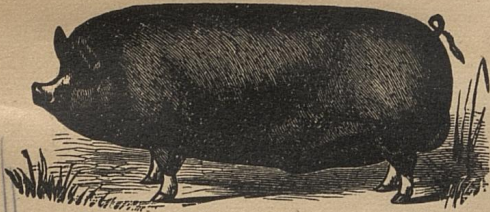

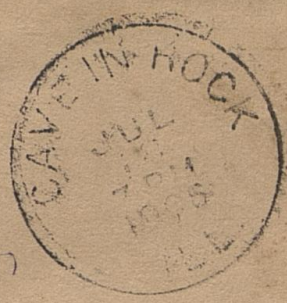

this summer.

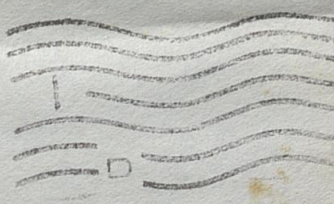
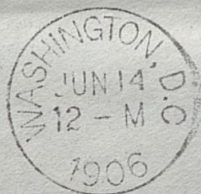
