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MR. JOHN CLARK.

THE *Daily Telegraph*, in its issue of May 24th, 1882, observes that “thirty years ago Mr. John Francis Clark—the respected judge upon whose verdict the thousands assembled to-day, at Epsom, will in a few hours ‘suspended wait’—took his seat for the first time in the box to pronounce what horse had won the Derby. Before him his father and grandfather had occupied the same place.

“Previously to 1770 the office of judge was always filled by one of the Stewards at each recurrent meeting; but, in that year, angry recriminations took place at Burford Races, Oxfordshire, respecting the honesty of a decision arrived at in a race, and it was then resolved that the functions of the office should be discharged by a paid professional. Mr. John Hilton was accordingly selected, and, from 1770 to 1806, he was as popular in the Chair as Arthur Onslow had been in that of the House of Commons. In 1822 the grandfather of Mr. J. F. Clark, having awarded the Derby to the Duke of York’s Moses, resigned in favour of his son, who, in 1828, was unable to decide whether victory belonged to the Duke of Rutland’s Cadland, or the Hon. E. Petre’s colt, The Colonel. Among those assembled on the course, few will have more reason than Mr. J. F. Clark to contrast the race of to-day—the thirty-first Derby which he will have contemplated from the same spot—with that of 1852, in which he gave the victory to Mr. J. Bowes’ Daniel O’Rourke—a victory achieved under circumstances somewhat similar to those accompanying that of Sir Bevys. There will be many still left to recall that the rains descended, the winds came and beat upon the course, as Mr. Bowes’ chestnut pony, or rather the accomplished jockey on his back, baffled the impetuous rush of little Hiatt, on Barbarian, whom the boy, at that moment far gone in pulmonary consumption,

bestrode, carrying two or three stone of dead weight." This was the first Derby decided by Mr. John Clark, and, Mr. Rudston Read, the commissioner of Mr. Scott's powerful stable, was wont to relate that, not many hours before the race came off, William Davies, the Leviathan Bookmaker, laid two bets of thirty thousand to one thousand, and two of twenty-five thousand to one thousand against Daniel O'Rourke."

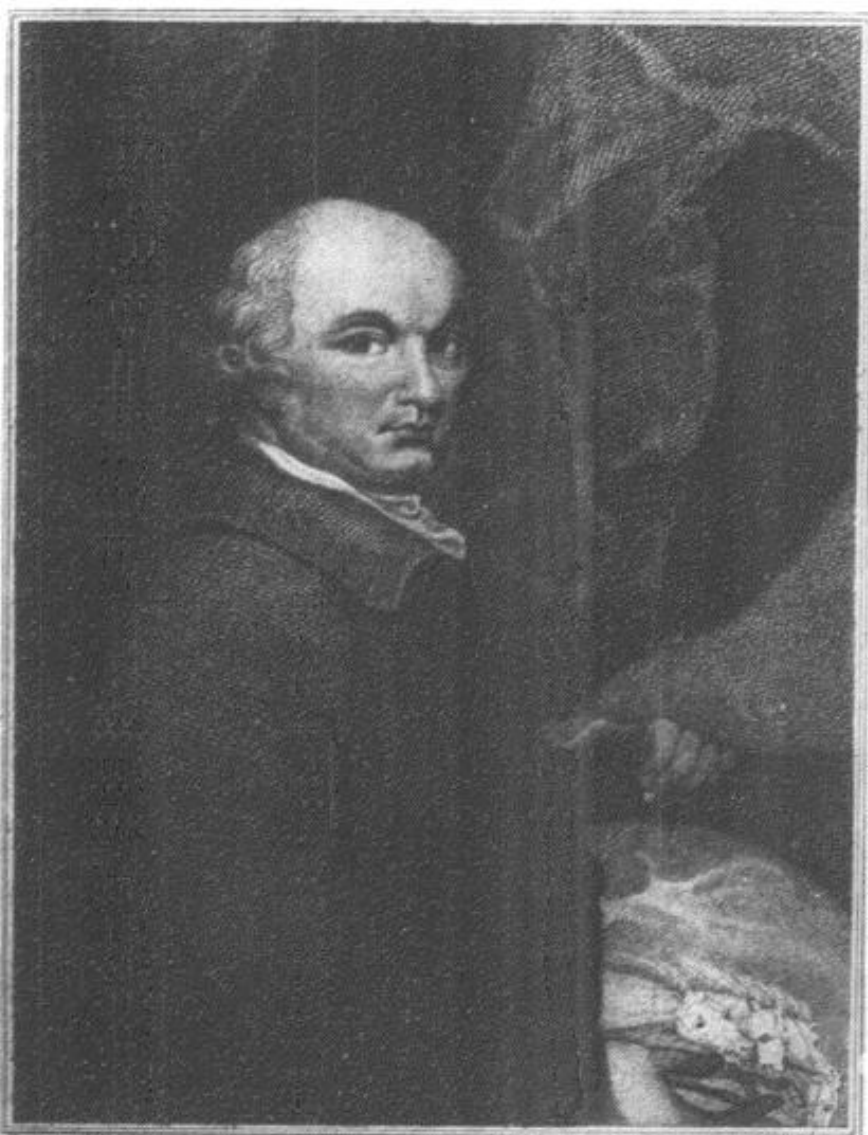
MR. JOHN HILTON was appointed to the office of Judge in 1770, and which he retained till 1806, "a period," as the *Daily Telegraph* observes, "when the game of racing was played 'with all the advantages,' or, in other words, when jostling, unfair riding, and combats on horseback between the jockeys, with their whips, were of constant occurrence. According to his cotemporaries, John Hilton, whose portrait gives him the semblance of a Quaker, was a wag of the first order, and as fond of mixed society as the more exalted functionary who presided in St. Stephen's Hall, at Westminster, and was in the habit of seeking relaxation from the cares of office in the kitchen of a public-house called the Jew's Harp, not far from what is now the top of Portland Place, where, seated in the chimney-corner, he enjoyed the low jokes of the landlord's humblest customers."

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GEORGE STUBBS, R.A.

MR. JAMES CHRISTIE-WHYTE, in his "History of the British Turf," observes: "In the Sporting obituary of this year (1808) we find the name of Mr. GEO. STUBBS, the celebrated painter of horses," but omits to state when he was born.

This eminent artist was the son of a respectable carrier and leather-cutter in Liverpool, and was intended to follow his father's business. From his childhood he evinced that taste for the profession in which, in after life, he gained so high a rank. When a boy, he would frequently steal from his father's warehouse to the stable, in order to delineate a favourite horse. One of his earliest efforts was the model of a horse, which he presented to the "Society for the encouragement of Arts," in his native town, and for which he was awarded the gold medal, with a highly complimentary letter.

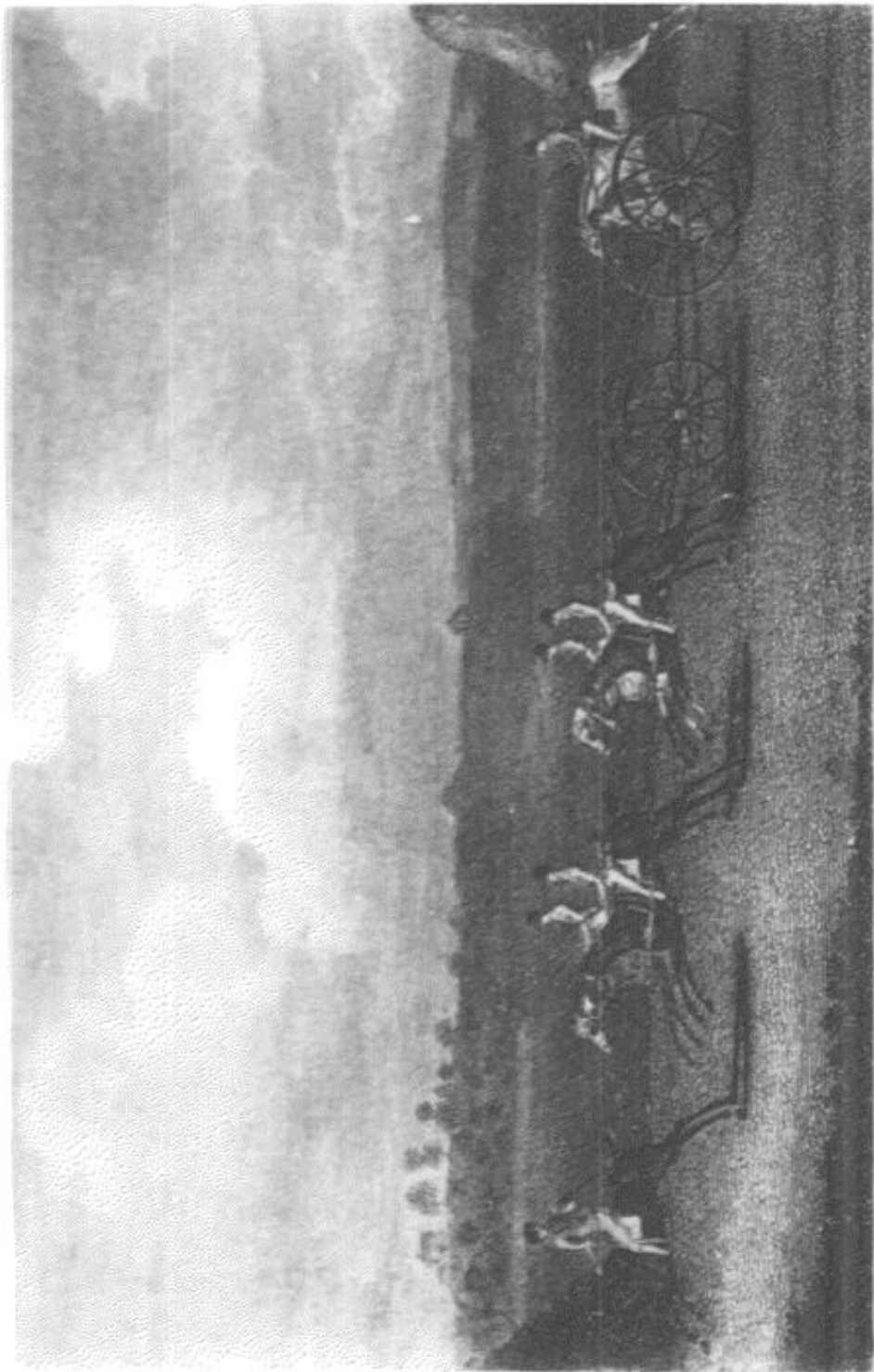
The fame of the young artist becoming known, Earl Grosvenor, with other noblemen and gentlemen, subscribed a sum of money sufficient to enable him to complete his studies in Italy, where he obtained several prize medals. The origin of his three celebrated pictures, in enamel, is thus related by one of his biographers. "Having remained in Italy the time necessary for his improvement, Mr. Stubbs embarked for England, and, during his passage, he became acquainted with a gentleman, a native of Africa, whose tastes and pursuits were similar to his own. This gentleman had been to Rome, and was returning to his family. He was well educated, and spoke the English language with accuracy. He was thus a delightful companion to Stubbs, who often expressed how much it would add to his gratification if he could but see the *Lion* in his wild state. His friend gave him an invitation to visit his paternal mansion.

The offer was gladly accepted, and Stubbs landed with his friend at the fortress of Ceuta, on the coast of Africa, and opposite to Gibraltar. They had not been on shore many days before a circumstance occurred most favourable to the wishes of our painter. The town, in which his friend resided, was surrounded by a lofty wall and a moat nearly level with the wall and on which a capacious platform extended, where the inhabitants enjoyed the refreshing breeze after sunset. It happened that one evening, while Stubbs and his friend were viewing the lovely scenery from this elevation, a lion was observed, at some distance, directing his way towards a white Barbary horse, which was grazing about 200 yards from the moat. Here, then, was the opportunity Mr. Stubbs had so long wished for. The moon was brilliantly clear, and the atmosphere serene. The lion did not make towards the horse by a regular approach, but by several curvatures, drawing nearer and nearer towards the devoted animal, till, under the shelter of a rocky projection, he came suddenly upon his prey. The terrified Barb foresaw his doom the moment he beheld his enemy, and threw himself into an attitude highly interesting to the artist. The noble creature for a moment appeared to be fascinated, and the lion finding him now in his power, sprang upon the back of the defenceless horse, and tore out his bowels with his terrible claws." On his return to England Mr. Stubbs met with great patronage; to him no less than Sartorius we are indebted for the portraits of the most celebrated horses of that period, and which continue to this day to retain their places in the galleries of our nobility and gentry. "The Druid" says: "Mr. Stubbs commenced painting his series of racehorses in the year 1768, with Lord Grosvenor's Mambrino,* of the lofty style, the forefather of some of the best American trotters. According to his portraits of Orville and Selim, they must have been perfect *giraffes*."

* Mambrino could scarcely have been the *first* of the series, seeing that he was only foaled in 1768.

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THE EARL OF MARCH'S FAMOUS CHAISE-MATCH AT NEWMARKET.

ON the 29th of August, 1750, was decided that very remarkable chaise-match made by the Earl of March (afterwards Duke of Queensberry), with Lord Eglinton, Count Theobald Taafe, and Mr. Andrew Sprowle, for one thousand guineas. The conditions of the wager were as follow; viz. a carriage, with four running wheels, drawn by four horses, and with a person either in or upon it, to complete nineteen miles within the hour. This famous match was performed on Newmarket Heath, the distance being accomplished in fifty-three minutes and twenty-seven seconds, as appeared by three stop-watches, held by as many umpires, and which, on comparison, did not vary one second at the conclusion of the match. The machine (with one of Lord March's postillions fixed thereon), weighed about twenty-four stone. The horses, three of which had won King's Plates, were all trained for racing, and therefore as fit as a fiddle for the task. The two leaders, including saddles and harness, carried about 8st each, the wheelers about 7st. "Tawney" (a brown horse, by Old Crab) was the near-leader, and ridden by Wm. Everett, Mr. Thomas Panton's groom, whose special duty it was to regulate the speed. The off-leader, named "Roderick Random," a grey horse purchased by Lord March in 1750, was ridden by one of his Lordship's stable-boys. The near-wheeler, "Chance," was a chestnut horse, got by the Duke of Bolton's Chance (son of Flying Childers, and formerly belonging to the Duke of Hamilton), and the off-wheeler, "Little Dan," were also ridden by stable-boys. All the horses had small bolsters to preserve their shoulders from coming into contact with each other. (Mr. James Christie Whyte, in his "History of the British Turf," describing this match, makes a strange blunder, for he says, page 473, "the *three boys* had bolsters to preserve their *shoulders*,"

which is simply absurd). A groom, dressed in crimson velvet, rode in front of the carriage to clear the way. The postillion, who was also a boy, seated on the end of the carriage, wore a white satin jacket, a black velvet cap, and red silk stockings. Mr. Everett, and the three boys who rode the horses, wore blue satin waistcoats, buckskin breeches, and white silk stockings, with black velvet caps. The traces of the machine, by an ingenious contrivance, were made to run into boxes with springs, in order that, in case any of the horses should hang back, the traces might not get under their legs. A rope went from the further end of the carriage to the pole, and was brought back from beneath it, in order to keep the pole quite steady. By the side of each wheel there was a tin case, containing oil, which constantly dropped on the axle-tree, to prevent its taking fire from the powerful friction to which it would be subjected. The postillion was placed on the carriage only to fulfil the conditions. The team started about seven o'clock in the morning, near the six-mile house, and ran between the Warren and the Rubbing-houses, came through at the ditch called the "running gap," then turned to the right, and went three times round a corded piece of ground, four miles in extent, and then back again to the place whence they started. The horses ran away the first four miles, with their riders, covering that distance in nine minutes. The odds were now 2 to 1 against Lord March. A vast crowd had assembled to witness the match, and enormous sums were staked on the issue. Mr. George Tanting, and a groom of Lord March's, were the only persons permitted to ride with the carriage; and their mission was to render assistance in the event of an accident.

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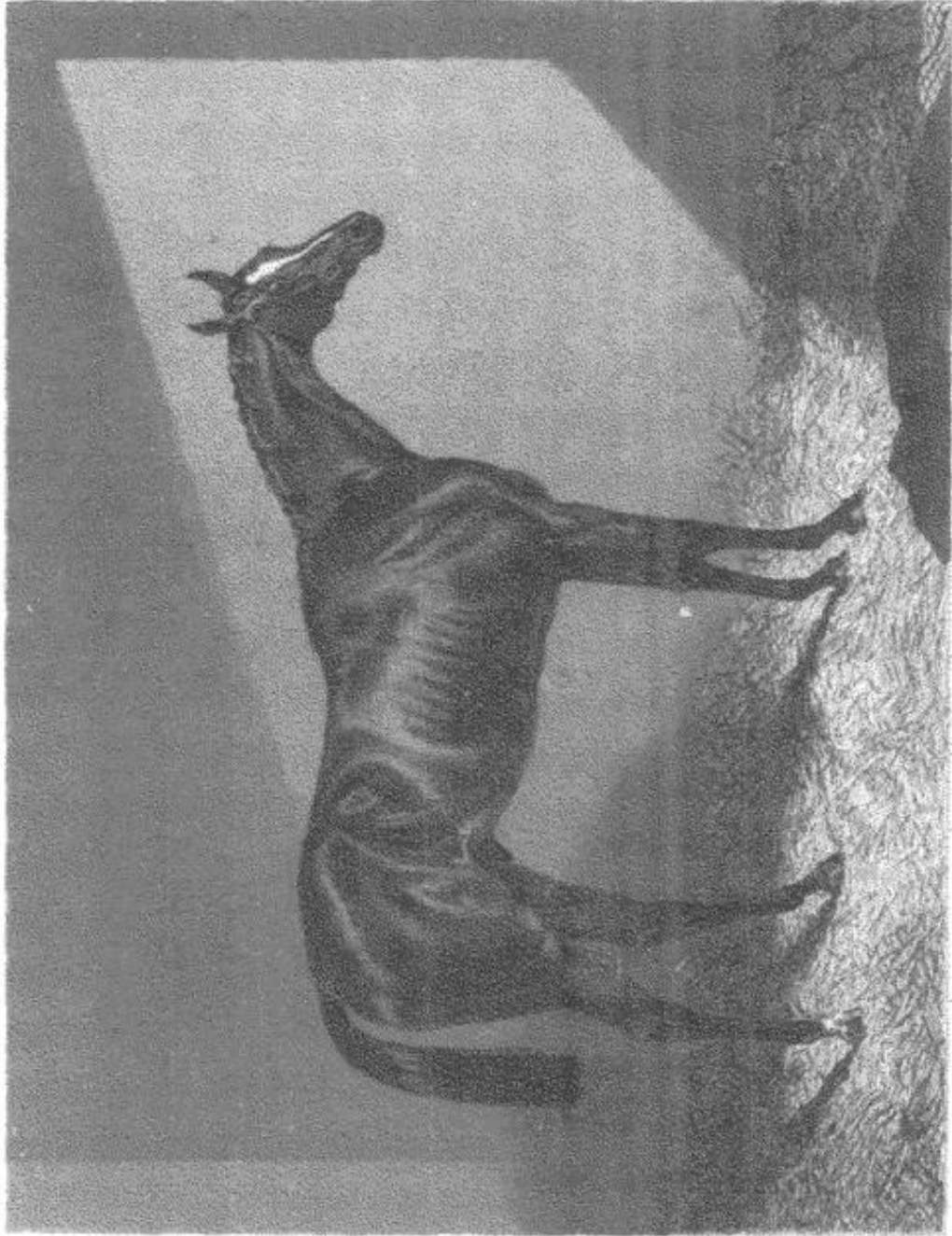

ALARM.

ALARM was a bay colt, foaled in 1842, the property of Captain Delme, who sold him, after winning the Champagne Stakes at Bibury, in 1844, to C. C. Greville, Esq. He was got by Venison, out of Southdown, by Defence, out of Feltona, by X. Y. Z. (son of Haphazard), out of Janetta (foaled in 1803), by Beningbrough, out of a mare by Drone (son of Herod), out of Contessina, by Young Marske, out of Tuberoze, by Herod, out of Grey Starling, by the Bolton Grey Starling, out of Coughing Polly, by Bartlett's Childers, &c.

ALARM'S PERFORMANCES.

1844.

At Bibury Club (Stockbridge Course), June 19th (ridden by Sam Mann), won the Champagne Stakes, of 30 sovs. each, h. ft., with £50 added by the Club, fifteen subscribers, for two years old, colts 8st 10lbs, fillies 8st 7lbs, beating Mr. John Day's b. c. Winchester, by Wintonian

(John Day, Jun.), second, Lord Chesterfield's ch. f. Lady Wildair (winner, this year, of the Chesterfield Stakes, at Newmarket, July), by Hornsea (Nat Flatman), third, Mr. John Day's ch. c. Nutbourne, by Elis. and Mr. Etwall's ch. f. Ægis, by Defence, not being placed; 7 to 4 on John Day's two. Won by a length. Alarm was now sold to Mr. Greville.

. 1845.

At Epsom (ridden by Nat Flatman), was not placed in the Derby, having broken away at the starting-post, thrown his rider, jumped the rails, was remounted and ran the course through, though much injured. For further details, see *The Merry Monarch* (Vol. III.). At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 9lbs, A. F. Match for 500 sovs., h. ft., received £250 from Mr. Gully's b. c. Old England (who ran third to *The Merry Monarch* in the Derby of this year), by Mulatto. At Newmarket (Houghton), 7st 9lbs (Nat), won the Cambridgeshire Stakes, of 25 sovs. each, 10 forfeit, and only 5 if declared, &c., with 100 added by Newmarket and its neighbourhood, 121 subscribers, of whom forty-three paid 5 sovs., beating Mr. Webber's b. f. Event (not placed in the Oaks, won by Refraction), by Toss-up (a son of Velocipede), three years, 6st 2lbs (Irvine), second, Lord Warwick's b. h. Yardley (winner, this year, of the Bentinck Testimonial, at Liverpool, and the Gold Cup at Newton), by Sir Isaac, five years old, 8st (George Whitehouse), third; also, not placed, Mr. Meiklam's br. h. Trueboy (winner, this year, of the Gold Cup at Richmond, and always running forward in the best of company), by Tomboy, five years, 8st 5lbs (Templeman), ch. c. The Baron, three years, 7st 8lbs (Bumby), Mr. Irwin's b. c. Ould Ireland (winner of a Free Handicap at Chester), by Young Blacklock, three years, 7st (Pigott), Mr. Moore's (really the Marquis of Waterford's), b. c. Wolf-Dog, by Freney (son of Roller), three years, 7st 2lbs (Jas. Chapple), and twenty others, not placed; 3 to 1 against Ould Ireland, 4 to 1 against The Baron, 9 to 1 against Alarm, 10 to 1 against Wolf-Dog, 17 to 1 against Yardley, and 50 to 1 against Event. They got away to a very good start, at the first attempt. The horses in general lay well together, as far as the Red Stand, after passing which, Event went to the front, followed by Lord Exeter's bl. f. Jet (winner, this year, of the Oatlands,

at Newmarket, Second October), by Velocipedè, three years, 4st 9lbs (J. Sharpe), Alarm and Yardley, in good positions, lying next, well up. At the Duke's Stand, Event shot out with a lead of several lengths, Alarm and Yardley going on in pursuit. About a distance from home, Alarm deprived Mr. Webber's filly of the lead, and went in an easy winner by a couple of lengths, the same distance dividing second and third. The pace was good throughout. Val. of stakes £1419.

1846.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 7lbs, D. M. Match for 500 sovs., h. ft., received 250 sovs. from Lord Glasgow's colt by Bay Middleton, 8st 1lb, both rising four years old. S. mg., for horses rising four years old, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 2lbs, D. I. (Nat), won the Claret Stakes, of 200 sovs. each, p. p., six subscribers (net value £1000), beating Mr. Irwin's b. c. Ould Ireland (F. Bell); only these two ran. Ould Ireland made the running, at a strong but steady pace, to the turn of the lands; half-way between the Duke's Stand and the finish, Alarm went up, obtained the lead a few strides from the chair, and won a good race by half a length. At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 7lbs, A. F. Match for 500 sovs., received 130 sovs. compromise from Mr. O'Brien's b. c. The Traverser, by Gilbert Gurney, three years, 6st 7lbs. At Ascot, June 7th, 8st 5lbs, two miles and a half (Nat), won the Emperor of Russia's Plate, of 500 sovs. (in lieu of the Cup), with a sweepstakes of 20 sovs. each. p. p., twenty-three subscribers (£460), beating Lord Lonsdale's br. c. Jericho (winner of the Port Stakes, at Newmarket Craven), by Jerry, four years, 8st 5lbs (Bartholomew) second, Wolf-Dog, four years, 8st 5lbs (Frank Butler), third; also, not placed, Orlando, five years, 9st (J. Robinson), who fell lame, The Baron, four years, 8st 5lbs (George Edwards), and seven others; 3 to 1 against Alarm, 9 to 2 against Wolf-Dog (winner, this year, of the Stand Cup and Queen's Plate, at Chester, the Gold Cup at Warwick, the Queen's Plate at Newmarket, and ran second for the Goodwood Cup), 11 to 2 against Jericho, 7 to 1 against Orlando, and 8 to 1 against The Baron, &c. Just before starting Orlando threw his rider, and broke his bridle (see Orlando, Vol. III.). At Goodwood, 8st 9lbs (Nat) three miles, won the Orange Prize, of 300 sovs. (the gift of the King of the Nether-

lands), with added sweepstakes of £480, beating Jericho, 8st 9lbs (Bartholomew), second, Wolf-Dog, 8st 9lbs (G. Whitehouse), third, and four others; 6 to 5 against Alarm, 2 to 1 against Jericho, and 6 to 1 against Wolf-Dog, who took the lead and kept it till near the distance-post, when the favourite came up and soon defeated him, Jericho being a little in advance of Alarm, who challenged fifty yards from home, and, after an exciting race, won by a head. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 8lbs (Nat), match for 300 sovs., beat Sir J. Hawley's b. h. The Bishop of Romford's Cob, by Jereed (son of Sultan), six years, 8st 2lbs (F. Butler), by a length; 5 to 2 on Alarm, who made the whole of the running at a very strong pace, and was never headed. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 7lbs each, T. Y. C. Match for 500 sovs. (Nat Flatman), beat the Duke of Bedford's b. h. Oakley, by Taurus, aged (ridden by James Robinson), after which he joined his Grace's Stud, having won for him several matches and stakes. In 1845, Oakley won six races, and was beaten twice, once by Miss Elis, and once by Wolf-Dog. At Newmarket (Houghton), 9st 4lbs (Nat), was not placed in the Cambridgeshire, of 25 sovs. each, 10 forfeit, and only 5 if declared, &c., with 100 added, 141 subscribers, of whom 73 paid 5 sovs., won by Mr. Nunn's bl. c. Prior of St. Margaret's, by Touchstone, three years, 6st 7lbs (Alfred Day), beating Lord E. Russell's br. c. Sting (winner, this year, of the Newmarket St. Leger (First October), by Slane, three years, 8st (Job Marson), by half a length, Lord Chesterfield's ch. f. Lady Wildair, by Hornsea, four years, 8st (Whitehouse), third, Mr. Meiklam's bl. h. Lightning, by Sheet Anchor, five years, 9st 4lbs, and eighteen others, not being placed. Alarm carried the highest weight, giving a *full year* to so good a horse as Lightning, both effectually being handicapped out of the race. S. mg., 8st each, B. C. (Nat), match for 1000 sovs., beat Mr. I. Mytton's (late Mr. G. Osbaldeston's) ch. m. Sorella (winner of the 1000 Guineas, the Great Produce Stakes, of 100 sovs. each, h. ft., twenty-eight subscribers, at Ascot, and the Park Hill Stakes, at Doncaster, all in 1844), by The Saddler; 6 to 1 on Alarm. Sorella (ridden by Whitehouse), made the running as far as the Duke's Stand, where Alarm went up to, and speedily passed her, winning in the easiest fashion, and full of running, by five lengths.

1847.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 7lbs, match for 500 sovs., received 100 sovs. (compromise) from the Duke of Bedford's br. c. Paragone, by Touchstone, four years, 7st 9lbs, and 200 sovs. from Mr. I. Mytton's (afterwards Mr. Theobald's) ch. h. The Baron (sire of Stockwell and Rataplan). Alarm's wind-up was not a successful one, as, in a match for 1000 sovs., carrying 8st 7lbs, over the T. Y. C., and ridden by Nat Flatman, he was beaten, five lengths, by Mr. O'Brien's b. c. The Traverser, by Gilbert Gurney, four years, 7st 7lbs (ridden by Cartwright), and was now transferred to the Stud.

 PYRRHUS THE FIRST.

PYRRHUS THE FIRST was a chestnut colt, foaled in 1843, the property of Mr. J. Gully, who disposed of him, at the close of 1847, to Mr. T. H. Pedley, the owner of Cossack. He was got by Epirus (son of Langar), out of Fortress, by Defence, out of Jewess, by Moses, out of Calendulæ, by Camerton (son of Hambletonian), out of Snowdrop, by Highland Fling (son of Spadille), out of Daisy, by Buzzard, out of Tulip, by Damper (son of Spectator), out of a mare by Eclipse, out of Rarity, by Match'em, out of Snapdragon, by Old Snap, her dam, by Regulus, out of a mare by Bartlett's Childers, &c.

 PERFORMANCES OF PYRRHUS THE FIRST.

1846.

At Newmarket (First Spring), for three years old, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 2lbs, D.M. (Sam Day), won the Newmarket Stakes, of 50 sovs. each, h. ft., twenty subscribers (val. £650), beating Colonel Anson's b. c. Iago (winner, this year, of the Column Stakes, at Newmarket, the rich Welcome Stakes, at Ascot, the Racing Stakes, at Goodwood, £1100 at Doncaster, and the Grand Duke Michael, at Newmarket), by Don John (F. Butler), Lord Exeter's br. c. St. Demetri, by Colwick (S. Mann), third, Lord George Bentinck's b. c. Marquis of Conyngham, by Slane (Nat), and four others; 6 to 5 on Iago, and 3 to 1 against Pyrrhus. At the end of the first quarter of a mile, Iago took the lead, at a strong pace, followed by the Marquis, St. Demetri, and Pyrrhus, all being very close together. In this order they entered the cords, where the Marquis was beaten. Half-way up, Pyrrhus challenged Iago, and after a magnificent race, in which both Sam Day and Frank Butler exhibited a grand display of horsemanship, won by a bare half-length. At Epsom (ridden by Sam Day), won

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the Derby of £4890, beating Mr. Wm. Scott's b. c. Sir Tatton Sykes, by Melbourne (W. Scott), second, General Shubrick's br. c. Brocardo, by Touchstone (J. Holmes), third; also, Lord E. Russell's b. c. Sting (winner, this year, of the Newmarket St. Leger), by Slane (H. Bell), b. c. Iago (F. Butler), Mr. A. Johnstone's ch. c. Grimston (winner, this year, of the Goodwood Cup), by Verulam (son of Lottery), Mr. O'Brien's b. c. The Traverser, by Gilbert Gurney (son of Muley), Mr. Meiklam's br. c. Fancy Boy (winner, this year, of the Dee Stakes, at Chester, and Gold Cups at Kelso and Northallerton), by Tomboy, and eighteen others; 5 to 1 against Fancy Boy, 8 to 1 against Pyrrhus, 10 to 1 against Lord Maidstone's bay colt Tom Tullock, by Hetman Platoff, 16 to 1 against Sir Tatton Sykes, and 25 to 1 against Brocardo. Sir Tatton Sykes lost fully sixty yards at starting, owing to his rider having staid behind to vent his indignation against the starter, for which the stewards fined him £5. Sir Tatton was very backward in the early part of the race, but just before the distance was reached, Wm. Scott brought him up, by dint of very hard riding and severe punishment, and instantly assumed the lead, but the sacrifice he made to secure it was too great, though he kept it to the Stand, and he was eventually defeated by a neck. It was always said that Sir Tatton was never the same horse afterwards, either in temper or courage.

1847.

At Newmarket Crayen, 8st 7lbs each (A. Day), match for 500 sovs., was beaten by The Traverser (Job Marson); 2 to 1 on Pyrrhus, who made all the running, at a splitting pace, to half-way up the cords, where The Traverser closed with him, and after a keen encounter, won by half a neck. At Newmarket (Houghton), 8st 2lbs, match for 200 sovs., paid 50 sovs. (compromise) to the Duke of Bedford's b. f. Bridle, by The Saddler, three years, 7st 2lbs, and was now sold to Mr. Pedley.

1848.

At Chester, 8st 10lbs (F. Butler), ran second in the Cheshire Stakes, won by Mr. Meiklam's br. m. Inheritress, by The Saddler, aged, 8st 9lbs (Templeman), beating three others. At Bibury, 11st 6lbs (Mr. J. Bayly), won the Cup Stakes, of £175, beating Mr. H. Elwes' b. f. Antagonist, by

Venison, four years, 10st 12lbs (ridden by her owner), b. h. Aristotle, by Physician, nine years, 11st 10lbs (Mr. G. Osbaldeston), third, and Mr. Pedley's br. c. Foreclosure, by Sheet Anchor, four years, 10st 12lbs; 6 to 1 on Pyrrhus. At Goodwood, 8st 12lbs (A. Day), won £205, beating the Duke of Richmond's b. c. Red Hart,* by Venison, four years, 8st 7lbs (Nat), by a head, Lord Clifden's b. c. Tiresome, by Bay Middleton, two years, 5st 4lbs, and one other; 6 to 4 on Pyrrhus. At Brighton, 9st 7lbs (A. Day), heats two miles, won the Queen's Plate, again beating Red Hart, 9st (Nat), in both heats. At Lewes, 10st, heats two miles (A. Day), won the Queen's Plate, beating Sir J. Hawley's b. f. Miami (Oaks Winner, in 1847), by Venison, four years, 9st 6lbs, in both heats. At Egham, 9st 11lbs (A. Day), won the Queen's Plate, beating Mr. Osbaldeston's ch. c. Fugleman, by The Saddler, three years, 7st 5lbs; 2 to 1 on Pyrrhus. At Canterbury, 10st, heats two miles, won the Queen's Plate, beating Mr. E. R. Clark's b. f. Alpheia, by Alpheus (son of Sultan), three years, 8st 4lbs, after a dead heat, Miami, 9st 6lbs, being third. Pyrrhus won the two last heats, which were closely contested, very cleverly; and now, with his honours full upon him, retired to the Stud, where he immortalized his name in having begotten that wonderful mare, Virago.

* Red Hart was sadly out of form the whole of this year; but in 1847, he won £400 at Newmarket First Spring, the Welcome Stakes of £720, at Ascot, £425 at Bibury, £850 at Stockbridge, the Gratwicke of £2300, and sweep of £150 at Goodwood, the Grand Duke Michael of £800, and the Royal Stakes of £860, at Newmarket.

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MENDICANT.

MENDICANT was a bay filly, foaled in 1843, the property of Mr. John Gully. She was got by Touchstone, out of Lady Moore Carew, by Tramp, out of Kite, by Bustard (son of Castrel), out of Olympia, by Sir Oliver, out of Scotilla, by Anvil, out of Scota, by Eclipse, out of Harmony, by Herod, out of Rutilia, by Blank, her dam, by Regulus, out of a mare by Soreheels (son of Basto), her dam, by Makeless, out of the Hon. Christopher D'Arcy's Royal Mare.

MENDICANT'S PERFORMANCES.

1845.

At Goodwood, for two years old, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 3lbs (ridden by J. Howlett), ran second in the Lavant Stakes, of £930, won by Mr. Forth's b. c. Sting (winner, also, this year, of the Molecomb, at Goodwood), the Clearwell (then Lord E. Russell's), at Newmarket Second October, and the Criterion, at Newmarket Houghton. Sting was purchased by the French Government, and disputed with the Emperor, the sireship of the famous French horse, Monarque. H. Bell rode Sting, winning by a length, and beating Lord Geo. Bentinck's b. f. Cherokee (winner of the Althorp Park Stakes), by Redshank, third, Mr. G. Payne's b. c. Collingwood, by Sheet Anchor, and Mr. J. Day's b. c. Cambaules, by Camel, out of Pocahontas; 6 to 4 each against Sting and Cherokee, 4 to 1 against Collingwood, and 5 to 1 against Mendicant.

1846.

At Newmarket (First Spring), for three years old fillies only, 8st 7lbs each, D.M. (Ditch-mile, 7 furlongs and 128 yards), ridden by Sam Day, won the 1000 Guineas, of 100 sovs. each, h. ft., twenty-six subscribers

(val. £1600), beating Mr. J. Bowes' br. f. Mowerina (dam of West Australian), by Touchstone (Frank Butler), second, Lord Orford's b. f. Prussic Acid, by Voltaire (Sly), third; also, the Duke of Bedford's ch. f. Taurina, by Taurus (Jas. Robinson), Lord G. Bentinck's b. f. Ennui (dam of Saunterer), by Bay Middleton (Nat), Mr. G. Osbaldeston's ch. f. Giselle, by Stockport (C. Marlow), and Mr. Wreford's b. f. Wilderness, by Sultan, Junior. Even on Mendicant, 5 to 1 against Mowerina, and 6 to 1 against Prussic Acid, who jumped off with the lead, followed by Giselle, Mowerina and Mendicant. At the new ground, Mowerina went to the front, Mendicant taking second place, close at Mowerina's heels. Entering the cords, Mr. Gully's filly challenged Mowerina, whom she defeated, after a very fine race, in which Sam Day's excellent jockeyship was most conspicuous, by half a length. Prussic Acid was beaten five lengths from the leaders. At Epsom, 8st 7lbs each (Sam Day), won the Oaks, of 50 sovs. each, h. ft., 140 subscribers (val. £3850), beating Mr. Wyatt's b. f. Laundry Maid, by Wintonian (son of Camel), ridden by F. Bell, second, Lord Glasgow's b. f. Conspiracy (winner, this year, of £1050 in matches, at Newmarket), by Retriever (son of Smolensko), John Holmes, third; also, Mowerina (F. Butler), Mr. Bowes' ch. f. Ukraine, by Hetman Platoff (Templeman), Sir C. Monck's br. f. Vanish (winner of the Two Year Old Stakes, of £900, at Doncaster, in 1845), by Velocipede (Cartwright), Mr. Drinkald's b. f. Ohio, by Montreal (G. Whitehouse), Mr. Elwes' b. f. Camelia, by Camel (Wakefield), Lord G. Bentinck's b. f. Princess Alice (winner, in 1845, of the Two Year Old Stakes, of £1200, at Goodwood, £400 at Chester, the Champagne at Doncaster, and the Prendergast at Newmarket; and, this year, the Nassau Stakes at Goodwood), by Bay Middleton (W. Abdale), Mr. Matthews' b. f. Chamois (winner, this year, of the *first* Great Metropolitan Stakes, at Epsom), by Venison (J. Mann), Mr. Johnstone's ch. f. Fair Helen, by Pantaloon (Job Marson), Prussic Acid, and twelve others; 9 to 4 against Mendicant, 9 to 2 against Vanish, 8 to 1 against Mowerina, 12 to 1 each against Princess Alice and Laundry Maid, and 35 to 1 against Conspiracy.

Soon after starting, Ohio took the lead and kept it to Tattenham Corner, taking her field a very merry dance. Before rounding the turn, she was passed by Laundry Maid, in whose immediate wake came

Conspiracy, third, Mendicant, fourth, Mr. Preston's ch. f. Osprey, by Irish Birdcatcher (Marlow), fifth, and Mowerina, sixth, all well up. About 500 yards from home, Sam Day sent Mendicant to the front, followed by Laundry Maid, Conspiracy, Osprey, and Mowerina. This order continued to the end, Mendicant winning very easily by a couple of lengths, the same distance dividing second and third. At Liverpool, 7st (A. Day), was not placed for the Cup, won by Mr. Meiklam's bl. h. Lightning (*Vide* The Baron). At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 11lbs, R.M., paid 100 sovs. (compromise), to Lord Glasgow's Conspiracy, 8st, match for 300 sovs.

1847.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 7lbs (F. Butler), match for 300 sovs., beat Conspiracy, 8st (Nat); 7 to 4 on Mendicant; won by a neck. Pace very good from start to finish. At Chester, 8st (F. Butler), ran second for the Cup, won by St. Lawrence (which see, Vol. III.). S. mg., 8st (F. Butler), won the Cheshire Stakes, of £565, beating Mr. Meiklam's br. h. Godfrey, by Inheritor (son of Lottery), six years, 8st 6lbs (Templeman), by four lengths, Mr. Mostyn's br. f. Sagacity, by Theon, three years, 5st 9lbs, third, Vanish, 7st, Sweetmeat, five years, 8st 10lbs, and two others; 2 to 1 on Mendicant, who was now sold to Sir Joseph Hawley for 2500 gs. At Ascot, 8st 2lbs (J. Marson), not placed for the Emperor of Russia's Plate, won by Mr. John Day's ch. c. The Hero (*Vide* Sir Tatton Sykes). Mendicant was now taken out of training, having paid a compromise of 80 gs. in a match for 500 gs., with the Duke of Bedford's b. f. Bridle, by The Saddler.

Mendicant proved an invaluable brood mare to Sir Joseph, seeing that she was the dam of Beadsman, who won the Derby, and begat Sir Joseph's famous trio, Blue Gown, Rosicrucian, and Greensleeve. to say nothing of The Palmer and Pero Gomez.

SIR TATTON SYKES.

SIR TATTON SYKES was a bay colt, bred by Sir Tatton Sykes, in 1843, and first named Tibthorpe. Sir Tatton sold him to William Scott, the jockey, who re-named him, after his breeder, Sir Tatton Sykes. He was got by Melbourne, out of a mare by Margrave, out of Patty Primrose (bred by Earl Fitzwilliam in 1830), by Confederate (son of Comus), out of Sybil (bred by the Earl in 1822), by Interpreter, out of Galatea (bred by his Lordship in 1816), by Amadis (son of Don Quixote), out of Paulina (bred by the Earl in 1804), by Sir Peter, out of Pewet, by Tandem, out of Termagant, by Tantrum, out of Cantatrice, by Sampson, out of a mare by Regulus, out of the dam of Old Marske, &c.

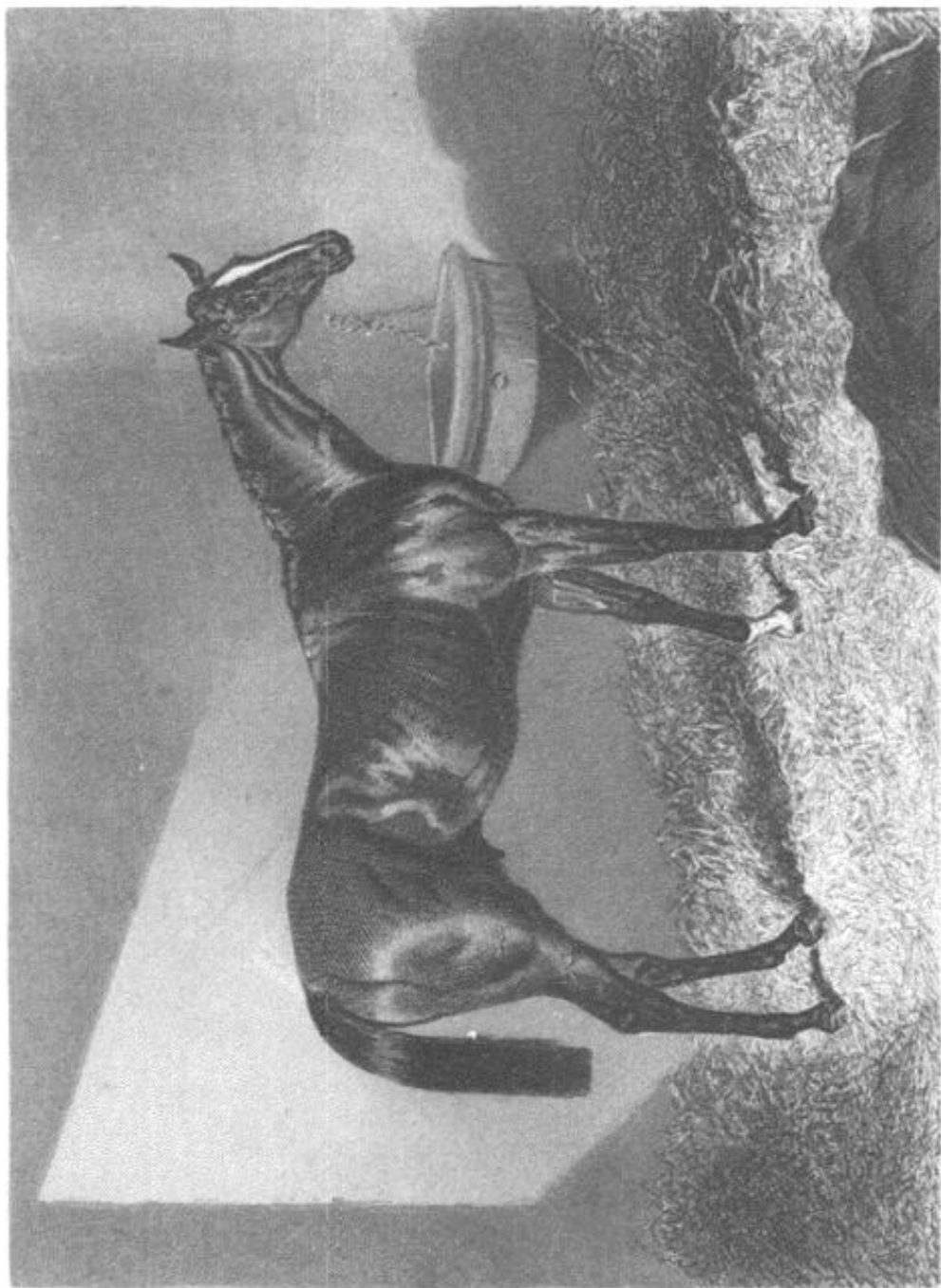
SIR TATTON'S PERFORMANCES.

1846.

At Newmarket (First Spring), colts, 8st 7lbs each (ridden by his owner), won the 2000 Guineas, beating Lord Maidstone's b. c. Tom Tullock, by Hetman Platoff (F. Butler), second, Lord Exeter's b. c. St. Demetri, by Colwick (Sam Mann), third; also, Lord Albemarle's b. c. Radulphus, by The Saddler, Lord G. Bentinck's Green Pea, by Bay Middleton, and Mr. Geo. Osbaldeston's br. c. King Charles, by Royal Oak (owner); 13 to 8 on Tom Tullock, 5 to 1 against Sir Tatton and Green Pea. Radulphus led off at a rattling pace, with Sir Tatton and Green Pea close at his heels, to the new ground, where King Charles, overpowering his rider, rushed to the front. At the bushes, Tom Tullock deprived him of the lead, closely followed down the hill by Sir Tatton and Demetri, King Charles having altogether collapsed. Half-way up the hill, St. Demetri was beaten, and the other two ran a fine race home, Sir Tatton winning by a length. At Epsom (owner), ran second in the Derby, won by

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Pyrrhus the First (which see). At Newcastle, 8st 7lbs each, was unplaced in the North Derby, won by Lord Eglinton's b. c. Dolo (winner, this year, of the Northumberland Plate), by St. Martin (son of Actæon), ridden by Job Marson, beating Fancy Boy and two others; 7 to 4 on Sir Tatton, 5 to 2 against Fancy Boy, and 3 to 1 against Dolo. At York, for three years old, 8st 7lbs (owner), won the Knavesmire Stakes, of £280, beating Mr. Lane Fox's br. c. Wrestler, by Gladiator, 8st 7lbs (J. Hullock), by 100 yards. At Doncaster, 8st 7lbs each (owner), won the Great St. Leger, of £2925, beating Col. Anson's b. c. Iago (winner, this year, of the Column Stakes, at Newmarket, the Welcome Stakes, at Ascot, £350 at Liverpool, the Racing Stakes at Goodwood, £1100 at Doncaster, and the Grand Duke Michael, at Newmarket), by Don John (F. Butler), second, and Brocardo, third, b. c. the Free Lance, by Jereed, b. c. Poynton (winner, this year, of the Great Yorkshire Stakes, at York), by Touchstone, Fancy Boy by Tomboy, Grimston by Verulam, Tom Tullock, Sting, The Traverser, and two others; 3 to 1 each against Sir Tatton and Brocardo, 11 to 2 against Sting, 7 to 1 each against Fancy Boy and The Traverser, and 10 to 1 against Iago. Tom Tullock took a three lengths' lead, followed by Sir Tatton and Brocardo. In this order they ran to the Red House turn, when Tom Tullock retired, leaving Sir Tatton with a two lengths' lead. At the distance Iago headed Brocardo (J. Holmes), all the rest being beaten off. About 100 yards from home, Iago made his effort to reach Sir Tatton, who shook him off with ease, winning by a length. At Newmarket (First October), ridden by Frank Butler, Iago defeated Sir Tatton in the Grand Duke Michael Stakes (Wm. Scott). Four ran; 2 to 1 on Sir Tatton, and 5 to 2 against Iago.

1847.

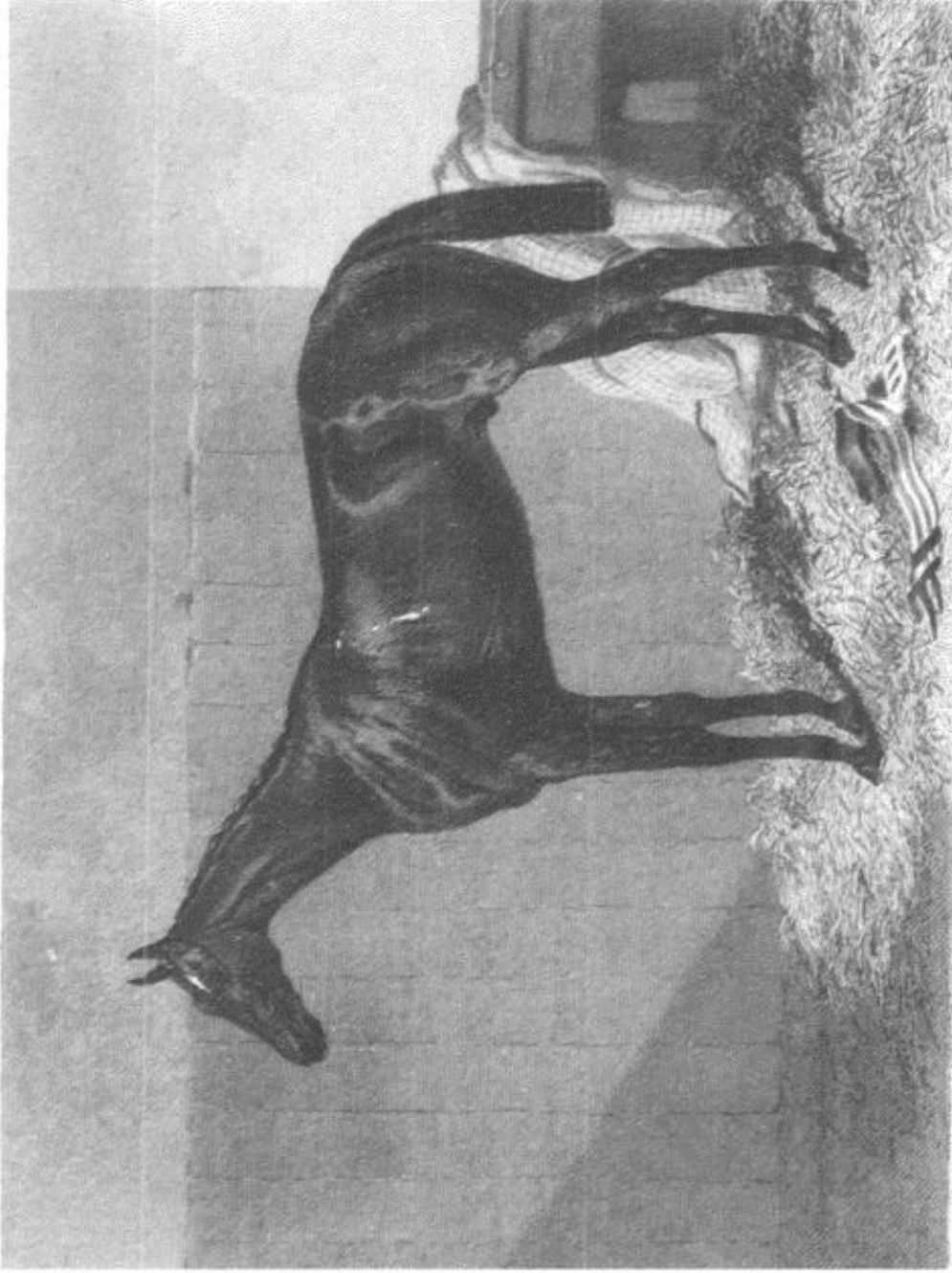

Sting, by Slane, and on whom 5 to 1 was laid. Sir Tatton made the running, at his utmost speed, to the cords, where Sting passed him, winning by eight lengths. Sir Tatton was now sold to Captain Kennedy; and at Ascot (W. Wakefield), was unplaced for

the Emperor's Plate, won by Mr. John Day's ch. c. the Hero (which see). At York (August), 8st 7lbs each, match for 500 sovs., beat Mr. O'Brien's b. c. The Traverser, by Gilbert Gurney, by three lengths. Ran once more, without success.

Sir Tatton ran once more, and quitted the turf.

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THE HERO.

THE HERO was a chestnut colt, bred by Mr. John Day, of Danebury, in 1843, and sold at the close of 1848, to Mr. J. Powney. He was got by Chesterfield (own brother to Crucifix), out of Grace Darling (bred by Mr. Isaac Sadler in 1832), by Defence, out of a mare by Don Cossack, out of Mistake (bred by Sir Ferdinando Poole in 1796), by Waxy, out of Woodcot, by Mentor (a son of Justice by Herod), out of Macaria, by Herod, out of Titania (bred by Mr. Latham in 1760), by Shakspeare, out of the dam of his horse Snap (called Latham's Snap), by Old Cade, out of Sister to Match'em's dam (bred by Mr. J. Crofts in 1732), by Old Partner, &c.

The Hero was quiet when in front of his field, but very impatient when behind. He always ran best when big, and not over trained. At three years old, he was rather a shelly colt ; but afterwards thickened amazingly. On wet, heavy ground, he could not move at all. As a sire, his stock was unexceptionally small. Rogerthorpe was the best of them.

1846.

At Goodwood, 5st 7lbs (Donaldson) ran second for the Goodwood Stakes (net val. £1320, the second receiving £100), won by Mr. O'Brien's br. c. Jonathan Wild, by Stockport, three years, 4st 7lbs, by a neck, Mr. Parr's ch. c. Dulcet, by Dulcimer (son of Muley), four years, 6st 10lbs, third, and eighteen others. Hero the favourite. At Salisbury, 7st 6lbs (A. Day), won a handicap of £145, beating Mr. Jones' gr. f. Miss Shirley in a canter, three years, 5st, and Sir J. Mill's br. f. Giantess (winner, this year, of the Hampshire Stakes), by Leviathan (son of Filho-da-Putá), four years, 8st 9lbs; also, w. o. for the Cup. At York (August), 6st 8lbs (A. Day), won the Dundas Stakes, of £145, beating Mr. Meiklam's br. h. Lightning (winner, this year, of the Liverpool Cup), by Sheet Anchor, five years, 8st 9lbs (Templeman), easily, and two others; 6 to 5 on Hero. S. mg., 7st 9lbs (A. Day), won the Queen's Plate, beating Mr. Meiklam's, br. m. Inheritress (winner, this year, of Queen's Plates at Liverpool and Lancaster, the Wolverhampton Stakes, and Gold Cup at Ayr, &c.), by The Saddler, six years, 9st 7lbs (Templeman), by a neck, and two others; also, 8st 7lbs (A. Day), won the County Cup (£235), beating Mr. Wormald's ch. c. Quadruped, by Velocipede, three years, 6st 11lbs (Abdale), by a neck, and eight others. At Epsom, won the Queen's Plate, and at Warwick, w. o. for the same. At Lichfield, won the Queen's Plate, beating two others, and the same at Leicester. At Doncaster, won the Queen's Plate, making all the running, by three lengths; also, 7st (A. Day), won the Cup, beating Lord Strathmore's br. c. Brocardo, by Touchstone, three years, 7st, Sir J. Hawley's ch. c. Bravissimo (winner of the Ascot Derby), by Velocipede, three years, 7st, and three others. Brocardo the favourite.

1847.

At Ascot, 9st 7lbs. two miles (A. Day), won the Queen's Vase, beating the Duke of Bedford's br. f. Bridle, by The Saddler, three years, 6st 12lbs (R. Pettit), by a head, Lord Lonsdale's br. h. Jericho, by Jerry, five years, 9st 11lbs, third, and five others; 2 to 1 against Bridle (winner, this year, of £2330 at Newmarket), 3 to 1 against Jericho, and 9 to 2 against Hero; also, 8st 5lbs (A. Day), won the Emperor of Russia's Plate, beating Lord Waterford's br. h. Wolf-Dog (winner, this year, of the Great Northamptonshire Stakes, &c.), by Freney, five years, 9st (F. Butler), by a length, Jericho, 9st (Bartholomew), third; also, Lord E. Russell's br. c. Sting (winner of the Port Stakes at Newmarket), by Slane, four years, 8st 5lbs (Nat), br. f. Mendicant, four years, 8st 2lbs (J. Marson), Mr. Meiklam's b. c. Poynton, by Touchstone, 8st 5lbs, and Sir Tatton Sykes, 8st 5lbs; 6 to 4 each against Hero and Mendicant, 7 to 1 against Sting, and 12 to 1 against Wolf-Dog and Poynton (winner of the Great Yorkshire Stakes in 1846). Hero, as usual, jumped off with the lead, at great speed, the rest toiling after him in vain. They thundered along, as hard as they could go, down the Swinley Hill, sweeping round the lime-kiln at the same terrific pace. At the last turn, all were dead beat, except Wolf-Dog, who raced with The Hero for a time, but nearing home, the gallant little chestnut put on a strong spurt, and won easily. At Winchester, 9st 1lb (A. Day), heats two miles, won the Queen's Plate, beating Mr. Elwes' br. c. Bourton, by Stockport, four years, 9st 1lb (S. Mann), and Captain Delmé's ch. c. Silver Eel, by Elis, three years, 7st 5lbs, in both heats easily. At Goodwood, 9st 6lbs (J. Day, Jun.), won the Cup (val. £690), beating Lord Eglinton's b. c. Eryx (winner, this year, of the Northumberland Plate), by St. Martin, three years, 7st 4lbs (J. Prince), the Duke of Richmond's b. c. Halo, by Mus, 7st 4lbs (Nat), third, Wolf-Dog, 9st 11lbs (F. Butler), Sting, 9st 4lbs (Marson), and four others; 5 to 4 on Hero, 4 to 1 against Wolf-Dog, and 6 to 1 against Eryx. Hero took the lead, and held it to within a quarter of a mile from home, where Eryx headed him. The two ran together, neck and neck, when Hero re-passed Eryx, one hundred yards from home, and won by a length in superb style. At Egham, w. o. for the Queen's Plate; and also for the same,

at Warwick, where, 8st 10lbs (A. Day), he likewise won the Cup, of £240, beating Wolf-Dog, 8st 13lbs (W. Boyce), by three lengths, and one other. At Doncaster, w. o. for the Queen's Plate; but, at 9st 5lbs (A. Day), was beaten for the Cup, by Mr. Bouverie's br. c. War Eagle, by Lanercost, three years, 7st 7lbs (S. Mann). At starting, Hero took a lead of two lengths, and held it to the distance, where War Eagle went up to him, had him dead beaten at the Stand, and went in an easy winner by three lengths. At Lichfield, 9st 6lbs (A. Day), heats two miles, won the Queen's Plate, in a canter; and the same at Leicester.

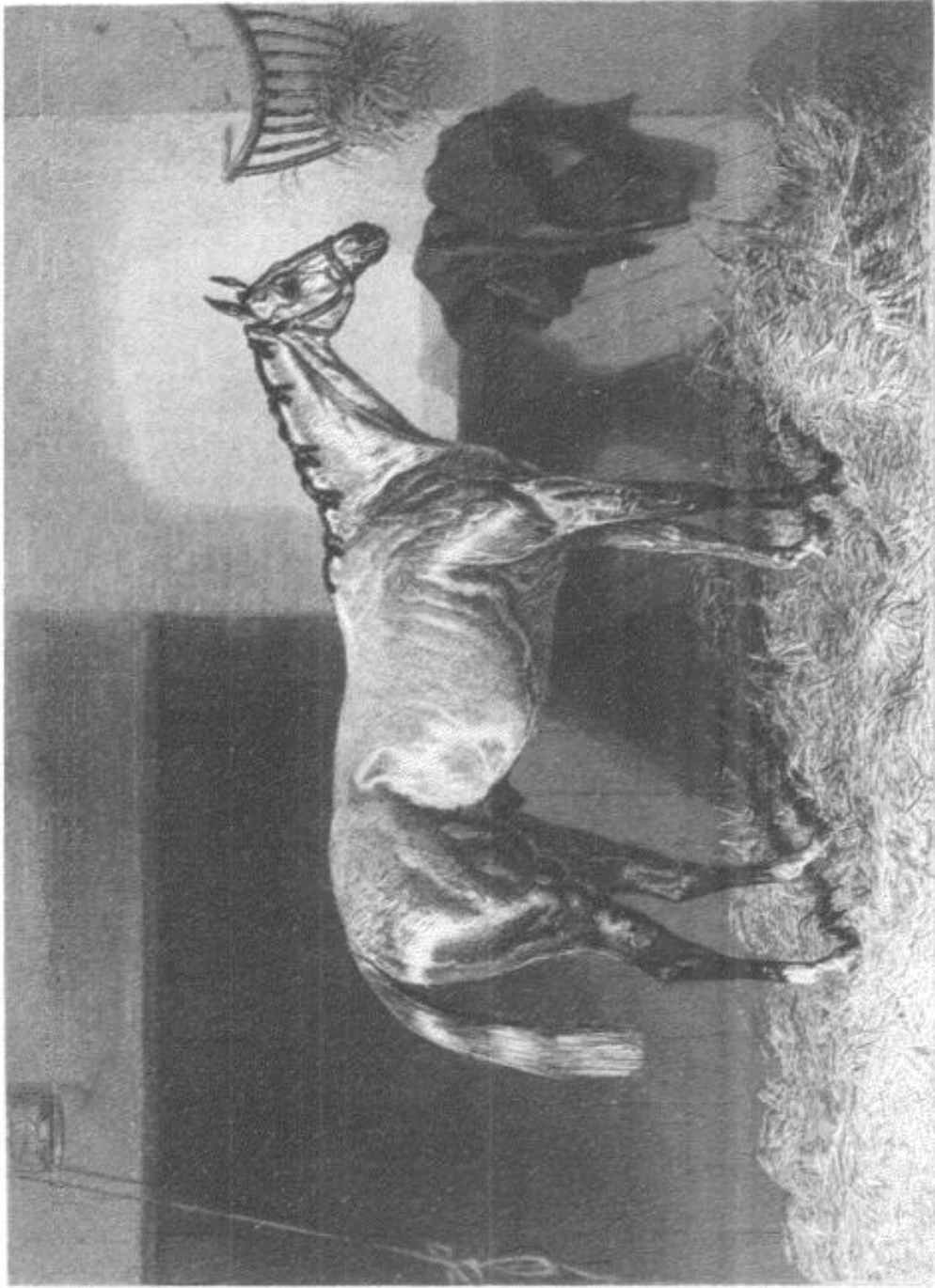

Day), not placed for the Cup, won by Lord Derby's br. f. Canezou, by Melbourne, four years, 8st 11lbs (F. Butler), beating Chanticleer, six years, 10st (J. Marson), by a length, Sir G. Heathcote's br. c. Black Eagle, by Voltaire, three years, 7st 4lbs, and four others. At York, 9st 4lbs (A. Day), won the Great Ebor Handicap, of £1100, beating Sir J. Hawley's b. c. Fernhill, by Ascot (son of Reveller), four years, 8st, by a neck, and twelve others. He ran once more, without success, and retired to the Stud.

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CHANTICLEER.

CHANTICLEER was a grey colt, bred in Ireland, in 1843, by Mr. St. George, and sold, in 1847, to Mr. James Merry. He was got by Irish Birdcatcher, out of Whim (a grey mare, bred by Colonel Westenra in 1832), by Drone (son of Master Robert), out of Kiss (bred by the Earl of Rossmore in 1827), by Waxy Pope, out of a mare by Champion (son of Pot8o's), out of Brown Fanny, by Maximin, &c. &c.

"Chanticleer" (says "The Druid"), "was a horse of strong constitution, but very bad temper, in fact a perfectly mad horse, when I'Anson first got hold of him. He was, however, at all times very savage; and so furious was he, on one occasion, that they were obliged to get the stable lad out of his box through the window. Sometimes he would roar like a bull; and, when at Hambleton, Harry Stebbings said he would rather be off the Moor when Chanticleer was on it."

Red Vixen, by Harkaway, three years, 7st 6lbs, and seven others. S. mg., 8st 5lbs, ran second in the Kirwan Stakes (Handicap), of 50 sovs. each, &c., won by Bantam, three years, 7st 8lbs, beating br. c. Plover (now Mr. Watts'), three years, 8st 2lbs, and Mr. Irwin's ch. c. The Connaught Ranger, by Harkaway, four years, 8st 12lbs, fourth and last. S. mg., 9st 2lbs, ran third for a purse of 100 gs., won by Mr. Watts' br. c. Mogador, by Verulam, two years, 6st 5lbs, beating Mr. Irwin's ch. c. Horn of Chase, by Harkaway, two years, 6st 5lbs, second, and Colonel Westenra's br. c. Joc-o'-Scot, by Hetman Platoff, two years, 6st 5lbs, fourth, and four others.

1847.

At the Curragh (April), 8st 9lbs (ridden by Wynne), two miles, won the Queen's Plate, beating b. c. Burgundy (now Mr. Whaley's), four years, 8st 9lbs, Mr. White's ch. c. Rat-trap, by Ratcatcher (son of Langar, by Selim), four years, 8st 9lbs, third, Mr. Watts' b. c. General Tom Thumb, by Ishmael, four years, 8st 9lbs, and four others. In June, 8st 9lbs (Wynne), ran third in the Kirwan Handicap, of 50 sovs. each, won by Joc-o'-Scot, three years, 7st 4lbs (Foley), beating Bantam, four years, 8st 2lbs (Doyle), second, Caurouch, 8st 2lbs, and two others. Even on Chanticleer, and 3 to 1 against Bantam. As a rule, betting

quotations on Irish races are rarely recorded. S. mg., 8st 7lbs (Wynne), two miles, won the Queen's Plate, beating Mr. Mangan's ch. c. Farnham, by Harkaway, three years, 7st, Colonel Westenra's ch. f. Venom, by Ratcatcher, three years, 6st 9lbs, third, and four others. Next day, 8st 13lbs (Wynne, who was styled the "Irish Sam Chifney"), won the Queen's Plate, beating Mr. Ferguson's ch. h. Fireaway, by Freney, aged, 9st 11lbs (Murphy), Farnham, 7st 4lbs, third. S. mg., 8st 8lbs, four miles (Wynne), won the Queen's Plate, beating Rat-trap, four years, 8st 8lbs, second, Fireaway, 9st 12lbs, bl. f. Wren, by Irish Birdcatcher, three years, 6st 5lbs, and one other. Chanticleer was now sold to Mr. Merry, and brought over to England by Mr. Wm. I'Anson.

At Liverpool (July), 8st 4lbs (Wynne), ran fourth for the Cup, won by Mr. Meiklam's br. m. Inheritress, aged, 8st 3lbs (Templeman), beating Mr. Johnstone's ch. m. Rowena, by Recovery, six years, 7st 8lbs (Cartwright), second, Sir W. Stanley's b. m. Pic-Nic, by Glaucus, five years, 7st 6lbs (Nat), third, and thirteen others. Wynne was brought over specially to ride Chanticleer; 5 to 1 against Pic-Nic, and 10 to 1 against Inheritress. At Paisley, 8st 4lbs (H. Robinson), won the Glasgow Cup, beating b. h. Tom Tough, by Young Priam, aged, 8st 9lbs. S. mg., 8st 2lbs (H. Robinson), won the Silver Bells, with 50 sovs. added, again beating Tom Tough, 9st. At Doncaster, 8st 5lbs, ran third in the Fitzwilliam Stakes, won by Mr. E. L. Mostyn's br. f. Wilderness, by Sultan Junior, four years, 8st 5lbs (Nat), beating Lord Glasgow's b. f. Conspiracy, by Retriever, four years, 8st 5lbs, second (J. Holmes), and Sir C. Monck's b. f. Gaiety, by Touchstone, three years, 7st 5lbs, last; 6 to 5 on Chanticleer (ridden by Bumby), and 2 to 1 against Wilderness—a head only dividing the first three.

1848.

At Ascot, 8st 7lbs (F. Butler), ran third in the Ascot Stakes, won by the Duke of Richmond's b. c. Vampyre (who won the same Stakes in 1849), by Mus (son of Bizarre), four years, 6st 5lbs (Kitchener), beating Lord Chesterfield's ch. m. Wildair, by Hornsea, six years, 8st 4lbs (Nat), by a neck, and twenty others. At Manchester, 11st 6lbs (Mr. Osbaldeston), won the Welter Cup, beating Sir J. Gerard's bl. h. Blackie, in a

canter. S. mg., 8st 12lbs (Bumby), won the Castle Irwell Stakes, beating Mr. Meiklam's b. c. Spaniard, by Don John, three years, 6st 4lbs, easily; 4 to 1 on Chanticleer. At Newcastle, 8st 8lbs (Bumby), won the Northumberland Plate, of £970, beating Mr. Lane Fox's br. c. Executor (winner, this year, of the Liverpool July Cup), by Voltaire, four years, 6st 8lbs (G. Abdale), second, Mr. Murphy's ch. c. Dough, by Tearaway (son of Voltaire), three years, 5st 2lbs (Doyle), third, Mr. Gray's bl. f. Reality, by Accident, three years, 4st 4lbs, Lord Eglinton's ch. c. Glen Sattel (winner, this year, of the Great Metropolitan at Epsom), by St. Martin, three years, 5st 8lbs, and six others. S. mg., w. o. for the Cup. At Goodwood, 9st 2lbs (C. Marlow), won the Goodwood Stakes, of £1120, beating Lord Eglinton's br. m. Plaudit, by Tomboy, six years, 7st 3lbs (J. Prince), Mr. Shelley's br. c. Remembrance, by Colwick, three years, 5st 2lbs, third, Mr. Courtenay's b. h. Bantam, five years, 7st 12lbs, and twelve others. S. mg., 9st 9lbs (J. Marson), not placed for the Cup, won by Van Tromp (which see). At Stirling, 9st 5lbs (H. Robertson), won the Cup, beating Mr. Wauchope's br. f. Cybele, by Inheritor, three years, 5st 5lbs, and two others. At Ayr, 8st 2lbs (H. Robertson), won the Cup, beating Glen Sattel, 7st 5lbs, easily. At Doncaster, 8st 12lbs (Nat), won the Cup, beating Captain (afterwards Admiral), Harcourt's br. f. Ellerdale (winner, this year, of the Cup at Stamford, the Queen's Plate at Lincoln, and the Cup at Richmond), by Lanercost, four years, 8st 2lbs (J. Marson), and Lord Eglinton's br. c. Van Tromp, by Lanercost, four years, 9st 3lbs (C. Marlow), third, and last; 7 to 4 on Van Tromp, 3 to 1 against Chanticleer, and 5 to 1 against Ellerdale. At Edinburgh, won both Queen's Plates. At Newmarket (Houghton), 9st 11lbs, was not placed in the Cambridgeshire, of £1560, won by Colonel Peel's ch. f. Dacia, by Gladiator, three years. 5st 9lbs; twenty-four ran.

1849.

At Ascot, ran second for the Emperor of Russia's Plate, won by Van Tromp (which see). At Newcastle, 9st 3lbs, won the Cup. At Goodwood 10st (S. Rogers), ran second for the Cup, won by Lord Stanley's br. f. Canezou (winner, this year, of the Newmarket Handicap, of £725,

the Queen's Plate and £270 at York, and the Cup and £450 at Doncaster), by Melbourne. Eight ran; 13 to 8 on Canezou, ridden by Frank Butler. At Warwick, 9st 12lbs (J. Marson), ran second for the Cup, won by Lord Exeter's b. c. Glenalvon (winner, this year, of the Gold Vase, at Ascot, and Queen's Plates at Goodwood and Warwick), by Coronation, three years, 6st 10lbs (J. Mann), Eagle's Plume, by Lanercost, four years, 8st, third. At Lichfield, 10st 3lbs, heats two miles, won the Queen's Plate; and, having ran four times more without success, quitted the Turf.

Chanticleer was a whitish-grey horse, standing, as nearly as possible, sixteen hands high. He had a somewhat coarse, sour head, a straight, strong neck, powerful shoulders, good large arms, and great depth of girth. He had immense ribs, and was rather roach-backed, indicating enormous strength. He was a little straight in his quarters, which drooped towards the tail. He had good thighs and hocks, was a trifle upright on his pasterns, with not very large bone. His great point was depth of girth, which measured, in October, 1848, five feet, seven inches and three-quarters round. He was a very free goer, a capital stayer, possessed fine speed and unbounded courage. He started thirty-two times, won nineteen races, amounting to £4485. His dam, Whim, was a grey mare, bred by Colonel Westenra, in 1832, figured for three or four seasons on the Irish Turf, but with no very great success, having a knack of running up rather than of running first. At the end of her racing career, she was purchased by Mr. St. George, and placed in his Stud, in 1838.

COLLINGWOOD.

COLLINGWOOD was a bay colt, foaled in 1843, the property of George Payne, Esq., and was got by Sheet Anchor, out of Kalmia, by Magistrate (son of Camillus), out of Zephyrina, by Middlethorpe (son of Shuttle), out of Pagoda, by Sir Peter, out of Rupee, by Coriander, out of Matron, by Florizel, out of Maiden (sister to Pumpkin), by Match'em, out of Mr. J. Pratt's Old Mare, by Squirt, &c.

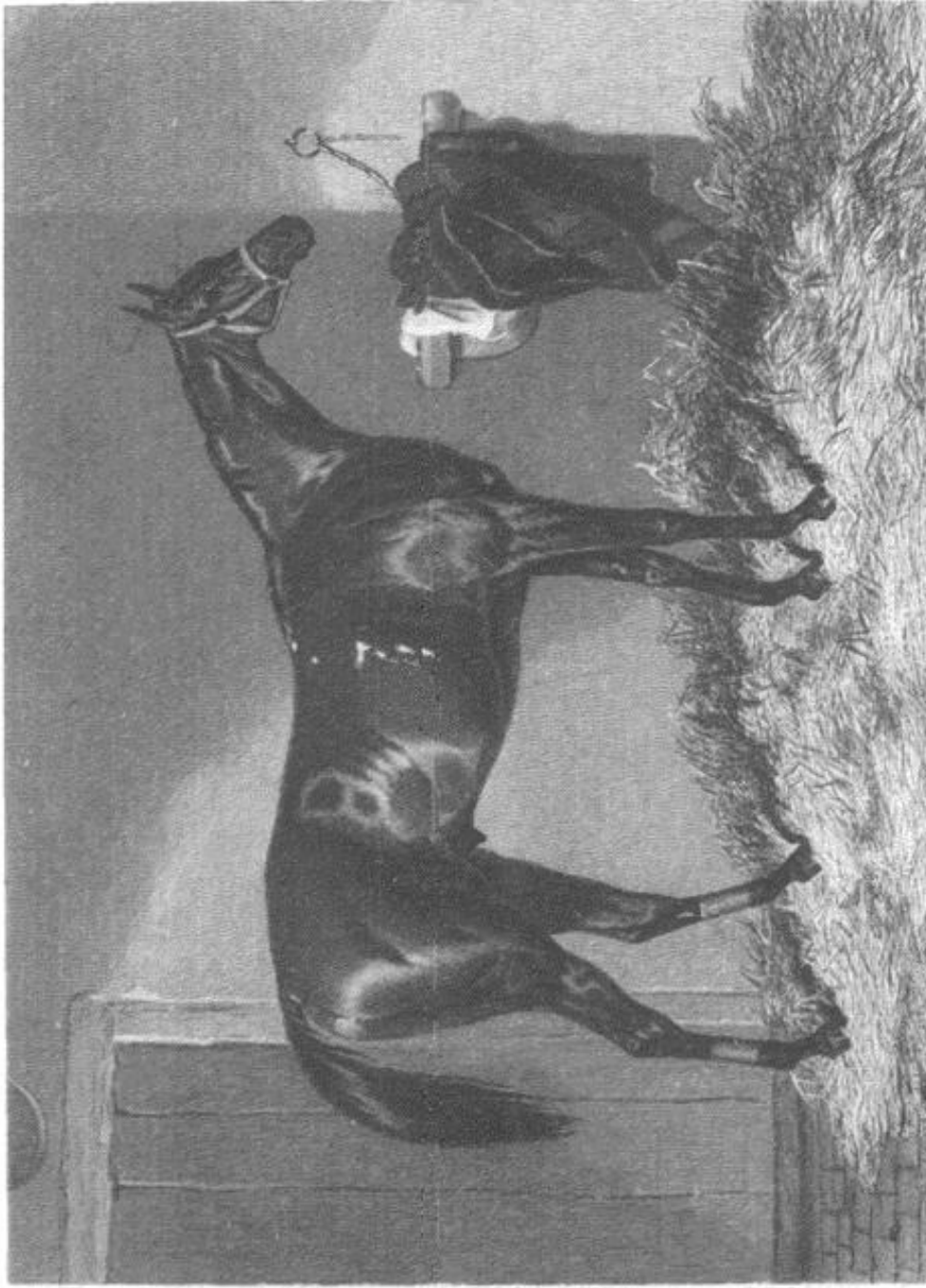
COLLINGWOOD'S PERFORMANCES.

1845.

At Ascot, 8st 7lbs each, match for 200 sovs., beat Lord Chesterfield's b. c. Subscription, by Hornsea (Nat), by six lengths. At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs (Nat), not placed in the Lavant Stakes, won by Mr. Forth's (afterward Lord E. Russell's) b. c. Sting, by Slane, 8st 7lbs (H. Bell), beating br. f. Mendicant (J. Howlett), by a length; five ran. S. mg., in a sweep of 300 sovs. each, h. ft., three subscribers, received the forfeits (300 sovs.). At Newmarket (First October), 5st 13lbs (W. Abdale), match for 200 sovs., beat the Duke of Bedford's br. c. Prologue, by Camel, three years, 8st 13lbs (H. Bell), by a head; 2 to 1 on Collingwood. After the first hundred yards, Prologue took a decided lead, at a very strong pace, followed closely by Collingwood, who nearly pulled little Abdale out of the saddle. Half-way up the cords Abdale gave Collingwood a free head, when a desperate encounter ensued, the little jockey winning, just on the post, by a short head. S. mg., 5st 13lbs (W. Abdale), match for 200 sovs., beat the Duke of Bedford's br. c. Captain Phœbus, by Jerry, three years, 8st 13lbs (H. Bell); 6 to 4 on the Captain. Collingwood made the running, at high-pressure speed, was never headed, and though hotly pursued won a fine race by half a length. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 7lbs (Nat), not placed in the Clearwell

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Stakes, of £660, won by Lord E. Russell's b. c. Sting (H. Bell), beating Lord Geo. Bentinck's b. f. Princess Alice, by Bay Middleton (winner, this year, of £400 at Chester, £1200 at Goodwood, the Champagne at Doncaster, and the Prendergast Stakes at Newmarket), 8st 4lbs (W. Abdale), easily, by two lengths. At Newmarket (Houghton), 8st 7lbs (Nat), match for 100 sovs., beat Lord Geo. Bentinck's b. f. Astern, by Sheet Anchor, 7st 10lbs (W. Abdale), both two years old. A very slow-run race to the cords, where Collingwood assumed the lead, was never headed, and won in a canter. S. mg., received 75 sovs. (compromise) from Lord Glasgow's colt by Retriever.

1846.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 7lbs (Nat), ran second in a handicap sweep of 100 sovs. each, won by Lord Lonsdale's bay colt by Bay Middleton, 8st 3lbs (Bartholomew); four ran, all three years old. At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 8lbs (Nat), ran second in a handicap sweep of 20 sovs. each, won by the Duke of Richmond's b. c. Peasant, by Voltaire, three years, 8st 1lb (Bartholomew), beating Mr. Stanley's ch. c. Leaconfield, by Hampton (son of Sultan), 8st 8lbs (J. Robinson), third and last, all three years old; 5 to 4 against Leaconfield, 6 to 4 against Collingwood, and 3 to 1 against Peasant, who made the running, followed by Collingwood, Leaconfield lying off till they reached the Ab. M. bottom, where all the three closed, and a most exciting finish ended, in favour of Peasant, by a neck, Collingwood defeating Leaconfield by a head. At Goodwood, 8st 9lbs (Nat), won the Cowdray Stakes, of 25 sovs. each, beating Lord G. Bentinck's b. f. Jollity, by Bay Middleton, the Duke of Richmond's b. c. Vampyre, by Mus, third; and two others. Collingwood was now claimed under the conditions of the race, by Mr. P. Rolt, for £150. At Egham, 9st 10lbs (ridden by his new owner), won the Amateur Stakes, beating Mr. Ricardo's br. m. The Widow (winner of the Cambridgeshire in 1847), by Abbas Mirza (son of Camel), aged, 11st 12lbs (owner), and Count Batthyany's br. c. Master Stepney, by Muley-Moloch, three years, 9st 10lbs (owner). At Newmarket (Second October), 7st 2lbs (R. Pettit), won a handicap, of £235, beating Lord Lonsdale's br. c. Joy, by Bay Middleton, three years, 7st 9lbs, and ten others. S. mg., 8st 3lbs

(F. Butler), match for 200 sovs., was beaten by Lord Glasgow's br. f. Conspiracy, by Retriever (son of Smolensko) three years, 8st (J. Holmes); 7 to 2 on Conspiracy. F. Butler took the lead, at a rattling pace, and, in the Ab. M. bottom, Holmes rushed Conspiracy to Collingwood's head, obtained the lead, and won a fine race very cleverly by half a length. Collingwood ran in six other races, this year, without success.

1847.

At Ascot, 7st 12lbs (E. Edwards), not placed for the Royal Hunt Cup, of £660, won by Count Batthyany's br. g. Tragical, by Emilius, four years, 6st 12lbs (W. Abdale), beating bl. f. Wintonia, by Camel, three years, 5st 13lbs, by a neck, b. f. Prussic Acid, by Voltaire, third, and twenty-one others. At Goodwood, 7st 9lbs (R. Pettit), ran second for the Stewards' Cup, of £485, won by Mr. Rolt's ch. g. the Cur (winner, this year, of the Stewards' Cup, at Goodwood; and the Cesarewitch and Brighton Stakes, in 1848), by Bran, five years, 7st 11lbs (G. Whitehouse), by a short head, beating twenty-two others. Mr. Rolt declared to win with Collingwood, and lodged a complaint against Whitehouse for not riding to orders; but Whitehouse stating that he did not know whether it was Collingwood or Campanile (ridden by Sam Mann) that he was running in with (the colours being so much alike), the Stewards accepted this explanation, and dismissed the complaint. S. mg., 6st 11lbs (J. Prince), won the Chesterfield Cup, of £510, beating Mr. Irwin's ch. h. Patriot, by Irish Birdcatcher, six years, 8st 4lbs, Sir T. Stanley's b. m. Pic-Nic, by Glaucus, five years, 7st 9lbs, and twelve others; 2 to 1 against Pic-Nic, and 4 to 1 against Collingwood.. At Newmarket (Ho.), 7st 12lbs, ran third in the Cambridgeshire, of £1880, won by The Widow (which see, Vol. III.).

1848.

At Chester, 9st 1lb (Nat), won the Grosvenor Stakes; and also, 8st 12lbs, the Stand Cup, beating Spaniard, by Don John, three years 6st (W. Abdale), and two others. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 12lbs (Nat), won 50 sovs. S. mg., 8st 12lbs (J. Robinson), won the Oatlands Handicap, beating Mr. John Shelley's br. c. Watchdog, by Ratcatcher, four years, 6st 4lbs, and one other. Ran once more, without success.

1849.

At Northampton, won the Trial Stakes, and a handicap sweep of £168. At Croxton Park, 12st. 12lbs (owner), won the Orange Cup (the gift of the King of Holland), beating Lord Clifden's b. h. Wafota, by Simoon (son of Camel), five years 12st 1lb, and six others. At Newmarket (First Spring), 9st 4lbs (J. Robinson), won a sweep of 20 sovs. each; and also, 8st 12lbs (Nat), a sweep of 20 sovs. each. At Ascot, 9st 3lbs (Nat), won the Trial Stakes; and also, 9st 7lbs (F. Butler), won the Royal Hunt Cup, of £530, beating Mr. B. Charlton's ch. f. Kiss-away, by Harkaway, three years, 5st 12lbs (Dockeray), in a canter, and nineteen others. S. mg., 9st 3lbs, ran fourth and last for the Emperor of Russia's Plate, won by Van Tromp (which see). At Newmarket (July), won 50 sovs., and, at Brighton, w. o. for the Cup. At Newmarket (First October), 9st 7lbs (Nat), match for 200 sovs., beat the Duke of Bedford's ch. f. Treacherous, by Harkaway, three years, 5st 7lbs (G. Mann); also (Second October), 8st 12lbs (Nat), won 50 sovs., beating bl. c. The Moor, by Sir Hercules, four years, 8st 7lbs, and three others; and also, 9st 2lbs, received 100 sovs. (forfeit), from Lord Clifden's b. c. Surplice, by Touchstone, four years, 8st. Ran six times more, without success.

1850.

At Northampton, won the Trial Stakes. At Newmarket Craven, 8st 10lbs (Nat), match for 200 sovs., beat Captain Harvey's br. c. Strongbow, by Touchstone, four years, 7st 2lbs; even betting. S. mg., 9st 2lbs (Nat), won 50 sovs., beating Lord Clifden's b. c. Honeycomb, four years, 8st 7lbs and two others. At Bath, 9st 3lbs (Nat), won the Trial Stakes, beating ch. f. Miss Lark-away, by Harkaway, three years, 6st 11lbs, and br. c. Strongbow (winner, in 1851, of the Liverpool July Cup), four years, 8st 7lbs. At Chester, won the Grosvenor Stakes. At Epsom, 9st 10lbs (Nat), won the Craven Stakes, beating seven others. At Newmarket (July), 9st 5lbs (Nat), won 50 sovs. At York, won the Dundas Stakes, and, having run thrice more, without success, quitted the Turf.

Collingwood was a very cheap bargain for Mr. Rolt. He ran in no less than seventy races, winning a large proportion of them: he was a worthy descendant of Tramp, and possessed the great staying powers of that illustrious line in a high degree.

 QUEEN MARY.

QUEEN MARY was a bay filly, foaled in 1843, the property of W. R. Ramsay, Esq.; and subsequently of Mr. Wm. I'Anson, of Malton, near York, in whose possession she died. She was got by Gladiator, out of a mare by Plenipotentiary, out of Myrrha, by Whalebone. out of Gift, by Young Gohanna, out of Sister to Grazier, by Sir Peter, out of Sister to Aimator, by Trumpator, out of a mare by Herod, out of a daughter of Old Snap, her dam, by Lord Gower's bay stallion (son of the Godolphin Arabian), out of a mare by Flying Childers, &c. "The Druid" thus writes of Gladiator, the sire of Queen Mary: "He was a very blood-like, dark chestnut horse, but rather delicate, and requiring the greatest care in his training. The two brothers, John and William Scott, bought him between them, when a yearling, for £100, and sold him to the Earl of Wilton for £200, with a contingency of half the Derby and St. Leger in the event of his winning either or both. With Bay Middleton out of the way, he would have won the first, and did not run again. His price, however, rose (after being second in the Derby) to £800, and finally increased to £2000, at which price he was sold, and sent to France." For Sweetmeat's sake alone he was worth every penny of the money; but he also left behind him Queen Mary, the dam of Blink Bonny, and grand-dam of Caller-ou, &c.

At Chester, for two years old, colts 8st 5lbs, fillies 8st 2lbs, was not placed in a sweepstakes of 25 sovs. each, seventeen subscribers (£400), won by Lord G. Bentinck's br. f. Princess Alice, by Bay Middleton (G. Whitehouse), beating Lord Chesterfield's ch. f. Curiosity, by Hetman

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Platoff, Mr. O'Brien's b. c. The Traverser, by Gilbert Gurney, and six others; 2 to 1 against Princess Alice, and 4 to 1 against Curiosity. This was the only time Queen Mary ever started.

The year 1880 was unusually fatal to trainers of racehorses. It commenced, in January, with the death of Thomas Parr, of Benham, near Wantage, Berks; and on the 18th of February, brought an end to the long and honourable career of Thomas Dawson, at Middleham; and, in July, Newmarket lost the most popular of its residents in the person of Joseph Dawson, whose death, later on, was followed by that of Carter, the *doyen* of French trainers, who imparted to Thomas Jennings the very difficult art of preparing racehorses for their engagements. On the 10th of January, 1881, Mr. Wm. I'Anson, who was in his seventy-first year, breathed his last at his residence, near Malton, where the greater portion of his long and industrious life had been spent. In his quiet way the breeder and owner of Blink Bonny, Blair Athol, and Caller-ou, was as much a representative man as Thomas or Joseph Dawson, who, like I'Anson, had passed many of their early years at the little town of Gullane, near Edinburgh. With the single exception, perhaps, of Robert Robson, who brought Waxy to the post for the Derby in 1793, and who expired in 1838, with £60,000 to his credit, no other trainers ever died richer than Joseph Dawson and Wm. I'Anson. Success upon the Turf often comes through a single animal, and I'Anson dated the commencement of his good fortune from his lucky purchase of Queen Mary. He bought her for a few pounds just as he was about to remove to Malton from Gullane (where he had long been the trainer of Mr. Ramsay's horses); and, in her, he became the lucky possessor of a gold-mine. No other dam, not even excepting Persepolis, Mandane, Banter, Barbelle, Pocahontas, Paradigm, Laura (dam of Fraulein and Petrarch), or Queen Bertha (dam of Spinaway and Wheel of Fortune), ever wrote her name through her own produce and that of her descendants, more deeply upon the annals of the Turf than did the mother of Haricot, Braxey, Bonnie Scotland, Blink Bonny, Broomielaw and Blinkhoolie.

COSSACK.

COSSACK was a chestnut colt, bred by R. C. Elwes, Esq., of Billing, Northamptonshire, in 1844, and sold to Mr. John Day, when two years old, for £2000, with a contingency of £1000 more, if he won the Derby. Mr. J. Day afterwards sold him, for the same sum, and on the same conditions, to T. H. Pedley, Esq. He was got by Hetman Platoff, out of Joannina, by Priam, out of Joanna, by Sultan, out of Filagree, by Soothsayer, out of Web, by Waxy, out of Penelope, by Trumpator, out of Prunella, by Highflyer, &c.

Cossack stood just fifteen hands and two inches high. He had a neat, blood-like head, a very clean neck, shoulders well drawn back, a round body, with very large ribs, a good back, and muscular quarters a little drooping towards the tail. He had not very large bones; but his legs were sound and clean, and his feet very good.

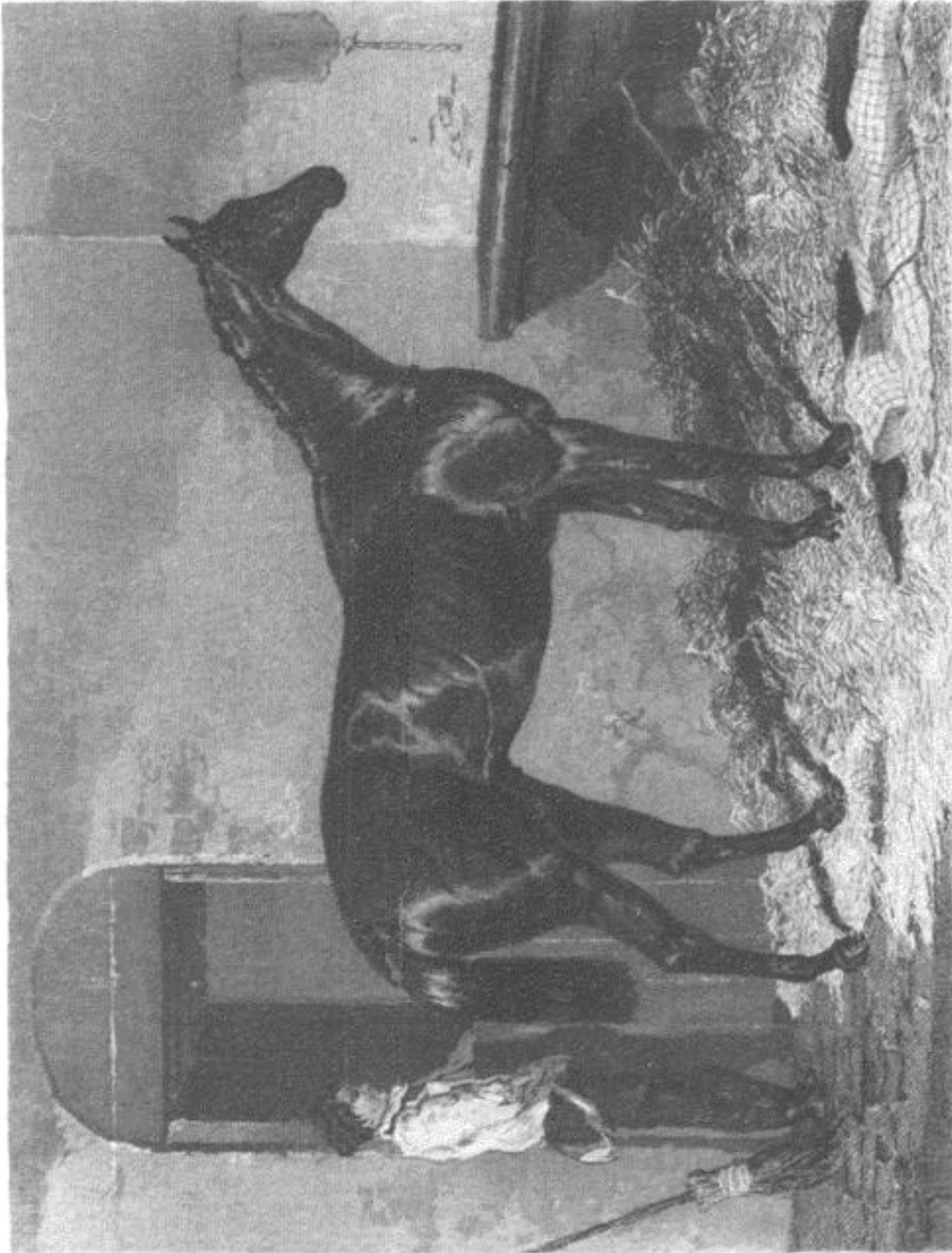

War Eagle (winner of the Doncaster Cup, this year), by Lanercost (J. Marson), second, Mr. Geo. Payne's b. c. Spider, by Venison (S. Mann), third, b. c. Oregon, by Slane, and two others; 6 to 5 against Cossack, and 5 to 4 against War Eagle, the latter of whom jumped off with the lead, at a slashing pace, with Cossack close at his heels. At the

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cords Cossack got to War Eagle's head, running neck and neck with him to the Stand, where he passed him, winning by half a length. Mr. George Payne always quoted this race as the fastest he ever saw. "The Druid" says, "It was in fact like two races, as the pair came right away by themselves, leaving a cloud of dust behind them." At Epsom (Templeman), won the Derby, of £5250, beating War Eagle (W. Boyce), second, Van Tromp (J. Marson), third; also, Sir R. Pigott's b. c. Conyngham (winner of the 2000 Guineas), by Slane, the Duke of Richmond's fine br. c. Red Hart (who stood sixteen-two), by Venison, and his b. c. Halo, by Mus (H. Bell), Mr. Mostyn's br. c. Planet, and his b. c. Gabbler, both by Bay Middleton, and twenty-two others; 5 to 2 against Conyngham, 5 to 1 against Cossack, 7 to 1 against Van Tromp, and 20 to 1 against War Eagle. Gabbler (ridden by Kitchener) showed the way, followed by Cossack, Conyngham and War Eagle. After a few strides, Cossack went in front, materially increasing the pace. At Tattenham Corner War Eagle was second, and Conyngham third, who was headed by Van Tromp on crossing the road. Cossack was never caught, and won by a length, four lengths dividing second and third. Very early in the race Mr. Irwin's b. c. Oxonian, by Wintonian (ridden by Sly), struck with great force into Van Tromp's heels, which caused him to swerve considerably, or he would have given the winner some trouble. At Ascot, 7st 4lbs, w. o. for the Swinley Stakes. At Doncaster, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 2lbs (Templeman), ran second in the St. Leger, won by Van Tromp (which see). At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 6lbs (Alfred Day), not placed in the Cesarewitch, of £1595, won by Mr. Disney's ch. c. Caurouch (bred in Ireland), by Irish Birdcatcher, four years, 7st (W. Abdale), beating Mr. Parr's ch. f. Giselle, by Stockport, four years, 6st 12lbs (F. Butler), second, Mr. Greville's ch. f. Geraldine, by The Saddler, four years, 5st 12lbs, third, War Eagle, 8st 1lb, and twenty-five others.

1848.

At Goodwood, for four years old, 8st each (Templeman), in a sweepstakes of 300 sovs. each, h. ft., twenty-six subscribers (£3600), was beaten by Van Tromp, by one hundred yards. S. mg., 9st 3lbs

(Templeman). not placed for the Cup, won by Van Tromp (C. Marlow), 9st 3lbs.

1849.

At Chester, 9st 1lb (F. Butler), ran second for the Cup (val. £2455), won by Mr. Stebbings' b. c. Malton, by Sheet Anchor, four years, 6st 10lbs (Fenn), beating Mr. Gregory's br. c. Loup-garou, by Lanercost, three years, 4st 10lbs (Hiatt), third, Chanticleer, Lady Wildair and twenty-two others; 5 to 1 against Lady Wildair, 9 to 1 against Cossack, and 12 to 1 against Chanticleer. At Ascot, 9st 7lbs (Templeman), for the Queen's Vase, won by Lord Exeter's b. c. Glenalvon, by Coronation, three years, 7st 3lbs (Pettit), Cossack ran a dead heat for second place with Lord Derby's br. f. Canezou, by Melbourne, four years, 8st 13lbs (Butler), won by a short head; 5 to 4 against Canezou, 6 to 4 against Cossack, and 10 to 1 against Glenalvon. S. mg., 9st (Templeman), ran third for the Cup, won by Van Tromp, 9st (Marlow).

1850.

At Chester, 9st 2lbs (Templeman), not placed for the Cup (val. £2345), won by Major Pitt's br. c. Mounseer, by St. Francis, four years, 6st 9lbs (Dockeray), beating Mr. Isaac Day's b. h. Cockermouth, by Lanercost, five years, 6st 10lbs, second; also, Mr. J. Merry's b. f. Miss Ann (dam of Scottish Chief), by the Little-known (brother to Little Wonder), Lord Howth's ch. h. Peep-o'-day-Boy (winner of the Chester Cup in 1848), by Harkaway, br. m. Ellerdale, by Lanercost (winner of the Great Yorkshire Stakes in 1847), and twenty others. At Goodwood, 9st 2lbs (Templeman), ran third for the Cup, won by Canezou, five years, 9st 7lbs (F. Butler), beating Mr. C. Greville's br. c. Cariboo, by Venison, three years, 7st 4lbs (J. Charlton), and five others. At Warwick, 8st 8lbs (Templeman), was not placed in the Leamington Stakes, of £955, won by Mr. Meeson's br. f. Doubt, by Gladiator, four years, 6st 4lbs (W. Sharpe), beating Mr. Drinkald's ch. c. Juggler, by Sleight of Hand, four years, 6st 3lbs (A. Pavis), second, Mr Osbaldeston's ch. h. Fugleman, by The Saddler, five years, 6st 9lbs (J. Charlton), third, b. f. Miss Ann, and nine others. Ran once more, this year, without success.

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1851.

At Goodwood, 8st 10lbs (A. Day), ran second for the Cup, won by Mr. Martinson's b. f. Nancy, by Pompey (son of Emilius), three years, 7st (J. Charlton), beating also Lord Lurgan's b. c. Cnæus, by Pompey, three years, 6st 10lbs, third, and seven others; won by a head. At Brighton, 8st 13lbs (A. Day), ran second in the Brighton Stakes, won by Lord Waterford's ch. h. Lord George, by Economist, six years, 6st 13lbs (Charlton). Fourteen ran. Value of stakes, £960. Ran twice more, this year, without success.

1852.

At Newcastle, 8st 2lbs, ran third for the Northumberland Plate, won by Mr. Meiklam's b. c. Stilton (winner, this year, of the Great Metropolitan, at Epsom, by Cotherstone, three years, 6st, beating Colsterdale and six others. This was Cossack's last race.

"The Druid" observes, of Cossack, that he was a delightful horse to ride, never pulling, and always as ready as a shot, when he was wanted. A strong pace was his delight, and he could make it for himself; and, except when War Eagle headed him (*for a moment only*), coming down the hill, he led in the Derby from the warren to the winning post." And, of War Eagle, he says that "he pitched in his slow paces; but that, for a mile, he was immensely fast, and that, for the Doncaster Cup, he followed The Hero just like clock-work, and came the moment Sam Mann touched him with the spur." War Eagle stood fully sixteen hands and one inch high.

MIAMI.

MIAMI was a b. f., bred by Mr. Isaac Sadler, of Stockbridge, in 1844, and sold to Sir Joseph Hawley, Bart. She was got by Venison, out of Diversion (bred by Mr. Sadler in 1838), by Defence, out of Folly (bred by Mr. Sadler in 1830), by Middleton (son of Phantom), out of Little Folly, by Highland Fling (son of Spadille), out of Harriet, by Volunteer, out of a mare by Highflyer, her dam, by Herod, out of Miss Middleton, by Regulus, out of Camilla, by a son of Bay Bolton, her dam, by Bartlett's Childers, out of a mare by Honeywood's White Arabian, out of the dam (bred by Mr. Bowes, of Gibside) of the Two True Blues, by the Byerley Turk.

Miami was really a bay roan filly, standing fifteen hands and one inch high, possessing a very handsome blood-like head and neck, good shoulders, great depth in the girth, rather a long back, good quarters, very muscular thighs, and capital legs and feet. She was slight in the bone, and trained very light. Taken altogether, she was a wiry, game little filly. She had no white whatever, save a star in the forehead, and a few grey hairs just on the top of the tail.

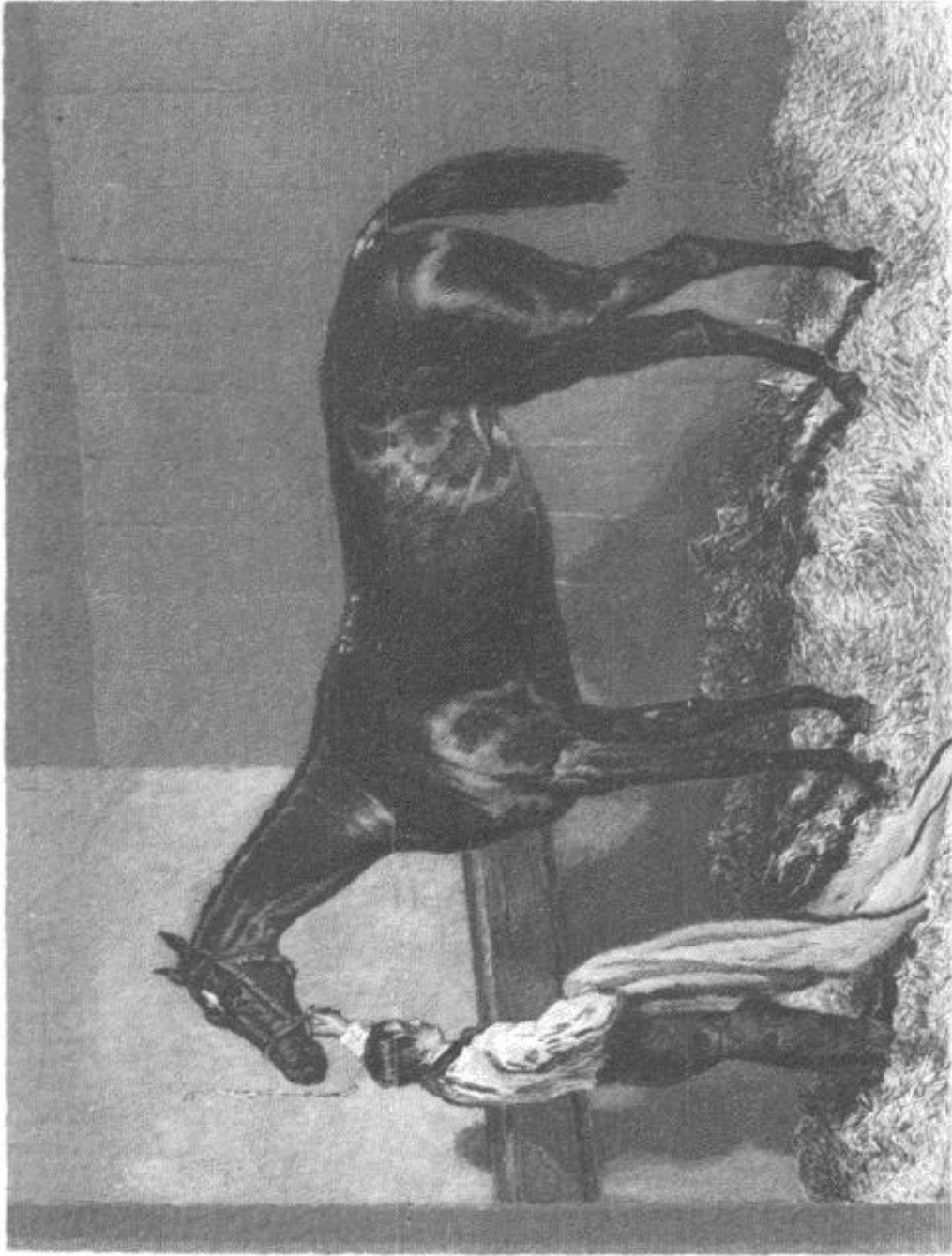
MIAMI'S PERFORMANCES.

1846.

At Newmarket, for two years old, colts 3st 7lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (Sly), won the July Stakes, of £850, beating Colonel Peel's br. f. Vert-Vert, by Venison (Nat), by a length, Cossack (A. Day), third, Colonel Anson's b. c. Don Cæsar, by Don John (F. Butler), Lord Exeter's ch. c. Tanais, by Hetman-Platoff (S. Mann), and his b. f. Cosachia, by Hetman-Platoff and three others; 7 to 4 on Cossack, who made the running to

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the top of the hill, where Miami assumed the lead, taking her field along at rare speed, followed by Cossack, second, Vert-Vert, third, Don Cæsar, fourth, and Tanais next, all close up with the leader. At the half-distance, Vert-Vert passed Cossack, and made a great effort to collar Miami; but Sir Joseph's game filly stalled off the challenge, holding her own to the end, and winning by a good length. Cossack was beaten by a neck for second place, and Don Cæsar was a good fourth. The pace throughout was very fast. A neck only divided second and third. S. mg., colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 4lbs (F. Butler), Miami, carrying 8st 13lbs, 9lbs extra, ran second for the Chesterfield Stakes, of £560, won by Lord Eglinton's b. f. Nerissa, by Launcelot (Job Marson), beating Lord Lonsdale's b. c. Ibrahim Pacha, by Camel, third, bl. c. Doctor Goodall, by The Provost, ch. f. Lady Lurewell, by Hornsea, Vert-Vert, and Cosachia; 9 to 4 against Ibrahim, and 5 to 1 each against Miami and Vert-Vert. Vert-Vert (J. Chapple) took the lead, closely followed by Nerissa and Ibrahim Pacha, Miami being next, two lengths behind. In this order they ran to the rise of the hill, where Nerissa went in front, Miami taking second place. At the distance, Miami got to Nerissa's head; but the extra weight began now to tell, and a very fine race home ended in Nerissa's favour by a very short neck. Vert-Vert was fourth; all the rest beaten off. Vert-Vert carried 4lbs extra.

1847.

At Newmarket, Craven, 8st (J. Marson), in a sweep of 50 sovs. each, six subscribers, p. p. (£250), Miami was beaten by the Duke of Richmond's b. c. Halo, by Mus, 8st 7lbs (Nat), who set off at score, was never caught, and won by a length; even betting. At Epsom (Templeman) won the Oaks, of £4125, beating Mr. Payne's b. f. Clementina (winner of the 1000 Guineas), by Venison (Nat), Captain Harcourt's br. f. Ellerdale (Marson), third, b. f. Cosachia (W. Abdale), fourth, also Sir C. Monck's b. f. Gaiety, by Touchstone (F. Butler), Mr. Mostyn's br. f. Slander, by Pantaloon, Mr. Brook's br. f. Luminous, by Lanercost, Mr. Crockford's b. f. Kite, by Buzzard, Lord Chesterfield's ch. f. Lady Lurewell, Lord Strathmore's b. f. Sultana, by Hetman-Platoff, Sir J. Hawley's b. f. Vanity, by Camel, Mr. Clifton's br. f. Brown Bess, by

Camel, b. f. Lady Lift, by Sir Hercules, b. f. Alsatia, by Lanercost, and nine others; 7 to 4 against Clementina, 11 to 2 against Slander, 9 to 1 against Miami, 10 to 1 against Ellerdale, and 14 to 1 against Alsatia. Miami took the lead, followed by Cosachia, Luminous (Cartwright) and Ellerdale, Clementina and Slander (Bartholomew) going on next. At the top of the hill, Cosachia and Ellerdale passed Miami, the former carrying on the running till they had made the turn, when Miami regained the lead, which she kept to the end. After crossing the road, Ellerdale and Clementina passed Cosachia, and at the half-distance, Clementina headed Ellerdale, but could not reach Miami. A good length separated each of the first four, Gaiety was fifth, and Slander sixth. At Ascot, for three years old, 8st 8lbs (Marson), ran third in the Welcome Stakes, of £620, won by the Duke of Richmond's b. c. Red Hart, 8st 7lbs (Nat), beating Mr. Mostyn's br. f. The Swallow, by Lanercost, 8st 2lbs (J. Holmes), by a length, and four others; 6 to 4 against Miami, 5 to 2 against The Swallow, and 6 to 1 against Red Hart. S. mg., 9st (Marson), in the Coronation Stakes, of £700, was beaten, half a length, by Lord Exeter's Cosachia, 8st 7lbs (W. Abdale): only two ran; 2 to 1 on Miami. At Stockbridge, 8st 3lbs (F. Butler), was not placed in a sweep of £850 won by Red Hart, 8st 9lbs (Nat), beating Mr. Mostyn's b. c. Crozier, by Lanercost, 8st 6lbs (H. Bell), by five lengths, Mr. Griffiths' b. f. Lady Lift, 8st 6lbs, and b. f. Sultana; 7 to 4 on Red Hart. At Newmarket (First October), 8st 4lbs (Marson), was third and last in the St. Leger Stakes, won by Mr. Pedley's b. c. Foreclosure, by Sheet Anchor, 8st 7lbs (A. Day), beating br. c. Ziska, by Clearwell, 8st 7lbs, by a neck. Miami led, at a good pace, to the Duke's Stand, where she turned rusty and flatly refused to go on. S. mg., 8st 7lbs, received 100 sovs. (compromise) from Lord Eglinton's Nerissa, 8st 3lbs, match for 300 sovs. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 7lbs (Marson), match for 200 sovs, beat Lord Glasgow's b. f. by The Provost, three years, 7st 11lbs (Nat); 6 to 4 on Miami. Lord Glasgow's filly made the running to the half-distance, when Miami closed with her, and won, after an exciting finish, by a head.

1848.

At Goodwood, 7st 4lbs (S. Mann), not placed for the Chesterfield Cup,

won by Mr. Drinkald's b. h. The Marquis of Conyngham, by Slane, five years, 7st 3lbs, beating twelve others. At Brighton, 7st 5lbs (S. Mann), won £130, beating Lord Clifden's br. f. Sagacity, by Theon, four years, 7st 12lbs (Nat), by a length, and five others. At Lewes, 9st 6lbs (S. Mann), for the Queen's Plate was beaten by Mr. H. Hill's ch. h. Pyrrhus I. (Derby winner in 1846), five years, 10st (A. Day). At Canterbury, 9st 6lbs (Sly), for the Queen's Plate was again beaten by Pyrrhus I. 10st (A. Day). Her last race.

VAN TROMP.



VAN TROMP was a brown colt, bred by H. Vansittart, Esq., in 1844, and sold to the Earl of Eglinton. He was got by Lanercost, out of Barbelle (bred by Mr. Vansittart in 1836), by Sandbeck (son of Catton), out of Darioletta (bred by Mr. Vansittart in 1822), by Amadis (son of Don Quixote), out of Selima (bred by Mr. Vansittart in 1810), by Selim, out of a mare (bred by Lord Grosvenor in 1794), by Pot80's, out of Editha (foaled 1781), by Herod, out of Elfrida (bred by Jenison Shafto, Esq., in 1768), by Old Snap, out of Miss Belsea, by Regulus, her dam, by Bartlett's Childers, out of a mare by Honeywood's Arabian, her dam, by the Byerley Turk, which was also the dam of the Two True Blues.

It was a long time before the Emperor Nicholas of Russia could make up his mind to purchase Van Tromp, which Mr. Kirby, of York, had offered to the Czar's agent, Colonel Schreider, for 2000 gs. The Emperor had seen Van Tromp's portrait, and did not like his neck; but, the Colonel assuring him that he had now a very fine crest, the bargain was concluded, and Van Tromp sent to Russia, where he became a great favourite with the Czar.

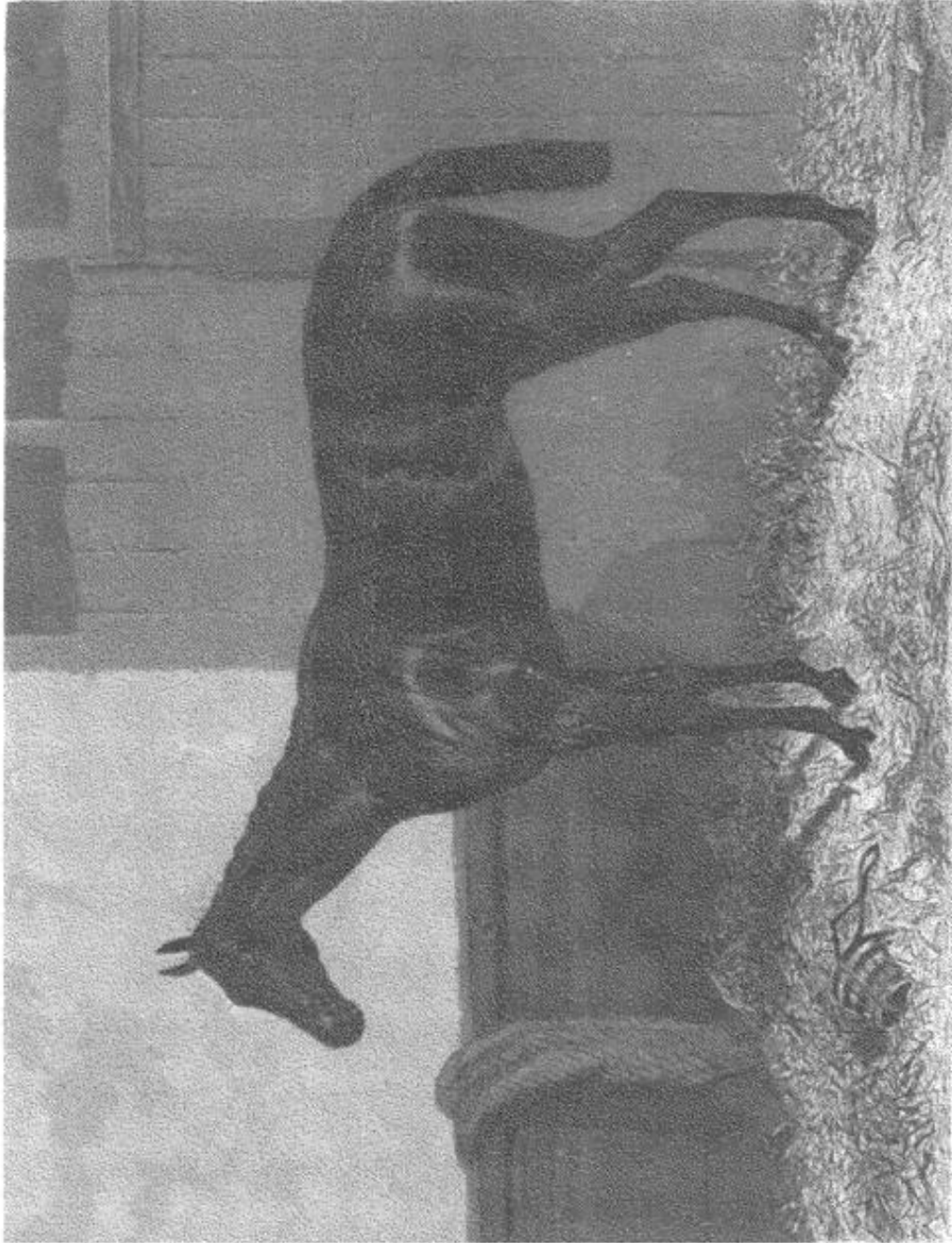

At Doncaster, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (Marson), won the Champagne Stakes, of £1075, beating Mr. Mostyn's br. c. *Planet*, by Bay Middleton (Nat), second, Mr. W. Scott's ch. c. *Christopher*, by Hampton (owner), third, br. f. *Ellerdale* (T. Lye), fourth, and three others; even on *Planet*. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 7lbs, match for 500 sovs., received 50 sovs. compromise from the Duke of Bedford's b. c. *Eothen*, by *Erymus*, 7st 7lbs, both two years old.

1847.

At Epsom (Marson) ran third in the Derby, won by *Cossack* (which see). At Newcastle, for three years old, 8st 7lbs each (Marson), won the North Derby, of £445, beating Lord Zetland's b. c. *Helias*, by Lanercost, Mr. Taylor's br. c. *George Hudson*, by Colwick, third, and ch. c. *Christopher* (now Mr. S. Conway's), last. S. mg., 8st 7lbs each (Marson), won the Gateshead Stakes, of £350, beating Mr. J. Scott's b. c. *Tim Whiffler*, by *Voltaire* (F. Butler), by four lengths. Van Tromp made all the running, was never approached, and won in a canter, hard held. At Liverpool (July), 8st 8lbs (Marson), won the St. Leger Stakes, of £1000, beating Mr. Mostyn's br. f. *The Swallow*, by Lanercost, 8st 6lbs, 3lbs extra for winning the Dee Stakes at Chester (J. Holmes), very easily, and Mr. Lane-Fox's br. c. *Executor* (winner of the Liverpool July Cup in 1848), by *Voltaire*, last. At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs each (Marson), ran second in the Racing Stakes, of £1150, won by *Planet* (F. Butler), *Red Hart*, by *Venison* (Nat), being third and last. At starting, *Red Hart* led by two lengths, Van Tromp being next, with *Planet* close at his heels. They ran thus to the distance, where Van Tromp took the lead, *Planet* being second. At the stand, *Planet* challenged, and, through Frank Butler's fine jockeyship, just won by half a length, *Red Hart* a bad third. At Doncaster (Marson), won the Great St. Leger of £3275, beating *Cossack* (Templeman), second, Lord Eglinton's b. c. *Eryx* (winner, this year, of the Northumberland Plate), third (Marlow), also br. c. *Planet*, Mr.

Lane-Fox's br. c. *Philosopher*, by *Voltaire* (F. Butler), Mr. Meeson's b. c. *Jovial*, by *Jereed* (son of *Sultan*), br. f. *The Swallow*, and Mr. Pedley's b. c. *Foreclosure*, by *Sheet Anchor*, out of *Mortgage*; 5 to 4 on *Cossack*, 4 to 1 against *The Van*, 11 to 2 against *Foreclosure*, 7 to 1 against *Planet*, and 12 to 1 against *Eryx*, by *St. Martin* (son of *Actæon*). *Cossack* took a clean lead at starting, followed by *Van Tromp*, *Jovial* (Whitehouse), and *Eryx*. At the hill, *Eryx* passed *Jovial*, and, shortly after, headed *Van Tromp*, *Jovial* being fourth. At the mile-post, *Foreclosure* passed *Jovial*; and, in making the last turn, *Marson* took *The Van* into the second place. At the distance, he went up to *Cossack*'s head, ran with him for fifty yards, and then took the lead, increased it as he went, and won very easily by a couple of lengths. *Eryx* was ten lengths in the rear of *Cossack*, *Jovial* four lengths from *Eryx*. Mr. Pedley had declared to win with *Foreclosure* (A. Day). S. mg., w. o. for the *Gascoigne Stakes* (£150).

1848.

At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs each (Marlow), won a sweep of 300 sovs., half forfeit, twenty-six subscribers (val. £3600), beating *Cossack* (Templeman) by upwards of one hundred yards; 7 to 4 on *The Van*. At Goodwood, 9st 3lbs (Marlow), won the Cup, of £570, beating *Baron de Maltzahn's* ch. c. *Armin*, by *Sir Hercules*, three years, 6st 4lbs (Geo. Dockeray), by a length, *Lord Glasgow's* b. m. *Miss Sarah* (winner of the *Great Yorkshire Stakes* in 1845), by *Gladiator*, six years, 8st 12lbs (Nat), a bad third, also (not placed), *Lord Clifden's* br. h. *Footstool*, by *The Saddler*, five years, 9st 9lbs (Robinson), Mr. Merry's gr. h. *Chanticleer*, five years, 9st 9lbs (Marson), ch. f. *Maid of Masham*, by *Don John*, three years, 6st 6lbs (J. Prince), *Cossack*, 9st 3lbs, and two others; 6 to 4 on *The Van*, 9 to 2 against *Chanticleer*, 12 to 1 against *Miss Sarah*, and 20 to 1 against *Cossack*, 9st 3lbs (Templeman). *Miss Sarah* was a bad third. At Doncaster, 9st 3lbs (Marlow), ran third and last for the Cup, won by *Chanticleer*, five years, 8st 12lbs (Nat), beating *Captain* (afterwards *Admiral*) *Harcourt's* br. f. *Ellerdale*, four years, 8st 2lbs (Marson), easily by two lengths; 7 to 4 on *The Van*, 3 to 1 against *Chanticleer*, and 5 to 1 against *Ellerdale*.

1849.

At Ascot, 9st (Chas. Marlow), two and a half miles, won the Emperor of Russia's Plate,* of 500 sovs., with sweep of 260 sovs., beating Chanticleer, 9st 3lbs (Nat), by half a length, ch. c. Cossack, five years, 9st (Templeman), third, and Mr. Rolt's b. h. Collingwood, by Sheet Anchor, six years, 9st 3lbs (F. Butler), last. A length between second and third, and a head between third and fourth; 5 to 4 on Chanticleer, 2 to 1 against The Van, 6 to 1 against Cossack, and 10 to 1 against Collingwood.

The general remark on the course, after the race was over, was that Van Tromp won it in magnificent style, and like a thoroughly good racehorse. This was The Van's last appearance on the Turf. He was subsequently sold to Mr. Kirby, and, as before stated, sent to Russia.

The Druid, in "Scott and Sebright," observes of Van Tromp that he "was an exceedingly idle horse, and not at all deficient in speed. The St. Leger day was his best, and he had won his race a mile from home. Never did horse win an Ascot Cup in such unflinching style as Van Tromp; but if Nat (on Chanticleer) had waited to the stand, instead of trying to take up the running soon after the last turn, Marlow never would have got a pull, and Van never could have answered so gamely to the whip as he did. Single-handed, Chanticleer ought always to have got the *last run*, and beaten him; but there was hardly 3lbs between them either way."

* This gift of the Emperor Nicholas was not continued by his successor, Alexander, it having been withdrawn at the outbreak of the Crimean War, and never renewed.

PEEP-O'-DAY-BOY.

PEEP-O'-DAY-BOY was a chestnut colt, bred in Ireland by J. O'Reilly, Esq., in 1844, and sold to Lord Howth, at the Curragh Meeting, in 1847. He was got by Harkaway, out of Rosetta, by Roller, out of sister to Recruit, by Whalebone, out of a mare by Teddy-the-Grinder, her dam, by Gohanna, out of Catherine (sister to Colibri), by Woodpecker, out of Camilla, by Trentham, out of Coquette, by the Compton-Barb, out of sister to Regulus, by the Godolphin Arabian.

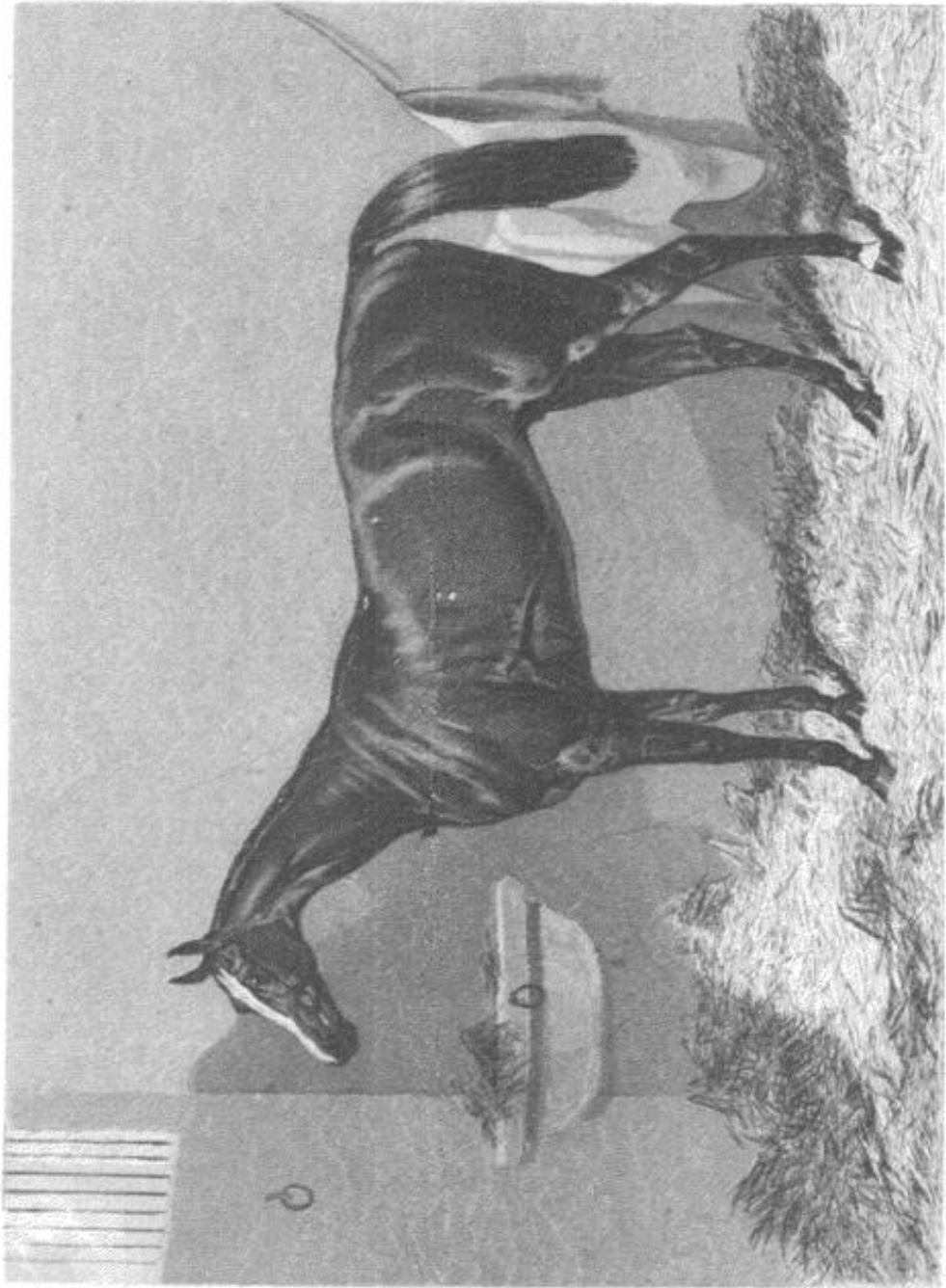

S. mg., 7st 1lb (Foley) not placed for the Queen's Plate, won by Mr. Whaley's b. c. Burgundy, by Ishmael, four years, 9st 4lbs (Keegan) beating Mr. White's ch. c. Farnham, by Irish Birdcatcher, three years, 7st 1lb (Magee), second, Mr. Watts's b. c. Mogador, by Verulam (son of Lottery) three years, 7st 1lb (Wynne), third, also Colonel Westenra's br. c. Joc-o'-Sot (winner at the Curragh, in June, of the rich Kirwan Stakes), by Hetman Platoff, three years, 7st 1lb, and seven others. At the Curragh (June), 8st 10lbs (Foley), ran second in a sweep of 200 sovs., won by Mr. J. Barrington's ch. c. The Bright Star, by Irish Birdcatcher, 8st 10lbs (Ccnlan), beating Mr. Whaley's b. f. Calcavella, by Irish Birdcatcher, 8st 10lbs, and Mr. Preston's b. c. The Irish King, by Conjuror (son of Camel), 8st 4lbs, all three years old.

"The Druid," in an article entitled "The Foreign Market," page 154 of his work, "Silk and Scarlet," says Colonel Schreider's next purchases were much less happy in his Sovereign's eyes. "Andover, for whom he gave 2000 gs. to Sir Tatton Sykes, had most certainly light back-ribs, as many of that tribe (the Bay Middletons) have; but still he was to our mind the nicest mover, and the best type of a Derby horse we ever saw by the old Jersey Bay. We remember lingering, on a Goodwood Cup day, that we might see him steal along once more with Alfred Day, in a walk over. However, his wide ears, his inclination to turn out his toes, and his roaring were fatal to him. Peep-o'-Day-Boy chiefly was disliked by the Emperor from his somewhat light forelegs, and the high price which had been paid for him. According to the Russian account, 600 gs. was the first sum asked for him, when the Colonel went to look at him at Neasdon. He would not, however, on that occasion give an answer, though the horse just suited to his mind; and when, shortly afterwards, he sent to say that he would take him, the price was raised to 1200 gs., and after another demur, to 1600 gs., at which price the Colonel at length closed the bargain, and sent in fury to fetch him away."

Colonel Schreider was the Emperor Nicholas's accredited agent in England for the purchase of thoroughbred stock, assisted, in his judgment, by Mr. Kirby, of York.

SURPLICE.

SURPLICE was a bay colt, foaled in 1845, the property of Lord Geo. Bentinck, who sold him, when two years old, to the Hon. E. L. Mostyn, from whom he was subsequently purchased by Lord Clifden, in 1847. He was got by Touchstone, out of Crucifix, by Priam, out of Octaviana, by Octavian (a son of Stripling, by Phœnomenon), out of a mare by Shuttle, out of Zara (bred by Mr. Garforth in 1801), by Delpini (son of Highflyer), out of Flora, by King Fergus, out of Atalanta (bred by Mr. Coates, of Castle Leavington, near Yarm, Yorks, in 1769), by Match'em, out of Lass of the Mill, by Oroonoko (son of Crab), out of sister to Lass of the Mill, by old Traveller, out of Miss Makeless, by Young Greyhound.

Surplice was foaled very early, on the 24th of January, 1845; and Lord George took some heavy Derby bets about him, at Goodwood, in that same year, the year in which he carried off both the Goodwood Stakes and Cup with Miss Elis. At the end of the following year, Lord George took his measure, and found him to be fifteen hands, and rather leggy. About this time he met with two accidents. The first snowstorm he was out in terrified him so much that he dashed at a stone wall, and performed a most complete somersault into an adjoining garden. That did him no harm; but, when he was being lunged, he made a slip, and lay with his fore and hind feet in so perilous a position as to indicate some injury to his back. Luck again favoured him, as he soon jumped up unhurt. Lord George bitterly regretted having parted with a Derby and St. Leger winner.

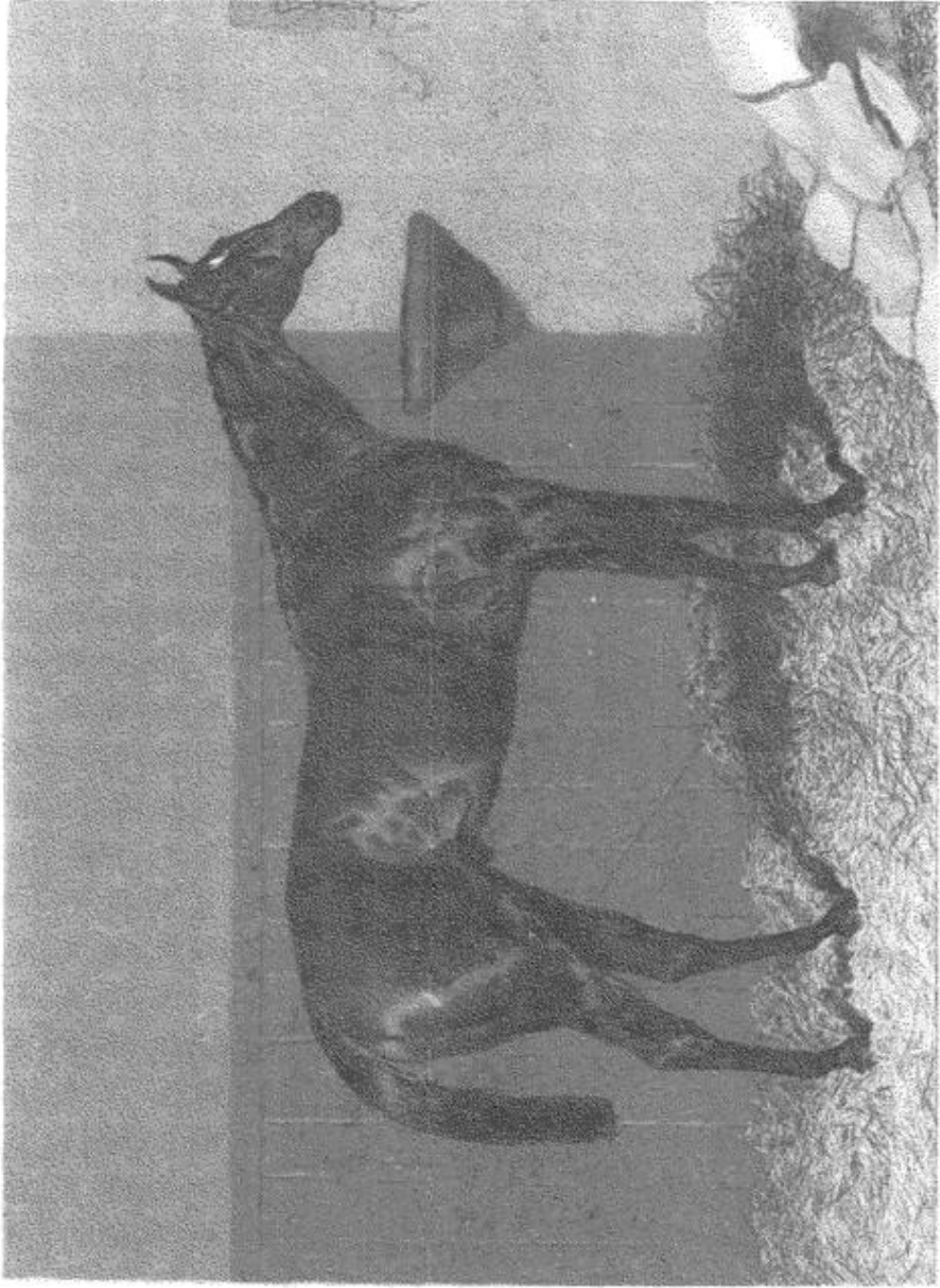

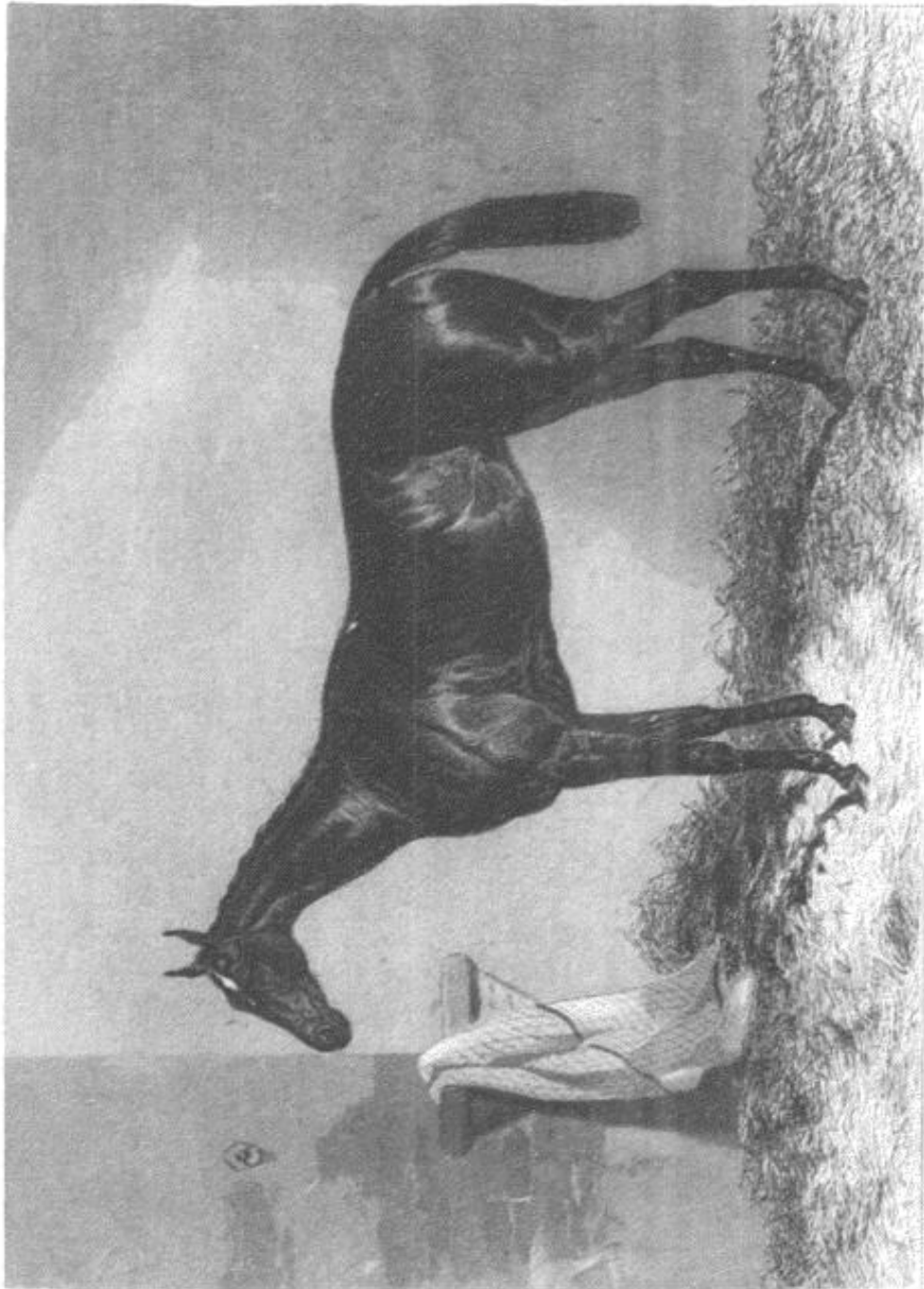

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CYMBA.

CYMBA was a bay filly, foaled in 1845, the property of Mr H. Hill. She was got by Melbourne, out of Skiff, by Sheet Anchor, out of Tertia, by Emilius, out of Miss Wentworth, by Cervantes (son of Don Quixote), out of a mare by Stamford (son of Sir Peter), out of Wryneck, by Beningbrough, out of Miss Tippet, by Morwick Ball (son of Regulus), out of Miss Cornforth, by Match'em, her dam, by Sampson, out of a mare by Regulus.

Mr. Henry Hill (better known in racing circles as Harry Hill) died at his house in Kensington, in February, 1881. Born almost on the same day as the late Mr. H. Padwick, Harry Hill filled up the place in the ring left vacant by Mr. Robert Ridsdale, who levanted when the Queen of Trumps won the St. Leger, in 1835. In 1832, the Derby was won by St. Giles; and it was the common talk of the day that, with the sole exception of Mr. Vansittart's Perion (who ran second), every horse *that started* ran in the *interest* of the owners and confederates, Messrs. R. Ridsdale and John Gully. After Mr. Ridsdale had left the place that knew him no more, Harry Hill became the confederate of Mr. Gully. The histories of John Gully, Robert Ridsdale, and Harry Hill had this in common, that, by birth, they all belonged to the lowest orders in society, and that all of them rose to opulence by betting and owning horses on the turf, though the extravagance of Ridsdale consigned him again to the rank from which he originally sprang. John Gully worked and lived to become M.P. for Pontefract. Harry Hill was certainly the cleverest of the three; and he, like Ridsdale (originally a footman in the service of the Earl of Durham), was born in Yorkshire, and passed his early days as "boots" in a small hotel at Bradford. He was one of the ablest commissioners of the day, and was more or less identified with the Days

and the Danebury stable ; but it was as the trusted commissioner of Lord George Bentinck that the name of Harry Hill will live longest in racing lore. He died full of years, wealthy, and highly respected for his honest conduct in every transaction in which he was engaged.

THE FLYING DUTCHMAN.

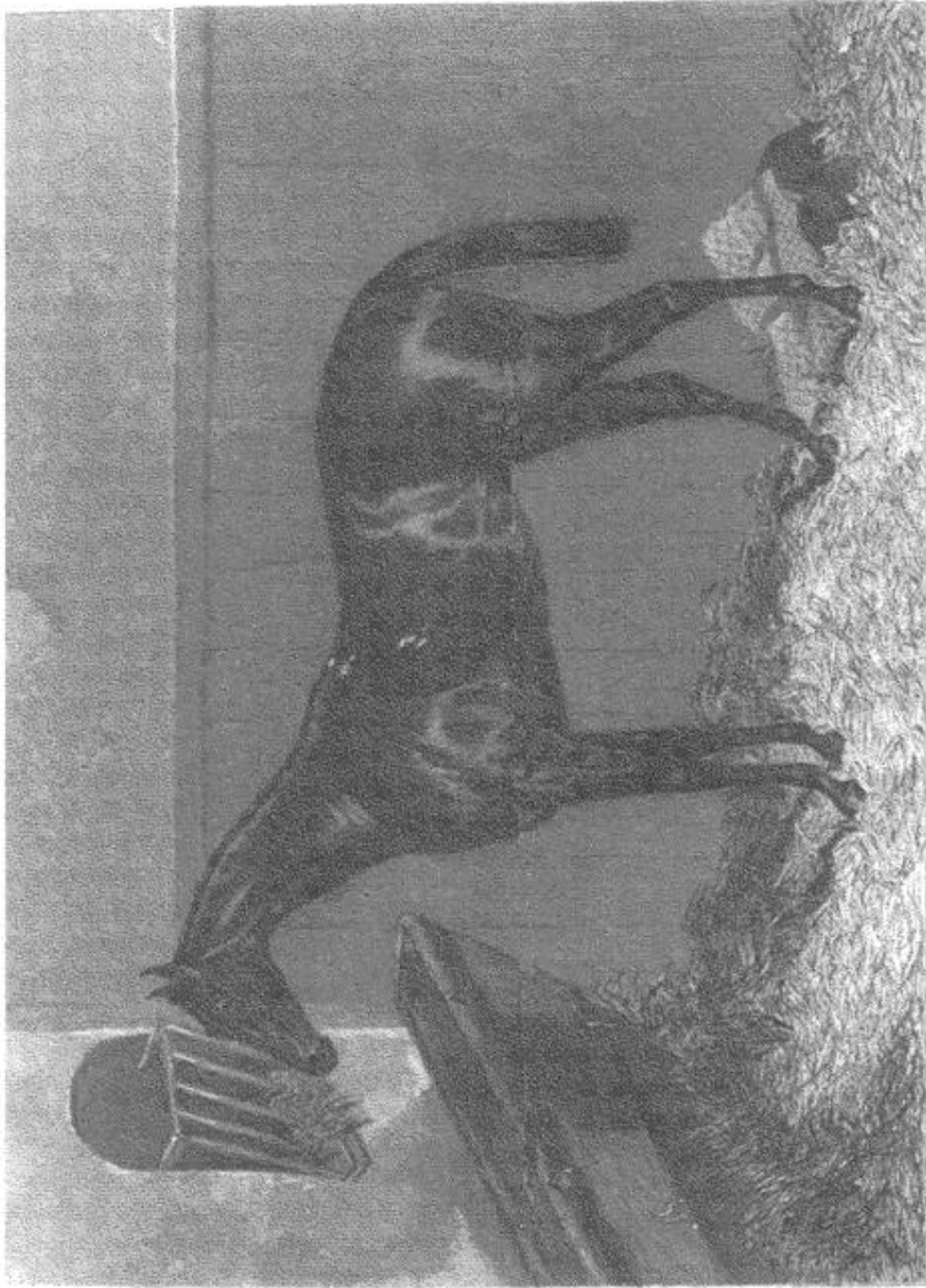
THE FLYING DUTCHMAN was a brown colt, bred by H. Vansittart, Esq., in 1846, and sold to the Earl of Eglinton. He was got by Bay Middleton, out of Barbelle, by Sandbeck (son of Catton), out of Darioletta, by Amadis, out of Selima, by Selim, out of a mare by Pot80's, out of Editha, by Herod, out of Elfrida, by Old Snap, out of Miss Belsea, by Regulus, her dam, by Bartlett's Childers, out of a mare by Honeywood's White Arabian, out of the dam of the two True Blues, by the Byerley Turk, bred by John Bowes, Esq., of Gibside Park, Durham.

The Flying Dutchman was foaled on the 27th of February, 1846. "Old Barbelle, his dam," observes "The Druid," "had been sold, some years after the Dutchman's birth, for 40 sovs., at auction, and sent to Ashgill with a filly foal by Pottinger, at her foot. The two were soon separated; and, for a while, indulged in a succession of responsive bewailings. The mare, old and ragged, was placed in a cart stable; and, with her light neck, and drooping quarters, looked more like a worn-out hack than a blood brood mare that had produced three yearlings which fetched 1000 gs. a-piece, one of them credited with a Derby and St. Leger and Ascot Cup, and another with a St. Leger, and the Ascot and Goodwood Cups." The Dutchman's feet could never get him well through dirt, in which Master Henry (Orville's game and plucky son) actually revelled. Before The Dutchman was sent to France, he was leased to the Rawcliffe Stud Company; but got nothing of high class, except Ignoramus and Fly-by-Night. At the Goodwood Meeting, of 1858, Mr. Phillips offered £4600 for him; but £5000, and nothing less, was the response. He was eventually sold for £4000, and sent to France.

Marlow was perfectly delighted when he first mounted The Dutchman, and followed Van Tromp up the gallop; and, on returning with him, remarked to the Trainer, Fobert, that he "had never been on such an one

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before." His stride was enormous; and, at the end of his two year old season, the Turf savans declared that the magnificent son of Bay Middleton had never been extended. Marlow considered that The Dutchman stayed better as he grew older; the fact, however, being that his speed was so tremendous that no horse could get him out.

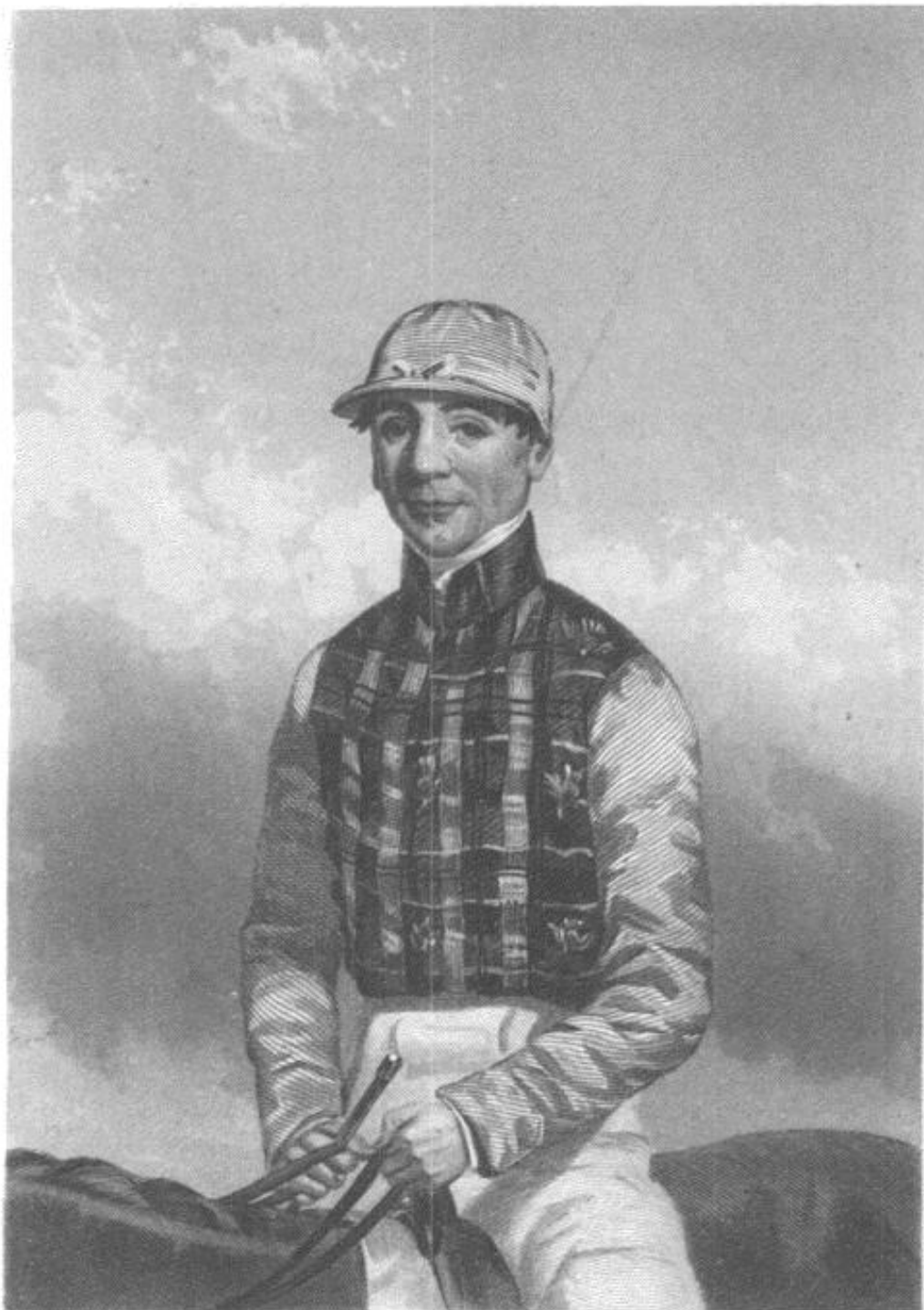

At the Furzes The Dutchman had a good length's lead, but appeared anything but comfortable in struggling through the mire. Rounding Tattenham Corner, Hotspur came up most unexpectedly on the right, and looked so like a winner that, for the instant, Marlow could not imagine what it could be. The Dutchman seemed altogether muddled and confused in the deep and holding ground, and perfectly inactive in comparison with his two year old movement. Hotspur, on the contrary, went over the dirt like a swallow, and showed no signs of coming back till within three strides of home, when Marlow, who had a length to make up, struck The Dutchman twice (the only time he ever touched him), and the last stride gave him the "short neck" victory. Whitehouse always maintained that he had won; and the only response Marlow ever made to this bold assertion was, "*You won at the wrong place, George; you didn't win at Judge Clarke.*" At Liverpool, w. o. for a Produce Stakes, of £700, and also for the Bickerstaffe, of £150. At Doncaster (Marlow), won the Great

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St. Leger, of £3330, beating Nunny-Kirk (A. Day), by two lengths, Sir J. Hawley's b. c. Vatican (J. Marson), third, Honeycomb (Robinson), fourth, Herbert, by Venison, Westow, by Melbourne, Saucy Dick and Thringaft, both by Hetman Platoff, Old Dan Tucker, and Elthiron; 9 to 4 on The Dutchman, 15 to 1 against Nunny-Kirk (whom "The Druid" describes as a horse "with slack loins, a sweet head, and sweeter action"), the same against Vatican, and 16 to 1 against Old Dan Tucker. S. mg., w. o. for the Foal Stakes, of £400. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 7lbs, D. M., match for 1000 sovs., h. ft., received £500, forfeit, from Lord Clifden's Honeycomb, 8st 4lbs. At Newmarket (Houghton), 9st (Marlow), won the Belvoir Stakes, of 200 sovs. each, h. ft., six subscribers (600), beating Vatican (Templeman), by eight lengths.

1850.

At Ascot, 8st 5lbs (Marlow), won the Emperor of Russia's Plate (in lieu of the Cup), with sweep (val. £760), beating Lord Lonsdale's bl. h. Jericho, by Jerry, aged, 9st 3lbs (Sam Rogers), by *eight lengths*, Lord Stanley's br. m. Canezou (winner of the 1000 Guineas, in 1848, the Goodwood and Doncaster Cups, in 1849, and the Goodwood Cup, in 1850), by Melbourne, five years, 8st 11lbs (F. Butler), third, Lord Exeter's b. c. Little Jack, by Slane, three years, 6st 10lbs, fourth, and Lord Howth's ch. h. Peep-o'-Day-Boy, by Harkaway, six years, 9st 3lbs; 7 to 4 on The Dutchman, 2 to 1 against Canezou, and 20 to 1 against Jericho: three lengths between second and third. At Goodwood, for four years old, 8st 7lbs each, three miles and five furlongs (Marlow), won a sweep of 300 sovs. each, h. ft., twelve subscribers (val. £1505), beating Vatican (Templeman), by ten lengths. At Doncaster, 8st 12lbs (Marlow), for the Cup, was beaten, half a length, by Lord Zetland's br. c. Voltigeur, three years, 7st 7lbs (Nat); 5 to 1 on The Dutchman. Referring to this race, in an obituary notice of poor Charles Marlow, who died in poverty and obscurity in the Devizes workhouse, at the close of October, 1882, the *Daily Telegraph* thus writes: "In the Doncaster Cup, of 1850, The Dutchman, aged four years, and with 8st 12lbs in the saddle, encountered, single handed, another winner of the Derby and St. Leger, in Lord Zetland's Voltigeur, aged three years, and carrying seven stone, seven

pounds. On the preceding Wednesday, Voltigeur had been unable to win the St. Leger until he had first run a dead-heat with Russborough; and everything pointed to an easy victory (on Friday), for Lord Eglington. The eager layers of odds, at the rate of six to one, on the four year old, were unaware that, for the first time in his life, The Dutchman had refused his food, and was unusually irritable when brought out to exercise. With more ostentation than sagacity, Fobert (his Lordship's trainer), gave the horse on *Thursday* the most tremendous gallop that perhaps was ever taken over the Doncaster Cup Course, a gallop of which 'The Druid' never ceased to speak. When the eventful moment approached The Dutchman, contrary to his wont, was unusually fidgety at the starting post; and Fobert, as he held his horse's rein, gave Marlow strict orders to *wait* upon the three year old until they had got round the Red House corner, and were within six furlongs of home. Unfortunately the Jockey was in the condition, depicted by Burns, of one 'o'er all the ills of life victorious.' He had, however, enough self-balance left to know that he was bestriding a great horse; and, utterly regardless of Fobert's orders, he exclaimed, as the flag fell, 'I'll show them what I have got under me to-day.' There are many still living, who have been familiar with horse-races for fifty years, and who have not yet forgotten the pace at which The Dutchman made the running as he passed the Stand for the first time. Round the turn they flew, and up the hill, The Dutchman still leading, until the Red House was near. Beautifully ridden by Nat, Voltigeur followed a couple of lengths behind his leader, until a little below the distance, when the three year old closed with his hitherto invincible rival. Then, to his amazement, The Dutchman's jockey, sobered by the intensity of his excitement, discovered that there was no steel left in the wonderful animal beneath him. To this hour, the spectacle presented by Lord Eglington as, pale with emotion, he leant against the wall of the Jockey Club Stand, has not faded from the memory of those who sympathetically looked on. Once again the two mighty antagonists were to meet; and, before retiring finally from the Turf, The Dutchman retrieved the laurels torn temporarily from his brow. That his rider, honest as the day, but drunken and improvident, should have died in a workhouse is a sad end to a brilliant career."

1851.

At York (Spring), May 13th, 8st 8½lbs (Marlow), match for 1000 sovs., two miles, beat Voltigeur, four years, 8st (Nat), by a length. The betting on this great match, at evens, was enormous, the Tykes putting down their money so freely as to imply the greatest confidence in their champion to inflict a second defeat on the renowned Dutchman, whose supporters (and they were legion), were equally assured of his ability to win. The race was most closely and resolutely contested throughout; but, in no part of it, was the issue ever for a moment in doubt.

The Dutchman now quitted the Turf, in the imperishable records of which his name will always occupy a prominent position.

LADY EVELYN.

LADY EVELYN was a brown filly, bred by the Earl of Chesterfield, in 1846, and got by Don John, out of Industry, by Priam, out of Arachne, by Filho-da-Putá, out of Treasure, by Camillus, out of a mare by Hyacinthus, out of Flora, by King Fergus, out of Atalanta, by Match'em. For remainder of pedigree, see Surplice.

Lady Evelyn was so named after one of Lord Chesterfield's daughters, but not till she had won the Oaks. She was a mealy-brown mare, standing fifteen hands one inch and a half high. She had a small blood-like head, a somewhat full and strong neck, with beautiful sloping shoulders. She possessed great depth of girth, a good back, fine arms and thighs, with powerful quarters, and good sound wearing legs and feet. Lady Evelyn was, in short, a very handsome model of a racehorse, low and lengthy, without an atom of coarseness anywhere. She was, moreover, a mare of boundless spirit, and great courage, always ran most kindly, always in the greatest stakes and the very best of company.

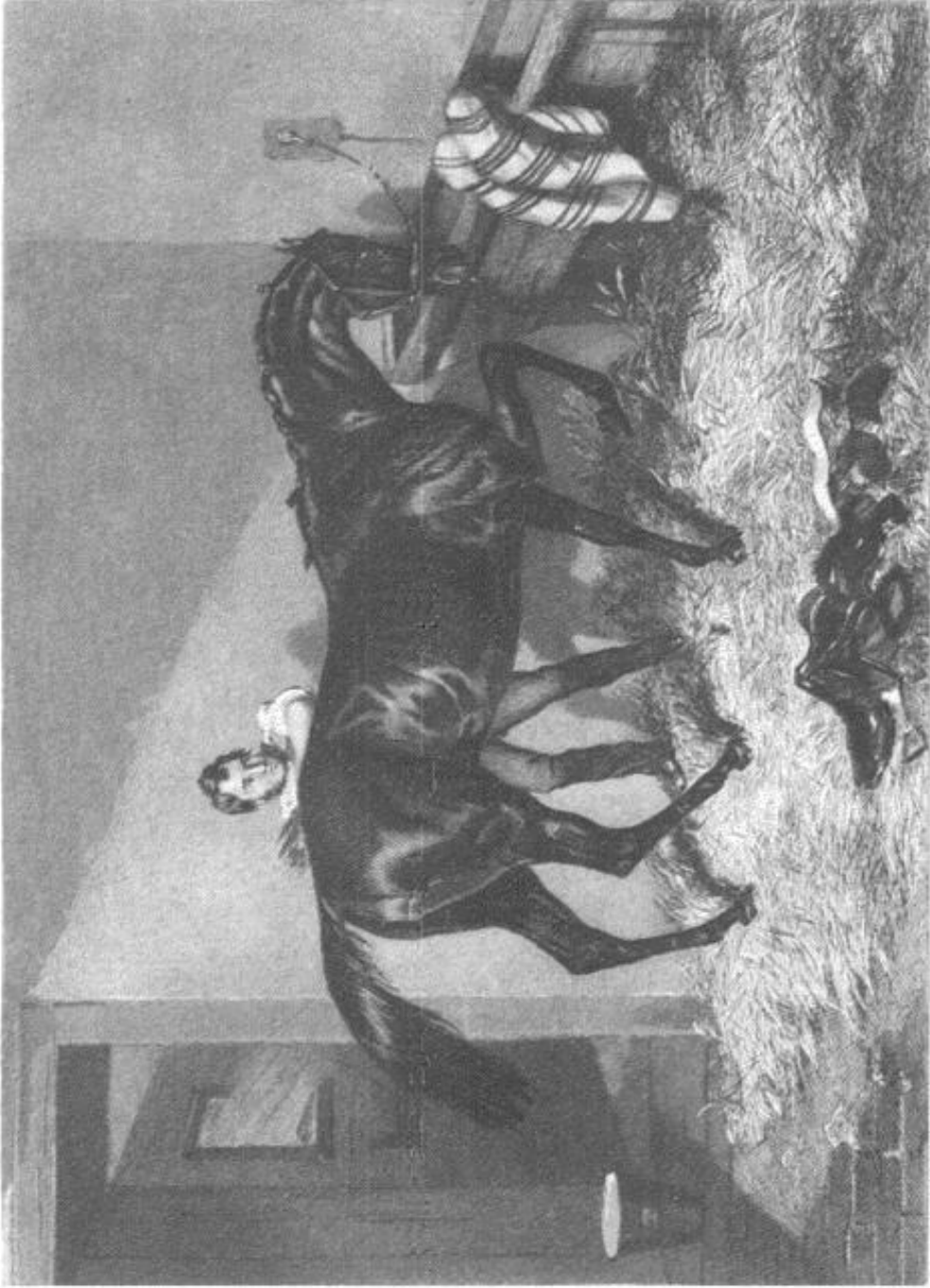

Highland Fling, by Venison, b. f. Clarissa, and six others; 3 to 1 against Lady Evelyn and Glauca, 4 to 1 against Clarissa, and 10 to 1 against Woodlark. At Ascot, 9st—7lbs extra—(Nat), for three years old, fillies only, 8st 7lbs each, won the Coronation Stakes, of £1050, beating ch. f. Grace (Bartholomew), by two lengths, and Mr. H. Neville's b. f. Letitia, by Sir Hercules (J. Robinson), last; 5 to 2 on Lady Evelyn. At York, Lady Evelyn was entered for the Yorkshire Oaks, for three years old, fillies only, 8st 7lbs each (won by Lord Zetland's b. f. 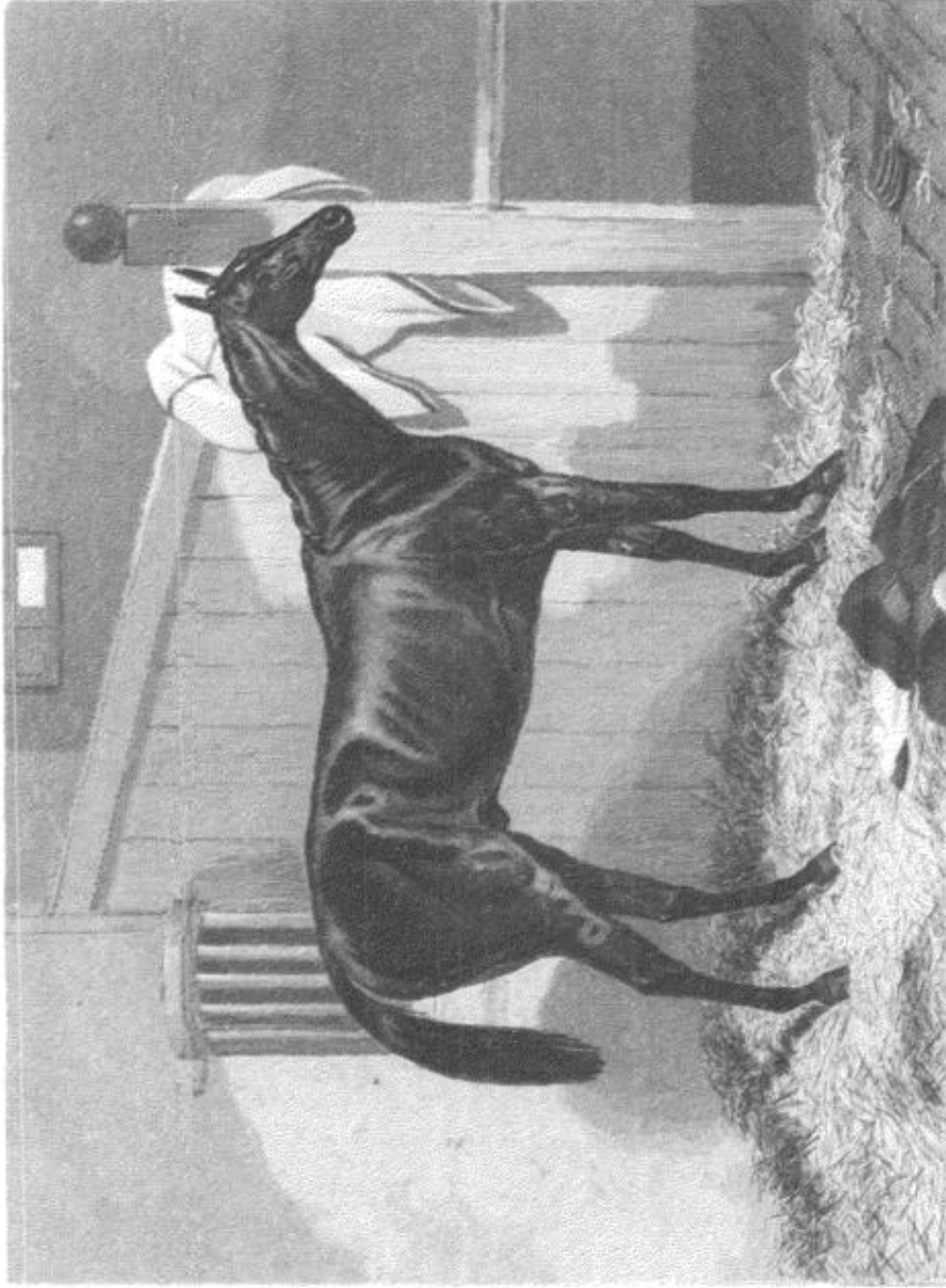

VOLTIGEUR.

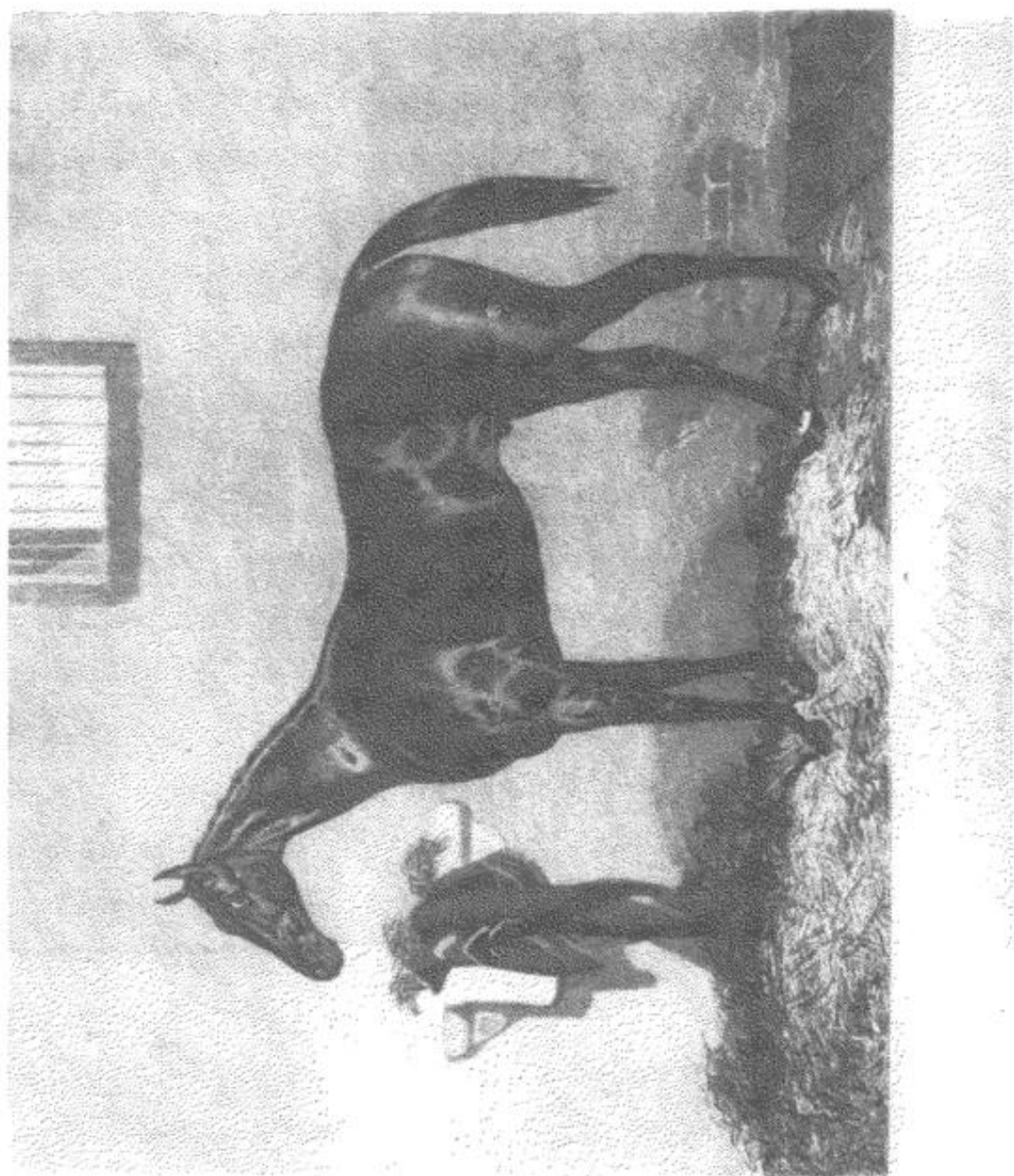
VOLTIGEUR was a brown colt, bred by Mr. Stephenson, and sold to the Earl of Zetland. He was got by Voltaire, out of Martha Lynn, by Mulatto (son of Catton), out of Leda (own sister to Fanny Davies), by Filho-da-Putta, out of Treasure, by Camillus, out of a mare by Hyacinthus, out of Flora, by King Fergus, out of Atalanta, by Match'em, out of Lass-of-the-Mill, by Oroonoko (son of Old Crab), out of Sister to Lass-of-the-Mill, by Old Traveller, out of Miss Makeless (bred by Mr. Holme, of Cumberland, in 1737), by Young Greyhound, out of a mare by Mr. Croft's Old Partner, out of Miss Doe's Dam, by Woodcock (a son of Old Merlin).

In his work, entitled "Scott and Sebright;" "The Druid" writes thus of Voltigeur: "Although the mares were pretty good, and bred well, the Voltaire colts did not rank very high, when Martha Lynn threw Barnton and Voltigeur to him. They were generally heavy-necked, and heavy-fleshed; and it was these peculiarities which caused Lord Zetland and others to dislike Voltigeur when Robert Hill marked him, as a yearling, at Doncaster, and begged his Lordship to have a look at him. When the colt came up before Mr. Tattersall, the 'take him away' soon boomed forth, as not a soul would bid a hundred for him, and he was sent back to his breeder, Mr. Stephenson. However, urged by Robert Hill, Lord Zetland consented to allow the colt to be brought to Aske, on loan to Mr. Williamson.* In his trial with Castanette, his victory was so hollow that, in doubt of its correctness, they were tried again on the following day, with the same result. A fortnight afterwards he was tried a third time, with Ellen Middleton (put in to make a pace), Castanette, and

* Mr. Williamson, second son of Sir Hedworth Williamson, was brother-in-law to Lord Zetland.

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Cantab, and he positively came in alone. Lord Zetland who, on this occasion, was present, now determined to give the £1500 asked for him, with a £500 contingency on each of the great events, and the luck of the spots now began."

Windischgrätz (winner, this year, of the Liverpool July Cup, and the Goodwood Stakes), by Jeremy Diddler (son of Jerry), b. c. the Bee-Hunter, by Gladiator, ch. c. Pitsford, The Italian, and two others also ran; 13 to 8 on Voltigeur, and 5 to 2 against Pitsford. S. mg., w. o. for the Scarborough Stakes; and 7st 7lbs (ridden by Nat Flatman), won the Cup, beating The Flying Dutchman, 8st 12lbs (C. Marlow), by half a length (which see.)

At Ascot, 9st (Marson), ran fifth for the Cup, won by Joe Miller (which see.) Voltigeur ran twice more, this year, at York August Meeting, without success, and retired to the Stud.

The colt at Aske his power can task, and put his pride to rout.

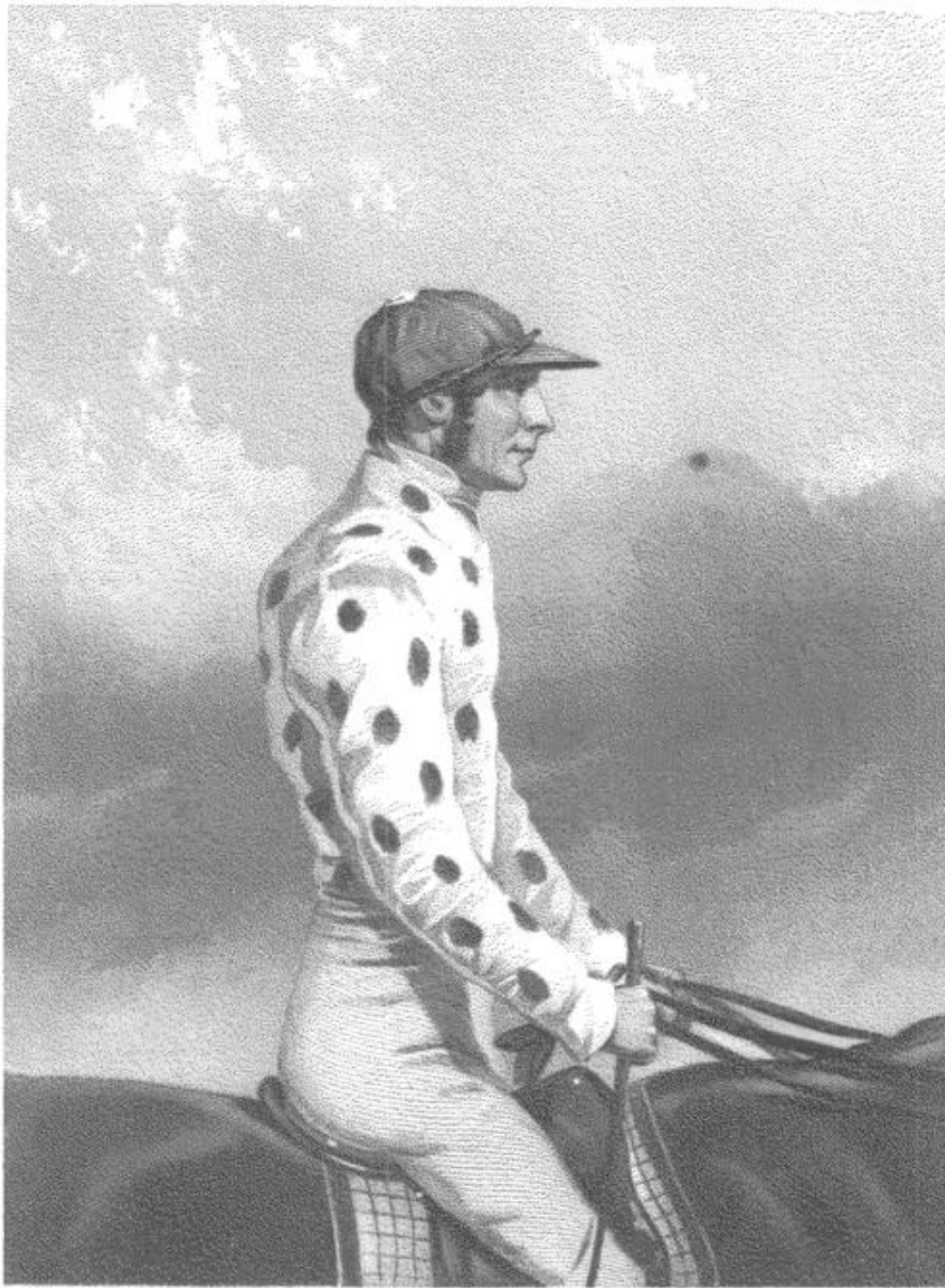
"Hold !" quoth Lord Eglinton, "ye Yorkshire sceptics, know

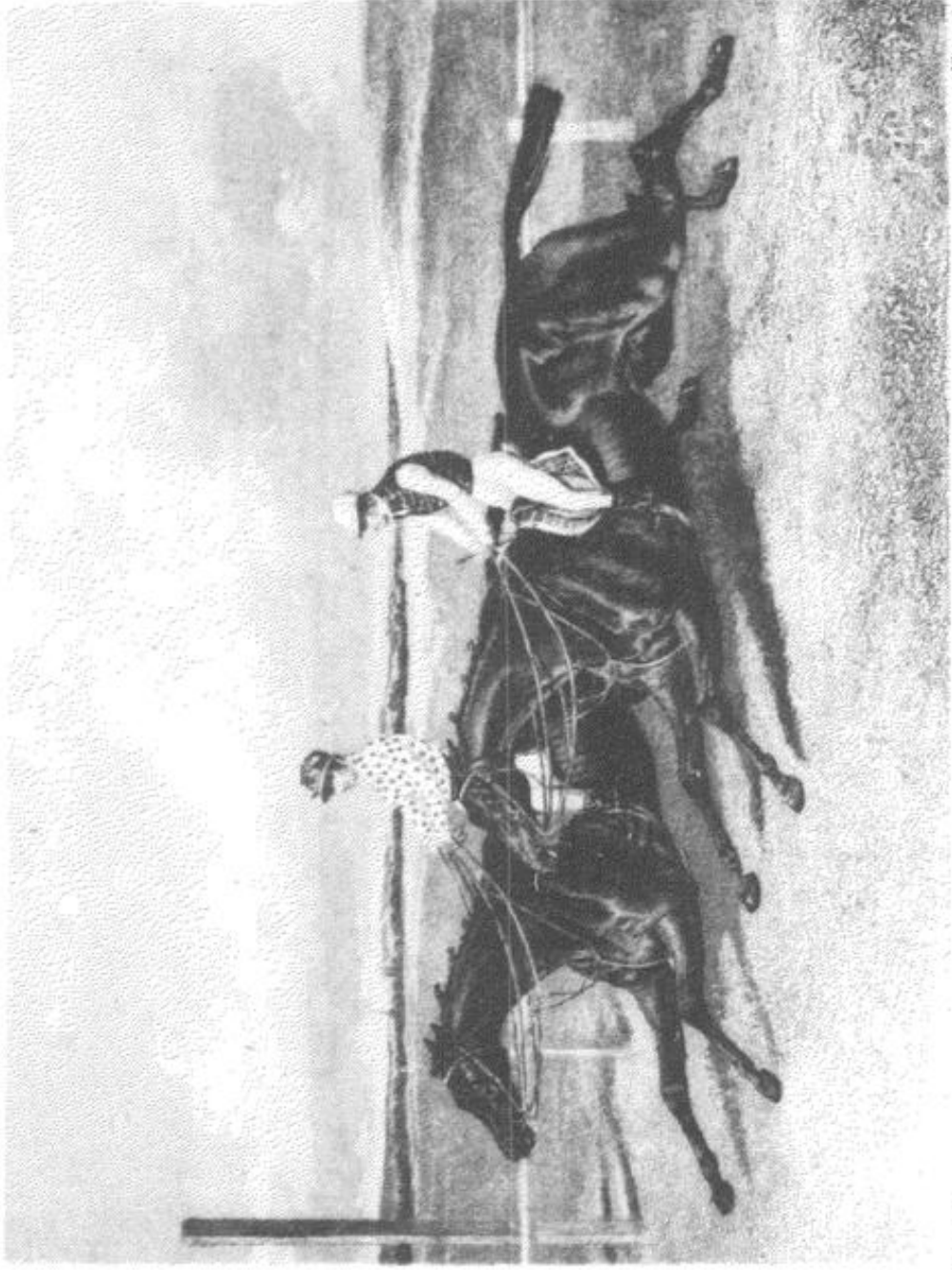
“Nat’s catching him : the young-un wins !” now falls on Marlow’s ear,

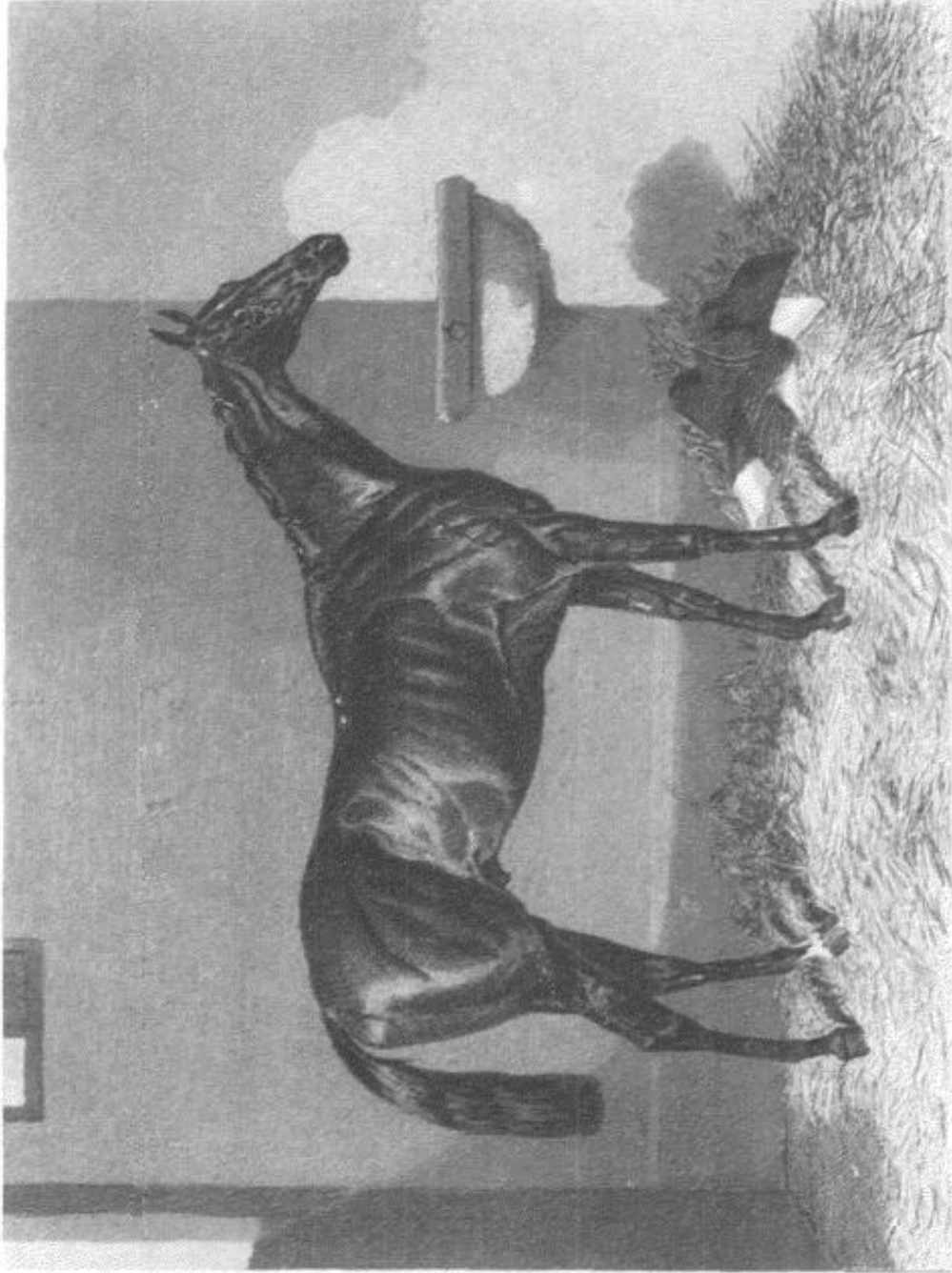

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 RUSSBOROUGH.

RUSSBOROUGH was a chestnut colt, bred by Lord Miltown, in Ireland, in 1847, and sold when a yearling to Mr. J. Murphy, who disposed of him to Mr. Mangan, a banker in Dublin, after winning the Railway Stakes Handicap at the Curragh, in September, 1850. He was got by Tearaway (son of Voltaire), out of Cruiskeen (bred by Lord Miltown in 1834) by Sir Hercules, out of Brandy Bet (bred by Mr. Montgomery in 1829), by Canteen, out of Bigottini (first named Beggar Girl, and bred by Richard Watt, Esq., in 1815), by Thunderbolt (son of Sorcerer), out of Tramp's Dam, by Gohanna, out of Fraxinella, by Trentham, out of a mare by Woodpecker, out of Everlasting, by Eclipse, out of Hyæna, by Old Snap, out of Miss Belsea, by Regulus, &c. Russborough stood 15 hands and 3 inches high. He had a good blood-like, lean head, closely set into the jowl, with a tapering nose and nicely pointed ears; he had a well-defined neck, fine oblique shoulders, with great depth of girth, splendid quarters, and excellent hocks and knees. He was altogether a very handsome horse, and blessed with a very sweet temper.

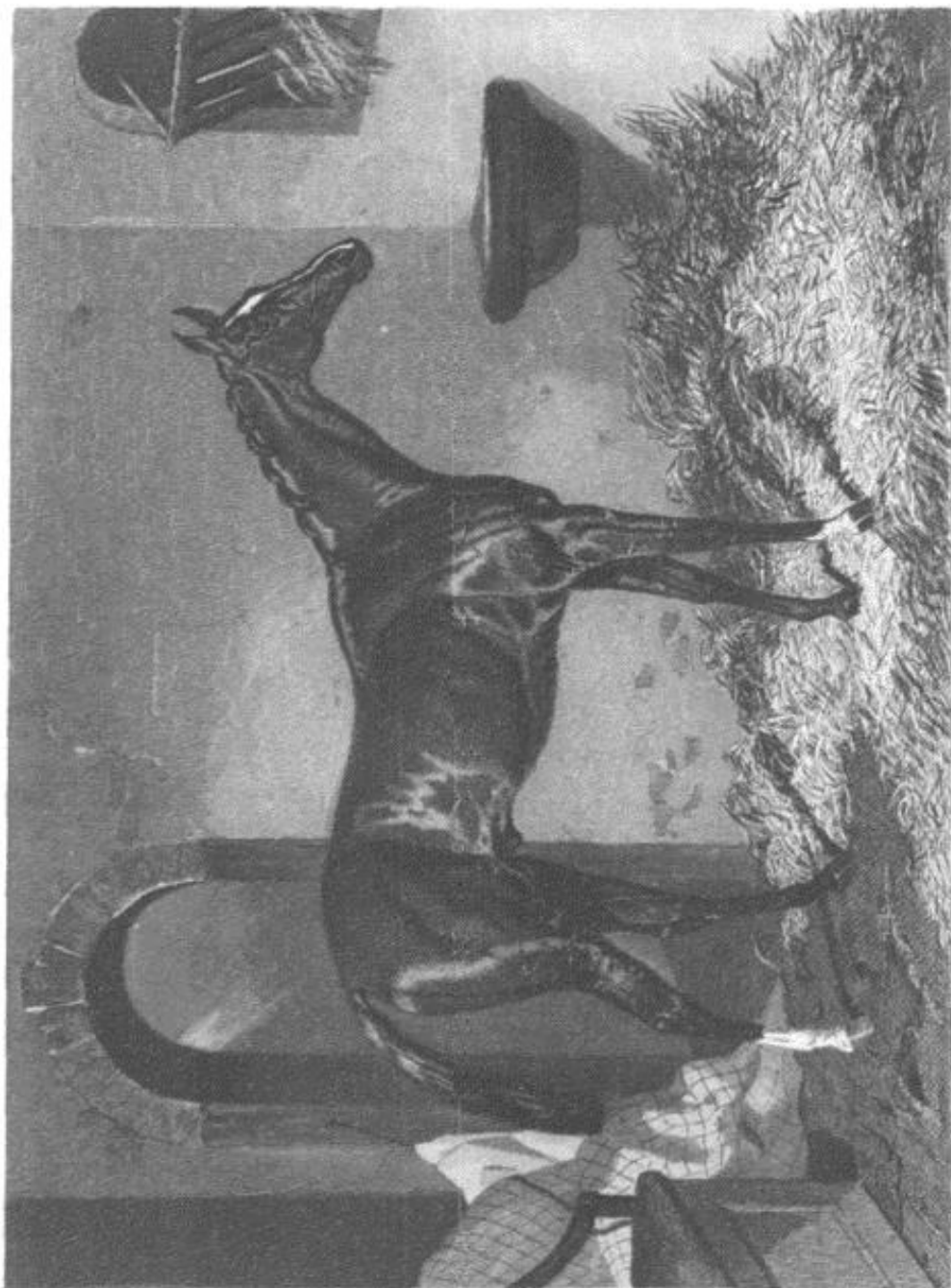

At Ascot, 8st 1lb, not placed in the Ascot Stakes (£755), won by Lord Palmerston's b. c. Buckthorn, by Venison, four years, 8st 5lbs (A. Day), beating Colonel Anson's b. c. King Pepin, by Orlando, four years, 6st 8lbs (Aldcroft), Lord Wilton's br. m. Lady Evelyn, and eight others, not placed. TEDDINGTON.

TEDDINGTON was a ch. c. foaled in 1848, the property of Sir Joseph Hawley, Bart. He was got by Orlando, out of Miss Twickenham, by Rockingham, out of Electress, by Election, out of a mare by Stamford, out of Miss Judy, by Alfred (son of Match'em), out of Manilla, by Goldfinder, her dam, by Old England, out of a mare by Lord Cullen's Arabian, out of Miss Cade, by Old Cade, out of Miss Makeless, by Young Greyhound, &c., &c. "The Druid" observes that, "Sir J. Hawley purchased Teddington, together with his dam, from a blacksmith at Stamford, for £250. with a contingency of £1000, if he won the Derby. He was a little clubby with one foot; and though, by constant paring and attention, it was got nearly right, there was always a marked difference in the size of his plates. Teddington's two-year old season was not a promising one; and, unlike most short horses, he never began well. He was a short horse, but very high on the legs, the only form in which a short horse proves a clipper." Crutch was another of this sort. In the great Derby trial, on Middle-down, Teddington gave 6lbs to Vatican, 21lbs to The Ban (winner, in 1851, of the Great Metropolitan and the Doncaster Cup), and 2st to Gladiole, by Gladiator, who forced the running at her best pace, but was caught, half a mile from home, by Vatican and Teddington, the latter winning so easily that Alec Taylor knew, through Vatican, that he had a second Dutchman. Uphill Teddington was very great, having such superb hind action. His giving Little Harry 2st 5lbs, and beating him for the Warwick Cup, was a very great feat. After his last Ascot Cup race, when he gave 9lbs to such a horse as Stockwell, one of his back sinews gave way; but still he lived, under the crushing weight of 9st 7lbs, almost into the bottom in the Cesarewitch of that year.

At Goodwood, 8st 10lbs (Templeman), ran third and last in the Eglinton Stakes, won by Lord Exeter's b. f. Phlegra, by Phlegon, 8st 9lbs (Norman), beating Buckhound, 8st 7lbs (Nat), second. S. mg., 8st 12lbs (Templeman), won the Molecomb Stakes, of £350, beating Lord Eglinton's b. c. Hippolytus, by Emilius, 8st 7lbs (Marlow), by a head. Only these two ran; 3 to 1 on Hippolytus.

1851.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 12lbs (J. Marson), won a sweep of £700, beating Lord Exeter's ch. c. Midas, by Beiram, 9st 2lbs (Norman); 8 to 1 on Teddington. At Epsom (J. Marson), won the Derby, of £5300, beating Marlborough Buck (Geo. Whitehouse), by two lengths, Mr. Wilkinson's br. c. Neasham (winner, this year, of the Northumberland Plate), by Hetman Platoff (J. Holmes), third, Lord Enfield's br. c. Hernandez (winner of the 2000 Guineas), by Pantaloon (S. Mann), fourth; also, Sir J. Hawley's ch. c. The Ban, by Don John, Mr. Nicoll's b. c. Newminster, Mr. Osbaldeston's b. c. Mountain Deer, both by Touchstone, Mr. Morris' ch. c. Hungerford (winner of the Great Yorkshire

Handicaps in 1852 and 1853, and Doncaster Cup in 1853), by John o' Gaunt, Mr. Sexton's bl. c. The Black Doctor (winner, in 1852, of the Manchester Cup), by The Doctor (son of Dr. Syntax), Mr. Halford's b. c. The Prime Minister, by Melbourne, Ariosto, Hippolytus, Midas, Buckhound, and nineteen others; 3 to 1 against Teddington, 7 to 2 against Marlborough Buck, 7 to 1 each against Hernandez and Prime Minister, and 15 to 1 against Neasham. About a week before the Derby the skin of Teddington's off foreleg festered, and the leg itself filled all round. On the morning of the Derby he would only pick the split peas out of the corn; but still his heart was all right. In reference to the race, Job Marson said, "I had only to spur him once to get him out, near the turn; and he then came with such a vengeance as almost to run over Ariosto." At Doncaster, w. o. for the Don Stakes, Prime Minister withdrawing his stake by consent. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 7lbs each, A. F., 8st 7lbs each (J. Marson), match for 1000 sovs., beat Mountain Deer (J. Robinson), by half a length; 5 to 2 on Teddington.

At Goodwood, 9st 3lbs (Butler), ran third for the Cup, won by Mr. Morris' b. c. Kingston, three years, 7st 6lbs (Nat), beating Mr. H. Padwick's b. c. Little Harry, by Epirus, three years, 6st 13lbs (Cowley), by a length, Newminster, Hobbie Noble, and six others. S. mg., w. o. for 200 sovs. At Warwick, 9st (Nat), won the Cup (val. £280), beating Little Harry, 6st 10lbs (Cowley), by a head, and two others. At Doncaster, 8st 12lbs (Marson), won the Cup, beating Kingston, 7st 7lbs (Nat), by a neck, ch. c. Hungerford, four years, 8st 5lbs (Basham), third; also (not placed) Mr. Martinson's br. f. The Nabob, by The Nob, four years, 8st, by a head, and thirty others. S. mg., 10st each, B. C., for The Whip and 200 sovs. each, was beaten, six lengths, by Kingston (Basham), Weather-gage also ran. This was Teddington's last race.

IRIS.

IRIS was a chestnut filly, bred by the Earl of Derby in 1848, and was got by Ithuriel (son of Touchstone), out of Miss Bowe, by Catton, out of a mare by Orville, out of Miss Grimstone, by Weasel (son of Herod), out of a mare by Ancaster (son of Blank), her dam, by the Damascus Arabian, out of a mare by Sampson, out of a daughter of Oroonoko, out of Sophia (sister to Mirza), by the Godolphin Arabian, &c., &c.

When Iris won the Oaks, Lord Derby observed that it was "the happiest day of his life." Probably, when his grand horse, Toxophilite (for grand he unquestionably was, despite his would-be detractors), was beaten by Beadsman in the Derby, it was just the reverse. In the first case, the victory was rather a surprise—in the second, the defeat was not only a very great surprise, but a grievous disappointment as well, inasmuch as Toxophilite's pretensions were greater than those of any other horse in the race.

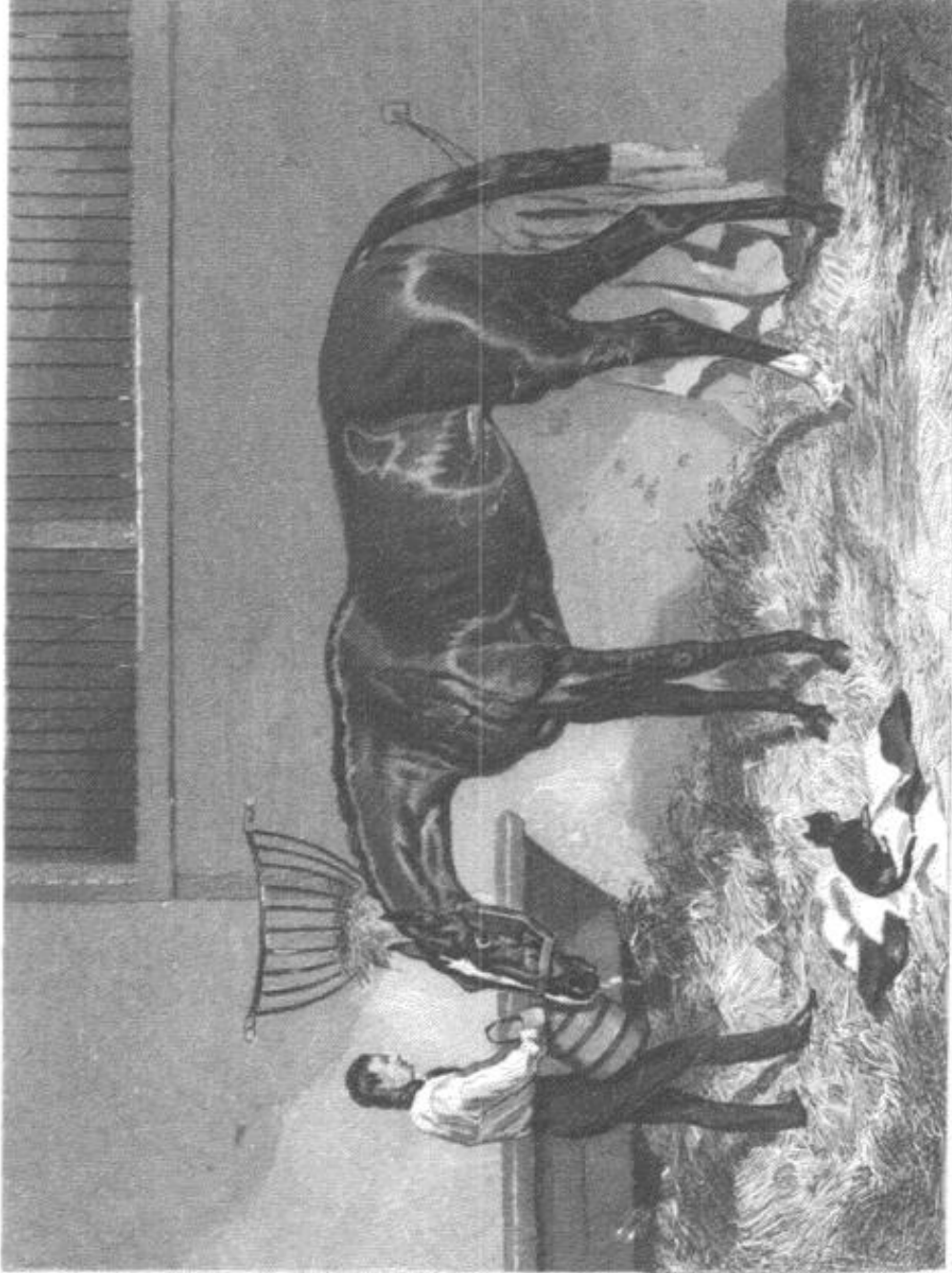

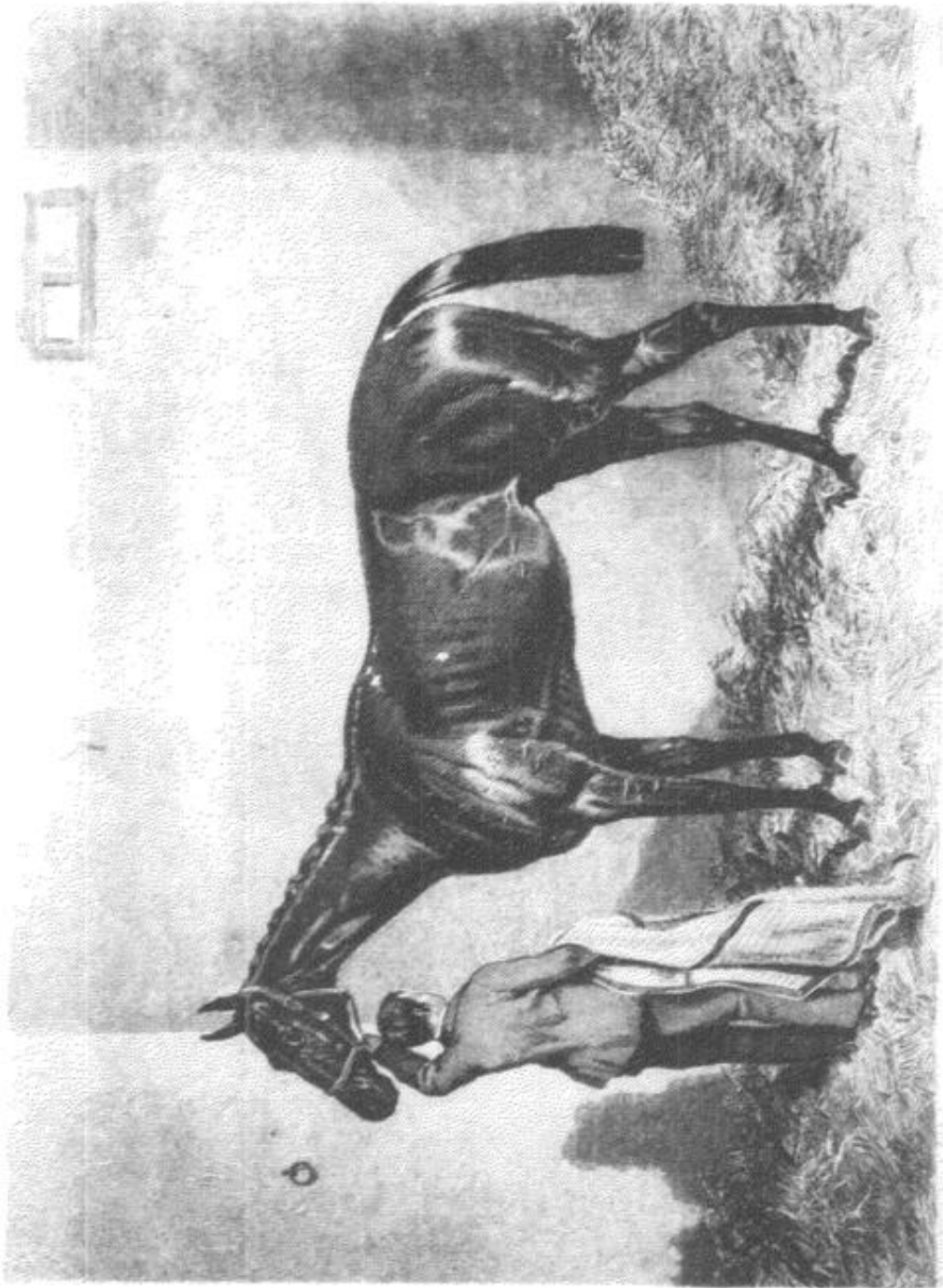

Bee's-wing, by Dr. Syntax, out of Tomboy's Dam (a lame mare by Ardrossan), out of Lady Eliza, by Whitworth (son of Agonistes, by Sir Peter), out of a mare by Spadille, out of Silvia, by Young Marske, out of Ferret, by Brother to Silvio (son of Old Cade), her dam, by Regulus, out of a mare by Lord Morton's Arabian, her dam, by the Mixbury Galloway (son of the Curwen Bay Barb), &c., &c.

"Newminster," says "The Druid," "was not so pretty to the eye as his brother Nunny-Kirk (also bred by Mr. Orde, and sold to Mr. A. Nichol), who had rather slack loins, but a sweet head, and sweeter action." John Scott always thought Newminster a very great horse; but he went dead amiss before the Derby, was equally so at York, and not really himself on the St. Leger Day. In fact, he never was able to show what he *could* do. In his gallop he went very near the ground, and his style of going was beautiful to look at. He was a very bad walker; and, on this account only, Sir Tatton Sykes declined the offer of him for £1200.

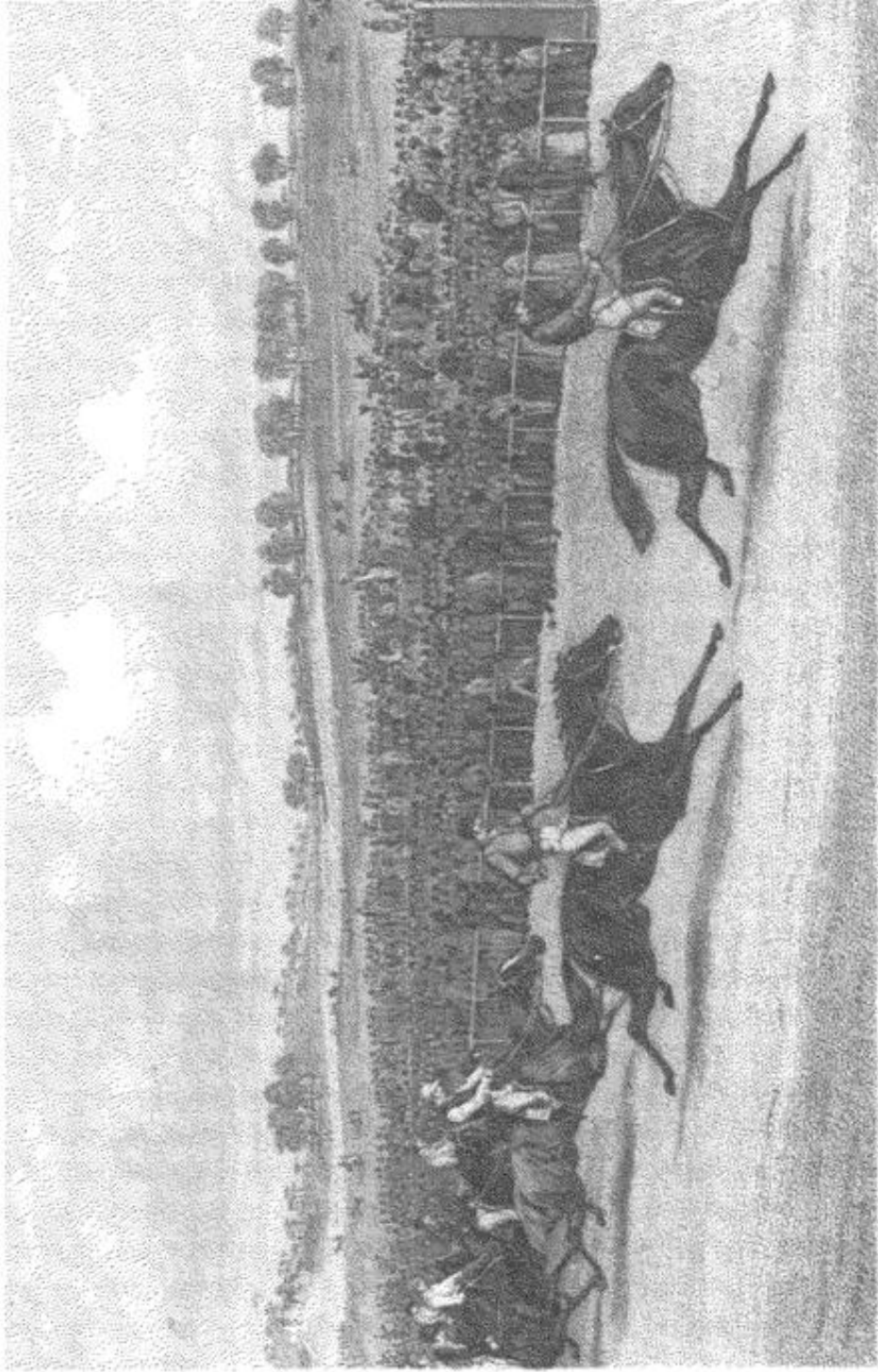

NANCY was a bay filly, bred by Mr. Baxter, in 1848, and sold to Mr. T. Lister, who disposed of her to Mr. Martinson, in June, 1851. She was got by Pompey (son of Emilius), out of Hawise (bred by Mr. John Scott in 1841), by Jereed, out of Sister to Hornsea, by Velocipede, out of a mare by Cerberus (son of Gohanna), out of Miss Cranfield, by Sir Peter, out of Sister to Sir Sydney, by Pegasus (son of Eclipse), her dam, by Paymaster (son of Blank), out of Pomona, by Herod, out of Caroline, by Old Snap, out of a mare by Regulus, her dam, by Hip (son of Flying Childers), &c.

"The Pompey line of Emilius," says "The Druid," "has so far stopped short with Nancy, as, latterly, he had scarcely any blood mares. Nancy fed well and did well all through 1851, but she received what was virtually her finishing-stroke in the Autumn of that year, as she took a gallop on Knavesmire. Going round the Middlethorpe turn, she slipped on a spot where the cattle had trodden down the grass, and sprained her off-hind leg so seriously that she never stood a good preparation again. Her great power was from her thighs to her hocks; but, on her visit to Eglinton Park, to run for Lord Glasgow's Plate, of 300 sovs., she nearly lost the use of her limbs by being thirteen hours in her railway box. Her great peculiarity was the remarkably graceful droop of her quarters, in which Saunterer a good deal resembled her. Nancy was very difficult to train, and furnished another proof that, when mares can *once* be got into form, they are more effective than horses; but that, while the latter often get back their form, mares, when they have once lost it, rarely ever do."

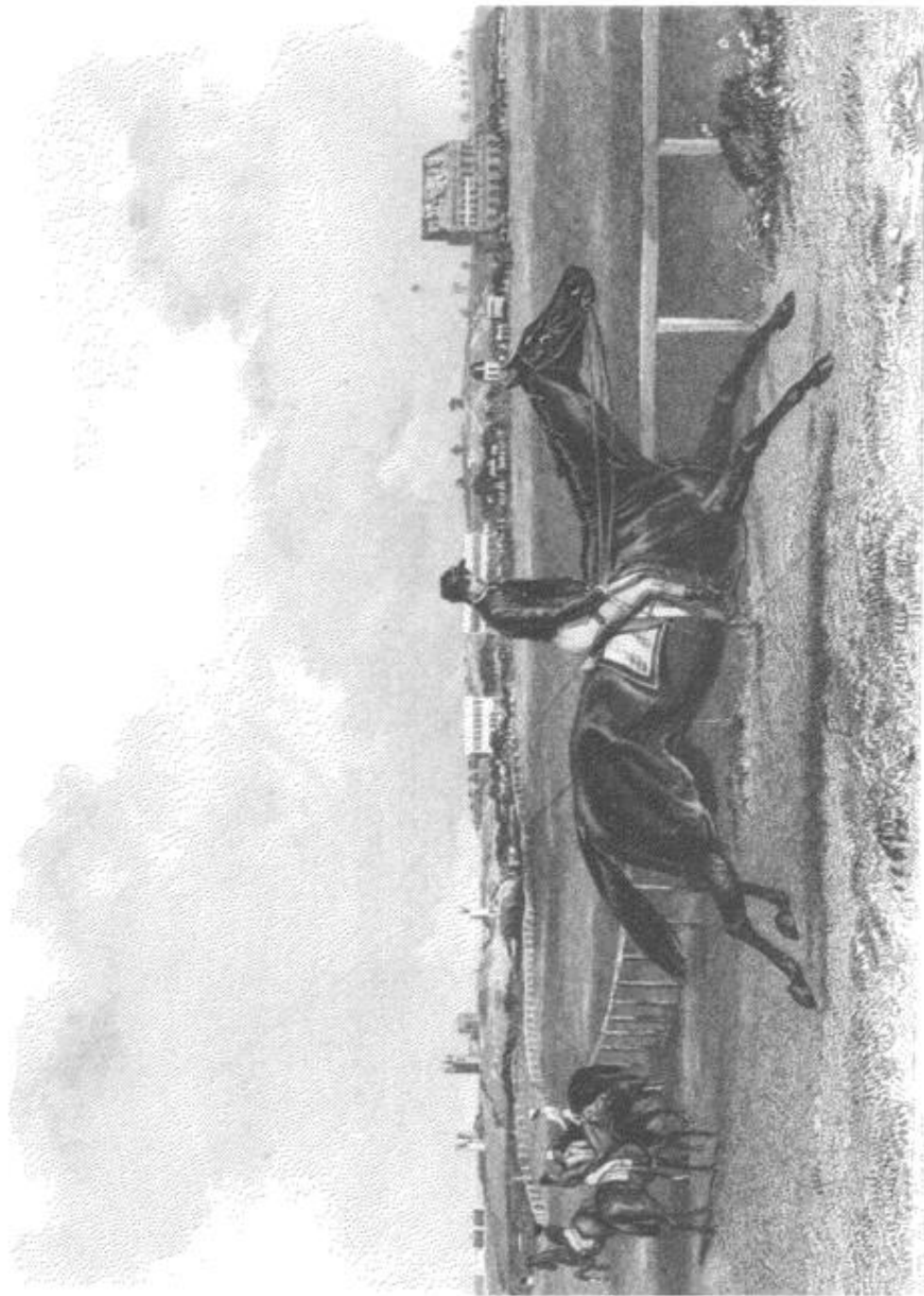

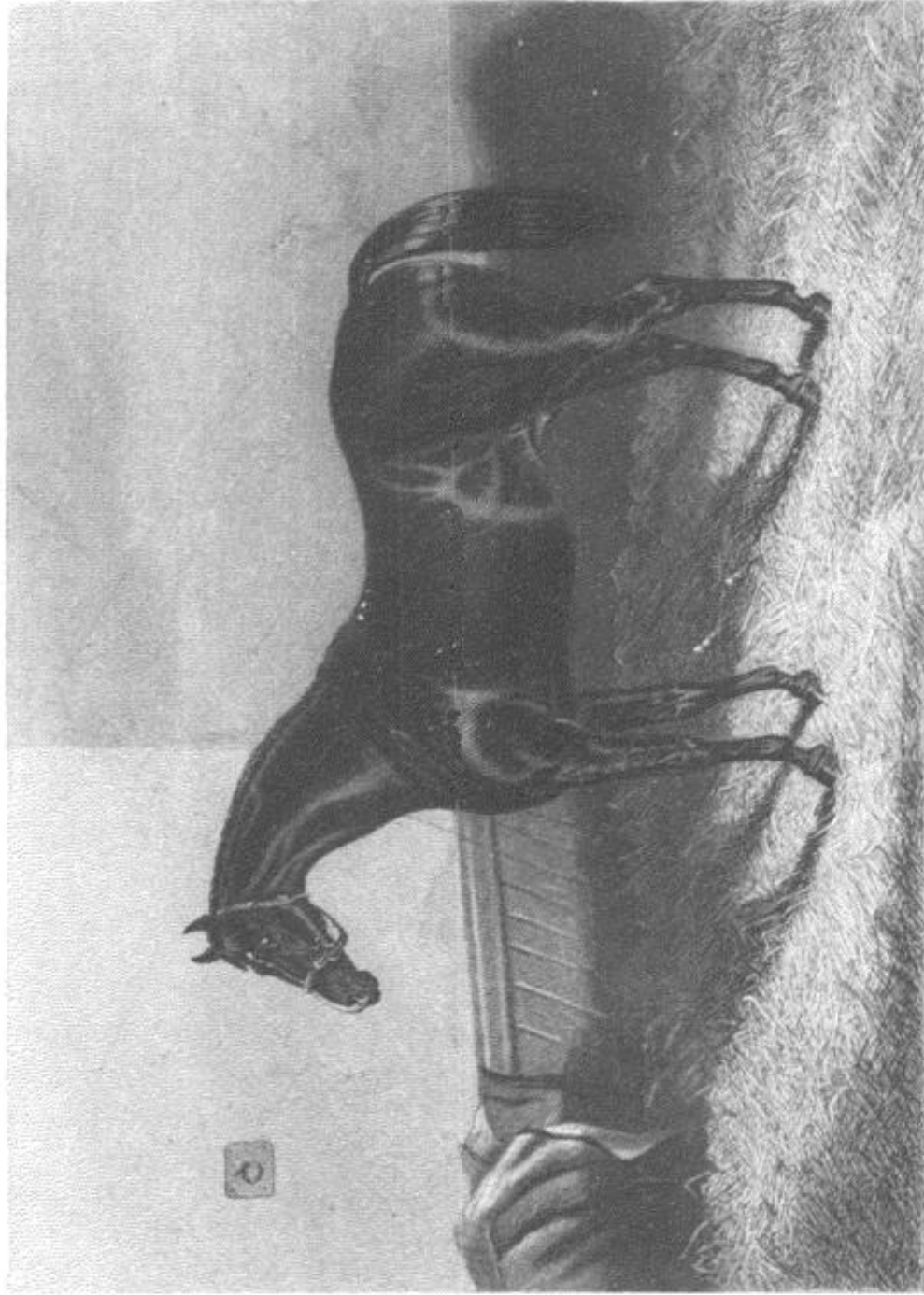

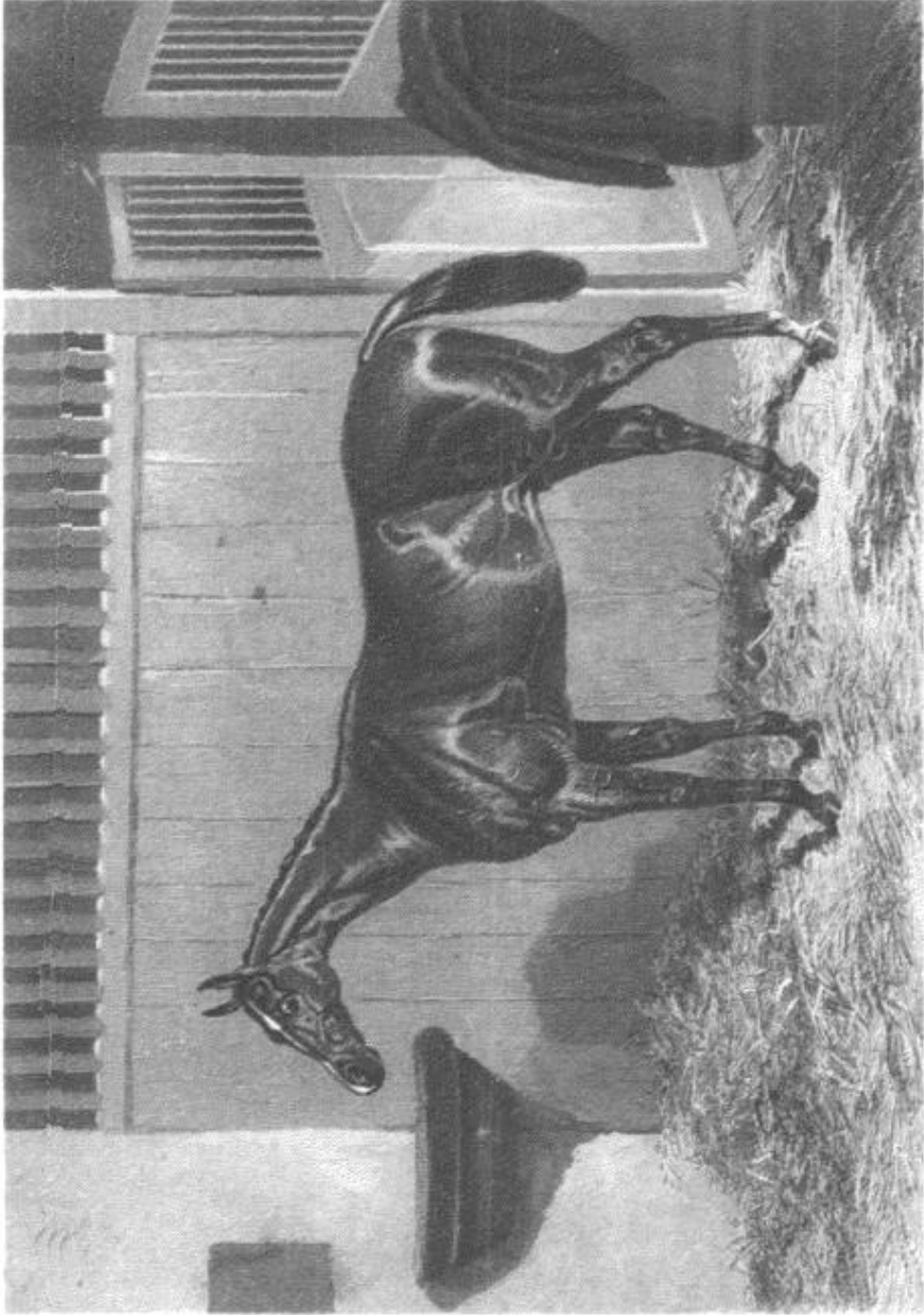

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DANIEL O'ROURKE.

DANIEL O'ROURKE was a chestnut colt, bred by John Bowes, Esq., of Streatlam Castle, in 1849, and was got by Irish Birdcatcher, out of Forget-me-not, by Hetman Platoff, out of Oblivion, by Jerry, out of Remembrance (bred by the Earl of Strathmore in 1805), by Sir Solomon, out of Queen Mab, by Eclipse, out of a mare by Tartar (son of Old Partner), her dam, by Mogul (son of the Godolphin Arabian), out of a mare by Sweepstakes (son of Lord Oxford's Arabian), out of Sister to Sloven, by Bay Bolton, out of a mare by Mr. Curwen's Bay Barb, &c.

"The Druid," in writing of Daniel O'Rourke, says that "he was the lengthiest and most compact of the Birdcatcher family, and was only fourteen hands and three inches when he won the Derby; but that, at four years old, he had nearly reached fifteen hands and two inches. He was purchased from Mr. Bowes by Sir Tatton Sykes, for breeding purposes, and was a great favourite at Sledmere. He got his foals of a darker chestnut than the Birdcatchers usually were, and all of them with backs and legs of iron. Daniel's own legs were perfection in this respect."

This was Daniel's last race.

"Queen Mab (Daniel's great-great-granddam) was," says "The Druid," "the youngest of the ten chestnuts which the 'Tartar Mare' threw to Eclipse, five colts and five fillies, all chestnuts, and all bred by Mr. O'Kelly."

Queen Mab was trained both at Epsom and Newmarket, but she never started. She stood about fourteen hands and three inches high, and was both thick and lengthy, with a white mane and tail, and wide drooping ears.

The Tartar Mare was bred by the Duke of Bolton, about the year 1751; after whose death she became the property successively of Mr. Peter Hammond, the Rev. Mr. Lascelles, and his friend, who bred several foals from her by very common stallions. When turned twenty years of age, she was sold for 5 gs., and was subsequently purchased by Mr. O'Kelly for 100 gs., who, it is asserted, cleared more than £30,000 by the sale of her produce; Queen Mab being the last, foaled when her dam was thirty-four years old. Daniel O'Rourke, after a long sojourn in the green pastures, at Sledmere, was sold to the Austrian Government for 800 gs., and shipped to Vienna.

 SONGSTRESS.

SONGSTRESS was a bay filly, bred by Mr. John Scott (the famous Malton Trainer), in 1849. She was got by Irish Birdcatcher, out of Cyprian (bred by Mr. Scott in 1833), by Partisan, out of Frailty, by Filho-da-Putá, out of Agatha, by Orville, out of a daughter of Star (son of Highflyer), out of a mare by Young Marske, out of Emma, by Telemachus (son of Herod), out of A-la-Greque, by Regulus, her dam, by Allworthy (son of Old Crab), out of Dairy Maid, by Bloody Buttocks, out of Bay Brocklesby, by Old Partner, out of Brocklesby Betty, by the Curwen Bay Barb.

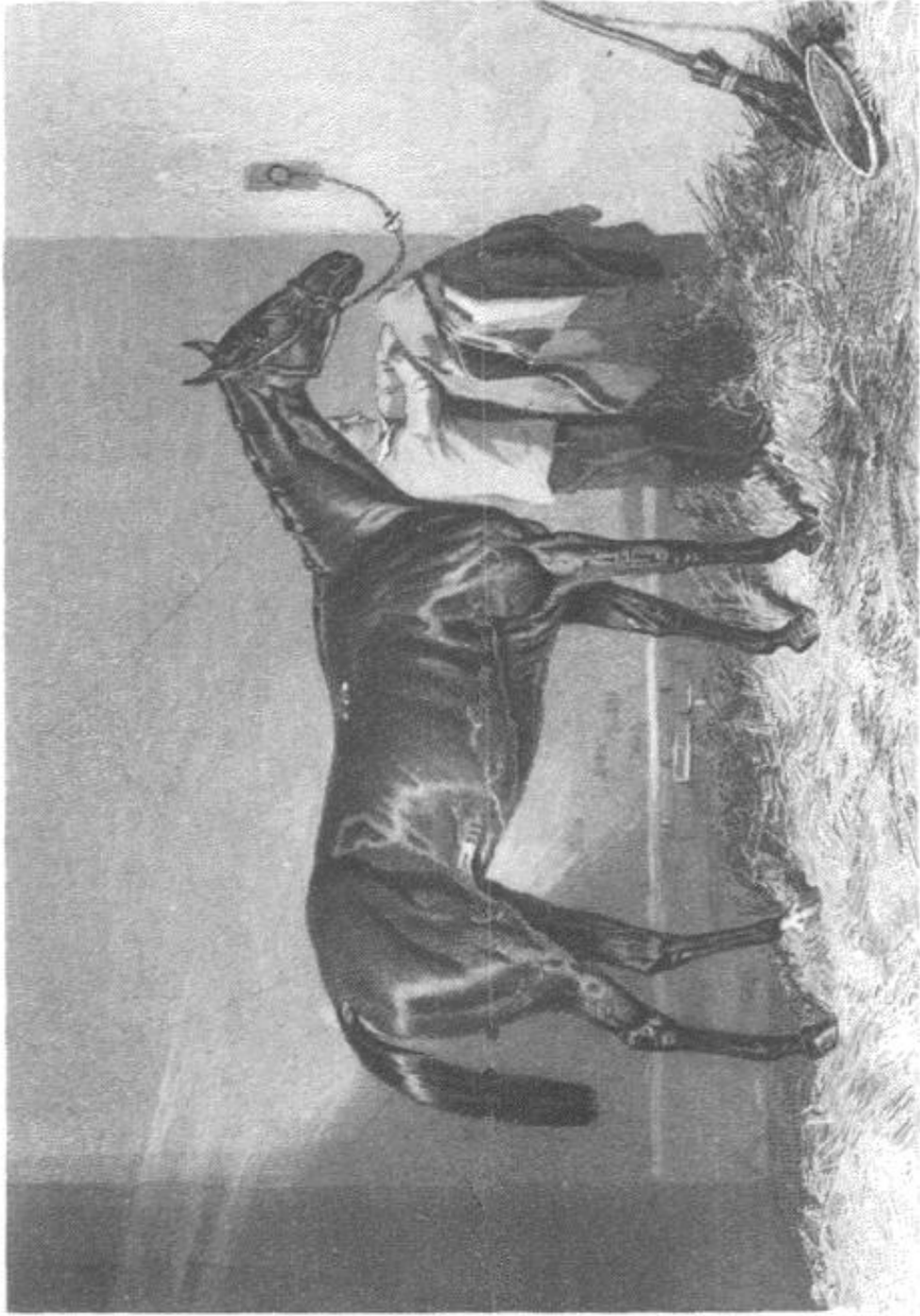

STOCKWELL.


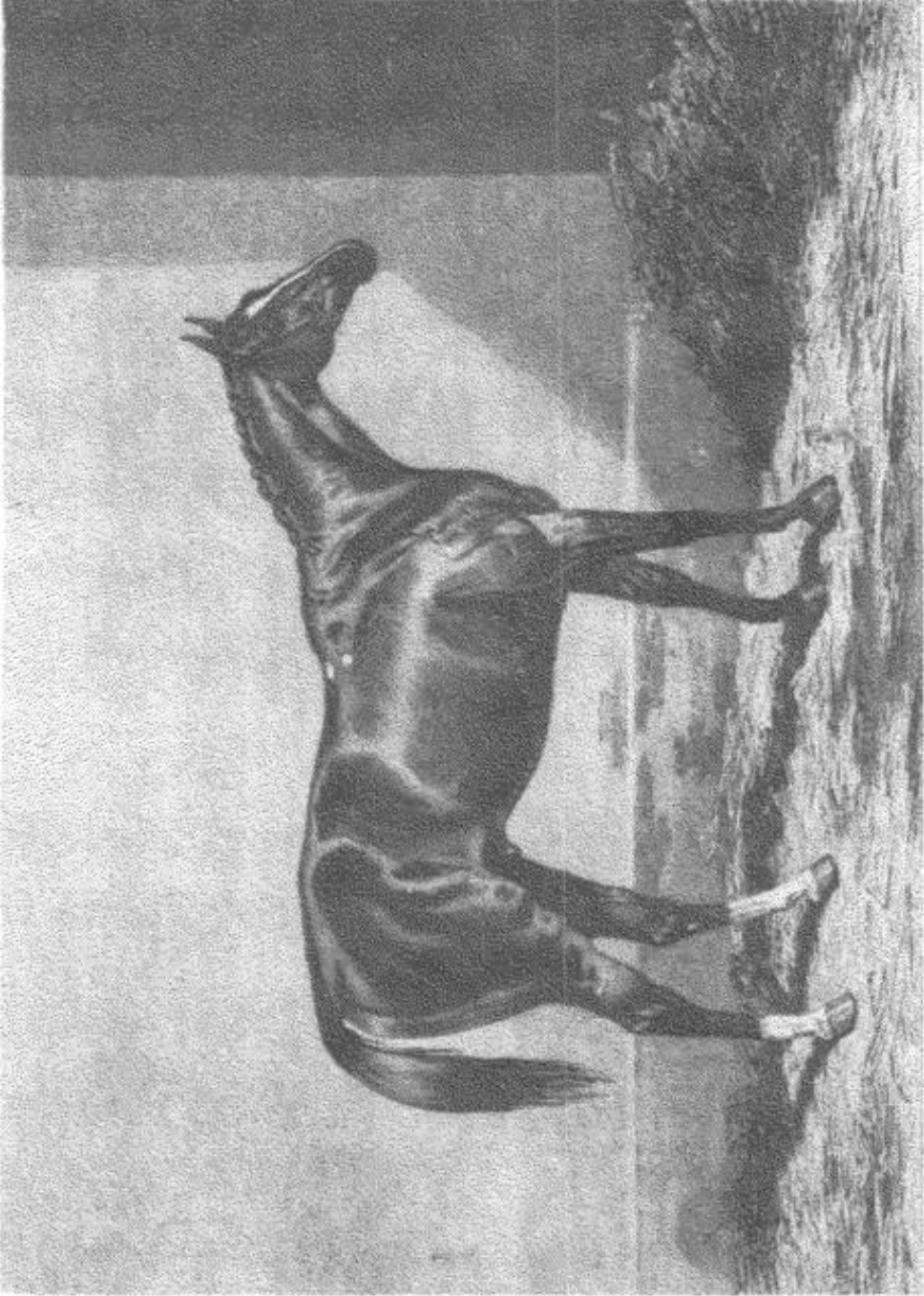
STOCKWELL was a chestnut colt, bred by Mr. Theobald, in 1849; and sold by him to the Marquis of Exeter. He was got by The Baron, out of Pocahontas by Glencoe, out of Marpessa by Muley, out of Clare by Marmion (son of Whiskey), out of Harpalice by Gohanna, out of Amazon by Driver (a son of Trentham), out of Fractious by Mercury, out of a mare by Woodpecker, out of Everlasting by Eclipse, out of Hyæna by Old Snap, out of Miss Belsea by Regulus, her dam, by Bartlett's Childers, out of a mare by Honywood's White Arabian, out of the dam of the two True Blues.

"Stockwell," says "The Druid," "was the fifth foal of his dam, Pocahontas, and a very fine colt he was; but he was considered by his breeder, and many other good judges, to be on too large a scale. John Lowry, however (Mr. Theobald's Stud groom), admired him greatly, and induced Lord Exeter to look at him, who, though of opinion that he was too big, eventually bought him for 180 sovs., with a contingency of £500 more if he won the Derby." Lord Exeter secured the colt just in time, as Mr. Theobald died (aged 85), within a month after it reached Burleigh.

Stockwell was rather a plain-looking horse, very much shoulder-tied, and by no means a good goer. After having thrown Stockwell, in 1849, his dam, Pocahontas, passed into the possession of Captain Thelluson, for whom she produced Rataplan, in 1850, and King Tom, in 1851. The Stud Book may be searched in vain for any other brood mare which, in three successive years, produced such a trio of colts as Stockwell, Rataplan, and King Tom. As regards Stockwell's sons and daughters, Blair Athol of the former, and Achievement of the latter, were unquestionably the best; but neither ever had their staying powers fairly tested. There was, however, more quality about The Marquis and St. Albans, than in any

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others of Stockwell's get, and the latter had a deal of dash and go in his action.

Belladrum was, perhaps, the best-looking of them all, and he too, had fine sweeping action. Stockwell's foals showed great quality and finish; but neither his nor Rataplan's had quite the bone or size that would be looked for from two such massive sires, while many of Rataplan's stock had his peculiar short drop on the quarter. Of the two brothers, Stockwell was always the more resolute.

This was Stockwell's last race.

The best racehorse the world ever saw, and the most successful sire of modern days, died within the same week—West Australian on Monday, the 2nd, and Stockwell on Thursday, the 5th of May, 1870—the former in France, and the latter at Hooton Hall, Cheshire, in the possession of Richard Christopher Naylor, Esq. Stockwell's covering fee, at one time, was 200 gs. Both The West and Stockwell were sold at Doncaster, by Mr. Tattersall, the former being purchased for the French Government, for £4000, and the latter by Mr. R. C. Naylor for £4500.

 HOBBIE-NOBLE.

HOBBIÉ-NOBLE was a bay colt, foaled in 1849, bred by and the property of Lord John Scott. He was got by Pantaloon, out of Phryne, by Touchstone, out of Decoy, by Filho-da-Putá, out of Finesse, by Peruvian (son of Sir Peter), out of Violanté, by John Bull, out of Sister to Skyscraper, by Highflyer, out of Everlasting, by Eclipse, out of Hyæna, by Old Snap, out of Miss Belsea, by Regulus, out of a mare by Bartlett's Childers, her dam, by Honeywood's White Arabian, out of the dam of the two True Blues.

"Independently of his blood and high descent," writes "The Druid," "Lord John had always a special regard for Hobbie-Noble, by reason of his hermit-like habits. No one ever saw him in the company of other horses; but he would come readily to a whistle, after the manner of a dog. His Lordship would often take his friends out after dinner, and whistle for him to come to the garden gate to be inspected. The habit seemed to foreshadow, for 'the proud young Porter,' that a £6500 cheque (the amount paid for him by Mr. James Merry), was in store for him."

Hobbie-Noble was, in all his points, so extremely handsome, and to the eye so very beautiful, that Her Majesty sent for him a *second* time to the front of the Royal Stand, at Ascot. It is beyond all doubt that Hobbie-Noble was drugged on the eve of the Derby, and that was "*how they squarcd him.*" He was admittedly the best three year old of his year.

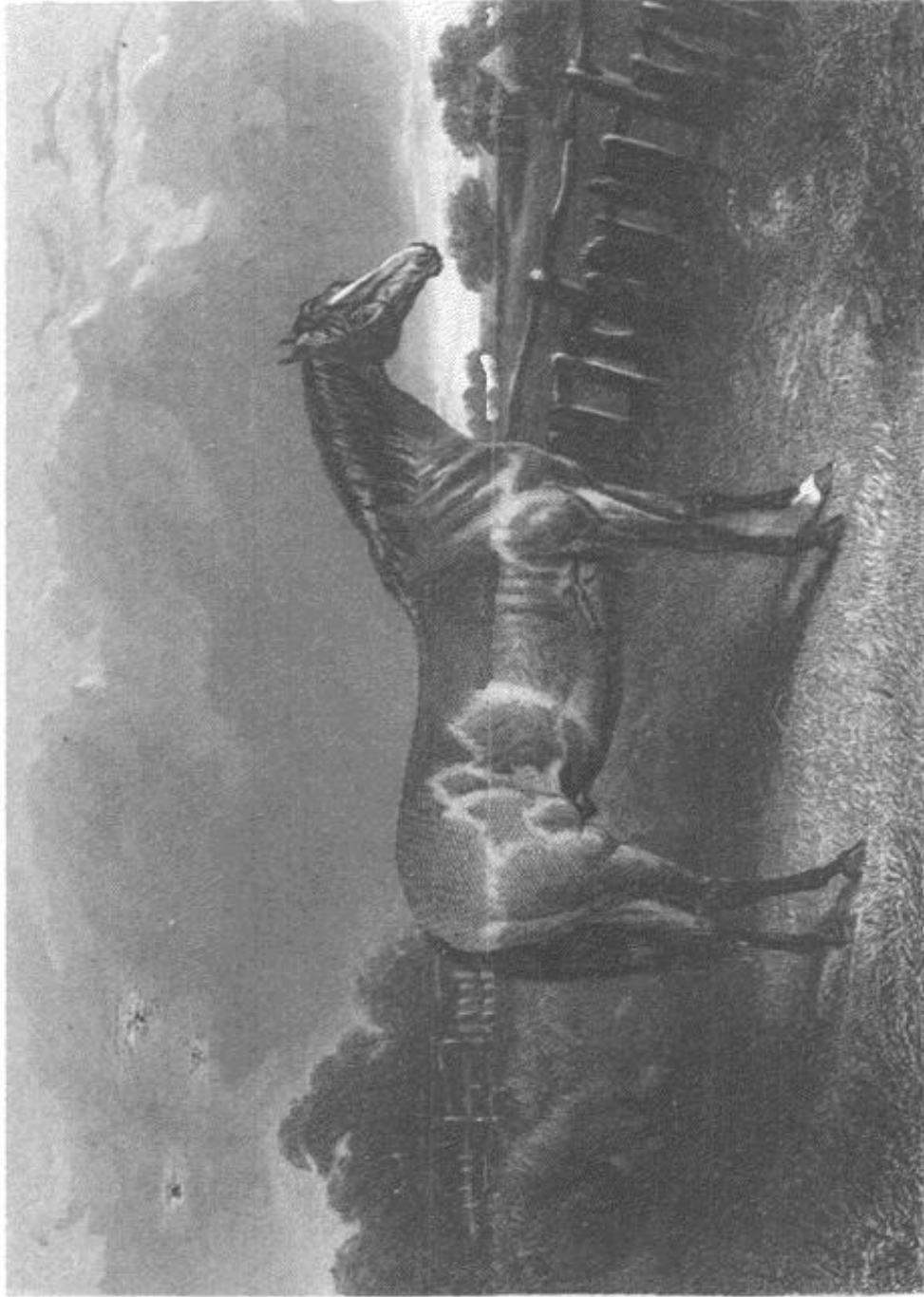

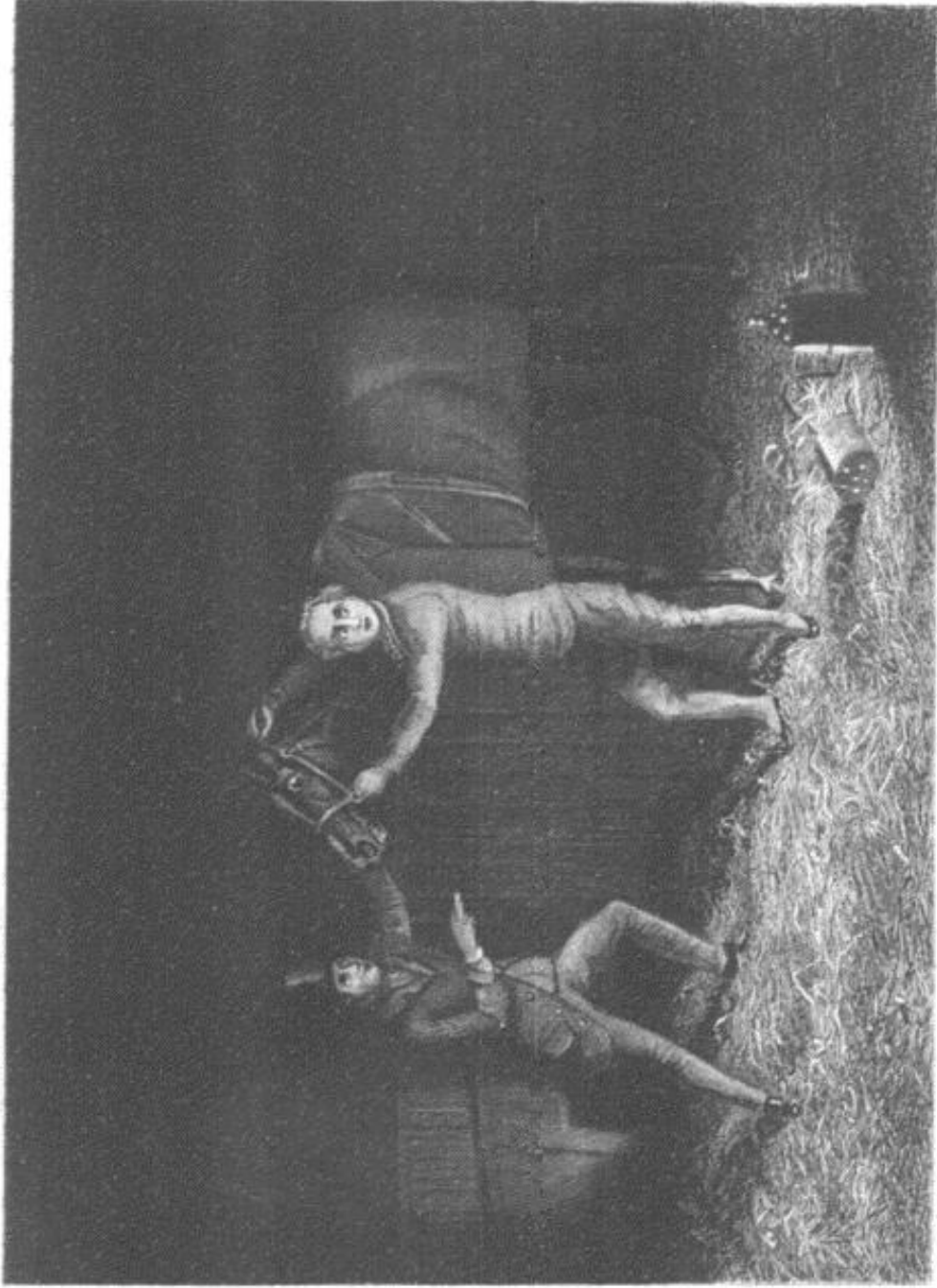

Hobbie-Noble was trained by Saunders, at Hednesford, and was, for a long time, first favourite for the Derby; but, within a few days of the race, had to give place to Little Harry, who had been very highly tried by the Days. The Derby of 1852 was, perhaps, the wettest and most sensational on record. The course was fetlock deep, and the issue left in the greatest uncertainty up to the very finish. Daniel O'Rourke, who perfectly revelled in the mud, under the masterly pilotage of Frank Butler, snatched the race from Hobbie-Noble, when it seemed to be quite at his mercy, and in the final, helter skelter, rush for places, Barbarian (who started at 100 to 1), and Chief Baron Nicholson got before him. After having been *squared* for the Derby, Hobbie-Noble never regained his early form.

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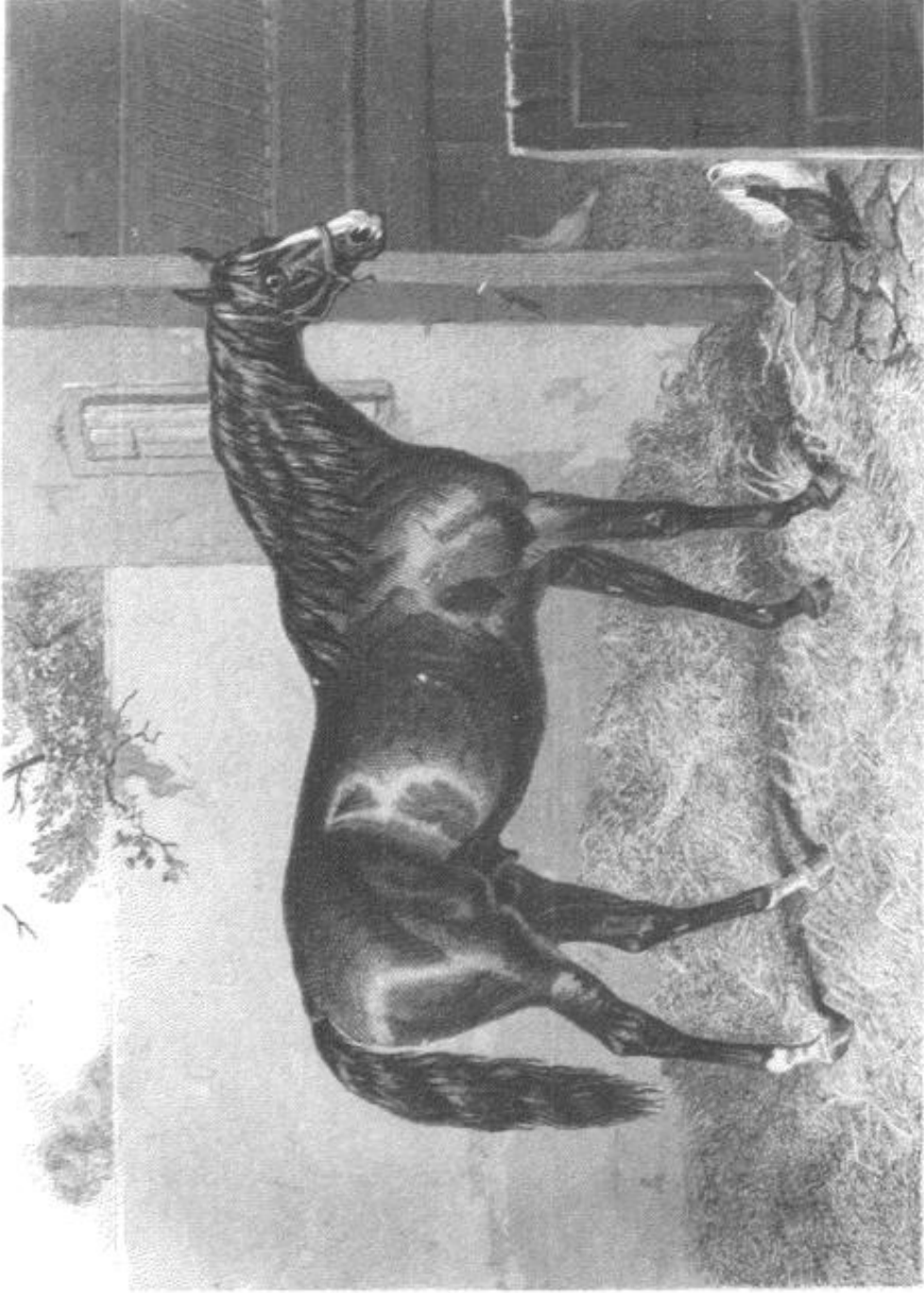

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LONGBOW.

LONGBOW was a bay colt, foaled in 1849, bred by, and the property of, the Earl of Derby. He was got by Ithuriel (son of Touchstone), out of the "sixteen-hand Catton-headed Miss Bowe," by Catton, out of a mare by Orville, out of Miss Grimstone, by Weasel (son of Herod), her dam, by Ancaster, out of a mare by the Damascus Arabian, her dam, by Sampson, out of a daughter of Oroonoko, out of Sister to Mirza, by the Godolphin Arabian, out of a mare by Leedes (son of Mr. Edward Leedes' Arabian), out of Queen Anne's Monah Bay Barb.

"To carry a high weight for a mile," says "The Druid," "was Longbow's forte, as he showed so plainly in the Stewards' Cup, at Goodwood; and even his long distance running, especially when he met Stockwell, in the most muggy of days, for the Great Yorkshire Stakes, was truly wonderful." Longbow's dam, Miss Bowe, was a brood mare in Lord Derby's Stud, at Knowsley; and, when in her thirtieth year, was as fresh and shapely as any mare of half her age. Her last foal was Tom Bowline.

The Damascus Arabian was a black-brown horse, foaled in 1754. He was of the purest Arabian breed, without any mixture of Turcoman or Barb. He was a horse of great substance and bone, and stood just fourteen hands and half an inch; and was bred by the Scheick or Chief of Acria, noted for his fine breed of horses, by whom he was presented to the Bashaw of Damascus, who sold him to an English gentleman. He was brought into England in 1760.

King Pepin, by Orlando, Red Hind, and two others; 7 to 4 against Father Thames, and 3 to 1 each against Longbow and King Pepin. S. mg., 8st 7lbs each (F. Butler), in the Bentinck Memorial Stakes, won by Harbinger, Longbow ran on the wrong side of the post, at starting, and was left behind. Nabob was second. At York (August), colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 2lbs (Butler), ran second in the Great Yorkshire Stakes, of £1590, won by Stockwell (Norman), by a short length; thirteen ran. At Doncaster, 8st 12lbs (Butler), ran second in the Eglinton Stakes, of £355, won by Lord Clifden's br. c. Pelion, by Ion, two years, 6st 10lbs (Charlton), beating also Mr. Meiklam's b. c. 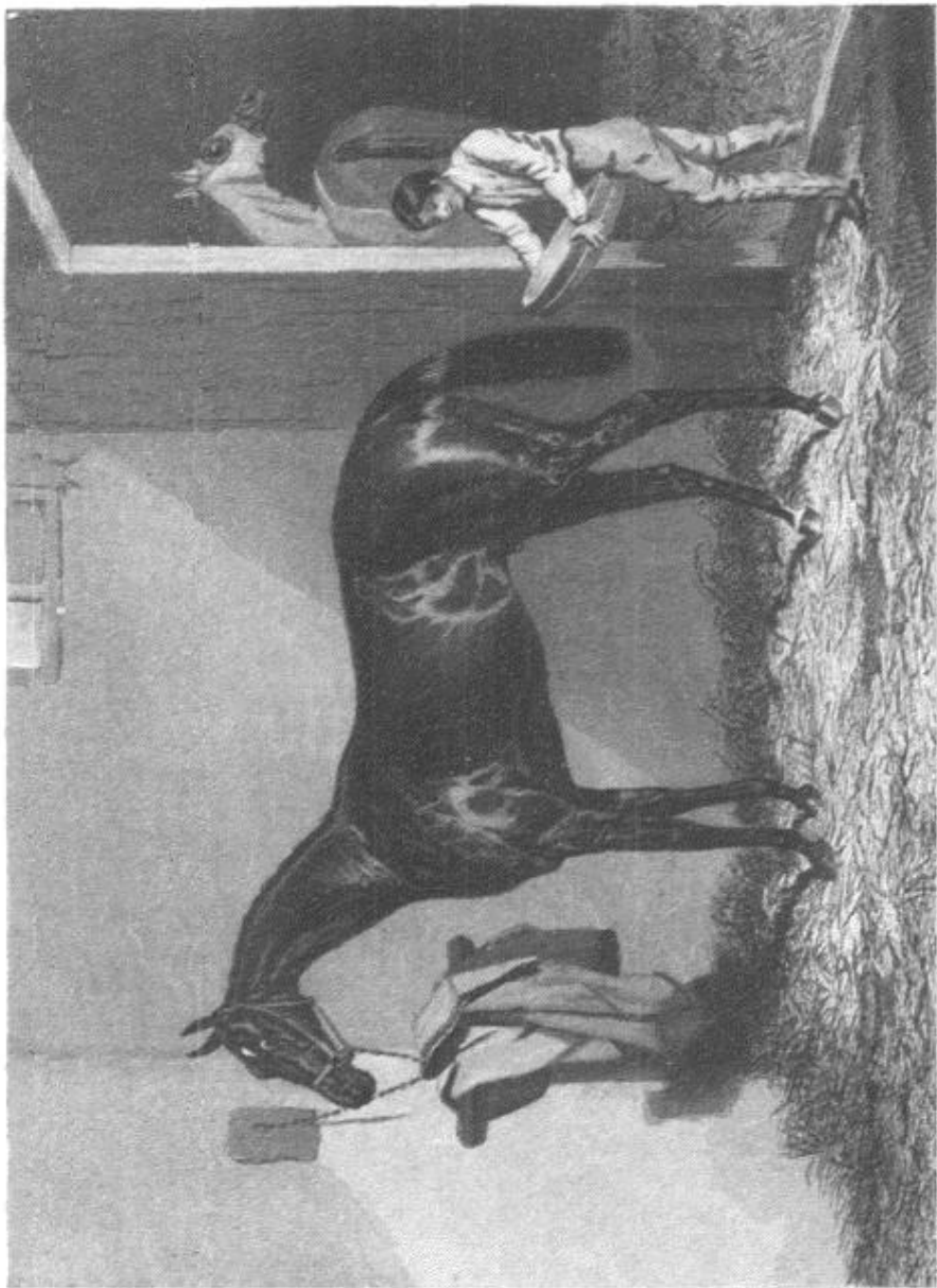

At Northampton, 8st (Nat), won £140, beating Captain Lane's ch. c. Conmore, by Malcolm, four years, 8st (G. Sharpe), second, and three others. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Nat), won a purse of 60 sovs., beating Mr. Morris' b. c. Kingston, four years, 8st 10lbs (Basham), by a length, and one other; 5 to 4 on Longbow. At Epsom, 8st 8lbs (A. Day), ran unplaced in the City and Suburban, of £960, won by Mr. Oliver's ch. c. Ethelbert, by Foig-a-Ballagh, three years, 5st 13lbs (Wells), after a dead-heat with Mr. J. Rogers' b. f. Pancake, by Vol-au-Vent (son of Voltaire), four years, 5st 2lbs (S. Steggles); twenty-four ran; 2 to 1 against Ethelbert, 7 to 2 against Longbow, 5 to 1 against Pancake, and 10 to 1 against Mons. Lupin's br. f. Jouvence (bred in France), by Sting, three years, 4st 12lbs (ridden by T. Sherwood). At Manchester, for all ages, 8st 7lbs (Sim Templeman), won the Meiklam Handicap, beating Mr. Meiklam's bl. c. The Hatchet, by Poynton (son of Touchstone), three years, 6st 4lbs (Waddington), and seven others; 7 to 4 on Longbow. S. mg., 8st 7lbs (Templeman), won the Union Cup (handicap), of £520, beating Mr. Harrison's ch. c. King of Trumps, by Velocipede (Cartwright), four years, 8st, by two lengths, Lord Chesterfield's bay colt, by The Emperor, three years, 6st, third, and nine others; 9 to 4 against King of Trumps, 7 to 2 against Longbow, and 10 to 1 against any other. (across the Flat—one mile, two furlongs and seventy-three yards), was beaten by Lord Glasgow's black colt, Caracara, by Irish Birdcatcher, four years, 7st 3lbs (I. Wells); 7 to 1 on Longbow, this being his last appearance on the Turf.

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JOE-MILLER.

JOE-MILLER was a bay colt, foaled in 1849, bred by Mr. Isaac Sadler, and sold to Mr. Farrance. He was got by Venison, out of Witticism, by Sultan Junior, out of Victoria, by Tramp, out of Bella, by Beningbrough, out of Peterea, by Sir Peter, out of Mary Grey (bred in Ireland, in 1784), by Friar (son of South, by Regulus), out of Timanthe, by Tim (son of Squirt), out of Sister to Noble, by the Irish Gamahoe.

"Joe-Miller, who could get equally well through wet or dry," says "The Druid," "was never quite fifteen hands high, but, like his sire, Venison, he had a very sweet head, but he was shorter, and all his limbs were most beautifully turned, and exquisitely proportioned. Like most light-bodied and light-fleshed horses Joe-Miller stayed well; but he was cut for temper, shot very early, and was honoured with burial in the centre of the Woodyeates Yard. His grandest triumph was winning the Chester Cup. He got away in front from end to end, and Stilton was never able to reach him. In the Metropolitan Stakes he got knocked over by Miss Ann. Joe was never the same horse after his temper rendered it necessary to cut him, at the close of the season of 1852. He was, till then, full of fire and courage, was particularly handsome, and showed a great deal of quality."

ran *two* dead-heats, after which Mr. Dorrien and Colonel Peel divided the stakes. Six ran; 5 to 4 on Kingston. In the second heat Alfred Day rode Chief Baron Nicholson, and Nat rode Kingston as before. Colonel Peel wished to run off the third heat, and offered 6 to 4 on Kingston; but Mr. Dorrien declined the proposal. At Goodwood, 7st 3lbs (H. Goater), ran second in the Nursery Stakes, of £460, won by Mr. Greville's br. c. Frantic, by Alarm, 7st 10lbs (Nat), beating the Duke of Richmond's b. f. Plumstead, by Chatham, 6st 11lbs, third, and nine others, all two years old. At Egham, 8st 4lbs (A. Day), ran third and last in the King John Stakes, won by Mr. Gratwicke's b. f. Flirt, by Hetman Platoff, 8st 6lbs (Kitchener), beating Mr. Greville's b. f. Greengage, by Alarm, 8st 3lbs (Geo. Dockeray), second. He ran once more, at Winchester, without success.

1852.

At Epsom (Spring), 5st 6lbs (H. Goater), ran second in the Great Metropolitan, of £1600, won by Mr. Meiklam's b. c. Stilton, by Cotherstone, three years, 4st 11lbs (Carroll), by a length, beating the Duke of Richmond's b. m. Officious, by Pantaloon, five years, 7st 3lbs (J. Charlton), third, and eighteen others, among whom was Mr. Merry's b. f. Miss Ann (dam of Scottish Chief, and the winner, in 1851, of the Chesterfield Cup at Goodwood), by the Little Known. Miss Ann, on this occasion, knocked over Joe-Miller in the race and extinguished his chance. At Chester, 4st 10lbs (Jas. Goater), won the Cup, of £2870, beating Stilton (winner, this year, of the Northumberland Plate), three years, 5st 8lbs (Aldcroft), by a length, Lord Clifden's br. c. Poodle, by Ion, three years, 5st 3lbs, third, Mr. Spencer's black filly Benita, by The Baron, three years, 4st (Geo. Fordham), fourth; also, br. f. Nancy, by Pompey, four years, 9st 1lb, ch. c. Hungerford, four years, 6st 10lbs, and thirty-eight others; 7 to 2 against Stilton, 8 to 1 against Joe-Miller, 14 to 1 against Nancy, and 20 to 1 against Benita. Joe-Miller jumped off with the lead, and headed from start to finish. Stilton, who got off badly, went in pursuit, but could not succeed in overhauling Mr. Farrance's colt. At Epsom, was unplaced in the Derby, won by Daniel O'Rourke. At Ascot, 6st 10lbs (G. Mann), won the Emperor of Russia's Plate and Sweep (val. £960), beating Mr. Saxon's black colt, The Black Doctor (winner, this year of

the Manchester Cup), four years, 8st 5lbs (Abrahams), by two lengths. Hobbie-Noble, three years, 6st 10lbs (Charlton), third, Little Harry, three years, 6st 10lbs, fourth, Voltigeur, five years, 9st, fifth, and four others; 7 to 4 against Voltigeur, and 6 to 1 against Joe-Miller. At Stockbridge, 8st 7lbs each (H. Goater), in the Triennial, was beaten, three lengths, by Kingston (Nat): four ran; 6 to 4 on Joe. At Weymouth, 8st 2lbs (H. Goater), won the Queen's Plate, beating three others. At Newmarket (Second October), 7st 10lbs, was unplaced in the Cesarewitch, of £1385, won by Mr. Parr's b. c. Weathergage, by Weatherbit, three years, 6st 11lbs (J. Wells), beating Lord Wilton's b. m. Lady Evelyn, six years, 8st 6lbs (F. Butler), second, Knight of the Shire, three years, 5st 8lbs, third, and twenty others.

1853.

At Salisbury, 9st 2lbs each (H. Goater), for the Queen's Plate, was beaten by Weathergage (C. Marlow); 6 to 4 on Joe. At Weymouth, w. o. for the Queen's Plate. At Newmarket (Second October), not placed for a purse of 100 sovs., won by Rataplan. Joe ran in five other races, this year, without success.

1854.

At Manchester, 7st 7lbs, was unplaced for the Cup, won by Rataplan, four years, 9st 3lbs (his best performance). At Ascot, 9st, not placed in the Trial Stakes; and, at Newmarket (Second October), 7st 7lbs, was unplaced in the Cesarewitch, of £1245, won by Muscovite.

1855.

At Salisbury, 8st 1lb (H. Goater), won the Wiltshire Plate, beating three others. S. mg., ran third for the Queen's Plate, won by Mr. Hill's br. c. Kingstown (bred in Ireland), by Tearaway. At Chester, was not placed for the Cup (val. £2575), won by Mr. Padwick's b. c. Scythian, by Orlando. Joe-Miller ran eight times more, without success, and quitted the Turf, a good game little horse, ruined by his violent temper.

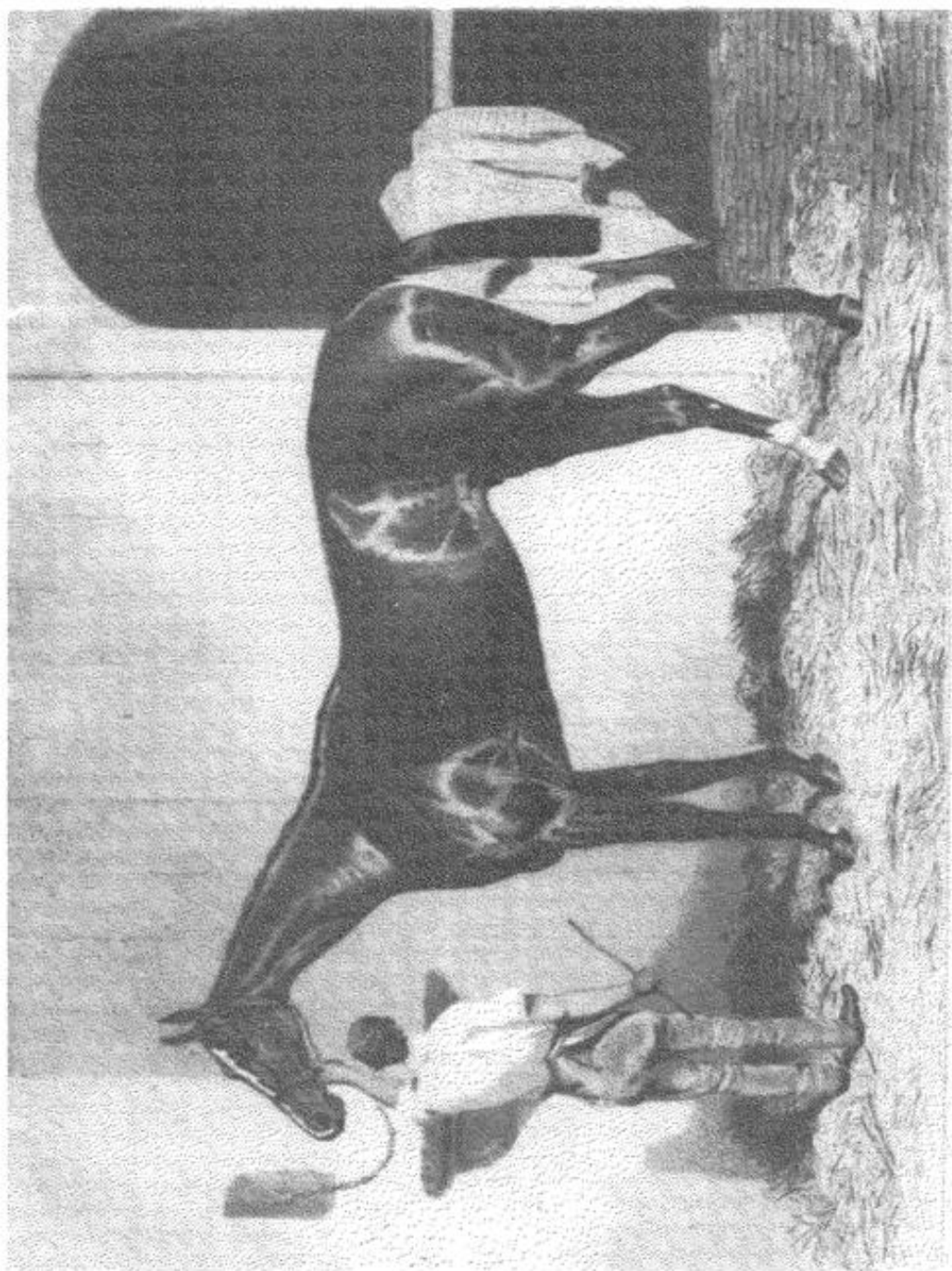
WEST-AUSTRALIAN.

WEST-AUSTRALIAN was a bay colt, bred by John Bowes, Esq., of Streatlam Castle, Durham, in 1850, and was got by Melbourne, out of Mowerina (bred by Mr. Bowes in 1843), by Touchstone, out of Emma (dam of Mundig and Cotherstone), by Whisker, out of Gibside Fairy, by Hermes, out of Vicissitude, by Pipator, out of Beatrice, by Sir Peter, out of Pyrrha, by Match'em, out of Duchess, by Whitenose (son of the Godolphin Arabian, out of Miss Slamerkin, by Young True Blue (son of Honeywood's White Arabian), her dam, by Lord Oxford's dun Arabian, out of Lord D'Arcy's black-legged Royal Mare.

West-Australian was proclaimed by many to have been the best race-horse, *up to his time*, of this century. This, after all, is mere matter of opinion; for nobody can say, with anything approaching a certainty, what would be the result could Bay Middleton, his son, the Flying Dutchman, and West-Australian be brought together, at even weights, to run over the Derby course. It must be borne in mind that Kingston never could have stretched the necks of Bay Middleton or The Dutchman, as he did that of West Australian, for the Ascot Cup, in 1854. The West (as he was fondly termed by Frank Butler), was sold by Mr. Bowes to Lord Londesborough, in 1854, for 5000 gs. He won for his Lordship, in that year, the Ascot Cup; and, in the following season, he was sent to the Stud, his stock first appearing in 1858, when Adelaide, Summerside, Joskin, Ticket of Leave, and three others, were credited to his account. In 1859, his best son, "The Wizard," made his *début* on the Turf. West-Australian covered at Kirkby, at 30 gs., till he was sold, for 4000 gs., and sent to France.

Even on Sittingbourne (who also won the Convivial Stakes, of £1210, at York), and 5 to 2 against The West. Won by half a length, a neck between second and third. S. mg., for two years old, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (F. Butler), won the Glasgow Stakes, of £700, beating Filbert (Norman) by two lengths, Speed-the-Plough (Nat), third, and General Anson's ch. c. by Don John (S. Rogers) last. Even on the West.

1853.

At Newmarket (First Spring), colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 4lbs (Butler), won the 2000 Guineas (net value, £3300), beating Sittingbourne (R. Pettit) by half a length, Lord Glasgow's b. c. Barbatus, by Bay Middleton (Nat), third, Sir J. Hawley's b. c. Orinoco, by Orlando (J. Marson), fourth, b. c. Filbert, and two others; 6 to 4 on The West, 7 to 2 against Orinoco (second to Vindex in the Champagne at Doncaster, and winner of the Clearwell in 1852), 7 to 1 against Barbatus, 8 to 1 against Filbert, and 15 to 1 against Sittingbourne, odds not warranted by his two year old running. At Epsom (Butler), won the Derby, of £5400, beating Sittingbourne (S. Rogers) by a neck, Mr. Powney's b. c. Cineas, by Touchstone (Bumby), third, ch. colt Rataplan (Wells) fourth; also, Baron Rothschild's b. c. Orestes, by Orlando, Lord Derby's br. c. Umbriel (winner, this year, of the Great Yorkshire Stakes), by Touchstone, Captain Lane's ch. c. Ninnyhammer (winner of the Ascot Derby, and who died shortly afterwards), by Orlando, the Duke of Richmond's br. c. Pharos (winner of the Ham Stakes and Bentinck Memorial at Goodwood,

in 1852), by Touchstone, Mr. Knowles' b. c. Talfourd (winner, this year, of the Newmarket Handicap), by Ion, Mr. Oliver's ch. c. Ethelbert (winner, this year, of the City and Suburban), by Foig-a-Ballagh, Mr. Way's br. c. Brocket (winner, in 1854, of the Royal Hunt Cup, at Ascot), by Melbourne, b. c. Barbatus, br. c. Filbert, b. c. Orinoco, b. c. Mr. Sykes (winner, in 1855, of the Cesarewitch), by Sir Tatton Sykes, and twelve others; 6 to 4 against The West, 7 to 1 against Orestes, and 8 to 1 against Sittingbourne. At Doncaster (Butler), won the St. Leger, of £2175, beating Lord John Scott's b. c. The Reiver (own brother to Hobbie-Noble), by Pantaloon (C. Marlow), ch. c. Rataplan (J. Wells) third, Mr. W. P'Anson's bay colt, Balrownie (winner, this year, of the Doncaster Stakes), by Annandale (Templeman), fourth; also, Lord Exeter's ch. c. Cobnut, by Nutwith, the Duke of Bedford's b. c. Feversham, by Chatham, ch. c. Sittingbourne (winner, this year, of the Gratwicke, of £1550, at Goodwood), b. c. Cineas, and two others; 6 to 4 against The West, 5 to 2 against Sittingbourne (at last his claims were recognized), ridden by Sam Rogers, and 7 to 1 each against The Reiver and Rataplan. S. mg., w. o. for a sweep of 200 sovs. each, h. ft., thirteen subscribers (net value £1000, Lord Exeter's b. c. Filbert withdrawing his 200 sovs. by consent). At Newmarket (First October), w. o. for the Grand Duke Michael Stakes, of £850, Lord Exeter's ch. c. Cobnut receiving 300 sovs. thereout, not to start.

1854.

At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 7lbs (A. F.), match for 500 sovs., h. ft., received 250 sovs. from Lord Glasgow's Barbatus, 7st 13lbs. The West was now sold to Lord Londesborough, and, at Ascot, 8st 7lbs (A. Day), won the Triennial, of £470, beating Lord Eglinton's br. c. Vanderdecken, by Bay Middleton (afterwards sold to Mr. Magenis), 8st 7lbs (Marlow), and Filbert, 8st 7lbs (Nat), last; 5 to 1 on The West. S. mg., 8st 5lbs (A. Day), won the Cup, of £540, beating Mr. Morris's b. h. Kingston, five years, 9st (J. Marson), by a head, Mr. Parr's ch. c. Rataplan, 8st 5lbs, third, Cobnut, Talfourd, Nabob, and Orestes, not being placed. This was considered the fastest-run race, for the Cup, on record; and it was won with great difficulty. At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs

each (A. Day), won a sweepstakes of £1200, beating Cobnut, by twenty lengths, and Hazelnut (both by Nutwith) by two hundred yards. This was The West's last appearance on the Turf. At the Stud he was about on a par with Teddington, perhaps a shade better.

CATHERINE HAYES.

CATHERINE HAYES was a bay filly, foaled in 1850, the property of Mr. Wauchope. She was got by Lanercost, out of Constance by Partisan, out of Quadrille by Selim, out of Canary Bird by Whiskey or Sorcerer, out of Canary by Coriander (son of Pot80's), out of Miss Green by Highflyer, out of Harriet by Match'em, out of Flora by Regulus, her dam, by Bartlett's Childers, out of a daughter of Bay Bolton, out of a mare by the Belgrade Turk.

"Catherine Hayes," writes "The Druid," "who shares with Ellerdale the honour of being the best daughter of Lanercost, was always a great favourite with Matthew Dawson. She required drawing light, and was a very sweet-tempered mare. She was wide in the hips, and her hocks were very close together. Her action was easy, graceful, and sweeping; and no horse ever crept so beautifully up the Epsom Hill. Her victory in the 'Nursery Cup,' at Goodwood, when judged by the subsequent achievements of many of the horses behind her, was a very remarkable performance, as she won very easily under the top weight of 8st 7lbs, giving Rataplan 11lbs, Ethelbert 13lbs, and Pantomime (winner of the Great Ebor Handicap, in 1853) 13lbs; while, to Dagobert, she conceded 2lbs. Mat Dawson was wont to declare that he had never tried a two year old so highly. After winning the Oaks, she caught cold across the loins, which greatly affected her spine and crippled her action. She was never the same mare afterwards, though she did give Mayfair half a stone and a beating in the Coronation Stakes."

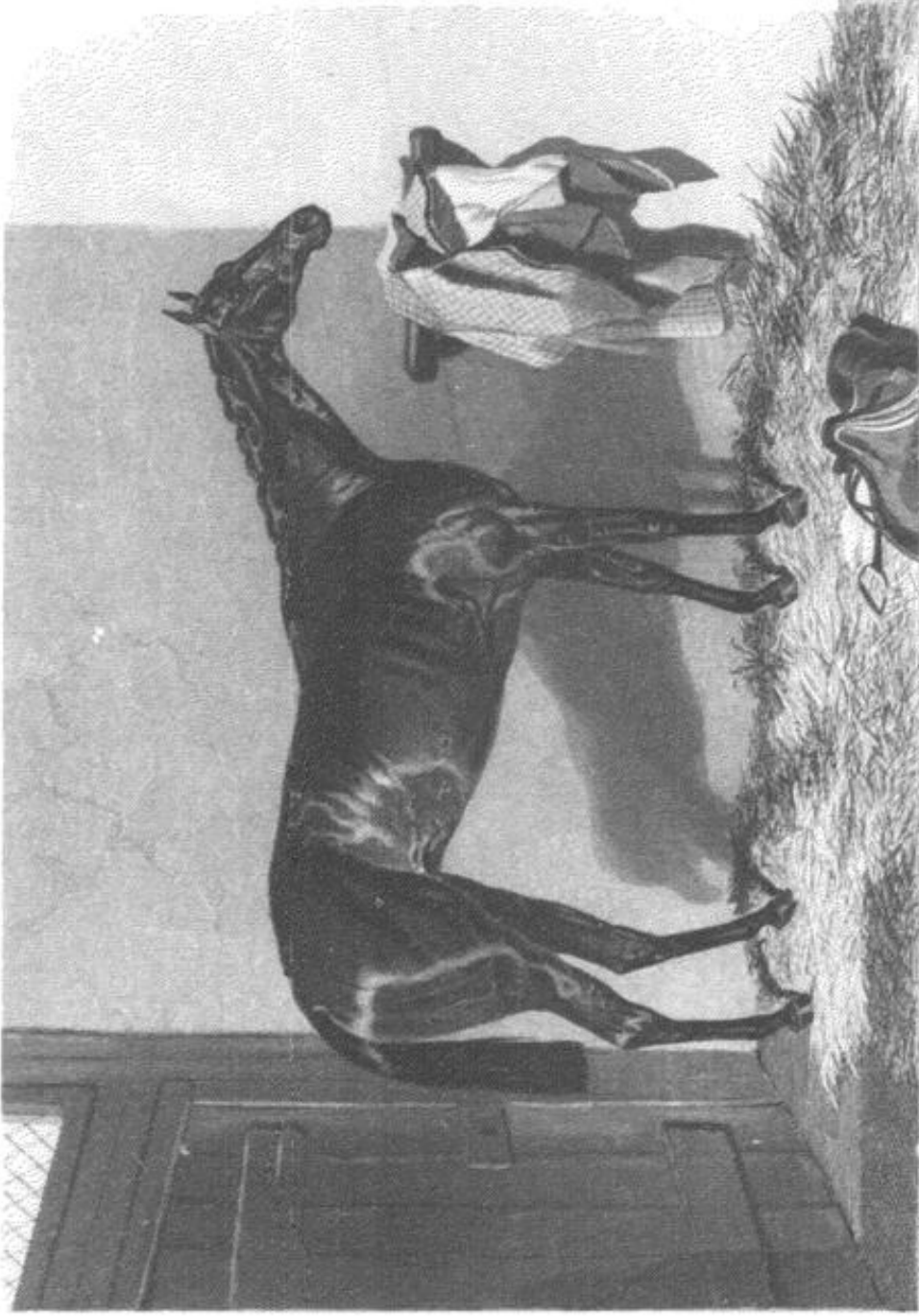

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RATAPLAN.

RATAPLAN (own brother to Stockwell), was a chestnut colt, bred by Mr. Theobald, of Stockwell, and sold, after his decease, to Captain Thellusson, and subsequently to Mr. T. Parr. Pedigree the same as Stockwell's.

Pocahontas foaled Rataplan on the very morning of the day on which Mr. Theobald died. Rataplan always went rather proppy on his long pasterns, and was also a very bad beginner, but the further he went the better he liked it. Mr. Parr's orders were the same to all Rataplan's riders, namely, "Let him alone till he gets into his stride," and when Sim Templeman, who strictly obeyed this injunction, rode him at Edinburgh, he thought he never should be able to catch the leaders; but he did and won. Rataplan's back-power was quite astounding; and, when he threw up his heels, no boy could sit him. Rataplan's finest performance on the Turf, was his winning the Manchester Cup with 9st 3lbs.

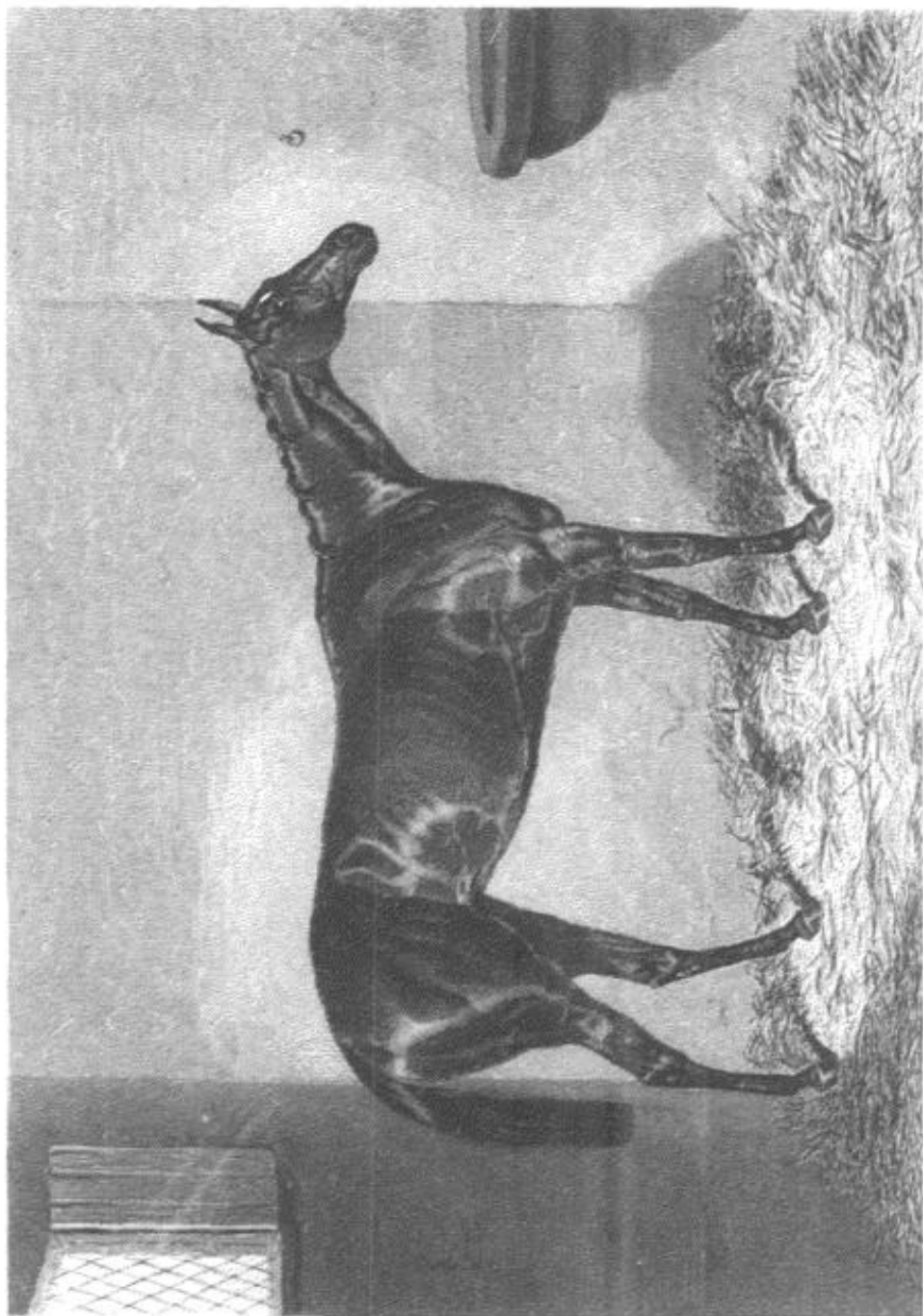

he inherited. "Springy Jack," observes "The Druid," "was a nice smart goer, but heavy-fleshed as a bull, and willing to eat up to his weight. As soon as he had emptied his manger, he would sleep for two or three hours; and, with such an increasing top, no training could keep his legs in order."

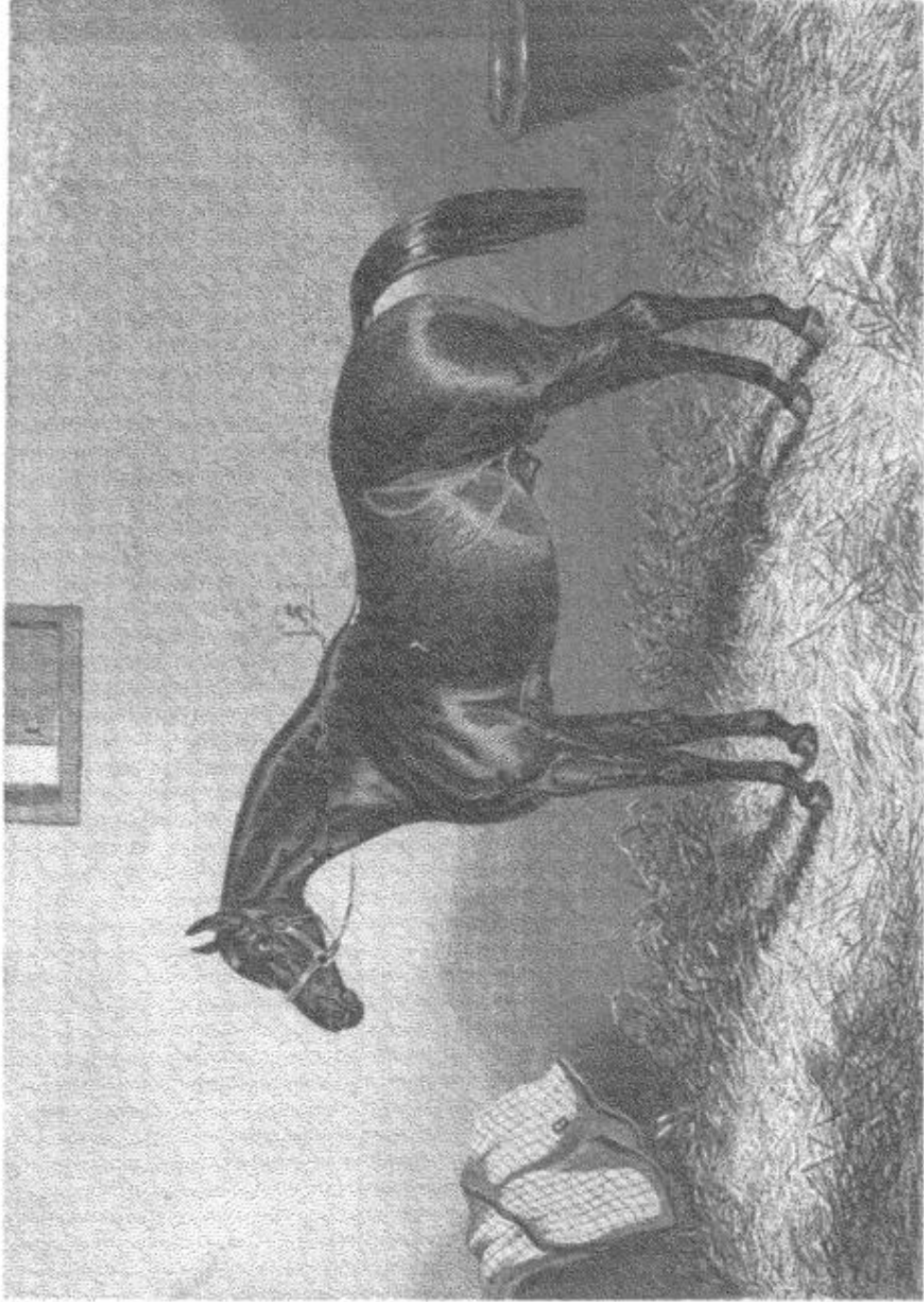

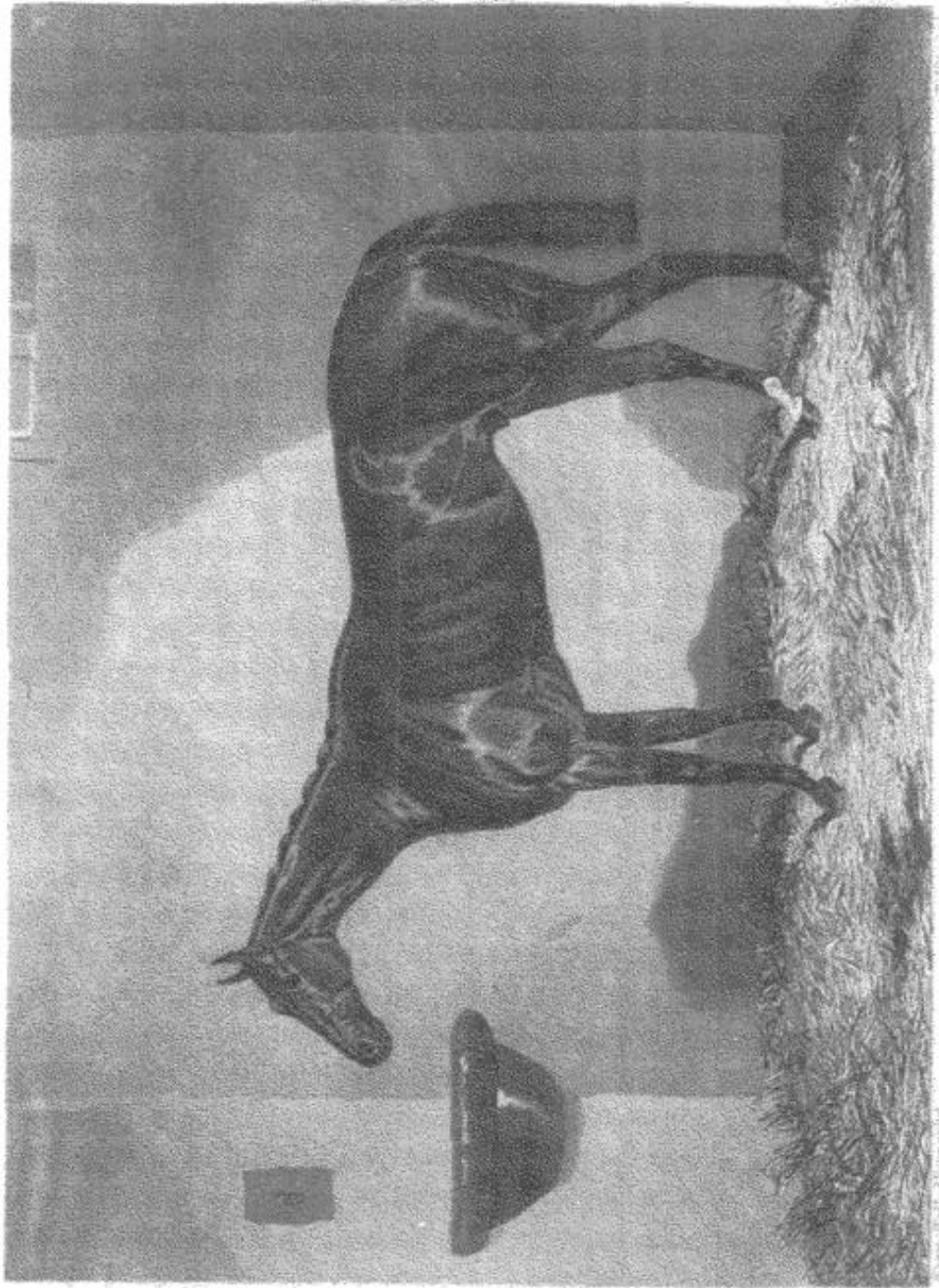

MINCEMEAT was a brown filly, bred by Captain Cookson, in 1851, and got by Sweetmeat, out of Hybla, by The Provost, out of Otisina (sister to Lanercost), by Liverpool, out of Otis, by Bustard (son of Buzzard), out of a mare by Election; out of Sister to Skysweeper, by Highflyer, her dam, by Eclipse, out of Rosebud, by Old Snap, out of Miss Belsea, by Regulus, out of a mare by Bartlett's Childers, her dam, by Mr. Honeywood's White Arabian, out of the dam of the two True Blues. Mr. Honeywood's White Arabian was first the property of Sir John Williams, Bart., who sold him to Mr. Turner, of Suffolk, from whom he was purchased by Mr. Honeywood. He was the sire of the two True Blues, both grey horses, and both bred by Mr. Honeywood. The elder of the two, foaled in 1710, was the best plate horse in England of his time. He won the King's Gold Cup, at York, in 1716, beating Sir William Strickland's b. h. Chaunter (also foaled in 1710), by the Acaster Turk, 12st each, four mile heats, and three others.

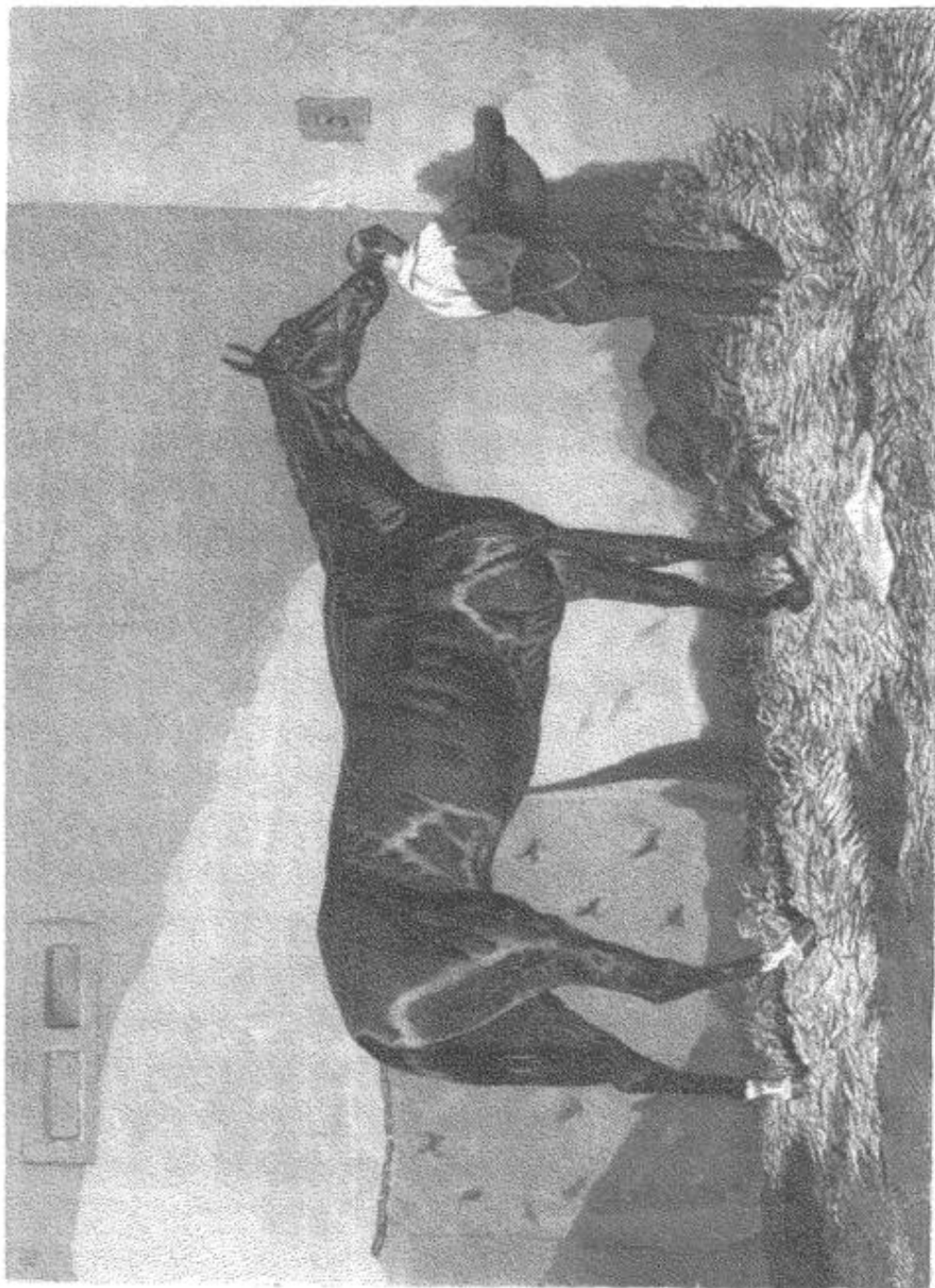

 VIRAGO.

VIRAGO was a ch. f. bred by Mr. Stephenson (the breeder of Voltigeur), in 1851, and became the property of Mr. Henry Padwick. She was got by Pyrrhus the First, out of Virginia by Rowton, out of Pucelle (bred by the Duke of Grafton in 1821), by Muley, out of Medora by Selim, out of a mare by Sir Harry (son of Sir Peter), her dam, by Volunteer, out of a daughter of Herod, out of Golden Grove, by Blank, out of Spinster (the Widdrington Mare), by Old Partner, out of a mare by Bloody Buttocks, her dam, by Old Greyhound, out of a mare by Makeless, out of a daughter of Brimmer, &c., &c. Old Partner, Bloody Buttocks (a grey horse), and Old Greyhound were all of them stallions in the Stud of John Crofts, Esq., of Barforth, Yorkshire.

Virago was advertized for sale, as a yearling, at Doncaster, in 1852. John Day, acting on behalf of Mr. Padwick, slipped down and tried to buy her privately, before the sale, but Mr. Stephenson insisted on her going to the hammer. John Scott took a great fancy for her, and bid up to 340 gs., when Mr. Padwick added ten, and secured her. She was tried as a two-year old, with Little Harry (then four years old), receiving only 7lbs. Wm. Day rode Virago, and was so pleased with her that he offered £2000 for her on the ground, which offer was increased to £3000 when they got into the house; but Mr. Padwick would not sell. After the Doncaster Meeting, in 1854, she turned roarer, and was so changed that the little St. Hubert (a son of Surplice), beat her at something under weight for age in a spin at home.

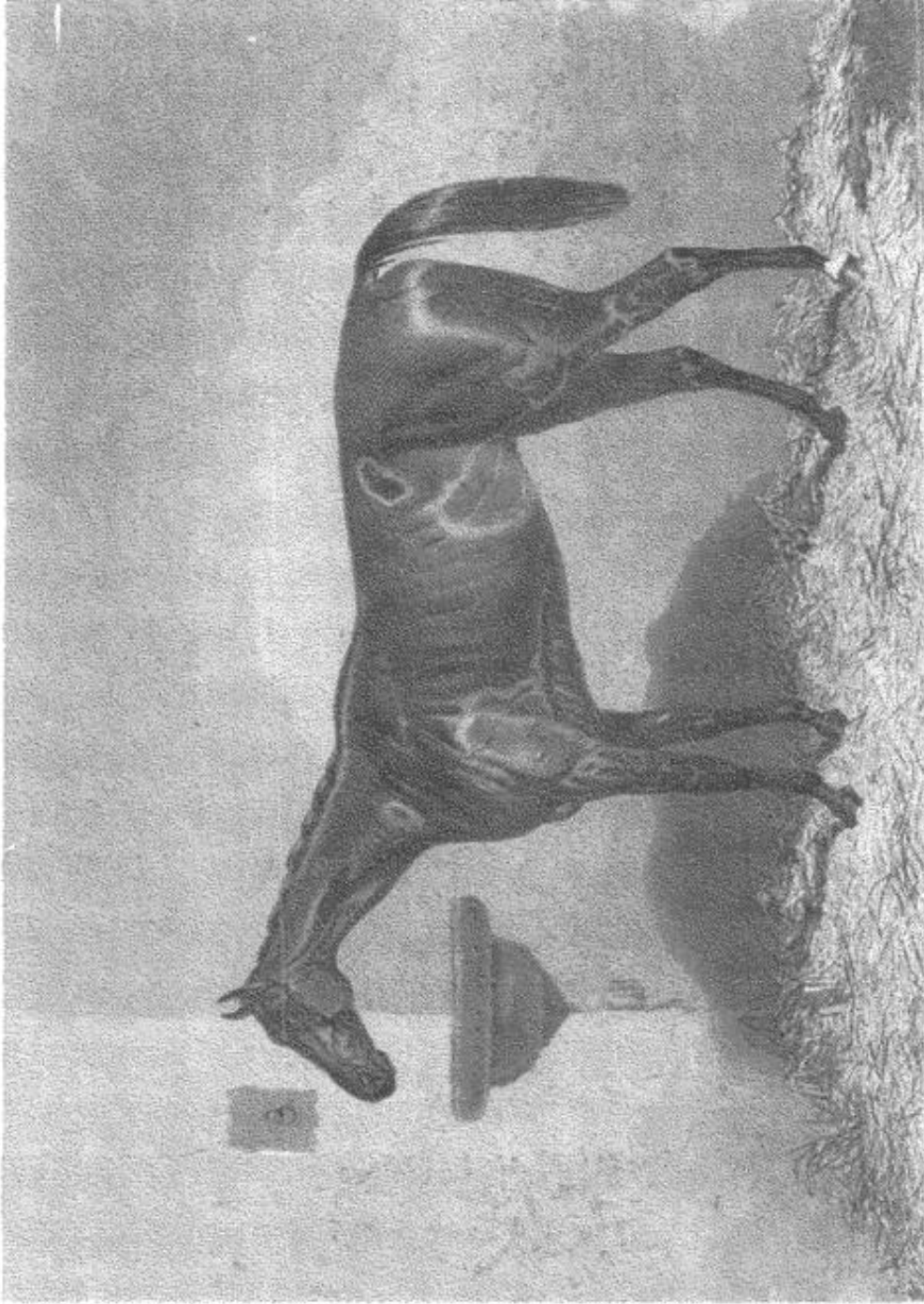

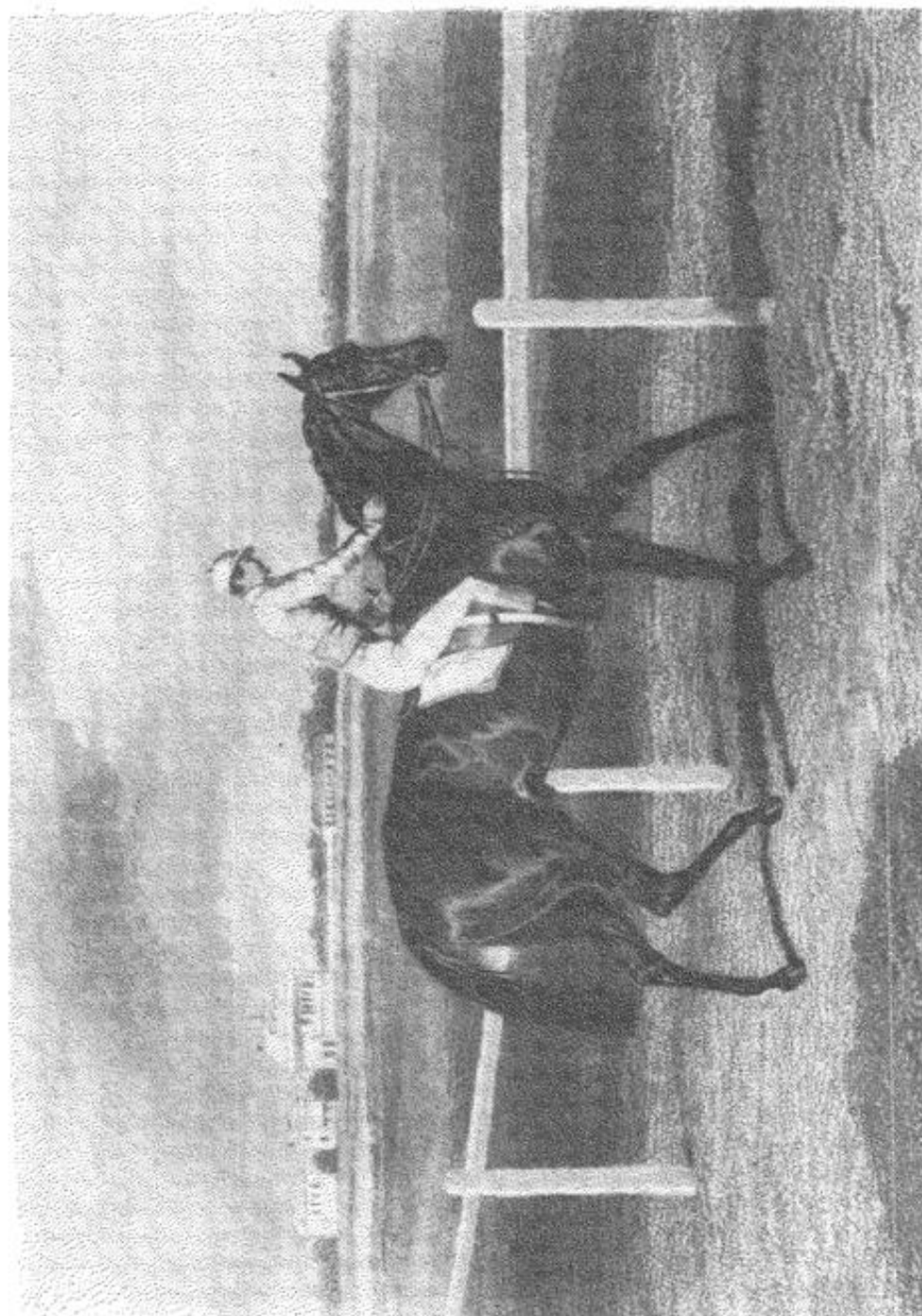

KNIGHT OF ST. GEORGE.

KNIGHT OF ST. GEORGE was a bay colt, bred in Ireland by Mr. Disney, in 1851, and sold to Mr. St. George, after his defeat in the Waterford Stakes, in 1853, who disposed of him at the close of that year to Mr. B. Morris, the owner of Kingston. He was got by Irish Birdcatcher, out of a mare by Hetman Platoff, out of Waterwitch (bred in Ireland by Mr. Flood, in 1833), by Sir Hercules, out of Mary Anne by Waxy Pope, out of Witch by Sorcerer, out of Sophia (bred by Mr. Tattersall, in 1794), by Highflyer, out of Catherine by Young Marske, out of Gentle Kitty (bred by Mr. Hutton in 1774), by Silvio (son of Old Cade), out of a mare by Dorimond (son of Dormouse, by the Godolphin Arabian), out of Portia by Regulus, her dam, by Mr. I. Hutton's Spot, her dam, by Fox Cub, out of a mare by Bay Bolton, &c. Knight of St. George was just fifteen hands high when he won the St. Leger; but he grew into a fine horse afterwards, and left a most beautiful and enlarged likeness of himself in his son, Knight of St. Patrick. There never was a more difficult horse to ride than Knight of St. George, and for this reason only Mr. Disney made up his mind to dispose of him. At the termination of his first season in Ireland, he was sold to Mr. Morris the owner of Kingston, Indian Warrior, &c. In his races the Knight was a most uncertain runner, though his capabilities were unquestionable. He required a deal of humouring to induce him to show what he could do, whip and spur being unavailing. When he was brought to Hambleton, in November, 1853, he was savage and intractable. Basham took him in hand for the winter, and gradually by gentle treatment brought him more under control. In the St. Leger, Basham rode him with consummate tact and judgment. His Derby trial, with Kingston and Eulogist, was highly satisfactory, and he won it in fine racing style; but in another essay with Kingston, he cut his boot clean off, penetrating the flesh, and was thus baulked of his chance for the Derby.

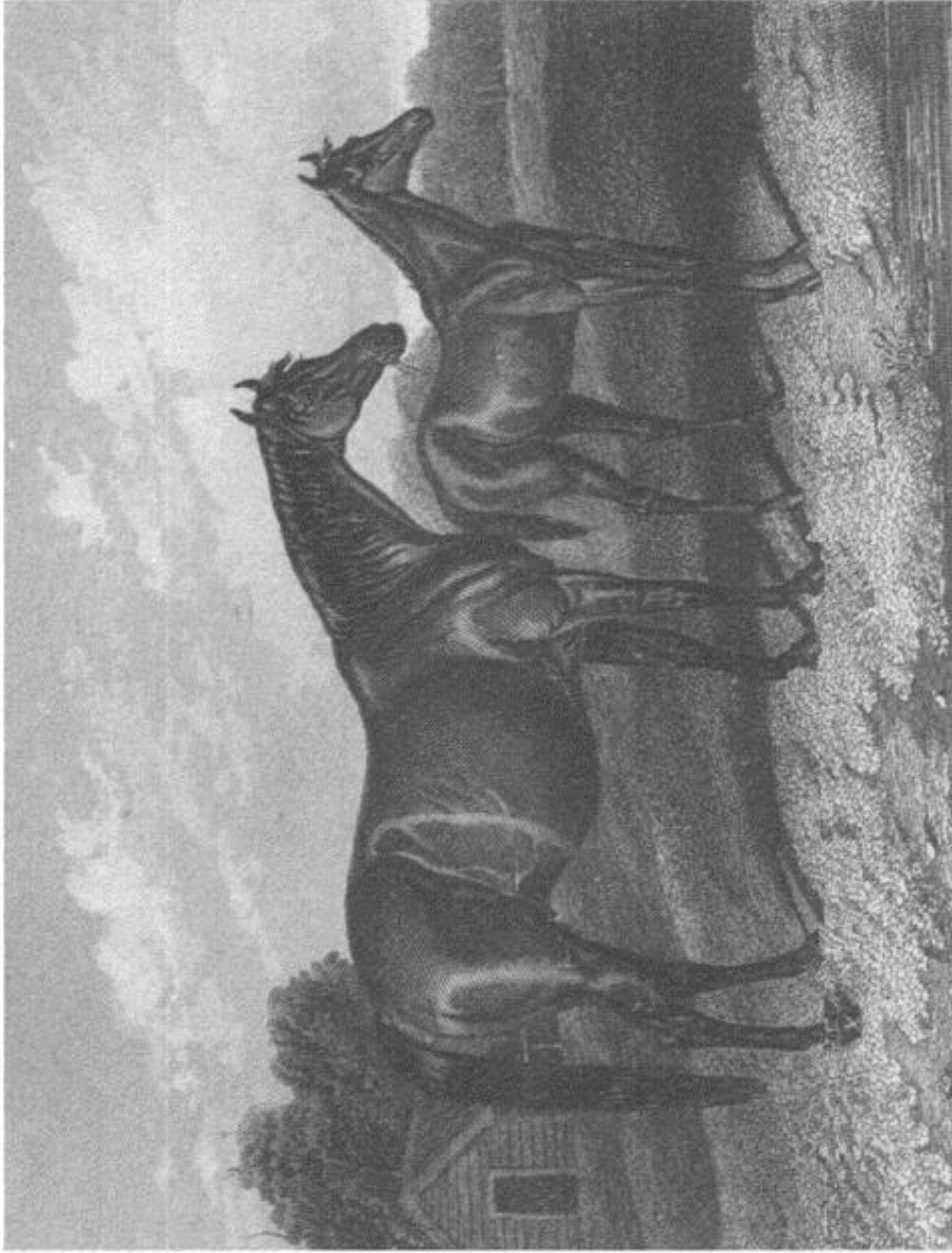

At Goodwood, 7st 3lbs (Basham), ran second for the Chesterfield Cup, won by Cat's-paw. At Doncaster, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 2lbs (Basham), won the Great St. Leger (£3850), beating Lord Zetland's b. c. Ivan by Van Tromp (Ashmall), by a head, Mr. Peck's b. c. Arthur Wellesley by Melbourne (J. Prince), Mr. Pedley's b. c. Scythian (winner of the Chester Cup in 1855), by Orlando (Wells), fourth; also (not placed), b. c. Boiardo by Orlando, b. c. Dervish, b. c. Acrobat, by Ithuriel (all three Lord Derby's, the last-named winning the Great Yorkshire Stakes at York), ch. c. Doctor O'Toole, br. f. Palmeria by Foig-a-Ballagh, br. c. The Trapper by Ion, b. c. Baalbec by Ion, br. c. Middlesex by Melbourne, b. c. Autocrat, ch. c. Aribbas, and four others; 6 to 4 against Boiardo, 5 to 1 against The Trapper, 7 to 1 against Acrobat, and 11 to 1 against Knight of St. George. At Newmarket (October 2nd), 7st 7lbs (Basham), won a £50 purse, beating Mr. Barber's Domino, three years, 7st 7lbs, and Mr. Greville's Adine (winner of the Ebor Handicap, 1852). St. George's last race.

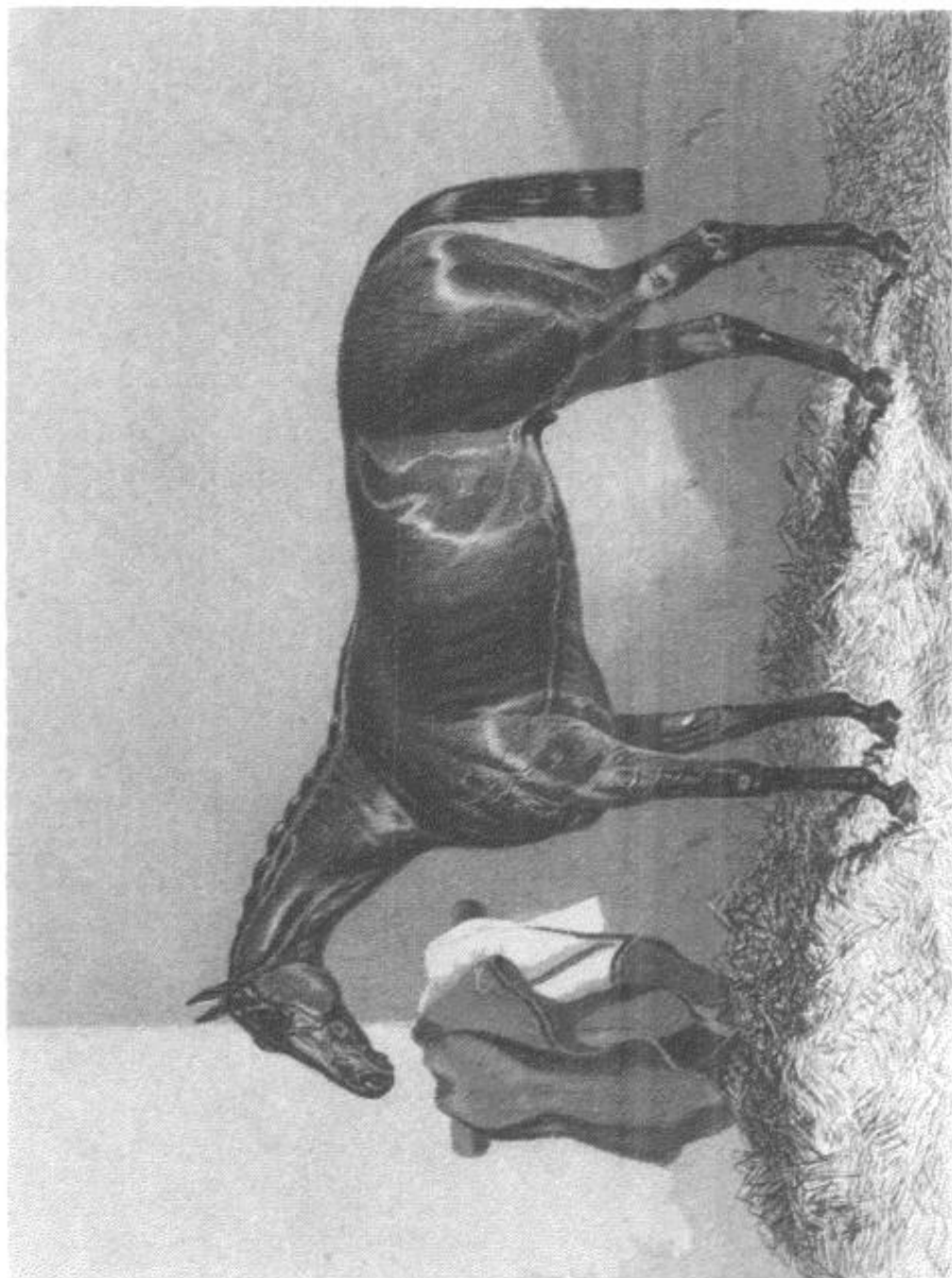
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THE PRINCESS.

THE PRINCESS was got by The Merry Monarch, out of Queen Charlotte, by Elis, out of Charlotte West (bred by Lord Jersey in 1827), by Tramp, out of Filagree (bred by his Lordship in 1815), by Soothsayer (son of Sorcerer), out of Web (bred by the Duke of Grafton in 1808), by Waxy, out of Penelope (bred by his Grace in 1798), by Trumpator, out of Prunella (bred by his Grace in 1788), by Highflyer, out of Promise (bred by his Grace in 1768), by Snap, out of Julia (bred by Mr. T. Panton of Newmarket), by Blank, &c. The Princess was never trained for racing, but she was the dam of Nutbourne and Neighbour, both by The Nabob, and both bred by Mr. Wyatt. The performances of Nutbourne were of very high promise till he broke down in the Derby, but Neighbour did not distinguish herself on the Turf, but her daughter Bertha (a ch. f. by Stockwell, foaled in 1859, and the property of the Earl of Stamford), won as a two year old, in 1861, at Goodwood, the Hurstbourne Stakes, of £625, beating Lord Annesley's ch. c. Ace of Clubs by Stockwell, and The Baron's ch. f. Gorse by King Tom, easily. S. mg. (ridden by Edwards), she won the Bentinck Memorial Stakes, of £275, in a canter, by three lengths, beating five others; also w. o. for the Sussex Stakes of £216. At Brighton, Bertha (French), won the Biennial Stakes, of £320, beating Lord Chesterfield's b. c. Canwell (who received 50 sovs. out of the stakes), by Stockwell (Fordham), after a most exciting race, by a neck; 11 to 2 on Bertha, 8st 10lbs, Canwell, 8st 7lbs. At Newmarket (Second October), for two years old fillies, w. o. for a sweep of 300 sovs. each, h. ft., four subscribers. S. mg. (Edwards), won the Bretby Stakes, of £550 (for fillies only), beating Mr. Alexander's b. f. Lorelia by Robert de Gorham (son of Sir Hercules), easily, by a length (Sharp); 5 to 2 on Bertha. In 1862, at Newmarket Craven, Bertha (Edwards), won

a sweep of 150 sovs., beating Mr. R. C. Naylor's b. f. Biondella, by The Flying Dutchman, 8st 7lbs each (Challoner), by a head, and Baron Névière's b. f. Baliverne (bred in France), by Womersley (Fordham); 13 to 8 on Biondella, and 4 to 1 each against the other two. At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs (Edwards), won the Nassau Stakes, of £500, beating Mr. T. Valentine's (Lord Falmouth's) b. f. Q.E.D. by Kingston, 8st 7lbs (Aldcroft), by a length, and Lord Coventry's br. f. Sappho by Kingston, 8st 7lbs (Adams). At Brighton, 8st 13lbs (Edwards), she won the Biennial, of £330, beating Mr. Wyon's b. c. Michel Grove by Rattle, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), Mr. Hodgman's b. c. Otho by King Tom, 8st 7lbs (Custance), and br. f. Pellucid by Pelion, 8st 7lbs (Goater); 6 to 4 on Bertha, who also ran second for the 1000 Guineas, at Newmarket (First Spring), to Mr. T. Valentine's b. f. Hurricane, by Wild Dayrell. In 1863 she won the Londesborough Cup, at York, and £175 at Manchester.

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WILD DAYRELL

WILD DAYRELL was a brown colt, bred by F. L. Popham, Esq., of Littlecote, near Hungerford, in 1852. He was got by Ion (son of Cain), out of Ellen Middleton by Bay Middleton, out of Myrrha (bred by General Sharpe in 1831), by Malek (brother to Velocipede), out of Bessy by Young Gouty, out of Grandiflora, by Sir Harry Dimsdale (son of Sir Peter), out of a mare by Pipator, her dam by Young Marske out of Pyrrha by Match'em, out of Duchess by Whitenose, out of Miss Slamerkin by Young True Blue, &c. With the exception of Lady Flora (a ch. f. by Hampton) Mr. Popham never in his life possessed a thoroughbred mare, until he purchased Ellen Middleton. Mr. Popham's groom, Rickaby, saw her advertised for sale in *Bell's Life*, and considered the Bay Middleton and Myrrha blood so good that his master directed him to write to her owner, Mr. Robert Hill, for the price. Mr. Popham bought her, unseen, in 1850 for £50. There being no stallion of note near Littlecote, Rickaby was sent in the spring of 1851 on a voyage of discovery for a suitable sire among the Stud Farms. Harkaway, Ratcatcher, and The Libel were not to his fancy; but at length he came to Barrow's, at Newmarket, where stood Don John, Irish Birdcatcher, John o' Gaunt, and Ion. Rickaby, greatly perplexed, at last fixed upon Ion. Ellen and Lady Flora were both sent to him. Ellen's colt-foal was born about 2 a.m. on the 14th of April, 1852. At this time Mr. Popham had no idea of training, and he therefore advertised both the colt and his half-sister (Lady Flora's foal) for sale in 1853. Several offers were made privately for the colt, and when Dagobert (the son of Ion) had put the Goodwood Stable in love with the blood, by winning the Chesterfield Stakes, Lord Henry Lennox sent Kent, the Duke of Richmond's trainer, to look at the foals, and he took the pair for 500 guineas. When they were two years old, the filly beat the big colt in a trial, whereupon Lord

H. Lennox sent them both up for sale at Tattersall's, and Mr. Popham bought them both back for 350 guineas. So, as Lord George Bentinck parted too hastily with Surplice, and Colonel Peel with Kingston, in like manner did Lord Lennox get rid of a Derby winner. Wild Dayrell was found dead in his box on Sunday, the 27th of November, 1870; and he left to Buccaneer and The Rake (whose paternity, however, was questioned) the honour of perpetuating a strain of blood which, if not the stoutest, was at any rate a valuable variety, which we could ill afford to lose. Most of Wild Dayrell's stock could race; and several two year olds at one time promised to make him a sire of very high fashion, but the transition from two to three years old was fatal to this expectation. Buccaneer unfortunately was transported to Hungary before his fame as a sire could be tested; but this was sufficiently established before his son Kisber (the Mineral Colt) won the Derby in 1876. The Rake, Wild Oats, and some others have gone utterly to the bad. A mouse-brown colt, with a handsome head and rather high on the legs, might safely be set down as a Wild Dayrell, and several of his stock, notably Wild Charley, showed a deal of quality. The Rake, however, was altogether quite of another mould, and partook more of the character of the Birdcatcher family.

WILD DAYRELL'S PERFORMANCES.

Para, by Paragon (son of Touchstone), who ran a dead-heat for second place with Lord Exeter's b. c. Hazel, by Nutwith: only three ran; won by two lengths.

1855.

At Epsom (R. Sherwood), won the Derby, of £4775, beating Mr. H. Hill's br. c. Kingstown by Tearaway (son of Voltaire), by two lengths (A. Day), Mr. J. Merry's b. c. Lord of the Isles (winner of the 2000 Guineas), by Touchstone (Aldcroft), third, a head only from Kingstown, Mr. Adkins' b. c. Flatterer by Hetman Platoff (Bartholomew), a bad

fourth; also Mr. Henderson's b. c. Rylstone by Touchstone (G. Oates), Mr. Norton's b. c. Courtenay by Flatcatcher (J. Prince), Lord Anglesey's ch. c. Strood by Chatham (Goater), Mr. Garrett's b. c. Little Brownie, by Flatcatcher (J. Marson), Mr. W. Smith's b. f. The Cave Adullam, by Bay Middleton, Lord Eglinton's br. c. Dick Hatteraick by Van Tromp (Chas. Marlow), and his b. c. Coræbus, by Slane, and Mr. J. Osborne's gr. c. Lord Alfred by Chanticleer (J. Osborne). These comprised the field. Even against Wild Dayrell, 7 to 4 against Lord of the Isles, and 12 to 1 each against Kingstown and Dick Hatteraick, and 20 to 1 against Flatterer. At York, 8st 13lbs (Bartholomew), won the Ebor St. Leger, of 25 sovs. each, twenty-eight subscribers (val. £650), beating Mr. Elwes' b. c. Oulston by Melbourne, 8st 7lbs (A. Day), in a canter, by two lengths; only these two ran; 6 to 4 on Oulston, who won this year the Biennial at Bath, the Queen's Vase at Ascot, the Steward's Cup at Stockbridge, and the Drawing-room Stakes at Goodwood. At Doncaster, 7st 7lbs (Wells), not placed for the Cup, won by Mr. Thellusson's ch. h. Rataplan, five years, 9st 1lb (A. Cowley), beating br. f. Ellermire, three years, 6st 11lbs (Bates), in a canter, by six lengths, Lord Derby's b. c. Acrobat, four years, 8st 5lbs (Bartholomew), third, Mr. Padwick's b. h. Little Harry (winner of the Goodwood Stakes in 1854) by Epirus, six years, 9st 5lbs (A. Day), fourth, and Indian Warrior, six years, 9st 5lbs (Basham), not placed. In running, Wild Dayrell broke down, and now retired to the Stud. Wild Dayrell stood fully sixteen hands high, with length, strength and symmetry to match.

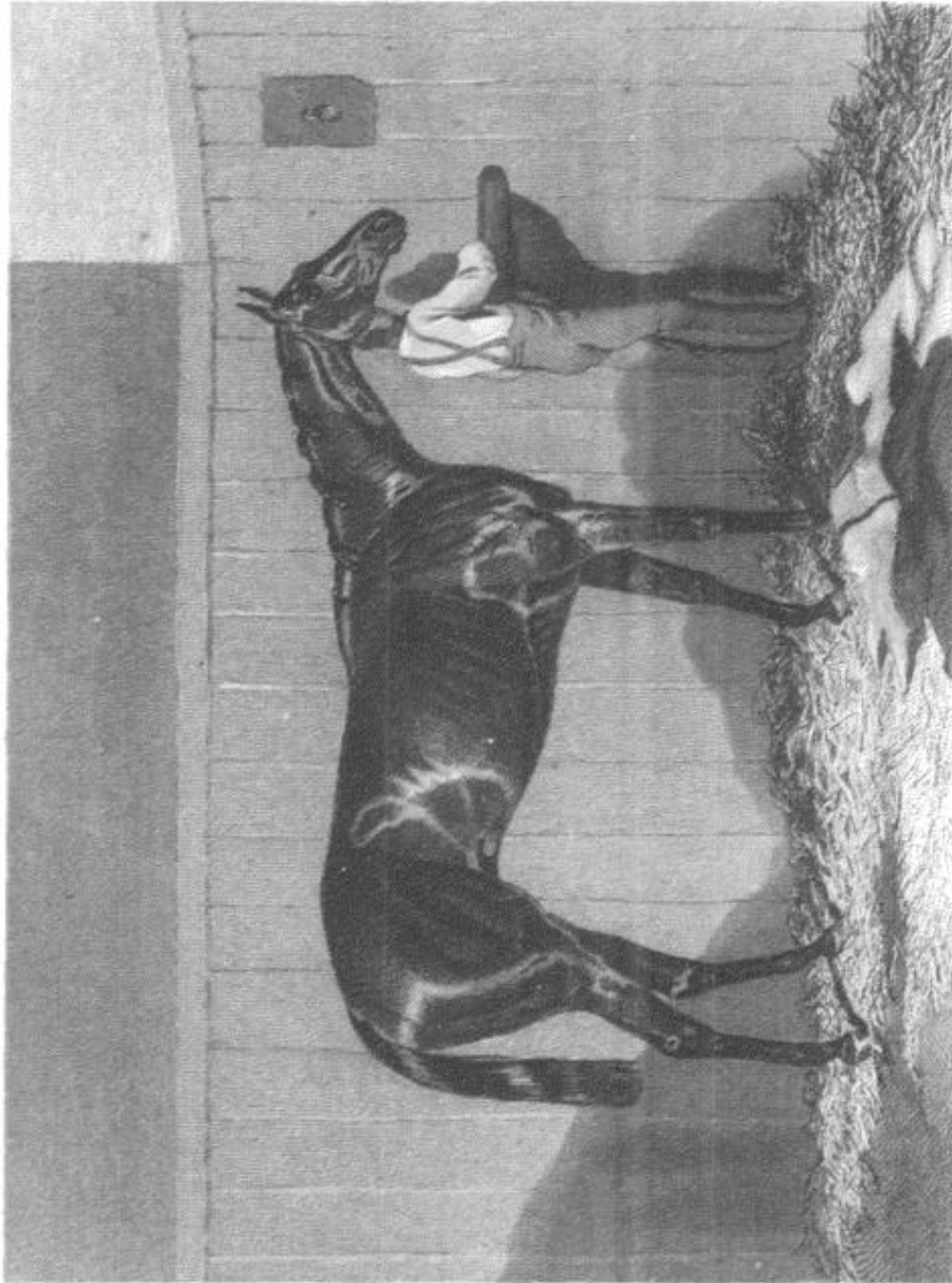
Wild Dayrell was sent to the post, for the Derby, in the finest condition possible, and his appearance was grand in the extreme. The *Daily Telegraph*, in its issue of March 13th, 1886, thus refers to Wild Dayrell. "At first sight he seemed light below the knee; but on measuring his forelegs they were found to be full of bone. He died at Littlecote Park in November, 1870. In the morning of the day on which he died, Thomas Hodgson, who had succeeded Rickaby as Stud groom at Littlecote, entered Wild Dayrell's box, and found him perfectly well. He had emptied his manger to the last oat, and nothing indicated his approaching dissolution. When, however, Hodgson visited him again in the middle of the day, the great horse lay dead in his box. It was the

opinion of the vet. at Hungerford, that apoplexy was the cause of his death."

Wild Dayrell was the sire of Buccaneer (who was sold to the Austrian Government, every effort to get him back having been made in vain), of The Rake, of Avalanche, Horror, Hurricane, Wild Oats, Wild Agnes, and Wild Moor; also of Guy Dayrell and Bold Dayrell, and several other winners. Had he not, like Lord Clifden, died prematurely, his fame as a sire would doubtless have equalled, or nearly so, that of Touchstone, Newminster, and Stockwell.

From his son, Buccaneer, the English Turf received Formosa (winner of the One Thousand, half of the Two Thousand, the Oaks, and St. Leger, of Brigantine (winner of the Oaks and Ascot Cup), of Paul Jones (winner of the Chester Cup and second in the St. Leger), of See Saw (who won the Royal Hunt Cup at Ascot, and the Cambridgeshire), and, finally, of Kisber who won the Dewhurst Plate and the Derby.

MARCHIONESS was a bay filly, bred by the Hon. S. Hawke in 1852, and sold to Rudston Read, Esq., in November, 1854. She was got by Melbourne, out of Cinizelli by Touchstone, out of Brocade by Pantaloon, out of Bombasine by Thunderbolt (son of Sorcerer), out of Delta by Alexander, out of Isis by Sir Peter, out of Ibis by Woodpecker, out of Isabella by Eclipse, out of a mare by Squirrel (son of Old Traveller), out of Ancaster Nancy (bred by the Duke of Ancaster in 1767), by Blank, out of Phœbe by Tortoise, son of Old Snap, out of a mare by Looby (son of Bay Bolton), out of a dau. of Old Partner, &c.

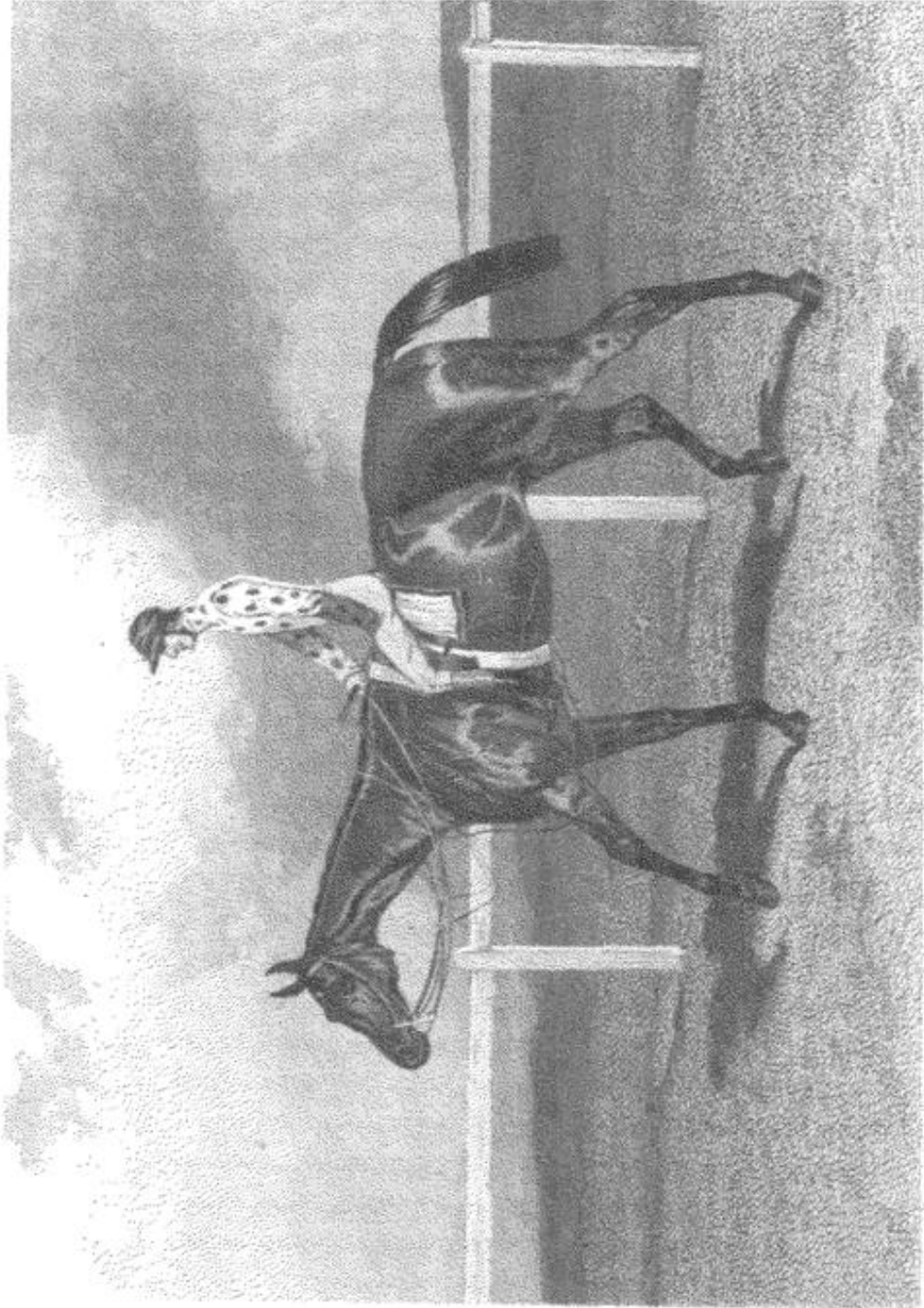

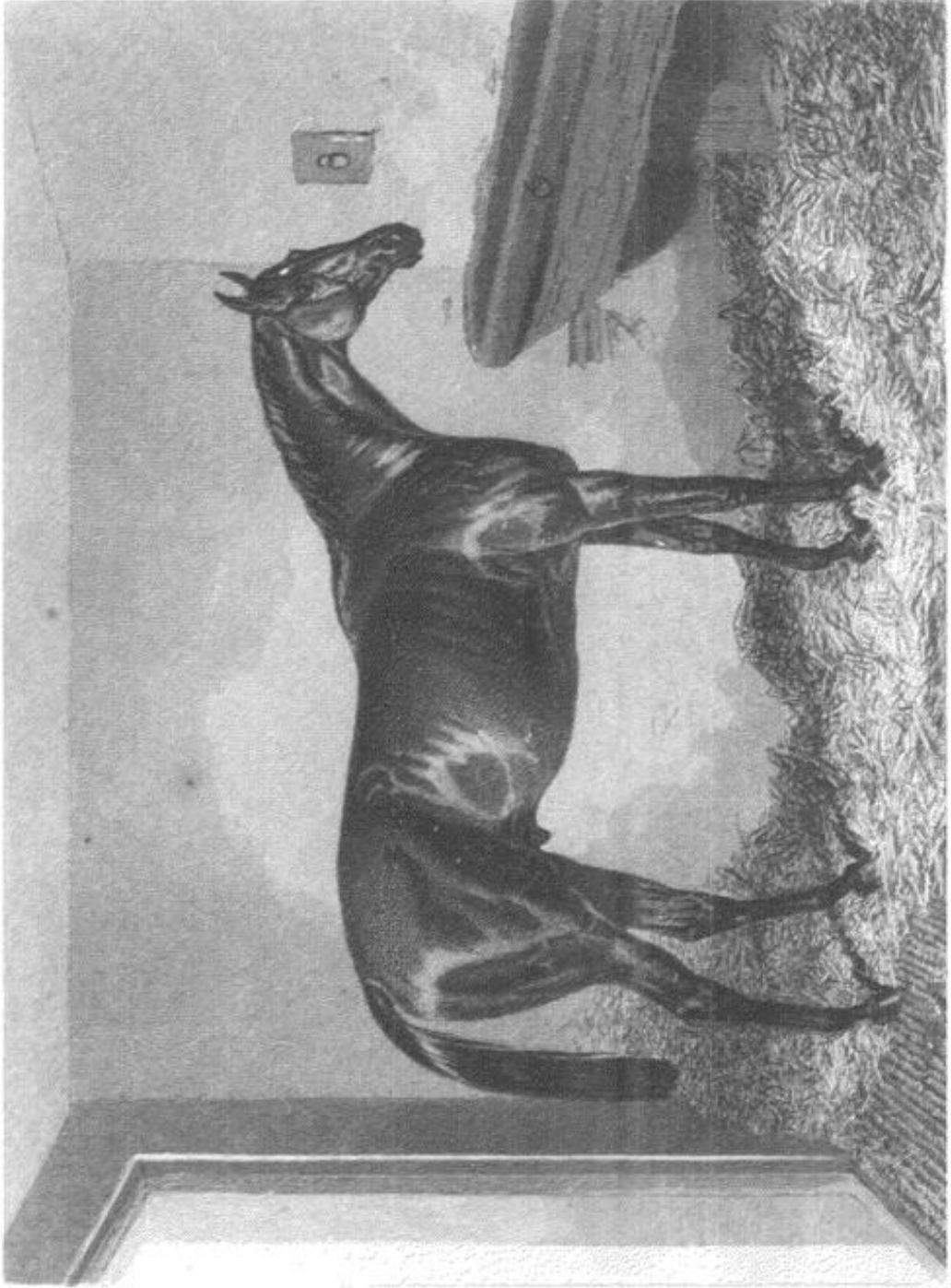

Day) very easily; 6 to 1 on Fandango, both four years old. S. mg., 8st 8lbs, D. I. (Marson), won a £50 purse, beating Mr. Walker's b. h. Winkfield (winner, this year, of the Ascot Cup) by Alarm, five years, 8st 13lbs (J. Mann), by twelve lengths, in a canter. At Richmond, w. o. for the Cup Stakes, and

retired to the Stud, having done good service for his owner, Lord Zetland, and proved himself a thoroughly good and honest horse upon the Turf.

“The Druid,” in discoursing on the blood of Blacklock, through its four perpetuators—Buzzard, Brutandorf, Voltaire, and Velocipede—remarks that, “no blood in the Stud-Book is better winded or runs better when full of flesh. Their aptitude for a distance displays itself in a very muscular neck, without which very few horses ever yet stayed; and they have also great depth from the withers to the shoulder points, and an immense roundness of rib in making the curve from the spine.”

Voltigeur and Fandango had all these characteristics. Barnton, the sire of Fandango, was, like Melbourne, a coarse-headed, lengthy, rough style of horse. He was deep in the rib, and rather narrow; whereas Voltigeur had more of the Blacklock roundness of rib. “Fandango’s action,” adds “The Druid,” “was very sweeping and workmanlike; and we never saw him look and steal along quite so well as when he ran second to One Act, at 52lbs, for the Great Northern Handicap.” (From “Silk and Scarlet.”)

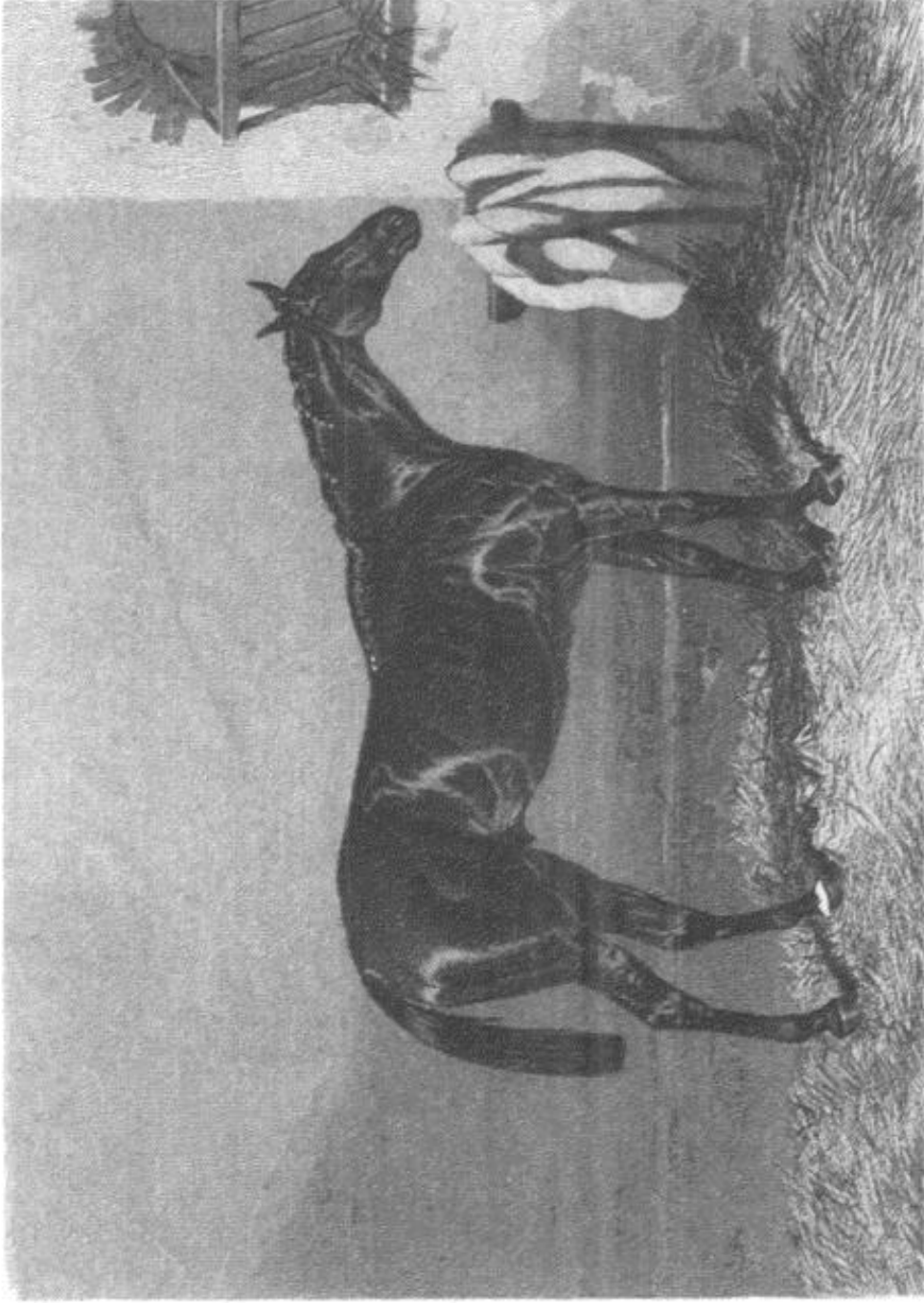

He was got by The Flying Dutchman, out of Ellerdale, by Lanercost, out of a mare by Tomboy, out of Tesane, by Whisker, out of Lady of the Tees (bred by Mr. Ferguson in 1822), by Octavian, out of a mare by Sancho, out of Miss Furey, by Trumpator, her dam, by Marc Anthony, out of Signora (bred by Jenison Shafto, Esq., in 1767), by Old Snap, out of Miss Windsor (bred by H.R.H. the Duke of Cumberland in 1754), by the Godolphin Arabian, out of Sister to Volunteer, by Young Belgrade, out of a mare by Bartlett's Childers, her dam by the Devonshire Chestnut Arabian.

"The Druid," in his work entitled "Scott and Sebright," speaking of Ellington, says that he "was ridden about at Admiral Harcourt's after his two year old season, by the coachman, and made as handy at gate opening as a hack—the first time probably that a future Blue Ribbon winner has so passed the previous winter. One of those who won on his Derby got the hint in a very curious way. His book was beating him, and in a desperate mood, he was sauntering down Piccadilly, when, on looking up at the clock over the Wellington Club, he saw that the hands stood at twenty minutes to eight, just obscuring the W. In an instant he had his cue, and felt so convinced he was right in accepting the omen, that he took the odds about the colt to win £500."

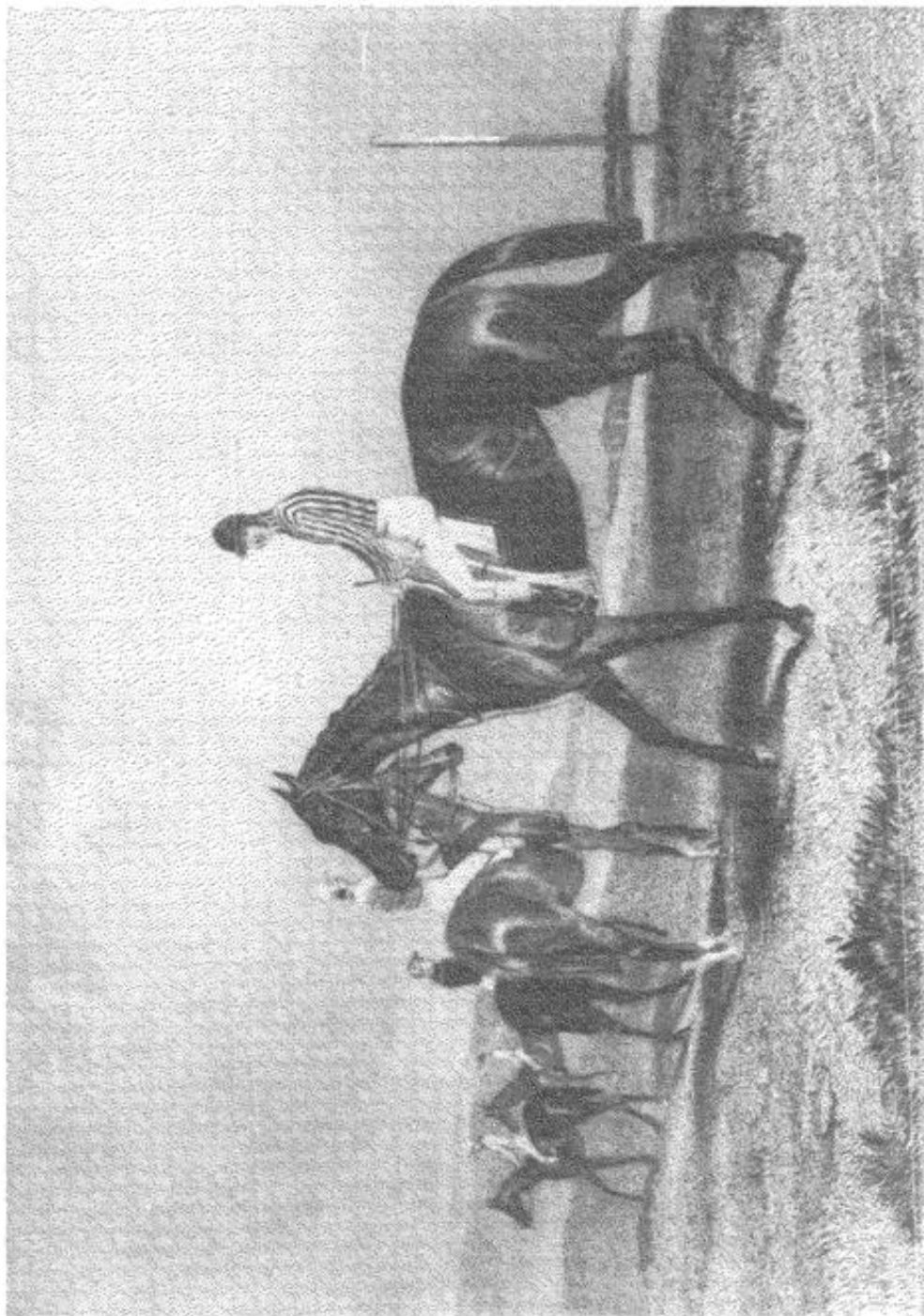

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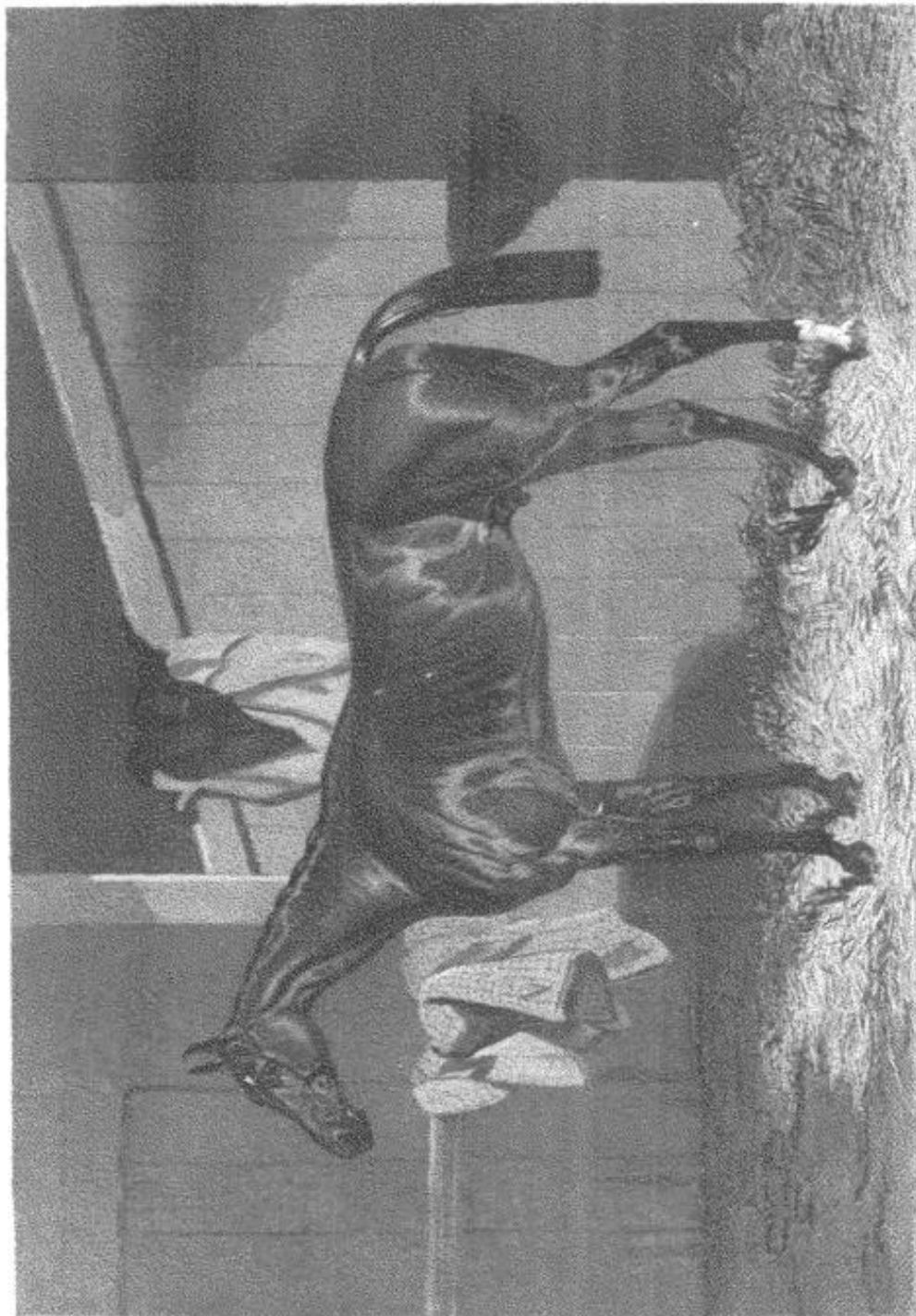

"Warlock," says "The Druid," "was a singularly unfortunate horse. At Epsom, he was suffering from very sore shins. At Newcastle, he bolted in his first race, and fell in the second. At Carlisle, he was pulled up by *mistake*, after going once round. He was a wonderfully game horse, but somewhat slow, and required a deal of management. John Scott felt certain that, barring Ellington, of whom he had just dread, the St. Leger was safe enough for Warlock, whose finest performance, however, was when he beat the redoubtable Fisherman, for the Queen's Plate, at York."

Elastic, by The Ugly Buck, four years, 6st 7lbs, fourth, and four others. At the end of the first round, Fordham, by mistake, pulled Warlock up, and he had to be set going again. 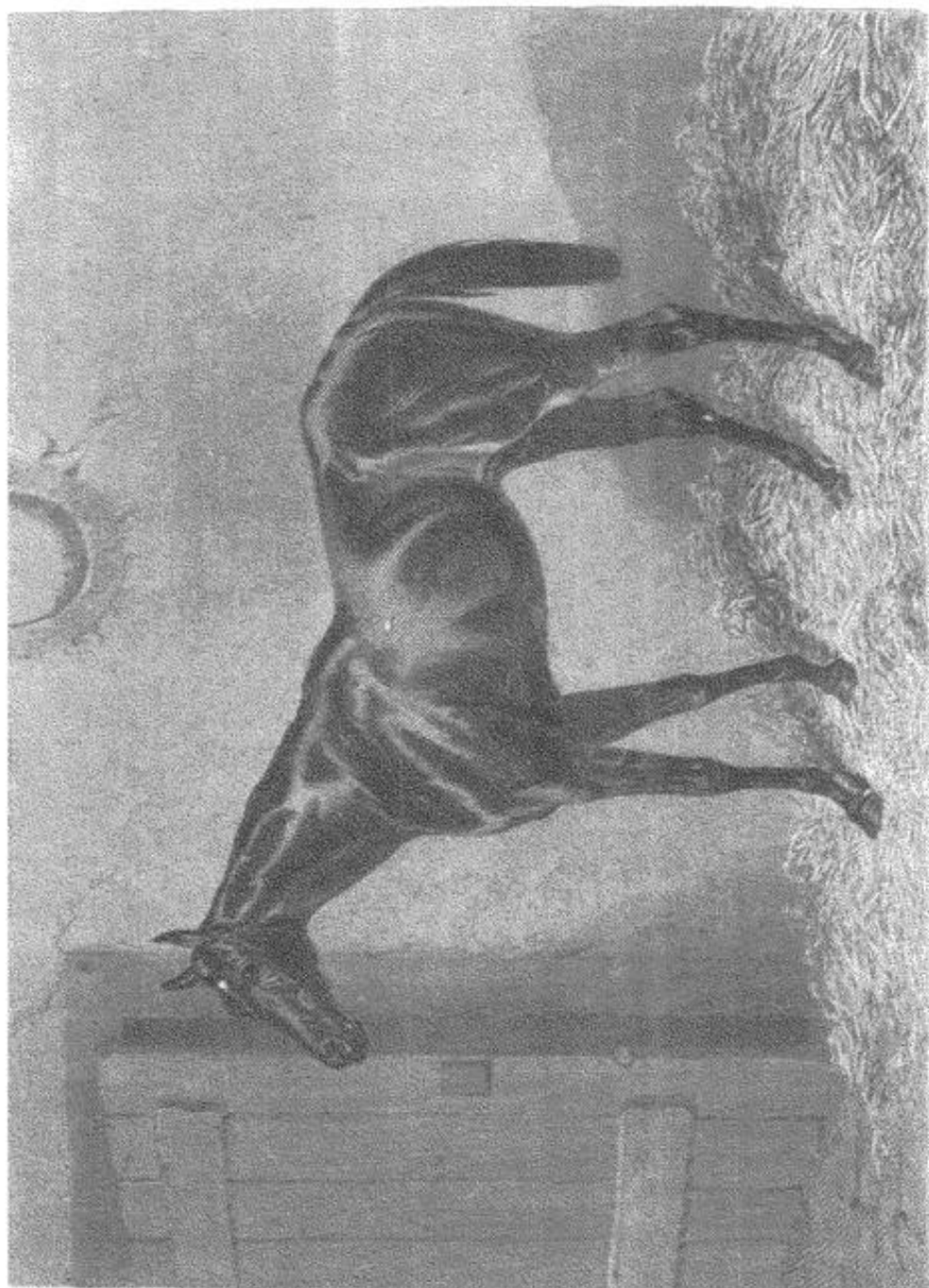

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FISHERMAN.

FISHERMAN was a bay colt, foaled in 1853, the property of W. S. Halford, Esq. He was got by Heron (a son of Bustard, by Castrel), out of Mainbrace, by Sheet Anchor, out of a mare by Bay Middleton, out of Nitocris (sister to Memnon), by Whisker, out of Manuella, by Dick Andrews, out of Mandane, by Pot8o's, out of Young Camilla, by Woodpecker, out of Camilla, by Trentham, &c.

Fisherman was purchased from Mr. Halford by Mr. Thomas Parr, of Benham, Berks, at the Liverpool meeting, in 1855. "In after times," says "The Druid," "Mr. Parr loved to tell how he was wont to humour Fisherman either with a long gallop, or a short one, but he never left him long without work. Mr. Parr never ceased referring to the 65lbs, and head-beating, which Fisherman gave to Misty Morn (the winner that year—1858—of twelve races), and which performance he regarded as Fisherman's greatest triumph out of all his sixty-seven victories."

Fisherman won twenty-three Queen's Plates, two Queen's Vases, nine Cups, and Stakes innumerable, beating such horses as Warlock, Ellington, Mélissa, Mincepic, Gemma-di-Vergy, Artillery, Sirius, Lord Nelson, Chevalier d'Industrie, Leamington, Black Tommy, Skirmisher, Saunterer, Misty Morn, Gildermire, Arsenal, Sunbeam, Ignoramus, North Lincoln, Lifeboat, Newcastle, &c.

Fordham), and two others. At Goodwood, 10st 4lbs not placed for the Bentinck Memorial Plate, of £1243 (handicap), won by Mr. Ten Broeck's ch. c. Starke (bred in America), by Wagner, four years, 8st; fifteen ran. At York, 9st 7lbs (Wells), ran second for the Queen's Plate, won by Lord Stamford's ch. c. 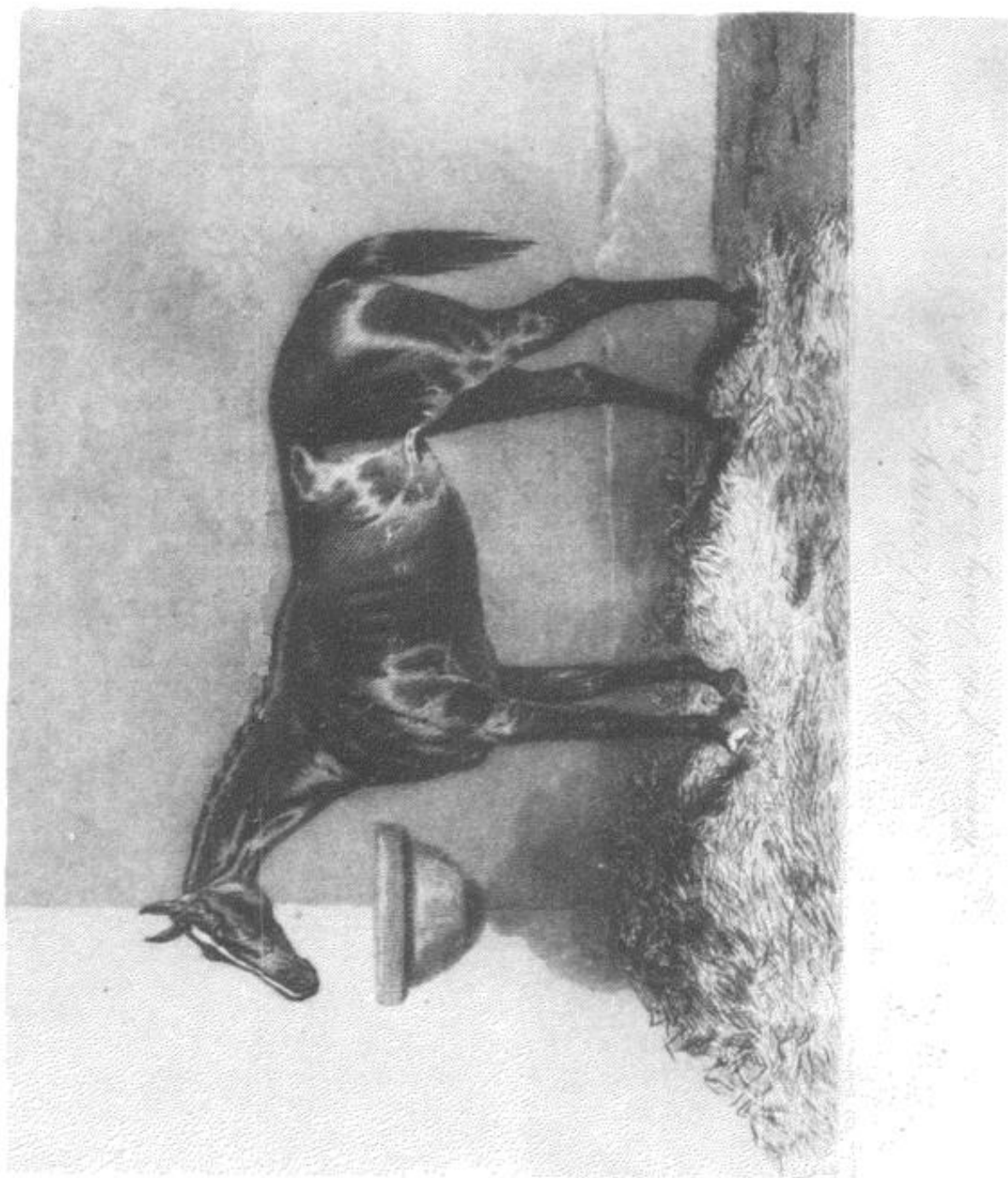
Modern race-goers knew little or nothing of Tom Parr, as he was familiarly called, who died in obscurity and poverty, paralyzed with old age, within a mile of the little town of Wantage, Berkshire, in January, 1880. But Tom Parr was, nevertheless, in his day, a great power on the Turf. He began his career in 1843, with Young Lochinvar, by Tipple Cider (a son of Defence), and which he purchased from Mr. Treen, but he made a poor show until 1852, when he bought Weathergage for 60 gs. At this point his luck turned, and the Benham horses (including Gaspard, a ch. c., by Daniel O'Rourke, and Lupellus, by Loup-garou), achieved as great a name as those of Danebury and Russley. But misfortunes again dogged his footsteps, until at length the once famous "Puce and white," so often to the fore in many of the great races, died completely away.

BLINK BONNY.

BLINK BONNY was a b. f., foaled in 1854, bred by, and the property of, Mr. William l'Anson, of Malton. She was got by Melbourne, out of Queen Mary (bred by Mr. W. R. Ramsay in 1843), by Gladiator, out of a mare by Plenipotentiary, out of Myrrha, by Whalebone, out of Gift (bred by Lord Egremont in 1818), by Young Gohanna, out of sister to Grazier, by Sir Peter, out of sister to Aimator (bred by Lord Clermont in 1788), by Trumpator, her dam, by Herod, out of a mare by Old Snap, her dam, by Lord Gower's bay stallion (son of the Godolphin Arabian), out of a dau. of the Duke of Devonshire's Flying Childers, &c. Blink Bonny was really a yellow-bay mare, her colour inclining, in parts, to a dull tint. She stood fifteen hands two and a half inches high, having a clean, blood-like head, tapering rather towards the nose. She had also a slightly white fore-fetlock joint. The white blaze in her face greatly resembled that of West Australian. Her neck was strong and muscular, but somewhat lengthy, her nostrils wide, and her ears rather wide apart. She had great depth of shoulder and girth, was very good through the knees, and well ribbed up. Her quarters, rising on the rump, and drooping towards the tail, which was a thin switch, and which she carried close to her, tended to give her a somewhat mean appearance. She had good thighs, hocks, arms, and knees, but she was not by any means a lengthy animal. Blink Bonny did very well till the autumn of 1856, when the harassing dentition fever, which was always peculiarly severe with the Melbourne stock, set in, and she sank, as Blooming Heather had done before her, to a perfect skeleton. She was the first of the family l'Anson had ever trained as a two year old, and she had a strange propensity of leaning to the off side, as if she were shrinking from some unseen fury on the near side. On her journey up to Epsom for the Derby, she seemed to have improved both in vigour and confidence, and when she galloped on the Tuesday with Strathnaver, on the Epsom Downs, she drew right

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away from him with her head down, and going in her best two-year-old form, setting back her ears, and flinging up her tail, as if she meant vengeance. In the race I'Anson saw her off in the ruck, hard held by Charlton, but although he swept the thirty horses, backwards and forwards, with his glasses, he could never find Charlton's yellow cap again till they were close at home. Mr. W. Scott, Sir Lydston Newman's stud groom, took a great liking to Blink Bonny, and advised Lord Londesborough to buy her, the price being £3000, conditional on her being trained by Mr. I'Anson. His lordship not conceding this point, the bargain was off. At the Northallerton meeting, in October, 1856, Mr. I'Anson refused 5000 gs. for her, offered by Mr. John Jackson, the owner of Saunterer. IMPERIEUSE.

IMPERIEUSE was a bay filly, bred at the Hampton Court Paddocks, in 1854, the property of Mr. Newland. She was got by Orlando, out of Eulogy, by Euclid, out of Martha Lynn, by Mulatto, out of Leda, by Filho-da-Putá, out of Treasure, by Cansillus, out of a mare by Hyacinthus, out of Flora, by King Fergus, out of Atalanta (bred by Mr. Coates in 1769), by Matchem, out of Lass of the Mill by Oroonoko, out of sister to Clark's Lass of the Mill, by Old Traveller, &c., &c.

Imperieuse was a rich bay filly, standing fifteen hands and three inches high. She had a plain head, with large ears, but a very expressive eye, a blood-like neck, and extremely good shoulders. She had great depth of girth, and was particularly thick through, a long back, wide hips, and quarters a little drooping, and was immensely powerful about her stifles, thighs, and gaskins. She had, also, very good hocks and knees; and, though not very large in the bone, was wiry and sound. Altogether, she was a handsome, blood-like filly; and nothing could have looked better than she did on the St. Leger day. Her's was the fourteenth St. Leger John Scott had won, but the first with one of his own horses.

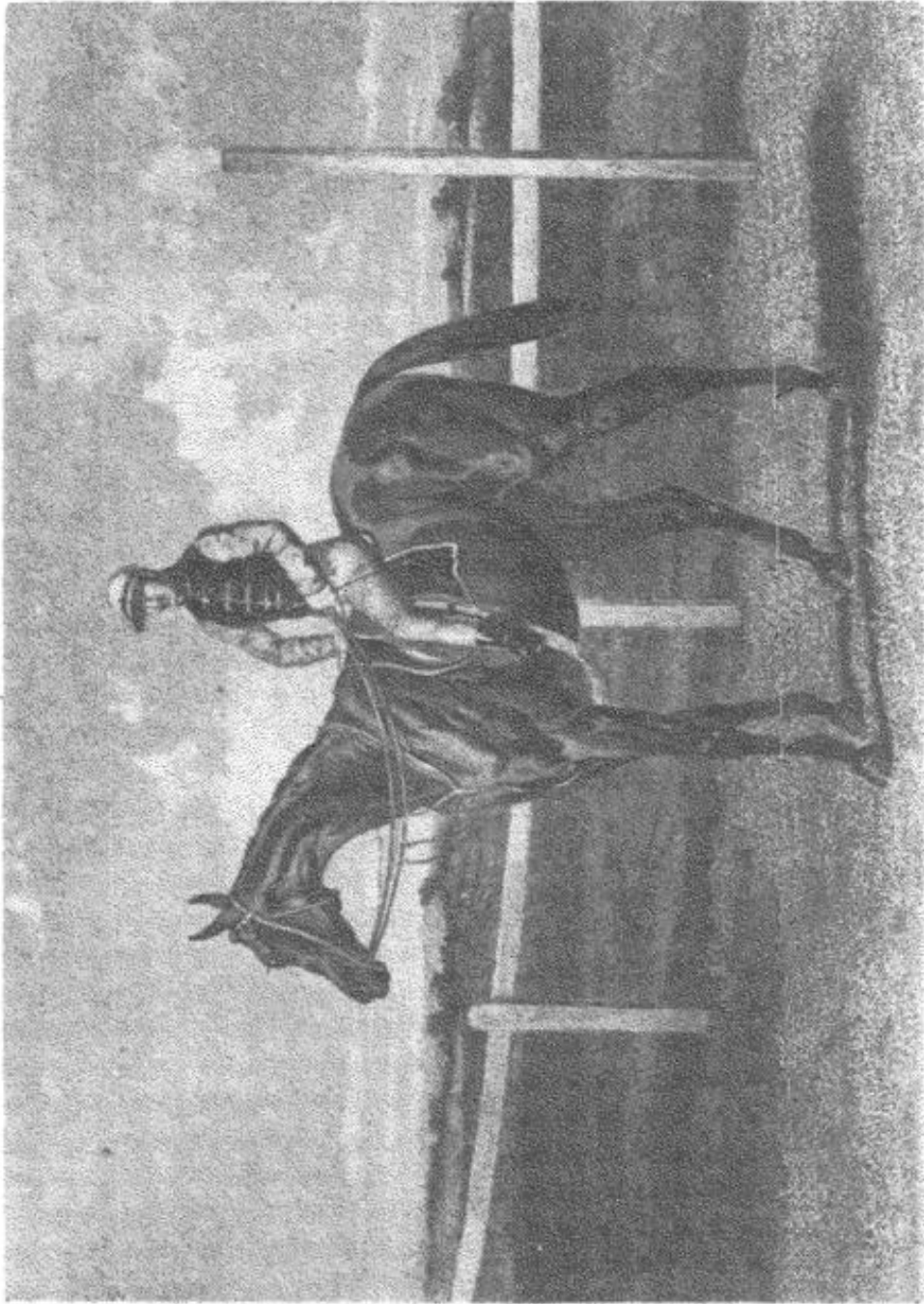

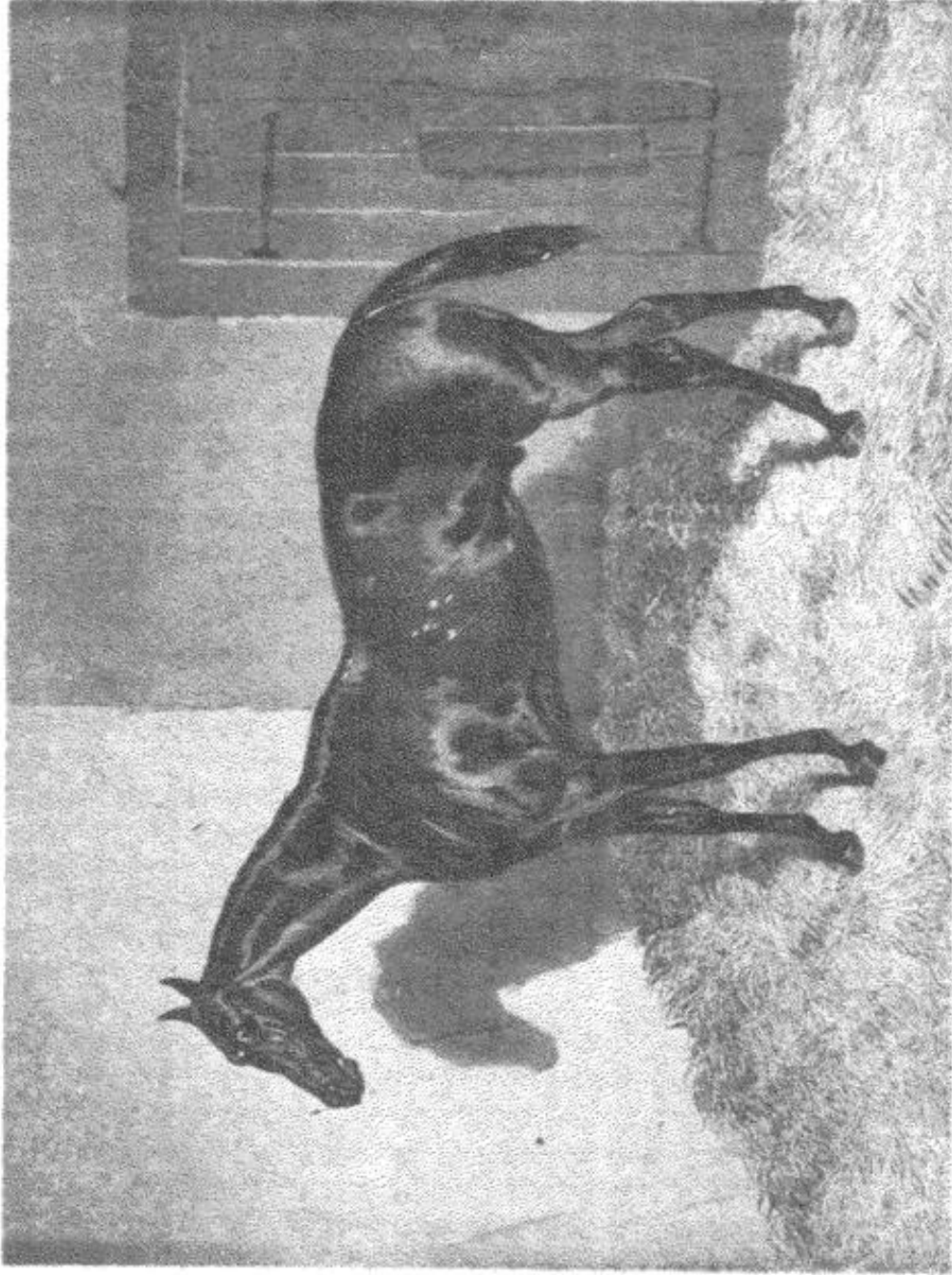

This St. Leger was considered so safe a thing for Blink Bonny, that her numerous supporters made some very severe comments on her running, and did not scruple to insinuate unfair play on the part of her owner. Mr. P'Anson's defence, however, of Blink Bonny's running was thoroughly straightforward and honest, and admitted to be so by the public. The statement about the winner was not so easy to solve. John Scott declared that he had not backed his filly for a shilling, though it was well known, many days before the Doncaster Meeting, that hundreds in Yorkshire had heaped their money on her. Whence came the inspiration? She wins the 1000 Guineas, is beaten twenty lengths in the Oaks, runs unplaced in a Consolation Scramble, at York, and is then backed, and *heavily too*, for the St. Leger, and wins it. And yet we are asked to believe that Mr. John Scott did not back her for a shilling!

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SAUNTERER.

SAUNTERER was a black colt, bred by Mr. R. M. Jaques, in 1854, and purchased when a foal by Mr. John Osborne at the Easby sale, for £50, passing subsequently into the hands of Mr. John Jackson, by whom he was sold, at the end of 1857, to Mr. Jas. Merry for £2100. He was got by Irish Birdcatcher, out of Ennui, by Bay Middleton, out of Blue Devils, by Velocipede, out of Care, by Woful, out of Camarine's Dam by Rubens, out of Tippitywitchet by Waxy, out of Hare by Sweetbriar, out of a mare by Justice. Saunterer was just fifteen hands three inches high. He had a very expressive, blood-like head, with a full and prominent eye. His neck was well set into his head, and was slightly arched. His shoulders were good and clean, his girth was very deep, and he had a good barrel. His loins were very arched, his quarters, though small, were muscular, and drooping towards the tail. He had good thighs, the true Birdcatcher hocks, fine arms, small knees, and legs always as clean as a foal's. He had a thin switch tail, which he was always whisking about, and also the habit of invariably throwing back his ears. He always trained light, and had a wonderful bloom on his coat, and, when in the humour, could race and stay with the best of his year. Altogether he was a handsome specimen of the thoroughbred. Saunterer died in September, 1878, aged twenty-four years. Despite his great merits as a racer, his fine breeding and splendid conformation, he was certainly a failure at the Stud. His Derby lot was cast in an extraordinary good year; but before the end of the season, he had distinguished himself rarely, and, in the Cambridgeshire, for which he was handicapped at 8st 12lbs, he won the large bet Mr. Jackson had made that "he would finish within ten lengths of the winner." He finished third, and the performance has always been regarded as one of the most remarkable on record. After his purchase by Mr. Merry, at a very inadequate sum for

such a horse, he was placed under Matt Dawson's care, and was known in racing circles as "Matt's Black." In his new colours (yellow jacket, and black cap) he won the Goodwood Cup, a victory generally believed to have occasioned the suicide of a nobleman, who had laid heavily against him, on account of his supposed want of stamina, and who disregarded Mr. Merry's assurance that, in this respect, he was wholly mistaken. Ennui, Saunterer's dam, was bred by Lord George Bentinck in 1843, and was a very fair racer. Eventually she became the property of Mr. Jaques, and was the dam of Dear-Me and Alas! by Melbourne, of Bravery by Gameboy, and of Saunterer, and was then sold to Lord Londesborough for 95 gs. Ennui won the great Four Year Old Stake at Goodwood, in 1847.

He was got by Sir Hercules, out of Snowdrop by Heron, out of Fairy by Filho-da-Putá, out of Britannia by Orville, out of a mare by Coriander (son of Pot8o's), out of Sister to Fanny by Weasel, out of a mare by Turk (son of Regulus), her dam, by Locust (son of Old Crab), out of Sister to Drudge by Old Crab, out of a mare by the Duke of Rutland's Black Barb, &c.

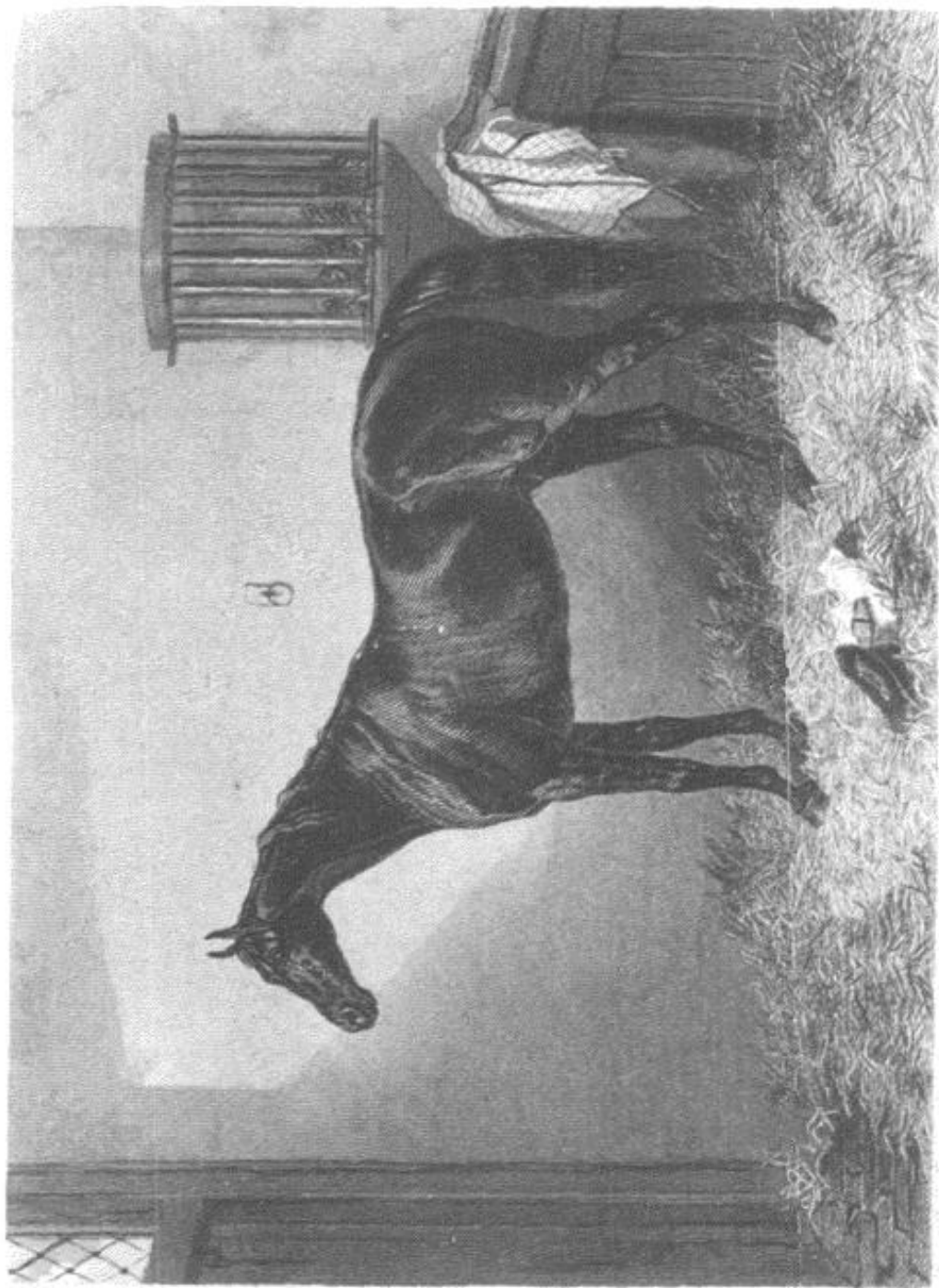

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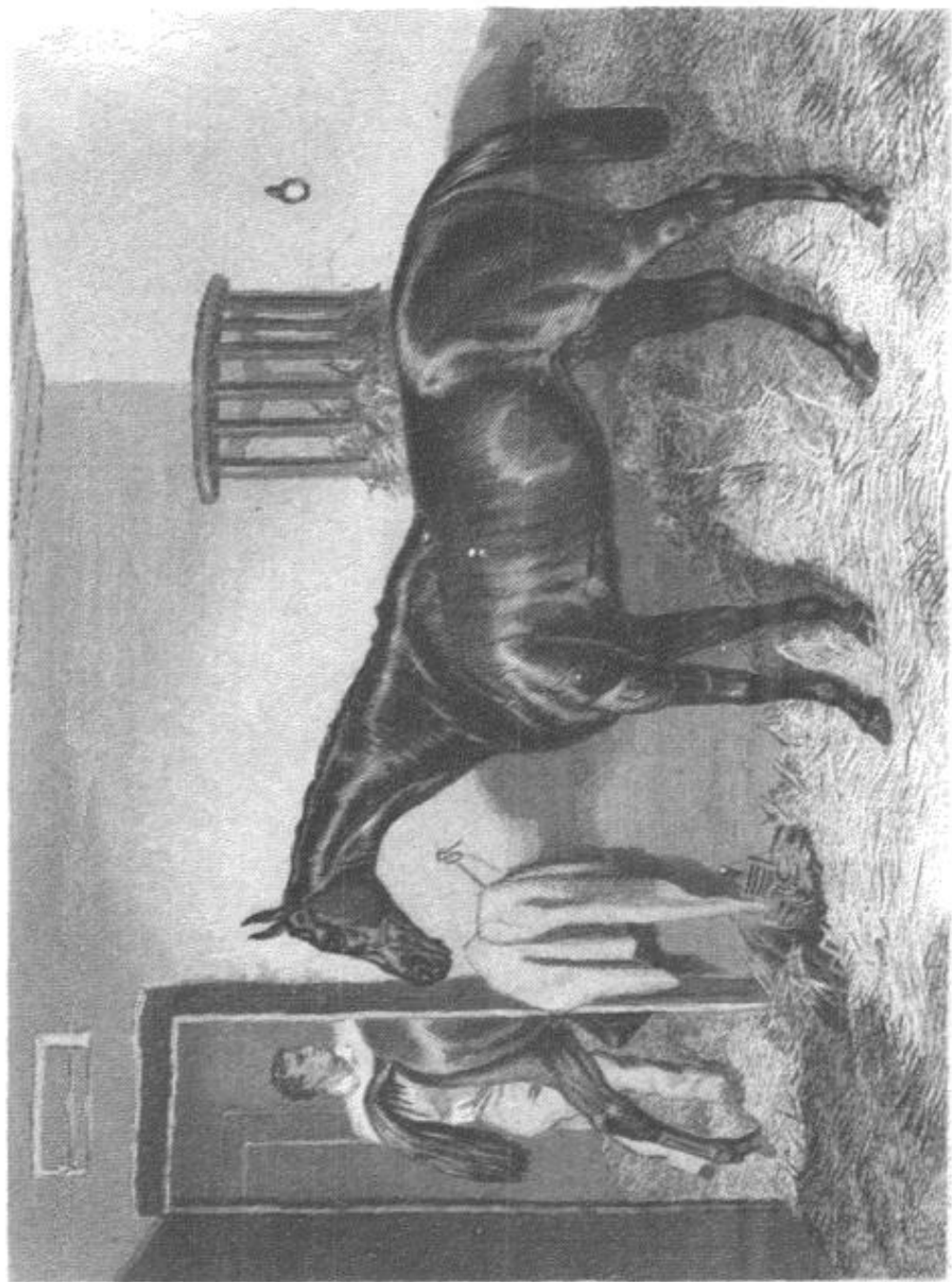

At Warwick, 8st 9lbs (Kendall), won a Nursery Handicap for two years old, of £345, beating Mr. Dawson's br. c. Little Cob by Sweetmeat, 6st 5lbs (Chaloner), by a head, Lord Ribblesdale's b. c. Companion by Womersley, 6st, third; also, Lord Anglesey's b. c. Cedric by Touchstone, 6st 13lbs, b. c. Fright by Alarm, and seven others. Gemma ran in five other races, this year, without success.

1857.

At Warwick (Spring), 7st (Fordham), ran second in the Trial Stakes, won by Mr. Parr's br. c. Fisherman, four years, 8st 9lbs (Wells), by a length; 5 to 4 against Gemma, and 2 to 1 against Fisherman; five ran. At Northampton, 8st 13lbs (Kendall), won the Whittlebury Stakes, of £310, beating Mr. Verrall's br. c. Volatore by Voltigeur, two years, 6st 8lbs (Fordham), and five others. S. mg., 9st 1lb (Kendall), won the Racing Stakes, of £180, beating Lord Ribblesdale's b. c. St. Giles (winner, this year, of the Great Northampton Stakes of £1095, and the Shrewsbury Handicap of £588), by Womersley, 9st 1lb (Hibberd), by half a length, Mr. Parr's ch. c. Sir Colin, by Robert de Gorham, 8st 5lbs (Wells), third, and four others; 11 to 10 against Gemma and 6 to 4 against St. Giles; all three years old. At Newmarket Craven, 8st 10lbs each (Kendall), won a sweep of £150, beating Mr. Barber's ch. c. Lord Nelson by Collingwood (Nat), by a neck; 3 to 1 on Gemma. S. mg., 8st 13lbs (Kendall), for three years old, won a sweep of £175, again beating Lord Nelson, 8st 13lbs (Nat), by a neck, as before, and the Duke of Bedford's b. f. Cruzada by Cowl, 8st 6lbs (S. Rogers). At Chester, 6st 12lbs (R. Bullock), won £130, beating Mr. Padwick's ch. c. Drumour by Weatherbit, three years, 7st 3lbs (winner of the July Stakes at Newmarket in 1856), ridden by Fordham, by a head, Fisherman, 8st 7lbs (Wells), third,

Mr. Merry's b. c. Honour Bright by Touchstone, three years, 6st 12lbs, fourth, Vandermulen (winner of the Lincoln Handicap in 1858), four years, 8st 7lbs, fifth, and ch. f. Melissa, four years, 8st 9lbs, last; 5 to 4 on Gemma. S. mg., 6st 11lbs (Bullock), not placed for the Cup, won by Leamington, beating Drumour (the property of Mr. Henry Padwick), 6st 3lbs, by a neck, and thirty-two others. S. mg., 7st 9lbs, won £70 (D. Hughes), beating Fisherman, four years, 9st 2lbs (Wells), by a head; 7 to 4 on Gemma. At Ascot, 6st 10lbs (Hughes), ran second for the Cup, won by Lord Zetland's br. c. Skirmisher by Voltigeur, three years, 6st 10lbs (Charlton), by a length, beating Mr. Jackson's bl. c. Saunterer by Irish Birdcatcher, three years, 7st 10lbs (Bray), third, a head only behind Gemma; twelve ran, among them being Pretty Boy, Winkfield, Leamington, Chevalier-d'Industrie, Warlock, and Rogerthorpe; 4 to 1 against Skirmisher, and 7 to 1 against Gemma. At Goodwood, 7st 9lbs (Aldcroft), not placed for the Cup, won by Count Lagrange's b. h. Monarque by The Emperor, five years, 8st 9lbs (Ashmall), beating Mr. Merry's gr. c. Riseber, by Chanticleer, three years, 7st 2lbs (Bray), by a head, Fisherman, 9st 1lb (Wells) third, and ten others. Gemma first favourite; 11 to 2 against Riseber, and 100 to 7 against Monarque. Gemma ran once more, this year, without success, and four times in 1858, without adding to his former triumphs, but also without lowering his reputation, and retired to the Stud.

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UNDERHAND.

UNDERHAND was a bay colt foaled in 1854, the property of Mr. G. Foster. He was got by The Cure (son of Physician), out of Contraction by Emilius, out of Ophelia, by Bedlamite, out of Lady of the Lake by Sorcerer, her dam, by Sultan (son of Eclipse), out of a mare by Herod, out of Thisbe by Mr. Latham's Snap (son of Old Snap), out of Sappho by Regulus, out of Mr. Lodge's roan mare by Old Partner.

"Underhand," writes "The Druid," "was a very small colt, and was foaled at the Consett Iron Works, from one of whose functionaries he derived his name. His style of carrying his head very high, in his gallop, led to the belief that he could not stay. This was a great mistake, as was proved in his long races; but, in a waiting race, his great speed always enabled him to run through his horses, even under very heavy weights. Aldcroft rode him admirably, his tender and patient nursing enabling him to win if it was possible. He very nearly won the Northumberland Plate four years in succession; and no horse, save Underhand, ever ran in the same handicap for five out of his six seasons, and not only win it three times, but finish by being second. Underhand was a trifle under fifteen hands."

(Wells), beating br. c. Herne, four years, 6st 4lbs (Tom Chaloner), by two lengths, and thirty others. S. mg., 8st 3lbs (Aldcroft), ran second for the Stewards' Cup, of £605, won by Tunstall Maid, four years, 6st 13lbs (Bullock), by half a length; eleven ran. At Newcastle, 8st 12lbs (Aldcroft), won the Northumberland Plate, of £540, beating Mr. J. Shelly's br. c. Lifeboat (winner, this year, of the Great Metropolitan, at Epsom), by Sir Hercules, four years, 8st 9lbs (Luke Snowden), by a neck, br. f. Hepatica, by Voltigeur, four years, 8st 1lb, and nine others; 3 to 1 against Hepatica, and 100 to 8 against Underhand. At York (August), 9st 1lb (Aldcroft), won the Great Ebor Handicap, of £560, beating Mr. Chilton's b. f. Archduchess, by Cossack, three years, 5st 12lbs (Jas. Grimshaw), by a length, Mr. Ten Broeck's ch. c. Starke (bred in America, and winner, this year, of the Goodwood Stakes, and in 1860 of the Goodwood Cup), by Wagner, four years, 8st 8lbs, third, and ten others; 7 to 2 against Starke, and 8 to 1 against Underhand. 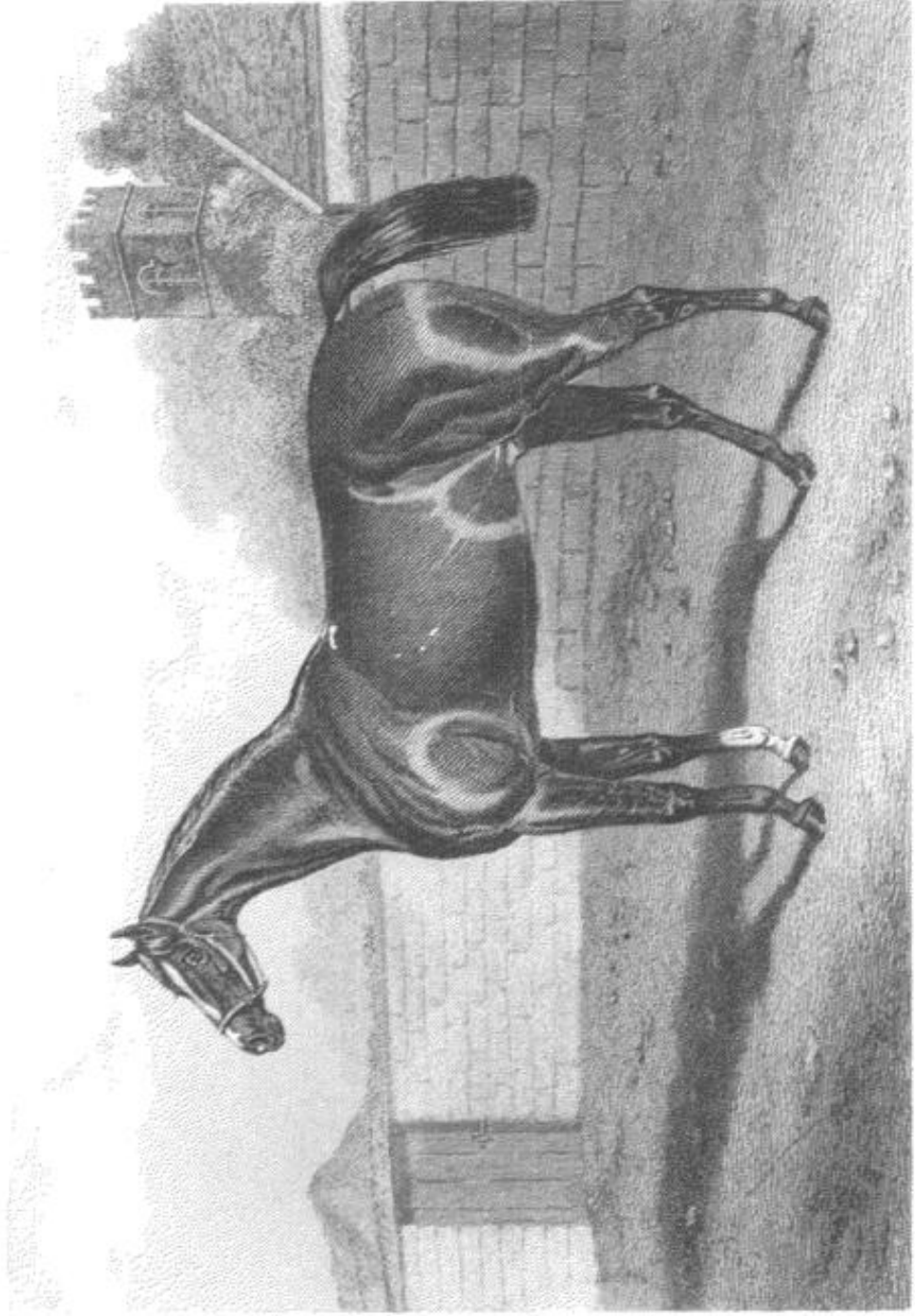

At Carlisle, w. o. for the Queen's Plate. At Liverpool, 9st 9lbs (Aldcroft), won the Queen's Plate easily; four ran. At Edinburgh, 9st 9lbs (Aldcroft), won the Queen's Plate, but was unsuccessful in ten other races this year, though he ran second to First Lord in the Northumberland Plate.

1861.

At Chester, 8st 8lbs (Aldcroft), won a Handicap Plate, of 100 sovs., beating thirteen others; and at Edinburgh, 10st 2lbs, won the Cup. He ran three times more, without success, and retired to the Stud.

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CHEVALIER-D'INDUSTRIE.

CHEVALIER-D'INDUSTRIE was a ch. c. bred by C. F. Greville, Esq., in 1854, and sold to Mr. H. Padwick. He was got by Orlando, out of Industry, by Priam, out of Arachne (bred by Thomas Houldsworth, Esq., in 1822), by Filho-da-Putai, out of Treasure (bred by Wm. Garforth, Esq., in 1810), by Camillus, out of a mare by Hyacinthus, out of Flora (bred by Mr. Garforth in 1789), by King Fergus, out of Atalanta by Match'em, out of Lass of the Mill by Oroonoko (son of Old Crab), &c., &c. Chevalier-d'Industrie was a rich chestnut, well set off with some of the Orlando markings, and standing over sixteen hands high. He had a neat head, set on to a good strong neck, with excellent shoulders, a capital barrel, and a rare good back. He had great width across the hips, famous quarters and thighs, with fine muscular arms, and strong legs, which were decidedly short. His temper was sweet, and he carried himself very grandly. The Chevalier stood at Mr. Theobald's Stud Farm, at Enfield, in 1859, at Mr. Mitchell's, near Worthing, in 1860-61 and 62. He was then purchased by the Messrs. Painter, whose Stud Farm was close to Stafford, where he remained till 1866. He was afterwards sold, under the hammer, to Mr. Gulliver, for 500 gs. Several of his stock were winners, but none of them half so good as Mr. Pryor's Friponnier. The Chevalier, however, did not beget a Derby, Oaks, or St. Leger-winner; but his son, Friponnier, did more, for in 1866, he beat the winner of the Derby and St. Leger, and, in 1867, he beat the winners of both the Derby and the Oaks.

THE CHEVALIER'S PERFORMANCES.

1856.

At Northampton (now Mr. Padwick's), 6st 4lbs (Fordham), won a sweep of £355, beating Lord Anglesey's b. f. Tricolor, by Touchstone,

two years, 6st 4lbs (Cresswell), second, Mr. Gully's ch. c. Hurdle by Nutwith, two years, 6st 7st, third, and four others. At Newmarket (July), colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 4lbs (Wells), in the Chesterfield Stakes, of £670, he ran a dead-heat with Lord Glasgow's unnamed ro. c. by Hernandez (Aldcroft); but, in the deciding heat, was beaten by a head, Mr. May's ch. f. Cantrip by Windhound (son of Pantaloon), being third; eight ran; 6 to 4 on the Chevalier; and after the dead-heat, 2 to 1 on him. At Goodwood, colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 4lbs (Wells), ran second in the Bentinck Memorial, of £296, won by Mr. I'Anson's b. f. Blink Bonny, by Melbourne (Robert I'Anson), beating Lord Portsmouth's ch. f. Ayacanora by Irish Birdcatcher, third, and one other. Won by three-quarters of a length, four lengths between second and third. At Doncaster, 6st 10lbs not placed in the Eglinton Stakes, of £415, won by Mr. Douglas' b. c. Tournament by Touchstone, two years, 6st 10lbs (Fordham), beating Mr. Harrison's b. c. Strathnaver by Flatcatcher, two years, 6st 3lbs (Withington), second, Gemma-di-Vergy, two years, 6st 10lbs (Bates), third, and five others; 6 to 4 against Gemma-di-Vergy, 5 to 2 against the winner and 6 to 1 against The Chevalier. At Newmarket (First October), colts 8st 7lbs, fillies 8st 4lbs (Wells), ran third, in the Triennial, of £390, won by Lord J. Scott's ch. f. Mæstissima by Pyrrhus the First (Kendall), beating Ayacanora* (A. Day), by a neck, and seven others, a dead-heat between second and third; 6 to 4 against Mæstissima, and 5 to 1 against The Chevalier.

1857.

At Epsom (Goater), was not placed in the Derby, won by Blink Bonny. S. mg., 6st 11lbs (Fordham), ran second for the Cup, won by Mr. Parr's ch. c. Sir Colin. At Ascot, 8st 7lbs (J. Goater), ran third, in the Ascot Derby, of £450, won by The Baron's ch. c. Sydney by Surplice, 8st 7lbs (D. Hughes), beating Lord Exeter's br. c. Turbit by Woodpigeon, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), second, and one other. S. mg., 6st 10lbs (Fordham), not placed for the Cup, won by Lord Zetland's br. c. Skirmisher by Voltigeur, three years, 6st 10lbs (Charlton), beating Gemma-di-Vergy, three years, 6st 10lbs, by a length (Hughes), Mr. Jackson's bl. c. Saunterer, three years, 6st 10lbs (Bray), third, and eight others. At Goodwood, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the Gratwicke Stakes, of £1000, beating Mr. W. Stirling

Crawfurd's b. c. Zuyder Zee (winner, this year, of the Houghton Handicap at Newmarket), by Orlando, 8st 10lbs (G. Oates), by four lengths, ch. f. Mœstissima, 8st 2lbs (Kendall), third, Lord Glasgow's unnamed colt by The Dutchman, 8st 7lbs (Aldcroft), fourth, and Sir J. B. Mill's b. f. Bar-One by Orlando, 8st 2lbs (A. Day), last; 6 to 4 against The Chevalier, 5 to 2 against Zuyder Zee, and 6 to 1 against Mœstissima, all three years old. S. mg., 8st 7lbs (Fordham), in the Bentinck Memorial Stakes, of £296, was beaten, twenty lengths, by Mr. l'Anson's b. f. Blink Bonny, by Melbourne, out of Queen Mary, three years, 8st 3lbs (Charlton): only these two ran; 6 to 1 on Blink Bonny. At Brighton, w. o. for the Cup. At Hereford, 7st 7lbs (Fordham), ran third for the Royal Plate, of 300 sovs., won by br. c. Fisherman (now Captain Starky's), four years, 9st 1lb (Wells), beating Lord De Mauley's br. c. Cotswold by Newcourt (son of Sir Hercules), four years, 8st 1lb (Wakefield), by a neck, and Lord Clifton's ch. f. Melissa by Surplice, four years, 8st 6lbs, last; 7 to 2 on Fisherman. This was the Chevalier's last race. At the sale of Mr. Greville's yearlings, in 1855, Chevalier-d'Industrie was knocked down to Mr. Padwick (who ran his horses under the name of Howard), for 255 gs. Old John Day was just then retiring from public; and the big chestnut colt was trained by Mr. Goater at Findon. Mr. E. Corbet, who painted Chevalier-d'Industrie, said that he was one of the finest horses ever put upon canvas.

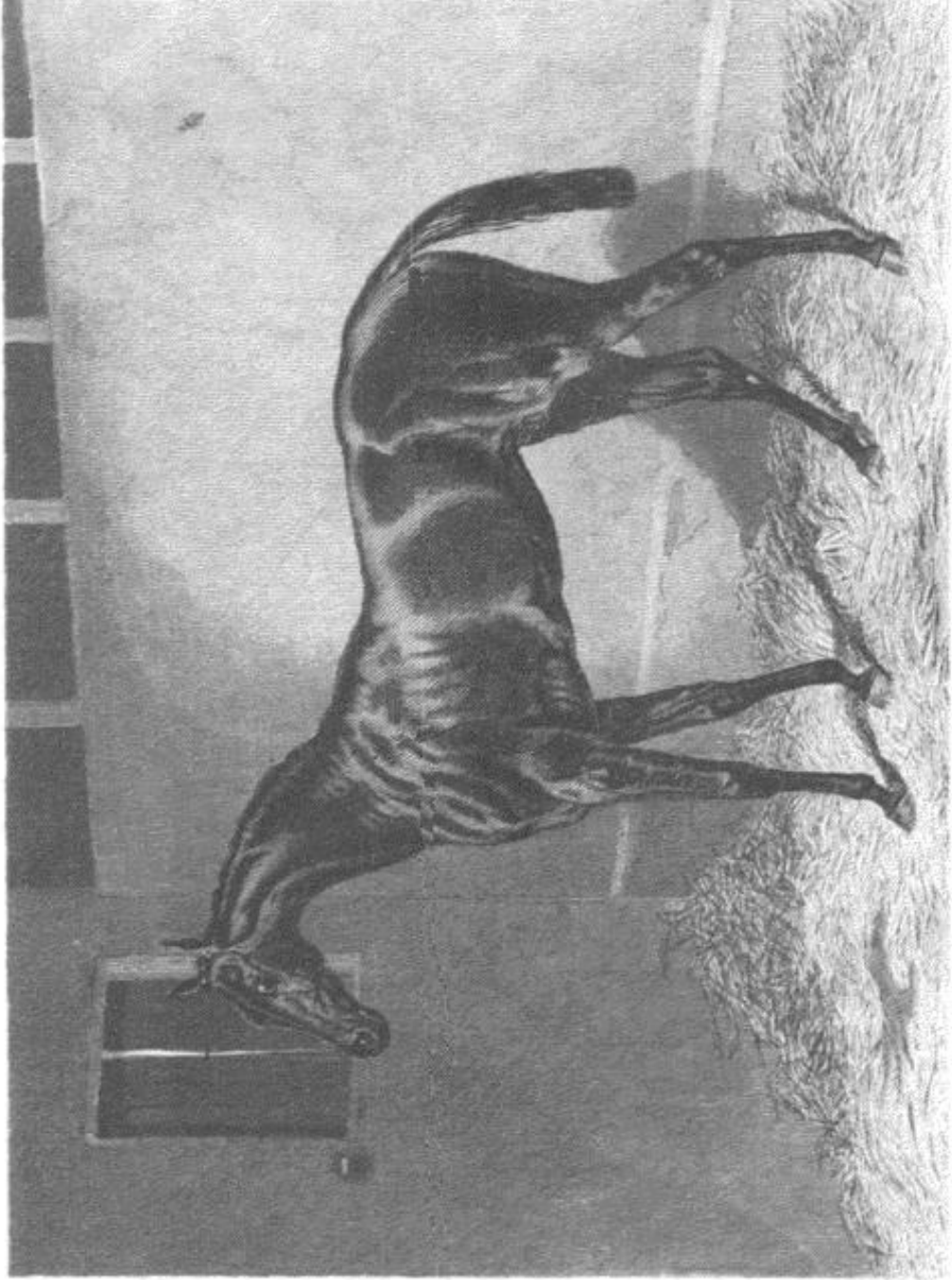
BEADSMAN.

BEADSMAN was a br. c. foaled in 1855, bred by, and the property of, Sir Joseph Hawley, Bart. He was got by Weatherbit, out of Mendicant, by Touchstone, out of Lady Moore Carew (bred by Mr. Allanson in 1830), by Tramp, out of Kite (bred by Lord Stamford in 1821), by Bustard (son of Castrel), out of Olympia (bred by Lord Stamford in 1815), by Sir Oliver, out of Scotilla (bred by his Lordship in 1795), by Anvil, out of Scota (bred by Mr. O'Kelly in 1783), by Eclipse, out of Harmony (bred by the Duke of Ancaster in 1775), by Herod, out of Rutilia (bred by his Grace in 1769), by Blank, out of a mare, bred by Mr. Scrope in 1751, by Regulus, her dam, by Soreheels (son of Basto), out of a mare, by Makeless (son of the Oglethorpe Arabian), out of the Hon. Christopher d'Arcy's Royal Mare.

“ It is more than probable that the grand blood of Weatherbit would, like that of Defence and other noted sires, have lapsed into oblivion, had it not been for Beadsman. It is true that we still have Brown Bread and Mandrake among us, but it is to Beadsman *alone* that the honour of elevating the Sheet Anchor line into importance is due; stoutness of heart and well-proved staying powers are the chief characteristics of that line. Beadsman, after his Derby victory, did not aspire to Cup-honours, generally held to be necessary to stamp the renown of Blue Ribbon winners; and his Turf career was too short to enable a correct judgment to be formed of his merits as a racehorse. Beadsman was not entered for the St. Leger, and it does seem strange that the names of Teddington, Beadsman, Musjid, and Blue Gown should all have been omitted from the Doncaster entries; and that fate should also have denied to Sir Joseph the glory of the double event with Pero Gomez, which Wells, to his dying day, always asserted he had fairly won—an opinion shared by many who saw that Derby run for. Beadsman was the fifth foal of his

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dam, Mendicant, for whom Sir Joseph gave 2500 gs. after she ran second to St. Lawrence for the Chester Cup in 1847, and with the Emperor's Plate at Ascot in prospective, for which, however, she ran unplaced to John Day's ch. c. The Hero. Mendicant, though disappointing her new owner on the Turf, was nevertheless a mare of the highest class as a racer, and full of that symmetry, quality, and action which make up the beau-ideal of an Oaks winner. Her first foal, by Don John, died young, and Friar Tuck by Old England, Supplicant by Cowl, and Gaberlunzie by Don John, were poor when compared with the result of her union with Weatherbit. Beadsman settled down to stud life, in 1860, at Leyburne Grange, but failed in securing public support, though four of Sir Joseph's best mares were put to him. The year 1863 saw his list slightly enlarged; but it was in his 1864 season that he begat Blue Gown, Green Sleeve, and Rosicrucian, beyond doubt the mightiest two year old hand ever held by any racing man. But, in the year which witnessed the *début* of this glorious trio, their sire was condemned to exile, and placed under the care of Smallwood at Middlethorpe, near York, soliciting in vain a ten guinea fee from the northern breeders. Before this, however, he had begotten The Palmer, and subsequently Pero Gomez, but the grand performance of the glorious trio soon rescued Beadsman from his obscurity, to resume again his position as Grand Master at Leyburne, where he placed both Fitzroland and Asteroid in the shade. Thenceforward he rose high in public estimation. The foreigners early set their hearts on the possession of Blue Gown, whom they secured for 5000 gs.; but he returned to England in 1876, being leased for a term to the Cobham Stud Company, and died on his passage to New York, in 1880." (From *The Sporting and Dramatic News*.)

1858.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 4lbs (Wells), won a sweep of £650, beating Mr. J. Bowes' gr. c. "Beadsman was a very dark brown horse; and the Derby polish, put upon his coat by Manning, is a thing to be remembered by all who saw him in the paddock on that eventful day. Beadsman stood exactly fifteen hands three inches high, was rather light and leggy, and somewhat wanting in bone. His head was large, plain, and lean, with full, prominent eyes, and was well set on to an elegantly-arched neck, so seldom associated with the character of a genuine stayer. His shoulders were upright, and a trifle loaded, but he had a good depth through the heart, and atoned for a rather light barrel and ribs by a very muscular back, with just a little too much length behind the saddle, made still more palpable by his drooping quarters. His thighs and arms were muscular, and his legs perfectly clean and sound. Nothing could possibly be finer than the style in which Beadsman swept past the Stand, at Epsom, to the astonishment both of Lord Derby and Flatman, who believed that the beating which Toxophilite gave him at Goodwood, the year before, when conceding him 8lbs, could not on this occasion, at even weights, be possibly reversed. Sir Joseph won £80,000 on this Derby." (The Druid).

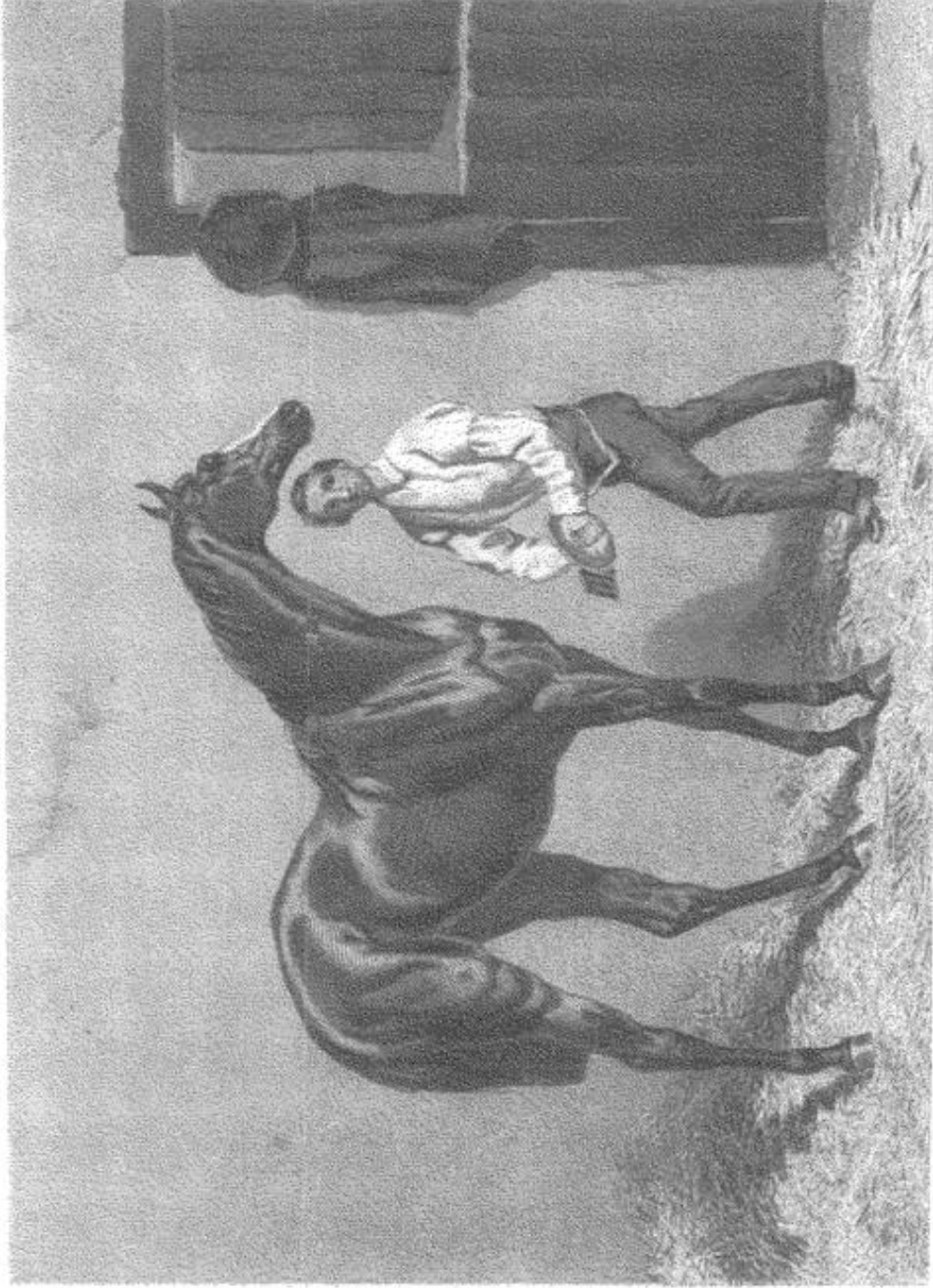

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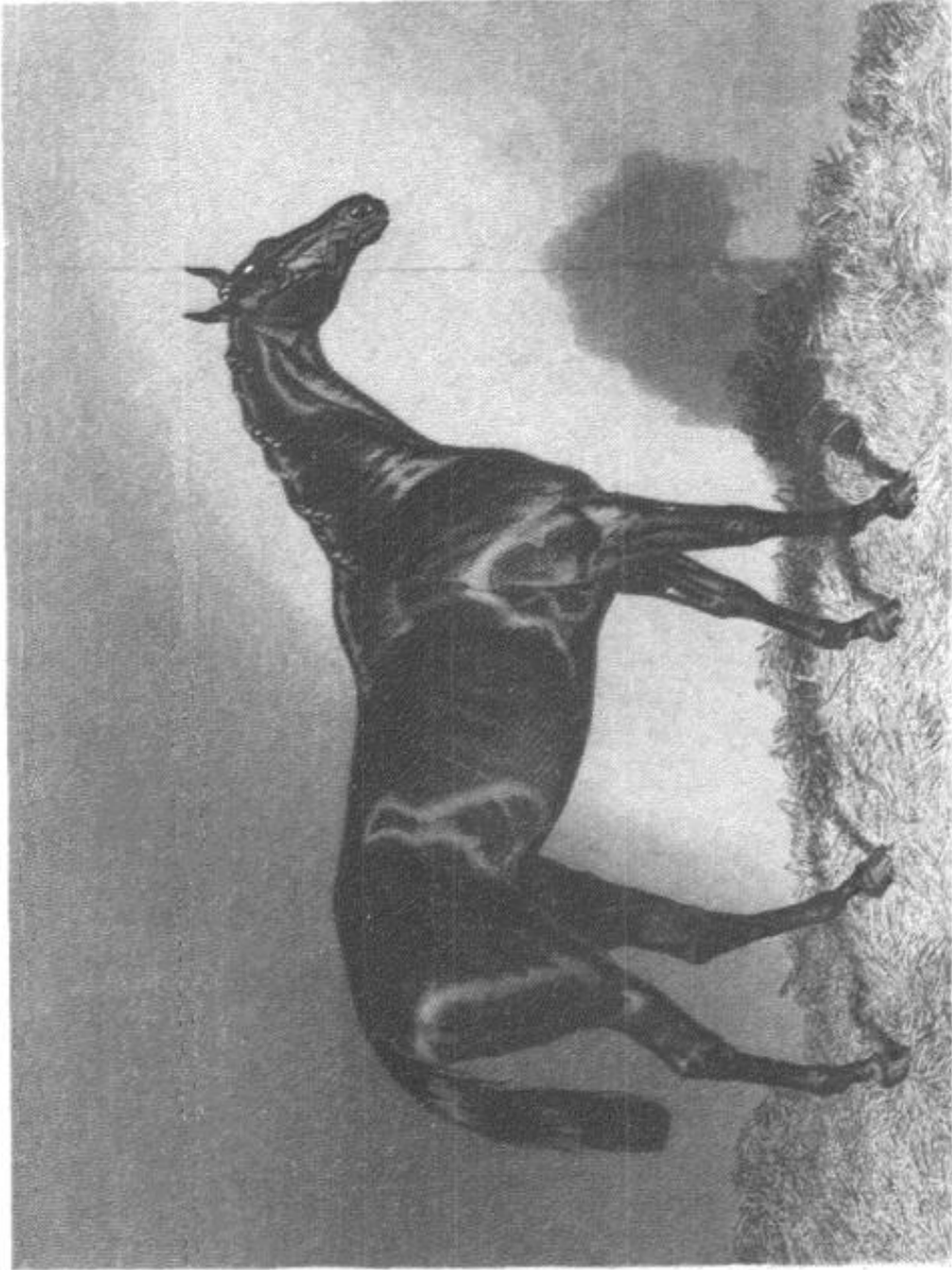

He was got by Newminster, out of Peggy (a bl. m. foaled in 1840), by Muley-Moloch, out of Fanny (bred by Lord Scarborough in 1830), by Jerry, out of Fair Charlotte (sister to Tarrare, bred by his Lordship in 1819), by Catton, out of Henrietta (bred by his Lordship in 1807), by Sir Solomon (son of Sir Peter), out of a sister to Olive (bred by Lord Egremont in 1798), by Woodpecker, out of a mare by Trentham, out of December, by Shakespeare, out of Tuting's Polly (bred by Mr. Blake in 1756), by Black and all Black (also called Othello), out of Fanny, by Tartar (sire of Herod), out of a mare by the Bolton Grey Starling (son of Bay Bolton), out of a daughter of Flying Childers, &c.

“Musjid was one of the Tickhill sticklers. His sire, Newminster, had two seasons there with Tickhill mares; and Tramp, Catton, Barefoot, Langar, Juggler (son of Comus), Cardinal Puff, Hetman Platoff, and Rataplan also figured there for a time, under those ivy-coloured battlements, girdled with a moat, above whose tangled mass of elm and sycamore the gilt Tarrare stands forth, to tell of those blue stripe days when George Nelson (Lord Scarborough's favourite and faithful jockey), seldom missed strolling of a morning to the old castle.” (From “The Druid.”)

SUMMERSIDE.

SUMMERSIDE was a br. f. bred by Admiral Harcourt, in 1856, and was got by West Australian, out of Ellerdale (bred by the Admiral in 1844), by Lanercost, out of a mare by Tomboy, out of Tesane by Whisker, out of Lady of the Tees by Octavian, her dam, by Sancho, out of Miss Furey by Trumpator, out of a mare by Marc Anthony. (For remainder see Ellington). Summerside stood just fifteen hands and two inches high. She had rather a Melbourne frontispiece, with a star in the forehead, a good blood-like neck, capital shoulders, and a rare back and loins. Her quarters were strong and muscular; and she was altogether one of those low, lengthy fillies that the ring so generally dread. Ellerdale, her dam, was an excellent mare, a good third for the Oaks, and a very stout runner up to six years old. The Admiral sold the whole of his thoroughbred stock, with the sole exception of Ellerdale, to Lord Londesborough, in 1858, including Summerside and Eller, the former being the best of West Australian's produce.

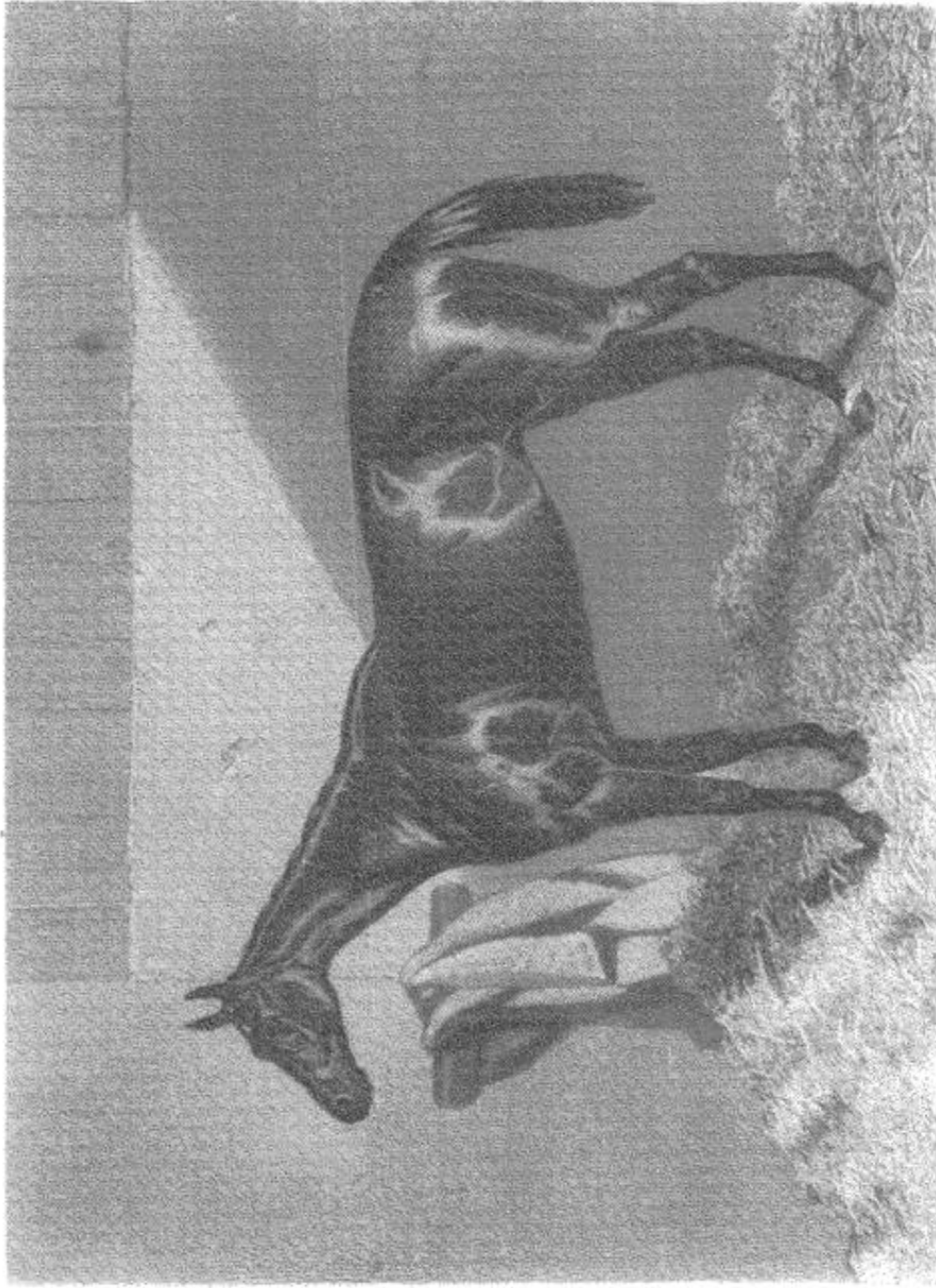

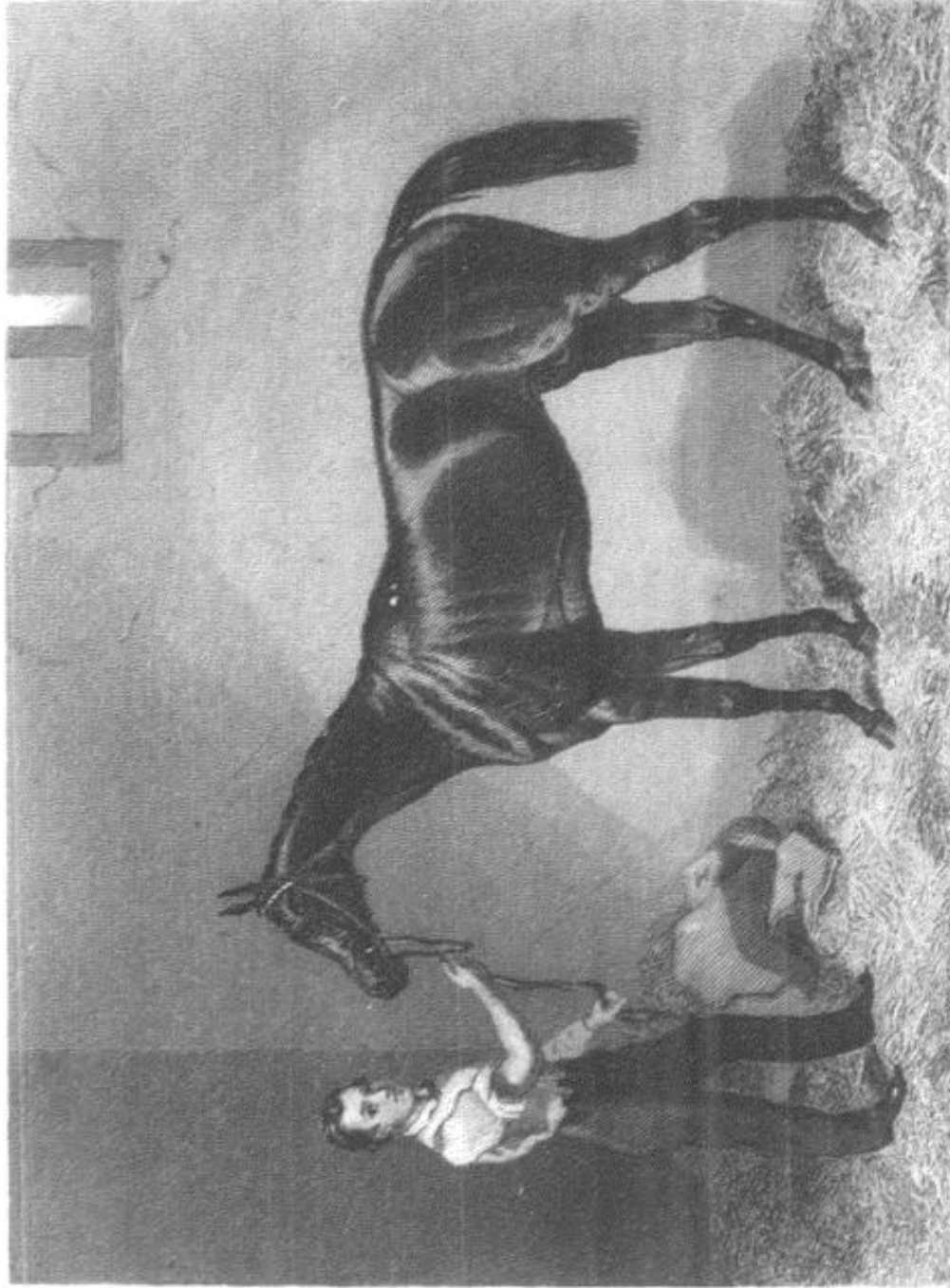

GAMESTER was a brown colt, bred by Sir Charles Monck, Bart., of Belsea Castle, Northumberland, in 1856, and got by The Cossack, out of Gaiety, by Touchstone, out of Cast Steel by Whisker, out of The Twinkle (bred by H. Peirse, in 1821), by Walton, out of a mare by Orville, out of Lisette by Hambletonian, out of Constantia by Walnut, out of Contessina by Young Marske, out of Tuberoze by Herod, her dam, by the Bolton Grey Starling, out of Coughing Polly by Bartlett's Childers, out of a mare by Snake (son of the Lister Turk). Snake was never trained, being incapable of racing by a tumorous swelling that afflicted him in his youth, supposed to have been produced by the sting or bite of some venomous reptile, hence his name of Snake. He was a stallion of high repute.

TRUMPETER was a ch. c. foaled in 1856, the property of Mr. Henry Hill. He was got by Orlando, out of Cavatina by Redshank (son of Sandbeck by Catton), out of Oxygen by Emilius, out of Whizgig by Rubens, out of Penelope by Trumpator, out of Prunella by Highflyer, out of Promise by Snap, out of Julia by Blank, &c., &c. Marionette and Trumpeter, though in the same stable, were never tried together, as two year olds, but they were so, collaterally with Pinsticker (a-ch. f. by Harkaway), which showed Trumpeter to be the better of the two, by fully 10lbs. Just before the Derby, however, they were tried together, when John Day thought still that Trumpeter was the better colt by 10lbs. Trumpeter's leg, much injured at Bath, gave way altogether in the Derby; and he was forthwith taken out of training; Mr. Hill purchased him, when a yearling, for 220 gs.

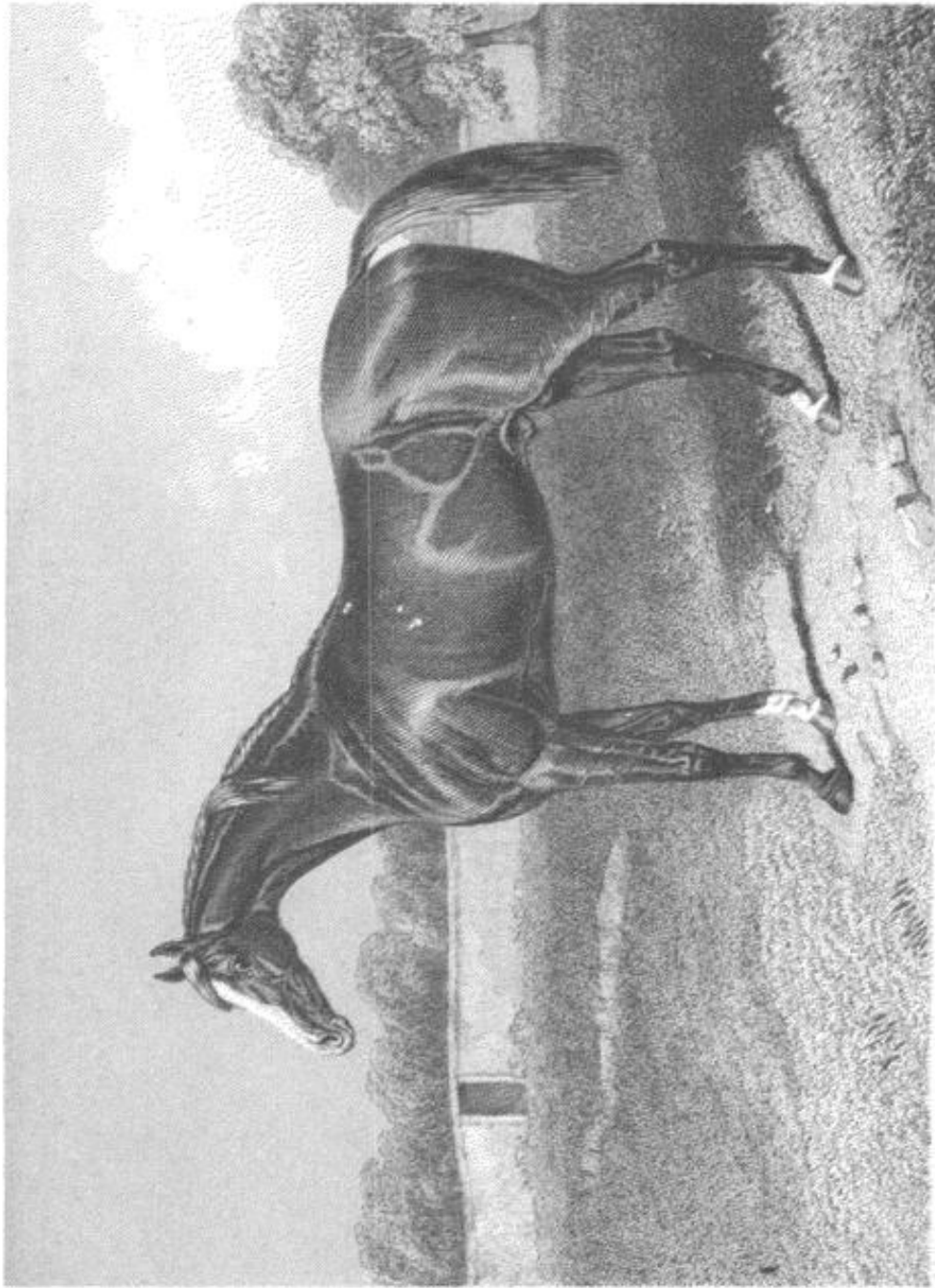

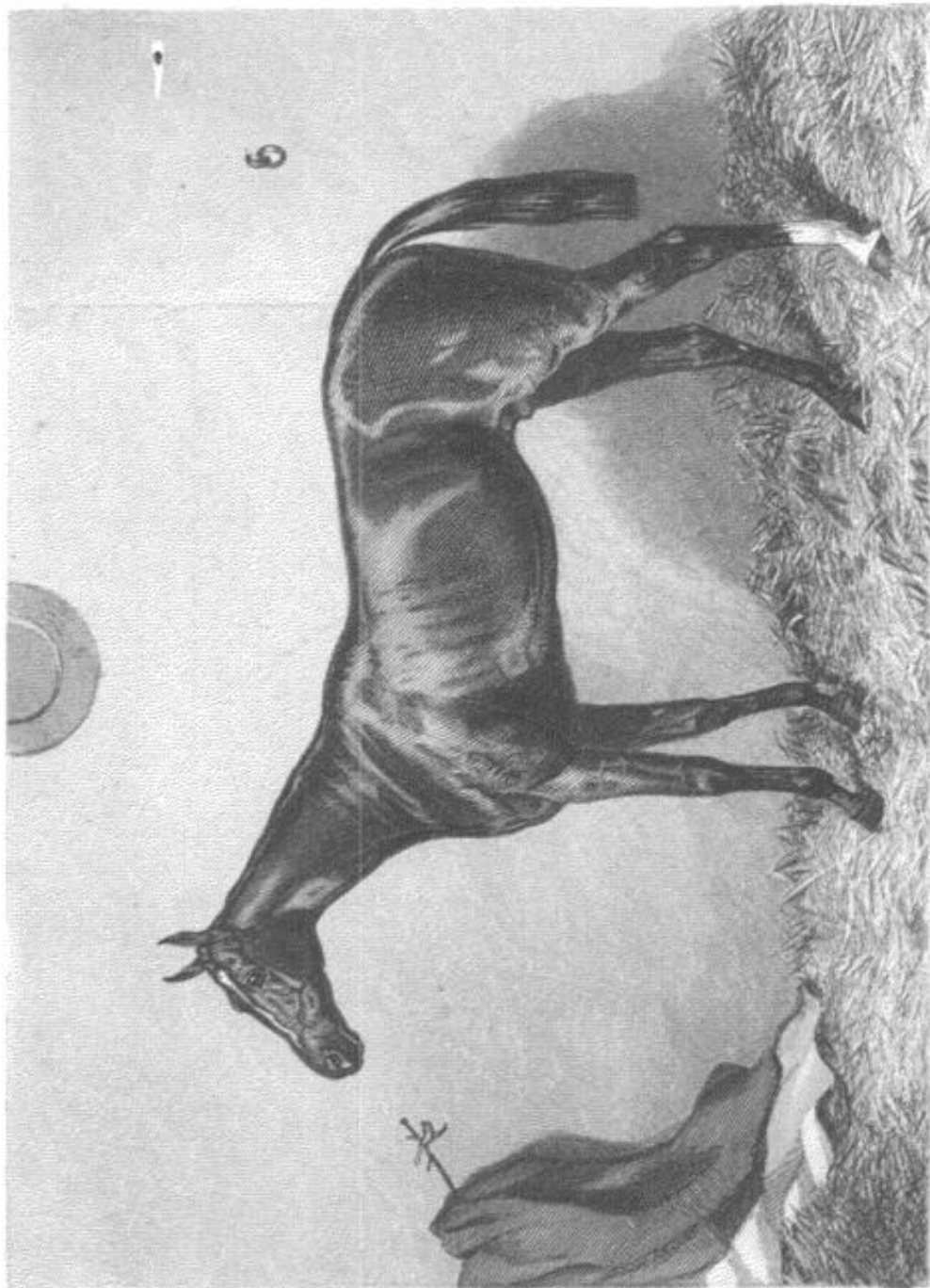

THORMANBY.

THORMANBY was a ch. c. foaled in 1857, the property of James Merry, Esq. He was got by Windhound (son of Pantaloon), out of Alice Hawthorn (bred by Mr. J. Plummer in 1838), by Muley-Moloch (son of Muley), out of Rebecca by Lottery, out of a mare by Cervantes, out of Anticipation by Beningbrough, out of Expectation by Herod, out of a mare by Lord Portmore's Skim, her dam by Janus (son of the Godolphin Arabian), out of Spinster (bred by Mr. Panton in 1743), by Old Crab, out of Spinster (the Widlington Mare), by Old Partner, out of Bay Bloody Buttocks (bred by Mr. J. Crofts in 1729), by Bloody Buttocks, from a dau. of Mr. Crofts' Old Greyhound, &c., &c. "Thormanby was a pale chestnut, but he got slightly darker after he went to the Stud. He never could be styled a handsome horse, with that exceedingly plain head, and general want of substance. His near hind-hoel was white to above the fetlock, and he had a peculiar blaze on his head. His neck was straight and strong, and there was a very unusual width between his ears. His shoulders were not very grand, and an uphill course suited him best. For this reason Goodwood did not suit him, but his level, strongly-knit back, and powerfully-arched loins, sent him up the Ascot incline like a steam engine. His quarters were drooping, a peculiarity inherited by most of his stock, his arms and thighs were fairly muscular, and his cannon-bones short. He had not much bone, and was slightly inclined to be leggy. In fact he was a type of one of those wiry, light-fleshed, greyhound style of horses, whose abilities so often belie their looks. As a stallion he first sought patronage in the north, and though his first batch of yearlings came fine and grand, they turned out slow, heavy animals. But when, in 1869, he could boast of half a dozen such clippers as Sunshine, Hester, Camel, Normanby, Barford, and Atlantis, and stood at the

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head of winning stallions, an extra stimulus was given to breeders to secure his services." (From the *Sporting and Dramatic News*.)

Thormanby was so entirely wanting in all those characteristics of his first reputed sire, Melbourne, that he has by universal consent been acknowledged to be the son of Windhound. Like most of Mr. Merry's two year olds, he had to undergo a very strong preparation for his engagements.

Snowden), but on entering the straight, the race clearly lay between Thormanby and Fairwater, the former winning very easily by two lengths. At Goodwood, 9st 10lbs (Custance), not placed for the Cup, won by Mr. Ten-Broeck's ch. h. Starke (bred in America), by Wagner, six years, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), beating The Wizard, four years, 9st (Osborne), by a head, Mr. Ten-Broeck's ch. c. Optimist (bred in America), by Lexington, four years, 8st, third, Doefoot, Wallace, Lady Clifden, and two others; 9 to 4 against Thormanby, 5 to 2 against The Wizard, and 8 to 1 against Starke. Thormanby was fourth. Wallace led off, followed by Starke, Royallieu, The Wizard, Doefoot, Lady Clifden, and Thormanby in the order named. At the distance, The Wizard took the lead, followed by Starke, Optimist and Thormanby. Fifty yards from home, Starke got up to The Wizard, and won a fine race by a head. Thormanby's last race. "Thormanby forms a pleasant link for Matthew Dawson, between his old and new service. He thought old Alice, Thormanby's dam, a very hopeless subject; but the spring brought her renewed strength, and she did not turn from Windhound, as she had done three weeks before from Melbourne, who got no foal at all that season." ("The Druid.")

THORMANBY'S RACE FOR THE ST. LEGER.

This was a magnificent race, and a better horse than St. Albans never

won it, though he also carried off the Chester Cup and the Great Metropolitan at Epsom in the same year. The Great Yorkshire meteor, Sabreur (winner, this year, of the Great Yorkshire Stakes and the Doncaster Cup), ridden by J. Osborne, took the lead at a pace which, if it could be maintained, would have distanced all his competitors; but after a quarter of a mile had been covered, Sweetsauce (who, this year, won both the Stewards' Cup at Goodwood, and the Goodwood Cup), now ridden by John Charlton, passed Sabreur, who, however, again put on the steam, and regained his position. Away this pair came, rounding the Red House with a clear lead, followed by the American colt Umpire (Fordham), The Wizard (Aldcroft), and Lord Ailesbury's ch. c. St. Albans (Luke Snowden). Crossing the road, Umpire collared Sabreur, who here held out signals of distress, and shortly after gave place to The Wizard, who led the flying squadron at a tremendous pace, and going himself so strongly that it looked a thousand to one on him. Here, however, Luke Snowden, seeing that every other horse in the race was beaten, gave St. Albans his head, who, coming with a mighty rush, that electrified the bystanders, and followed by High Treason (R. Bullock), won by a couple of lengths. The Wizard (a neck from High Treason), being third, Sabreur fourth, and Thormanby fifth, whose defeat was greeted by a perfect yell of frenzy in the enclosure.

BUTTERFLY.

BUTTERFLY was a ch. f. bred by Mr. Sharpe, in 1857, and sold to Mr. Eastwood, who disposed of her to Colonel Towneley. She was got by Turnus (son of Taurus, by Phantom), out of Catherine (bred by Lord Chesterfield in 1845), by Don John, out of Arachne, by Filho-da-puta, out of Treasure, by Camillus (son of Hambletonian), out of a mare by Hyacinthus, out of Flora, by King Fergus, out of Atalanta, by Match'em, &c., &c.

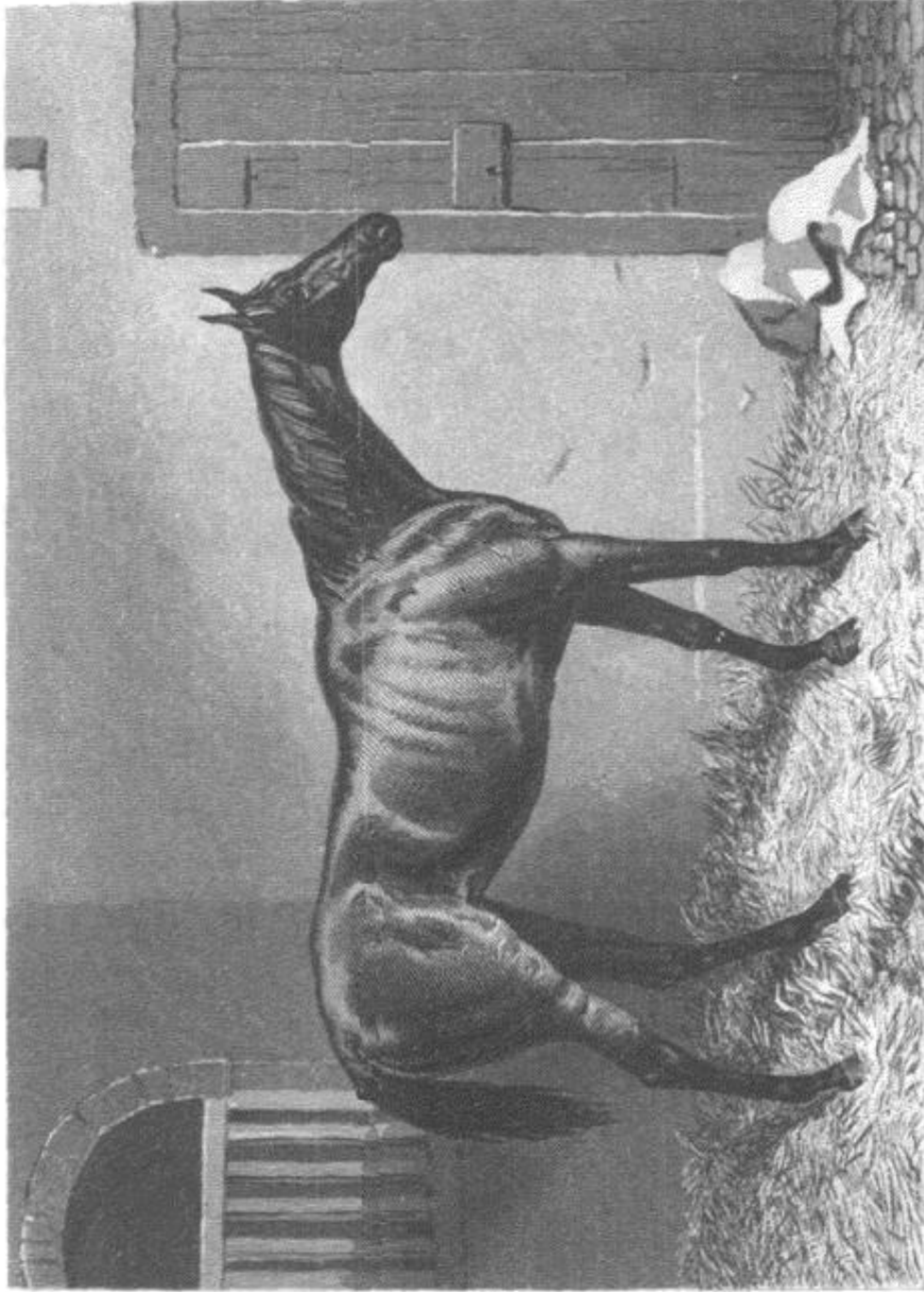

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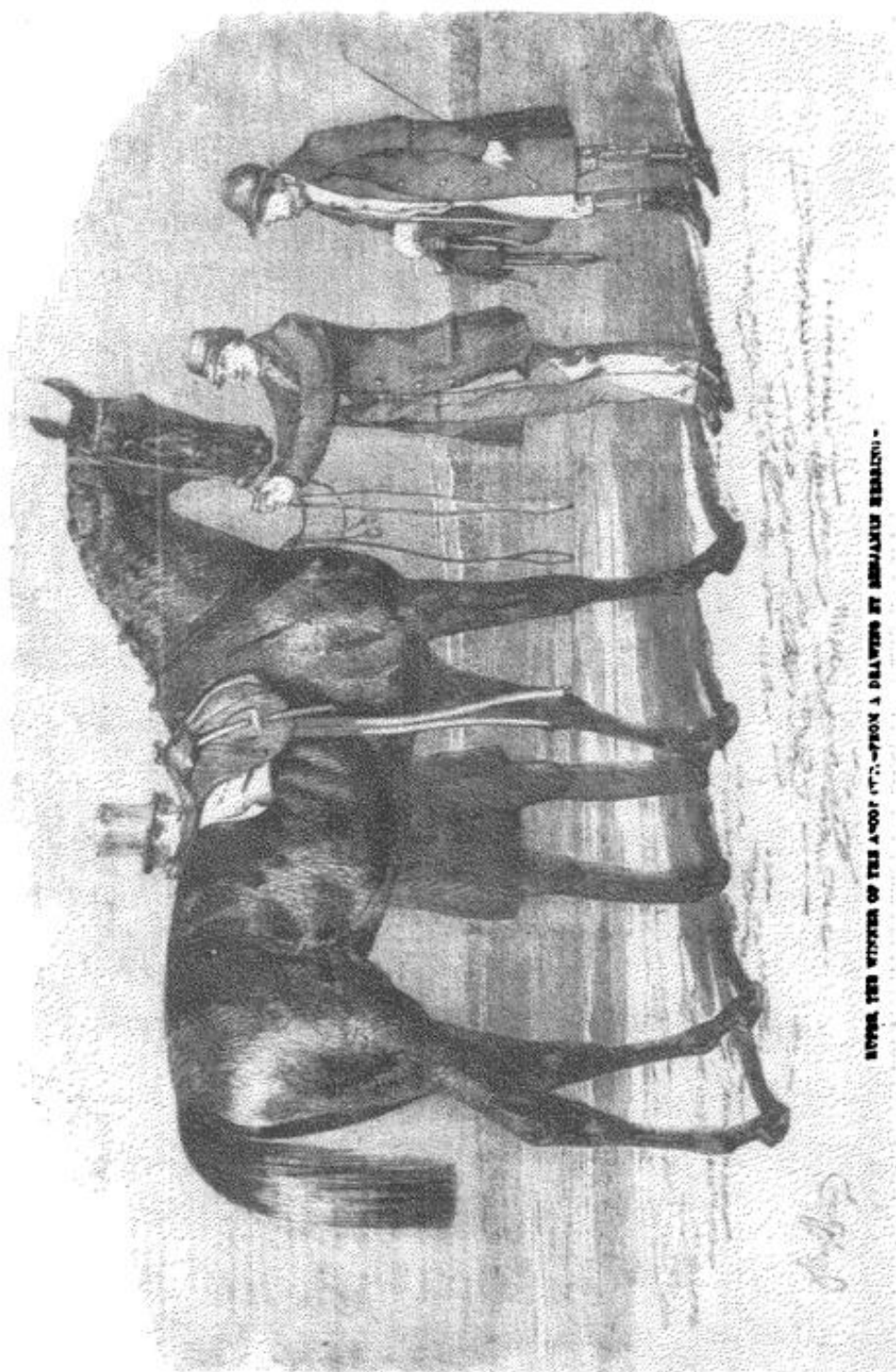

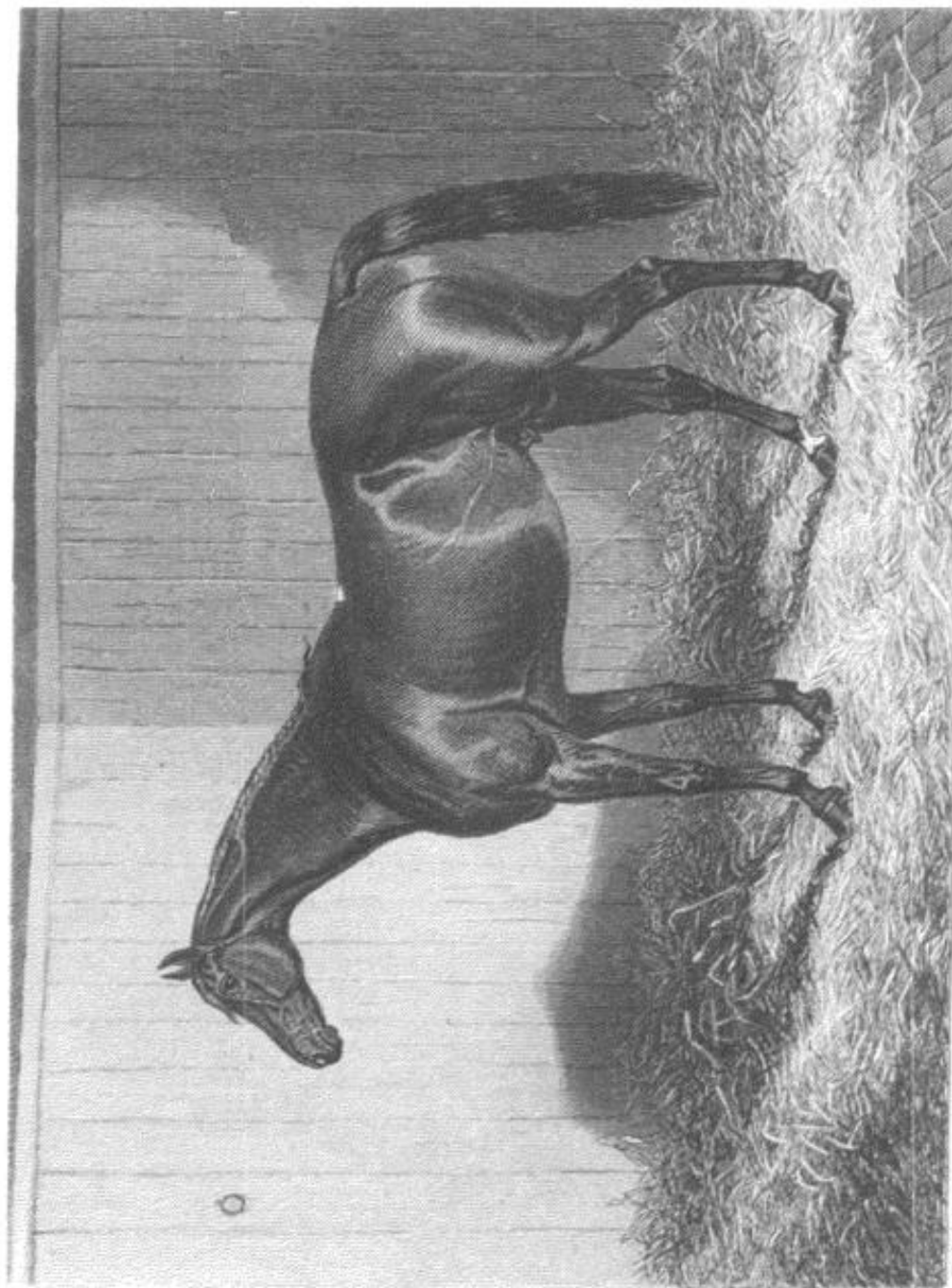

In an article in the *Sporting Times*, of May 11th, 1867, a correspondent, under the name of "Cedric the Saxon," thus writes of Nutbourne: "It was during the Goodwood Meeting, of 1863, that I first saw Nutbourne, and through the courtesy of his breeder and owner, Mr. Wyatt, I had the gratification of seeing this magnificent sire. He is a splendid animal, and I could not dispute his claim to the Hundred Guinea Prize he obtained at Leeds. His colour is of the very richest chestnut. He stands sixteen hands high, and is, without exception, the most powerful and most level thoroughbred horse I ever saw. He is, moreover, all quality; and I could not discover a single coarse point about him. He has a beautiful type of head, muscular neck, and very fine shoulders. His back and loins are excellent, and his quarters a model of power and symmetry. His hocks are large, and the shank, from the hock to the fetlock, is of extraordinary strength. The formation of his chest is somewhat peculiar, and the thickness of his girth remarkable." In running for the Derby he strained the suspensory ligament of his near foreleg, and was taken out of training. He was the sire of Fraulein (winner of the Doncaster Cup in 1875), and of Mr. Swindell's ch. c. Woodlands.

SWEETSAUCE.

SWEETSAUCE was a chestnut colt, foaled in 1857, the property of Lord Annesley. 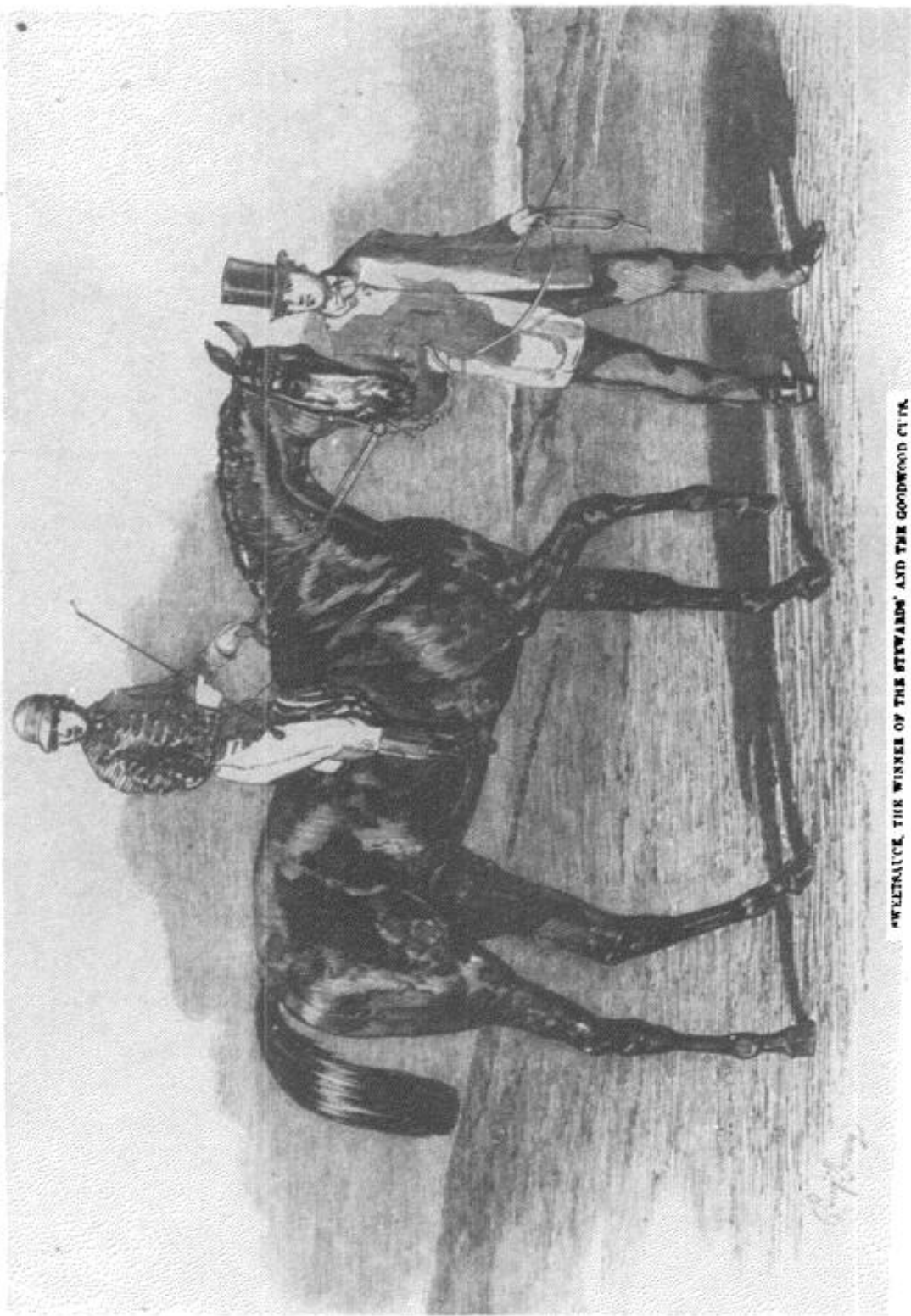

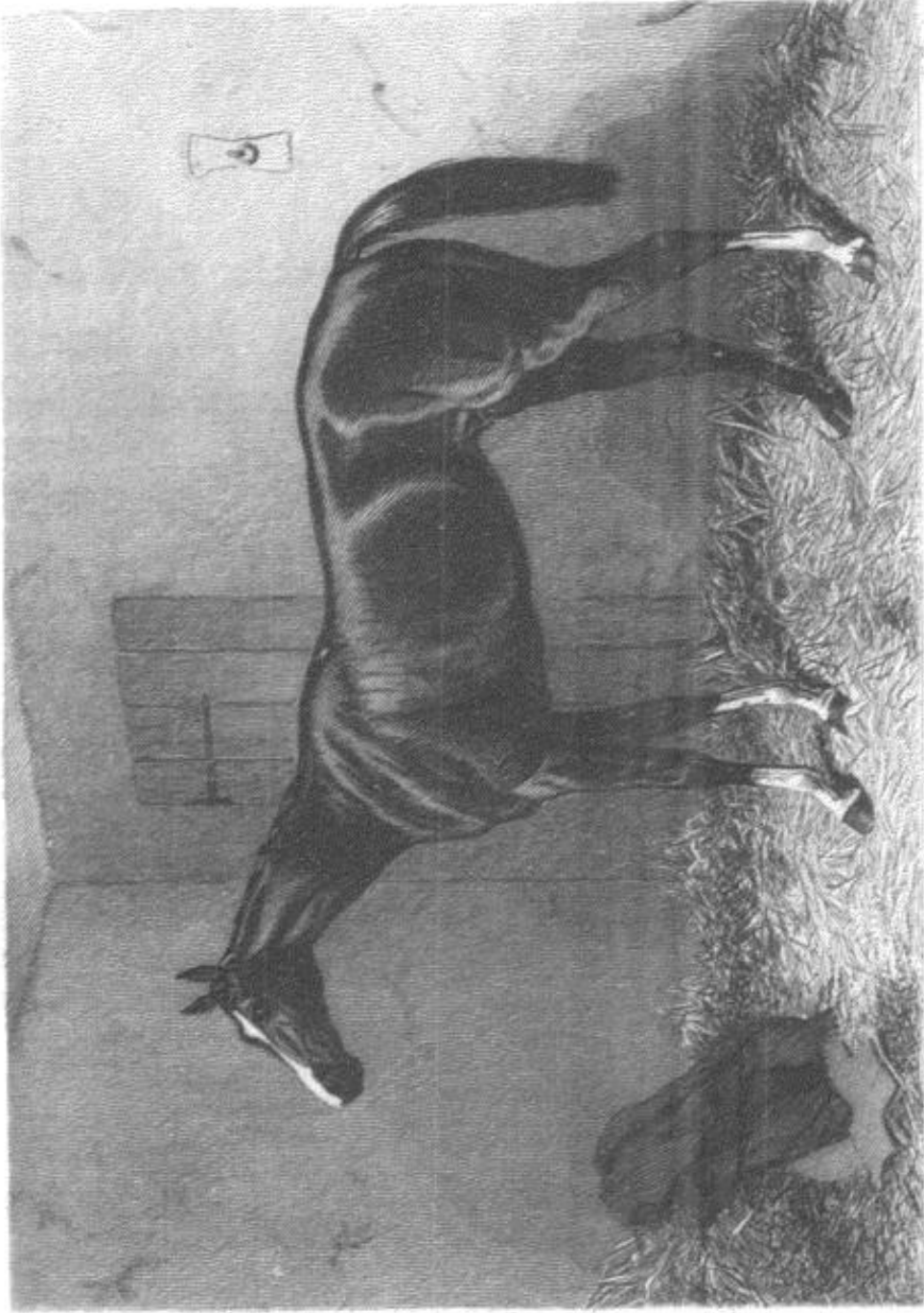

Maggiore (bred in America), by Le-Compte, three years, 6st 4lbs (Arthur Edwards), by a good length, Count Frederick de Lagrange's ch. h. Zouave (sire of the famous steeple-chaser, The Lamb), by The Baron, six years, 8st 6lbs, third. Sir J. Hawley's b. f. Catawba by Cowl, three years, 5st 12lbs, fourth; also, br. f. Seclusion (dam of Hermit) by Tadmor (son of Ion), three years, 7st 4lbs, The Baron's ch. c. King of Diamonds, 7st 4lbs, and thirty-two others; 6 to 1 against Maggiore, and 20 to 1 against Sweetsauce. This Stewards' Cup was in the form of an elegant vase, designed from an antique model, the sculptural decorations being appropriately chosen from classical mythological fables. The group, on the cover, represents Bellerophon, mounted on Pegasus, the winged horse of the Muses, conquering the Chimæra. Four delicately-executed medallions, in low relief, round the sides of the vase, illustrate other incidents in relation to Pegasus. The shaft is decorated with the head of Medusa, winged monsters, and boys. S. mg. (at Goodwood), 7st 7lbs (J. Charlton), won the Goodwood Cup, of £660, beating The Baron's (Rothschild's) b. c. Gustave by Lanercost, three years, 6st 7lbs (J. Daly), by ten lengths, ch. h. Zouave, five years, 8st 7lbs, third, Mr. Ten-Broeck's ch. h. Starke (bred in America, and winner, in 1859, of the Goodwood Stakes, of £985, the Bentinck Memorial, of £1242, and the Cup, of £330, at Warwick; and, in 1861, of the Cup, at Goodwood), by the American horse, Wagner, out of imported Reel by Glencoe, five years, 8st 7lbs, fourth, br. c. 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KETTLEDROM.

KETTLEDROM was a ch. c. foaled in 1858, the property of Colonel Towneley, of Towneley, Lancashire. He was got by Rataplan, out of Hybla (Mincemeat's dam), by The Provost, out of Otisina (sister to Lanercost), by Liverpool, out of Otis (bred by the Earl of Egremont in 1820), by Bustard (son of Buzzard, by Woodpecker), out of Gayhurst's dam by Election, out of sister to Skysweeper by Highflyer, out of a mare by Eclipse, out of Rosebud by Old Snap, out of Miss Belsea (bred by Sir William Middleton, of Belsea Castle, Northumberland, in 1753), by Regulus, her dam, by Bartlett's Childers, out of a mare by Honeywood's Arabian, out of the dam of the two True Blues.

Kettledrum was by no means an elegant horse, but he possessed very strong limbs. He was bred by Mr. Cookson, who chose Rataplan for his sire, for the sake of the double cross of whalebone, through The Saddler (sire of The Provost) and The Baron. Hybla (his dam), was never trained. At Doncaster many took exception to him, as having then too heavy a top. Colonel Towneley bought Kettledrum at the earnest request of his trainer, William Oates; and Joseph Dawson also bid very perseveringly for him. Caller-Ou and her dam (Haricot) were both in the sale on that Doncaster Thursday, and William l'Anson would have let them go for £500, bid for Haricot and her yearling-filly, had not his wife entreated him not to part with the blood, and so they were bought in. Kettledrum in his gallop, had a habit of throwing up his head, and crossing his legs. A tremendous pace was what he wanted in the Derby; and the style in which he came along from Tattenham Corner, when Dundee came down the fatal hill into the straight, will never be forgotten. In the St. Leger, Yorkminster's flat refusal to make the running to the Red House, as he was appointed to do, was fatal to his chance, and thus he had to share the

disappointment of taking the double-class honours with Coronation, Cotherstone, and Thormanby.

Klarikoff (winner, in 1860, of the Municipal at Doncaster, of the Criterion and Glasgow at Newmarket Houghton) by De-Clare (son of Touchstone), third (Fordham), Lord Stamford's ch. c. Imaus, and Mr. Payne's b. c. Copernicus, both by Newminster, ch. c. Overton by Teddington, Russley, Gardener, and five others; 9 to 4 against Klarikoff, 4 to 1 against Kettledrum, 8 to 1 against Imaus, and 25 to 1 against Diophantus, who, shortly after the start, took the lead, followed by Kettledrum, Klarikoff, and Imaus (French). Descending the Bushes Hill, Klarikoff was beaten, and from that point Diophantus came on, with a commanding lead, and won at his leisure; Imaus was fourth, and Copernicus fifth. At

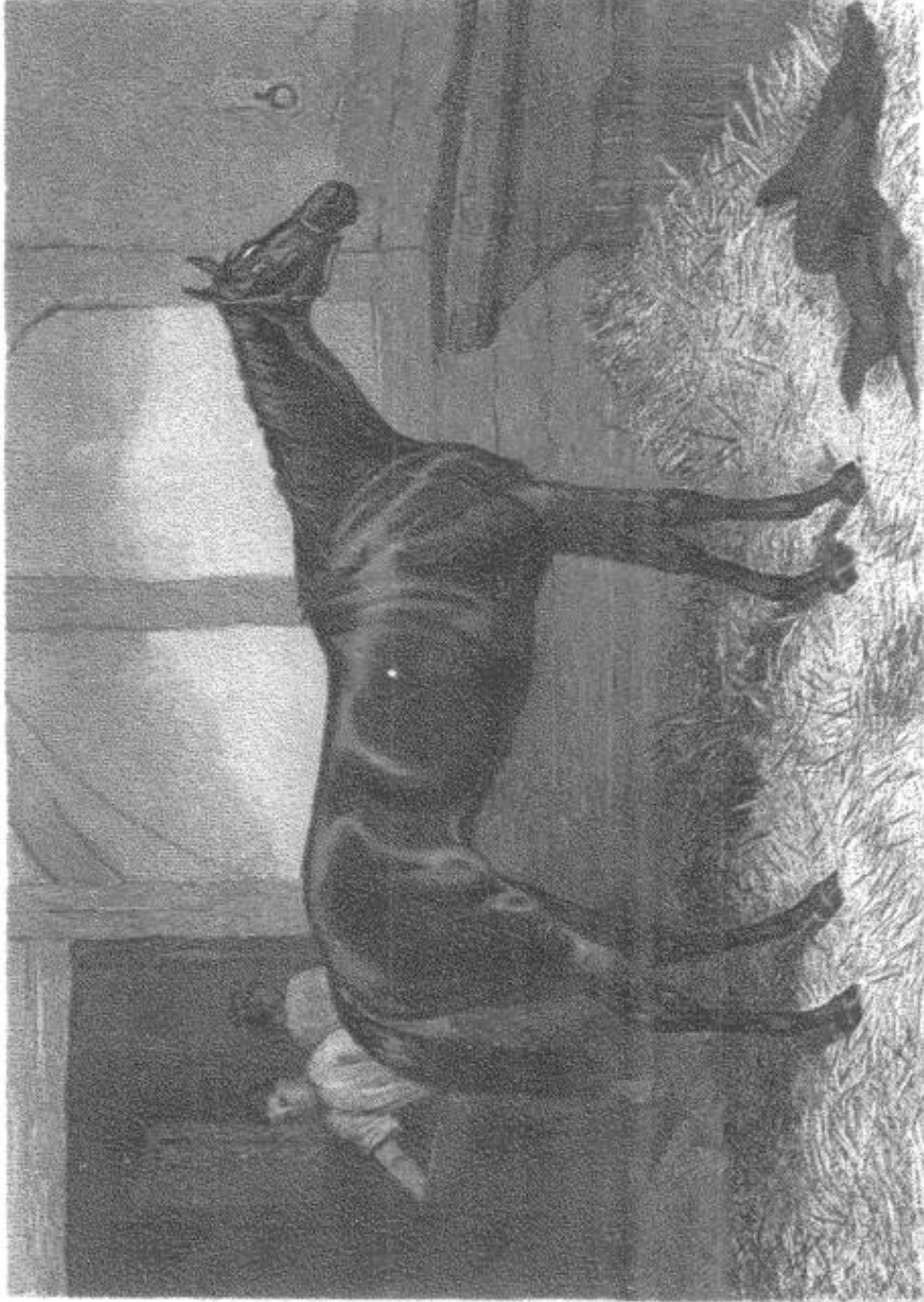
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Epsom (R. Bullock) won the Derby, of £6250, beating Mr. Merry's b. c. Dundee (winner, in 1860, of the Woodcote, of £520, at Epsom, the Two Year Old Plate, of £450, at Liverpool, the Findon Stakes, of £560, at Goodwood, and the Hopeful, of £550, at Newmarket) by Lord of the Isles (Custance), by a length, ch. c. Diophantus (Edwards) third; also, Count Lagrange's ch. c. Royalieu (bred in France) by Fitz-gladiator, Mr. Parr's b. c. Kildonan (Clement), Colonel Towneley's ch. c. Yorkminster by Newminster (Luke Snowden), ch. c. Imaus (French), br. c. Dictator, (Osborne), Sir J. Hawley's ch. c. Rouge-Dragon by Windhound (Wells), b. c. Atherstone by Touchstone (S. Rogers), br. c. Lupus, by Loupgarou, Russley, Gardener, and three others; 3 to 1 against Dundee, 4 to 1 against Diophantus, 8 to 1 each against Klarikoff and Dictator, and 100 to 6 against Kettledrum. At the second attempt the flag fell to a bad start, Klarikoff, Rouge-Dragon and Lupus being several lengths behind. Royalieu (H. Grimshaw), took the lead, followed by Diophantus and Imaus, side by side, Kettledrum fourth, and Yorkminster fifth, Dundee heading the middle division. They ran thus to the City and Suburban starting-post, where Diophantus went in front. No material change occurred, till they approached Tattenham Corner, round which the lot swept, Diophantus still leading, followed by Kettledrum, Dundee, Atherstone, Royalieu, Kildonan, Dictator, Aurelian, and Klarikoff, in close company. Before reaching the distance, Dictator was beaten, and Dundee broke down very badly. At the half distance, Klarikoff and Aurelian next the rails, Kettledrum and Diophantus in the middle of the course, and Dundee on the high ground, were running nearly level, when Bullock, with one prick of the spur, sent Kettledrum a length in advance, and he appeared to be winning easily, but, at the enclosure, Dundee came again in the gamest style, for the final struggle, but failed to reach Kettledrum; a head divided second and third, and a neck third and fourth; Aurelian (J. Goater) by Stockwell, was fourth, Klarikoff fifth, Royalieu sixth, and Kildonan seventh. At Doncaster (L. Snowden), ran second for the Great St. Leger, of £4300, won by Caller-Ou (Chaloner), beating Kildonan, third (Fordham), The Baron's b. c. Janus (winner of the Ascot Derby) by King Tom (Wells), fourth; also, b. c. Russley, br. c. Dictator (Osborne), ch. c. Imaus (Edwards), Mr. Osbaldeston's b. c. Camerino

(winner of the Doncaster Stakes) by Stockwell (Grimshaw), Captain Skipworth's b. c. Aurelian (Goater), ch. f. Lady Ripon, by Stockwell (Bullock), ch. c. Yorkminster (J. Snowden), Gardener (Ewart), and four others; 6 to 4 against Kettledrum, 7 to 1 against Kildonan, 9 to 1 against Lady Ripon, 11 to 1 against Imaus and Aurelian, and 100 to 1 (offered, but no takers) against Caller-Ou. Kettledrum jumped off with the lead, followed by Camerino, and Lady Ripon, the rest being in a cluster, and close up. In running along towards the hill, Camerino, Lady Ripon, and Dictator were well in front, the rest close together. When nearing the Red House, James Snowden forced Yorkminster up to the leaders, but he instantly shut up. On rounding the bottom turn, Kildonan, Janus, Russley (Custance) and Caller-Ou improved their positions; but, before the distance was reached, Fordham was hard on Kildonan. Within the distance, Caller-Ou joined Kettledrum, and from this point the race lay between these two. Opposite the stand Caller-Ou got slightly the advantage over Kettledrum, whom, after a desperate struggle, she defeated by a head. Russley was fifth, Dictator sixth, Imaus seventh, and Camerino eighth. S. mg., 7st 7lbs (Bullock), ran a dead-heat for the Cup, with Brown Duchess. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 12lbs w. o. for the Select Stakes (£125), and retired from the Turf.

"The Druid" says that "Dundee was a coltish light-fleshed horse, with a beautiful wind, a very blood-like head, and fine thighs; but, like his sire, a little upright on his fore joints." A few days before the Epsom Meeting, the condition of the suspensory ligament, in the near foreleg, caused considerable anxiety and suspicion that all was not right there. During the race for the Derby it gave way altogether, insomuch so that, at the finish, the fetlock touched the ground, and it was with great difficulty that they got him back to Sherwood's.

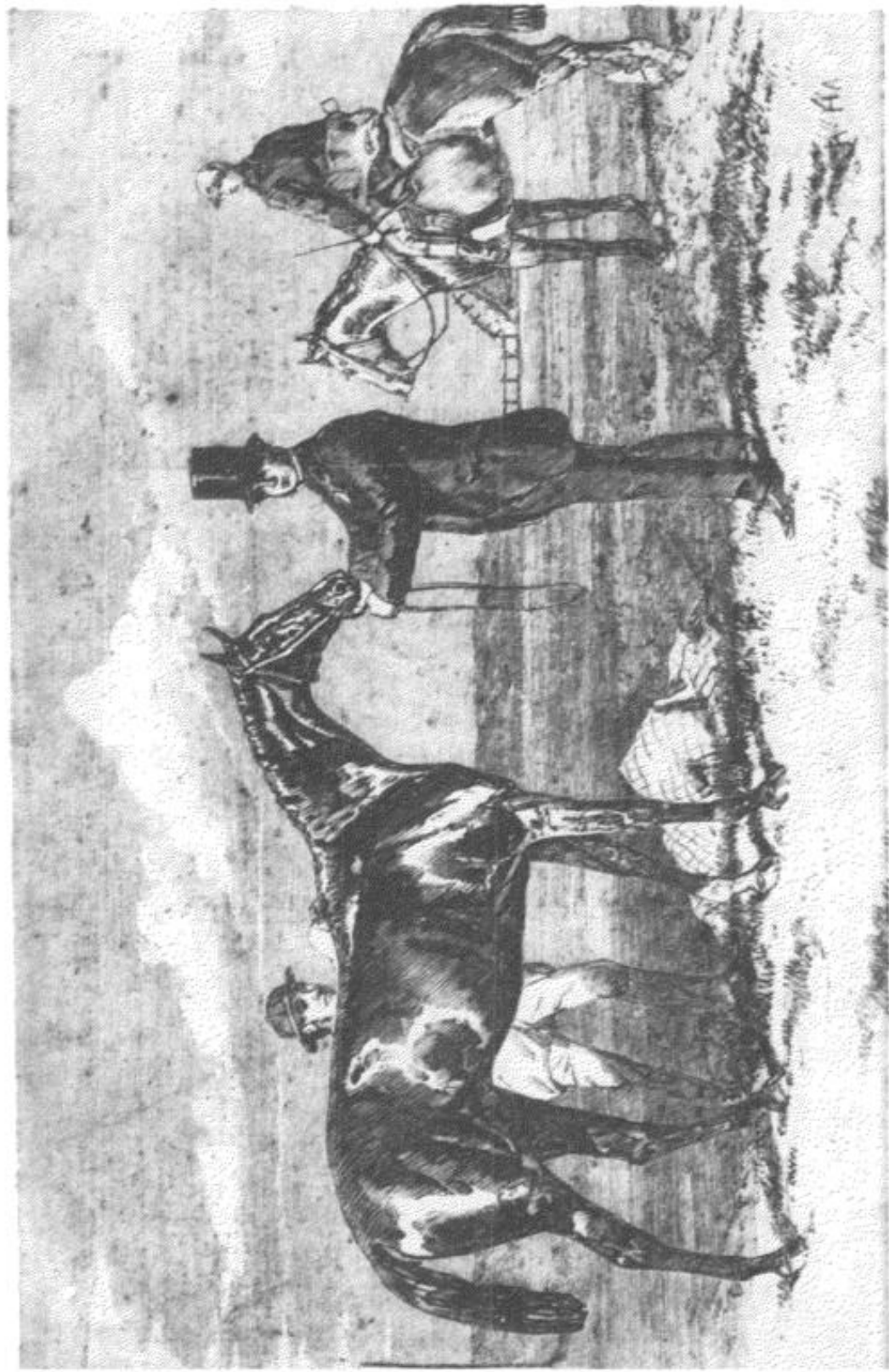

At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 7lbs each (L. Snowden), ran third in the 1000 Guineas, won by Mr. Fleming's b. f. Nemesis (Fordham), beating Mr. Cartwright's b. f. Fairwater (winner of the Great Northampton Stakes, in 1863, and the Liverpool Cup in 1862) by Loupgarou (J. Osborne), by a length, a head only between second and third; also, Mr. Gratwicke's ch. f. Preceptress (winner of the Prendergast in 1860), by Chatham (H. Grimshaw), Queen of the Vale (Charlton), Sweet Hawthorn (Custance), Sir J. Hawley's b. f. Fordham), Imaus (A. French), Copernicus (J. Charlton), Knight of St. Patrick (Norman), Janus (Wells), and Sweet Hawthorn (Custance). The ruck was headed by Russley, and formed the second division. 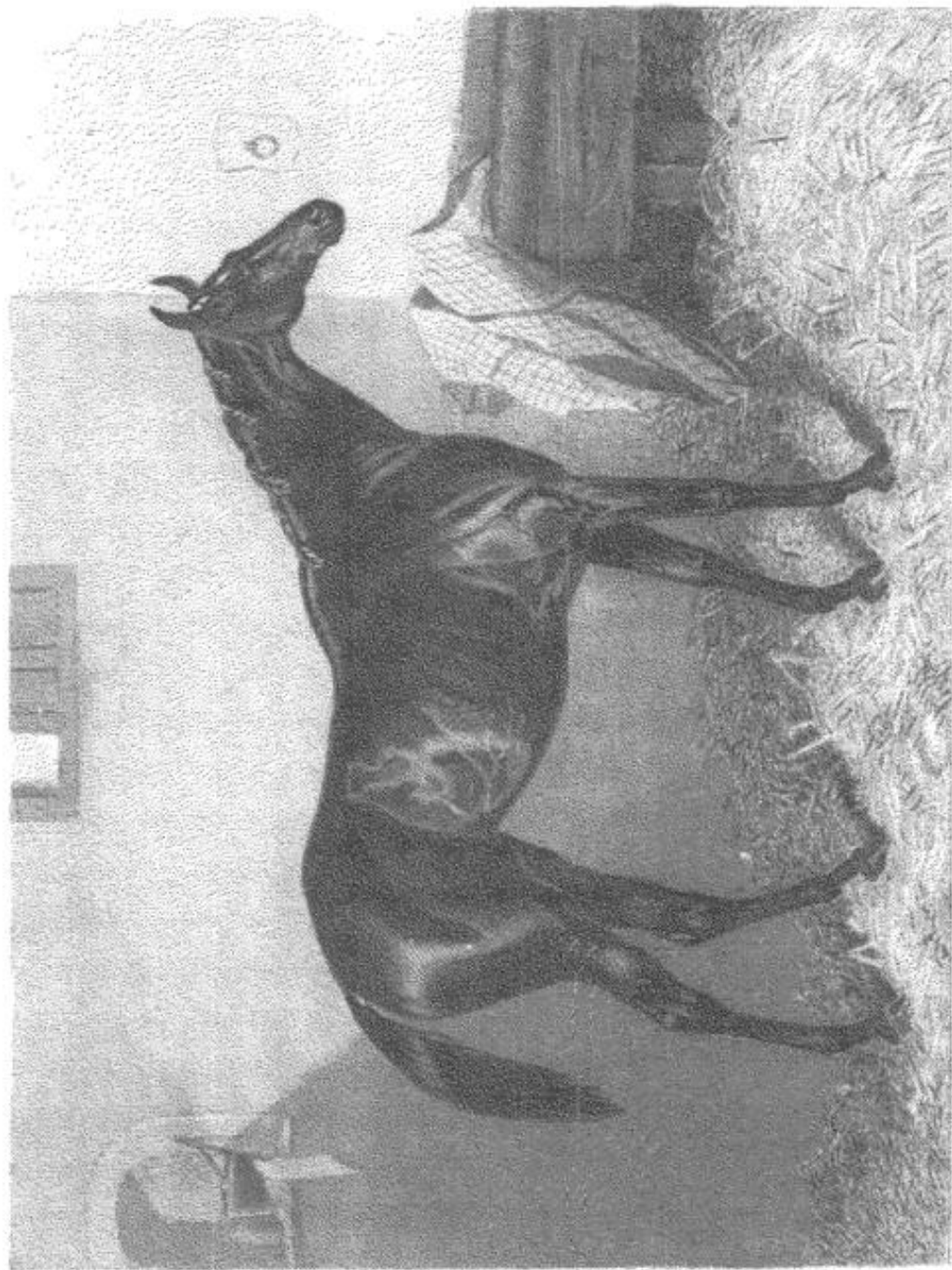

Osborne), being one of them. At Hampton, won the Queen's Plate, and at Newcastle, 9st (Chaloner), ran second for the Northumberland Plate, won by Mr. Mackenzie's br. c. Brown Bread by Weatherbit, three years, 6st 5lbs (Carroll), beating Mr. Montgomery's ch. m. La Toucques (bred in France), by The Baron, five years, 8st 10lbs (Custance), third, and six others. At the Stand, however, she too was done with, and Ely cantered in an easy winner, by eight lengths. At Lewes, 9st 12lbs (Aldcroft), ran second for the Queen's Plate, won by Lord Portsmouth's b. c. Sædmoaton, by Vengeance, three years, 8st 5lbs (Fordham), by a length, beating four others. Caller-Ou ran in four other races this year, without success, and now retired from the Turf. Chaloner rode her in most of her races. She started twelve times in 1860, winning thrice, seventeen times in 1861, winning eight races, thirteen times in 1862, winning five races, twenty-seven times in 1863, winning eighteen races, twenty times in 1864, winning eleven races, and twelve times in 1865, winning six races. Total number of starts, 101; total of victories, 51.

Carabineer by Rifleman, four years, 8st 10lbs (A. Edwards), by a head, b. c. Asteroid, four years, 8st 10lbs (Wells), third, Mr. Henry's br. c. Malek by Stockwell, three years, 7st 7lbs, and Lord Falmouth's b. f.  MACARONI.

MACARONI was a b. c. bred by the Marquis of Westminster, in 1860, and sold to Richard Christopher Naylor, Esq., of Hooton Hall, Cheshire. He was got by Sweetmeat, out of Jocose (bred by the Marquis in 1843), by Pantaloon, out of Banter (the dam of Touchstone), by Master Henry, out of Boadicea by Alexander. (For remainder of pedigree, see Touchstone.) Macaroni was a dark bay, and stood fifteen hands and three inches high. He had a small white star on his forehead, and a curious saddle-mark on his near side. His head was plain, but full of character, his neck thick and muscular, which became still more so when a stallion. He had magnificent sloping shoulders, with great depth of girth. His back was short and strong, and he looked every inch of him, the thorough workman he was. His defects were his upright pasterns, inherited by his famous son, Macgregor, and length of cannon bone; but his action was exceedingly free and fine. He was purchased, in June, 1875, for the widow of the late Baron Meyer de Rothschild, for the sum of 7100 gs., and located at Mentmore, where he reigned supreme. It was a matter of great and general regret, that Macaroni and Lord Clifden did not meet in the St. Leger, for which, most unfortunately, the former was not entered. The head beating Lord Clifden sustained in the Derby would have excited intense interest, had they met again at Doncaster.

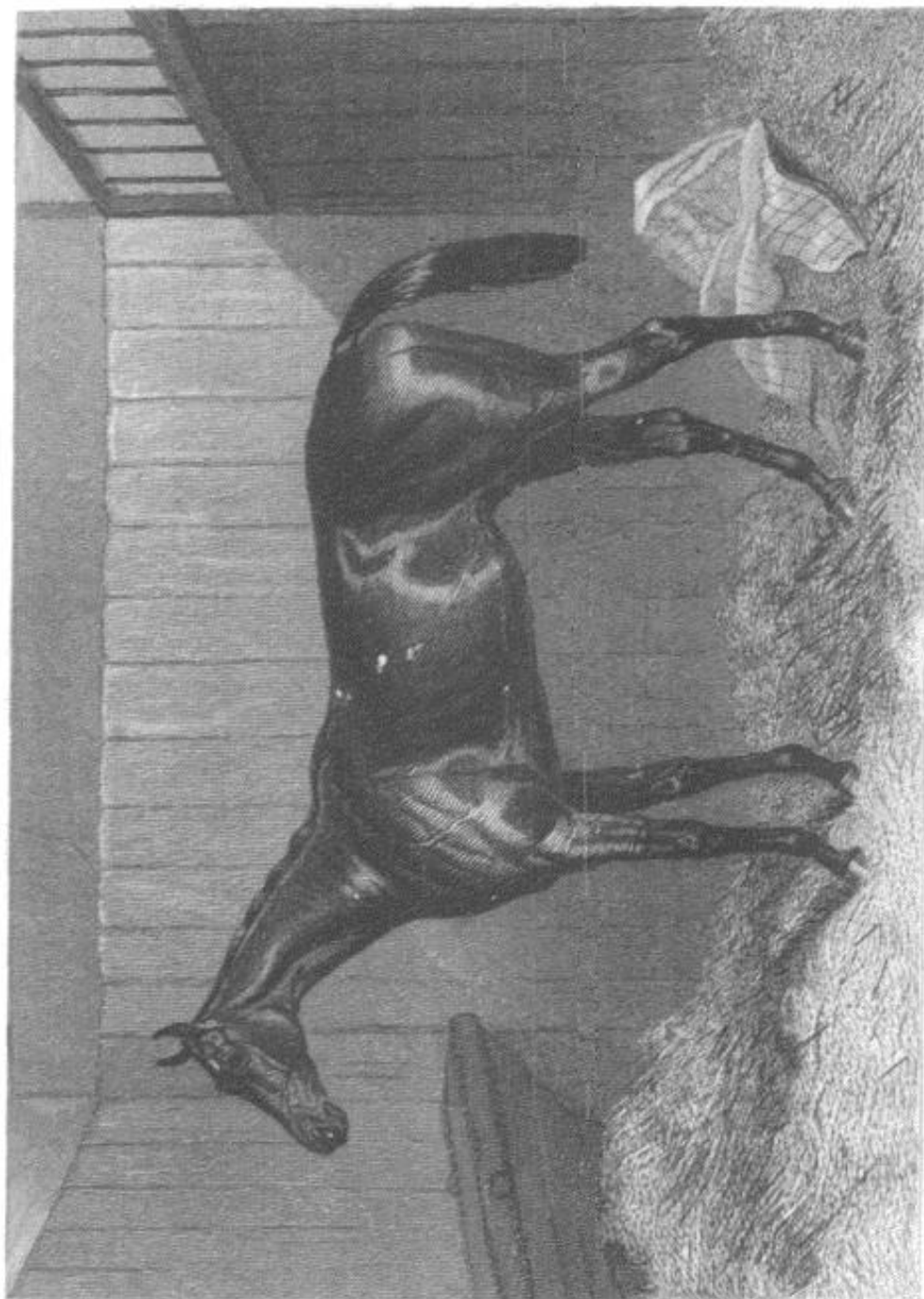

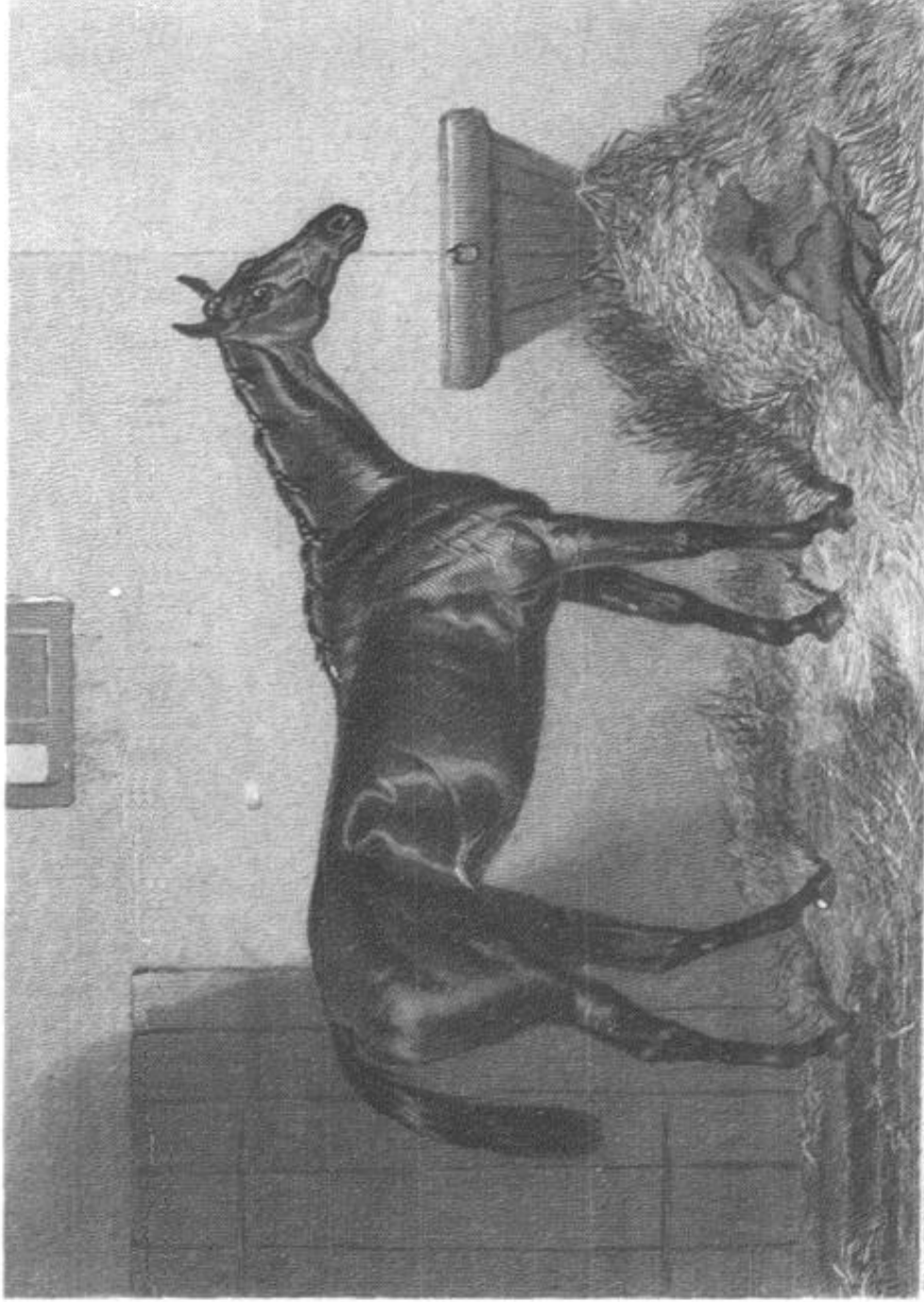

QUEEN BERTHA was a b. f. bred by Viscount Falmouth, in 1860, and got by Kingston, out of Flax by Surplice, out of Odessa by Sultan, out of Sister to Cobweb by Phantom, out of Filagree by Soothsayer, out of Web by Waxy, out of Penelope by Trumpator, out of Prunella by Highflyer, out of Promise by Old Snap, out of Julia* by Blank, out of Spectator's dam by Old Partner, out of Bonny Lass by Bay Bolton, her dam by the Darley Arabian, out of a dau. of the Byerley Turk, out of a mare by the Taffolet Barb, her dam by Mr. Place's White Turk, out of a natural Barb mare.

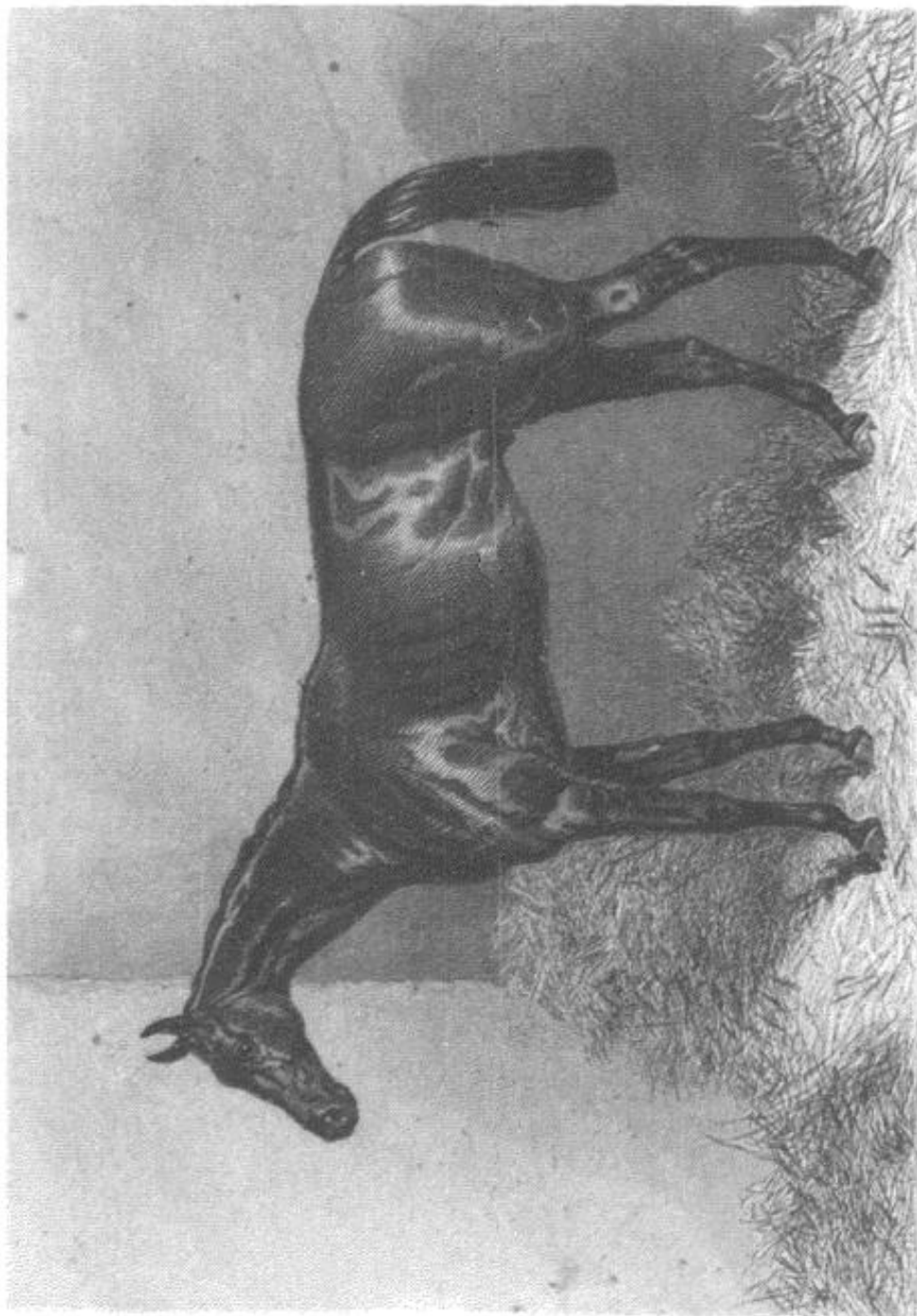

Queen Bertha was now added to Lord Falmouth's Stud, where she produced some excellent runners, among them the flying Wheel of Fortune, who sustained her first and only defeat in the Great Yorkshire Stakes in 1879, by Mr. Houldsworth's ch. c. Ruperra, both being by Adventurer.

LORD CLIFDEN.

LORD CLIFDEN was a b. c. bred by Mr. Hind in 1860, and sold to Lord St. Vincent, after winning the Woodcote Stakes at Epsom, in 1862. He was got by Newminster, out of The Slave by Melbourne, out of Volley by Voltaire, out of Martha Lynn (bred by Mr. Ramsay in 1837) by Mulatto, out of Leda (bred by T. Houldsworth, Esq., in 1824) by Filho-da-Putá, out of Treasure by Camillus, out of a mare by Hyacinthus (son of Coriander by Pot80's), out of Flora by King Fergus, out of Atalanta (bred by John Coates, Esq., of Castle Levington, Yorkshire, in 1769) by Match'em, out of Lass of the Mill by Oroonoko, out of Clark's Sister to Lass of the Mill by Old Traveller, out of Miss Makeless by Young Greyhound. "At the termination of his racing career, Lord Clifden covered mares at Moorlands, till he was bought by Mr. Gee, of Dewhurst, and added to his Stud. Mr. Gee gave £4000 for him; but had the great misfortune to lose him in February, 1875. Lord Clifden's death was justly regarded as a national loss, as he was unquestionably one of the grandest ornaments of the English Stud. He was, moreover, by far the biggest and hardest of all Newminster's sons, and there was nothing of the band-box dandy about him. He had a deal of the Melbourne character, indicated by his somewhat plain head and *outré* ears, and his great length of shank below the knee and hock, as well as the general appearance of too much daylight under him. Still, looking at him in his box, everybody must have been impressed by the grandeur and majesty of his bearing, while his temper was absolutely perfection. Flat courses suited Lord Clifden better than the ups and downs. At Epsom he was evidently all abroad, though, on that occasion, there is no doubt the best horse won; and it was perhaps fortunate for Lord Clifden that Macaroni was not in the St. Leger. In the Claret Stakes at Newmarket, it was owing more to the hill than lack of preparation, or want of

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heart, that enabled Rapid Rhone to get to his girths, and achieve so easy a victory. But of all courses, Ascot was the least to his taste, where there is hardly a furlong without a gradient, and here he seemed to leave his hind legs behind him, when breasting the hill, which suited the lighter and more corky Scottish Chief to a nicety on that merry day in June. It was a terrible blow to Mr. Gee to lose Lord Clifden at the very beginning of the season, when the *élite* were crowding to his paddocks, and when so many of his owner's mares were destined for his service. His place will not easily be filled up, for *high class* stallions, such as he (barring Hermit and two or three others), are becoming very scarce indeed. Lord Clifden's covering fee latterly was 100 gs." (*Sporting and Dramatic News*).

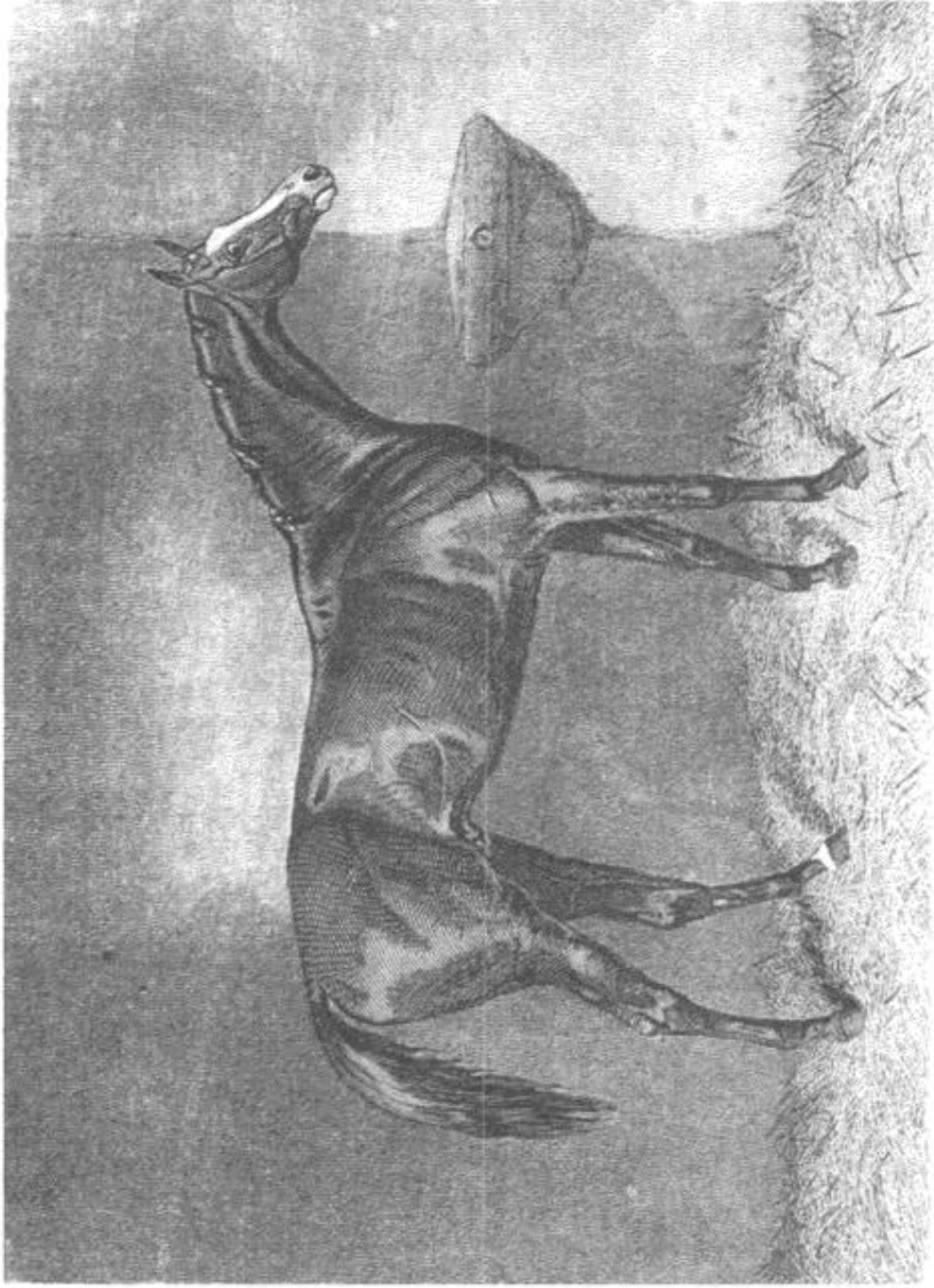

Woldga by West Australian (Wells), third and last; 4 to 1 on Lord Clifden, and 9 to 2 against Rapid Rhone (Fordham). At Ascot, 8st 10lbs (Osborne), not placed for the Cup, won by Mr. Merry's b. c. Scottish Chief by Lord of the Isles, three years, 7st 5lbs (H. Covey), beating ch. c. The Little Stag (winner, this year, of the Stewards' Cup at Chester, and the Cup at Epsom), by Mountain Deer, three years, 7st 5lbs (J. Grimshaw), by six lengths, br. c. Lord Zetland by Voltigeur, three years, 7st 5lbs (French), third, The Ranger, and four others; 2 to 1 against Scottish Chief, and 3 to 1 against Lord Clifden. At Goodwood, 8st 10lbs (Osborne), not placed for the Chesterfield Cup, of £1110, won by Mr. Whittaker's br. c. King of Utopia by King of Trumps, four years, 7st 7lbs (Hibberd), beating b. c. Skeffington by Teddington, and twenty-three others. S. mg., w. o. for 100 sovs., and retired from the Turf. Posthumous honours were abundantly showered on Lord Clifden, when his best son, Petrarch, ran away with the Middle Park Plate in the same year in which his renowned sire died. Lord Clifden was a highly remunerative investment to his purchaser, Lord St. Vincent.

BLAIR ATHOL.

BLAIR ATHOL was a ch. c. bred by Mr. Wm. l'Anson, in 1861, and was got by Stockwell, out of Blink Bonny by Melbourne, out of Queen Mary by Gladiator, out of a mare by Plenipotentiary, out of Myrrha (bred by Lord Egremont in 1830), by Whalebone, out of Gift by Young Gohanna, out of Young Æthe (bred by Mr. T. Hutchinson in 1803), by Sir Peter Teazle, out of Æthe (bred by Mr. Hutton in 1793), by Young Marske, out of Serina by Goldfinder, out of a mare by Squirrel (son of Old Traveller). "And now, gentlemen, what shall I say for the best horse in the world?" were Mr. Tattersall's words, when the mighty blaze-faced chestnut came striding into the ring at Middle Park, casting one contemptuous glance around, and then neighing a bold defiance to all nations. The bidding was strong, resolute, and defiant as the horse's challenge to all creation. There was no dwelling on the last offer, the advances succeeding one another like a roll of musketry. When Mr. Coupland had silenced the enemy's fire, and the hammer fell with a decisive "gone," a burst of cheering broke from the crowded ring, and Blair Athol was withdrawn from its admiring gaze, leaving the sum of 12,500 gs. to be paid for his transfer to other hands. He was purchased for the Cobham Stud Company, whose plucky resolve not to allow the foreigners to get possession of a horse so beloved by the nation was thoroughly appreciated. "His first Malton trial," says "The Druid," "was at even weights with Borealis (who was a year older), and he beat her by two lengths; Mr. l'Anson then tried him to give her 7lbs; but, as he ran out at the turn, Chaloner, on the mare, beat him by a head. Owing to an injury in the muscles of his thigh, about ten weeks before the Derby, he did not go out of a walk for the first five weeks after it. In the Grand Prix, at Paris, he ran big, and yet, sore as he was with the hard ground there, he crossed the Channel to Ascot, and cut down Ely on the Friday, over the new mile. Caller-Ou and Borealis generally led him in his gallops, and a hard time they had of it. Mr. l'Anson never

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knew how good he was ; but was wont to say that he never had a horse with such true action, as even in distress he never rolled or rocked. Before passing into Mr. Blenkiron's hands, he became the property of Mr. John Jackson, of Fairfield, at whose sale Mr. Blenkiron purchased him. Blair Athol has begotten a large number of winners, but the staying powers of his distinguished progeny have not hitherto equalled their speed, though Silvio was certainly an exception. Blair Athol was a bright chestnut horse, standing over sixteen hands high. His head was more remarkable for honesty than beauty. He had a muscular neck, rare shoulders, and was somewhat high in the withers. He possessed great depth of girth, a short back, and loins well arched. After he had been some time at the Stud he lost very much of that greyhound look which he had when in training. His arms were more powerful than his thighs, and his legs and feet were all that could be desired. His near hind heel was white, nearly to the fetlock. Besides Prince Charlie, he was the sire of Scottish Queen, Cecilia, Ethus, Andred, Silver Ring, Ecosais, Glenalmond, Silvio, and a host of other notables, too numerous to mention." (*Sporting and Dramatic News*).

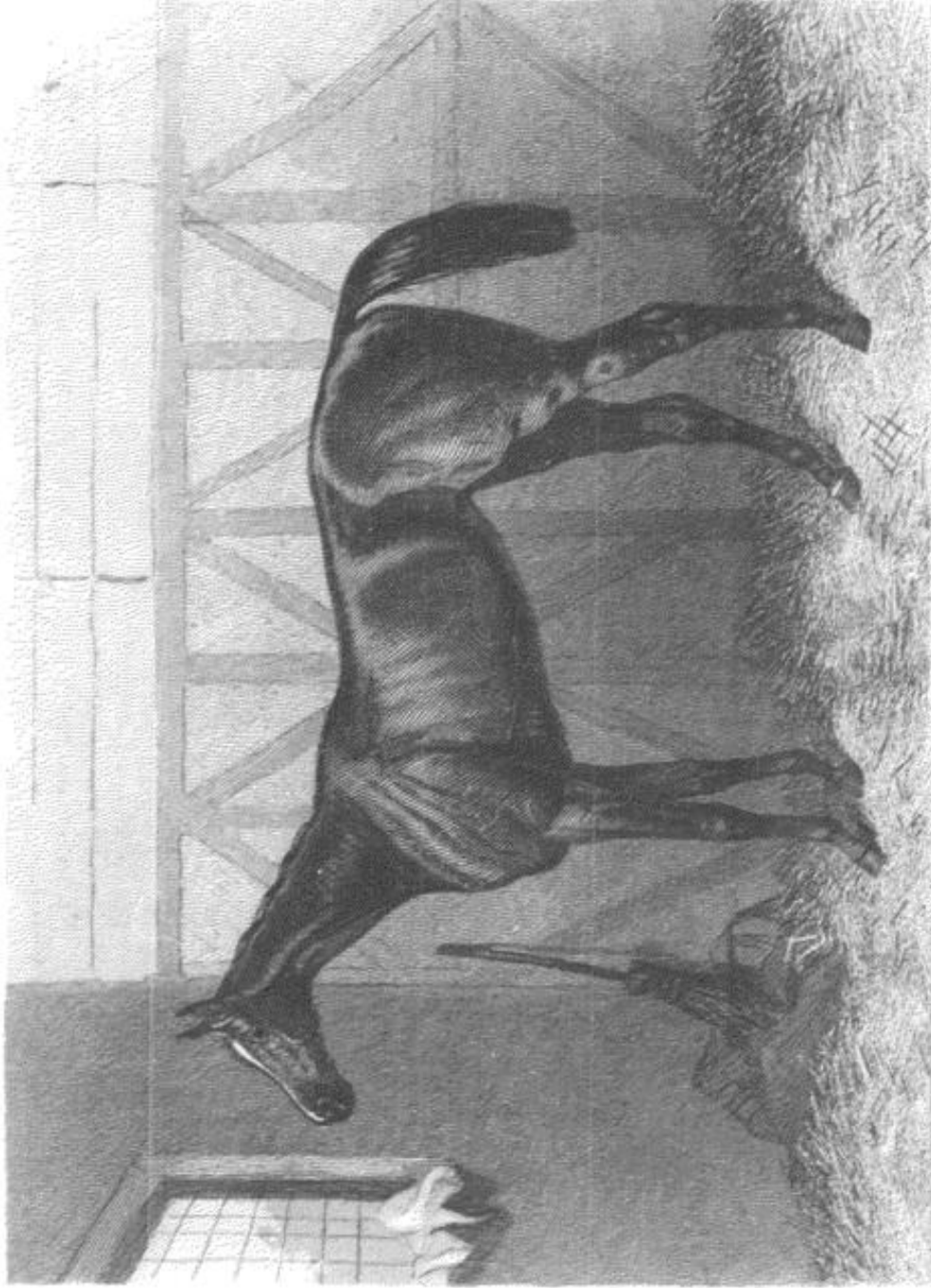

At *Paris* (*T. Chaloner*), ran second in the *Grand Prix de Paris*, won by b. c. *Vermout* by *The Nabob* (*Kitchener*), beating b. c. *Bois Bousel* (winner, this year, of the *French Derby*) by *The Nabob*, third, ch. *Baronello* by *The Baron*, and *Fille-de-l'Air*; 7 to 4 on *Blair Athol*, 3 to 1 against *Fille-de-l'Air*, and 20 to 1 against *Vermout*. At *Ascot*, 8st 10lbs each (*Chaloner*), won the *Triennial*, of £585, beating *Ely* by two lengths; 6 to 5 on *Ely*. At *Goodwood*, 8st 7lbs (*Chaloner*), won the *Gratwicke Stakes*, of £800, beating br. c. *Peon* by *Alarm*, 8st 7lbs, by two lengths, b. f. *Miss Pickle* by *Saunterer*, 7st 13lbs, and one other. S. mg., w. o. for the *Zetland Stakes*, of £150. At *York*, 9st 2lbs (*Chaloner*), ran second in the *Great Yorkshire Stakes*, of £940, won by the *Rev. John King's* ch. c. *Miner* by *Rataplan*, 8st 10lbs (*Osborne*), by a length, beating *Ely* (*Custance*), 8st 10lbs, third, *Hollyfox*, and two others; 2 to 1 on *Blair Athol*, *The Miner* not quoted. At *Doncaster*, 8st 10lbs (*J. Snowden*), won the *Great St. Leger*, of £5300, beating *General Peel* (*Wells*) by two lengths, *Cambuscan* (*Edwards*) third, *Miner* (*Osborne*) fourth, *Ely*, *Knight of Snowden*, and two others; 2 to 1 against *Blair Athol*, 3 to 1 against *General Peel*, 6 to 1 against *The Miner*, 100 to 6 against *Cambuscan*, and 20 to 1 against *Ely*. This was *Blair Athol's* last appearance on the *Turf*. It is a matter for regret that *Blair Athol* did not aspire to *Cup* honours, either at *Ascot*, where he could again have tried conclusions with *Scottish Chief*, or at *Doncaster*, where he would have met *General Peel*. At the termination of his racing career, *Blair Athol* was sold to Mr. *Jackson*, latterly better known, among his sporting brethren, as *Jock of Oran*, from having purchased the *Oran Estate*, long in the possession of the *Wilson's*.

Blair Athol died at *Cobham*, on Sunday, the 3rd of September, 1882.

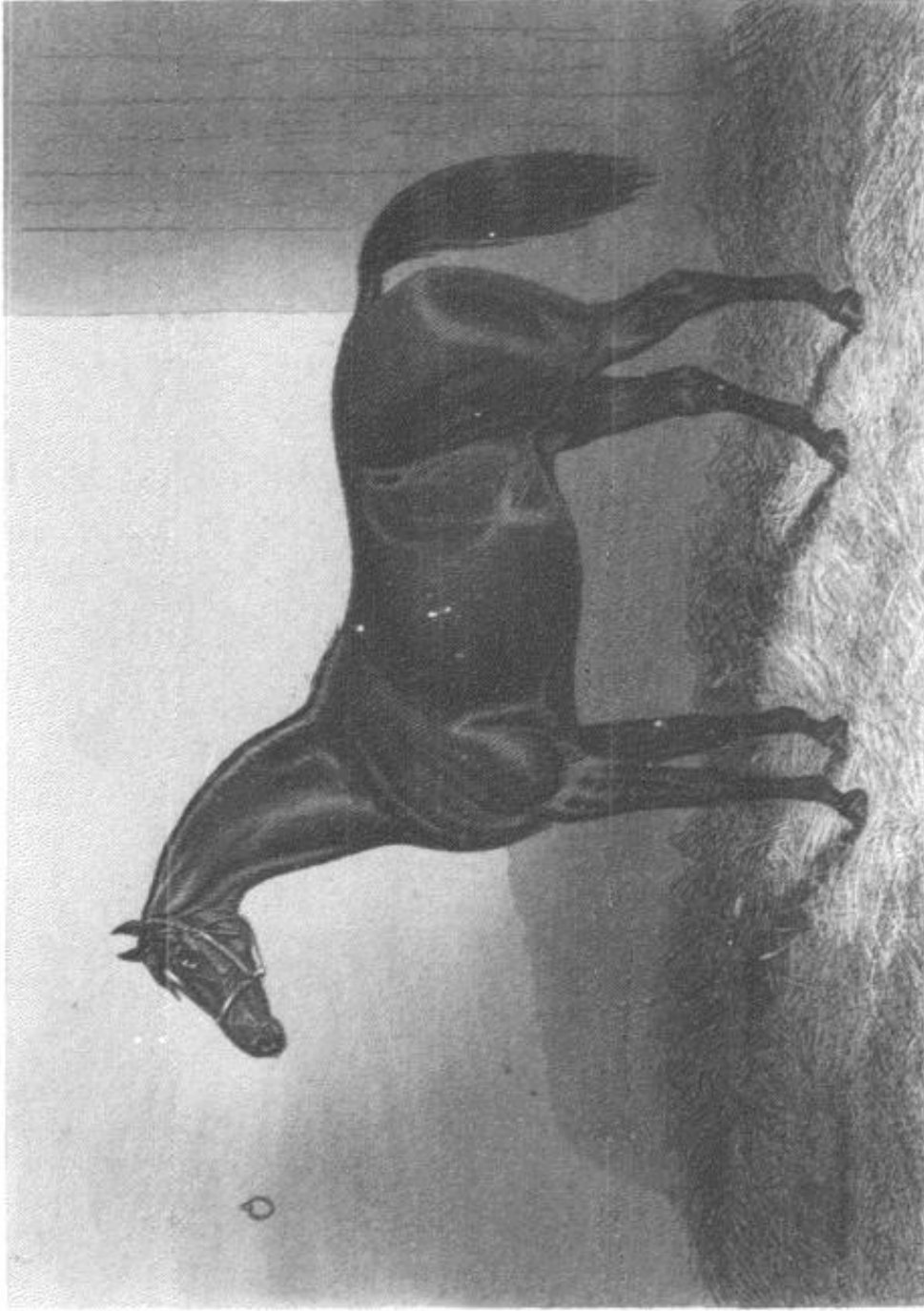

Skeffington by Teddington, 8st 10lbs, last. S. mg. 8st 10lbs (Custance), won the Triennial, of £408, beating b. f. Tomato (winner, this year, of the Ascot Stakes), 8st 4lbs (J. Daley), in a canter, and br. c. Sir Roger by Saunterer, 8st 7lbs.

1865.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 10lbs each (Custance), was beaten in the Biennial, by Cambuscan (Fordham), by two lengths; four ran. At Bath, 8st 10lbs (Custance), two and a half miles, won the Cup, of £580, beating Cambuscan (Fordham), 8st 10lbs, by four lengths, and four others. At Ascot, 8st 10lbs (Custance), won £485, beating Baragah, 8st 10lbs (Ashmall), by a neck, and three others. S. mg., 8st 10lbs each (Custance), won the Cup and Sweep, of £870, after a dead-heat with General Peel (Fordham), beating also The Baron's b. f. Zephyr (dam of Favonius), three years, 7st 2lbs, by King Tom (J. Grimshaw), third, b. c. Victorious by Newminster, three years, 7st 5lbs (Morris), br. f. Fille-de-l'Air, four years, 8st 7lbs (H. Grimshaw), and b. c. Oppressor by Newminster, three years, 7st 5lbs (Covey); 7 to 4 each against General Peel and Fille-de-l'Air, 6 to 1 against Ely, and 9 to 1 against Zephyr; deciding heat, 2 to 1 on General Peel, who was beaten by twelve lengths. At Goodwood, 9st 7lbs (Custance), won the Cup, of £550, beating Cambuscan, 9st (Carroll), Mr. H. Saville's b. c. Privateer by Skirmisher, four years, 8st 10lbs (Loates), third; also, Lord Glasgow's br. c. General Peel by Young Melbourne, four years, 9st 7lbs (Aldcroft), Mr. Morris's b. c. Union Jack by Ivan, four years, 9st (Fordham), The Baron's ch. Breeze by King Tom, four years, 8st 10lbs (Wells), the Duke of Beaufort's br. c. Todleben by Muscovite, three years, 7st 7lbs (T. Cannon), ch. c. Eltham by Marsyas, three years, 7st 7lbs (H. Grimshaw), and br. c. Hollyfox by Voltigeur, four years, 8st 5lbs (W. Boyce). Betting, at starting, 3 to 1 against Mr. Robinson's Eltham, 4 to 1 against Ely,

11 to 2 each against General Peel and Cambuscan, and 100 to 8 against Privateer. Instantly the flag fell, Privateer jumped off with a clear lead of two lengths, followed by Eltham, Breeze, Ely, and Mr. Perry's Hollyfox, close at whose heels came Todleben, Union Jack, Cambuscan, and General Peel, all abreast. On making the turn Privateer was four lengths in advance of Breeze, who was now second, Union Jack being third, with Eltham and Hollyfox side by side next, followed by Ely, Cambuscan, Todleben, and General Peel. Ascending the hill, Hollyfox dropped back to the rear of all, and, as they reached the brow of the hill, Privateer, Breeze, Union Jack, Ely, Eltham (who won the Queen's Vase), and Cambuscan, in the order named, closed up. Entering the straight, Privateer's lead had decreased to half a length; and, halfway down the hill, he was headed by Ely, Cambuscan, Eltham, and Union Jack, who ran abreast to the commencement of the rails, where Custance let Ely out, who was never afterwards approached, winning in a canter, by two lengths; Cambuscan, who headed Privateer at the half-distance, securing second place by a neck. At Brighton, 9st 10lbs (Custance), won the Cup (val. £635), beating Mr. I'Anson's br. m. Caller-Ou, aged, 9st 2lbs (Chaloner), by eight lengths, Union Jack, 9st (Fordham), third, Cambuscan, 9st (Wells), fourth, Mr. Brayley's br. c. Redmire by Hospitality, three years, 7st 9lbs, fifth, and Lord Portsmouth's b. c. Sydmonon by Vengeance, three years, 7st 9lbs, last; 5 to 4 against Ely, 3 to 1 against Cambuscan. At Stockton, 9st 3lbs (Custance), won the Claret Stakes, of £295, beating three others by twenty lengths. At York, w. o. for the Burgundy Stakes of 200 sovs., and also for the York Cup, and now quitted the Turf.

THE RACE FOR THE ASCOT CUP OF 1865.

Mr. Mackenzie's Oppressor (Covey) rushed to the front immediately the flag fell, followed by Mr. Hodgman's Victorious (J. Morris), Ely (Custance), General Peel (Fordham), in the order named, Fille-de-l'Air, two lengths off, being next, close up with whom came Baron Rothschild's Zephyr (J. Grimshaw). These positions were maintained to past the stand, where Covey increased the pace with Oppressor, and soon placed a dozen lengths between him and his followers. Rounding the top turn,

Fille-de-l'Air, overpowering Harry Grimshaw, ran into the third place, soon after displaced Victorious, and became second. On reaching the bottom of the hill she was pulled back, and Ely took her place. On passing the lime-kilns, Victorious beat a retreat to the rear, and became the absolute last, General Peel now going on fourth, followed by Zephyr, the whole lot (with the exception of Oppressor, the leader) running in a body to the bend into the straight. Here Oppressor's lead began to shorten, and half way up he dropped quite away, leaving Ely, next the rails, in front; at the same time the Baron's filly, coming up on the left, headed General Peel and Fille-de-l'Air, and, for a brief period, inspired her supporters with a flattering hope. This, however, was soon dissipated, as they approached the distance, where she and the French filly appeared to be in difficulties, both being headed by General Peel, who caught Ely at the Queen's Stand, and, after a punishing and most exciting set to, finished with a dead-heat, Fordham especially making very free use with his persuaders, to which the gallant General responded most gamely. Deciding heat: Ely took the lead at a good pace to the turn into the straight, where General Peel went up to him; but, on reaching the enclosure, he put down his ears, swerved across the course, and defied all Fordham's efforts to keep him straight, and was thus, by a bit of temper, most disgracefully beaten.

GLADIATEUR.

GLADIATEUR was a b. c. bred in France, in 1862, by Count Lagrange. He was got by Monarque, out of Miss Gladiator by Gladiator, out of Taffrail by Sheet Anchor, out of the Warwick Mare by Merman (son of Whalebone), her dam, by Ardrossan, out of Shepherdess by Shuttle, out of a mare by Buzzard, out of Ann-of-the-Forest by King Fergus, out of Miss West by Match'em, her dam, by Regulus, out of a mare by Old Crab, out of the dam of Flying Childers, out of a mare by Basto. Monarque, a bay horse, foaled in 1852, with three reputed sires, viz. Sting, The Baron, and the Emperor, was admittedly the son of the last-named, out of Poetess by Royal Oak, out of Ada by Whisker, out of Anna Bella by Shuttle. After the breaking out of the Franco-Prussian War, in 1870, Count Lagrange's entire stud was sold off, and Gladiateur was purchased by Captain Ray. Up to the time of his death, in 1876, he had proved utterly unsuccessful at the Stud, and latterly had received very scant patronage, though a few fast and infatuated friends stood by him to the last, in the hope that, as he advanced in years, better fortune would attend him. Gladiateur was a rough-looking, angular horse, without any quality; but, amongst his Derby competitors, he stood out like a giant in the midst of pigmies; and, as "The Druid" remarks, "with his flying mane and hairy heels, he towered above them all like a king." Some of his earliest yearlings, from the prestige of their sire, fetched large prices, but they soon went all to pieces, and showed no signs of eventual recovery.

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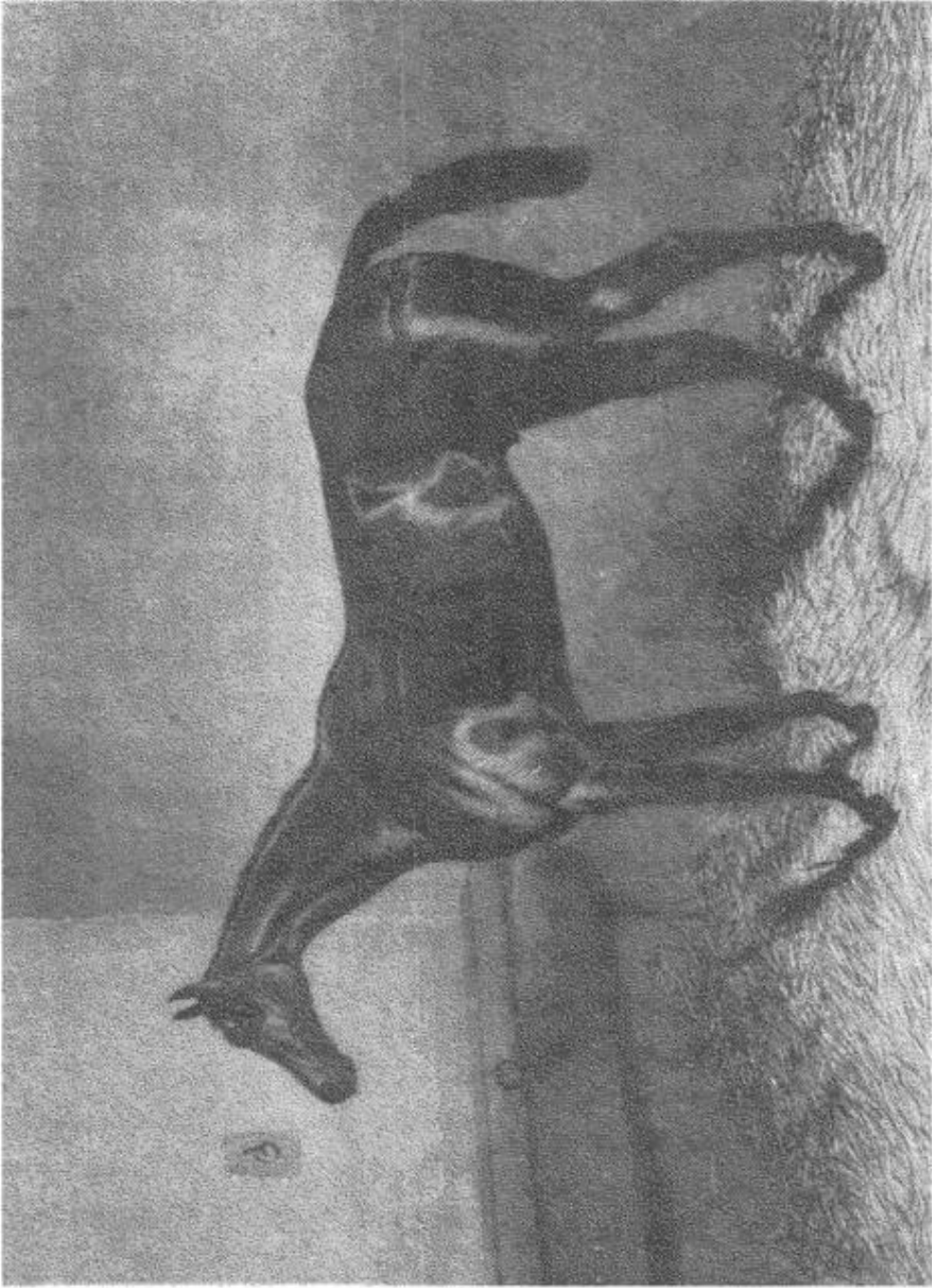

Siberia (winner, in 1865, of the 1000 Guineas), by Muscovite, 8st 11lbs—3lbs extra for winning the Filly Stakes at York—(Fordham), easily, by two lengths, Mr. Spencer's br. c. Longdown by Rattle, 9st 2lbs, and four others; 6 to 4 against Gladiateur, and 8 to 1 against Bedminster. At Newmarket (Ho.), 9st 2lbs (Edwards), not placed in the Criterion, of £1380, won by Mr. R. C. Naylor's ch. c. Chattanooga by Orlando, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), beating Lord Westmorland's br. c. Brahma, by Lambton, 8st 10lbs (J. Goater), by two lengths, Capt. Machell's b. c. Monitor by West Australian, 8st 10lbs, the Duke of Beaufort's b. c. Kœnig (winner of the Molecomb at Goodwood) by Trumpeter, and eleven others.

1865.

At Newmarket (First Spring), colts 8st 10lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (H. Grimshaw), won the 2000 Guineas (val. £5100), beating Lord Stamford's ch. c. Archimedes by Newminster (Aldcroft), second, Mr. Merry's br. c. Liddington by Orlando (J. Daley), third, his bl. c. Zambezi by Saunterer (Covey), Duke of Beaufort's ch. f. Tibia by Trumpeter, Mr. Chaplin's ch. c. Breadalbane by Stockwell, Mr. W. Robinson's b. c. Kangaroo (winner of the Newmarket Biennial, which induced the Marquis of Hastings to give the absurd sum of £12,000 for him) by Hobbie-Noble, Sir C. Rushout's ch. c. Cedric by Ethelbert, Count Lagrange's b. c. Le-Mandarin by Monarque, Mr. Ten-Broeck's ch. c. Jack-o'-Lantern by Stockwell, ch. f. Regalia, Pantaloon, Bedminster, Joker, and four others. At the Bushes Hill, a sheet would have covered the lot, Zambezi leading, who, on rising the hill, after the Abingdon Mile Bottom, was headed by Gladiateur, and on entering the cords, by Archimedes and Liddington (winner, in 1864, of the July and the Chesterfield Stakes, at Newmarket), the four running a magnificent race home, Gladiateur winning in the last

stride by a neck, the same distance between Archimedes and Liddington ; 3 to 1 against Bedminster, 9 to 2 against Liddington, 5 to 1 against Kangaroo, and 7 to 1 against Gladiateur. Zambezi, fourth, was only a head from Liddington. At Epsom, colts 8st 10lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (H. Grimshaw), won the Derby, of £6875, beating Mr. Walker's br. c. Christmas-Carol by Rataplan (French), second, Mr. Robinson's ch. c. Eltham by Marsyas (S. Adams), third, br. c. Longdown (Osborne), fourth ; also, the Duke of Beaufort's br. c. Todleben (winner of the Royal Stakes at Newmarket) by Muscovite. The Baron's b. f. Zephyr (dam of Favonius) by King Tom, Mr. Chaplin's b. c. Broomielaw, and his ch. c. Breadalbane, both by Stockwell, Mr. Watts' b. c. Olmar by Saunterer, Mr. Mackenzie's b. c. Oppressor by Newminster, Le Mandarin, Archimedes, Brahma, Bedminster, Mr. Merry's b. c. Wild Charley by Wild Dayrell, b. c. Kangaroo, and eleven others ; 5 to 2 against Gladiateur, 7 to 2 against Breadalbane, 10 to 1 each against Archimedes and Longdown, and 20 to 1 against Christmas-Carol. Rounding Tattenham Corner, Broomielaw (winner of the Chesterfield Cup, at Goodwood, in 1866), was leading, followed closely by Eltham and Christmas-Carol, with Todleben next, wide on the right, and in his rear came Longdown, Archimedes (Chaloner), Brahma (J. Goater), and Gladiateur, in the order named. After crossing the road, Gladiateur took fourth place ; at the distance, Christmas-Carol headed Broomielaw ; and he and Eltham ran locked together to the half-distance, where Harry Grimshaw, with a rush, sent the mighty Frenchman to the front, who won in a canter by two lengths. At Paris, 7st 12lbs each (H. Grimshaw), won the Grand Prix de Paris, of £5744, beating Monsieur Delamarre's b. c. Vertugadin by Fitzgladiator, in a canter, by three lengths, br. c. Tourmalet by The Flying Dutchman, third, Major Fridolin's ch. c. Gontran (winner, this year, of the French Derby) by Fitzgladiator, Todleben, and Le-Mandarin ; 5 to 3 on Gladiateur. At Goodwood, 9st 6lbs (H. Grimshaw), won the Drawing-room Stakes, of £500, beating Longdown, 9st 1lb—5lbs extra—(Fordham), by forty lengths, and Mr. W. Cartwright's ch. f. Princess of Wales by Stockwell, 8st 6lbs (Custance), third, and last ; 3 to 1 on Gladiateur. S. mg., w. o. for the Bentinck Memorial Stakes (£315). At Doncaster, colts 8st 10lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs, won the Great St. Leger, of £5950, beating Regalia

(winner of the Oaks) easily, by three lengths (Osborne), Archimedes (Carroll), third, Lord Hastings' b. c. The Duke by Stockwell, Mr. Bowes' b. f. Klarinska (winner, this year, of the Great Yorkshire Stakes) by De Clare (son of Touchstone), Mr. Richard Tattersall's b. f. Peeress by Newminster, bl c. Zambezi, ch. c. Breadalbane, and six others; 6 to 4 on Gladiateur, 5 to 1 against The Duke, and 6 to 1 against Regalia. S. mg., 9st 6lbs, 10lbs extra (H. Grimshaw), won the Doncaster Stakes, of £770, beating Breadalbane, 8st 10lbs (Custance), by three lengths, and Reginella, 8st 6lbs (French), last; 5 to 1 on the winner. At Paris, 8st (H. Grimshaw), won the Prix du Prince Impérial, of £404, beating Vertugadin, 8st (Hullock); only two ran. At Newmarket (Second October), 9st 4lbs (H. Grimshaw), won the Newmarket Derby, of £455, beating Longdown, 8st 11lbs (Fordham), by forty lengths as before; only these two ran. At Newmarket (Ho.), 9st 12lbs, very heavy going (Grimshaw), not placed in the Cambridgeshire, of £2240, won by Mr. R. Sutton's br. f. Gardevisure by Vedette, three years, 6st 2lbs (Carter), beating Lord Poulett's b. f. Nu by Orpheus, three years, 5st 7lbs (Goodwin), by a neck, Mr. Geo. Payne's br. f. sister to The Duke, four years, 5st 10lbs, third; also, Mr. Day's b. h. Catch'em-alive (winner of the Stake in 1863) by Flatcatcher, six years, 7st 12lbs., br. c. John Davis (winner of the Great Northampton Stakes in 1866) by Voltigeur, four years, 8st 7lbs, Mr. Brayley's b. f. Endsleigh (winner of the Great Metropolitan Stakes in 1867) by Gemma-di-Vergy (son of Sir Hercules), three years, 6st 7lbs, Regalia, Le-Mandarin, Breadalbane, ch. c. Moldavia by Hospodar, three years, 6st 2lbs, ch. c. Ostregor, three years, 6st, The Duke, Gontran, and twenty-two others; 6 to 1 each against Gladiateur and Moldavia, and 25 to 1 against the winner; four lengths between second and third.

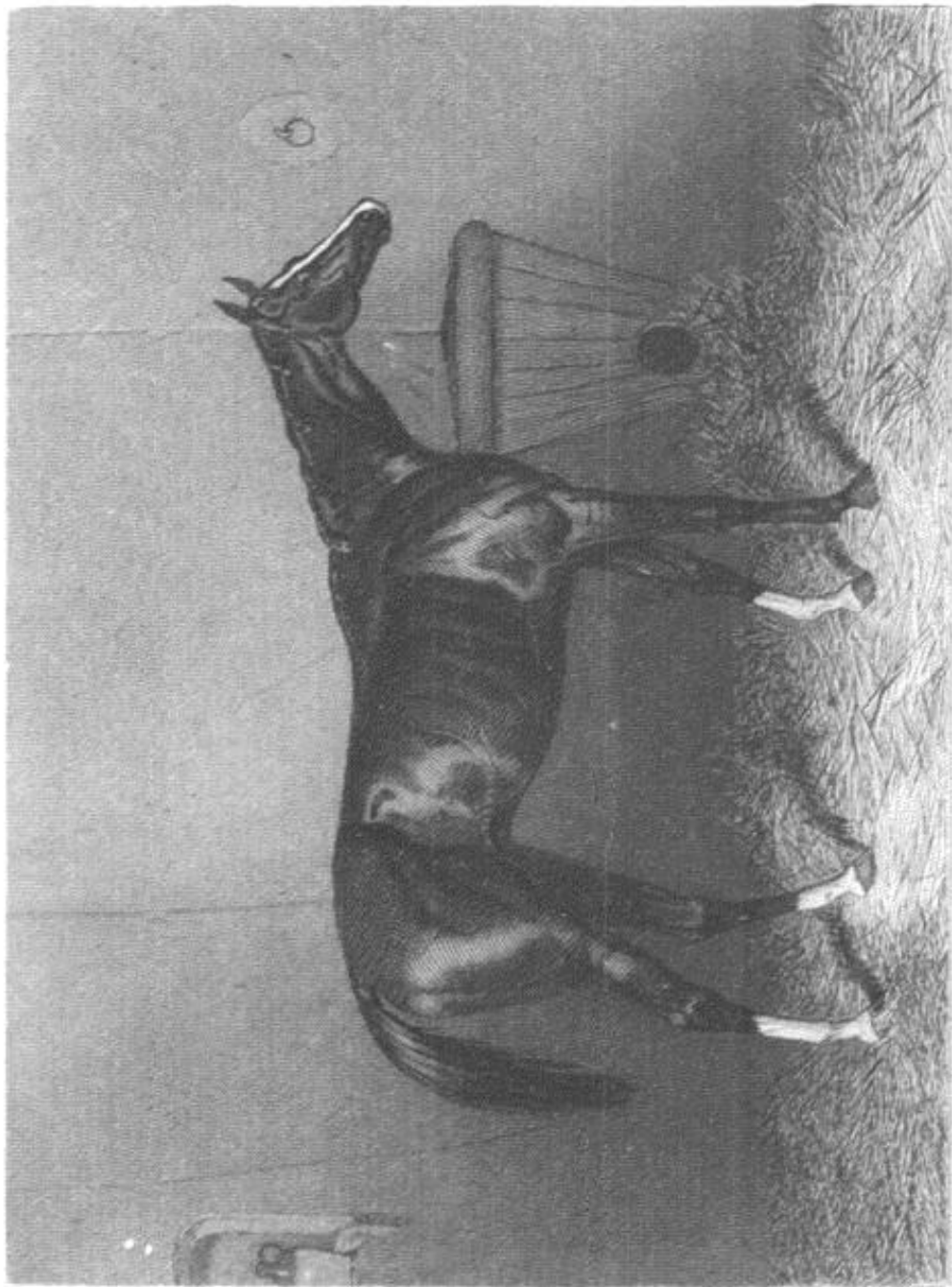

In addition Gladiateur won, this year, at Paris, the Grand Prix de l'Impératrice, of £658, beating

b. f. Fumée by Fitzgladiator, and Vertugadin, in April. At Paris (April), 10st 7lbs, won the Gold Cup (£841), beating Le-Mandarin, second, 9st 8lbs, Gontran third, and one other (Grimshaw). At Paris (October), 8st 13lbs (Geo. Pratt), four miles, won the Grand Prix de l'Empereur, of £855, beating Vertugadin, 8st 13lbs (Chas. Pratt), by three lengths, b. f. Fumée, 8st 10lbs, and ch. c. Gland-d'Or by Cossack, 9st 6lbs, last.

Gladiateur won in Stakes alone £980 in 1864; in 1865, £12,480; in 1866, £2378, not including the Ascot Cup of £650, and The Cup at Paris of £841.

She was got by Stockwell, out of The Gem (a bl. m. foaled in 1851) by Touchstone, out of The-Biddy by Bran, out of Idalia (The dam of Pantaloon, and bred by Lord Grosvenor in 1815) by Peruvian (son of Sir Peter), out of Musidora (bred by Lord Grosvenor in 1804) by Meteor, out of Maid of all Work by Highflyer, out of sister to Tandem by Syphon, her dam, by Reguius, out of a mare by Snip (son of Flying Childers).

At Doncaster, 9st 7lbs (Norman), won the Queen's Plate, again beating Ackworth, 9st 13lbs (Fordham), by a half distance, b. f. Tormentor by King Tom, and two others, all of whom had pulled up. At Newmarket (Second October), not placed in the Cesarewitch, won by Lecturer. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 10lbs, won £100, beating Ostreger, four years, 8st 10lbs, and three others. He was got by Stockwell, out of Paradigm by Paragone (son of Touchstone), out of Ellen Horne by Redshank (son of Sandbeck), out of Delhi (bred by the Duke of Grafton in 1838) by Plenipotentiary, out of Pawn-junior (bred by his Grace in 1817) by Waxy, out of Pawn (bred by the Duke in 1808) by Trumpator, out of Prunella by Highflyer, &c., &c.

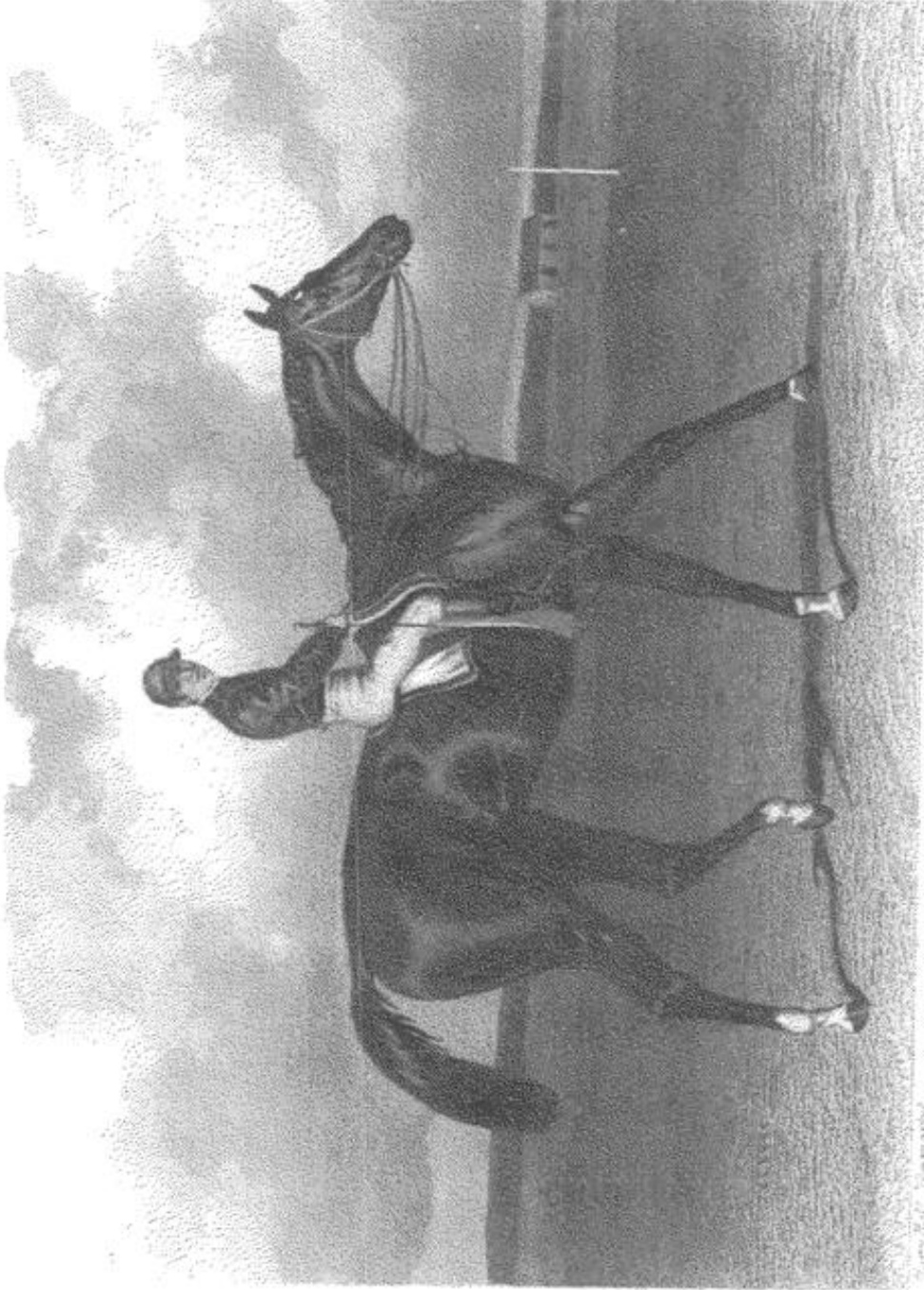

Janitor by King Tom, 9st 1lb (Wells), third, Mr. R. C. Naylor's b. c. Hawthorn by Stockwell, 8st 8lbs, The Primate, 8st 8lbs, the Duke of Beaufort's b. c. Jack-in-the-Green by Gleumasson (winner, this year, of the Prendergast), 8st 12lbs, and seven others; 5 to 2 on Lord Lyon, and 10 to 1 against any other. Janitor was beaten by a head for second place.

1866.

At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 10lbs (Thomas), won the 2000 Guineas (val. £4850), beating Mr. Naylor's ch. c. Monarch of the Glen, by Stockwell (Chaloner), Lord Exeter's b. c. Knight of the Crescent by Knight of St. Patrick (Ashmall), third, Lord Glasgow's ro. c. by brother to Bird on the Wing (Osborne), fourth, also Robin Hood, Janitor, Jack-in-the-Green, Mr. Merry's b. c. Student by Oxford, and seven others; 75 to 40 on Lord Lyon, 50 to 1 against Monarch of the Glen, and 66 to 1 against Knight of the Crescent. About two hundred yards from home, Mr. Naylor's colt, Lord Exeter's colt, and Lord Glasgow's roan colt, were running abreast of Lord Lyon's quarters, but, the moment Thomas roused him, a few strides from the chair, he left them without an effort, and won by a length. At Epsom (Custance), won the Derby, of £7550, beating Lord Ailesbury's ch. c. Savernake (brother to St. Albans) by Stockwell (French), by a short head, the Duke of Beaufort's ch. c. Rustic by Stockwell (Cannon), third; also, Mr. Bowes' b. c. Westwick (winner, this year, of the Great Ebor Handicap) by Stockwell, Lord Hastings' b. c. Blue Riband by Fazzoletto, Count Lagrange's b. c. Plutus (sire of Flageolet) by Trumpeter, Prince Soltykoff's b. c. Duke of York by Windhound, Mr. Bryan's ch. c. Laneret by Newminster, Mr. Rigby's ch. c. Abergeldie (winner of the City and Suburban in 1867) by Trumpeter, ro. c. Strathconan (winner, this year, of the Great Yorkshire Stakes), Knight of the Crescent, Redan, Janitor, Robin Hood, Vespasian (now Mr. Chaplin's), Monarch of the Glen, Sealskin, and nine others; 6 to 5 on Lord Lyon, 5 to 1 against Rustic,

12 to 1 against Redan, and 20 to 1 against Savernake. Half an hour was consumed before a start could be effected. As they entered the furzes, Blue Riband (Cowley) rushed to the front, Robin Hood (Daley) being next. As they rounded the turn, into the old course, Lord Lyon moved up towards the leaders, closely attended by his dreaded and dangerous opponent Rustic, behind whom were Knight of the Crescent (Adams), Redan (H. Grimshaw), Savernake, Strathconan (J. Snowden), Vespasian (J. Grimshaw), and The Baron's other string, Janitor (Wells). Coming into the straight, the two leaders retired beaten, leaving Lord Lyon in front, followed by Redan, who, after a few strides was headed by Savernake, full of running. At the distance, Savernake headed Redan, as did Rustic also; and so strong was Savernake going, at this point, that he seemed to have both Lord Lyon and Rustic beaten. Half way up, however, Custance called vigorously on Lord Lyon, who caught Savernake at the Stand, and just won, in the very *last stride*, Rustic being three lengths behind. Lord Ailesbury thought French might have won, and, in the St. Leger, his Lordship put up Tom Chaloner, but with the same result, as will be seen. At Ascot, 9st 3lbs (Custance), ran second in the Prince of Wales's Stakes, of £3925, won by Rustic, 8st 13lbs (Fordham), beating Robin Hood, 8st 3lbs (J. Daley), third, b. c. Sealskin 8st 3lbs, Chibisa, 8st 13lbs, and one other; 75 to 40 on Lord Lyon, 5 to 1 against Rustic, and 6 to 1 against The Baron's colt. As they entered the straight, Lord Lyon held a clear lead, followed by Rustic and Robin Hood to half way up the hill, where Fordham drew up to the favourite, and at the enclosure, made his effort, heading Lord Lyon at the Stand, and winning cleverly by half a length, Robin Hood being a bad third. At Doncaster, 8st 10lbs (Custance), won the St. Leger of £5825, beating Savernake (Chaloner) by a short head, as before, Knight of the Crescent (Norman), third, Mr. Graham's ch. c. Caithness by St. Albans, Lord Zetland's br. c. Podargus by Newminster, Strathconan, Westwick, Sealskin, and three others; 7 to 4 on Lord Lyon, 9 to 2 against Savernake, 14 to 1 each against Strathconan and Westwick, and 25 to 1 against Knight of the Crescent. An admirable start was effected, Lord Glasgow's b. c. by Young Melbourne (French) leading, at a great pace, and followed by Lord Lyon, Caithness (Parry), Knight of the Crescent, and Harefield, the rest being in a cluster,

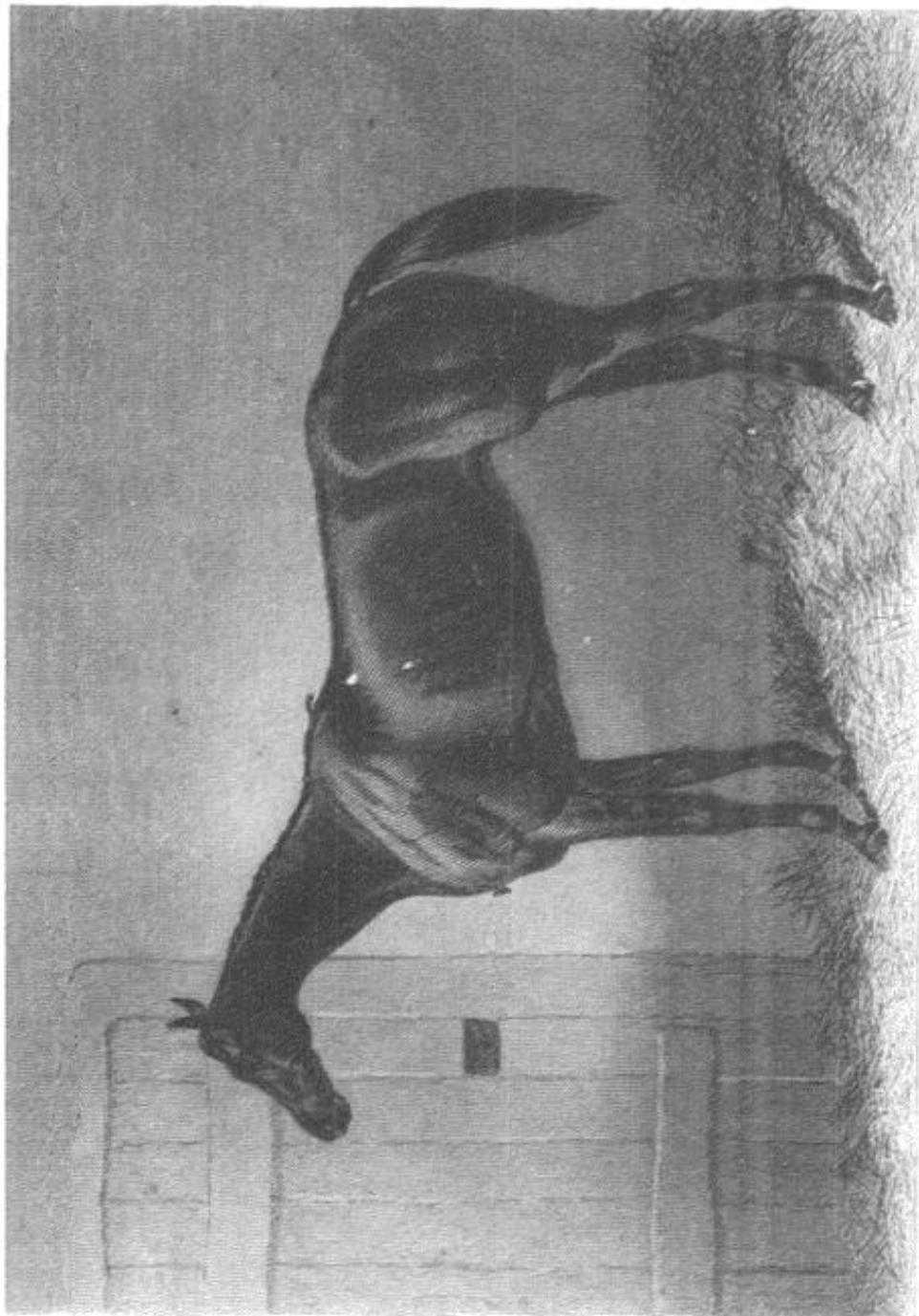
with the exception of Sealskin (Goater), and Sir W. Booth's br. c. Emigrant by Warlock, who were quite outpaced. When three hundred yards had been covered, Savernake and Knight of the Crescent drew up to Lord Lyon, where, as they emerged from behind the hill, Westwick took third place, Lord Glasgow's colt still leading, a couple of lengths in advance of Lord Lyon, Savernake having been pulled back. On nearing the Red House, the Young Melbourne colt retired beaten, as did Westwick (Fordham) also. Coming into the straight, Lord Lyon was leading, followed by Caithness at his girths, Savernake being third, Knight of the Crescent fourth, and Strathconan fifth. Five hundred yards from home, Caithness cried "enough," the race now being confined to Lord Lyon (in the centre), Knight of the Crescent (next the rails), and Savernake (on the outside). At the distance, Savernake, who had headed The Knight, got on level terms with Lord Lyon, and they raced home, neck and neck, and nose to nose, so closely locked together, that nobody could say which had won till the judge gave it in favour of Lord Lyon, by the shortest of heads. One yard further, Savernake must have won; at least, such was the general opinion. He was a much gamer horse than Lord Lyon, and had good running left in him at the finish. Had he come earlier, he would assuredly have beaten the crack. His owner gained nothing by the change of jockeys. S. mg., 7st 11lbs (Chaloner), ran third for the Cup, won by Lord Westmorland's b. c. Rama (winner also, this year, of the Goodwood Stakes and the Lewes Grand Handicap) by Lord Fauconberg (son of Irish Birdcatcher), three years, 7st (Kenyon), beating Lord Hastings' br. g. Ackworth (winner of the Cambridgeshire in 1864, and the Doncaster Cup in 1865), by Fazzoletto, five years, 9st 2lbs (Fordham), by eight lengths, and b. c. Sealskin, three years, 7st (Covey), beaten off: a head between second and third; 6 to 1 on Lord Lyon, 8 to 1 against Rama, and 20 to 1 against Ackworth. At Newmarket (First October), 9st 3lbs (Custance) won the Grand Duke Michael Stakes, of £1000, beating Lord Exeter's b. c. Knight of the Crescent, 8st 5lb (Norman), in a canter, by six lengths, Robin Hood, a bad third, and Lord Exeter's b.c. Knight of St. Michael by Knight of St. Patrick, three years, 8st 10lbs, beaten off; even on Lord Lyon. At Newmarket (Second October), 9st 3lbs (Custance), won the Select Stakes, of £325, beating Mr. Watts' Strathconan, 9st 1lb (J.

Snowden), by three lengths, and the Duke of Beaufort's br. c. Mr. Pitt 8st 10lbs (Fordham), a bad third, and last; 4 to 1 on Lord Lyon. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 10lbs (Custance), ran second in the All-aged Stakes, won by Mr. Pryor's ch. c. Friponnier by Chevalier-d'Industrie, two years, 6st 12lbs (Covey), beating also Rustic, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), three lengths from Lord Lyon, third and last; won easily by two lengths; 7 to 4 on Lord Lyon, 2 to 1 against Friponnier, and 4 to 1 against Rustic. S. mg., 8st 10lbs each, D. I. (Custance), match for 1000 sovs., beat Rustic (Fordham), by twenty lengths.

1867.

At Newmarket (First Spring) won £100 Plate, beating two others; and also, 8st 10lbs (Custance), won another £100 Plate, beating b. c. Julius by St. Albans, three years, 7st (Covey), by a short head, and one other. At Ascot, 10st (Chaloner), won the Biennial, of £590, beating the Duke of Hamilton's b. c. Wild Moor by Wild Dayrell, three years, 8st (Edwards), by twelve lengths, and Mr. J. Day's b. c. Harpenden by St. Albans. At Stockbridge, 9st 13lbs (Chaloner), won The Cup, beating Mr. Thelluson's b. h. Ostreger by Stockwell, five years, 9st 7lbs (Fordham), by a length, Lord Hastings' b. c. Mameluke by Stockwell, two years, 7st 1lb (Kenyon), third, and four others. At Lincoln, 9st 7lbs each (Chaloner), for the Queen's Plate, again was beaten by Rama (Custance), by a head, Regalia, five years, 9st 11lbs, being third; 7 to 4 on Lord Lyon, who now retired to the Stud, where he has begotten some very creditable racing stock, among them being Placida, the winner of the Oaks, and Mr. R. C. Vyner's Minting.

Old Crab), &c., &c.

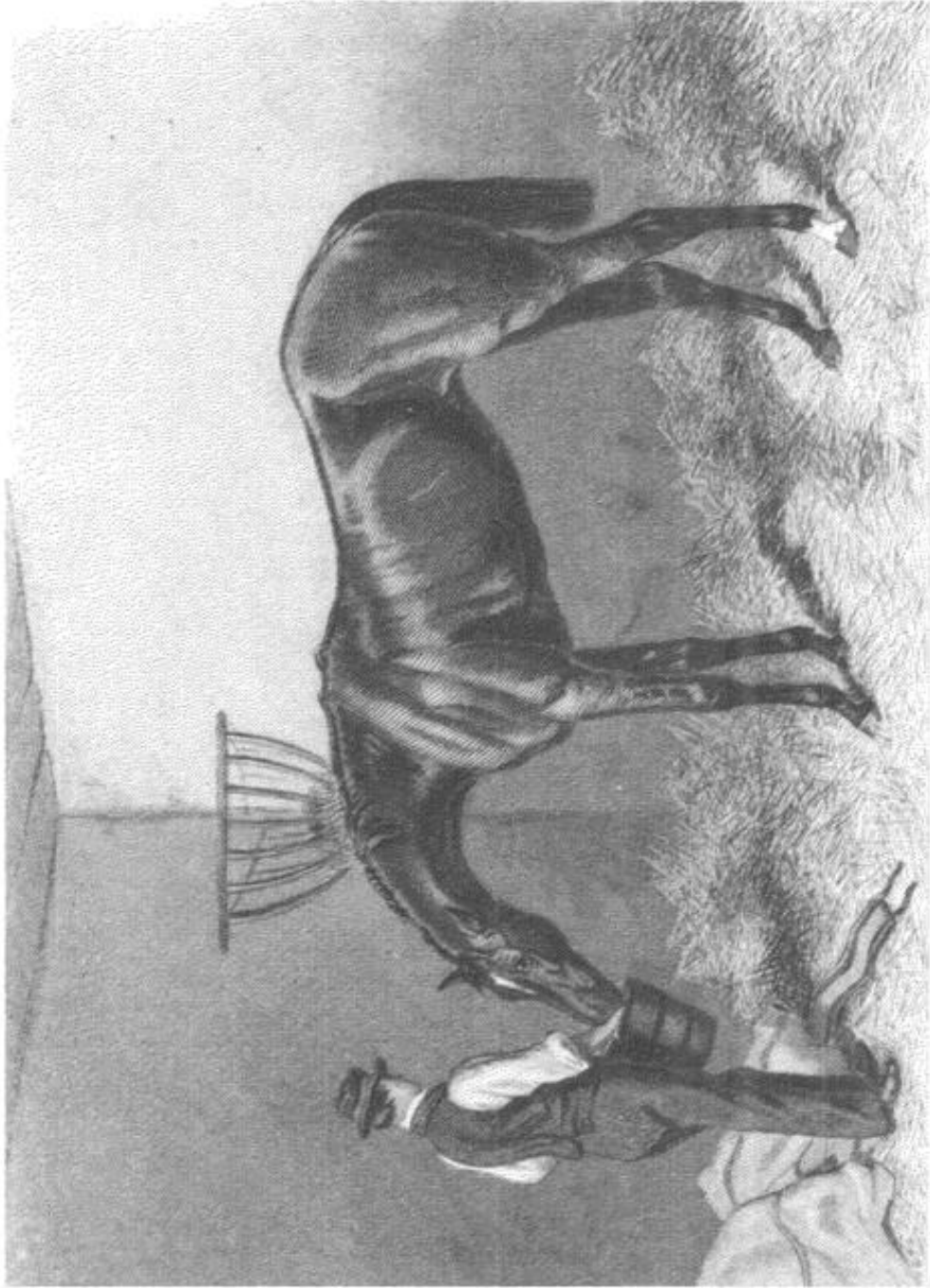

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TORMENTOR.

TORMENTOR was a b. f., foaled in 1863, the property of Mr. Dunbar. She was got by King Tom, out of Torment by Alarm, out of a mare by Glencoe, out of Alea (bred by Lord Jersey in 1828) by Whalebone, out of Hazardess by Haphazard, out of a mare by Orville, out of Spinetta (bred by Lord Clermont in 1792) by Trumpator, her dam, by Herod, out of a daughter of Old Snap, out of a mare by Lord Gower's stallion (son of the Godolphin Arabian), &c. Tormentor was a slight, weedy-looking filly, with bad heels, curby hocks, weak knees, and a low back: defects inherited in a great measure from her sire. She had, however, grand quarters, wide hips and excellent shoulders, fortified by the stout and lasting properties of the Partisan and Defence blood on the side of her dam, to which her Oaks' victory is mainly due.

b. f. Monitress by Idle Boy, Mr. Morris's ch. f. La-Dauphine by Stockwell, Mr. Johnstone's ch. f. Lady Vane by Bandy, the Duke of Beaufort's br. f. Fair Rosamond by Gunboat (son of Sir Hercules), Lord Westmorland's b. f. Lady Sophia by King Tom, Capt. Lane's b. f. Ammunition by Vedette, Mr. W. S. Crawford's b. f. by King Tom, and a b. f. of Lord Glasgow's by Young Melbourne out of Maid of Masham; 7 to 2 against Ischia, 4 to 1 against Mr. Crawford's filly (out of Mayonaise), 9 to 2 against Tormentor, 9 to 4 against Proserpine, and 40 to 1 against Mirella. Mother of Pearl (Payne) jumped off with the lead, followed by La-Dauphine (A. Edwards), Fair Rosamond (A. Cowley), Hebe (Ashmall), and Tormentor. Next to these came Ischia (Cannon), Wild Briar (Chaloner), Actæa (Wells), and Ammunition (J. Daley). Three lengths off, Lady Sophia (Hibberd), Elfeta (Morris), and Monitress (Clement), running abreast, headed the ruck. When two hundred yards had been covered, Mother of Pearl gave place to La-Dauphine, who led at a strong pace through the furzes, at which point Mirella, emerging from the ruck, rushed to the front with an impetuosity not to be denied, nearly pulling Covey out of the saddle. There was little variation in the positions until Tattenham Corner was reached, when La-Dauphine again assumed the lead, and came on first into the straight, Mirella being second, Elfeta third, Proserpine (J. Goater) fourth, and Tormentor (J. Mann) fifth, Ischia, running wide on the high ground, being slightly in the rear. At the distance, La-Dauphine was again passed by Mirella, who now held a clear lead to the stand, and looking as though she would win easily; but, about thirty yards from home, she quite died away, and was instantly passed by Tormentor, who won very cleverly, by a good length, whilst Ischia, gaining on Mirella at every stride, was only beaten by a neck for second place, Lady Vane (Carroll) and Lord Glasgow's Maid of Masham filly (Osborne) were fourth and fifth, and Wild Briar sixth. At Hampton, 7st (J. Mann), won the Queen's Plate, beating six others. At Chelmsford 7st 9lbs (J. Mann), ran third in the Great Handicap of £285, won by Mr. Bevill's b. c. Ostreger by Stockwell, four years, 9st 1lb (W. Bevill), beating Mr. Goodwin's br. h. Saccharometer (winner in 1862, of the July Stakes, at Newmarket) by Sweetmeat, six years, 9st 5lbs (Fordham), by three lengths. At Newmarket (July), 7st 7lbs (J. Mann), not placed in

the Beaufort Stakes, of £265, won by Count Batthyany's b. c. Antimacassar by Zuyder Zee, four years, 6st 10lbs (Clark), beating Mr. Savile's b. c. Sealskin by Skirmisher, three years, 6st 9lbs (Covey), second, Mr. Ten-Broeck's ch. c. Forester by Stockwell, four years, 6st 7lbs (Kenyon) third, The Baron's b. f. Love-Apple by King Tom, out of Mincemeat, four years, 6st 13lbs (Peake), Mr. Pryor's bl. f. Lass-o'-Gowrie by Dundee, three years, 5st 7lbs, and Count Lagrange's b. c. He was got by Newminster, out of Vesta by Stockwell, out of Garland (bred by Sir Charles Monck in 1835) by Langar, out of a mare (bred by Sir Charles in 1828) by Whisker, out of The-Twinkle (bred by H. Peirse, Esq., in 1821) by Walton, out of a mare by Orville, out of Lisette (bred by Mr. Peirse in 1806) by Hambletonian, out of Constantia by Walnut, out of Contessina by Young Marske, out of Tuberoze by Herod, out of Grey Starling by the Bolton Grey Starling, out of Coughing Polly by Bartlett's Childers, out of sister to Thunderbolt by Lord D'Arcy's Counsellor (son of Lord Lonsdale's Counsellor), out of a mare by Snake (son of the Lister Turk), &c.

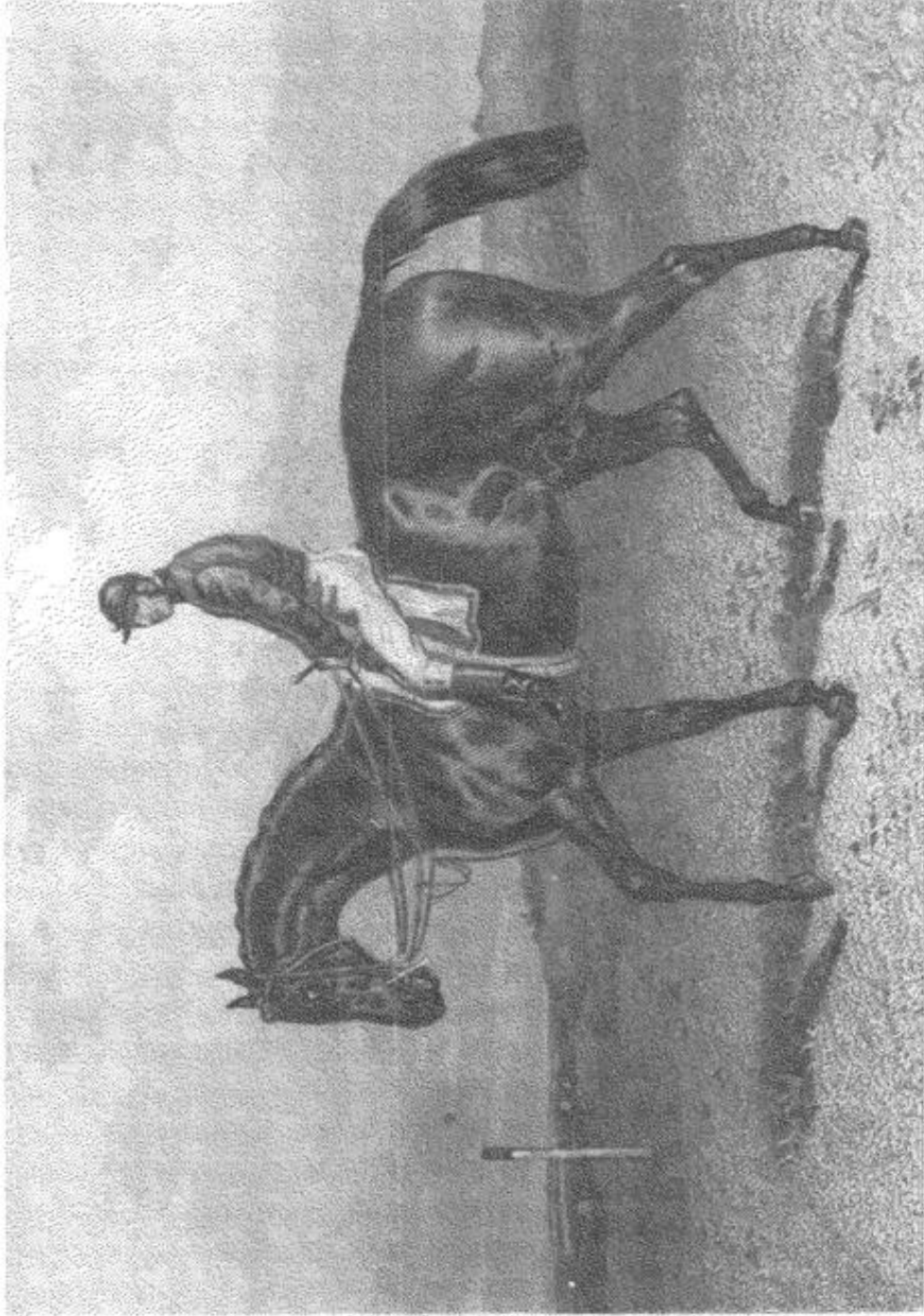

THE HERMIT.

THE HERMIT was a ch. c. foaled in 1864, the property of Henry Chaplin, Esq., M.P. He was got by Newminster, out of Seclusion by Tadmor (son of Ion), out of Miss Sellon by Cowl, out of Belle Dame by Belshazzar, out of Ellen by Starch (son of Waxy Pope), out of Cuirass (bred by Lord Sligo in 1823) by Oiseau, out of Castanea by Gohanna, out of Grey Skin by Woodpecker, out of a mare by Herod, out of Young Hag by Skim, out of Hag by Old Crab, out of Ebony by Flying Childers, out of Old Ebony by Basto, &c., &c.. Oiseau (son of Camillus) was bred by William Garforth, Esq., and sent over to Ireland, for a stallion.

“The Hermit, sire of the horse Tristan, which won for M. Lefèvre more than a third of the £20,537, standing to his credit, is again first on the list of ‘winning sires.’ It is the fourth year in succession that Hermit has occupied this position, having had 30 winners of 81 races, worth £44,608, in 1882, 21 winners, of 49 races, worth £27,222, in 1881, and 23 winners, of 64 races, worth £29,622, in 1880. In the two previous seasons (1878 and 1879), Hermit’s progeny won 64 races, worth £21,643, and this year (1883) 62 races, worth £30,801. Thus, in six seasons, 131 of his progeny have won 320 races, worth £153,896.” (From the *Times* of December 24th, 1883.)

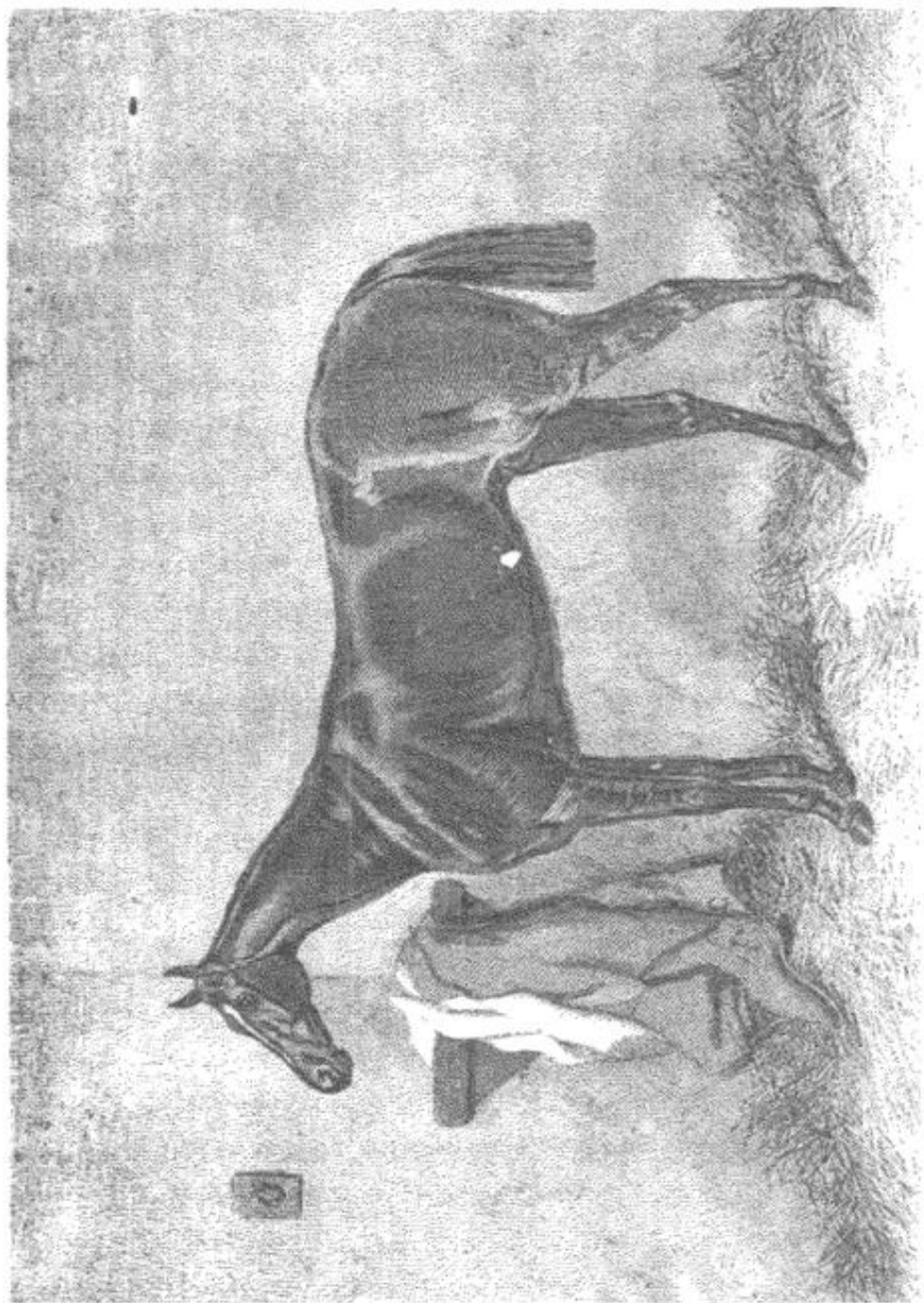

Seville by St. Albans, 8st 4lbs, third, and eleven others; 7 to 4 against Cellina, 5 to 2 against Seville, and 5 to 1 against Hermit. At Epsom, 8st 10lbs (Custance), ran second in the Woodcote, of £685, won by Achievement, 8st 7lbs (Chaloner), by three lengths, beating Monsieur Lupin's b. f. Jeune-Première (bred in France) by West Australian, 8st 7lbs (G. Pratt), third, Mr. H. Savile's br. c. D'Estournel, 8st 10lbs, and four others. At Ascot, 8st 10lbs (Custance), won the Biennial, of £705, beating Count Lagrange's b. c. Dragon by Ventre-St.-Gris (son of Gladiator) (H. Grimshaw), by a neck, Lord Stamford's br. c. Arundel by Wild Dayrell, 8st 10lbs each, third, The Baron's ch. c. Jasper by King Tom, 8st 7lbs (Wells), and twelve others. At Bibury, colts 8st 10lbs (Custance), won the Stockbridge Biennial, of £1020, beating the Duke of Beaufort's br. c. Vauban by Muscovite (Fordham), by a neck, Mr. Starkey's b. f. Viridis (winner, this year, of the two Nursery Stakes, of £1550, at Newmarket Ho.), by Marsyas, 8st 5lbs, third, and thirteen others; 11 to 8 on Hermit, 6 to 1 against Viridis, and 100 to 8 against Vauban. At Stockbridge, 8st 10lbs (Custance), won the Troy Stakes, of £1525, beating Lady Hester, 8st 4lbs (Fordham), by two lengths, Julius, 8st 7lbs (J. Goater), third, three lengths from second, Vauban, 8st 10lbs, and seven others. Hermit was so severely punished in this race, and so unnecessarily, by Custance, that he had ever after a dread of him, trembling and lathering whenever Custance mounted him.

At Epsom (J. Daley), won the Derby, of £7000 beating **ch. c. Marksman** (Grimshaw), by a neck, Vauban (Fordham), **third; also, not placed, Mr. H. Savile's br. c. D'Estournel** (who showed such temper at the post that he was left behind) by Parmesan, Mr. Gilby's ro. f. **Skysail** by Weatherbit, Mr. Baker's b. c. **Bedlamite** by Stockwell, Mr. Bowes' ch. c. **Taraban** (winner, in 1871, of the Goodwood Stakes) by Rataplan, Sir J. Hawley's b. c.

The Palmer by Beadsman, Mr. Fleming's br. c. Van Amburgh by Van Galen, Mr. Pryor's br. c. The Rake by Wild Dayrell, b. c. Wild Moor, Mr. A. Heathcote's ch. c. Gipsy King by Marsyas, Lord Exeter's b. c. Grand Cross by Knight of St. Patrick, Lord Hastings' br. c. Uncas by Stockwell, Lord Uxbridge's b. c. Distin by Trumpeter, Sir R. Bulkeley's br. c. Owain-Glyndwr by Young Melbourne, ch. c. Ben Nevis by Big Ben, Mr. Johnstone's b. c. Tynedale by Warlock, Julius, Dragon, and ten others; 6 to 4 against Vauban (winner of the 2000 Guineas), 7 to 1 against The Palmer, 9 to 1 each against Van Amburgh and The Rake, 11 to 1 against Marksman, 15 to 1 against Julius, and 1000 to 15 against Hermit, who was never mentioned for a place at all. Hermit's Derby will be for ever memorable on account of the heavy snow which fell during the whole day. After eleven false starts, occupying an hour, the thirty horses got off on good terms, except D'Estournel (Edwards), who, the moment the flag fell, reared right on end, standing quite upright on his hind-legs, till he rushed off to the chains, and tried to pound the bystanders with his near foreleg. Julius (J. Mann), took the lead, followed by Skysail (Huxtable), Bedlamite (Viney), and Vauban, slightly in advance of the rest, who were in a cluster. At the end of two hundred yards, Bedlamite rushed to the front, followed by Julius second, and Skysail third, the next lot being Wild Moor (Clement), Vauban, Van Amburgh (Chaloner), Owain-Glyndwr (J. Goater), The Palmer (Wells), Gipsy King (J. Snowden), and Hermit. The Rake (Custance) headed the ruck. At the mile post, Bedlamite dropped away, and Vauban took the lead, followed by Wild Moor, Van Amburgh, Julius, Marksman, The Rake, The Palmer, Hermit, and Gipsy King. In the order named, they streamed round Tattenham Corner, Vauban leading into the straight, with Wild Moor and Van Amburgh (on the whip-hand), and Marksman (on the lower ground), all well up with the leader, while The Palmer (next the rails) The Rake and Hermit (in the centre), were two lengths in the rear of them. The first to give way were The Rake and The Palmer; and before reaching the distance, the Duke of Hamilton's colt, Wild Moor, also compounded, the finish appearing to be left to Vauban, Marksman, and Van Amburgh, the last of whom was going so strong and well, that loud shouts of "The Van wins" were heard on all sides.

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Within the half-distance, however, The Van had shot his Lolt, and was displaced by Hermit, who now joined Vauban and Marksman. Nearing the Stand, Vauban was seen to be in difficulties; but he gamely struggled on, while Marksman was going quite within himself, and at such a strong and steady pace, that now the shouts were "Marksman wins in a canter." Less than a hundred yards from home, however, John Daley challenged with Hermit, who, unobserved by many, had been lying wide on the left of Marksman. Stride by stride, he now gained on his opponent, the finish in the last fifty yards being of the most exciting character, and terminating in the victory of Hermit by a neck, ridden with admirable patience and judgment. Daley received a *douceur* of £3000 for his fine riding from the confederates, Messrs H. Chaplin and Captain Machell, who were large winners by the event; the Marquis of Hastings losing, *it was said*, £120,000 on the race. Captain Machell managed both horse and market on this occasion. At Ascot, 8st 10lbs (Custance), won the Biennial of £705, beating Julius, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by a length, Count Lagrange's b. c. Dragon (bred in France), 8st 10lbs (Hibberd), third; also, Mr. Cartwright's br. c. Wroughton (winner, in 1866, of the North of England Biennial at York), by Musjid, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), and two others; 5 to 2 on Hermit. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Custance), won the St. James' Palace Stakes, of £900, beating The Palmer, 8st 10lbs (Wells), by three lengths, and Wild Moor, 8st 10lbs (Edwards), last; 20 to 1 on Hermit. At Doncaster (Custance), ran second in the St. Leger won by Achievement (Chaloner), Julius (Daley), being third, and Vauban fourth; Lord Glasgow's c. by Young Melbourne, Mr. Montgomery's b. c. Fer-vaques (bred in France, and winner, this year, of the Northumberland Plate) by Underhand, Lord Hastings' br. f. The Duchess (winner of the Nassau Stakes at Goodwood) by St. Albans, and his b. c. Challenge (winner, this year, of the Liverpool July Cup, the Huntingdonshire and the Hampshire Stakes, Queen's Plates at Lewes and Egham, and the Stewards' Cup at Kelso) by Trumpeter, The Palmer, Taraban, Van Amburgh, and Count Lagrange's ch. c. Longchamps by Monarque, were not placed; 6 to 5 against Hermit, 7 to 4 against Achievement, 12 to 1 against Vauban, and 100 to 7 against Julius. Half a mile from home, Vauban was leading, followed by The Palmer, Achievement, Hermit,

Julius, and Challenge. Rounding the turn, The Palmer was beaten, Julius taking his place, with Challenge close at his heels, fifth; the rest being out of the race. Before reaching the distance, Challenge succumbed; and at that point Vauban was done with, Achievement having now a slight lead of Hermit, upon whom Custance was seen to be at work. At the commencement of the enclosure, Chaloner called on Colonel Pearson's filly, who won by a length; Julius finishing most gamely, being only a head from Hermit, Vauban six lengths behind Julius. S. mg., 7st 7lbs (Jeffery), ran second for the Cup, won by Achievement, 7st 4lbs (Kenyon), by half a length; eight ran. S. mg., 9st 3lbs (Custance), won a sweep of £500, (St. Leger Course), beating Lord Glasgow's b. c. by Barbatus, three years, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), by a length, and br. c. Arundel, 8st 10lbs (Daley), last. At Newmarket (First October), 9st 3lbs (Custance), ran second in the Grand Duke Michael, of £750, won by ch. c. Friponnier by Chevalier-d'Industrie 8st 10lbs (French), by a length, Julius, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), being last; The Baron's b. f. Hippia (Daley), was third. Ran twice more without success.

1868.

At Newmarket Craven, 9st 3lbs (Custance), ran second in the Biennial, won by Julius, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by half a length; four ran. At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 9lbs (Custance), match for £1000, was beaten by Julius, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by two lengths; two miles. He ran three times more, this year, without success.

1869.

At Epsom (May), 9st 4lbs (Custance), not placed in the Six Mile Hill Handicap, of £1085, won by Count Batthyany's ch. h. Nine Elms by Stockwell, five years, 6st 10lbs, beating Martyrdom by St. Albans, three years, 7st 9lbs, second, and fifteen others. At Ascot, was not placed for the Royal Hunt Cup, won by Lord Wilton's br. c. See-Saw by Buccaneer, four years, 8st 7lbs (Fordham). Hermit ran once more, without a win, and retired to the Stud, where he has made a good name as a sire, having begotten a legion of winners, many of them of a very high class.

Hermit, like many other sons of Newminster, was a most delicate

horse to train. His running, as a two year old, would have been brilliant, had it been more uniform. At times he displayed great ability, and, at others, performed very moderately. Hermit was entered for the 2000 Guineas, but was withdrawn by Mr. Chaplin, as Captain Machell (who had the management of him) desired to run his own colt, Knight of the Garter, instead.

HIPPIA.

HIPPIA was a bay filly, bred by Baron Meyer de Rothschild in 1864, and got by King Tom, out of Daughter of The Star by Kremlin, out of Evening Star by Touchstone, out of Bertha by Rubens, out of Boadicea by Alexander (son of Eclipse), out of Brunette by Amaranthus, out of May Fly by Match'em, out of a mare by the Ancaster Starling, out of a daughter of Grasshopper (son of Old Crab), &c.

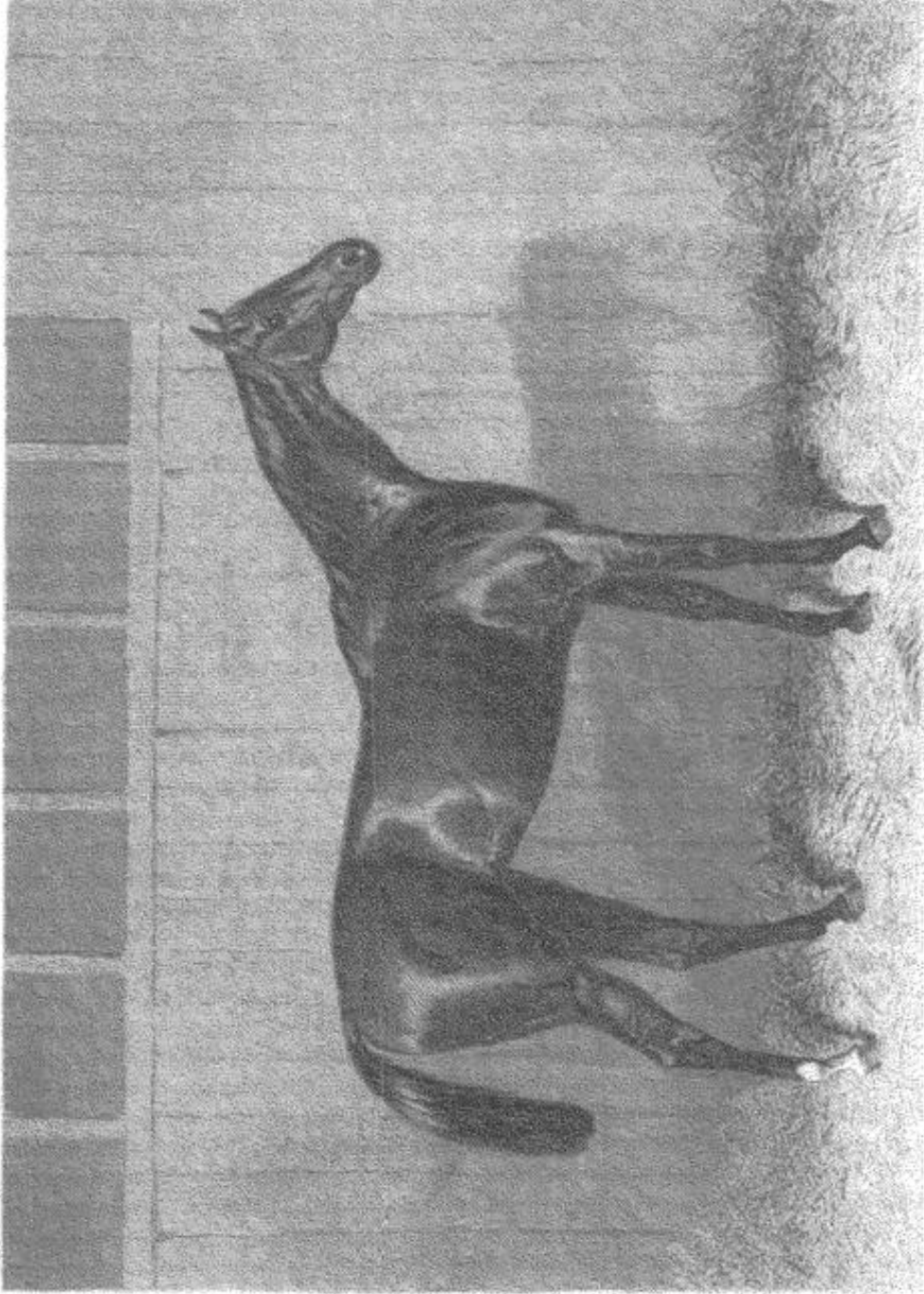

Girl and Bounceaway. Bumblekite was very fractious at the post, and delayed the start twenty minutes. At length they all got well away, Bumblekite (J. Snowden), going to the front, followed by Romping Girl (J. Osborne), and Achievement (Custance), close up. Hippia (Daley), Sœur-de-Charité (Loates), and Minster Bell (T. Chaloner), came next, Arapeile (Wells) and Bounceaway (J. Mann), being the two last. On reaching the City and Suburban starting-post, Romping Girl took the lead; and, at Tattenham Corner, there were not ten lengths between the first and last. Approaching the Stand, Achievement was seen in the centre of the course, with Hippia about a length behind her. On the lower ground were Bumblekite and Romping Girl, the former going so well and strong as if about to beat the lot. Past the Stand, Lord Zetland's filly held a slight lead, and Achievement no sooner challenged than Bumblekite gave in. At this momentous conjuncture Daley called upon Hippia, who answered most gamely, and was soon level with the favourite. ACHIEVEMENT (own sister to Lord Lyon) was foaled in 1864, and bred by Colonel Pearson. She was a dark-brown filly, standing fully fifteen hands and three inches high. She had a Stockwell head, was very full between the eyes, and her ears were curled back at the points; but the expression of her head was good. She had a powerful neck, fine shoulders, and an extraordinary depth of girth; but she ran up, like many of the sort, very light and waspish in the barrel. She had a good back, arched hips, drooping quarters, and strong muscular thighs. Her arms and knees were small, and she was altogether very light of bone, being also rather sickle-hocked, and standing with her hind-legs right under her. Her pasterns were long and well inclined, and she still retained on the off fore one the blemish caused by getting her feet over the collar-shank when a yearling. She was, however, a beautiful filly; though, by a casual observer, she would have been pronounced to be mean-looking in appearance, from being so very light and narrow. Paradigm, her dam, ran only twice (as a two year old), being second to Lord of the Isles, in the Lavant Stakes, and breaking down in the same week. Besides Lord Lyon and Achievement, she was the dam of King at Arms and Man at Arms, both by Kingston, of Blue Mantle and Panoply, also by Kingston, and of Gardevisure and Hatchment by Vedette.

For several strides the pair raced side by side, but, after passing the distance, Kenyon sent Achievement to the front, who, literally pulling her rider out of his seat, won by nearly a length. Tynedale was twenty lengths behind the pair. The pace was very great the last half-mile. The Duke of Beaufort's ch. m. Gomera dy Marsyas, five years, 8st 9lbs, was fourth, Mr. Heathcote's b. f. Bee's-wing (winner, this year, of the Chester Cup, and the Leamington Stakes), by Newminster, four years, 8st 2lbs (Cannon), was fifth. She pulled up a hundred yards from home.

1868.

At Bath, 9st 3lbs (Chaloner), ran second for the Beaufort Cup, won by Julius, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by fifteen lengths. At Ascot, 8st 5lbs (Chaloner), for four years old, ran second in the Triennial, won by Mr. Johnstone's ch. c. Mandrake (winner, this year, of the Doncaster Cup, and in 1867, of the Great Ebor Handicap, and the Liverpool Cup), by Weatherbit, 8st 10lbs (Osborne), ch. c. Taraban, 8st 10lbs (Custance), being third and last: even on Achievement; won by half a length. At Stockbridge, 9st 10lbs (Chaloner), ran third for the Cup, of £270, won by Captain Machell's br. c. Knight of the Garter, four years, 9st 6lbs (Custance), beating Mr. Savile's b. c. Ryshworth (winner of the July Stakes, and several other rich Stakes this year), by Skirmisher, two years, 7st 1lb (Maidment), by six lengths, and two others. The winner was the favourite. This was Achievement's last appearance on the Turf.

He was got by Muscovite (son of Hetman Platoff), out of Palm by Tadmire, out of Figtree by Envoy (son of Plenipotentiary), out of Azora, by Voltaire, out of Minikin by Manfred (son of Election by Gohanna), out of Morgiana by Coriolanus (son of Sir Peter), her dam, by Lurcher (son of Dungamon), out of a mare by Phlegon (son of Match'em), her dam, by Merlin (son of Second by Flying Childers), out of a daughter of Regulus, &c.

Within a dozen strides of the post, Wroughton looked all over the winner, but Fordham's grand rush just gained the victory. At

Newmarket (First Spring), colts 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the 2000 Guineas (£5350), beating Knight of the Garter (Custance), second, Marksman (Chaloner), third, Julius (Edwards), fourth; also, b. c. Uncas by Stockwell, Mr. Jones' b. c. Huntsman by Orlando, Count de Lagrange's ch. c. Trocadero, Mandrake, Pericles, Plaudit, Owain Glyndwr, Star of India, Van Amburgh, Ravioli, 8st 5lbs, and four others; 5 to 2 against Vauban, 100 to 30 against Plaudit, 4 to 1 against Julius, 7 to 1 against Marksman, and 20 to 1 against Knight of the Garter. After two breaks away, they all got well off, Uncas rushing to the front, Pericles racing at his quarters, followed by Van Amburgh (Cartwright), Star of India (French), Knight of the Garter, and Huntsman (Heartfield), on the right, Trocadero (Hibberd), Plaudit (J. Snowden), and Owain Glyndwr (Goater), being in the centre; while Julius, Vauban, and Marksman were close up on the left. At the end of a quarter of a mile, Daley, on Pericles (to serve Julius), forced the pace, and drew up to Uncas (Cannon), the pair racing head and head for three hundred yards, when Uncas began to tire, and Pericles took the lead by a couple of lengths, followed by Van Amburgh, Star of India, and Knight of the Garter, all of whom had passed Uncas. Close behind these came Plaudit, Huntsman, Trocadero, Owain Glyndwr, Julius, Vauban, and Marksman, the rest being pretty well up, except Ravioli. At the bushes hill, Pericles had shot his bolt, and retired, leaving Van Amburgh with the lead, but he soon after bolted across the course. Descending the hill, Plaudit retired beaten, and the leading division now comprised Marksman, Vauban, and Julius, in close company, on the left, Trocadero, Star of India, Knight of the Garter, and Huntsman being on the right, the two first and the last, however, soon compounded. When in the dip, Edwards had to call on Julius to keep pace with Vauban; but it was evident he could not do so. The race now seemed to be left to Vauban and Marksman, who were running head and head, when Custance, who was lying wide on the right, brought up Knight of the Garter with such a resolute rush, that it seemed as if he would prove the winner. The moment, however, that Fordham called on Vauban, it was all over; for he shot out, in the gamest manner, and won, easily, by two lengths, Marksman losing the second honours by a head only, Julius being three lengths from him; Trocadero was fifth,

and Lord Falmouth's *Star of India* sixth. At Epsom, ran third in the Derby, won by *Hermit*. At Ascot, 9st 1lb (Fordham), won the Prince of Wales' Stakes, of £3425, beating *Achievement*, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), by ten lengths, *Marksman* third (*Julius*), *Van Amburgh*, *Ravioli*, and six others. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the Triennial, of £440, beating *Achievement*, 8st 7lbs (Chaloner), by three lengths, *Mr. R. C. Ailesbury* by *St. Albans*, 8st 8lbs (*Custance*), by four lengths, the Duke of Newcastle's b. f. *Opoponax* by *Drogheda*, 8st 1lb (*Daley*), third, *Count de Lagrange's* bl. c. *Montgoubert* (bred in France), by *Ellington*, 8st 10lbs, and the Duke of Beaufort's ch. f. by *St. Albans*, 8st 2lbs, last; 10 to 1 on *Vauban*. At Goodwood, 9st 1lb (Fordham), won a Post Sweep of £1050, beating *Count de Lagrange's* b. c. *Cerf Volant* by *Monarque*, 8st 10lbs (*Hibberd*), by six lengths; also, 7st 7lbs (*Parry*), won the Cup, of £540, beating *Mr. Johnstone's* (alias *Jardine's*), b. c. *Tynedale* by *Warlock*, three years, 7st 7lbs (*Cameron*), in a canter, ch. m. *Regalia*, five years, 9st 3lbs (*Daley*), third, *Lord Hastings' b. f. Miss Havelock* by *Rataplan*, and one other. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the Bentinck Memorial, of £278, beating *Taraban*, 8st 10lbs, and *Ravioli*, 8st 6lbs. At York, 9st 1lb (Fordham), won the North of England Biennial, of £628, beating *Mr. Savile's* br. c. *Roquefort* by *Parmesan*, 8st 10lbs (*Custance*), *Taraban*, *Lady Hester*, and three others. S. mg., in the Great Yorkshire Stakes, was beaten by *Achievement*, by ten lengths. At Doncaster (*Parry*), was not placed in the *St. Leger*, won by *Achievement*. S. mg., 9st 1lb (*Parry*), ran second in the Doncaster Stakes, of £590, won by *Mr. Bowes' ch. c. Taraban* by *Rataplan*, 8st 10lbs, (*Carroll*), by a head, beating *Mandrake*, 8st 10lbs (*Osborne*), third, *Count de Lagrange's* ch. c. *Longchamps* by *Monarque*, *Ravioli*, and *Van Amburgh*. Even on *Vauban* and 10 to 1 against *Taraban*. This was *Vauban's* last race. *Vauban* was bred by the Duke of Beaufort, who owned his dam. To the eye, *Vauban* was a plain-looking horse, with a long plain head, but a good muscular neck, and powerful quarters, droop-

ing towards the tail. He had very fine shoulders, but very upright pasterns, fatal to his Derby chance. Vauban was a descendant of the Brutendorf branch of the Blacklock line, by far the best of the four divisions into which that line is cut up. The blood which most largely predominates in Vauban's ancestry, is that of Selim, there being more than double the number of strains of that speedy blood than of any other. Although a Blacklock, Vauban was not a "Blacklock upon Waxy," the one thing needful. Vauban's friends were wont to insist that staying was his forte, rather than speed. This was not so; and Vauban's kith and kin were certainly more famous for speed than for stamina, and he himself was not an exception. ("The Druid.")

He was got by St. Albans, out of Julie by Orlando, out of Nun-Appleton by Bay Middleton, out of Miss Milner by Malek, out of a mare by Whisker, her dam, by Orville, out of a mare by Expectation (son of Sir Peter), out of Calabria by Spadille (son of Highflyer), her dam, by Alfred (son of Match'em), out of a mare by Locust (a son of Old Crab), out of a dau. of Changeling (own brother to Match'em), out of a daughter of Old Cade.

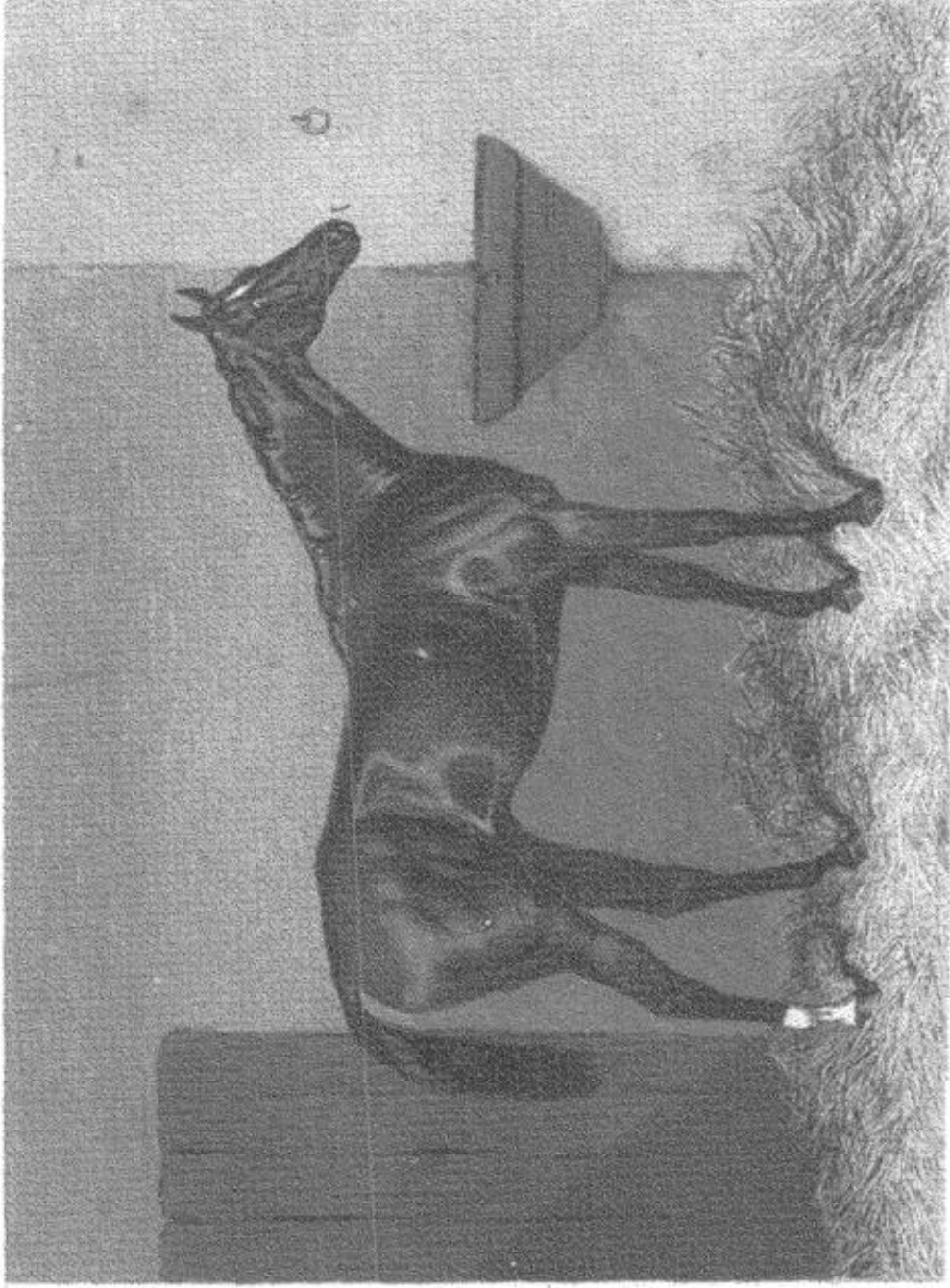

Brayley's Pearl Diver (Cannon), being next. Before the Bushes Hill was reached, more than two-thirds of the field were beaten; the pace having been very severe. On the brow of the hill, La-Dauphine gave way, and Julius, coming right through the leading division, rushed to the front, followed by Westwick (French), Mr. Savile's Sealskin (Fordham), and Honesty (Covey), on his whip-hand, with Pearl Diver, Romping Girl, and Blinkhoolie (Jeffery), on the left, while Colonel Knox's br. c. Armourer by Knight of Kars, three years, 6st 2lbs (Butler), and La-Dauphine were in the centre, well up. At Ascot, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), ran second for the Queen's Vase, won by Blinkhoolie, four years, 8st 10lbs (Custance), by six lengths; four ran. At Stockbridge, 8st 10lbs (Daley), ran second for the Hurstbourne Cup, of £290, won by Gomera (winner of the Goodwood Stakes in 1867), six years, 9st (French), by a short head. BLUE GOWN.

BLUE GOWN was a b. c. foaled in 1865, bred by, and the property of, Sir Joseph Hawley, Bart. He was got by Beadsman, out of Bas-Bleu by Stockwell, out of Vexation by Touchstone, out of Vat (bred in Ireland by Lord Sligo in 1826) by Langar, out of Wire (bred by the Duke of Grafton, in 1811, and sold to Lord Sligo for 1500 gs., and sent to Ireland) by Waxy, out of Penelope by Trumpator, &c., &c.

Bas-Bleu, bred by Sir J. Hawley in 1858, ran a few times, as a three year old, but unsuccessfully. She threw a filly to Béadsman, in 1863, another to him (which died after being foaled) in 1864, Blue Gown in 1865, a filly to Asteroid in 1866, and a filly to Thormanby in 1867. Blue Gown stood close upon fifteen hands three inches high, and was a little big compact horse, that wanted only the blood-like elegance of his half-brother and sister. In his appearance, indeed, he took more after his dam's than his sire's family. He had a somewhat lean but expressive head, with rather lop ears, a strong neck, good barrel, and powerful shoulders. He had grand quarters, with remarkable width across the stifles, was short in his cannon from the knee to the ground, but not so from the hock, standing a little high behind. When being led back to the rubbing house, after winning the Derby, one of the stable lads was hanging on to his long tail. He was the gentlest and the most docile animal ever seen. At the end of his racing career, Sir Joseph sold Blue Gown for 5000 gs. to go to France. He died in December, 1880, on his passage to New York. His death was occasioned by the rolling motion of the vessel, which seemed to affect him terribly.

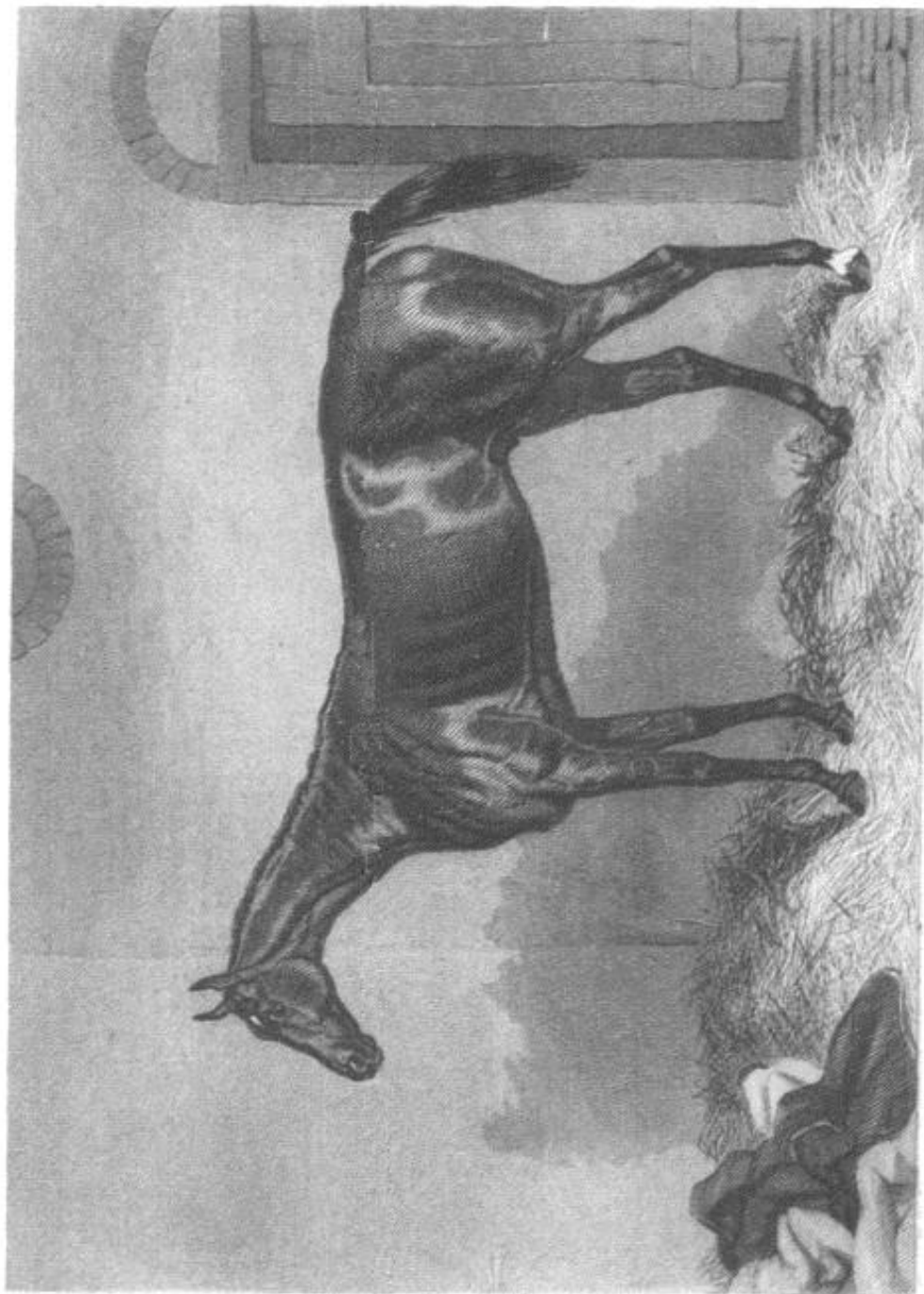

Elizabeth by Trumpeter, 8st 12lbs (Fordham), beating Mr. Pryor's ch. c. Grimston (winner of the Biennial the day before) by St. Albans, 9st 1lb (Loates), by a head; also, Mr. Graham's ch. f. Formosa by Buccaneer, 8st 7lbs, Mr. Lincoln's br. c. Uncas by Stockwell, 8st 7lbs, Lord Ailesbury's b. c. Picnic by St. Albans, 8st 7lbs, and five others; 2 to 1 against Blue Gown, 4 to 1 against Uncas (winner, this year, of the Newmarket Triennial, and ten other races in Ireland), 5 to 1 against Lady Elizabeth, and 6 to 1 against Grimston. At Ascot, 7st 2lb (Huxtable), won the Fernhill Stakes, of £240, beating Grimston, 7st 2lbs (Covey), by a length, and two others. At Doncaster, 8st 10lbs (Wells), not placed in the Champagne Stakes, won by Mr. Holmes' br. f. Virtue by Stockwell, 8st 8lbs (J. Snowden), beating Sir F. Johnstone's br. c. Bel-Giorno by Orlando, 8st 10lbs (Parry), Lord Hastings' b. c. Mameluke by Stockwell, 8st 10lbs (T. Cannon), third, the Duke of Newcastle's ch. c. Pace by Caterer, 8st 10lbs, and seven others; 7 to 1 against Virtue, and 2 to 1 against Blue Gown, who came in first, but was disqualified for carrying 2lbs over weight, which Wells did not declare. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Custance), not placed in a sweep, of £1750, won by Pace, beating three others; 7 to 4 on Blue Gown. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 13lbs (Huxtable), won the Clearwell, of £910, beating Mr. H. Chaplin's ch. c. St. Ronan by St. Albans, 8st 13lbs (Custance), by two lengths, The Baron's b. c. King Alfred by King Tom, 8st 10lbs (Daley), third, and five others; 6 to 4 on Blue Gown, who led from start to finish, and was never approached at any part of the race, winning in a canter.

1868.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 10lbs (Wells), ran second in the Biennial, of £687, won by Lord Hastings' b. c. The Earl, 8st 10lbs (Fordham). At Newmarket (First Spring), 9st 10lbs (Wells), won £155; also, 7st 9lbs (Huxtable), won £150, beating the Duke of Hamilton's ch. f.

Leonic (winner, this year, of the Nassau Stakes at Goodwood, the Yorkshire Oaks at York, and the Shobdon Cup at Shrewsbury) by Newminster, three years, 7st 9lbs (Covey), by four lengths; 6 to 4 on Blue Gown. At Epsom, colts 8st 10lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (Wells), won the Derby, of £6850, beating King Alfred (Norman), by a length, the Duke of Newcastle's b. c. Speculum (winner, this year, of the City and Suburban, and the Goodwood Cup) by Vedette (Kenyon), third; also, Mr. Hodgman's br. c. Paul Jones (winner, this year, of the Chester Cup) by Buccaneer (Parry), Mr. Beadman's b. c. Orion by Cramond (Clement), Sir J. Hawley's b. f. Green Sleeve (winner of the Middle Park Plate, of £4410, in 1867) by Beadsman (J. Adams), Colonel Pearson's ch. c. Cap-a-pie by Thormanby, Sir J. Hawley's br. c. Rosicrucian (winner, in 1867, of the Criterion and Troy Stakes at Newmarket Ho.), Mr. Padwick's ch. c. Sampson by Stockwell, Lord Wilton's br. c. See-Saw (winner, this year, of the Cambridgeshire) by Buccaneer, The Baron's br. c. Suffolk by North Lincoln, Mr. J. Scott's b. c. Viscount by The Marquis, Lord Glasgow's br. c. Brother to Bird on the Wing, ch. c. St. Ronan, b. f. Lady Elizabeth, and three others; 7 to 4 against Lady Elizabeth, 7 to 2 against Blue Gown, 8 to 1 against Paul Jones (yclept the Steam Engine), 100 to 7 against Speculum, 25 to 1 against Green Sleeve, and 30 to 1 against Rosicrucian, with whom Sir Joseph declared to win. After two false starts, they all got off in a cluster, with the exception of Lady Elizabeth (Fordham), who lost about three lengths. After a few strides Cap-a-pie (Maidment) rushed to the front, followed by Orion and Speculum, next to whom came Blue Gown, Green Sleeve, Paul Jones, and See-Saw (J. Grimshaw). The next division comprised Rosicrucian (Custance), King Alfred, Sampson (French), Lord Glasgow's br. c. (Cameron), ch. f. Franchise (Chaloner), Suffolk (Daley), with whom The Baron declared to win, St. Ronan (Jeffery), and Lady Elizabeth. Emerging from the furzes, Orion was leading by a couple of lengths, Speculum second, and Cap-a-pie third, in close attendance being See-Saw, Green Sleeve, Paul Jones, and Blue Gown. Descending to Tattenham Corner, Cap-a-pie gave way, Paul Jones taking third place, with Sir Joseph's three close at his heels. Rounding the corner, King Alfred came through his horses, Orion still leading, and joined Blue Gown at the lower ground, Speculum

and Paul Jones being level with them, on Orion's whip hand, Rosicrucian, Suffolk, and Green Sleeve being two lengths behind them. When in the straight, King Alfred headed Orion, who was shortly after passed by Blue Gown. At the distance, the race was reduced to a match between King Alfred and Blue Gown, all the rest being beaten. Two hundred yards from home, Wells challenged Norman; and, amidst intense excitement, drew up level with King Alfred, gradually forging ahead, and winning a magnificent race; Speculum was five lengths in the rear of King Alfred, and St. Ronan, fourth, six lengths from Speculum; Rosicrucian was fifth, Orion seventh, and the Steam-engine eighth. At Ascot, 7st 5lbs (Cameron), won the Cup (val. £920), beating Speculum, 7st 5lbs (Kenyon), and King Alfred, 7st 5lbs (Peake), third and last; Blue Gown had the race in hand all through, and won as he liked. At Doncaster, 8st 10lbs (Wells), won the Fitzwilliam Stakes, beating Mr. Eastwood's (for some years the manager of Col. Towneley's Stud) br. f. Evelina by Kettledrum, three years, 8st 1lb (J. Snowden), by three lengths, Sir C. Legard's b. h. Vespasian by Newminster, five years, 9st 1lb, third, and four others. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 11lbs (Wells), not placed in the Cesarewitch, of £1490, won by Mr. Edward Etches's ch. c. Cecil by Plum Pudding (son of Sweetmeat), three years, 5st 13lbs (Wyatt), beating The Baron's b. c. Restitution (winner of the Goodwood Cup in 1869) by King Tom, three years, 7st 10lbs (J. Morris), Count Lagrange's b. c. Nélusko by Monarque, three years, 7st, third, Paul Jones, 7st 10lbs, See-Saw, 8st, Tormentor, five years, 7st 10lbs, and twenty others; 5 to 1 against Cecil, 11 to 1 against Blue Gown, 12 to 1 against Nélusko, and 30 to 1 against Restitution. At the bushes Blue Gown was leading; but, soon after, the crushing weight began to tell, and a quarter of a mile from home Wells eased him, and came in with the crowd. S. mg., w. o. for the Royal Stakes, of £650. At Newmarket, Ho., 9st (Wells), ran second in the Cambridgeshire, of £1850, won by See-Saw, three years, 8st 2lbs (Fordham), beating Mr. Johnstone's b. c. Mercury by Lambton, three years, 7st 9lbs, third; also, ch. f. Lady Coventry by Thormanby, three years, 7st 9lbs (Chaloner), Mr. Webb's b. m. Actæa (winner of the Cambridgeshire in 1866) by Stockwell, five years, 8st, Mr. Bowes' ch. h. Taraban (winner of the

Goodwood Stakes and Northumberland Plate in 1871), four years, 8st 6lbs, Nélusko, 7st 2lbs, Cecil, 6st 5lbs, and fourteen others; 9 to 4 against Cecil, 2 to 1 against Lady Coventry, 20 to 1 against Blue Gown, and 30 to 1 against See-Saw. The pace throughout was very severe. At the site of the old Duke's Stand, Mercury (Cameron) held a two lengths' lead, Lady Coventry being next, Actæa (Payne) third, Blue Gown fourth, and See-Saw fifth. At the distance, Lady Coventry and Actæa collapsed, being unable to live at the tremendous pace. About two hundred yards from home, Blue Gown and See-Saw went up to Mercury, who had run with indomitable gameness, and had him beaten in a hundred yards, at which point Blue Gown was going so strong that frantic shouts were raised by his adorers. The impost, however, of 9st began to make itself felt at the critical moment; and Fordham, by dint of most resolute riding, managed to get See-Saw's head in front in the last thirty yards, and to send him in a winner by a length. Blue Gown's performance was considered to be a very grand one, under the heavy weight. S. mg., w. o. for the All-aged Stakes; also, 9st (Wells), won a free handicap, of £1100, beating Mr. J. Day's bl. c. Cock-of-the-Walk by Chanticleer, three years, 6st 13lbs, in a canter, Mercury, 7st 8lbs, b. c. Lictor (winner of the Liverpool July Cup in 1869), and four others.

1869.

At Epsom (Spring), 9st 2lbs (Wells), won the Trial Stakes, of £135, beating Formosa, four years, 8st 13lbs (Fordham), by a head, Vespasian, six years, 9st 9lbs (French), third, four lengths from Formosa, and four others; 5 to 2 on Blue Gown. At Newmarket (April), w. o. for the Craven Stakes, of £120; also, 9st 3lbs (Wells), won the Newmarket Biennial, of £602, beating Mr. H. Savile's bl. g. Blueskin (winner of the Great Metropolitan in 1868) by Skirmisher, 8st 6lbs (Maidment), by a head, Mr. Merry's b. c. Phœbus by Thormanby, 8st 2lbs (Kenyon), and King Alfred, 8st 6lbs (Daley), last; all four years old; 4 to 1 on Blue Gown. Blueskin held a strong lead to the turn of the lands, where Blue Gown headed him, the former running so gamely that Wells had to arouse the crack. The other two were beaten off. At Newmarket (First Spring), 9st (Wells), match for 500 sovs., was beaten, two lengths, by Sir C. Legard's b. h. Vespasian, six years, 8st 10lbs (Fordham); 7 to 4

on Blue Gown, who conceded two years and 4lbs. At Winchester, 9st 7lbs, two miles (Wells), won the Queen's Plate, beating Col. (now Sir John) Astley's br. c. Young Fenton by Master Fenton, three years, 7st 11lbs (Killick), in a canter, Mr. J. Day's br. f. Reflection by Voltigeur, three years, 7st 11lbs, third, and five others; 6 to 1 on Blue Gown. At Ascot, 8st 10lbs (Wells), ran second for the Cup, won by Sir F. Johnstone's b. f. Brigantine, three years, 7st 2lbs (Butler), beating ch. f. Formosa, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), third, Count Lagrange's ch. h. Trocadero by Monarque, five years, 9st 3lbs (Chaloner), fourth, and Mr. Johnstone's ch. c. Thorwaldsen (winner, two days before, of the Queen's Vase) by Thormanby, three years, 7st 5lbs, distanced; 2 to 1 against Blue Gown, 5 to 2 against Formosa, and 4 to 1 against the winner. Trocadero and Thorwaldsen made very strong running, followed by Blue Gown, Brigantine, and Formosa, to the Swinley Bottom, where Thorwaldsen passed the French horse, as did Blue Gown and Brigantine also, a few yards further. Half a mile from home, Blue Gown fell quite into the rear, Brigantine heading Thorwaldsen, and Formosa going on third. When in the line for home, Wells again brought up Blue Gown, who successfully headed Formosa and Thorwaldsen, but failed to reach Brigantine, though he responded most gamely to Wells's call, and was beaten by half a length. At Goodwood, 9st 6lbs (Wells), won the Craven Stakes, beating Vespa-sian, 9st 9lbs (Fordham), by a head, and ch. c. Lamlash by Marsyas, three years, 7st 3lbs, last; even betting between the first two. At Brighton, 9st 4lbs (Wells), ran second in the Champagne Stakes, won by Suffolk, 8st 11lbs (Daley), by five lengths; four ran; 7 to 2 on Blue Gown. At Newmarket (Second October), 9st (Wells), match for 500 sovs., beat Mr. Pryor's ch. h. Friponnier, five years, 9st (French), by a length; 5 to 2 on Blue Gown. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 13lbs (Wells), won £100, beating Mr. Bevill's c. h. King Victor by Fazzoletto, five years, 8st 13lbs (Fordham), in a canter, and one other. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Wells), won £50, beating Mr. R. Peck's b. c. Prior by Camerino, three years, 7st 10lbs, by thirty lengths; only two ran. (Sir Joseph now sold Blue Gown to Prince Plass of France for 5000 gs.).

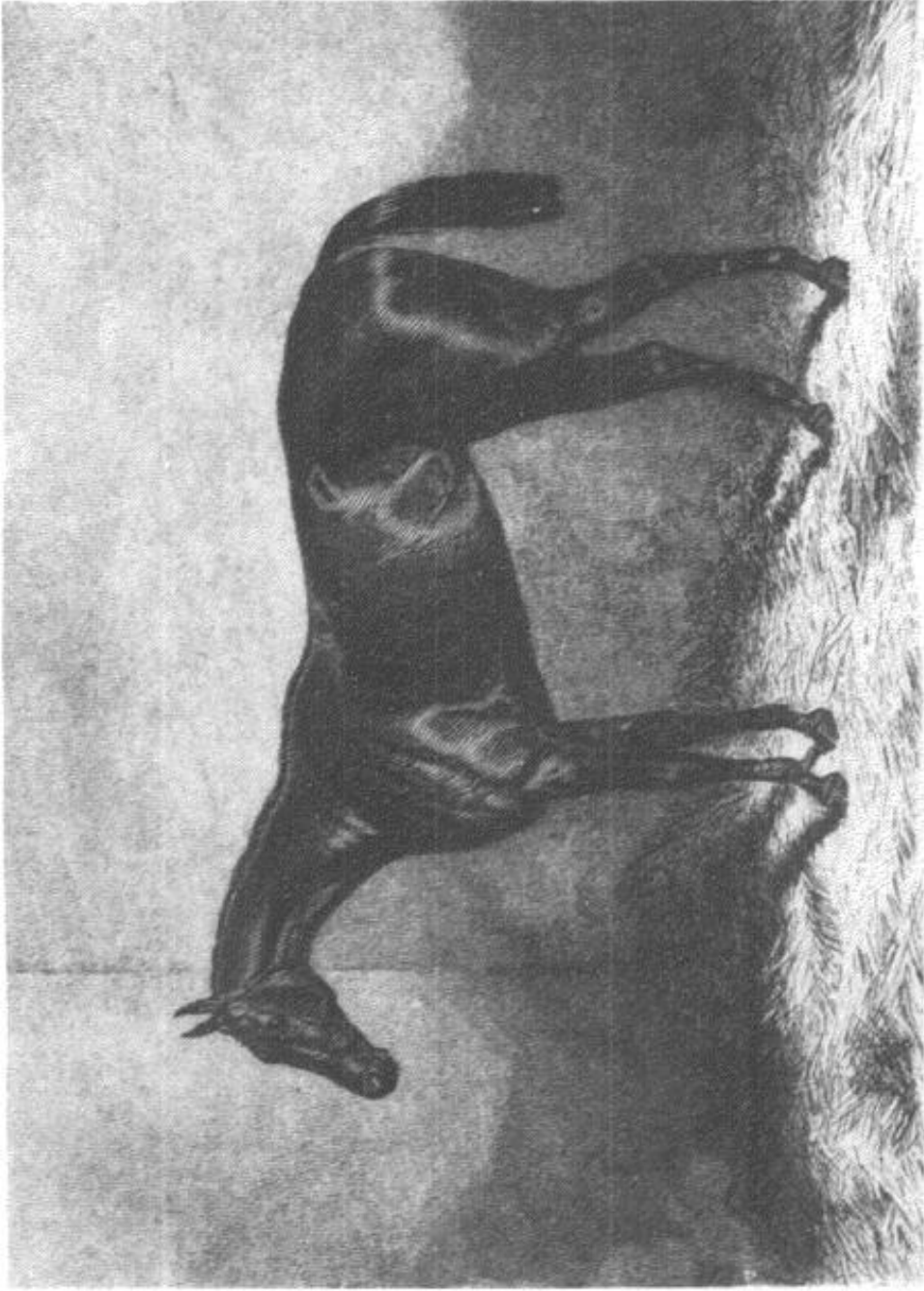
1870.

At Newmarket (Ho.), 9st (Wells), won £50, beating Monsieur

Aumont's ch. f. Miss Hervine (bred in France) by Orphelin, three years, 6st 12lbs, Mc. R. C. Naylor's c. f. Marsala, by Stockwell, three years, 6st 5lbs, third, and fourteen others. At Lincoln, 9st 11lbs (I. Grimshaw), ran third for the Queen's Plate, won by Mr. G. Payne's br. c. Musket (sire of Petronel, and winner, this year, of the Ascot Stakes) by Toxophilite, three years, 6st 8lbs (W. Gray), beating Count Lagrange's b. c. Dutch Skater (winner of the Great Metropolitan and the Doncaster Cup in 1872) by the Flying Dutchman, four years, 9st 7lbs (Carratt), second, and two others. Blue Gown ran three times more without success, and quitted the Turf for France.

"Sir Joseph Hawley's horses were trained in private by Porter, at Kingsclere, near Newbury, on that famous range of Downs that stretches from Ilsley. There was nothing, in the Derby of 1868, to compare with Sir Joseph's three. Rosicrucian was not a big horse, but he was very handsome, very powerful, muscular, and wiry, with good looks and very fine ends. He took more after his grandsire, Weatherbit, than Beadsman, and was, at all points, the most Derby-like horse in the paddock; but then Rosicrucian was never quite himself in his three-year-old season. Green Sleeve was a very racing-like filly, with a fine forehead and very grand quarters, backed by a noble and stately carriage, though she lacked something of the exquisite grace of her grand dam, Mendicant. Sir Joseph would have preferred winning the Derby with Rosicrucian, as he had backed him rather heavily, and had not a shilling on Blue Gown, only starting the latter because the public had so extensively supported him. Sir Joseph won the Derby four times, viz. in 1851 with Teddington, in 1858 with Beadsman, in 1859 with Musjid, and in 1868 with Blue Gown. In three, at least, of these famous victories, he had something to pick and choose from—Beadsman and Fitzroland (son of Orlando) started at nearly the same price, and nobody seemed able to say which was the better of the pair; while, in Teddington's year, they tried four or five that finished all of a heap, viz. Teddington, The Confessor, The Ban, and Aphrodite, all of whom Alec Taylor found to be rare good ones."

FORMOSA was a dark chestnut filly foaled in 1865, the property of William Graham, Esq. She was got by Buccaneer, out of Eller by Chanticleer, out of a mare by Tomboy, out of Tesane by Whisker, out of Lady of the Tees by Octavian, her dam, by Sancho, out of Miss Furey by Trumpator, out of a mare by Marc-Anthony, out of Signora by Old Snap, out of Miss Windsor by the Godolphin Arabian, out of Sister to Volunteer by Young Belgrade (son of the Belgrade Turk), &c., &c. Buccaneer was by Wild Dayrell, out of a mare by Little Red Rover (son of Tramp), out of Eclat by Edmund (son of Orville), out of Squib by Soothsayer, out of Berenice by Alexander (son of Eclipse).

At Ascot, 6st 9lbs (Cameron), not placed for the Queen's Stand Plate of £370, won by Mr. Fleming's b. c. Cecrops by Newcourt, four years, 9st 12lbs (French), beating Lord Hastings' (afterwards Lord Wilton's) b. c. See-Saw, 6st 12lbs, by a head, and seven others. S. mg., 8st 7lbs (Heartfield), ran third in the Triennial, of £460, won by the Duke of Beaufort's ch. f. Europa by Trumpeter, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), beating Mr. Lincoln's br. c. Uncas by Stockwell, 8st 10lbs (Osborne), second, and nine others; 10 to 1 against Europa, 20 to 1 against Uncas, and 100 to 3 against Formosa. S. mg., 6st 8lbs (Cameron), ran fourth in

the Biennial, of £600, won by Lord Falmouth's ro. c. Tregeagle by Wild Dayrell, 6st 11lbs (Kenyon), beating See-Saw, 6st 11lbs (Butler), second, Mr. Beadman's br. c. Bismarck by Weatherbit, three years, 9st 3lbs (Daley), and three others. At Stockbridge, 7st 8lbs (Heartfield), won the Nursery Stakes (Handicap), of £320, beating the Duke of Hamilton's b. f. Contempt by King Tom (Edwards), by two lengths, Lord Hastings' br. f. Cuckoo by Buccaneer, 8st 2lbs each (Fordham), third, and seven others; 9 to 4 against Formosa, and 5 to 2 against Contempt. At Newmarket (July), 8st 7lbs (Heartfield), won the Chesterfield Stakes of £1250, beating the Duke of Hamilton's ch. f. Léonie by Newminster, 9st (Edwards), The Baron's b. c. Suffolk, 9st 3lbs (Daley), third, Lord Hastings' ch. f. Athena (winner of the Lavant at Goodwood, the Filly Stakes at Doncaster, the Hopeful and Forlorn Stakes at Newmarket, First October) by Stockwell, 9st (Fordham), and four others; even on Athena, 4 to 1 against Léonie, and 20 to 1 against Formosa. At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs (Heartfield), ran third and last in the Bentinck Memorial of £270, won by Tregeagle, 8st 10lbs (French), beating Mr. Merry's br. c. The Parson by St. Albans, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by a neck. At Abingdon, won £235, beating two others. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 13lbs, not placed in the Middle Park Plate, of £4410, won by Sir J. Hawley's b. f. Green Sleeve by Beadsman, 8st 3lbs (Kenyon), beating Rosicrucian, 8st 9lbs (Huxtable), by a head, Mr. Matthew Dawson's ch. f. Lady Coventry, 8st 3lbs (J. Grimshaw), third, also Sir Frederick Johnstone's b. c. Michael-de-Basco (winner of the Glasgow Stakes at Newmarket), by Buccaneer, 8st 6lbs, Lady Elizabeth, 8st 13lbs, ch. c. St. Ronan (for which Mr. Chaplin gave 4500 Guineas, as a yearling), 9st 2lbs, Count de Lagrange's b. c. Le Sarrazin, by Monarque, 8st 13lbs, and eight others; even on Lady Elizabeth, 3 to 1 against Lady Coventry, 8 to 1 against Rosicrucian, and 12 to 1 against Green Sleeve; two lengths between second and third.

1868.

At Newmarket (First Spring), colts, 8st 10lbs, fillies, 8st 5lbs (Fordham), for the 2000 Guineas (val. £5650), ran a dead-heat with Mr. W. S. Crawford's br. c. Moslem by Knight of St. Patrick (Chaloner),

beating ch. c. St. Ronan (Custance), third; also Green Sleeve, 8st 7lbs—2lbs extra—(French), Le Sarrazin (Grimshaw), Lord Stamford's b. c. Vale Royal by Stockwell (J. Mann), Rosicrucian (Wells), King Alfred (Norman), ch. c. Pace by Caterer (Daley), Sir F. Johnstone's b. c. Banditto by Buccaneer (Parry), and four others; Stakes divided; 5 to 2 against Green Sleeve, 3 to 1 against Formosa, and 100 to 7 against Moslem. They all got off to a capital start, in a cluster. Moslem instantly rushed to the front, followed closely by Formosa, Green Sleeve, Le Sarrazin, Vale Royal, and Rosicrucian. At the Ab. M. Bottom, Formosa was leading, Green Sleeve second, Rosicrucian third, Moslem fourth, and St. Ronan fifth. Within the half distance, Green Sleeve on the left, and Rosicrucian, on the right, were nearly level with Formosa; but, soon after, both gave way, when Moslem closed with Formosa; but, swerving fifty yards from home, he lost ground, leaving Formosa half a length in advance; a dozen strides from the Chair, Chaloner called vigorously on Moslem, making a dead-heat of it. S. mg. (Fordham), won the 1000 Guineas (val. £3750), beating Athena (now Mr. H. Padwick's), by three lengths (Cannon), Lady Coventry (Daley), third; also, Lord Ailesbury's ch. f. Franchise (Chaloner), br. f. Virtue, Mr. C. Naylor's ch. f. Lady Highborn by Stockwell (French), and two others; 11 to 10 on Formosa, 11 to 4 against Lady Coventry, and 10 to 1 against Athena; at the end of half a mile, Athena and Lady Coventry drew clean away from the rest of the field, and drew up to Formosa who, till then, had held a commanding lead, and at whose girths Athena lay, till reaching the cords, when Fordham called on Formosa, who shot out, and won very easily; three lengths between second and third. At Epsom, 8st 10lbs each (Fordham), won the Oaks, of £5450, beating Lady Coventry (Daley), second, Athena (French), third; also, Lady Elizabeth (Cannon), Mr. William Davis's ch. f. Fair Star by Cape Flyaway (Grimshaw), Léonie (T. Aldcroft), Mr. G. Holmes's br. f. Virtue by Stockwell, Mr. W. Graham's b. f. Janet Rawcliffe by Stockwell, and b. f. Curfew Bell by Newminster (Osborne); 11 to 8 on Formosa, 9 to 2 against Lady Elizabeth, 8 to 1 against Virtue (J. Snowden), and 12 to 1 each against Lady Coventry and Léonie. Athena jumped off with the lead, but was soon headed by Janet Rawcliffe (Page), and Curfew Bell, the former making

strong running (to serve Formosa) to the furzes, where Formosa went in front, followed by Virtue, Léonie, Curfew Bell, and Fair Star. Rounding Tattenham Corner, Lady Coventry took second place, Virtue being third, and Athena (French) fourth. Before reaching the distance, Virtue was beaten, Lady Coventry vainly striving to catch Formosa, who, defying all competition, won in a canter by ten lengths. At Ascot, 9st (Fordham), not placed in the Prince of Wales's Stakes, of £4100, won by King Alfred (Daley), 8st 10lbs, beating The Baron's b. c. Restitution, 8st 3lbs (Morris), second, Moslem, 9st 1lb (Chaloner), third, Lady Elizabeth, 8st 10lbs, and three others. S. mg., 8st 7lbs (Fordham), ran second in the Triennial, of £466, won by Vale Royal, 8st 10lbs (Bumby), Restitution 8st 5lbs, third; four ran. At Doncaster, colts, 8st 10lbs, fillies, 8st 5lbs (T. Chaloner), won the St. Leger, of £5825, beating br. c. Paul Jones by Buccaneer (Fordham), in a canter, b. c. Mercury, by Lambton (Osborne), third; also, Mr. Bowes' b. c. The Spy (winner of the Liverpool July Cup, and Northumberland Plate in 1869) by Underhand, Count Batthyany's b. c. Typhaus by Stockwell, See-Saw Orion, St. Ronan, Virtue, King Alfred, and two others; 100 to 30 each against King Alfred and Formosa, 100 to 15 each against See-Saw, and Paul Jones, and 25 to 1 against Mercury. At Newmarket (Second October), 9st 3lbs (Fordham), won the Newmarket Oaks, of £725, beating The Baron's b. f. Nyanza by King Tom, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by six lengths, Athena, 9st 3lbs (French) third, and ch. f. Lady Grace by St. Albans, last; 9 to 4 on Formosa.

1869.

At Bath, won £60, at Epsom (Spring), in the Trial Stakes, was beaten by Blue Gown. At Ascot, 8st 5lbs (Fordham), won the Triennial, of £460, beating Restitution (winner, this year, of the Goodwood Cup), 8st 5lbs (Morris), by a neck, Mr. Savile's bl. c. Legard's b. c. Guy Dayrell (winner of the Lincolnshire Handicap in 1872), two years, 6st 8lbs (Jeffery), by three lengths; five ran. S mg., 8st 12lbs (Fordham), ran second for the Hurstbourne Cup, won by Brigantine. At Goodwood, 8st 5lbs each

(Fordham), three miles and five furlongs, won the Bentinck Memorial, of £269, beating Blueskin (Maidment), by forty lengths; 4 to 1 on Formosa. At Weymouth, 9st 1lb (Page), won the Queen's Plate, two miles, beating Mr. E. Brayley's br. c. Arlington (winner, this year, of the Grand Handicap at Lewes, and the Queen's Plate and Cup at Egham) by Voltigeur, three years, 8st 7lbs (Cannon), by half a length, and three others. At Doncaster, 8st 12lbs (Fordham), not placed in the Great Yorkshire Handicap, of £680, won by Lord Zetland's br. c. Géant de Batailles by Voltigeur, four years, 7st 10lbs (Hudson), beating Mr. Johnstone's (Mr. Jardine's) ch. c. Argyle by Adventurer, three years, 6st 4lbs, Paul Jones, 7st 8lbs, third, and seven others; 3 to 1 against Argyle, 4 to 1 against Paul Jones, 9 to 2 against Formosa, and 100 to 7 against the winner. At Newmarket (Ho.), 9st (Fordham), ran second in the All-aged Stakes, of £350, won by Rosicrucian (winner of the same stakes in 1870, and also the York Cup), four years, 9st 3lbs (Wells), by a neck, Mr. W. S. Crawford's b. f. Heather Bell, three years, 8st 7lbs (Chaloner), third, and last. At Liverpool (November), 8st 8lbs (Fordham), not placed for the Autumn Cup (£865), won by Sir J. Hawley's b. c. Lictor by Lambton, four years, 7st (Butler), beating Lord Westmorland's ch. f. Cocoanut by Nutbourne (Gradwell), second, and twelve others; 6 to 1 against Lictor, 10 to 1 against Cocoanut, and 100 to 7 against Formosa, this being her last race.

THE EARL was a b. c. foaled in 1865, the property of the Marquis of Hastings. He was got by Young Melbourne, out of Bay Celia (dam also of The Duke) by Orlando, out of Hersey by Glaucus, out of Hester by Camel, out of Monimia by Muley, out of Sister to Petworth by Precipitate, out of a mare by Woodpecker, out of Sister to Juniper by Old Snap, out of the dam of Young Marske by Blank, out of Bay Starling by the Bolton Grey Starling, out of Meynell (bred by Mr. Holme in 1736) by Old Partner, out of a mare by Old Greyhound (son of King William's White Barb, Chillaby).

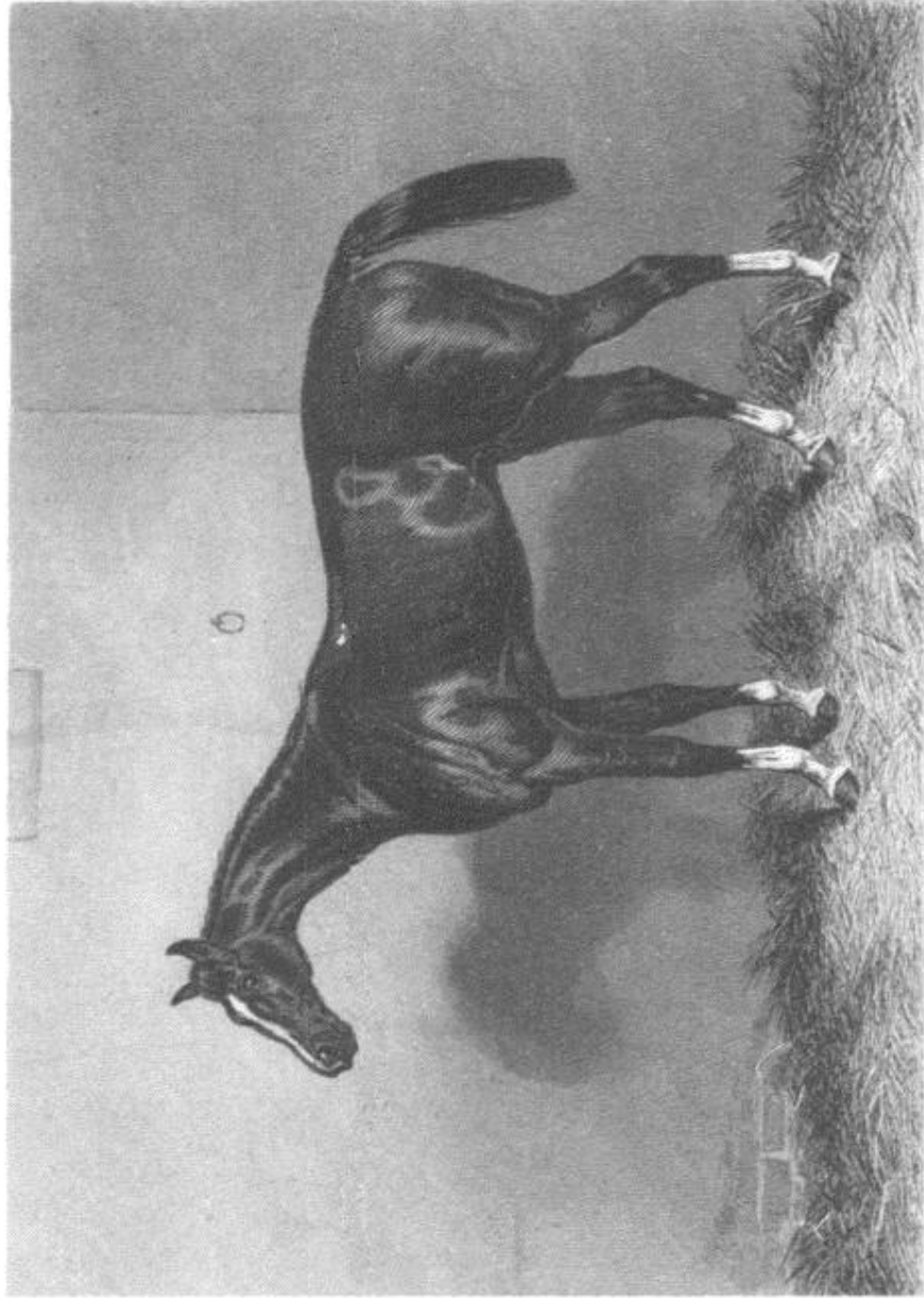

At Stockbridge, 8st 10lbs (Cannon), ran third for the Eltham Plate, of £1820, won by Lady Elizabeth, 8st 11lbs (Fordham), beating Mr. Richard Sutton's b. c. Ironmaster by Thormanby, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), by two lengths; three ran. At Stamford, 7st 10lbs (Cannon), won the Nursery Handicap, of £185, beating Mr. Samuel's b. c. Chivalry by Tournament, 6st 9lbs, and five others, all two years old. At York (August), 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the Gimcrack Stakes, of £355, beating Count de Lagrange's ch. c. Ouragan by Monarque, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), by two lengths, and five others; The Earl the favourite. Mr.

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Fobert's br. f. Frolicsome by Weatherbit, 8st 5lbs (J. Grimshaw), was third. At Warwick, 9st (Fordham), won the Castle Park Stakes, beating Mr. H. Chaplin's b. f. Veda (winner, this year, of the Brighton Biennial) by Lambton, 8st 12lbs (Cannon), by a length, Mr. Woolcott's b. c. Wild Blood by Wild Dayrell, 8st 5lbs, and one other. S. mg., 8st 9lbs (Fordham), ran second in the Nursery Handicap, won by Lord Vivian's b. c. Redivivus by Newminster, 6st 4lbs (Quince), beating six others. At Doncaster, 9st 1lb—5lbs extra—(Cannon), ran second in a sweep of £710, won by the Duke of Newcastle's ch. c. Pace by Caterer, 8st 10lbs (Daley), beating Ironmaster, 8st 10lbs (Clement), third, Blueskin, 8st 10lbs, and three others; 5 to 2 on The Earl, and 20 to 1 against Pace (who, on the following day, won £1750, beating Lord Falmouth's b. c. Courtmantle by King Tom, Blue Gown, and two others, though he was nowhere in the Champagne Stakes, his first time of starting), and 5 to 1 against Ironmaster. Won by half a length. At Newmarket (First October), 9st (Fordham), won the Rutland Stakes, of £340, beating The Baron's b. c. Suffolk, 9st 3lbs (Daley), and the Duke of Hamilton's ch. c. Innerdale by Dundee, 9st (Edwards), last; 6 to 4 on Suffolk, and 7 to 4 against The Earl, who made the running at rare speed, to within a quarter of a mile from home, when Suffolk drew up to him; but The Earl shook off his challenge, and won, in a canter, by four lengths. At Newmarket (Second October), for two years old, 9st 8lbs (Fordham), in the Bedford Stakes, of £450, ran a dead-heat with Ouragan, 8st 10lbs (J. Grimshaw); but, in the deciding heat, was beaten by a head; four ran. Betting, at starting, 2 to 1 on The Earl, and 3 to 1 against Ouragan. The Count's colt led to the dip, where Fordham brought up The Earl, and gaining ground at every stride, just managed to make a dead-heat of it. Betting, on the second heat, 11 to 8 on The Earl. At Newmarket (Ho.), 7st 9lbs (Cannon), match for 500 sovs. (Bretby Course, six furlongs), was beaten by Sir J. Hawley's b. h. XI. by General Williams, four years, 9st 4lbs (Wells). A fine race, and won by a head; 55 to 50 on The Earl. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Fordham), Ab. M. (seven furlongs and two hundred and twelve yards), in a sweep of £250, was beaten by Suffolk, 8st 10lbs (Daley); 7 to 4 on The Earl; won by a neck, and very cleverly done. The Earl was now sold to Mr. H. Padwick.

1868.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the Biennial, of £687, beating Blue Gown, 8st 10lbs (Wells), b. c. Suffolk, 8st 10lbs (Daley), third, Count de Lagrange's b. c. Nelusko by Monarque (J. Grimshaw), Sir R. Bulkeley's br. c. Sir David Gam by Underhand (J. Goater), Mr. Harlock's b. c. Stamford by Muscovite (Norman), Mr. Merry's br. c. The Parson by St. Albans, Mr. Geo. Payne's ch. c. Boanerges by Thunderbolt (Chaloner), Mr. Clayton's b. c. Lymington by Wild Dayrell (Parry), Mr. Pryor's b. c. Ritualist by Newminster (French), and Mr. Heene's ch. c. Belfast by Stockwell (Forster); 6 to 4 against The Earl, 7 to 2 against Suffolk, 5 to 1 against Blue Gown, 6 to 1 against The Parson (Morris), and 8 to 1 against Nelusko. No others quoted. The saddling, at the Bird Cage, was watched with great interest by the public, and each of the three cracks (The Earl, Blue Gown, and Suffolk) was followed by a number of admirers as, one by one, they emerged from the enclosure. The superiority of this trio over the rest, was instantly manifest. Without any delay, they were despatched to a beautiful start, all going abreast for a few yards, till Nelusko, lying wide on the left, shot out, and took up the running with a length's lead of Sir David Gam, The Parson, on the right, being next, The Earl and Lymington in the centre, closely followed by Blue Gown and Suffolk. After a hundred yards had been covered, Suffolk was seen to drop away three or four lengths in the rear of Blue Gown. In this order they reached the Bushes Hill, when The Earl, heading The Parson, Sir David Gam, and Nelusko, in turn, assumed the lead. At the same time, Daley put on a spurt with Suffolk, passing Blue Gown, and going up to the quarters of The Earl, the others having all gone to the rear. The race was now left to the three cracks, and they came on together into the Abingdon Mile Bottom, where Suffolk appeared to be going the best of the three, but the moment they commenced the ascent to the finish, he was evidently in trouble; and though he maintained his place until entering the cords, he stopped dead there, as if he had been shot, Blue Gown simultaneously closing with The Earl.

A most interesting and exciting race now ensued, and the vast crowd of spectators was hushed into a deep and prolonged silence, unbroken by a

single cheer, till Wells brought Blue Gown up to The Earl's head, about one hundred yards from home, when "the favourite's beat," resounded on all sides; and in another moment "the favourite wins" was again heard, till Blue Gown drew up quite level with his opponent, when the same shouts were alternately heard till, in the last half-dozen strides, the splendid son of Beadsman and Bas Bleu, though running gamely enough, was evidently too weak for the final effort, while Fordham, by dint of hard riding, and the most resolute determination, visible to everybody, landed The Earl a winner by half a neck. Suffolk was a bad third, Nélusko, ten lengths off, fourth, Ritualist fifth, and The Parson sixth.

S. mg., w. o. for 100 sovs. At Newmarket (First Spring), for three years old, w. o. for the Newmarket Stakes, of £500, Mr. Padwick and Sir J. Hawley, who had entered Blue Gown, agreeing to divide the stakes. At Ascot, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), for three years old, won the Ascot Derby, of £975, beating Colonel Pearson's ch. c. Cap-à-pie by Thormanby, 8st 3lbs (Chaloner), by two lengths, b. c. Suffolk, 8st 10lbs (Daley), third, and the Duke of Newcastle's br. c. Clarion by Trumpeter, 8st 10lbs (French), last. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the Ascot Biennial, of £735, beating Suffolk, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by a length, b. c. Vale Royal, 8st 10lbs (Bumby), third, and St. Ronan, 8st 10lbs (Custance), last; 5 to 2 on The Earl, 6 to 1 against St. Ronan, 8 to 1 against Vale Royal, and 12 to 1 against Suffolk. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Fordham), won the St. James's Palace Stakes, of £800, beating The Baron's b. c. Restitution by King Tom, 8st 3lbs (Morris), both three years old; 7 to 2 on The Earl, who lay several length's off, till nearing the distance, when Fordham thought it was high time to be drawing up, and he came a cracker, but was unable to catch Restitution, of whom Morris was now making the best, till within a few strides from the Chair, a splendid set to ending in The Earl's favour by a neck.

At Paris (June 7th), 8st 9lbs (Fordham), won the Grand Prix de Paris, beating Count de Lagrange's b. c. Suzerain by Monarque, 8st 9lbs (Custance), by a length, the Count's b. c. Nélusko, 8st 9lbs (J. Grimshaw), third, Lord Stamford's b. c. Vale Royal by Stockwell, 8st 9lbs (Daley), fourth, Blueskin (Maidment), and two others, all 8st 9lbs. No betting quoted. Net value of stakes, 141,000 francs.

The Earl ran no more, after the Ascot meeting. The scratching of The Earl for the Derby, for which race, together with Blue Gown, he had been extensively backed by the public, created a profound and most disagreeable sensation in all racing circles, a large amount of obloquy being cast on his late and present owners, who were strongly suspected to be in league in this disgraceful business. His scratching for the St. Leger was anticipated, as a cloak to the other nefarious transaction, and consequently the public kept their money safely in their pockets. Next to Blue Gown, The Earl was certainly the best horse of his year.

He was got by Adventurer (son of Newminster), out of Ferina by Venison, out of Partiality by Middleton (son of Phantom), out of Favourite by Blucher (son of Waxy), out of Scheherazade by Selim, out of Gipsy (sister to Aimator) by Trumpator, out of sister to Postmaster by Herod, her dam, by Old Snap, out of a mare by Lord Gower's stallion, out of a daughter of Flying Childers.

PRETENDER'S PERFORMANCES.

1868.

At Stockton, 8st 10lbs (Cameron), ran third for the Lambton Plate, of £450, won by Mr. Launde's (alias the Rev. John King, Rector of Launde, and son of Colonel King, the owner of Bessy Bedlam, &c.) ch. f. Minaret (sister to Mineral), 8st 6lbs (Osborne), beating ch. c. Thorwaldsen, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), second, Mr. Merry's ch. c. Glenalmond by Blair Athol, and three others. The winner made the running throughout, and won by a neck, the same distance dividing second and third. At York (August), 8st 7lbs (Osborne), won the North of England Biennial, of £511, beating the Duke of Beaufort's ch. c. Standard-Bearer by Trumpeter, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), by a neck, Mr. Savile's ch. c. Brother to Ravioli by Parmesan, 8st 7lbs, third; also, his ch. c. The Rajah by Parmesan, and Mr. Naylor's ch. c. Wellington (of whom very great expectations were formed but never realized) by Stockwell. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 13lbs (Osborne), ran

third in the Middle Park Plate, of £4480 (£1000 of which was the free gift of Mr. Wm. Blenkiron), won by Pero Gomez.

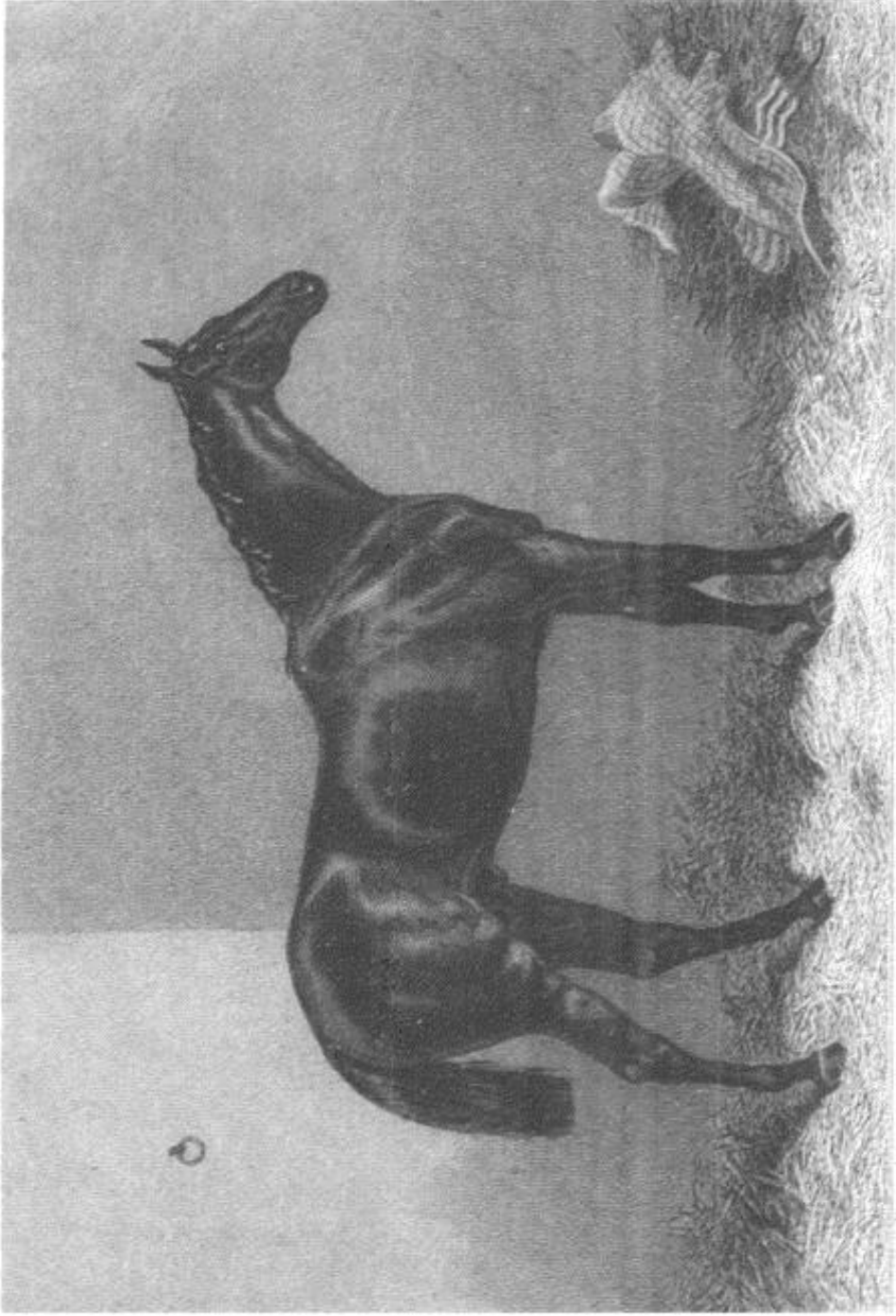
1869.

At Newmarket (First Spring), colts 8st 10lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (Osborne), won the 2000 Guineas (val. £4400), beating Mr. Merry's b. c. Belladrum by Stockwell, out of Catherine Hayes (Kenyon), second, br. c. Perrydown (Butler), third, ch. c. Martyrdom (Fordham), fourth; also, Mr. E. Brayley's b. c. Duke of Beaufort (Cannon), the Duke of Newcastle's b. c. Tenedos by Knight of St. Patrick (Heartfield), Count Batthyany's b. c. Typhon by Weatherbit, Sir R. Bulkeley's br. c. Tasman by Warlock, Sir J. Hawley's br. c. Siderolite by Asteroid, and his br. c. King Cophetua by Asteroid, Mr. W. Graham's br. c. Drummer by Rataplan, Lord Royston's ch. c. Alpenstock (winner of this year's City and Suburban) by Rataplan, Standard-Bearer, and seven others; 3 to 1 each against Duke of Beaufort and Pretender, 8 to 1 against Belladrum, and 5 to 1 against Martyrdom. The pace was a rattler, from start to finish, settling many before the Bushes Hill was reached, at which point Perrydown was leading, followed by Tenedos second, Belladrum third, Lord Calthorpe's ch. c. Martyrdom fourth, and Pretender fifth. Half way down the hill, Belladrum took the lead, and, at the Abingdon Mile Bottom, Osborne sent Pretender up to him, the pair coming away by themselves, and the latter being a bare half length in front of Mr. Merry's colt. The finish was an exciting one, but although Kenyon made a splendid effort with Belladrum, the son of Catherine Hayes was beaten by a short half-length. At Epsom (Osborne), won the Derby, of £6225, beating Sir J. Hawley's br. c. Pero Gomez (Wells), by a head, br. c. The Drummer (winner, this year, of the Great Metropolitan), third (J. Morris); also, Mr. Jardine's b. c. Lord Hawthorn by Kettledrum (Hudson), and his ch. c. Thorwaldsen by Thormanby (T. Chaloner), ch. c. Martyrdom by St. Albans (Fordham), b. c. Belladrum (Daley), Mr. Surtee's b. c. The Ægean by Buccaneer (Parry), Mr. Padwick's b. c. Ethus (winner of the October Handicap at Newmarket in 1870) by Blair Athol (J. Goater), ch. c. Alpenstock (W. Bevill), Sir C. Legard's ch. c. Border Knight by

Adventurer (J. Snowden), Lord Rosebery's br. c. Ladas by Lambton (Custance), Lord Strafford's ro. c. Rupert by Knowsley (Custance), Mr. Savile's bl. c. Neufchâtel by Parmesan (Hammond), br. c. Perrydown (Butler), King Cophetua (Adams), Mr. Savile's b. c. Ryshworth (winner, this year, of the Great Yorkshire Stakes) by Skirmisher (Maidment), br. c. Tasman (Kenyon), ch. c. De Vere by St. Albans (J. Grimshaw), br. c. Defender by Gunboat and Tenedos, &c. ; betting, at starting, 5 to 4 against Pretender, 5 to 1 against Pero Gomez, 6 to 1 against Belladrum, 10 to 1 against Perrydown, and 20 to 1 against Martyrdom and The Drummer. When fairly settled in their places, Neufchâtel (to serve Ryshworth) made the running, followed by Lord Hawthorn (who had a similar mission for Pretender). At the mile post this pair were racing at top speed, three lengths in advance of Pretender, The Ægean, Ryshworth, Thorwaldsen, Perrydown, Duke of Beaufort (Cannon), The Drummer, Alpenstock, and Pero Gomez, in the order named, Belladrum and Ethus being fully fifty yards in the rear of everything, and never afterwards taking part in the race. At the furzes the pace was much increased by Lord Hawthorn, who had headed Neufchâtel, holding a slight lead to Tattenham Corner, where Thormanby swerved right across Duke of Beaufort, who all but fell. Wells, to avoid a collision, had to pull Pero Gomez quite to the outside, to his great and manifest disadvantage. When fairly in the straight, Lord Hawthorn beat a retreat, when The Drummer, emerging from a closely-packed body of horses, went to the front, having Perrydown and Rupert on the left; King Cophetua, The Ægean, and Pretender, a length behind them, were in the centre. Ryshworth and Pero Gomez were on the higher ground, two lengths in the rear of Pretender, and next to them followed Duke of Beaufort, Martyrdom, and Alpenstock. The three leaders looked so formidable at the distance, that the fielders screamed with delight. Here, however, King Cophetua and The Ægean were beaten, and so killing was the pace that, very shortly after, Rupert and Perrydown succumbed to its severity, as did Ryshworth also, a few strides further on. All eyes were now fixed on Drummer and Pretender, as it looked like a match between this pair. Just opposite the Stand, however, Welis sent Pero, who had passed The Drummer about fifty yards from home, in front of

Pretender, who till then had been leading by half a length, and for a moment Sir Joseph's colt appeared to have the best of the struggle ; but Pretender, springing to Osborne's severe application of the whip, won one of the grandest races ever witnessed. Pero and Wells came in for a large share of applause, so well deserved. Poor Wells, to his dying hour, always maintained that it was Pero's head, and not Pretender's, that was in front of the post, and many were of the same opinion. Just after the race, a report was circulated that Mr. Sadler, the breeder and nominator of Pretender, had died in Yorkshire, the evening before, on which Sir Joseph claimed the stakes ; but a telegram despatched brought the reply that the statement was untrue. At Stockton, 9st 6lbs (Osborne), won the Great Northern Leger, of £375, beating Mr. Bromsgrove's b. c. Islam by Musjid, 8st 10lbs (Custance), by a neck, and Mr. C. Peck's b. c. Fichu by Ivan, 9st 3lbs (T. Chaloner), last. At Doncaster (J. Osborne), was not placed in the St. Leger, won by Pero Gomez (Wells) ; and, in the Doncaster Stakes, was again defeated by Pero Gomez. At Newmarket (Second October), 9st 4lbs (John Osborne), ran second in the Newmarket Derby, of £545, won by Count de Lagrange's b. c. Boulogne by Monarque, 8st 11lbs (Butler), beating The Baron's b. c. Wildbad by North Lincoln, 8st 11lbs (Daley), third, Martyrdom (on whom 11 to 10 was laid), 9st 4lbs (Fordham), last. Pretender ran several times, in 1870 and 1871, and not always in good company, such as a Derby winner was bound to do, without one single success, or even obtaining a place ; and it would have been better for his reputation had he retired earlier from the Turf, previously to his degradation to "plating company."

PERO GOMEZ was a br. c. foaled in 1866, bred by, and the property of, Sir Joseph Hawley, Bart. He was got by Beadsman, out of Salamanca by Student (son of Chatham), out of Bravery by Gameboy (son of Tomboy), out of Ennui by Bay Middleton, out of Blue Devils by Velocipede, out of Care by Woful, out of Camarine's dam by Rubens, out of Tippitywitchet by Waxy, out of Hare by Sweetbriar, out of a mare by Justice, her dam by Chymist (son of Match'em), out of a mare by South (son of Regulus), out of Sister to Sir James Lowther's Babraham (son of Babraham).

Adams), won the Middle Park Plate, of £4480 (£1000 of which was the free gift of Mr. William Blenkiron), beating the Duke of Beaufort's ch. f. Scottish Queen, 8st 6lbs (Fordham), by a length, Mr. Jardine's br. c. Pretender, 8st 13lbs (Osborne), third; also, Count Batthyany's b. c. Typhon by Weatherbit, Sir R. Bulkeley's br. c. Tasman by Warlock, the Duke of Hamilton's br. c. Wild Oats by Wild Dayrell, Mr. W. Graham's br. c. The Drummer by Rataplan, Mr. Jardine's b. c. Derventio by Citadel, br. c. King Cophetua by Asteroid, b. c. Ryshworth, Captain Machell's b. c. The Priest by Romulus, Count Lagrange's, ch. c. Le Saphir (bred in France) by Ventre-St.-Gris (son of Gladiator), Mr. Naylor's br. c. Chatsworth by Stockwell, and his b. f. Lurline by Macaroni, Mr. T. Jennings' br. c. Perrydown by Ben-Webster, Dr. Shorthouse's b. f. (afterwards named Atonement), by Oulston, br. c. Badsworth by Carnival, and four others; 5 to 2 against Wild Oats, 100 to 30 against Pero Gomez, 7 to 1 against

King Cophetua, and 11 to 1 against Scottish Queen. After three breaks away, the flag fell to a capital start, the twenty-one horses stretching across the course like a regiment of cavalry. The first to show in front was The Priest, 8st 6lbs (Jeffery), followed by the Oulston filly, 8st 3lbs (Cannon), and Mr. Chaplin's Brother to Chattanooga by Orlando, 8st 9lbs (Custance), in the centre of the course; whilst on the left, were Le Saphir, 8st 6lbs (Grimshaw), Perrydown, 8st 6lbs (Parry), King Cophetua 8st 9lbs (French), Pero Gomez, Scottish Queen, and Pretender, all in the order named. Well up with these came Wild Oats, 8st 9lbs (Norman), Chatsworth, 8st 6lbs (Kenyon), Lurline, 8st 3lbs (Butler), Mr. Cornish's ch. c. Consternation by Blair Athol, 8st 9lbs (Covey), The Drummer, 8st 6lbs (Page), Badsworth, 8st 13lbs (J. Mann), Derventio (Cameron), 8st 6lbs, Ryshworth, 9st 2lbs—7lbs extra for winning the July Stakes at Newmarket—(Daley), and Mr. Holmes' b. f. Lady Dewhurst by Newminster, 8st 6lbs (J. Snowden), forming the rear division, with Typhon, 8st 9lbs (Morris), and Tasman, 8st 9lbs (J. Goater), the two last. With little change, they ran thus to the Bushes Hill, where Wild Oats began to compound, and Pero Gomez, emerging from the ruck, here took up the running, passing the leaders, one by one, and followed by Le Saphir, the Oulston filly, Scottish Queen, and Pretender, quite clear of the rest of the field, The Priest and Brother to Chattanooga having gone to the rear some time before. In the dip, the Oulston filly and Le Saphir retired beaten, and here Fordham brought up Scottish Queen, and challenged Pero Gomez. An exciting race home then ensued, but the moment Adams asked Pero for an effort, the race was over, and he won easily by a length. Pretender, four lengths from The Queen, was third, Oulston filly a bad fourth, Wild Oats fifth, Le Saphir sixth, and Perrydown seventh. Sir Joseph declared to win with King Cophetua. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 12lbs (J. Adams), in the Criterion, of £1300, ran a dead-heat with Wild Oats, 8st 12lbs (French), Sir Joseph and his Grace dividing the stakes. King Cophetua, 8st 8lbs (Cannon), and Ryshworth, 8st 11lbs (Daley), also ran. Sir Joseph declared to win with Pero.

1869.

At Newmarket Craven, 8st 10lbs (Wells), won the Biennial of £670,

beating Mr. E. Brayley's b. c. Duke of Beaufort by Trumpeter, 8st 10lbs (Cannon), by a neck, Ryshworth, 8st 10lbs (Maidment), four lengths off, third, and three others; 2 to 1 on Pero, who on this occasion looked really magnificent, and 4 to 1 against Duke of Beaufort. Ryshworth took the lead, followed by Duke of Beaufort, with Pero close at his heels, and the Duke of Newcastle's b. c. Tenedos by Knight of St. Patrick, 8st 10lbs (Daley), fourth. Ascending the hill to the Bushes, Tenedos headed Sir Joseph's colt, but soon after Pero regained the second place. A few strides further Ryshworth rushed to the front, and led into the Ab. M. Bottom, when he retired, leaving the Duke of Beaufort with the lead again. Two hundred yards from home Wells brought Pero up to the Duke's head and, amidst intense excitement, got just in front of him. Cannon made a most brilliant effort, but Pero, increasing his advantage at every stride, won easily at last by a neck, which Wells could have made a length or two. At Epsom (Wells), ran second in the Derby, won by Pretender. At Ascot, 9st 1lb (Wells), ran second in the Prince of Wales' Stakes, of £3125, won by Martyrdom, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), by a length. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (Wells), won the Ascot Derby, of £725, beating Count Lagrange's b. c. Consul by Monarque, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), by two lengths, Mr. Jardine's bl. c. Good Hope (winner, this year, of the Doncaster Cup) by Cape Flyaway, 8st 10lbs (Osborne), third, and Scottish Queen, 8st 6lbs (Fordham), last. At Doncaster (Wells), won the St. Leger, of £5525, beating Martyrdom (Fordham), by a length, br. c. George Osbaldeston by Camerino (French), third; also, b. c. Typhon (Morris), Duke of Beaufort (Cannon), Mr. Jardine's b. c. Lord Hawthorn (Chaloner), Mr. Wm. Day's b. c. The Starter (winner, this year, of the Goodwood Stakes), by Voltigeur (J. Adams), Mr. Graham's b. c. Consul by Buccaneer (Page), and his b. c. The Drummer by Rataplan (Custance), Mr. Jardine's ch. c. Derventio by Citadel (Hudson), and his br. c. Pretender (Osborne); 6 to 5 on Pretender, 3 to 1 against Pero Gomez (taken freely), 7 to 1 against Martyrdom, and 33 to 1 against George Osbaldeston. At the first attempt, they got off to a most perfect start, Pero on the extreme left, and Conrad on the right, being the first to show in advance. Wells, however, soon pulled Pero back, who was tearing away far too freely. When two hundred yards had been covered, Typhon rushed to the front, but Page, whose orders were to make the

pace strong for The Drummer, raised his whip, and sent Conrad a good length in front of Typhon, who was followed by Starter, Derventio, Lord Hawthorn, Pero, and The Drummer, Pretender being at the tail of the last trio, a length in advance of Duke of Beaufort and George Osbaldeston, while Martyrdom was quite in the rear. At the end of a quarter of a mile, Hudson on Derventio (to serve Pretender), went up to the two leaders, being hard pressed by The Starter, Pero, and The Drummer. Nearing the Rifle Butts, the severity of the pace obliged Conrad and Derventio to retire, when The Starter took the lead, followed by Typhon, The Drummer, George Osbaldeston, Pero and Pretender. In this order they reached the Red House, after passing which, Pero rushed forward and headed Typhon, Martyrdom at the same time coming through from the ruck, and taking up a prominent position on the right. After rounding the bend, The Drummer compounded, George Osbaldeston taking his place, with Pretender at his quarters. Soon after, The Starter abandoned the lead, and retired beaten, when Pero took up the running in earnest, making the pace very hot. It was now that Osborne saw the necessity of calling on Pretender, but the Derby winner floundered all over the course, and was beaten in an instant. George Osbaldeston now came up and raced for about two hundred yards with Pero, but was unable to continue it further, so tremendous was the pace. At the enclosure, however, Pero was challenged by Martyrdom, who appeared, inch by inch, to be gaining on Sir Joseph's colt, but, notwithstanding Geo. Fordham's resolute riding, and an attempt at a fine dash, he could never get on anything like level terms with him, and was defeated easily: S. mg., 9st 6lbs (Wells), won the Doncaster Stakes, of £820, beating Pretender, 9st 6lbs (Osborne), by a length, Typhon, 8st 10lbs (Morris), third; also, Sir R. Bulkeley's b. f. Martinique, 8st 6lbs, Duke of Beaufort, 8st 10lbs, and Mr. W. Day's b. c. Castle Hill by Voltigeur, 8st 10lbs (Cannon). At Newmarket (First October), w. o. for the Grand Duke Michael, of £750, and at Newmarket (Second October), w. o. for the Royal Stakes (£1300). At Newmarket (Ho.), 9st (Wells), ran third in a Free Handicap, of £750, won by Mr. Pryor's b. c. Cardinal York (winner of the Cæsarewitch in 1870), by Newminster, three years, 6st 12lbs (Hunt), beating Sir C. Legard's ch. c. Border Knight (winner, this year, of the Wynnstay and

the Hawkeston Cups at Shrewsbury, and the Great Autumn Welter Cup at Warwick), by Adventurer, 7st 2lbs (Jeffery), by four lengths, and Martinique, 7st 8lbs (Maidment), last ; all three years old ; a head only between second and third ; 7 to 4 on The Cardinal, 100 to 30 against Pero, and 6 to 1 against Border Knight. Pero conceded 30lbs to the winner, and 26lbs to the second horse, and now, not disgraced, if defeated, retired to the Stud, whence have issued some of his youngsters, who have given fair promise of helping to preserve the very valuable line of Beadsman.

Abstinence (winner, this year, of the Hopeful Stakes at Newmarket), by Newcastle (Daley), 9st, by a head, and three others. At Newmarket (Ho.), for two years old, 8st 7lbs (Cannon), ran second in a Nursery Handicap, of £400, won by Mr. Pryor's b. c. Cardinal York (winner of the Cæsarewitch in 1870), by Newminster, by a short neck (Covey), and beating eleven others. S. mg., 8st 5lbs (Cannon), won a Nursery Handicap, of 600 sovs., beating Mr. Wright's

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ch. f. Dryad by Cape Flyaway, 7st 9lbs (Covey), by two lengths, Mr. Woolcote's b. c. Conrad by Buccaneer, 6st 7lbs, third, and eighteen others; 4 to 1 against Dryad, 5 to 1 against Brigantine, and 10 to 1 against Conrad (Hammond).

1869.

At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 10lbs each (Cannon), ran third in the 1000 Guineas (£3750), won by the Duke of Beaufort's ch. f. Scottish Queen by Blair Athol (Fordham), beating Sir J. Hawley's br. f. Morna by Beadsman (Wells), by half a length, Mr. Bowes' b. f. Toison-d'Or by Buccaneer, third, Mr. Crawford's b. f. Heather Bell by Stockwell, Sir F. Johnstone's b. f. Carita by Adventurer, Mr. Launde's ch. f. Minaret by Rataplan, Mr. H. Padwick's b. f. Music by Stockwell, and Mr. Merry's ch. f. Crocus by Thormanby; 100 to 60 against Morna, 2 to 1 against Heather Bell, 7 to 1 against Brigantine, and 10 to 1 against Scottish Queen. They all got away at the first attempt, to a good start, Carita (Parry), to serve Brigantine, cutting out the work at a good rate of speed, on the left, and slightly in advance of Brigantine. In the centre was Morna (Adams), and on the right was Heather Bell (Chaloner), fourth, while Crocus (Daley), Toison-d'Or (T. French), Minaret (Osborne), and Music (Kenyon), followed almost in a line. At the end of a quarter of a mile Carita retired, leaving Brigantine with the lead, Morna being second, close up, and Heather Bell third, a length in advance of Scottish Queen, who had come up from the rearmost. At the T. Y. C. post, Cannon was forced to call on Brigantine, who did not respond, and was instantly passed by Morna, while The Queen drew level with Heather Bell, who compounded in the dip, and dropped back. The Queen was now second, and remained so till within two hundred yards from home, when she headed Morna, and, being full of running, maintained her advantage to the end, Morna beating Brigantine by a neck only, who was four lengths in front of Heather Bell, fourth, Toison-d'Or being a bad fifth, and Crocus, a long way off, sixth. At Epsom (Cannon), won the Oaks, of £4550, beating Morna (winner, in 1868, of the Champagne, of £1425, at Doncaster, and in 1869 of the Nassau Stakes, of £1050, at Goodwood), (Adams), by two lengths, Sir R. Bulkeley's b. f. Martinique (winner, this year, of the

Coronation Stakes, of £1500, at Ascot, and the Triennial at Newmarket), by Macaroni (J. Snowden), third; also, Scottish Queen (Fordham), Lord Anglesey's b. f. Miss Foote by Orlando (H. Constable), Toison-d'Or (Morris), Mr. Jardine's b. f. Hymen by Voltigeur (Chaloner), Count de Lagrange's b. f. Curieuse by Monarque (Butler), Mr. R. C. Naylor's b. f. Tees-water by Stockwell (Maidment), ch. f. Crocus (Daley), ch. f. Dryad (French), and three others; 5 to 4 against Morna, 100 to 30 against Brigantine, and 8 to 1 each against Scottish Queen and Martinique. After one false start they all got well off; and, at the end of a quarter of a mile Morna assumed the lead, followed closely by Brigantine, Miss Foote, Crocus, Toison-d'Or, and Martinique, in the order named. Very soon after, Miss Foote headed Brigantine, and challenged Morna for the lead, but unavailingly, Sir Joseph's filly holding her own till they got round Tattenham Corner, at which point Brigantine headed Miss Foote, and took second place. Entering the straight, she drew up level with Morna, where Miss Foote retired to the rear, beaten, the next three being Toison-d'Or, Crocus, and Martinique. At the distance the race became a match between Brigantine and Morna, the former winning very easily. Martinique was two lengths behind Morna, Crocus fourth, and Toison-d'Or fifth. At Ascot, 7st 2lbs (Butler), won the Cup, beating Blue Gown, 8st 10lbs (Wells), by a length, Mr. Graham's ch. f. Formosa, four years, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), third, Count de Lagrange's ch. h. Trocadero (bred in France), by Monarque, 9st 3lbs (Chaloner), five years old, Mr. Jardine's ch. c. Thorwaldsen, three years, 7st 5lbs, distanced; 6 to 4 against Blue Gown, 5 to 2 against Formosa, and 4 to 1 against Brigantine, Trocadero leading, and Thorwaldsen (Hudson) making very strong running, followed by Blue Gown, third, Brigantine, fourth, and Formosa last, to the Swinley Bottom, where Thorwaldsen passed Trocadero, as, a few yards further, did Blue Gown and Brigantine also. Half a mile from home Blue Gown fell quite into the rear, Brigantine having headed Thorwaldsen, and Formosa being now third. When in the line for home Wells again brought up Blue Gown, who successfully headed Formosa and Thorwaldsen, but failed to reach Brigantine, though he responded with most astonishing gameness to Wells's call. At a very

critical part of the race he had lain too far off. At Stockbridge, w. o. for the Biennial, of £400. S. mg., 7st 7lbs (Butler), won the Cup, beating Formosa, 8st 12lbs (Fordham), by twenty lengths, Mr. E. Brayley's bl. c. Cock of the Walk by Chanticleer, four years, 8st 10lbs, third and last. At Goodwood, 7st 10lbs (Cannon), ran third for the Cup, won by The Baron's b. c. Restitution by King Tom, four years, 9st (Daley), beating Mr. Savile's bl. g. Blueskin, four years, 8st 10lbs (Maidment), by two lengths, Lord Calthorpe's ch. c. Robespierre by Stockwell, three years, 7st 7lbs (Jeffery), fourth, and ro. c. Rupert, 7st 7lbs, last. Brigantine was now put to the Stud.

THE RACE FOR THE GOODWOOD CUP.

Betting, at starting, 9 to 4 against Brigantine, 5 to 1 against Restitution, 8 to 1 against Lord Stafford's ro. c. Rupert (winner, this year, of the Drawing-room Stakes at Goodwood), 100 to 8 against Robespierre, and 100 to 30 against Blueskin. Directly the flag fell Restitution and Blueskin jumped off together, and raced for the lead; and, rounding the bend, were twenty lengths in advance of Robespierre. At the end of a mile Blueskin slightly headed The Baron's colt; but, at the clump, Restitution was quite a couple of lengths in front of Blueskin, who was fully fifty yards ahead of Robespierre, next to whom, at a long interval, came Rupert (Butler). A little over a mile from home Brigantine drew up to Rupert, whom she soon passed, as she did Robespierre, also, shortly after, and now held third place. At the same moment Blueskin again headed Restitution, who, however, regained the lead when fairly in the straight. At this time Brigantine was lying quite forty lengths off, and Restitution was going so strong and well, with Blueskin very handy on his whip-hand, that it became evident Brigantine must exert all the power of which she was capable to get near the leaders. To the consternation of her backers, Cannon was seen to move on Brigantine a quarter of a mile from home, and an immense and prolonged shout from the fielders proclaimed the defeat of the favourite. At the distance, Blueskin was beaten, when Restitution, still full of running, drew away, and won in a common canter. Brigantine was quite eighty yards in the rear of Blueskin, and Robespierre, trotting in, was fourth.

KINGCRAFT.

KINGCRAFT was a b. c. foaled in 1867, bred by, and the property of, Viscount Falmouth. He was got by King Tom, out of Woodcraft by Voltigeur, out of Wedding Day by Camel, out of Margellina (sister to Memnon), by Whisker, out of Manuella (bred by Richard Watt, Esq., of Bishop Burton, in 1809), by Dick Andrews, out of Mandane by Pot80's, out of Young Camilla. 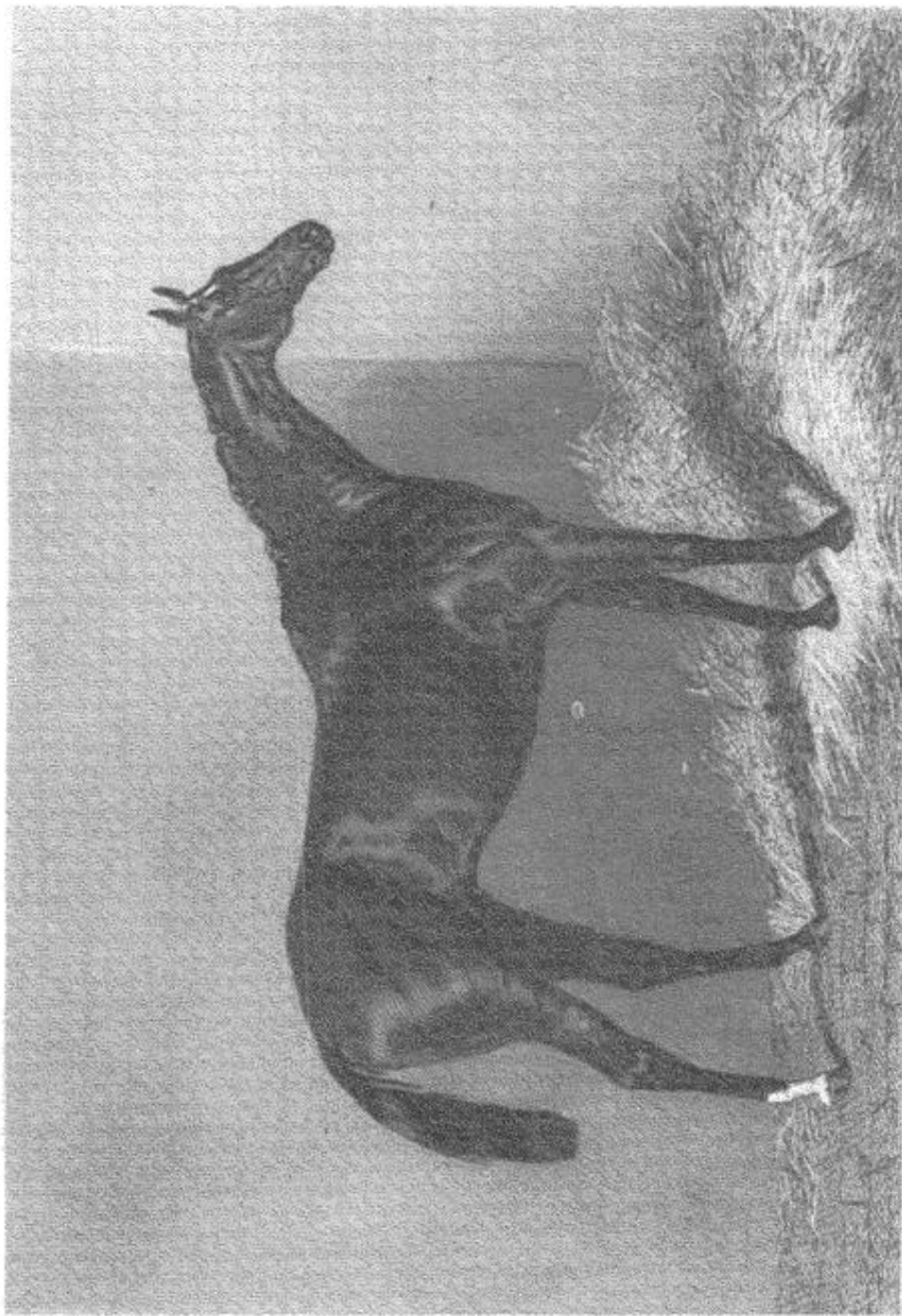

Cestus by Newminster, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), by two lengths, Mr. Vaughan's ch. c. St. George by Newminster, 8st 10lbs (Maidment), third; also, Mr. Launde's (alias the Rev. John King's) b. f. Agility (winner, in 1870, of the Nassau Stakes at Goodwood, the Cup at Warwick, and the Park Hill Stakes at Doncaster), by Adventurer, 9st—7lbs extra—(J. Osborne), Mahonia, 8st 7lbs, and nine others; 5 to 2 against Kingcraft, and 4 to 1 against Cestus. At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs (French), won the Ham Stakes, of £900, beating Mr. Merry's ch. c. Sunlight (winner of the Black Duck Stakes, of 1000 sovs. each, at York), by Stockwell, 8st 10lbs (Daley), by half a length; 5 to 2 on Kingcraft. At York (August), 9st (French), won the Convivial Stakes, of £295, beating Mr. A. de Montgomery's b. f. La-Calonne (bred in France), by

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Newminster, 8st 3lbs (Chaloner), by a length, Mr. J. Bowes' b. c. Nobleman by The Marquis, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), third, and two others. At Newmarket (First October), 8st 10lbs (French), won the Buckenham Stakes, of £600, beating Lord Stamford's ch. c. Normanby by Thormanby, 8st 10lbs (J. Goater), by a head; 3 to 1 on Kingcraft. The pair ran in close company all through, no more than half a length dividing them at any part of the race, and the finish was splendid. S. mg., 8st 10lbs (French), won the Triennial, of £440, beating Nobleman, 8st 10lbs (Fordham), by six lengths, Lord Falmouth's b. c. Linsey-Wolsey by Blair Athol, 8st 10lbs, third, and four others. At Newmarket (Second October), w.o. for 300 sovs. S. mg., 9st 2lbs (French), ran third in the Middle Park Plate, of £4140, won by Mr. Lindon's ch. f. Frivolity by Macaroni, 8st 10lbs (Chaloner), beating Mr. Merry's b. f. Sunshine (winner, this year, of the July Stakes at Newmarket, the Lavant at Goodwood, and the Champagne at Doncaster), by Thormanby, 8st 13lbs (Daley), by a long head, Kingcraft being a short head behind Sunshine, and having run with extraordinary gameness; Hawthornden, 8st 9lbs, Normanby, 8st 9lbs, Mahonia, 8st 6lbs, and eleven others, also ran; 7 to 4 against Sunshine, 7 to 2 against Hawthornden, 5 to 1 against Kingcraft, and 8 to 1 against Frivolity. At Newmarket (Ho.), 9st 1lb (French), ran third in the Criterion, of £1170, won by Mr. Joseph Dawson's br. f. Hester by Thormanby (winner, in 1870, of the 1000 Guineas), 8st 8lbs (J. Grimshaw), beating Sunshine, 8st 8lbs (Cannon), by a length; also Mr. Merry's ch. c. Sunlight by Stockwell, Lord Falmouth's ch. f. Atlantis, (winner of the Clearwell and Prendergast at Newmarket), by Thormanby, 8st 13lbs (Chaloner), fourth, b. c. Nobleman, 8st 8lbs, and five others; 6 to 5 against Kingcraft, 11 to 2 against Atlantis, and 7 to 1 each against Hester and Sunlight (J. Daley), Count Legrange's ch. c. Alaric by Monarque, and his b. c. Roquefort by Hospodar (both bred in France), 8st 8lbs each, led to the Duke's Stand, where they were beaten, giving place to Kingcraft, who, however, at the commencement of the rails, was in turn beaten and headed by Sunlight, pulling double, who seemed to have the race in hand, but Jemmy Grimshaw, by a brilliant effort, brought up Hester to Sunlight's head, when the son of Stockwell and Sunflower, not relishing the challenge, instantly shut up.

At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 10lbs (French), ran third in the 2000 Guineas (val. £4400), won by Mr. Merry's b. c. Macgregor by Macaroni, 8st 10lbs (Daley), beating Normanby, 8st 10lbs (J. Grimshaw), in a canter, by five lengths, Sunlight, Hawthornden, Claudius, and four others not being placed; 75 to 40 against Kingcraft, 100 to 30 against Macgregor, and 66 to 1 against Normanby. At Epsom (French), won the Derby, of £6175, beating Mr. W. S. Crawford's br. c. Palmerston by Bocket (Chaloner), by four lengths, Lord Wilton's br. c. Muster by Tim Whiffler (Maidment), third; also, Captain Machell's b. c. Bonny Swell by Macaroni, Sir R. Pigot's b. c. Bay Roland, by Fitzroland, Mr. J. Ellis' ch. c. Cymbal by Kettledrum, Mr. J. Dawson's b. c. King o' Scots by King Tom, and his ch. c. Camel by Thormanby, b. c. Macgregor (Fordham), Mr. W. Cartwright's b. c. Ely Appleton by Ely, ch. c. Normanby (J. Grimshaw), b. c. Nobleman (J. Morris), Mr. J. B. Morris' b. c. Prince of Wales by Chevalier-d'Industrie (Cannon), and two others; 9 to 4 on Macgregor, 100 to 9 against Camel, 100 to 8 against Prince of Wales, and 20 to 1 each against Kingcraft and Palmerston, Muster not being quoted. Muster, Normanby, and Palmerston, were the first to show in front, the last-named eventually taking the lead, which he held to Tattenham Corner, followed by Macgregor, who dropped away the moment they commenced the descent. When fairly in the straight, Bonny Swell headed Palmerston, Muster then being third, and Macgregor, already in difficulties, fourth. At the distance, Fordham called upon Macgregor for an effort, but unavailingly; and soon after, Bonny Swell, who till now possessed a chance second to none, suddenly collapsed, leaving Palmerston with half a length's lead of Muster, Kingcraft at this point being behind Lord Wilton's colt. All eyes were now fixed on Palmerston and Muster, who had commenced a most exciting struggle, when Kingcraft rushed to the front, and without the slightest effort, drew away and won with consummate ease, Palmerston securing the second money (£300), by a neck from Muster, who received 150 sovs., Macgregor was fourth, Bonny Swell (who had won the Dee Stakes at Chester, beating Muster and others), fifth, and Prince of Wales sixth. S. mg., w.o. for the Great Surrey Foal Stakes, of £250. At Doncaster (French), ran second in the

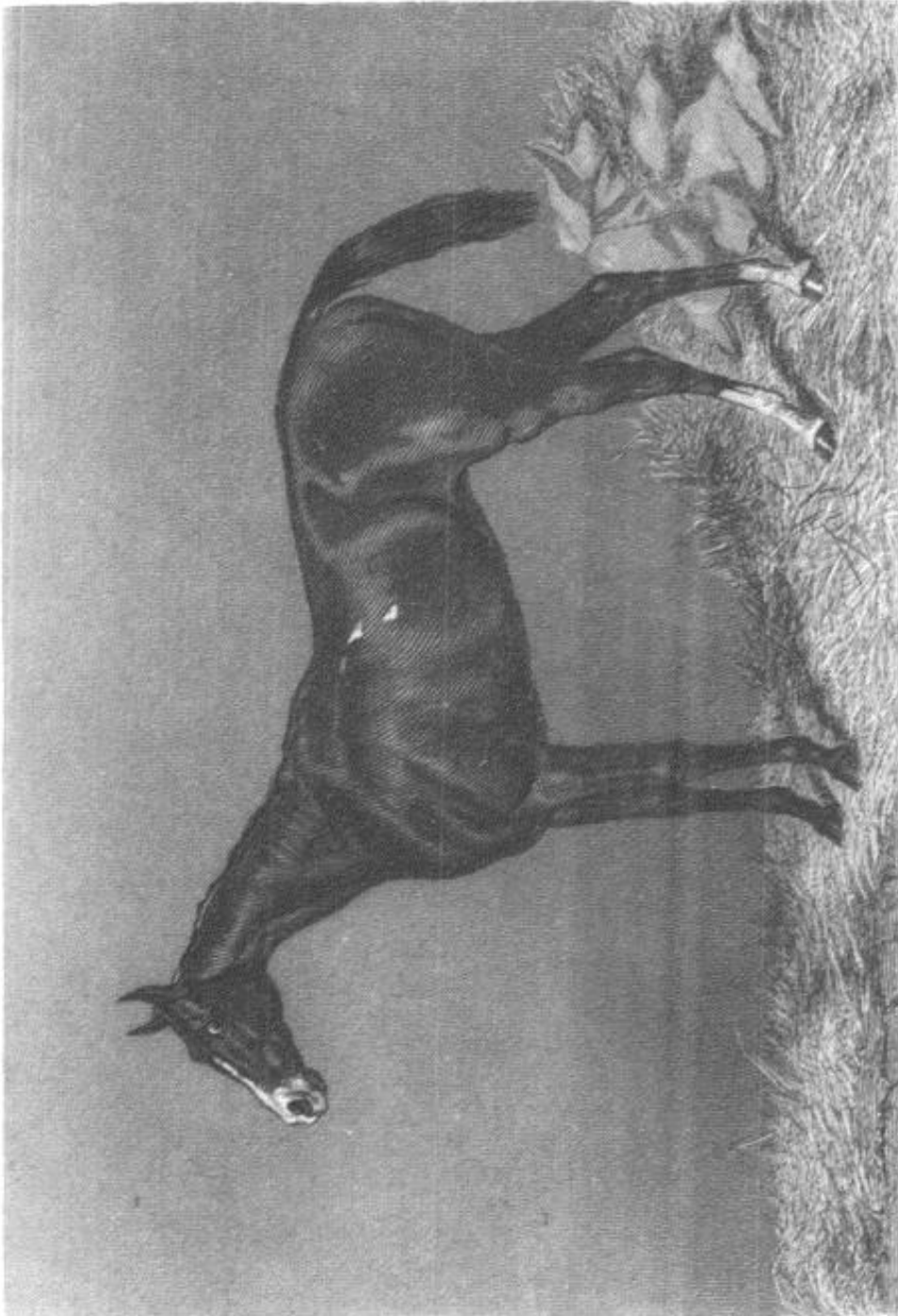
St. Leger, won by Hawthornden. S. mg., 9st 6lbs (French), not placed in the Doncaster Stakes, of £560, for which Mr. Hope's b. c. Enterprize by Adventurer, 8st 10lbs (J. Morris), and Agility, 8st 6lbs (Osborne), ran a dead-heat, stakes divided; 7 to 4 against Kingcraft, 100 to 45 against Agility, and 8 to 1 against Enterprize, who this year won the Stockton Handicap. At Newmarket (First October), 8st 10lbs (French), ran second in the Triennial, of £432, won by Lord Zetland's b. f. Fragrance by Voltigeur, 8st 7lbs (J. Snowden), by a length, beating two others; 3 to 1 on Kingcraft. S. mg., 9st 3lbs (French), ran fourth and last in the Newmarket St. Leger, of £925, won by Mr. H. Savile's b. f. La-Perichole by Parmesan, 8st 6lbs (Maidment), beating Mr. Drewitt's b. c. Scarborough (winner, this year, of the Biennial at Stockbridge, and the Drawing-room Stakes at Goodwood), by Lambton, 8st 10lbs (Parry), by two lengths, and the Baron's b. c. King Leopold by King Tom, 8st 10lbs (Fordham); 5 to 4 against Scarborough, 3 to 1 against Kingcraft, 5 to 1 against King Leopold, and 6 to 1 against La-Perichole. At Newmarket (Second October), w.o. for the Select Stakes of £100. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 10lbs (French), ran fourth and last in the All-aged Stakes of £500, won by Sir Joseph Hawley's br. h. Rosicrucian by Beadsman, five years, 9st 5lbs (Wells), beating Lord Stamford's ch. c. Normanby, 8st 10lbs (Maidment), by half a length, and Prince Batthyany's b. h. Typhæus by Stockwell, five years, 9st 5lbs, third; even on Rosicrucian, and 4 to 1 against Kingcraft.

1871.

In this year Kingcraft sustained a succession of defeats by horses whom he had before easily beaten, viz. at Newmarket Craven, in the Claret Stakes, by Palmerston; at Ascot, in the Triennial, by Nobleman; and, lastly, at Newmarket (Second October), in the Cesarewitch, by Corisande, and in the Cambridgeshire, by Sabinus—the only races for which he started. These reverses quite tarnished the good name he had previously established. Equally unfortunate was he in 1872. Had he retired from the Turf after his half-length defeat in the St. Leger (the severity of which race probably subdued his spirit), he would have ranked deservedly high as a race-horse. It remains to be seen what he will do

at the Stud. He has already begotten for his noble owner, Apollo, who beat Robert the Devil, and ran fourth to Bend Or in the Derby; and several others of his stock have occasionally done well since that time.

Pandore by Newminster, out of Caller-Ou, and six others. At Harpenden, 9st (Fordham), won the Two Years Old Stakes, of £285, beating Paté, 9st (French), b. c. Temple by Orlando, 8st 10lbs, third, and six others. At Windsor, 9st 1lb (Fordham), won the Windsor Stakes, of £180, beating Mr. Morris' ch. f. Calypso by Thormanby, 8st 3lbs (Cannon), by a head; only these two ran. At Goodwood, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), won the Bentinck Memorial, of £340, beating Lord Falmouth's b. f. Gertrude (winner of the Yorkshire Oaks, and the Great Yorkshire Stakes in 1870) by Saunterer, out of Queen Bertha, 8st 7lbs (French), by a neck, Mr. Merry's ch. c. Sunlight by Stockwell, 8st 7lbs, third, and Mr. W. S. Crawford's ch. f. Blue Bell by Thormanby, 8st 10lbs, last; 5 to 4 against Gamos, and 2 to 1 against Gertrude. At Weymouth, 9st (Page), won the Two Years Old Stakes, of £218, beating Mr. Cartwright's ch. c. Recorder by Marsyas, 8st 10lbs (Cannon), in a canter; 5 to 1 on Gamos. At Bedford, 9st (Page), ran

second in the Woburn Stakes, of £160, won by Paté, 9st (Marsh), beating two others. At Leicester, for two years old, 9st (Page), in the Gopsall Park Stakes, of £95, was beaten by Mr. Wm. At Epsom (Fordham), won the Oaks, of £4350, beating Mr. Merry's b. f. Sunshine (winner of the Woodcote at Epsom, of £890, the July Stakes, of £1510, at Newmarket, the Lavant Stakes, of £690, at Goodwood, the North of England Biennial, of £358, at York, the Champagne, of £1300, at Doncaster, and £1500 at Newmarket October, all in 1869, and the Coronation Stakes, of £1300, at Ascot in 1870) by Thormanby (James Snowden), second, b. f. Paté (T. Chaloner), third, Lord Falmouth's Gertrude (French), fourth, Sir R. Bulkeley's b. f. Carfax by Oxford (Maidment), fifth, Mr. Joseph Dawson's br. f. Hester (winner of the 1000 Guineas), by Thormanby (J. Grimshaw), sixth, and Mr. Eastwood's ch. f. Hawthorndale by Kettle drum (Osborne), seventh and last. Betting, at starting, evens against Hester, 4 to 1 each against Sunshine and Paté, 10 to 1 against Gamos, and 100 to 3 against Gertrude. They got away, at the first attempt, to an excellent start, Gamos, on the outside, being in front. Soon afterwards, the lead was taken by Hawthorndale, who was followed by Paté and Hester, Gamos being fourth, and Gertrude fifth. On entering the furzes, Paté deprived Hawthorndale of the lead, which the latter soon after recovered. At the mile post, Paté again assumed the lead, and Hester headed Hawthorndale, and soon after, Paté also.

When fairly in the straight, Paté overhauled Hester, as did Sunshine also, who now held the second place. Gamos passing Hester, taking the third. Very speedily Gertrude headed Hester, and became fourth, all the rest being hopelessly in the rear. Just outside the distance, Sunshine shot past Paté, and took the lead, but was instantly challenged by Gamos, who defeated her at the Stand, and won in a canter, by a length. At Goodwood, 8st 6lbs (Fordham), ran second in the Bentinck Memorial, won by Lady of Lyons, 8st 6lbs (J. Snowden), beating Gertrude, 8st 6lbs, third, Mr. A. de Montgomery's b. f. La-Calonne by Newminster, who made the running for half the distance, when Lady of Lyons took the lead, having Gamos close at her heels. At the foot of the hill, Fordham challenged, but could not quite get up, and Gamos was beaten by a neck. At York (August), 9st 3lbs (Fordham), ran third in the Yorkshire Oaks, won by Gertrude, 8st 10lbs (French), beating the Rev. John King's b. f. 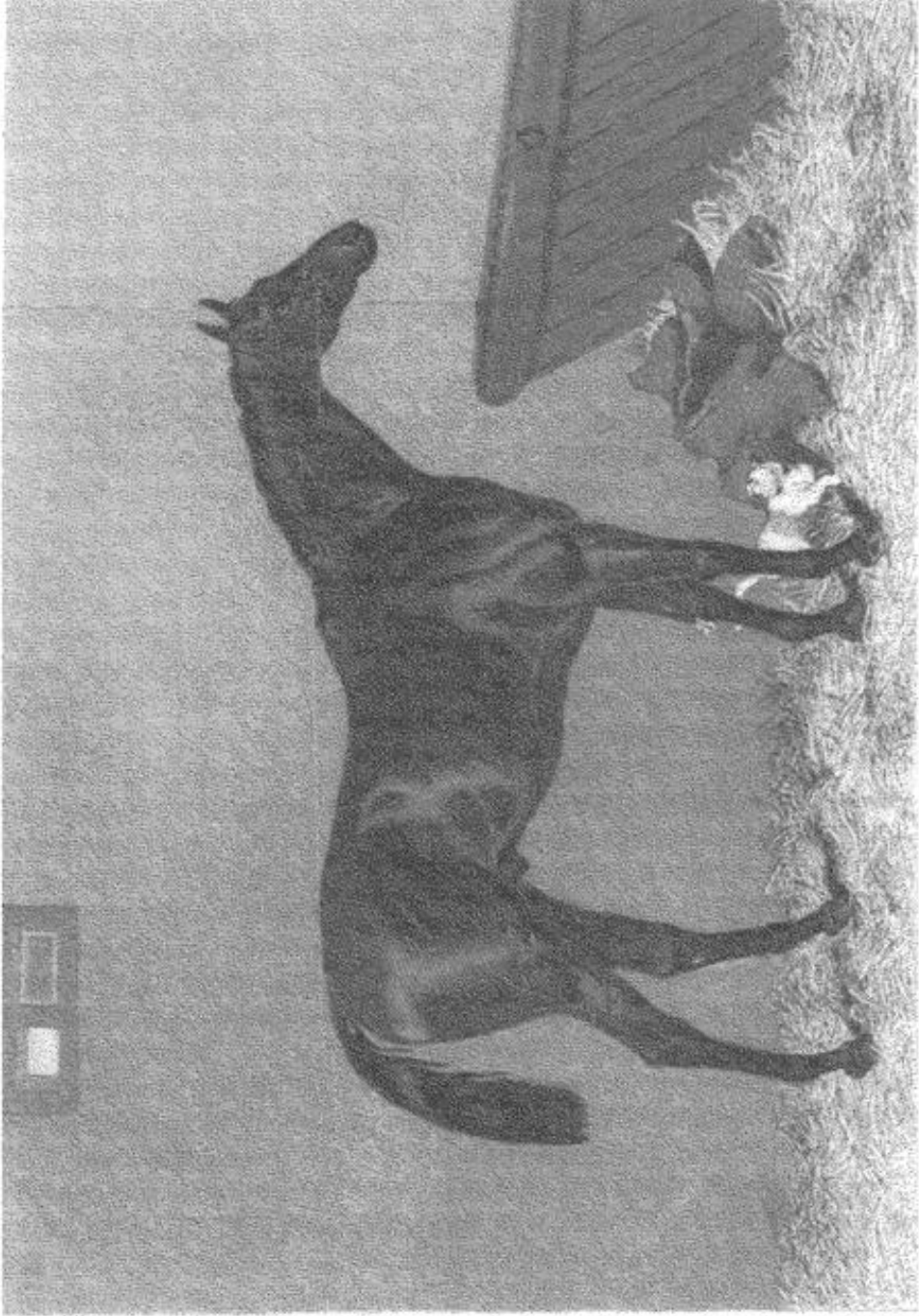

Stockhausen by Stockwell, 8st 7lbs (Fordham), by a length, and six others. At Huntingdon, 9st 3lbs—7lbs extra—(Adams), won £360, beating Mr. H. Chaplin's b. f. Pandore (winner of the Biennial at Ascot), by Newminster (Jeffery), by a neck, 8st 13lbs, Mr. Graham's b. f. Cestus by Newminster, 8st 13lbs (Fordham), third, Mr. Chaplin's ch. f. Religieuse by Newminster, 8st 1lb, Count de Lagrange's b. c. Florian by Hospodar, 8st 3lbs, and two others. Florian the favourite. At Newmarket (Second October), 8st 13lbs (Adams), ran third in the Prendergast, of £950, won by Lord Falmouth's ch. f. Atlantis (winner, also, of the Clearwell), by Thormanby, Mr. C. Hilton's b. c. Atlas by Asteroid, 8st 10lbs (Maidment), being second; eight ran; 11 to 8 on Atlantis, 9st (T. French), and 9 to 2 against Hawthornden; won by a neck.

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1870.

At Newmarket (First Spring), 8st 10lbs each (Adams), not placed for the 2000 Guineas (val £4400), won by Mr. Merry's b. c. Macgregor by Macaroni (Daley), beating Lord Stamford's ch. c. Normanby by Thormanby (J. Grimshaw), by five lengths, Lord Falmouth's b. c. Kingcraft (winner of the Derby), (T. French), third; also, Mr. Merry's ch. c. Sunlight by Stockwell, Mr. Joseph Dawson's b. c. King o' Scots by King Tom, and four others; 75 to 40 against Kingcraft, 100 to 30 against Macgregor, 6 to 1 against King o' Scots (winner of the Prince of Wales' Stakes, of £3275, at Ascot), and 100 to 6 against Hawthornden, who was fourth, a neck only behind Kingcraft. The race was a hollow one, all the field being spread-eagled. At Ascot, 8st 12lbs (French), not placed for the Queen's Stand Plate, of £340, won by Mr. Merry's b. c. King of the Forest, by Scottish Chief, two years, 6st 12lbs (Hunt), beating Mr. Graham's br. f. Perfume by Buccaneer, four years, 9st 2lbs (Lynch), by a length, Mr. Graham's bl. c. Digby Grand (winner of the City and Suburban in 1872), by Saunterer, two years, 6st 12lbs, third (Rowell), Sir J. Hawley's br. h. Rosicrucian, five years, 9st 11lbs, fourth (Wells), and three others. At Goodwood, 7st 11lbs (Huxtable), not placed for the Stewards' Cup, of £790, won by Count Batthyany's b. h. Typhæus by Stockwell, five years, 8st 10lbs (Morris), beating Mr. Stuart's b. c. Tabernacle, by Newminster, three years, 7st 10lbs (Kenyon), by a neck, Mr. Vaughan's b. h. Plaudit (the first to lower the flying Achievement's colours), by Thormanby, six years, 8st 8lbs (J. Snowden), and Mr. Ellis' ch. c. Cymbal by Kettledrum, three years, 7st 10lbs (Butler), who ran a dead-heat for third place, and twenty-three others. S. mg., w. o. for the Rous Stakes; also, 6st 13lbs (Hunt), not placed in the Chichester Stakes, of £485, won by Prince Soltykoff's bl. h. Tibthorpe by Voltigeur, six years, 9st 2lbs (French), beating Mr. J. C. Stuart's ch. f. Cocoanut by Nutbourne, four years, 7st 10lbs (Kenyon), by a head, and nine others. At Doncaster (now the property of Mr. T. V. Morgan), colts 8st 10lbs, fillies 8st 5lbs (J. Grimshaw), won the Great St. Leger, of £5500, beating Kingcraft by King Tom (T. French), second, Lord Falmouth's br. f. Wheatear (winner of the two Biennials at Ascot, and the Newmarket

Oaks), by Young Melbourne (Webb), third ; also, Mr. W. S. Crawford's br. c. Palmerston by Bocket (T. Chaloner), Captain Machell's br. c. Bonny Swell (winner of the Dee Stakes at Chester), by Macaroni (Jeffery), Mr. Graham's b. c. Captivator (winner of the Great Metropolitan in 1871), by Caractacus (Fordham), Mr. Merry's ch. c. Sunlight (J. Snowden), Mr. Johnstone's b. c. Stanley by Knowsley (Osborne), ch. f. Stockhausen (Adams), ch. c. Normanby (Parry), Count de Lagrange's ch. c. Alaric by Monarque (Hunter), Mr. W. Cartwright's b. c. Ely Appleton, by Ely (Custance), Mr. T. Dawson's b. c. Ptarmigan by Blair Athol (Hudson), Mr. W. S. Crawford's br. f. Wild Flower by King Tom (Butler), Tabernacle (Goater), and four others ; 2 to 1 against Kingcraft, 7 to 2 against Palmerston, 8 to 1 against Sunlight, 10 to 1 against Wheatear, and 1000 to 35 against Hawthornden. After an endless succession of false starts, greatly to the disadvantage of the irritable Sunlight, who tried his best to throw his jockey, they all got well away, Sunlight, with his head well in his chest, rushing to the front, and tearing along at a tremendous pace, followed by Wild Flower, Palmerston, Stockhausen, Hawthornden, and Kingcraft, all in a line. After going about three hundred yards, Sunlight broke his fetlock joint, and was destroyed. This terrible disaster left Wild Flower with the lead, who increased the pace, which Sunlight had already made so severe. After a quarter of a mile had been covered, Ely Appleton, Normanby, Alaric, Wheatear, Captivator, and Palmerston, drew up to Wild Flower and Stockhausen, the leading pair, while Hawthornden and Kingcraft dropped away to the very tail of the ruck. Behind the hill Ptarmigan and Ely Appleton raced past Wild Flower and Stockhausen (the first named having come hot from the ruck), next to whom were Tabernacle, Normanby, Alaric, Palmerston, and Wheatear, Kingcraft and Hawthornden being still several lengths behind. In this order, they descended the incline towards the Rifle Pits, Wild Flower, dead beaten, having gone to the rear. Half a mile from home, the ruck closed up with the leaders, Ely Appleton being in front. He, however, soon collapsed, when Alaric took up the running, followed by Tabernacle, Normanby, and Palmerston. In this order they came sweeping round the bend ; and, the moment they came into the straight, Alaric, Tabernacle,

and Palmerston compounded, as did Normanby shortly after. At this juncture Tom French brought up Kingcraft, going so well and strong that the wildest odds were offered on him. At the distance, Jemmy Grimshaw rushed Hawthornden up to the favourite's girths; and, after a brief and ineffectual effort to shake off the challenge, French was seen to raise his whip, amid the most deafening screams from the fielders, renewed again and again, as Hawthornden was gradually forging ahead; and, notwithstanding French's resolute riding, he maintained his advantage, winning cleverly by half a length. The result was hailed with tremendous cheering by the Ring. S. mg., 7st 10lbs (Hunt), not placed for the Portland Plate, of £530, won by Mr. W. Day's b. g. Oxonian by Oxford, four years, 7st 11lbs (Wyatt), beating Mr. R. C. Naylor's b. f. Stephanotis by Macaroni, three years, 7st 7lbs (Webb), by two lengths, Mr. Fisher's b. c. Tim Weaver by Tim Whiffler, three years, 6st (Newhouse), third, and seventeen others; 3 to 1 against Hawthornden, and 6 to 1 against Oxonian. At Newmarket (Second October), 7st 12lbs (T. Chaloner), not placed in the Cæsarewitch, of £1870, won by Mr. Pryor's b. c. Cardinal York, by Newminster, four years, 7st 8lbs (Parry), beating Mr. Myer's ch. c. Not Out (winner of the Stewards' Cup at Chester, and also the Great Ebor Handicap this year), by Umpire, three years, 5st 13lbs (Sopp), by six lengths, General Peel's b. f. Far Away, by Young Melbourne, four years, 6st 12lbs (Covey), third, Mr. Wm. Alington's b. c. Barford by Thormanby, three years, 6st 7lbs, fourth; also, Mr. T. Smith's b. h. Paganini (winner, this year, of the Goodwood Stakes), by King of Kent, five years, 5st 9lbs, and twenty-eight others. At Newmarket (Ho.), 8st 7lbs (J. Grimshaw), not placed in the Cambridgeshire, of £2550, won by Count Renard's ch. c. Adonis by Grimston (son of Stockwell), three years, 6st 3lbs (Lynham), beating Major Stapylton's ch. c. Syrian by Mentmore, three years, 6st 3lbs (Gray), by a length, Captain Machell's Bonny Swell, three years, 7st 1lb, third; also, Lord Rendlesham's b. c. Royal Rake (winner, this year, of the Lincolnshire Handicap), by Arthur Wellesley (son of Melbourne), four years, 7st 10lbs, Mr. Lyndon's ch. f. Frivolity (winner of the Middle Park Plate in 1869), by Macaroni, three years, 7st 3lbs, and thirty-eight others.

At Epsom, 9st (French), won the High Level Handicap, of £440, beating Mr. Rupert's b. c. Free Trade by Caractacus, four years, 7st 2lbs (Lynham), and Major Fridolin's ch. c. Finisterre by Cape Flyaway, four years, 7st (Handley), who ran a dead-heat for second place, and four others.

1872.

At Chester, 8st 8lbs (French), not placed for the Cup, of £1460, won by Mr. W. Nicholl's br. c. Inveresk by Lambton, three years, 5st 9lbs (Griffiths), beating Mr. Brayley's b. h. Soucar (winner of the Chesterfield Cup at Goodwood in 1870), by Dollar, five years, 7st (Mordan), after a severe and most exciting race, by half a neck, Lord Wilton's b. c. Napolitain (winner, this year, of the Chesterfield Cup at Goodwood), by Hospodar (son of Hetman Platoff), three years, 5st 7lbs, third, and ten others. S. mg., 8st 12lbs (French), won the Cheshire Stakes (Handicap), of £325, beating Mr. Johnstone's (i. e. Mr. Jardine's) b. c. Columbus by Adventurer, four years, 7st 3lbs (Gray), Mr. Laurie's b. f. Pompadour (who when running in the Cambridgeshire in 1875, broke her thigh, and was destroyed on the spot), by Cape Flyaway, three years, 6st 2lbs (Chaloner), third, and Mr. W. J. Legh's b. c. Silverdale, by Colsterdale (son of Lanercost), three years, 5st 12lbs, last; even on Hawthornden. Silverdale made the running, followed by Pompadour and Columbus, to the five furlong post, where Hawthornden, who till then had been lying off, joined them. Entering the straight, Hawthornden took the lead, winning easily by two lengths. S. mg., 9st 2lbs (French), ran second for the Stewards' Cup, won by Mr. Douglas' br. f. Day Dream by Crown Prince, three years, 7st 9lbs (Glover); three ran. This was Hawthornden's last race.
