Sir

Your letter of the 30<sup>th</sup> Ultimo, satisfactorily explains why you have not made returns of "final process." The law allowed your immediate predecessor in office, D.<sup>r</sup> Relfe, to execute all such precepts as were in his hands when he was removed from office. It was his duty to have returned the precepts in his hands at the October Term of the Court: and if new process were necessary in such cases, it will be your duty to execute them. The District Attorney will be instructed to take the proper measures for the due return of precepts in the hands of Doct Relfe in favor of the United States.
