Professor Paul Oberst presented resolutions concerning Dean Alvin E. Evans, who died June 17, and Acting Associate Dean Steele presented resolutions concerning Dr. W. W. Dimock, who died July 24. President Donovan spoke briefly in eulogy of both men. The Faculty voted that these resolutions be included in the minutes and that copies be sent to their respective families.

On June 17, 1953, the University of Kentucky suffered the loss of an outstanding legal scholar and educator through the death of Alvin E. Evans. Dean Evans had assumed change-of-work status in 1948 after serving for more than twenty years as Professor of Law and Dean of the College of Law and had taken leave of absence to teach first at John B. Stetson University and then at St. Louis University, where he served as Professor of Law and Dean of the Law School for three years prior to his death.

He came to the University of Kentucky in 1927 and throughout his career here was an able and active leader in the affairs of this institution. As an administrator, he worked untiringly to strengthen the College of Law and to improve its faculty and library. He exerted great influence on the bar of this state through his teaching, and gained wide reputation as an authority on the law of wills through frequent publication of law review articles. He was never too busy, however, to give freely of his sound advice on legal problems to the University and to his many colleagues, who knew him as a sincere and congenial friend.

Dean Evans was a native of Nebraska and received his A. B. degree from Cotner University, his M. A. from the University of Nebraska, and his Ph.D. and J. D. degrees from the University of Michigan. He also studied at the Harvard Law School and held the



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Ezra Ripley Thayer Teaching Fellowship there in 1935-36. He began his teaching career at the State College of Washington as Professor of Latin, and entered law teaching at the University of Idaho. He was on the faculty of George Washington University before coming to Lexington, and had taught during the summers at Texas, Cincinnati, Michigan and Western Reserve. Dean Evans also practiced law in Idaho and was admitted to practice before the bars of Kentucky, Nebraska, Michigan, Idaho, the District of Columbia and the Supreme Court of the United States. He was particularly active in the efforts of the bar and the various law school associations to improve legal education, and held membership in many scholarly and professional organizations. His breadth of interest also extended to numerous civic activities in Lexington, where he was a member of the Central Christian Church.

In grateful memory of Alvin E. Evans' long and unselfish service to the University of Kentucky and its College of Law, as well as the community and state in which he lived, the University Faculty, of which he was a most valuable member, resolves that this resolution be spread upon its minutes and that copies be sent to the bereaved family.

Dr. William Wallace Dimock, Emeritus Professor of Veterinary Science, Emeritus Veterinarian, and former Head of the Department of Animal Pathology, died on July 23, 1953. He was appointed Head of the Animal Pathology Department in 1919 and served in that capacity until relieved for special duties in September, 1946, which were pursued until the change-of-work status effective March 1, 1950.

Dr. Dimock was born in the town of Tolland, Connecticut, February 20, 1880. He received his B.S. degree in Agriculture from New York State Veterinary College, Cornell University, in 1905. Following graduation, he spent four years at the National Cuba Experiment Station as an investigator of animal diseases and as veterinarian for the National Board of Health. He was granted an honorary D.V.M. degree by the University of Havana in 1908, and was further honored by an honorary professorship in that University in 1944. He returned to the United States in 1909 to serve as Professor of Pathology and Bacteriology in the School of Veterinary Medicine at Iowa State College where he remained for ten years before coming to the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Dimock had a keen interest in all phases of animal production, and he attacked problems associated with animal diseases with great industry and professional skill. He directed the development of the Department from a small service unit into one of the outstanding research organizations of its type. Under his guidance the Department attracted competent research personnel who contributed magnificently to the control of livestock diseases in Kentucky. Some of the contributions of this group received world-wide recognition.

A monument to his services will endure in the 153 publications on animal diseases of which he was author or co-author. His most widely recognized contributions were in the field of sterility of mares and diseases of equine fetuses and foals. He also made outstanding contributions on diseases of swine, paratuberculosis of cattle and parasitic diseases of domestic animals. Further evidence of his professional competency was reflected in his eight trips to England to consult with and instruct English veterinarians in techniques of which he was the recognized master.

Dr. Dimock was an ardent supporter of organized veterinary medicine and gave considerable thought and energy to the general improvement of veterinary services in the state and nation. In recognition of this service, he was elected to the presidency of the American Veterinary Medical Association for the year 1943.

Dr. Dimock's friends and associates in the University of Kentucky, his colleagues in the veterinary profession, and the livestock interests of the Commonwealth of Kentucky regret his passing and extend their sympathy to his wife and children.

Dean White presented the following recommendations from the College of Arts and Sciences concerning new courses, dropped courses, and changes in courses. These recommendations were approved by the University Faculty:

I. Courses to be Added

Botany 40. The Origin of Cultivated Plants (3)  
Archeological, Historical, and biological evidence for the place and time of origin of many plants useful to man and the relation of these plants to ancient centers of civilization. Three Lectures per week.

English 80. The Writing of Fiction (3)  
A course for those who wish to write fiction and to develop a critical appreciation of narrative writing. Analysis of models and student manuscripts. Prereq: English 1a and 1b, and consent of the instructor.

II. Courses to be dropped

Botany 30. Introduction to Heredity (3)

English 2b. The Short Story (2)

III. Changes

1. The description of Botany 130 to read: (No change in credit) Chromosomal cytology and the principles of heredity; three lectures per week. Prereq: 3 credits in the Biological Sciences.

2. Change the number of Botany 135 to Botany 235. No change in description.

3. The number of English 2a to English 60. No change in credit or course description.

4. Change Geology 53 from Lecture, 4 hours, to Lecture 2 hours and Laboratory, 2 hours.

I. Courses to be Added

Ancient Languages 83b. Hebrew Conversation and Composition.  
(1) Continuation of Ancient Languages 83a.

- Ancient Languages 84a. Isaiah. (3)  
Selections with attention to the literary, historical, and general cultural background. Prereq: 82b or consent of instructor.
- Ancient Languages 84b. The Psalms. (3)  
Selections with attention to poetic form and to historical and general cultural background. Prereq: 84a or consent of instructor.
- Ancient Languages 152a,b. Studies in Roman Philology. (3 ea.)  
Courses to meet the needs of students in various areas of Roman philology, e.g., in Latin literature, in Roman civilization, in Latin linguistics, etc. Prereq: Consent of instructor.
- Ancient Languages 153a,b. Studies in Greek Philology. (3 ea.)  
Courses to meet the needs of students in various areas of Greek Philology, e.g., in Greek literature, in Greek civilization, in Greek linguistics, etc. Prereq: Consent of instructor.
- Ancient Languages 154a,b. Studies in Semitic Philology. (3 ea.)  
Courses to meet the needs of students in various areas of Semitic Philology, e.g., in literature, in civilization, linguistics, etc. Prereq: Consent of instructor.
- Radio Arts III. Cinematography. (2)  
The art of making films for television, including the mechanics of motion picture photography. A study of equipment, lenses, lighting, color, editing, and set designing. Lecture, 2 hours; Laboratory, 2 hours. Prereq: Consent of instructor.
- Mathematics & Astronomy \*51a,b. Descriptive Astronomy (3,3)  
A study of the sun, moon, planets, comets, meteors; the celestial sphere, the telescope, latitude and longitude, time and calendar making; tides; eclipses; stars and stellar systems; and theories of evolution. These courses are non-mathematical. Prereq: none.
- Mathematics & Astronomy 126. Introduction to Higher Algebra (3)  
Integral domains, fields, rings, polynomials, vector spaces. Prereq: M. and A. 26 or consent of instructor.
- Mathematics & Astronomy 128a. The Operational Calculus (3)  
The introductory theory and properties of the Laplace Transformation. Applications in differential equations, difference equations and boundary value problems of mechanics, electricity and heat. Prereq: M. and A. 35
- Mathematics & Astronomy 128 b. The Operational Calculus (3)  
The theory of the inverse Laplace Transformation. Applications in advanced boundary value problems. Fourier Transforms and applications. Prereq: M. and A. 128a.
- Mathematics & Astronomy 146. Algebraic Methods in Engineering (3)  
Study of number systems, matrices, determinants, and Boolean Algebra with applications to electrical networks, machine computation, and other engineering problems. Prereq: M. and A. 20b.
- Psychology \*1. Introduction to Psychology (4)  
An introduction to the study of problems of behavior. Among the topics discussed are: heredity, development of the individual,

motivation, emotion, learning, the senses, perception and personality. Lecture-recitation, three hours; laboratory, two hours.

Sociology 131. Sociological Analysis of American Society (3)  
A study of the contemporary U. S. A. with emphasis upon the changing relations among various aspects of American society and culture. Prereq: one sociology course.


