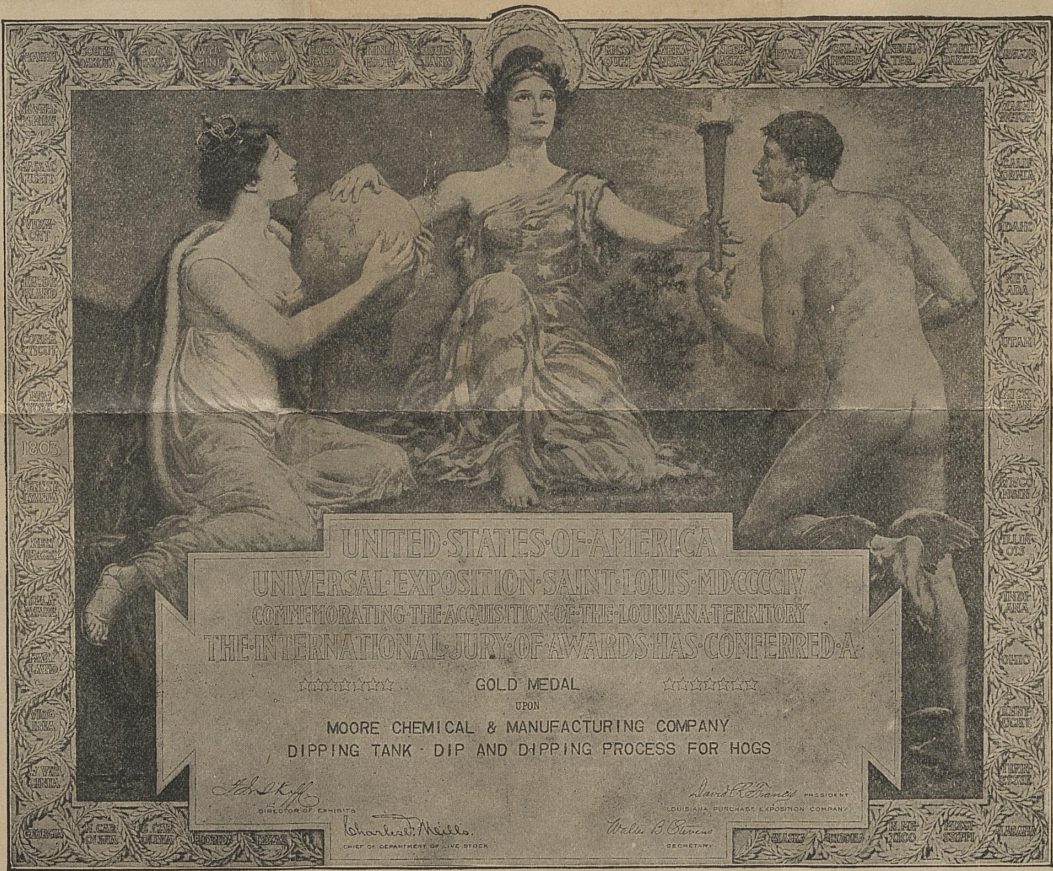




Dear Sir:-

I have your letter of yesterday in reply to letter I wrote you on the 15th., and you say that you received all the maps that I sent you, with the exception of that of Martin Co.

I concluded not to send you a map of that County at this time, with our unsold lands marked on same, as with the exception of two small tracts, (one about three miles West of Stanton and another about two miles N.W. of Germania) all our lands in that County, (and we have quite a large amount) are what are known as "escrow lands", and they are not in market now, and have not been for several years, on account of a legal complication, that we expect will be adjusted, possibly before the end of the present year, but until it is adjusted, we do not care to furnish list of these lands, as to do so, only leads to confusion. We cannot, as I say, sell them now, and we do not care to be bothered answering inquiries about them, while they are in the present condition. I enclose one of our Martin County maps without indicating our lands by separate color.

I thought to make 15 or 18 bu.

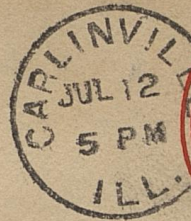

 colt, 10 head of sheep, and am going

My Dear Son:

I herewith inclose you a letter which I received from Edwards on yesterday morning and I sent him a new note to sign, telling him to remit the interest for sixty days. I will feel mighty thankful when I am done with him about this matter, as I think he has been as Johah so far as doing business in Texas is concerned. I don't want you to say anything to him about the \$480.00 matter until this is out of the way. Then I will have you write him a pretty stiff letter. Of course he will try to hedge probably by insisting that his settlement with me covered everything. I will be able to aid you to the extent of saying that the Ford transaction was not taken into consideration or even thought of by me, in fact ~~my~~ at that time they had not been earned. Hill has never been here since I saw him at St. Louis and I don't think it is likely he will be. If he does come I propose to let him know that I know he lied to me, and also the fact that they will have some trouble before they get through it. The weather here is sizzling hot now. We had two very heavy rains. On Friday and Saturday. I got caught in the one on Friday by doing an errand for Nell and Walter Edward, although I got them into shelter all right. We had the two boys in with us one day early in the week and all four of the grandchildren on Saturday and the two boys again yesterday, and this morning. Fred leaves tomorrow. I managed after considerable work, to get hold of a pony and let them have a ride. It is the first time Walter has got to use his saddle since he came from Texas and while ~~x~~ I did not have either of them out long, it was sufficient to take the wire edge off of both. Nell thinks that Walter is not well. I don't see any effects of indisposition, especially when we have control over him so that he does not play too hard. He has been a mighty good boy all the way through and all that we have been together, I have not had to punish him but twice, once with a little tap and the next time, tying his hands with my handkerchief for about five minutes on account of his being so rough with his hands in attacking other children. I never saw a youngster so infatuated with another one as he seems to be with Elionore. I believe that he would play with her for days at a time without any manifestation of rudeness, but with other youngsters he seems impelled to either be pushing or grabbing hold of them. More on account of exuberance, however, than maliciousness. The dog Fred is quite ill natured. So much so, that I keep a muzzle on him whenever I have him out. But he took right up with both Walter Edward and Nell. Business ~~is~~ almost at a standstill. The prospects of corn for the farmers was never better. Nell and Clarice both happened in this morning in time to take waffle breakfast with us and the boys about 8:30. So you see we are not leading a very strenuous life so far as getting up early is concerned. Walter had a fine nights rest last night, but I think the excessive heat makes him have a wearied look. But I see no occasion for any uneasiness on your part. The other youngster ties to me as close as a sick kitten to a hot brick. I believe this is all I care to say now, As ever,

Dear Mr. Anderson:-

The answer to your letter of recent date has been delayed by reason of the fact that it came in the midst of a great rush of business.

I have looked over the law to some extent, and I have no reason whatever to think that the state has any claim whatever to any mineral on your land, unless it was reserved in the sale to you. Article 40-41 of the Revised Statutes especially provides that the state thereby release to the owner or owners of the soil all mines, or minerals that may be on the same, subject to taxation; and this law has not been repealed.

There is a separate law referring to the designation and classification of mineral lands as such, and they are sold under special regulations involved in Title 71 of the Revised Statute.

I also find that the court of civil appeals has decided (in the case of ~~Hiel~~ vs. Martin, 70 S.W.437) that no one as against the patentee can require from the state title to any part of the land or its minerals; and I think this would be good in favor of the settler, whether he had his patent or not, unless the minerals were reserved in the sale.

I cannot find anything to indicate that mineral water would be included in any of the reservations concerning mineral land. Of course I have not gone deeply into this, as I would have done if I were preparing a case for the supreme court, especially as I do not understand from your letter that you are having any present trouble. You had better be careful to comply strictly with all the requirements of the law concerning the land which you have bought; and I think it very unlikely that you will have any trouble because of the discovery of mineral springs.

In the case of ~~Hiel~~ vs. Martin the supreme court has refused a writ of error, which strengthens the position, *Decision,* although I do not know on what grounds the writ was refused. The case involved a number of points. I make no charge for this opinion.

Mr. Leland finally sent the fees charged him, and I will consider your annoyance in that matter reward enough for me.

~~Also was~~ pleased to know that you feel so encouraged, and hope everything will come out all right with you. Also Mr. John C. is *arranging* asking for some more land in Kerr County,

but we do not know how the titles are yet.

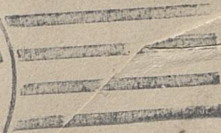

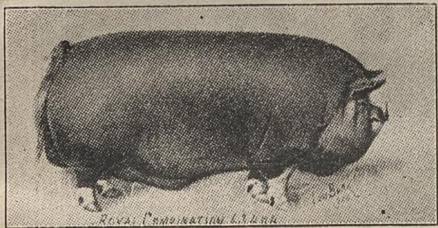
