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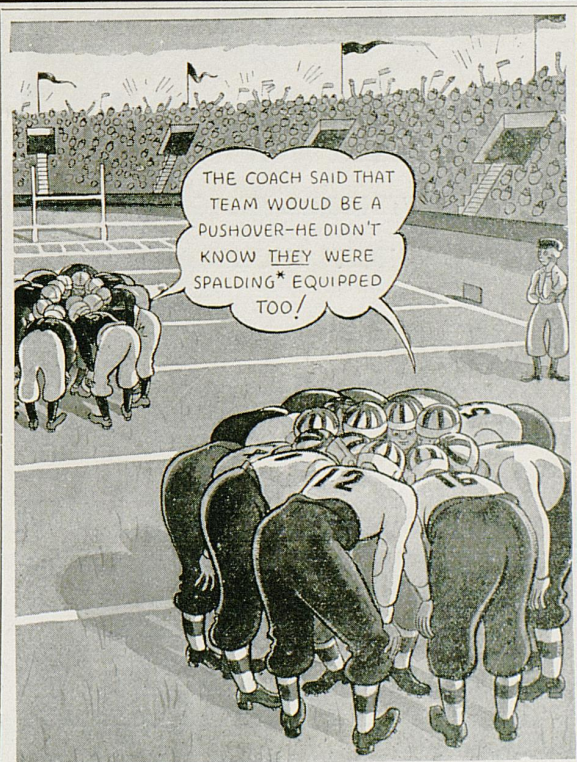

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Here Comes That Team Again!

The Crimson Tide will get you if you don't watch out.

That is the sum and substance of what Chet Wynne, University of Kentucky football coach and athletic director, has been shouting at the Wildcats all this week as he pointed toward Tuscaloosa, Ala.

For it was at Tuscaloosa that the Red Elephants entrained Thursday for Lexington, where they arrived yesterday all set to be the pumpkin-headed goblin to make Kentucky's Hallowe'en a realistic affair.

For the past thirteen years Alabama has been Kentucky's bugaboo. For thirteen consecutive years the Crimson Tide has humbled the Wildcats. And thirteen years is mighty long time. Thirteen is an unlucky number. Thirteen may prove to be Alabama's undoing.

Those big, blustering Elephants who have been munching other Southern foes like so many peanuts—except the Tennessee Volunteers, who refused to be crunched—are right here in Lexington, eagerly awaiting a chance to grind the Wildcats into dust.

Our Wildcats are ready for them. It is a sorrowful fact that Bob Davis, leading point maker in the Southeastern Conference, and Wendell Skaggs, regular tackle, are in no condition to play in today's game but Bob is rearing to go, anyway. Don't be surprised if the Dayton express trots out on the field before this game is over.

You no doubt know that this is Kentucky's annual homecoming game. Alabama knows it and Coach Frank Thomas has instructed his boys to ruin the occasion for the Wildcats.

How do you like those fancy pennants flying from thirteen flagpoles around the stadium? Those pennants represent the members of the Southeastern Conference. One is of Crimson with the word "Alabama" emblazoned thereon. Wave a red flag at a bluegrass bull and see what happens. Chet Wynne has been waving that banner at the Wildcats all week in an effort to make them mad enough to claw the Crimson Tide to shreds.

Just before the kickoff you will see a patriotic ceremony the likes of which never have been witnessed on Stoll Field. At the west end of the stadium you can see a 100-foot flag pole. Five minutes before the game begins you will see two smartly uniformed cadets march to that pole and, while the "Best Band in Dixie" plays the National anthem, up will go Old Glory.

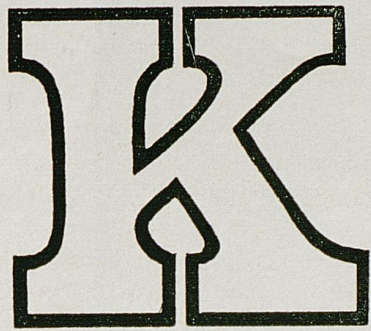

Coach Thomas, we welcome you as a former team-mate of our Chet Wynne at Notre Dame. Crimson Tide, we welcome you as one of our oldest and most feared rivals. We hope your stay in Lexington will be pleasant until that referee toots his whistle to start the game this afternoon.

From that time until the timer blows his final horn we wish you nothing but a lot of misery.

Star fullback and world's champion high hurdler at Notre Dame, maker of championship football teams at Creighton and later at Auburn, native of Kansas but adopted Kentuckian, attorney-at-law, close friend and favorite pupil of the late Knute Rockne, the man all Kentucky is banking on to lead the Wildcats eventually to Southern football supremacy.

That is Chet Wynne.

This mild mannered, cultured gentleman who once shared the National football limelight with George Gipp in Rockne's backfield of the early 1920's, is entering on his third season at Kentucky with ambitions of turning out a team that will make Kentuckians everywhere glow with pride.

When Wynne came to the Blue Grass he found football in a deplorable state. Hope had all but died. Victories had been scarce. Friends had turned away. There was muttering by fans whose enthusiasm had curdled. Alumni turned their heads.

But there were still loyal friends of the Blue and White. These stretched out their arms toward the South, where Chet Wynne had performed the miracle of creating a great football machine on the deep Alabama plains. He heard their call and left Auburn and his successes there to start building all over again at Kentucky.

It was a dreary struggle for the Chetter. Material was scarce. Spirit on the campus was at a low ebb. He was faced with the toughest assignment of his career. But the Chetter was undaunted.

With a dissipated squad, Wynne turned out a fighting team his first season at Kentucky. Teams that had been defeating the Wildcats handily found the going hard. Kentucky was beginning to win back its self-respect. The Wildcats showed improvement in breaking even in a ten-game schedule.

When the second Wynne season started last fall at Lexington hope had been born again. The material

was better but there was lack of reserves. The Wildcats were faced with a back-breaking schedule but, with Wynne at the helm they came through to win six of their ten games, showing gradual improvement. They were magnificent in defeat when they lost to Ohio State's great team by 19 to 6 at Columbus, and they won a world of respect in that game.

With two great stars, Bert Johnson, halfback, and Stanley Nevers, tackle, out because of injuries, the Kentuckians slumped after mid-season, but they came back to end the season in a blaze of glory in handing Tennessee a 27 to 0 defeat, the first Kentucky victory over the Volunteers in a decade and the worst beating taken by Tennessee in years. That victory did more to arouse enthusiasm at Kentucky than anything that had happened in a generation. It proved that those who believed in Wynne were not mistaken.

Wynne had given Kentucky the team it had hoped for — a team that fought from the first kick-off to the last whistle. It drove on the offense; it fought for every inch on defense. It was a TEAM.

Another year is at hand, and a new Kentucky spirit has been born to give encouragement to a Kentucky's own team. The dissatisfaction of the old days is gone; a new confidence

and a new esteem rule in its place. Win, lose or draw — Kentucky has done its best. That all-pervading spirit is the stuff from which tradition is built and is the foundation stone for greater and more glorious years to come.

Now the dark-eyed Wynne is facing another season with a high-spirited crew of hard-fighting Wildcats who believe they are as good as the best. They are eager for action, fearless, self-confident, superbly coached, capable. They are a tribute to the ability of Chet Wynne.

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UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY BASKETBALL TEAM IN 1935-36



For the first time in years, the University of Kentucky had absolutely no claim on the Southeastern Conference basketball title at the close of the 1935-36 season last spring. But still the season was considered quite successful as the Wildcats won 14 of their scheduled games and lost only four.

Coach Adolph Rupp had planned to build his team around a sophomore, the all-American center, Leroy Edwards, but had to change his plans when Edwards turned professional and remained at Indianapolis instead of continuing his education and his basketball at Kentucky.

Without Edwards, Coach Rupp was under a terrific handicap but he made the most of the material at hand and once more turned out a team that was a credit to the University.

Possibly one of the most surprised basketball teams ever to tread a hardwood floor was the University of Pittsburgh Panthers here last January 8. Pitt took a Southern tour and dropped off in Lexington with the idea of giving the Wildcats a lesson in basketball. Imagine how those Panthers felt when, at the end of the half, Kentucky was leading by 22 to 2. The Panthers picked up a bit in the last half but the damage was done and Kentucky won by 35 to 17.

Once more the Wildcat basketball team displayed its strength against Alabama, which has been unable to whip Kentucky in basketball since Coach Rupp took over the reins here. Coach Hank Crisp's lanky lads fell by the close score of 32 to 30 at Tuscaloosa, and by 40 to 34 at Lexington.

Other high lights of the season were the Wildcat victories over the powerful Michigan State and Butler University quintets. The worst defeat suffered by a Wildcat basketball team in years was its loss to Notre Dame by 41 to 20. They will meet again at Louisville next spring and the Wildcats hope to achieve their revenge.

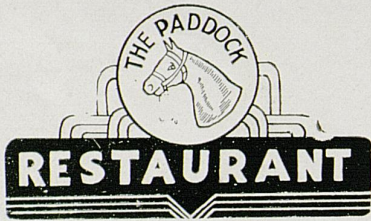

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WILDCAT TRACK TEAM HAS GOOD SEASON



The University of Kentucky track team, working its last year under the coaching of Bernie Shively, who will devote all his time in the future to physical education classes in the University and the University Training School, won two dual meets and lost one by a close score last spring.

The Kentucky track team was forced to train without a track. The athletes were forced to run on the grass of the football practice field, and on at least one occasion, went to Georgetown to work out on the track there. This condition was caused by the reconstruction of the cinder track around Stoll Field. This track has been completed and now is one of the finest in the country. It is a quarter-mile track with a 220-yard straightway. In the future you may expect the Kentucky track teams to rank with the best in the South.

The Wildcats won their first dual meet, with Vanderbilt at Nashville, by 61 1-2 to 55 1-2. They lost their next encounter, with Tennessee at Knoxville, by 66 to 51, and came back to trounce Berea by 94 to 37 at Berea.

Coach Shively took a few of his boys to the conference meet at Birmingham and they picked up quite a few points and made a very respectable showing. Dave Rogan won the half-mile and the mile runs there, establishing a new conference record in the mile at 4 minutes 22 seconds.

The freshman track team won both its dual meets, defeating Tennessee 70 to 47, and Berea 91 to 40.

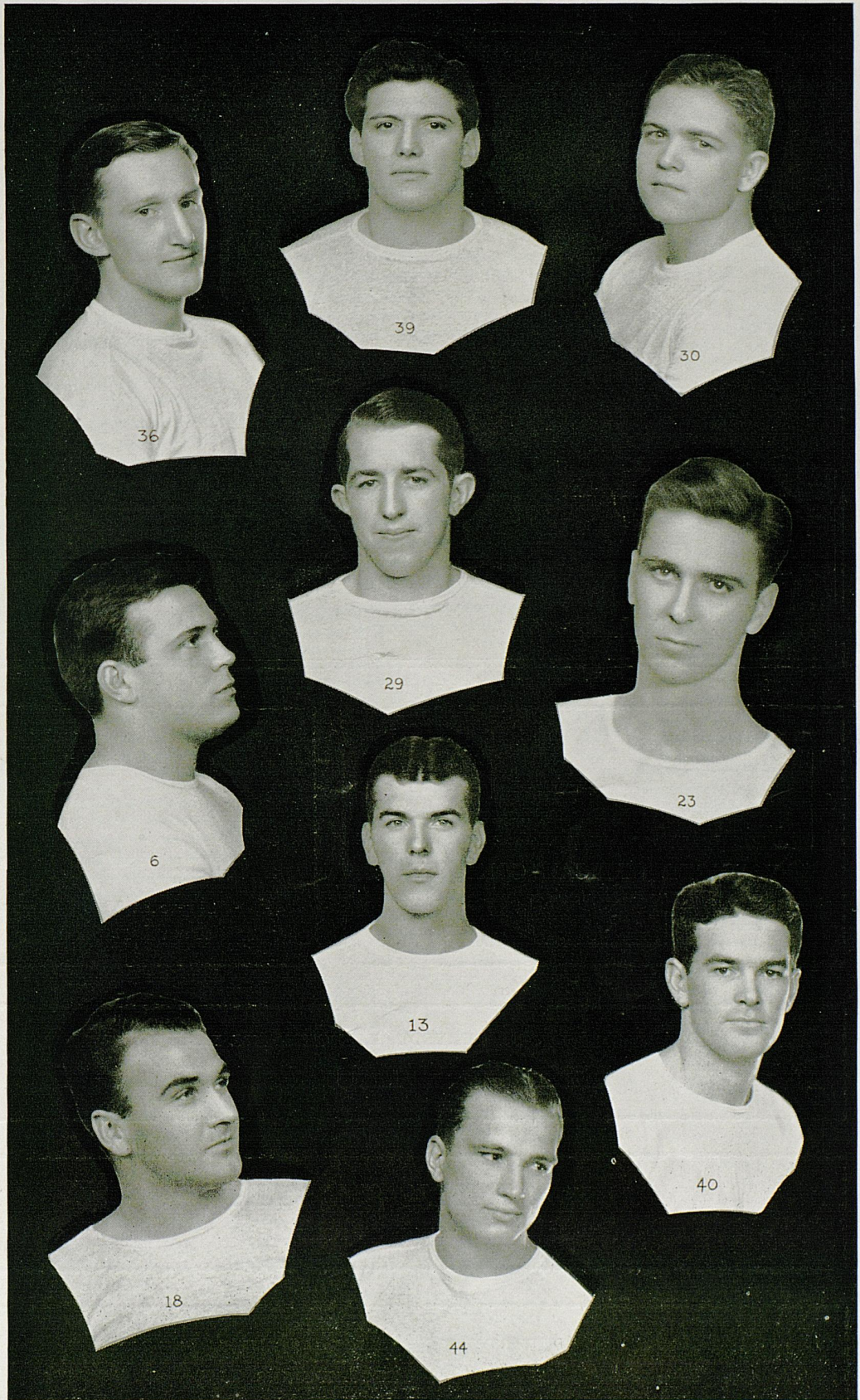

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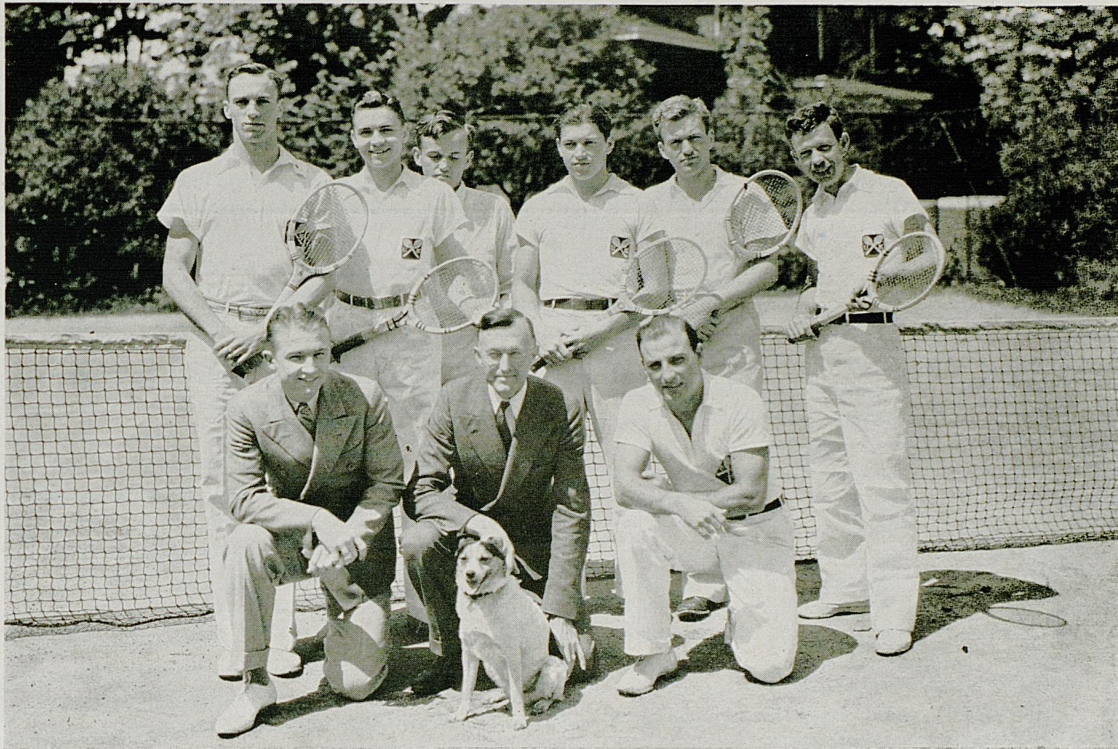
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A PHI BETA KAPPA TENNIS TEAM



The University of Kentucky's Phi Beta Kappa tennis team of last spring, so called because of the high scholastic standing of its members, demonstrated that it was just as good on the courts as in the class rooms when it won 11 matches and lost one. This team had an excellent claim on the Southeastern Conference tennis championship.

The Kentucky tennis team was coached, in his spare time, by Prof. H. H. Downing, head of Astronomy Department.

The Wildcat tennis players cleaned up in their Southern matches, staged a victorious march through Indiana and, tired out from playing three strong teams in three consecutive days, went to the well just once too often and lost to Michigan State on the fourth straight day of competition.

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Despite the fact that he was unable to play last Saturday in the Florida game, Bob Davis, Kentucky halfback, maintained a safe lead in Southeastern Conference scoring. Bob has made eleven touchdowns for a total of 66 points.

Although forced to train without a track, the University of Kentucky track team accredited itself nobly the past spring, winning two out of three dual meets and making a good showing in the Southeastern Conference meet at Birmingham, Ala. In dual meets the Wildcats defeated Vanderbilt and Berea, losing by a narrow margin to Tennessee.

Baseball, dropped from the University of Kentucky's sports program a few years ago, probably will be reinstated next spring.

Two of the finest collegiate bands in the South will appear on Stoll Field this afternoon. Alabama's "Million Dollar Band" and Kentucky's "Best Band in Dixie" will perform for your entertainment.

The University of Kentucky football teams have elected captains among the linemen the past seven years. Stanley Nevers, giant tackle, will lead the 1936 eleven. He was chosen by the lettermen to succeed Jimmy Long, end. The alternate captain, also a lineman, is Gene Myers, center.

Two leading candidates for end position on the University of Kentucky football team also are basketball players. They are fellow townsmen, Joe

Two regular members of the 1936 University of Kentucky football team also are members of the Wildcat basketball squad. They're guards in basketball and both are ends in football. They are Joe "Red" Hagan and Russell Ellington. Both live at Louisville.

Alabama has won the conference championship in 1924, 1925, 1926, 1930, 1933 and 1934.

The University of Kentucky football team will play an eastern team this season for the first time. The Wildcats will meet Manhattan College, coached by the great Chick Meehan, November 7 at Brooklyn, N. Y. Meehan, who developed great teams at New York University, has a fine team at Manhattan. His team conditioned itself by scrimmaging against the professional New York Giants early this fall.

Alabama has had six undefeated seasons. They were in 1897, 1906, 1925, 1926, 1930, 1934.



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When Bob Davis, regular Wildcat right halfback, became disabled, his place was taken by his younger brother, Dameron, a sophomore. Dameron aided Kentucky materially in the victory over Florida last Saturday. He returned a punt more than 40 yards to score Kentucky's only touchdown in that game.

The Kentucky Wildcats will play Manhattan College next Saturday afternoon at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn. That will mark the first time in history that a University of Kentucky football team has appeared in the East. The Kentucky basketball team has played twice at New York. Two former Wildcat football stars intend to witness the Kentucky-Manhattan game. They are John Sims "Shipwreck" Kelly, owner of the professional Brooklyn Dodgers,

and Ralph Kercheval, star halfback on the same team. Kelly and Kercheval were two of Kentucky's greatest stars of all time. Kercheval is recognized as the greatest punter in pro ranks. He holds the record with a 91-yard kick.

Kentucky's best bid for all-American or all-Southern honors this season is Gene Myers, alternate captain and one of the greatest centers ever to wear a Kentucky uniform. Myers was the outstanding player on the field when Kentucky lost to Georgia Tech. He is a fine snapper back, blocker, tackler, pass interceptor. In fact Myers is the answer to a line coach's prayer. His ability is recognized throughout the South.

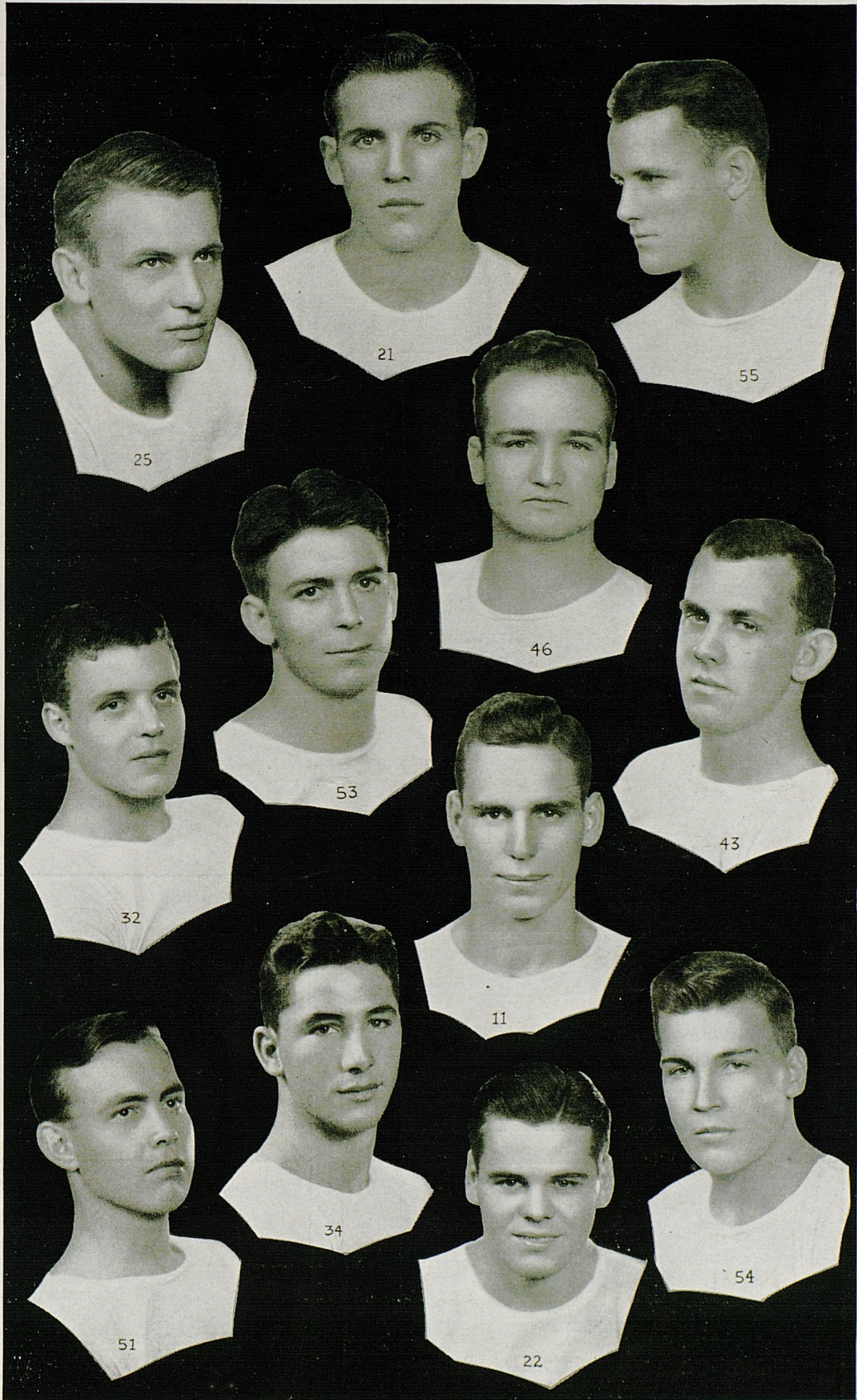

The Tidesmen have played four times in the Rose Bowl, winning three and tying one.

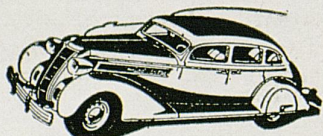
Out of a total of 326 games played since football started at Alabama in 1892 the Tide has won 223 contests, while dropping 82 and tying 21.

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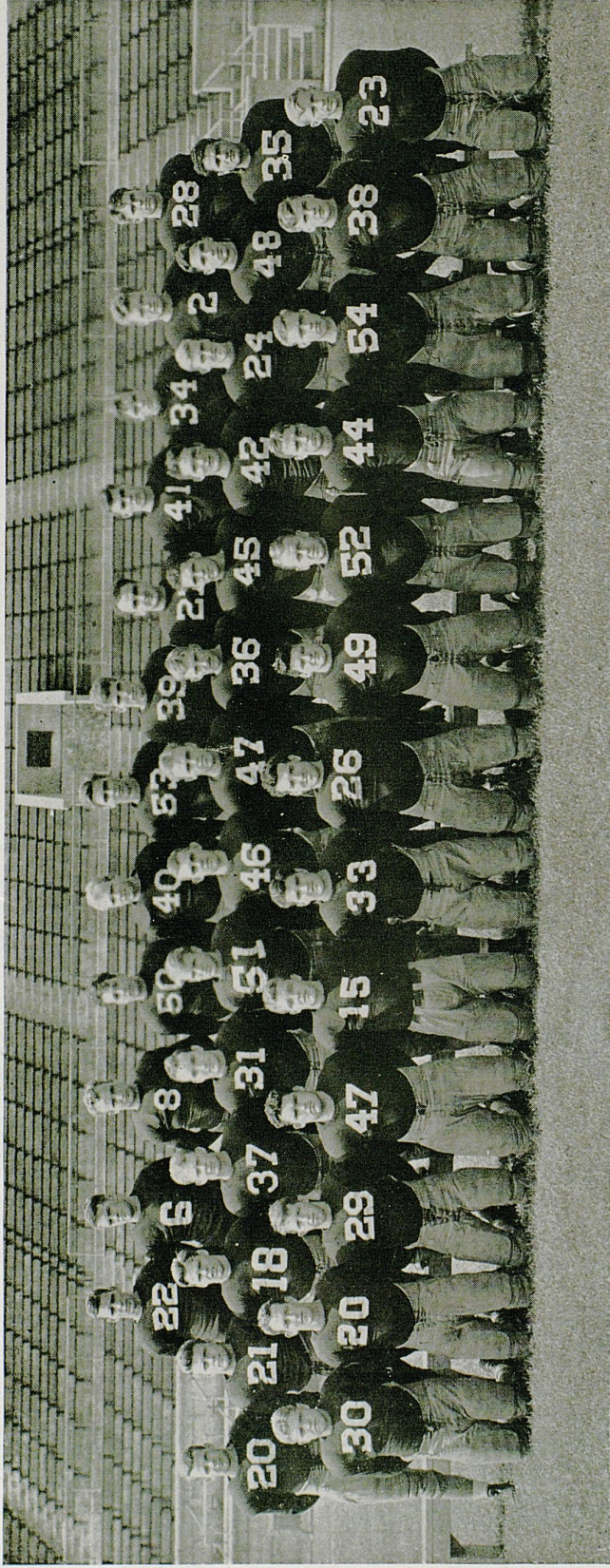
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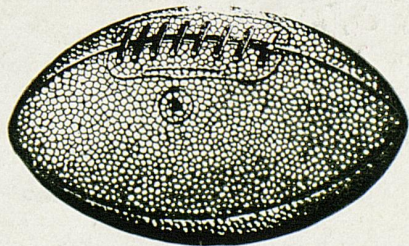
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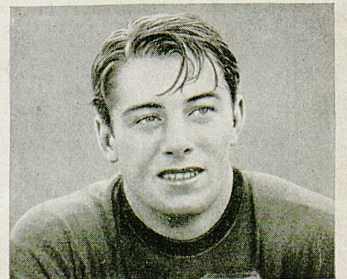
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
