He is survived by his wife, Anne-Russell Lillis Noffsinger.

Noffsinger was internationally recognized for his knowledge of architectural history, preservation and Japanese architecture and culture.

JERUSALEM — A thunderous car bomb killed two Israelis near a crowded Jerusalem market on Thursday, escalating tensions as Israeli and Palestinian leaders put off a truce announcement meant to end five weeks of fighting. Islamic militants claimed responsibility for the blast, which killed the daughter of a right-wing Israeli political leader. SCRANTON Pa. — Al Gore warned that rival George W. TAIPEI, Taiwan — Angry relatives accused officials Thursday of concealing information about the deadly crash of a Singapore Airlines jetliner, and some survivors criticized the flight crew. The death toll stood at 81, including at least 23 Americans; 40 people remain hospitalized.

Sailor from Russian sub is buried

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia — Lt. Dmitry Kolesnikov, the sailor who wrote a note describing conditions in the sunken Russian submarine Kursk, was remembered Thursday during functal services in his hometown of St. Petersburg. His body was one of 12 that have been recovered from the wreck by deep-sea divers. His note, written as he and other sailors buddled in an intacter compartment after explosions ripped the front of the submarine apart, showed that some sailors survived the initial catastrophe-despite official claims that everyone on board died almost immediately.

NEW YORK — Buyers moved selectively back into the stock market yesterday, snapping up financial and technology issues after the market's dip. Selling in basic material and retailing stocks left the overall market mixed. The Dow Jones industrial average closed down 18.96 at 16.880.51, according to preliminary figures. Broader stock indicators fared better. On the NYSE, gainers led losers by more than 4-to-3. The Nasdaq composite index rose 95.63 to 3.429.02.

Kasparov loses world chess title

LONDON — Garry Kasparov, who had dominated world chess in the way Michael Jordan controlled a basketball court, quietly relinquished his crown yesterday to his former procese. After losing to 25-year-old Vladimir Kramnik, a fellow Russian, Kasparov admitted that he was "out prepared." The match was decided not with a bang but with a draw after 38 moves - the 13th draw in 15 games. The difference was that Kramnik won two games and Kasparov didn't win any.

Fires burn in national forests

Arson: Officials say most of the fires raging in the Southern region were set intentionally

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Forest fires — most of them set by arsonists — have burned across more than 10,000 acres in East Tennessee as one of the driest Octobers on record combined with unsually heavy underbrush for a potentially explosive fire season. "We've got fires all over the place," state forester Dwight Barnett said Wednesday. "The whole Southern region is dry, but as you go south it gets drier. And it's not getting better." Fire activity is higher than usual in most of the South where rain-filled fronts have bypassed the region and temperatures have stayed above average, said Mark Rounsaville, emergency operations manager for the southern region of the U.S. Forest Service. He identified hotspots in eastern Kentucky near the Daniel Boone National Forest, western North Carolina in and near the Pisgah National Forest, northern Georgia in the Chattahoochie National Forest and parts of East Tennessee, northern Alabama and northern Mississippl.

Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas have been spared for the most part due to recent rains, Rounsaville said.

"If it would just start raining, fire season would probably be over for the fall, But that doesn't look likely this week," he said.

The National Weather Service reports the first chance of wide-spread rainfall is early next week when a front now is expected to move in from the Plains states.

Forestry offices stopped issuing outdoor burning permits in most of East Tennessee, where last month tied 1983 for the driest October on record. Emergency officials in Cumberland County have issued a respiratory alert due to smoke drifting over from fires in neighboring Roane County. And the state has shifted firefighting manpower and equipment from Middle and West Tennessee, where little activity has occurred during the fire season that officially began Oct. 15.

A Tennessee Air National Guard helicopter was dispatched Wednesday to drop water on a fire in Pickett State Forest, adjacent to both Pickett State Park and Big South Fork National Recreational Area. More than 400 acres have burned there since Monday.

NEW YORK — Two U.S. embassy bombing suspects attacked a guard at a federal lockup, stabbing him in the eye and leaving him in critical condition, authorities said.

A federal law enforcement source, speaking on condition of anonymity, told The Associated Press that the guard at the Metropolitan Correctional Center was stabbed in the eye Wednesday with some kind of plastic implement.

Harry Browne, 67, was an investment adviser for nearly 30 years. He has also been a public speaker, has edited a monthly newsletter and is the author of 11 books. This is Browne's second try at the presidency as the Libertarian candidate. He believes in removing the federal government's involvement in issues. Most notably, the party wants to revoke the income tax and replace it with nothing. Doing so, Browne believes, would give Americans more money for other things childcare, education and retirement investments.

The Libertarian's desire to free America of Social Security is the major reason college students should vote for Browne and his vice president candidate, Art Olivier, Browne said.

"We need to get Social Security completely out of the politicians hands," Browne said.

Browne's 1995 book, "Why Government Doesn't Work," served as a summation of his campaign platform. It offered a mix of ideas that spoke to hundreds of thousands of Americans who felt ripped off and frustrated by big government.

John Hagelin, Ph.D., 46, is a Harvard-trained physicist, educator and public policy expert running on the Natural Law Party ballot. Hagelin and vice presidential candidate Nat Goldhaber embrace an ideology to achieve unlimited possibilities for the individuals in America. Hagelin has worked with Congress for two decades to implement these solutions.

Hagelin supports a democracy enlisting our nation's greatest minds and most innovative thinkers.
