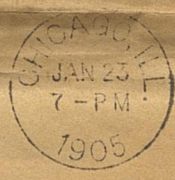

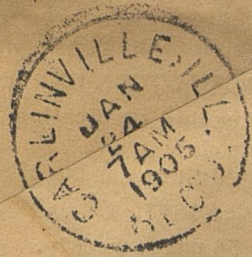

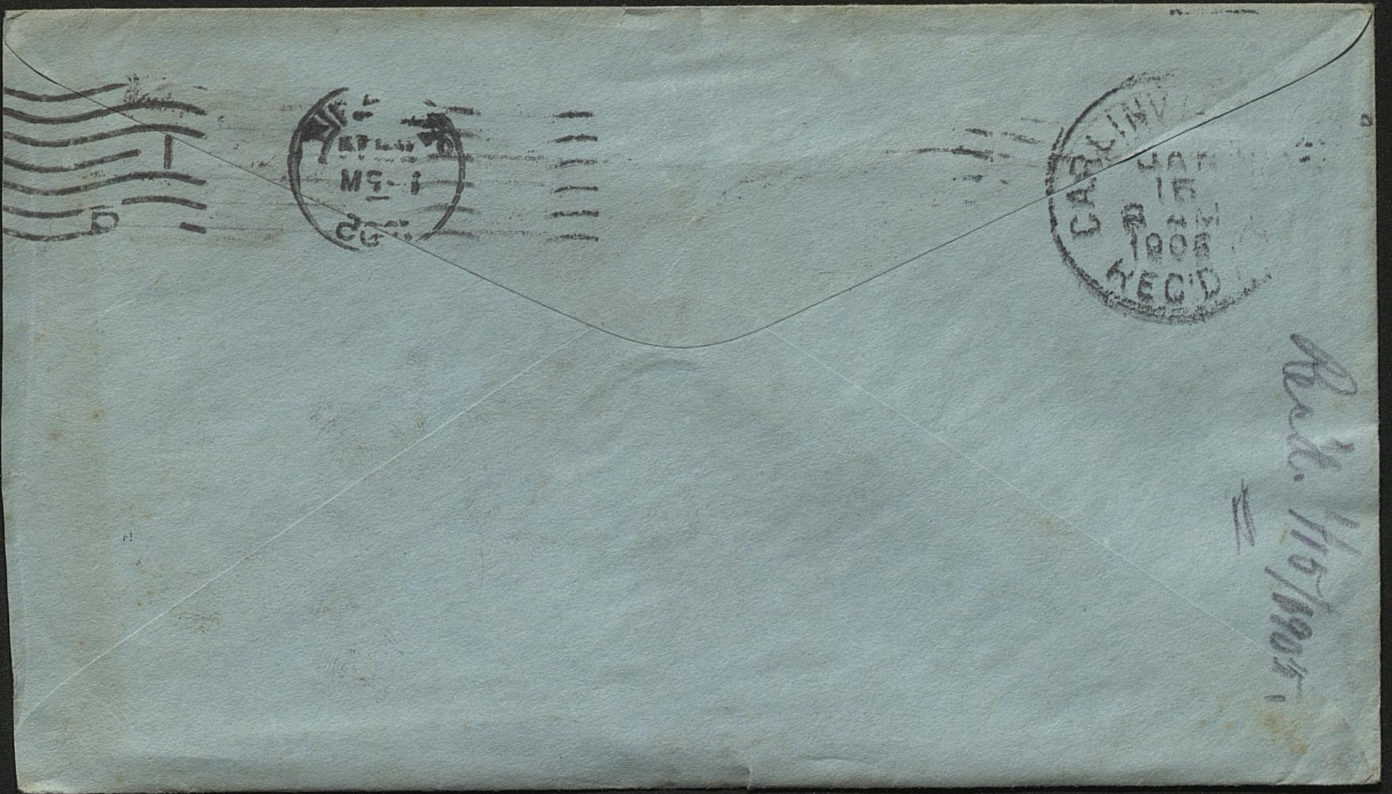

At the price marked in red ink we prepay the freight, or, in case you desire the goods to come by express we will either apply the freight charges to the express charges or remit you the amount of the freight charges.

For your information will say for very short distance hauls express does not cost much more than freight, but in long distance hauls express comes to two or three times as much as freight. Express is quicker than freight, but since we have a St. Joseph distributing house our freight shipments go over trunk lines and reach all points of the country without much delay.

Ordinarily it only takes one day longer for you to send your order direct to our home office, and in case it is just as convenient for you we prefer that you do so.
