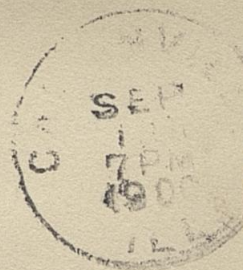

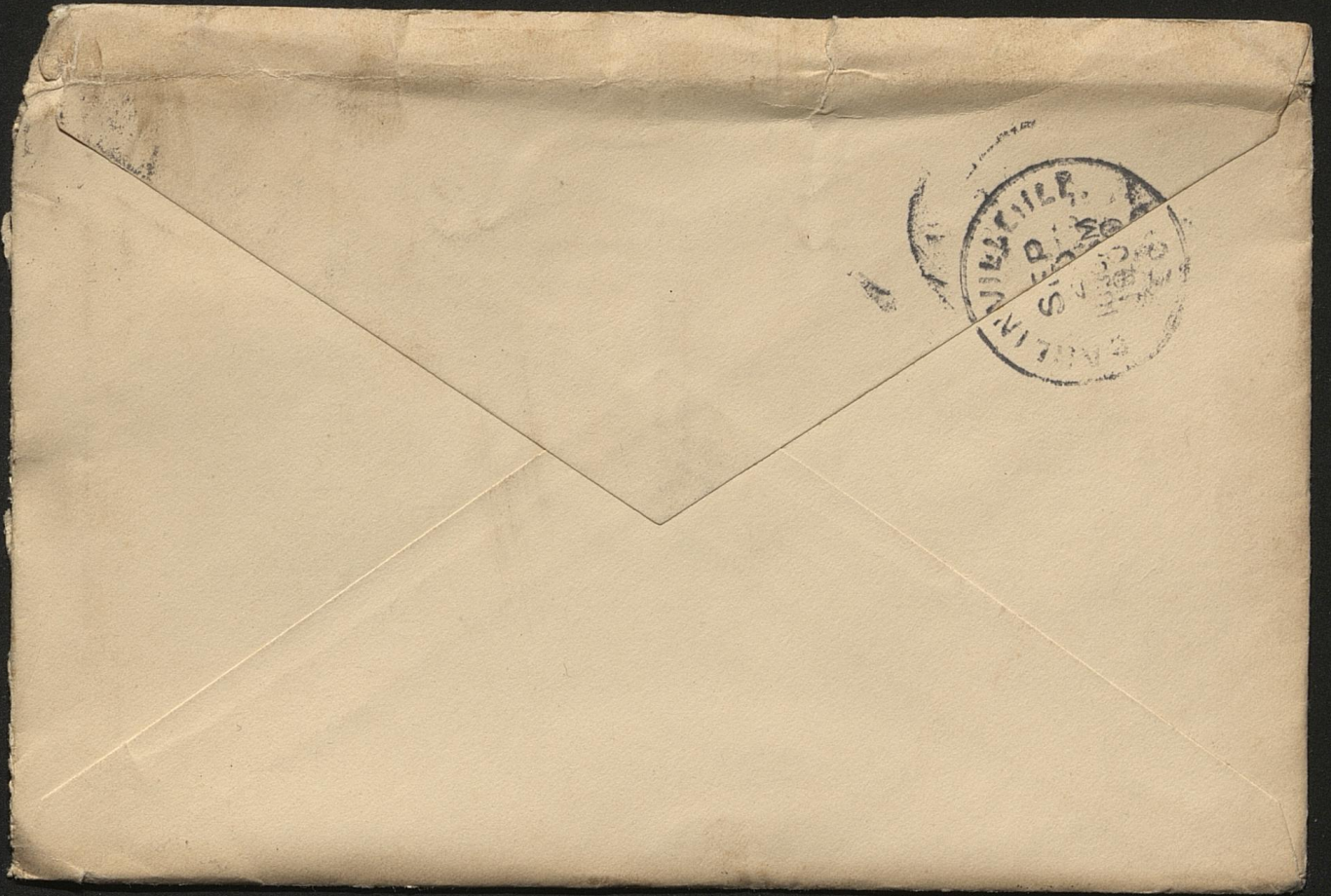

My Dear Son,

Your letter to me and postal from Pikes Peak, and your letter to Mom with the inclosure of Mr. Corn's letter, came duly to hand, and your letter to Mom this morning, also came to hand in due time, which she has not yet had the exquisite pleasure of reading, but will at noon. I thought I would drop you a few lines to let you know how the world is moving here while you are away. We had a pretty hard rain on Friday and Saturday, and as good luck would have Groves concluded that he would have his boys dig a little hole in the pasture north of the spring, which they did. I do not know how deep, but they struck a lot of water. So that I was saved the expense of having Mr. Coffy go out, all of that happened by Coffy's not being able to go out a week ago today when Groves came in for him. Groves was to come in for him on Wednesday, but by that time he changed his mind. He made a pass at cutting the weeds in the west field, but it is not done, and I don't know whether he is going to finish them or not. I was out there yesterday with Mr. Patchen, and I went pretty much all over the farm, and your stock looks pretty well. Of course there is an awful sight of work to do cleaning up when you get home, except that you must not be too brash about it, but I hope you will keep at it until you get everything cleaned up as neat as a pin. I was very much afraid during that hot weather, that you would lose some of those fine hogs. Ned seems to be doing everything pretty well and also seems to take quite an interest in things. I was very much mortified and humiliated at the large stock of chickens you have for all of the preparations that have been made, and I hope that you will next year ~~that you~~ have at least 1000.

I hope you will have a good time at Cheyenne, and I don't know but what that was the proper thing for you to do. I want you to get home without having to ride on freight cars or using the ties, but at the same time I want you to use good judgment and if you do have to get money from Mr. Corn, do not get any more than you absolutely think is necessary to get you home in good shape. Walter expects to be home on the 29th, and we are very anxious for you to get home on the morning of the 2nd as Willie expects to be done on that day and we all want to have dinner together.

Give the Corns all our love, and trusting that this will find you all well, I am

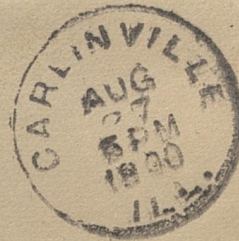

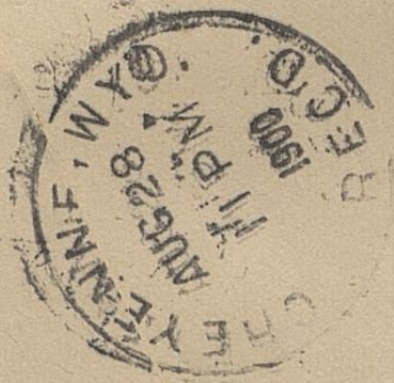
