Present records reveal that more casualties result from automobile accidents when youth is at the wheel than when the 40 or 50 year old is in the driver's seat. Purpose of the safety driving campaign which opens on the campus tomorrow is to reverse these records.

To change the records to help make young drivers actually the best drivers, to lessen traffic accidents, the American Automobile Association is conducting safety-driving campaigns in universities and colleges throughout the nation.

The University campaign opens tomorrow with indoor examinations on road rules and driving laws, and road examinations to test student drivers for vision and reaction. Members of the psychology department will direct the driving law and road rule tests and the Kentucky State Highway Patrol will handle the road tests for vision and reaction.
