The Board members heard the report, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, same was authorized received and made a part of the minutes.

#### D. President's Report.

President Donovan read the following statement on enrollment, student and faculty morale, and Field Office of the United States Geological Survey:

#### Enrollment

"It is safe to say that there has never been more interest manifested in the University at any time since it was founded in 1865 than at present. This is evidenced by our enrollment which at this time (September 25) is 7745. What the enrollment of the University would have been had we been able to house all of the students who wanted to attend this institution this fall, I am unable to tell. Several hundred girls who expected to come here for their college work applied for admission to other universities simply because we did not have sufficient dormitories to take care of them. A number of parents whose daughters had applied for admission, and had been accepted, refused to permit them to live in rooms occupied by three or four students when they discovered our crowded conditions.

"The enrollment of women in the University has not increased since the close of the war because there has been no additional dormitory space available for them. The ratio of men to women before the Second World War was approximately two to one. Last year the ratio was four to one. While many men who wished to attend the University were unable to find living quarters, the men on the whole did not fare as badly as the women because boys will live under conditions which are regarded as unsatisfactory for young women. Also, many GI's were denied admission to the University because they could not find homes for their newly established families. Just what the enrollment of the University might have been this year is difficult to say. However, I am satisfied that it would have been between 8,500 and 9,000, and might have reached 10,000, if the University had additional residence halls for both men and women.

"Last year 9,991 different students enrolled in the University for one or more quarters. The total number graduated was 1,306. The University has about reached its maximum growth until we can secure new dormitories to accommodate other young Kentuckians who desire to study at their state university. The Board of Trustees should consider seriously the possibility of erecting new dormitories at an early date."

#### Morale

"A distinguished member of our faculty who has been connected with the University since before the First World War stated to some of his friends a few days ago that he had never known the morale of both faculty and students to be better than at the present time. My own observations lead me to believe that the faculty and staff of the University on the whole are happy in their work and, therefore, are doing good work because of this state of mind.

"One of our pioneer educators coined the phrase,
"As is the teacher, so is the school.' While this truism
was an evaluation of a one-room school, it is likewise
true of a university. As are the teachers, so is the
university.

"To secure and retain good teachers of the quality needed for the important task of educating Kentucky's sons and daughters is a very great responsibility on those who are asked to select the personnel of our institution. Great care is being taken today to up-grade the faculty of the University when new appointments are made. The salary increases this past year have done much to improve the morale of our teaching and research staff. While the increases in salary were relatively large for Kentucky, the salaries now being paid are not comparable to the upper fifty per cent of the state universities of this country. The state of Kentucky will not wish to have mediocre teachers in the classroom. The difference between the cost of a mediocre teaching staff and a superior teaching staff is relatively small, but the difference in the return on the investment involved is tre-The most expensive teacher the public can employ is a cheap teacher. Unless superior teachers are provided, the best results in education will not be se-A good plant and equipment, beautiful grounds, adequate laboratories, and a great library are of little value unless there is good teaching going on in the classroom.

"The University of Kentucky has on its staff today many great teachers. Their value to the students cannot be estimated. The trustees, the deans of the colleges, and the president of the University must be at all times deeply concerned about the welfare of these men and women who make up the faculty and research staff."

# Field Office of United States Geological Survey Located on Campus of the University

"Last summer Mr. Paul Averitt, who is a member of the United States Geological Survey, called to see me and stated that the Survey was considering the location of a Field Office in this part of the United States, primarily for the purpose of studying coal reserves. He wanted to know if the University of Kentucky would be interested in having this office located on the campus. He indicated that there would probably be at least ten people working out of the Regional Office when it was fully staffed.

"An invitation was immediately issued by the Kentucky Geological Survey to the Field Section of the United States Geological Survey to locate its Field Office here. The invitation has been accepted and the office has been opened in the Administration Building of the University. The United States Geological Survey expents to inaugurate a long-term investigation of mineral fuels in this state.

"The program is being started in Leslie County where the work will be directed primarily to determining the availability, character, and reserves of coal in that county, which are important but relatively undeveloped. It will be a detailed study of surface and underground geology of the county directed toward other possible resources as well. It will take about two years. Later the work will be extended into other counties of the coal belt.

"Working from this office, the Federal Survey is also studying the region bordering Pine Mountain for information pertinent to oil and gas development in Kentucky and adjacent parts of Virginia.

"Mr. Ralph Wilpolt, a geologist of the U. S. Geological Survey with extensive experience in Virginia, Arkansas, New Mexico, and Mexico, will be in charge of the field office. The staff at the start will include three other geologists with a number of assistants. It will be some months before the program will get in full swing due to lack of geologic personnel.

"This week Mr. Watson Monroe, who is in charge of all work on mineral fuels in the United States east of the Rocky Mountains, came with Mr. Wilpolt for a conference with Dr. Arthur C. McFarlan, head of the Kentucky Geological Survey, and me relative to the program that the United States Geological Survey has planned for Kentucky. In our comference Mr. Monroe stated that one reason why Kentucky was selected was because the Kentucky Geological Survey had been located at the University of Kentucky and was being administered by Dr. Arthur C. McFarlan, Head of the Department of Geology of the University."

The Board members heard the President's Report, and after brief discussion, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the information was received and ordered made a part of the minutes.

# E. Method of Computing Salaries for Change-of-Work Policy.

President Donovan related that salaries of staff members who were given change of work have been computed on the basis of the nearest half year of service at the University. He raised the question of whether or not the salaries on change of work status should be computed on a basis of whole years, or nearest half year, or actual fractional part of a year. The Board members discussed the question of paying for the whole year plus one or two months' services beyond the whole year, or computing the salaries to the nearest half year.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the salaries of staff members who are eligible for change-of-work status and are granted change of occupation, shall be computed to the nearest half year.

# F. Budget Changes.

President Donovan read a list of budget changes which he recommended approved. He stated the total decreases recommended amounted to \$5,020.00 and the total of increases amounted to \$16,801.84, or a net budget increase of \$11,781.84. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in, and the Comptroller was directed to make the necessary budget adjustments.

# G. Report of Sale of Auditorium-Fieldhouse Revenue Bonds.

President Donovan read the following letter from the Comptroller, outlining in detail information concerning the issuance, sale and delivery of Auditorium-Fieldhouse 2-3/4% revenue bonds. The President recommended that the letter be placed in the minutes, for the record.

September 1, 1948

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear Doctor Donovan:

I have completed the transactions in regard to the issuance, sale and delivery of eight hundred one thousand dollar University of Kentucky Auditorium Fieldhouse 2-3/4% Revenue Bonds by the following:

- 1. Delivery of eight hundred \$1,000.00 bonds to the Citizens Fidelity Bank, Louisville, Kentucky for delivery to the purchaser upon receipt of payment of the principal sum plus accrued interest from August 1st.
- 2. Delivery of certified copy of the Minutes of the Board of Trustees of August 9th to the bond attorneys.
- 3. Obtained signatures of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and of the Secretary of the Board to an Execution, Signature and No-Litigation Certificate required by the bond attorneys.
- 4. Executed Treasurer's Receipt and placed same with the bonds in escrow with the Citizens Fidelity Bank to be dated and delivered upon receipt of payment for bonds.
- 5. Delivered twenty-five bonds (\$1,000.00 each) numbered consecutively from 801 to 825 inclusive to the Union Bank and Trust Company, Lexington for safe custody, subject to the orders of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. They are not signed by either the Chairman or the Secretary of the Board, and all coupons are attached. A signed receipt from the Union Bank and Trust Company, by the president of the bank and attested by the secretary is in the files of this office.

# H. Bids on Sprinkler System Accepted, and Work Authorized.

The Comptroller reported that, pursuant to direction of the Board of Trustees, proposals for the installation of a sprinkler system in the Combined Shops Building, located on the Experiment Station farm, Rose Street, had been received, opened and tabulated. He reported receipt of proposals from the following firms:

Globe Automatic Sprinkler Company, 1340 Union Trust Building, Cincinnati 2, Ohio. Base Bid, \$49,742.00. Number of Sprinkler Heads - 1005.

Crowder Brothers, 2212 Cole Street, St. Louis 6, Missouri. Base Bid, \$54,440.00. Number of Sprinkler Heads - 1005.

Central Automatic Sprinkler Company, Fourth Street & Cannon Avenue, Lansdale, Pennsylvania.

Base Bid, \$47,489.00.

Number of Sprinkler Heads - 1005.

Rockwood Sprinkler Company, 38 Harlow Street, Worcester, Mass. Base Bid, \$45,134.00.
Number of Sprinkler Heads - 989.

The Comptruller analyzed the problem as follows:

- (1) The Board may reject all bids and try to continue the operation of the Combined Shops building without a sprinkler system. To do so, the insurance rate would remain at \$7.56 per hundred. It would cost a premium of \$30,240.00 per year on a value of \$400,000.00 on building and contents.
- (2) The Board may accept the bid for sprinkler system in the Combined Shops building without a water storage tank at a cost of \$25,004.75. The insurance rate would be reduced from \$7.56 per hundred to \$2.50 per hundred. The total annual premium on a valuation of \$400,000.00 on building and contents would be reduced to \$10,000.00
- (3) The Board may accept the bid for sprinkler system in the Combined Shops building with 75,000 gallon water storage tank at a cost of \$45,317.75. The insurance rate per hundred dollar value would be \$1.25 per hundred. The total annual premium on a valuation of \$400,000.00 on building and contents would be reduced to \$5,000.00.
- (4) The Board may accept bid to install sprinkler system in the Combined Shops building, the Storage building adjacent to the Shops building, and the Boiler building, housing the heating plant for the Combined Shops building, and erect a 75,000 gallon water storage tank, at a cost of approximately \$60,000.00. The insurance rate per \$100 value would be reduced to .75 per hundred and the total cost of insurance per year would be reduced to \$3,000 on \$400,000 value on building and contents.

It was also reported that there would be a further saving in insurance premium through a reduction of the rate on the Storage building and on the boiler house if sprinkler systems were installed in these buildings.

A further saving in insurance would result on the Animal Pathology building, the Meat Laboratory, the Agricultural Engineering building, the Hospital Barn and the Cattle Barn, if the 75,000 gallon water storage tank was installed to give greater water pressure for the purpose of fighting fires in that vicinity.

The Comptroller further reported that this group of buildings had all the fire protection normally given to buildings inside the city limits, and that, because these buildings and some other buildings were outside the city limits, the Kentucky Actuarial Bureau had advised a county rate. If the territory concerned were annexed to the city, some of these buildings would take a third class city insurance rate instead of, as now, an eighth class county insurance rate.

The Board heard the report, and after some discussion, a motion was made, seconded and carried, to accept the bid of Rockwood Sprinkler Company, 38 Harlow Street, Worcester, Mass., in the amount of \$45,317.75, which includes sprinkler system for the Combined Shops building and the 75,000 gallon water storage tank.

They also authorized the installation of sprinkler system in the Storage building and Boiler house.

The sum of \$60,000 was approved and appropriated from the unappropriated aurplus of the general University budget for this work.

# I. Modified Plans for Stadium Addition Examined and Proposals Authorized.

Dean Terrell, of the College of Engineering, was invited to meet with the Board, and was asked to explain to the Board modified plans for an addition to the Stadium. Dean Terrell explained that the modified plan eliminates a steel upper deck on the south side of the football stadium and provides for an additional 31 rows across the five sections on the south side. The modified plan would also make possible the erection of 222 box seats.

He stated that if the stadium were further expanded, seating capacity would accommodate approximately 40,000 persons.

A general discussion of the proposal followed, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was authorized to request proposals for the work in accordance with plans and specifications, the bids to be taken on October 22 and reported to the Board at its next meeting.

# J. Governor Clements Vacates Chair. Mrs. Blazer Requested to Assume the Chair.

Governor Clements explained to the members of the Board that he had a prior commitment that necessitated his leaving the meeting at that time. He requested Mrs. Blazer to act as Chairman, in the absence of Judge Stoll, Vice Chairman. Mrs. Blazer assumed the chair.

# K. Bill of Jerrico, Inc., Authorized.

It was explained to the Board that Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Morell, owners of property located at 400 Rose Street, had leased their property to Jerrico, Inc., and it was the intention of Jerrico, Inc., to erect a small building and to establish a business which was deemed undesirable so close to the campus of the University. The University negotiated with the owner of Jerrico, Inc., and Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Morell, owners of the property, and secured an agreement whereby Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Morell would lease the property to the University for a period of five years, with an option to purchase or re-lease the property. It was further explained that Jerrico, Inc., exercised their option and did cancel the lease with Mr. and Mrs. Morell.

Jerrico, Inc., prior to cancellation of the lease with Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Morell on premises known as 400 Rose Street, Lexington, Ky. incurred expenses in the nature of rentals, recording and attorney fees, and miscellaneous expenses aggregating \$590.50. President Donovan recommended that Jerrico, Inc., be reimbursed from the College Collection Fund, for this out-of-pocket expense.

The Board expressed approval of the action of the President and Comptroller in entering into the above agreement, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, authorized the Comptroller to pay Jerrico, Inc., \$590.50 out of College Collection Fund.

# L. Report on Truck Accident.

The Comptroller road the following letter reporting an accident on Highway 25 near Williamstown, Ky.

August 28, 1948

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear Dr. Donovan:

On April 26, 1948, our truck No. 110, 1946 Dodge panel, made a trip to Cincinnati, Ohio, for the metallurgy department of the College of Engineering, to pick up a special type of sand and other material used in metallurgical research.

On the return trip, at about 5:30 p.m., eleven miles north of Williamstown, our truck had a tire blow-out. The truck driver, Mr. Willie Smith, parked on the right side of the road in order to make necessary repair. While the University truck was so parked, a 1946 G.M.C. truck, driven by Mr. Earl Newall Terry for the Central Gas Company of Stanford, had a collision with a 1940 Ford sedan driven by Mr. Henry Ray, R.F.D. #1, Blanchester, Ohio. The force of this accident rammed the Ford into the rear of the University truck, causing the following damage: rear door crushed, rear bumper torn off, left rear fender smashed, and right front fender smashed. Our truck was repaired at the L. R. Cooke Chevrolet Company at a total cost of \$346.55.

Mr. Torry, driver of the Central Gas Company truck, stated at the time that he did not have good brakes on the G.M.C. truck. A report has been filed with the state Department of Revenue in accordance with state laws. Carpenter-Warren Insurance Agency, Lexington, Ky., insurer of the University fleet, has been properly notified. The Central Gas Company has been requested to pay the repair bill on the University truck, but to date, we have not been able to collect the account.

Mr. Willie Smith, an employee of the University and driver of the truck has been summoned to appear in the Grant Circuit Court in a suit brought by Henry Ray against the University of Kentucky. If you have not already been served with a summons, I believe you will be upon your return to the office. I think the evidence will show that the University truck was correctly and legally parked off the side of the highway. That you may get a better idea of the situation, I am attaching hereto our office copy of "Motor Vehicle Accident Report" which shows the diagram describing the accident. I am not yet advised as to whether this summons should be turned over to the Attorney General or to Carpenter-Warren. In the meanwhile, however, I am notifying Carpenter-Warren of the suit and will avait your advice as to whether to pass it on to the Attorney General.

# M. Agricultural Experiment Station Regional Project Budget Approved.

President Donovan submitted budget for the Agricultural Experimen Station for Hope-Flannagan Regional Research Projects. It was explained that, at the time the budget of the University was approved, action on the federal budget had not been consummated, and that funds for the Regional Research Projects had since been made available. The budget was read, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved, and the figures contained therein authorized as a maximum appropriation for the fiscal year 1948-49.

# N. Budget for Northern Kentucky Center Approved.

President Donovan submitted budget for the Northern Kentucky Center, which indicated income in the amount of \$5,320.00 and expenditures in the amount of \$5,310.00. He recommended approval of the budget.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the President's recommendation was concurred in.

# O. Contract for Sale of Timber on Robinson Sub-Station Author-1zed.

President Donovan submitted proposed contract for the sale of marked standing timber on the Robinson Sub-Station on the right hand branch of upper Beaver Dam Creek of Troublesome Creek, otherwise known as Compartment 2 of the Laurel block of the Robinson Forest of the County of Perry. He read the proposed contract and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved, and the Director of the Experiment Station was authorized to execute same on behalf of the University.

# P. Agreement with Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools for Testing Program Approved.

PresidentDonovan submitted a proposed agreement between the University of Kentucky and the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. He stated that the proposal had been approved by Professor Murray of the College of Law as to form, and had been approved by the Executive Committee of the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and authorized executed by the officials of that Association.

He stated that this agreement would permit the University, under the direction of the Director of Personnel, to take on cooperative counseling and testing service.

The Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools agrees to reimburse the University in the amount of \$4,500.00, or as much of this amount as may be needed for the program during the period of the contract. The contract is for a period of ten months.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the agreement was authorized approved and the President was directed to execute the contract on behalf of the University.

# Q. Scholarships Authorized.

President Donovan submitted recommendation of the Committee on Foreign Students for free-tuition scholarship for Mr. Y. C. Ting for the school year, 1948-49.

President Donovan presented a request of the Radio Station for grants-in-aid to 16 students who may be selected because of particular talent for assistance in the radio studios.

He also submitted a request of the Music Department for grants-in-aid to 20 students who may be selected because of talent for assisting in musical programs of the Department.

A fourth request was submitted by the Athletic Department for grants-in-aid to 120 students who may be selected for participation in football and basketball during the school year 1948-49.

The President recommended that the requests be granted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the President's recommendation was concurred in, and the scholarships were authorized.

# R. Injury to Dan Welch.

The Comptroller submitted a report on an injury to Mr. Dan Welch.

September 21, 1948

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear Dr. Donovan:

On August 30, 1947, at 9:00 a.m., Mr. Dan Welch, a painter, was working while standing on a ladder in the Stock Pavilion. The ladder slipped on the concrete floor, throwing Mr. Welch to the concrete. A fellow worker immediately took Mr. Welch to the dispensary, where he was examined by Dr. McChord. About a week

later, Mr. Welch was re-examined and an X-ray was made. The X-ray showed Mr. Welch had suffered a fracture of the sacrum, and Dr. McChord referred Mr. Welch to Dr. Ernest E. Myers, orthopedic consultant, for treatment. The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, at the October 21st meeting, approved payment of bill of Dr. Myers for ten dollars for the treatment of Mr. Welch.

Mr. Welch has continued to be troubled by the injury, but has worked. About August 1, 1948, he reported again to Dr. McChord, and was again referred to Dr. Myers. Dr. Myers advised Mr. Welch to stay home from August 9th through the 14th for observation. After to period, Dr. Myers found a small sliver of bone on the coccyx was causing the irritation of the flesh near the tip of the spine. Mr. Welch was again instructed to stay home for about ten days, which he did, returning to work on August 50th. On September 13th, Mr. Welch reported to Dr. Hyers for examination, as instructed, and was informed that the injury had improved slightly, but that an operation would be necessary for permanent re-According to Dr. Myers' report, a copy of which is atvached, he prescribed continuation of hot baths, coccyx manipulation and consideration of removal of coccyx if relief was not had by the patient. advised Mr. Welch to continue working, if possible, and to return for examination should extreme pain occur.

I attach Dr. Myers' statement for services from August 5, 1948 through the 25th, in the amount of \$25.00 and recommend that the bill be submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval for payment.

# S. Injury to Prince Del Rio.

The Comptroller submitted report on an injury to Prince Del Rio, groundsman.

September 20, 1948

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear Dr. Donovan:

While working in the Botanical Gardens, on August 25, 1948, at about 9:00 a.m., Prince Del Rio, groundsman, slipped while removing a tree. The left side of his face and neck struck a rock which was protruding from the ground. He went at once to the dispensary, but found no one on duty to treat the injury. Because the wound was bleeding profusely, Mr. Farris directed Mr. Del Rio to go to Dr. Harry G. Herring at 200 North Upper Street for emergency treatment. Dr. Herring examined the wound and advised the patient to go home and apply ice packs to the injured neck and head intermittently.

The cut seems to be healing satisfactorily. I attach Dr. Herring's bill for \$3.00, and recommend that it be submitted to the Board of Trustees for approval for payment.

## T. Salary Increases for Agricultural Extension Workers Author-12ed.

President Donovan submitted request of Dean Cooper to increase salaries of a list of County Agricultural and Home Demonstration Agents, effective October 1, 1948. He reported that Dean Cooper stated that the increases were in agreement with the intent of Congress and within funds available from the Federal Government. The list included 164 County Agricultural Agents and Assistant Forestry Agents. He stated that seven of the agents were not listed for an increase in salary, because three were promoted in September to higher positions, with increase in salary, three were appointed since July 1, and the other one had been seriously ill for some weeks and was on sick leave. The total increase proposed for the men agents

amounts to \$58,914.00 annually and represents an average increase peagent of \$247.00 per year.

There were 101 Demonstration Agents listed, with a total increase of \$25,250.00 annually, or an average annual increase per agent of \$25,000

President Donovan recommended that the request be granted, and the increases authorized.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the sum of \$48,123.00 was authorized appropriated from the additional appropriation made by Congress for increases in salary for county and home demonstration agents and other cooperative extension workers, and th increases requested were authorized and approved.

# U. Outside Work for Dean Stahr, Professor Oberst and Professor Natthews Authorized.

President Donovan stated that he was in receipt of a request from Professor Paul Oberst, Professor W. L. Hatthews, Jr., and Dean Elvis J. Stahr, Jr., to be permitted to do professional work of an expert character for the Department of Revenue of Kentucky. Dean Stahr stated that the work was of such a character that it was not readily obtainable elsewhere, and that the performance of the outside work of an expert character would not in any way interfere with the regular work of any of the professors involved. President Donovan recommended that the request be granted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the Fresident was concurred in.

# V. Gifts

From Mrs. W. D. Funkhouser.

President Donovan stated that he had been notified by Mr. Rober 5. Davis, Vice President and Trust Officer, First National Bank and Trust Company, executor of Dr. M. D. Funkhouser's estate, that Mrs. Funkhouser wished to present to the University Doctor Funkhouser's Membracidae Collection. Mrs. Funkhouser requested that the Collection be carefully preserved with an appropriate marker evidencing the gift in memory of Doctor Funkhouser.

President Donovan stated that this was a very fine collection and that the University was very fortunate to receive the offer of the gift from Mrs. Funkhouser. Various members of the Board expressed personal gratification, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, the gift of the Hembracidae Collection of the late Dr. W. D. Funkhouser was gratefully received. President Donovan was directed to convey the appreciation of the Board of Trustees and the University of Kentucky to Hrs. W. D. Funkhouser and Mr. Robert 5. Davis.

From Murphy Chair Company, Owensboro, Ky.

President Donovan reported a gift from the Murphy Chair Company Owensboro, Ky., of an electric football scoreboard. He stated that, in his opinion, this was one of the nicest gifts that has come to the University of Kentucky in a long time, and recommended that it be accepted by the Board. On motion duly made, seconded and carried the gift of an electric football score board was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the donor.

From Sears-Roebuck Foundation.

President Donovan read the following communication from Dean Cooper:

September 1, 1948

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

I am pleased to inform you that we received from the Sears-Roebuck Foundation, a check for \$2200.00 for boys' scholarships for the year 1948-49. Check was transmitted to Mr. Peterson on August 19. This represents a contribution in continuance of their policy for the past few years in furnishing funds for scholarships to freshman students and one sophomore. It has been particularly helpful, both to the students and the College.

President Donovan read the following communication from Dean Cooper:

In line with its scholarship plan for the past few years, the Kroger Company has contributed \$800 to the College of Agriculture and Home Economics for 4 scholarships, \$200 each. This scholarship grant is most helpful to the College in providing financial assistance to worth while students, who otherwise might not find it possible to attend the University.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$300.00 was ordered accepted, and President Donovan was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the donor.

From Kentucky State Highway Department.

President Donovan reported that the Kentucky State Highway Department had granted 18 student engineering employees! scholarships valued at \$500.00 each. He stated that the plan proposed that the 18 scholarships be offered to applicants selected upon a competitive basis. The tests will be conducted by the Personnel Department of the University, and the awards made upon recommendations to the Scholarship Committee of the University. The plan is being advanced for the purpose of encouraging young engineers to become interested in becoming engineers for the State Highway Department.

President Donovan recommended that the 18 Student Employees Scholarships be accepted by the University. A motion was made, seconded and carried concurring in the recommendation of the President, and he was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the Commissioner of Highways on behalf of the Board of Trustees and the University for this very fine gift in the form of scholarships.

# From Miss Annie Dillard.

President Donovan submitted a contract between Miss Annie Dillard of Lexington, Ky., and the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. He stated that this contract provides that Miss Dillard is to convey the property known as 270 South Limestone to the University, for which the University agrees to pay the sum of \$300 per month during the remainder of Miss Dillard's life. Miss Dillard is to retain possession of the entire lower floor of the building during her lifetime, and is entitled to have her part of the building heated and water furnished at the expense of the University. The upper part of the house, which consists of seven rooms and five baths

is to be leased by the University to tenants selected by the University, the University to receive the income from the rooms and apartment.

President Donovan explained that Miss Dillard is now 77 years of age. The life expectancy is figured as from 4.48 to 6.27 years. The house is located on a lot with a frontage of 75 feet and a depth of 175 feet. There is a brick garage in the rear. On today's market, the property would sell at approximately \$35,000.00.

The contract was read and, after some discussion, notion was made, seconded and carried approving the contract, and President Donovan was authorized to execute same on behalf of the University.

Library of Mr. Fisher Hughes and Mr. Joe Hughes.

President Donovan stated that he had been advised through Dr. Jane Haselden, Assistant Dean of Women, of the gift from Mr. Fisher Hughes and Mr. Joe Hughes of their library of old books. He stated that the library consisted of an interesting collection of Kentuckiana and other books, mostly older than 100 years. He stated that this would be a very nice addition to the University of Kentucky Library, and recommended that the gift be accepted.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of Mr. Fisher Hughes and Mr. Joe Hughes of their library of old books was authorized accepted, and President Donovan was requested to write a letter to the donors expressing appreciation of the gift.

W. Rules and Regulations Governing Non-Official Broadcasts from the University of Kentucky Campus Amended.

President Donovan recommended that Paragraph 9 of Rules and Regulations Governing Non-Official Broadcasts from the University of Kentucky Campus be amended by adding to Paragraph 9 the following:

"However, if the authorities of another institution with which the University of Kentucky is competing allot one or more outlets for Kentucky broadcasts and refuse to assign these outlets without a recommendation from the University of Kentucky, such a recommendation may be made. In any such case the object will be the widest possible coverage of the State of Kentucky."

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in, and Paragraph 9 of Rules and Regulations Governing Non-Official Broadcasts from the University of Kentucky Campus was amended to read as follows:

"The University of Kentucky will assume no obligation to procure broadcasting privileges for games played away from home by its teams. Sponsors and stations are hereby advised that they must make their own arrangements. The University of Kentucky has no jurisdiction over stations making such broadcasts and receives no income from them.

"However, if the authorities of another institution with which the University of Kentucky is competing allot one or more outlets for Kentucky broadcasts and refuse to assign these outlets without a recommendation from the University of Kentucky, such a recommendation may be made. In any such case, the object will be the widest possible coverage of the State of Kentucky."

# X. Addition to Steam Distribution System Recommended.

The Comptroller roported that, pursuant to direction of the Board of Trustees, proposals for the construction of additions to the steam distribution system between the old steam pit east of the Administration building and the Fine Arts building had been received, opened and tabulated. It was explained that the bids were requested for the installation of the steam line in pre-fabricated conduit or in tile conduit. It was reported that the firm of Proctor-Ingels, Engineers, who designed the addition to the steam distribution system, stated that, in their opinion, there is no difference in the quality of the installation between pre-fabricated conduit and tile conduit, and that at this time there may be a decided advantage in the use of pre-fabricated conduit, in that piping is more easily obtained.

The Comptroller stated that the low bid was for the installation of the steam mains in pre-fabricated conduit. The low bid was submitted by George Pridemore and Son, Lexington, Ky. It was recalled that the cost of installation of the steam main will be paid from appropriation at the disposal of the Kentucky Building Commission.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Comptroller was directed to recommend to the Kentucky Building Commission the acceptance of the bid of George Pridemore and Son on the installation of the steam mains in pre-fabricated conduit.
