### LS/2000 STAFF TRAINING

The OPAC (online public access catalog) Training Subcommittee has placed on reserve under Olson several packets of printed guides for self instruction. Training packets are also available at the Medical Center Library from Bernie Baldini. Included in the packets are two instruction sheets (one brief and one more detailed), a list of sample searches for practicing at the terminals, and a series of commonly asked questions with answers on the LS/2000 system. All staff members are encouraged to take a short block of time to become familiar with the system (branch library staff will be trained as their systems come up). Currently, there are three OPAC terminals in the Reference Room and four in the Medical Center Library. They are available on a first come/first served basis. You may also arrange to use terminals in the King Circulation Department by contacting Gail Kennedy (7-8396). Any questions concerning searching methods and/or the instructional packets can be directed to the reference staff at the terminal sites. SOMETHING INTERESTING ABOUT...

Mark Markiw, a monographic cataloger and general whiz-kid in Russian, German, and Slavic languages, has recently published an article in Monashefte; a journal devoted to the study of German language and literature, Vol. 77(3), 1985; p. 286-291. The title of the article is "German books in American University Libraries: the effect of prices and production in acquisition." Co-authored with Peter Hess of the UK Department of Germanic Languages and Literature, the article discusses the high prices of books from German-speaking countries, and their impact on library funds and scholarly activity by German Studies Scholars. The high prices are coupled with a tripling of West German book production. Monatshefte is shelved in PNM, and its call number is 430.7.M7425.
