ENQUIRER NEWSMEN ARE CONTEST JUDGES

More Than Forty Delegates Attend Convocation, Hear Underwood

The Kernel was chosen the best all-around college newspaper in Kentucky at the semi-annual meeting of the Kentucky Intercollegiate Press Association Friday and Saturday at Centre College, Danville.

Other awards garnered by the Kernel at the meeting were first places for sports and feature stories, second place for editorials, and third place for advertising.

Selection of the winners, from entries submitted by seven Kentucky colleges, was made by Ralph Quinn, general manager of the Cincinnati Enquirer, and Hub Logan, former Kentucky editor of the same paper.

Other colleges entered in the contests were Murray, Eastern, Western, Georgetown, Morehead, and Transylvania.

More than 40 delegates from seven colleges attended the two-day meet. A series of roundtable discussions of college newspaper problems was on the program Friday.

Leading the roundtable discussion on advertising was John H. Morgan, Kernel advertising manager. Kernal Editor L. T. Ighitar, as president of the KTPA, presided at the session.

Continuing the first day's program was a banquet for delegates held at the Kentucky College for Women, Danville, Underwood, editor of the Lexington Herald, was general speaker.

Discussing qualities of good journalism, Mr. Underwood stressed accuracy, saying that never in our history has there been a time when accuracy of reporting was more needed than at present.

A business session Saturday morning continued the meeting. It was decided that the next meeting of the association would be held at the University of Kentucky in April.

Calling 'Em Wild

WHEN you say that, pull in your ears and duck podner! In case you are one of those guys who has contended so long and so vehemently that the type of football played by Kentucky high schools is inferior to the calibre of other states—you'll best hold up your tent and sneak through the nickel seat exit with the Arabs. The East-West charity cletic classic unfurled on Stoll Field Saturday afternoon was convincing evidence that Kentucky prep school talent ranks with the best in the nation. Old timers scratch their heads and still recapture recollections of but few games that were better played or more evenly matched than this Saturday's scoreless deadlock.

Ordinarily sitting for two hours through a scoreless game is a most unpalatable and tasteless affair. In this case, however, the stasis is served, but the altar presentation despite the lack of six points, was as full of thrills as a ten-cent detective magazine.

Probably the best proof that Kentucky high school football is rated highly is evidenced by the number of schools that had scouts at the game. Out of state representatives swarmed to the game like moths to a free lunch. For example, I sat within whispering distance of Joseph A. Mager, University of Cincinnati coach, and from Vanderbilt and Xavier, all who sat with nose books in hand taking names of players who caught their eye. From a reliable source comes the word that 9 of the Southeastern Conference's 13 teams had contact men at the game. That's conclusive proof that Kentucky school football is rated high. And what sort of a show did the boys throw for the visitors and customers? As a also in the form of your memory, think through the following incidents:

East Threatens First

Late in the first quarter, with Rucker, Ball and Howard alternating at the driver's seat, the Eastern team drove from their own 42 yard line to the West 5, where the line of scrimmage was drawn, with first down and goal to go. Taking the Eastern punt-out, on the Red 39 another drive was launched that moved to the 11. 4,000 Shivering Fans Witness Charity Game End Scoreless

In a game so closely contested all the way that one postage stamp would have mailed both teams—two hand-picked teams of Kentucky high school football stars—one from the West, the other from the East—battled to a 0-0 tie Saturday afternoon on Stoll Field.

The game was played under a slate-colored sky that threatened rain any time and on a field that had been transformed into a vertiginous quagmire by the early morning downpours. The uncertain weather held the attendance to 4,000 brave fans who sat in shivering huddles near the entrance ramps. All the proceeds above actual expenses were turned over to the Lexington Union of Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children to be used in its work.

So evenly pitted were the two teams that it was only fair the game should have ended without a winner. From start to the final gun it was "Me and My Shadow" in music set to the tempo of pounding cleats. But that game was not void of thrills as time and time again both teams threatened to score. But that last 5 yards—the heartbeat high play that led to the six-point dough—the all-stars found practically impassable.
