chairperson for the department. This proposal has been reviewed by appropriate administrators and committees, and has been recommended for approval by the University Senate. On motion by Mr. Black, seconded by Mr. Homer Ramsey and passed, the reestablishment of the Department of Telecommunications was approved. (See PR 7 at the end of the Minutes.)

L. University Research Professorships (PR 8)

President Singletary said it was with much pleasure that he was recommending approval of three University Research Professorships for 1981-82 to be awarded to the following professors in recognition of their outstanding research achievements: William Gragg, Department of Mathematics; Jerome Mechier, Department of English; and Professor Clasine van Winter, Departments of Physics and Mathematics. The three recipients were present at the meeting and were introduced. Following a round of applause for the three faculty members, Mr. Sturgill called for a motion for approval of the naming of these individuals as University Research Professors for 1981-82. Professor Wilson so moved. Her motion was seconded by Professor Wagner and passed unanimously. (See PR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Honorary Degree Recipients (PR 9)

President Singletary recommended that approval be granted for awarding the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters to Mrs. Harriette Louisa Simpson Arnow; Doctor of Letters to Dr. Daniel J. Boorstin; Doctor of Law to Mr. James C. Bowling; Doctor of Law to the Honorable John Y. Brown, Jr.; and the Doctor of Science to Dr. Stephen Diachun. The Committee on Honorary Degrees has recommended to the Graduate Faculty and the University Senate that honorary degrees be awarded to these persons and these two bodies have expressed their approval of the recommendation. Mr. Clay so moved. His motion was seconded by Mrs. Hermansdorfer and passed unanimously. (See PR 9 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Report on Tobacco and Health Research Institute

President Singletary reported on the recent developments at the Tobacco and Health Research Institute. He pointed out that the current investigation, which resulted from rumors, anonymous letters, and comments of concern, was incomplete. He has turned over information to the campus police dealing with the security of

individuals and added that additional security for the building itself has been provided. In addition, at the request of Dr. Gary Huber, President Singletary arranged for an audit of the Institute. Because of various charges, rumors and anonymous communications, President Singletary assigned the General Counsel of the University, Mr. John Darsie, to conduct a thorough investigation of affairs at the Institute. A substantial number of contradictory and conflicting allegations have resulted from this investigation which range from statements that could be interpreted as personal dislike for the Director, to questions that suggest mal-administration, to questions that raise the possibility of violations of law, to allegations about the research program itself. Some of the allegations were found to be trivial or frivolous and some others were not. President Singletary expressed his concern about the allegations of possible violation of law and of administrative practices which are unacceptable to the University.

President Singletary then read the following statement, copies of which were distributed to the news media:

In the course of this investigation, certain matters have come to light which raise serious administrative concerns as well as questions of possible violations of law. The information relating to the administrative concerns developed in the investigation has of course been considered in the decisions to be announced here today. The University cannot make the ultimate decisions concerning legal issues. Therefore, with respect to these aspects of the investigation, we have and will continue to cooperate with the proper authorities.

On the recommendation of Dr. Wimberly Royster, Graduate Dean who has the administrative responsibility for the Tobacco and Health Research Institute, I am taking the following actions:

- 1. I am temporarily reassigning Dr. Gary L. Huber, Director of the Tobacco and Health Research Institute, and Mr. Val E. Pochay, Associate Director. Dr. Huber is being reassigned to duties in the College of Medicine where he holds a tenured professorship. Mr. Pochay is being reassigned to duties in the office of the Graduate Dean. Both actions are effective immediately.
- 2. I have asked Dr. Layten Davis, Professor of Agronomy, to serve as temporary acting Director of the Tobacco and Health Research Institute. Dr. Davis, a widely respected authority in tobacco leaf chemistry, has accepted the temporary appointment which becomes effective immediately. I have asked Mr. Joe Burch to oversee the day-to-day administrative responsibilities at the Institute, beginning immediately. Mr. Burch, who has ably served in a number of administrative capacities on this campus and is currently Dean of Students, is an experienced and respected administrator.

3. Because of certain allegations about the research program itself, I expect, in the immediate future, to appoint a committee of scientists to make a technical evaluation of the research programs of the Institute and to report their findings and recommendations to me. I will share this information with the Kentucky Tobacco Research Board.

In the meantime, both the audit and the investigation will be continued. I will have no further comments on the audit or the investigation until their completion.

President Singletary said he wished to add for amplification to the Board that his action today should not be misunderstood or misinterpreted. He stressed that this does not represent any final action and it does not and should not be interpreted as indicating that there have, in fact, been violations of law. Neither does his action today indicate that the University has made any final decision about the directorship of the Institute.

President Singletary pointed out that when Dr. Gary Huber came to the University, he came into a situation that was deteriorating. The former director was suffering from a terminal illness over a prolonged period of time. He said it was obvious that the leadership had faltered. Dr. Huber did, in fact, take some actions at the Institute which were very strong in the deletion of the positions of some 20 or more persons. This action generated a certain amount of hostility. President Singletary feels Dr. Huber has been subjected to a persistent campaign of harassment and he thinks these things should be recognized.

President Singletary concluded by stating that his action today, based on several discussions and with the recommendation of Dean Royster, is believed to be a prudent administrative action which is in the best interest of the University and all concerned, and is aimed primarily at the necessity to insure that the program itself continues to function.

The Chairman thanked President Singletary for his report.

O. <u>Interim Financial Report (FCR 1)</u>

Mr. Clay, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the committee had met on the morning of April 7 and considered four items to be presented for action, the first of which was the Interim Financial Report for the period ending February 28, 1981. The Committee found the University to be "on target" and Mr. Clay moved that the report be accepted. His motion, seconded by Mr. Kessinger, passed and the report was accepted. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Financial Statement of Spindletop Hall, Inc. (FCR 2)

On motion by Mr. Clay, seconded by Mr. Farmer and passed, the Board of Trustees accepted the financial statement of Spindletop Hall, Inc. for the year ended December 31, 1980.

Q. Authorization to Expend from Maintenance Reserve by Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity (FCR 3)

Acting on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, Mr. Clay moved that the Vice President for Business Affairs and Treasurer be authorized to request funds from the "Maintenance Reserve Account" as recommended in FCR 3 for the purpose of paying the cost of replacing two water heaters at the Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity House. His motion was seconded by Mr. Frank Ramsey and passed with all present voting "aye". (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Resolution Approving Report of the Director, Auxiliary Services, Reciting Inspection of the Housing and Dining Buildings and Appurtenant Facilities of the University's Housing and Dining System, Previously Approved by the President as Required in Connection with the Delivery to the Purchasers of the University's \$4,200,000 "Housing and Dining System Revenue Bond Anticipation Notes, Series L," Sold at Public Sale on March 10, 1981 (FCR 4)

The members of the Board were reminded that the Executive Committee at its meeting held on March 10, 1981, awarded at public sale the University's \$4,200,000 Housing and Dining System Revenue Bond Anticipation Notes, Series L. The Series L Notes were sold for the purpose of providing for payment of the costs of constructing an addition to the University's Student Center.

One of the conditions set forth in the Board's June 1, 1965, Trust Indenture with Farmers Bank & Capital Trust Company, Frankfort, Kentucky, as Trustee, creating and establishing the issue of "Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds," is that each Series of Bonds may rank on a basis of parity as to security and source of payment with all previously issued Bonds only if there is a written report, made by a proper member of the University's staff, approved by the President, and submitted to and approved by the Board, showing that there has been a physical inspection of all the facilities of the System and that they are found to be in a good and tenantable state of repair, ordinary wear and tear excepted.

Mr. Albert Clay tendered to the Board such a certificate made under date of March 23, 1981, signed by the Director, Auxiliary Services, and bearing the written endorsement of approval of the President. He requested that the same be approved by the Board.

Mr. Clay moved that the tendered certificate of the Director, Auxiliary Services, be approved, and his motion was seconded by Mr. Homer Ramsey. After discussion, the Chairman put the question and upon call of the roll, the motion was approved by unanimous vote of all members present. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

S. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the meeting, on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Chairman declared the meeting adjourned at 2:25~p.m.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS

Recommendation: that the following proposed amendments to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky which were received for preliminary consideration at the February 9, 1981 meeting of the Board of Trustees be approved:

(Note: Proposed additions are underlined.)

First Amendment -- Change the first paragraph of Part X.A to read:

All appointments shall be made strictly on the basis of merit. An applicant for a position shall not be discriminated against because of sex, race, ethnic origin, national origin, color, creed, religion, age, or political belief. Additionally, the University shall not discriminate against any applicant for employment because of Vietnam-era veteran status, disabled veteran status, or physical or mental handicap in regard to any position for which the applicant for employment is qualified.

Second Amendment -- Change the first paragraph of Part XII.A to read:

Equal opportunities shall be provided for all persons throughout the University in recruitment, appointment, promotion, payment, training, and other employment practices without regard to sex, race, ethnic origin, national origin, color, creed, religion, age, or political belief. Further, the University shall not discriminate against any applicant for employment because of Vietnam-era veteran status, disabled veteran status, or physical or mental handicap in regard to any position for which the applicant for employment is qualified.

Background: These amendments will provide consistency between the <u>Governing</u> Regulations of the <u>University</u> of <u>Kentucky</u> and the <u>University</u>'s current practice.

REESTABLISHMENT OF DEPARTMENT OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS

Recommendation: that the Board approve the reestablishment of the Department of Telecommunications as an educational unit in the College of Communications, effective with the appointment of a chairperson or acting chairperson for the department.

Background: In earlier years, there was a Department of Radio, Television, and Film in the College of Arts and Sciences which was later given the title of Department of Telecommunications. Several years ago that department was dissolved, and the baccalaureate program was administered as a part of the Communications Department. Still later, with the reestablishment of the School of Journalism, the program was administered as a part of the Department of Human Communications. An outside committee of evaluators recommended in 1978 that the department be reestablished in the College of Communications. Representatives of the broadcast industry in Kentucky have urged repeatedly that the program be strengthened and the department reestablished. Student majors have increased sharply in recent years to a current level of 312, and the impact of telecommunications on our society is readily apparent and constantly increasing. It is therefore appropriate to emphasize the University's commitment to this area of instruction through the reestablishment of the Department of Telecommunications as an educational unit.

UNIVERSITY RESEARCH PROFESSORSHIPS

Background: In April 1976, the University Senate recommended to the President the establishment of one-year Research Professorships as soon as possible and that priority be given to the goal of establishing permanent Research Professorships as funds became available. The purpose of the University Research Professorships is to enhance and encourage scholarly research productivity, provide an opportunity for concentrated research effort for selected faculty members, recognize outstanding research achievement by members of its faculty, emphasize its research function, and to publicize its research accomplishments in order that the research function of the Unviersity be appropriately recognized and understood.

HARRIETTE ARNOW

Harriette Louisa Simpson Arnow was born in 1908 in Wayne County, Kentucky, and attended both Berea College and the University of Louisville where she received her B.S. degree in 1931. She is well-known as a writer, having produced to date five novels, various short stories (two of which were anthologized in O. Henry Memorial Award Prize Stories), full length non-fictional works, and various articles and reviews.

Her third novel, The Dollmaker, which explores the effects of urban life on the uprooted mountaineer, is indicative of her outstanding achievement in creative writing. Published in 1954, it came in second in the final run for the National Book Award (the winner was William Faulkner's "The Fable"). The work did win the 1955 Friends of American Writers Award and the following words of praise from the acclaimed novelist Joyce Carol Oates: "The Dollmaker [is] a legitimate tragedy, our most unpretentious American masterpiece."

Recognition of her work has already been forthcoming. She has received a special Weatherford Award granted to publications that further an understanding of Appalachia. Other honors include the Woodcock Award from the University of Louisville and an honorary degree from Transylvania.*

Mrs. Arnow is being recommended for Honorary Doctorate of Letters.

DANIEL J. BOORSTIN

Dr. Daniel J. Boorstin was born in 1914 in Atlanta. He attended Harvard, Oxford, and Yale and received a D.Litt. from Cambridge and a J.S.D. (Doctor of Science of Law) from Yale. He taught history and legal history at Swarthmore, Harvard, and the University of Chicago. He then moved to Washington to become director of the National Museum of History and Technology at the Smithsonian Institute from 1969-73. He was the Senior Historian from 1973-75 and from 1975 to the present has been the Librarian of Congress at the Library of Congress.

He has lectured all over the world as a Fulbright Visiting Lecturer, as lecturer for the United States Department of State and in other academic capacities.

He is the recipient of numerous prizes and honors. In 1959, Dr. Boorstin won the Bancroft Award for his trendsetting work, The Americans: The Colonial Experience and later was a Pulitzer Prize winner for The Americans: The Democratic Experience (1974).

For his contributions to the academic profession and to American education and culture, the Committee recommends Dr. Boorstin for the Honorary Doctor of Letters.

JAMES C. BOWLING

James C. Bowling is a native Kentuckian, outstanding educational leader, and strong supporter of higher education who pioneered the development of industry programs for support and encouragement of research and education in land-grant institutions for tobacco programs. A member of one of the State's early pioneer families and direct descendant of John Wolf, the first man to raise tobacco in the new colonies, Mr. Bowling was born in Paducah and educated at the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville.

In 1952, he joined Philip Morris, Inc. and rapidly rose to his present position as Senior Vice President and member of their Board of Directors. As a result of his leadership and interest in research and education programs, Philip Morris, Inc. recently granted the College of Agriculture what may become the largest single education and research grant in the history of this college. Similar grants were arranged by him for North Carolina State University and Virginia Polytechnic Institution and State University.

Mr. Bowling is also active in civic affairs. He is honorary chairman of the Board of Keep America Beautiful, was appointed a member of the Advisory Committee for the Kentucky Department of Commerce in 1970, and serves on the National Council of Boy Scouts of America. His leadership in education is also evident in his place on the Board of Trustees of several educational institutions, among which are Midway and Berea Colleges; his election as a Trustee of the Kentucky Independent College Foundation, and his participation on the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Development Council.

For his activity in encouraging the tobacco industry and higher education to work together in areas of common scientific interest, the Committee recommends Mr. Bowling for the Honorary Doctor of Law.

JOHN Y. BROWN, JR. GOVERNOR, COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY

John Y. Brown, Jr., was an undergraduate at the University of Kentucky in the mid-fifties and graduated from the University of Kentucky College of Law in 1960.

Following graduation, he rose to national prominence as president and chairman of the board of Kentucky Fried Chicken, building the fast-food operation into a multi-million dollar corporation with outlets throughout the world.

He served as chairman of the Governor's Economic Development Commission, as chairman of the National Young Leadership Council, and as chairman of the highly successful Democratic National Telethon in 1972-73.

In 1973, Mr. Brown gave the University of Kentucky \$1,000,000 to be matched by state government to construct the Sanders-Brown building which houses the program for the study of aging on the University of Kentucky campus.

In 1975, he headed the University of Kentucky Annual Giving Fund which reached a new high as the result of his efforts. During 1975, he contributed \$5,000 to the successful \$50,000 fund drive to establish the Joe Creason Lecture held annually on the University of Kentucky campus.

He has served on the University Development Council and his personal contributions to the University make him the largest individual donor in the history of the institution.

It has been a tradition at the University of Kentucky to honor the head of our State with an Honorary Degree from this institution, a practice which has been followed for approximately 50 years. The Committee recommends Governor Brown for the Honorary Doctor of Law.

STEPHEN DIACHUN

Dr. Stephen Diachun, Professor Emeritus of the Department of Plant Pathology, is well-known to the faculty of the University of Kentucky. He was born in Rhode Island in 1912, received his B.S. from the University of Rhode Island in 1934, and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Illinois.

Dr. Diachun has devoted his entire academic life to this University, arriving in 1937 as an Assistant Professor in Plant Pathology and retiring after a decade of service as chairman of that Department.

He is the author or co-author of 88 articles, has made significant contributions to his field, and is highly regarded for his work with tobacco diseases and bacterial pathogens.

His interest and involvement in teaching is quite evident from his activities on campus. He served for five years as the first director of the University of Kentucky Honors Program.

He has shown leadership on all levels at the University: as a member of the Board of Trustees, as Chairman of the University Senate Council, and as presiding officer of the University Senate. These are only the most outstanding examples of an entire academic life devoted to this University. Because of his outstanding contributions in these fields, he was honored by being chosen University of Kentucky Alumni Professor in 1974.

For his service to the University, dedication to his profession, and outstanding contributions to the field of plant pathology, the Committee recommends Dr. Diachun for the Honorary Doctor of Science.

Recommendation: That the Board of Trustees approve the report of the Director, Auxiliary Services, dated March 23, 1981, reciting inspection of the housing and dining buildings and appurtenant facilities of the University's Housing and Dining System, said report stating that such inspection shows that the Housing and Dining System is in good and current state of tenantability and repair.

Background: On February 9, 1981, the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees authorized the issuance of \$4,200,000 University of Kentucky Housing and Dining System Revenue Bond Anticipation Notes, Series L, for the purpose of paying the costs of an addition to the University's Student Center. On March 10, 1981, the Executive Committee awarded at public sale the Series L Notes to the bidders submitting bids with the lowest interest cost.

One of the conditions set forth in the Board's June 1,1965, Trust Indenture with Farmers Bank & Capital Trust Company, Frankfort, Kentucky, as Trustee, creating and establishing the issue of "Housing and Dining System Revenue Bonds", is that each Series of Bonds may rank on a basis of parity as to security and source of payment with all previously issued Bonds only if there is a written report, made by a proper member of the University's staff, approved by the President and submitted to and approved by the Board, showing that there has been a physical inspection of all of the facilities of the System and that they are found to be in a good and tenantable state of repair, ordinary wear and tear excepted. Such a certificate was made and approved by the Board prior to each of the previous Bond issues and it is now appropriate and necessary that the same step be updated for the Series L Notes.

It has been brought to my attention in connection with the Housing and Dining System Revenue Bond Anticipation Notes, Series L, "that Section 1101 (c)" of the Trust Indenture of June 1, 1965, requires as a condition precedent that there be filed with the Trustee a certificate signed by an officer, agent or employee of the Board principally charged with responsibility for the maintenance and repair of the buildings and facilities comprising the Housing and Dining System, approved by the President of the University and by Resolution of the Board, showing that a physical inspection of such buildings and facilities has been made and that they are found to be in a good and current state of tenantability and repair, subject only to exceptions for matters scheduled to be corrected and for which budgeted money is available.

As Director of Auxiliary Services, I am the officer charged with such responsibility, and this report is submitted responsive to the requirements of the Trust Indenture.

The Maintenance Staff of the University is adequate and is so equipped and stocked that it is able to keep abreast of observed and reported structural and mechanical defects and failures on a prompt and regular basis. Inspections of roofs, tuck pointing, floors, stairways, elevators, heating and air-conditioning systems and the like are on a scheduled basis according to their useful life anticipation, and budgeted funds are such that renewals and replacements are a part of an active, continuing program. Movable furnishings and fixtures are repaired and replaced on a regular basis.

My most recent periodic review of the records of my office together with routine and scheduled inspections of buildings and facilities show that the Housing and Dining System is in a good and current state of tenantability and repair. I have no exceptions to report other than those routine and ordinary matters which are constantly receiving attention from day to day and for which budget provisions have adequately been made.
