Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, April 1, 1947.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office at 10:00 a.m., Tuesday, April 1, 1947. The following members were present: Governor S. S. Willis, Judge Richard C. Stoll, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer, Thomas Cutler, H. D. Palmore, J. C. Everett, Robert C. Tway, Eldred E. Adams, Harper Gatton, and R. P. Hobson. President H. L. Donovan and Comptroller Frank D. Peterson, Secretary of the Board, were also present.

A. Approval of Minutes.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Board of Trustees of March 11, 1947, were approved as published.

B. Comptroller's Report.

Mr. Peterson made the usual monthly financial report and read the following summarized statement.

General income of the College Division amounting to \$577,327.50 has been allocated to the Plant Fund.

The total general income realized during the first eight months of the fiscal year 1945-46 amounted to \$3,093,370.93. The current year realization exceeded that for the corresponding period of the preceding year by 41.25.

The charges against departmental appropriations during the first eight months of the fiscal year 1945-46 were \$2,145,069.51. The current year charges during the same month exceeded the prior year figure by 34.4%.

Unencumbered state revolving fund balances on February 28, 1947 amounted to \$912,822.93, consisting of balances to the credit of the Division of Colleges of \$275,712.48, and balances to the credit of the Agricultural Experiment Station of \$537,110.45.

Plant Fund expenditures during the period covered by the report amounted to \$244,325.91.

Members of the Board heard the report, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the action of Judge Stoll in signing the contracts on behalf of the University with the above-named architects was approved and ratified.

D. Contract for Work on Auditorium-Fieldhouse Signed.

Judge Stoll reported that contracts with Grayson Jones for excavation and foundation work and with the Midland Structural Steel Corporation were ready to be executed on behalf of the University and asked direction.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees was directed to sign the contracts with Grayson Jones for excavation and foundation work, and with the Midland Structural Steel Corporation for structural steel work, and the Secretary was directed to attest the signature.

E. Budget Increases.

President Donovan submitted a list of budget increases.

The President recommended that the list of increases be approved, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the increases recommended were authorized, and the Comptroller was directed to make the necessary transfers.

F. New Boys' Residence Hall Named.

President Donovan read the following statement concerning John Bryan Bowman:

JOHN BRYAN BOWMAN Regent, Kentucky University 1865-1878

John Bryan Bowman was born in the Cane Run section of Mercer county October 16, 1824, the son of John and Mary Mitchum Bowman. He attended the country school for two years and then the Cane Run Academy. He entered Bacon College at the age of 12 and received the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1842. He studied law; was admitted to the bar but never practiced.

On February 16, 1846, he married Mary Dorcas Williams, the sister of the first president of the University. For the next ten years he lived the life of a country gentleman, overseeing his farm, the "Old Forest."

In 1855, at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bacon College, while considering a plan for securing funds to reopen the institution he said, "Brethren, you have failed to build up a College; now, then, let us establish a great University." Beginning in 1856, "in one hundred and fifty days he obtained one hundred and fifty thousand dollars." He secured a new charter under the name of Kentucky University to be located in Harrodsburg, and the college was reopened in 1859.

In 1864, the buildings burned, and then he immediately undertook the plan of combining the funds of Kentucky University with those of Transylvania to establish an institution under the name of Kentucky University' to be located in Lexington. He learned that the limit of time fixed by Congress for the state to accept the provisions of the Morrill Act or prove a forfeiture, was rapidly expiring. Hence, on condition that he raise the necessary \$100,000 to purchase the experimental farm and a site for all necessary buildings, the Legislature on February 22, 1865, approved the merger making the Agricultural and Mechanical College one of the six proposed colleges. This he accomplished before the Legislature adjourned. Quoting from William Benjamin Smith in his unpublished biography of President James Kennedy Patterson, page 92, "he secured subscriptions from citizens, and to meet the payments falling due before subscriptions were collected he drew on his own private resources."

John Bryan Bowman served as regent of Kentucky University from 1865 until 1878 when the connection between the A & M College and Kentucky University was severed. Again quoting from Smith, "In fact, the day had not dawned for an undenominational University of Kentucky; Bowman had anticipated by a full generation the natural process of enlightenment and culture, and he who anticipates is lost."

In 1855 he had dedicated his life and his fortune to the building of a great university. His final program included a plan for six colleges, including the Agricultural and Mechanical College, which completed his program of an institution dedicated to the education of the masses, to include training in every phase of human endeavor and placed within the reach of every individual. His vision of a university, which has hardly been surpassed even in this day, was destroyed by petty sectarian jealousies.

Although he died broken-hearted, believing that he had failed in the program to which he had given gratuitous-ly the best of his life, yet he preserved for Kentucky a land grant college, and, in addition, left us a rich heritage in the example he set of a lifetime of unselfish service.

President Donovan recommended that the new Residence Hall for Men be named the John Bryan Bowman Hall, in memory of Mr. Bowman who contributed so much to the building of the University.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of President Donovan was concurred in.

G. Report of Settlement for Insurance on the Art Center Building

President Donovan read the following letter reporting on collection of the insurance on the Art Center, destroyed by fire.

March 31, 1947

Dr. H. L. Donovan, President University of Kentucky

My dear President Donovan:

At the time the Art Center Building was destroyed by fire, February 10, 1947, the University was carrying insurance on the building in the amount of \$28,000, and on the contents in the amount of \$15,000.00. We have submitted the report and proof of loss to the State Fire and Tornado Insurance Fund, and all reports and conferences have been furnished to the adjuster. We are now advised that our claims in the amount of \$43,000.00 have been approved and the funds allocated to the University of Kentucky for replacement.

The President recommended that the settlement be accepted, and that the funds be appropriated towards building of the Fine Arts Building, soon to be placed under contract.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the sum of \$43,000.00, received in settlement of the claim of the University of Kentucky for loss of the Art Center, destroyed by fire, was ordered allocated to a fund for the construction of the Fine Arts Building.

H. Appropriation for New Wing to Animal Pathology Building, and for Re-building the Animal Hospital Barn.

President Donovan read a request from Dean Cooper for appropriations and allocation of funds for construction work on the Animal Pathology Building and Animal Hospital Barn.

March 13, 1947

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

According to recent newspaper statements, the Civilian Production Administration has approved our application for the construction of the new wing to the present Animal Pathology building and for the moving and reconstruction of the Animal Hospital. In anticipation of the official notice of this approval, I wish to recommend that the necessary funds be set up for the new Animal Pathology wing and for the Animal Hospital.

In the application submitted to the CPA, the estimated cost of the new wing was placed at \$100,000. The Board of Trustees in September, 1943, gave authorization for setting aside \$65,000 for the construction of a new wing to the Animal Pathology building. However, approximately \$10,000 of the amount thus set aside was expended for reconditioning and completing the present wing of the Animal Pathology building after its release by the Army, so that now only \$55,000 remains in that fund (Account 5015). I recommend, therefore, that \$45,000 be transferred from Account 5010a (Feed) to Account 5015, to bring the total to \$100,000 for the construction of the Animal Pathology wing.

It was estimated that the new material and construction with this new material required for the Animal Hospital would be \$10,000. The cost of removing and rebuilding with old material has been estimated at \$35,000. Accordingly, I recommend the transfer of \$30,000 from Account 5010b (Fertilizer) and \$15,000 from 5010d (Farm), and that the total, \$45,000, be set up in a separate account for the Animal Hospital.

President Donovan recommended that the request be granted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the sum of \$45.000 was ordered appropriated from Account No. 5010a (Feed) to supplement an existing appropriation of \$55,000 to construct a new wing to the Animal Pathology Building, and the sum of \$30,000 from Account 5010b (Fertilizer) and the sum of \$15,000 from Account 5010d (Farm) were appropriated for rebuilding the Animal Hospital.

I. Plans and Specifications for New Wing to Animal Pathology Building Authorized.

President Donovan read a letter from Dean Cooper requesting approval of securing plans and specifications for a new wing to the Animal Pathology Building.

March 29, 1947

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

The Board of Trustees on February 25, 1947, authorized the preparation by the architects of specifications and plans for the hospital barn for animal pathology. This request should also have been accompanied by one for approval of new specifications and plans for the wing to the animal pathology building. Certain changes were necessary to provide for chemical laboratories not previously contemplated. However, as we look forward to the developments which are occurring, such changes seem essential. Other minor laboratory changes have been included, as recommended by the head and staff of the Department of Animal Pathology. I thought it well that the necessity for new specifications and plans should be called to your attention for approval. The changes are all embodied in the plans to be placed before you.

President Donovan recommended that the request be granted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, it was directed that plans and specifications for the new wing to the Animal Pathology Building be secured, and approval was given to make such changes in the plans and specifications as seem to be to the best interest of the College.

J. Dairy Center -- Plans and Specifications Accepted.

President Donovan submitted plans and specifications for a Dairy Center and explained that the plans had been so drawn as to permit the taking of alternate bids, in the event the whole structure costs more than the funds available.

Plans and specifications were examined and discussed, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, were accepted, and the Comptroller was directed to cause bids to be taken, for the construction of the Dairy Center, on May 15, 1947, and to report to this Board results of bids submitted.

K. Fine Arts Building -- Plans and Specifications Accepted.

Messrs. Johnson and Brock, Architects Associated, were invited to meet with the Board, and submitted plans and specifications for the Fine Arts Building. The plans were examined in some detail, and were explained by the architects. A wooden model of the Fine Arts Building was available, to afford members of the Board a perspective of the Building.

After general discussion of the plans submitted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the plans and specifications were accepted and approved. The Comptroller was directed to work with the State Division of Purchases to have bids taken for the construction of the building and opened on May 29, 1947, or at such other date as might be more convenient to the Division of Purchases, but not later than May 30, 1947; the tabulation of the bids received to be submitted to this Board at its meeting in June, 1947, for action.

L. Policy Controlling Enrollment at the University of Kentucky Rescinded.

President Donovan stated that, at the meeting of the Board of Trustees on February 15, 1946, he had requested that the enrollment of non-resident students be limited to approximately 15% of the estimated enrollment for a particular quarter, and that the Board approved the policy limiting enrollment of non-resident students to approximately 15% of the estimated enrollment for a particular quarter. He explained that he was now recommending that the Board approve the repeal of that order.

He indicated that other universities throughout the country would take similar action in regard to enrollment of non-resident students in colleges and universities.

The Board heard the request and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation of the President was concurred in

M. Resurfacing Driveways at the Robinson Substation Authorized.

President Donovan read a letter from Dean Cooper concerning repairs to Robinson Substation driveways.

March 25, 1947

President H. L. Donovan University of Kentucky

Dear President Donovan:

About a year ago, I advised you that the Highway Department had looked over the roads at the Robinson Substation at Quicksand. At that time, they informed us of the cost of surfacing the driveways with a bituminous treatment. The cost seemed greater than could be justified from Sub-station funds. Mr. Catching, the district engineer, has informed me that another inspection of the driveways and roadways was made March 11, 1947, and it is the opinion that the road could be placed in fair condition through the expenditure of \$1,920 - this being for the application of crushed limestone, reshaping of roads, etc. I wish to recommend that you and the Board approve and authorize the payment of \$1,920 to the State Highway Department for surfacing and reshaping roadways and driveways within the property of the Robinson Substation at Quicksand, Kentucky and that the necessary action be taken to notify the Highway Department of the authorization of this expenditure.

President Donovan recommended that the request be approved, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the request was approved and the Comptroller directed to work out the details with the State Highway Department, and take such action as may be necessary to make the sum of \$1,920.00 available to the State Highway Department.

N. Military Leave Does Not Count Towards Earned Sabbatical Leave.

President Donovan stated that he had received a request from Dean Cooper concerning sabbatical leaves, and desired the Board to clarify the situation. He read Dean Cooper's letter.

Dear President Donovan:

Question has arisen as to whether during military leave, a staff member accrues time toward sabbatic leave. For example, if a staff member has 3½ years continuous service, then is absent on military leave for two years and returns to his duties for a year and a half, is the military leave considered a part of the seven year service and is he then entitled to apply for sabbatic leave?

O. Gifts.

President Donovan reported a grant from the General Education Board to pay expenses of work shops for school librarians, to be held during the summer of 1947, in cooperation with the State Department of Education.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the grant was accepted, and President Donovan was requested to write a letter of appreciation on behalf of the University to the General Education Board.

From Mr. Ross W. Sloniker.

President Donovan reported receipt of etchings, mezzotints, lithographs, etc., donated to the University Department of Art by Mr. Ross W. Sloniker. He reported that these works came to the University through the efforts of Mr. Edward Warder Rannells, head of the Department of Art.

Dear President Donovan:

The accompanying copies of letters acknowledge two separate gifts by Mr. Ross W. Sloniker. There are more to come.

Mr. Sloniker found me in my office one evening in November, about eight o'clock. He was carrying some portfolios under his arm; he introduced himself, asked me if I could use the prints, and left them. At the same time, he offered to lend his collection of original leaves from original Bibles. We have them on exhibition in the Art Gallery now. When he saw how we were presenting them, he seemed pleased and offered to give them to us also. And yesterday, he telephoned from Cincinnati to say that he was sending us some additional prints - etchings, aquatints, etc., by French and English artists of the nineteenth century.

All these items are of value; some of them are important; all can be used to advantage by the Department of Art in its work. I would say that it is a very happy circumstance that Mr. Sloniker should take an interest in us.

P. Resolution on Death of Dean Emeritus C. R. Melcher.

The following resolution was submitted concerning the death of Dean Emeritus C. R. Melcher, and upon motion made, seconded and carried, authorized spread upon the minutes. A copy was directed to be transmitted to his wife and daughter.

On March 23, 1947, the University of Kentucky, the City of Lexington, and a host of personal friends suffered a grievous loss in the death of Columbus Rudolph Melcher.

Dean Melcher, as he was commonly known throughout Kentucky and many other States, was born in Vevay, Indiana, the son of the late John and Susan Melcher. He was educated in Hanover College, Indiana, from which he received a Master of Arts degree in 1890 and an LL.D. in 1935. the years 1886-88 Dean Melcher attended extensive lectures in the fields of Literature and Philology in the Universities of Munich and Leipzig in Germany. After returning to the United States, he took special work in the Universities of Louisville and Chicago. After serving as Principal of Vevay High School for one year, Professor Melcher became Superintendent of Schools in Carrollton, Kentucky, a position which he held until 1895. From 1901-2 he served as Principal of Reynolds Presbyterian Academy at Albany, Texas, and the following five years he taught Ancient and Modern Languages in Hanover College. In 1907 Professor Melcher assumed a position in the Modern Languages Department in the University of Kentucky, and in 1908 he was given a full professorship. From 1914 until his retirement

in 1953 he served as Head of the Department of German. Professor Melcher served also as Dean of Men during the same years.

He was a member of the Kentucky Academic Society, Kentucky Education Association, American Association of University Professors, Modern Language Association of America, Delta Tau Delta, and Omicron Delta Kappa. He is listed in Who's Who in America. In 1925 he was president of the Conference of Deans of Men. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church, Masons, and Knights of Pythias.

Without question, few men who have served on the Faculty of this Institution have sought more sincerely to preserve close contacts with graduates of the University of Kentucky than did Dean Melcher. It was his delight to welcome back students who had been here a decade or two ago and, in most cases, to greet them by name and recall instances closely associated with their experiences in school.

In his civic and academic work, Dean Melcher was always assisted ably by a devoted and charming wife, to whom a copy of these Resolutions shall be sent.
