



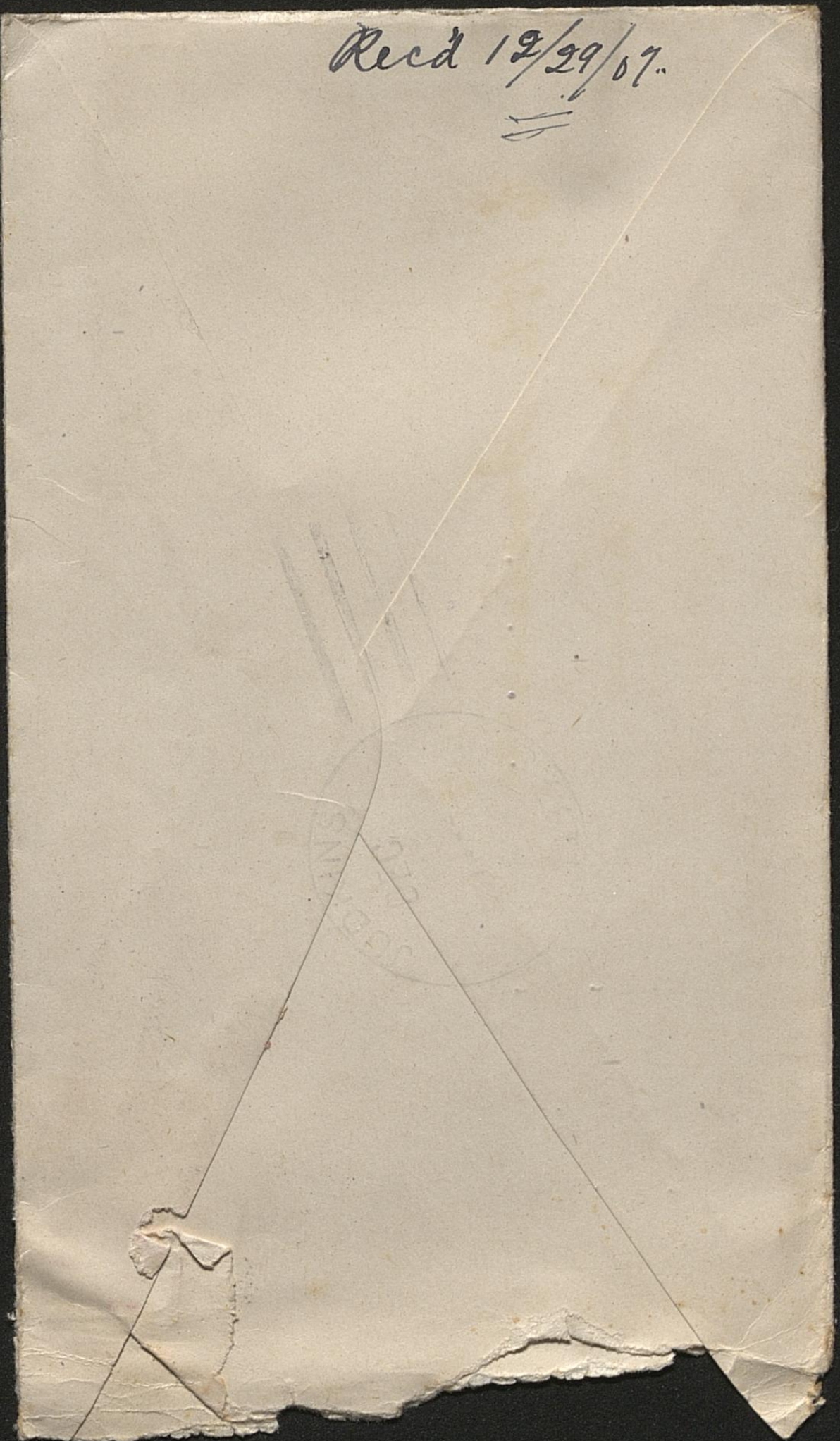

My Dear Son;

You know that in closing up my letter on yesterday I said that there was something special that I wanted to say to you. Well, it was about the weather. On Saturday we had one of those dark, chilly gloomy days with the wind a little in the north-east but as bad a day as it was, the square and streets were thronged with crowds. In fact I had occasion to go into the Co-operative and men and women had to elbow their way through the crowd. By evening the wind shifted to the east and cut like a knife. On yesterday we were greeted with a sleet for a couple of hours then it moderated and drizzled a little. Then along towards four o'clock it commenced in a long gentle rain and continued until along about ten. This morning when I got up I found the ground covered with two or three inches of snow but of the soft and watery kind. The boys and I did about a mile of cleaning the roofs and walks and then it commenced snowing hard again and continued until about nine and now looks like it would clear up. But we have that to do over again. It is thawing some but I think it will turn cold to-night. I would like to know just how the weather was down there Saturday, Sunday and to-day. I couldn't find the weather predictions in yesterday's Republic.

Saturday after supper I concluded I would go down town awhile and just as I got down in front of Florence Anderson's house she came out of the house shaking like she had a chill with a lamp in her hand and asked me to go in to the house. It was about seven o'clock. She had left home about five, bolting all the doors except the one she went out of, which she locked with a key, and she had just come home and found all the doors open. A neighbor came along just then, I have forgotten his name, and we went into the house and looked in all the closets, under the beds and in all the rooms, but we found no one and on yesterday morning when I saw her she said she had missed nothing but had slept at a friend's house. I started up town and got as far as Hoecker's corner, and the night was pretty dark and there were several tramps in town and I concluded that home was a pretty good place for a fellow and turned around and went back home.

I mailed you this morning a pretty good fat letter from Mother and while I do not expect you to answer all I write you, I am doing so largely on account of the fact of keeping you in touch with home while you are being initiated and will probably not do so, so frequently after you get your family with you.

I was at the depot the other day and in helping lift the casket of Col. Simonson, I wrenched my back pretty bad and for three or four days have suffered with the lumbago. Friday and Saturday nights I didn't sleep very much, but rested well last night, as I went in and let Matthews attach his electrical machinery but as that costs \$1.00 a charge I do not want to do any more of that than I can help.

I guess Nell and the children will move from her mother's to Stoddard's to-day. I have arranged with Angus to go out and see when they want to go and after dinner to take their baggage in the buggy over, and come back and take Nell and Crittenden the 3rd, and then to go and get Walter Edward and bring him to the office and we will probably keep him until Tuesday

My Dear Son;

We have not heard from you since Monday morning. Probably Nell has and we have not received information to that effect as we are not seeing each other very often. I forgot on yesterday to enclose the Will's letter so in this I enclose one from Mr. Wills, one from the Union Bank of Houston, and one from Dr. Fancher, in reply to one I had written him telling him of both Trucie's and the colt's arrival here and of your arrival, and also asking him to suggest what I had better do with reference to that hind limb of hers. And I want you to write suggestions as to what to feed the colt, in case we want to wean it. Trucie seems to be doing all right. I do not like the idea of not feeding her corn because she likes it so well. She has been getting the finest kind of food, namely, corn, sheaf oats, shelled oats, timothy hay, fine blue-grass hay with a little clover here and there. The colt is thriving well and begins to get it's nose in to both eating corn and sheaf oats. It does not look to me like it is the prudent thing to wean it in dead winter, but I shall be governed very largely by your dictation in the matter. I let Angus ride Trucie up to the mail this morning, leaving the colt tied in the stall and it behaved itself admirably. By degrees I am going to separate them along and keep the colt well handled so that it will be well broken. We are having a very fine spell of weather here again. Had a pretty good snow Monday or Tuesday but where the roads are traveled it is no good but will be good for the wheat. I wrote you somewhat at length yesterday and hence have not to say to-day.

Your letters of 18th to Mother & self and postal of 19th to Mother have received this morning. The letters were encouraging and inspiring and rejoiced at your cheerfulness. You would also be surprised at the interest John & I take in you nearly every day. He asks to visit the news from out I read your letter to me to him this morning and he clings in every word and when I finished he said those sound statements on something fine and that he was caught in one place I said Angus offered the day you left when I get the day money I will take my 3⁰⁰ magazine money out and probably send you balance, I will give till a check to my account for \$10⁰⁰ and charge you with it - from now on our relations in money matters will be strictly business it would have been better to have been so at your beginning but it is never too late to start right, I hope you will be successful in getting Ford to take the 1000 acres if he does not write winter / Ferguson and some of the other fellows here, it would be a good investment to have built you a house and taken up 4 or 5 thousand dollars worth of your paper out of course on sale of day as land alone, I will help you all I can in trying to interest the fellows; you go after, by all that is sacred I want to urge you not to buy any more until you are free of debt no matter how soon it appears to be I will follow this suggestion myself from now on, there is a disposition in the family to plunge at times but as good as financial as he was did it well and had it not been that grandpa Stratton and Uncle Dave came to his rescue he would have been broken up financially mentally and physically at 50 years of age. 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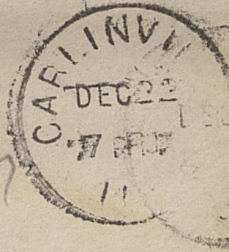

My Dear Son;

Your postal to Nell and your letters to your father and mother announcing your arrival at Metz, Friday, the 13th., at 11:50 P.M. in good shape, both yourself and stock and that you are nearly unloaded, we received this morning, which relieved us of considerable suspense. I noted your emphasis as to the pleasant day and night. It was quite a contrast with the weather of your old home near Carlinville, Illinois. In fact Friday was one of those winter days which we commonly style "villianous", barring extreme cold of course.

I was somewhat dissappointed at your not saying either on your postal or in your letters whether or not you had received the packages shipped to you from Burgdorff Bros. and your camera. This morning, upon inquiring at the Bank whether they had forwarded your statements and found they had not and gave them orders to do so forthwith. Neighbors phoned me this morning that he would move in to-day. The weather is between a cloudy and clear day. Early this morning it indicated snow, at ten minutes to ten it is hard to tell what it is going to do.

Your grandfather goes to Gillespie this morning for two or three days visit. I was very much gratified to hear of your receiving a letter from John Plummer. He came to the office on the morning that you left with a present for me of a box of fifty fine ten cent cigars, Amadors. I am in the habit of smoking nickel cigars you know, and I was especially pleased and gratified at this token of good will largely on account of the fact that last year he paid me over \$100.00 in various fees in the examination of abstracts of title of Kansas lands, and you would have supposed that the present was coming from the other side of the house. I knew Plummer's old father. He worked for me by the day gardening, when we first started to housekeeping. The boys were all little chaps then and of course I did not know much about them but they were very poor and as this has all been brought about, I wish you could have seen the house that they lived in and had for a home. Since his going west he and his brother have been closely associated with the leading capitalists of Colorado and Kansas. John came back here this time and erected a monument over the graves of his father and mother, as he had them brought back to their old home when they died. So his acquaintance and interest is worth cultivating. I sent his letter to Nell with your letters to mother and myself. I think what brought John to the office the morning you left, he having heard of it and naturally supposed I would have the blues and he took it upon himself to add words of commendation and predicting a bright future for yourself and family.

It is especially gratifying to know that you were greeted with a beautiful day upon your arrival at your destination. I do not know of any one going to Texas to-day except Dickerson's son-in-law. I wrote all of your fellows again telling them that I was ready to go with them if they went. None of them showed up except Kuester who said that his family was in such a condition that it was out of the question, but will try and keep the good work going on. By keeping after it I think it will come around in good shape and I am in it to stay if it takes one, or five, or ten years.

Trusting that this will find you getting everything in good shape and taking all the necessary precautions within your circumscribed surroundings against the weather that you may yet have and with regards to Bill,

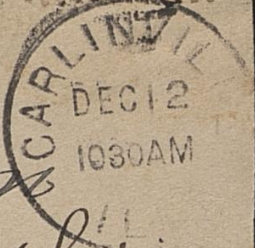

I found every thing at the farm in splendid shape except a pile of straw which you left on the back porch, a little dangerous, but as it had rained and got wet I didn't bother it. Clark says to tell you he still has six head, old Mollie, combination, two sows and two pigs. Smith wrote him to crate the hogs and ship them but he was not able to do so at present. Trucie is alive. George Marrietta starts from East St. Louis with her and the colt this morning overland. They must be several miles out already as I sent him down on the 4:52 A.M. C & A. My letter to you at Judkins tells you all about her. Some of your mail by my mistake was forwarded to you at Metz which you have probably now got. You will find a large express package at Metz for you. A Christmas present from myself and mother. Hope every thing will suit and fit you all right. Try them on before you leave and what does not, return as I have bought them conditionally. And if anything is too small or large state the size you want, but at any rate put what you can on so that you will look as nice as possible on your advent.

Old man Diess died Saturday with old age. John Zumbrock, the boy who has been in the employ of the Zaepffel family for many years, died suddenly Saturday morning, was buried yesterday. Nell and the children are still with us and we are enjoying their visit. She may go out to her mothers to-day. Wanted to yesterday but on account of it thundering and raining most of the day, I wouldn't stand for it. I believe that this is all I care to say now as you will be stuffed full of good cheer and home news when you get to Judkins. I hope this will find you having arrived safely with everything in good condition, be of good cheer, keep up your nerve, take care of your health, don't try to do everything in a day, take plenty of time. Oh! yes, I want to make a suggestion about your tent. When you put that up, stake it down perfectly secure, dig a trench around it, throw the dirt up next to the tent so as to prevent the wind getting in from underneath. By all means put a stove up in it and I hope you took lumber enough from the farm to lay along partly for a floor.

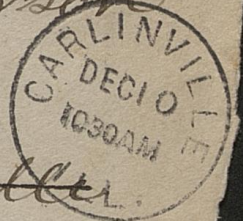
