

U.S. says Fallujah has been seized

NEAR FALLUIAH, Iraq — U.S. and Iraqi security forces scourced Pallujah for remaining fighters and pounded the southermost neighborhoods of the city with heavy artillery and bombs late into last night, as military commanders declared victory seven days after launching the largest military operation since the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq last year. Solid Lit. Gen. John F Sattler, commander of the Ist Marine Expeditionary Force. "We have liberated the city of Fallujah."

The military said 38 U.S. troops had been killed and 275 wounded since the offensive operation began Nov. 7. Three of the fatalities resulted from non-combat injuries. Marines found the mutilated body

of a Western woman yesterday in a street as they searched for the remaining fighters, the Associated Press reported. The disemboweled body, which could not be immediately identified, was wrapped in a blood-soaked blanket, the Marines said.

Two Western women abducted last month from Baghdad are known to be missing, Margaret Hassan, 59, director of CARE International in Iraq, and Teresa Borze Khalifa, 54, a Polish-born longtime resident of Iraq, were both taken at gunpoint.

Center aids in making small businesses reality

Kate Mogllevski knew the Kentucky Small Business Development Center's state head-quarters was located on the second floor of the Gatton College of Business and Economies.

But it's safe to say the man-agement senior is one of few students aware of the center.

We're one of those resources that you don't know about unless you need us," said Becky Naugle, KSBDC state director.

Book Nauge KSBDC state di-pector and the state di-pector more than 20 years, KS-BBC has been helping small alusinesses and affecting the economy across the state — but often unnoticed.

KSBDC provides services in 15 locations across the state and is part of a larger national network of state centers. It is cosponsored by the Small Busi-ness Administration, adminis-tered by UK. and has partner-ships with other universities. The center offers free man-agement and environmental consulting for existing business owners, inexpensive training sessions for start-up businesses and resources on various busi-ness subjects.

But most students have yet to realize there are free services to take advantage of.

to take advantage of.

Naugle acknowledged that

students aren't generally aware
of the organization and said
she'd like them to know it is
there to help.

"I would encourage students to think of entrepreneurship as a career," Naugle said.
"Orben, their great ideas are really worth the time to check

And on top of the surplus SAB's fee to students increased this school year by a quarter from \$7.50 to \$7.75. (Considering SAB did not ask or need this increase, the Board of Trustees' decision to increase student fees across the board by 3.3 percent was inconsiderate considering the 14 percent tuition increase, but we digress.)

SAB ran Into a \$83,000 deficit in 2002-2003 — something the board members have corrected by themselves.

The board also has to look at the \$89,000 loss in Lexington Community College fees. Since LCC is split from UK last spring, the college's students don't have

to pay UK fees.

SAB Vice President Ethan Bennett said this loss will not have much of an affect on this year's line-up of events but its something to remember for the future. He also told the Editorial Board, "Just because we have more money doesn't mean we are bringing more events."

At the surface, this comment seems insensitive to the students who pay this fee—Shouldn't students see bigger and more events since they are paying more money? — but actually, that idea could do more harm to campus events.

As Bennett points out, gearing SAB toward bigger-named programs means catering more to the mainstream. This goes against one of the SAB's three main goals — diverse programming, And considering UK's lackluster racial demographics — black students constituted 5 percent of enrollment in 2003 — diverse programming is of a high priority. 


