The Faculty met at the usual hour. The reports of the several clubs were, in the main, satisfactory. The general conduct of Messrs Halby and White was reduced to of each for trespassing on the fruit trees on these grounds. Harbert was reported as absent from classes. He also asked to be excused from drill. His case was referred to the Pres. and Prof. concerned. Mr. D. V. Throop was reported as continually absent from classes, as having violated the rules for the government of clubs, and as having visited a house of ill fame. Messrs Belcher, Webster, and Owens were also reported as having visited a house of ill fame. An investigation of the case resulted in the following resolution, viz: That Messrs D. V. Throop and F. D. Belcher be publicly and dishonorably dismissed for gross immoral conduct and neglect of duty. Messrs Webster and Owens denied the charge preferred against them and, in the absence of proof of their guilt, their case was passed by, to be resumed when any further evidence of guilt or innocence can be produced. Mr. Fitzgerald was allowed to change his place of boarding and also to withdraw from the working department, provided he first procure the consent of the superintendent of that department. The reference of the Ex. Committee, in regard to the organization of a class in Penmanship, was referred to the Pres. to be reported on at our next meeting. Mr. W. C. Collins, having failed to pay his indebtedness to his club, was required to pay at once or withdraw from it immediately.
