are about over for me now, except quarters at 5:30. It may interest you to know that I am called at 5:30 to 5:00 every morning. I am an assistant to the executive officer in looking out for the cleaning on the berth deck and below. I am an expert on wriggling through double bottoms, anyway they still have the good old custom of making a "handy-billy", "squeeze handle" or whatever you want to call him, meaning a "doer of any old thing", out of a ruidshipinar, and retain the barbarous

Mark weather, I suppose, and I am writing to you in my shirt sleeves, with port open, and still hot. It must be pretty warm here in summer.

Today I saw some flying fish, the first time I ever saw them. They looked white, and flew rapidly fifty or sixty yards about a yard or two above water. It reminded me of Kipling, "On the road to Mandalay, where the flying fishes play," etc. I wish I knew it all.

When we get in we

have our work cut out for us. First we will have to coal, about three long days of it, I suppose, followed by steaming ship, and then target practice.

I hear from Mother that the youngster is flourishing, and I am of course glad to hear it. I have gotten out the pictures you sent me several times and never failed to wish I was where they were taken.

I wish I could get home this summer. My leave last summer was so short that it doesn't seem

like I had been home at all. I would also like to see the Purchase Exposition.

I suppose we are going to South America after target practice. Some people think we will go up to New York first, but no one knows.

I know I am good and anxious to get in, as I did not get any leave to go ashore in San Juan. We were only there a day, and I was doing the boat duty.

I think I shall go up on deck and see what is in sight. The labors of the day
