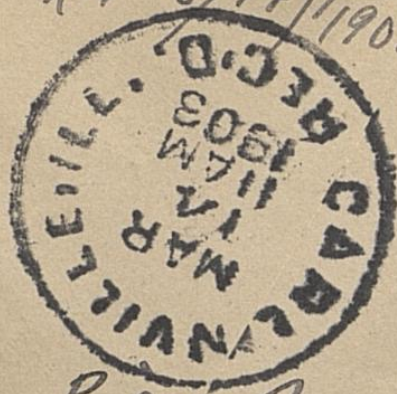

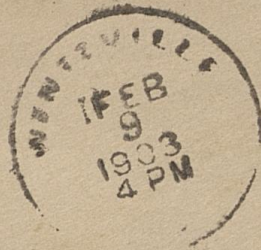

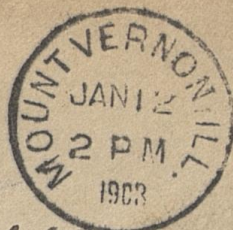

see you at the State Poultry Show.

I have been busy since and am
away behind with my letters.

As to White Rose Comb Leghorn
culls I could probably furnish
ten or a dozen, yearling that
is coming two years and pul-
lets mixed. About half and half.
Some have black spots in
their plumage others salmon
color and I have a few sin-
gle comb sports. (Pullets).

Have never seen but one lot
of chicks from a Rose Comb Leg-
horn female (a brown one) and
a light Brahma male, they
were marked like they say

backed light Brahma hens you
sometimes see and had red combs.

I believe you would generally
get rose comb or pea comb chicks
which are an advantage as they
would not be as bulky, as the
marketmen call it, - no single
comb Leghorn chicks.

However should think a Leg-
horn male, on account of greater
fertility, - on Brahma females
would be a better cross, and get
a larger, more plump and as
early a maturing chick with
infall probability a pea comb.

I am putting in a few Brah-
mas, and need a first class
cockerel, as near Standard Shape
and requirements as possible
and early hatched, ready for
immediate use.

of the cull hens or pullets mentioned for such a cockerel, or a yearling cock as good.

If you care to trade send him right along and I will give you generous treatment when shipping the Leghorn females.

Believe I can furnish fifty or more Leghorn hens and pullets, principally Rose Comb Browns, or very high grades, for 50¢ each about Dec. or possibly April 1st.

In case you do not care to trade the good Brahma Male for the cull pullets and hens I will trade five good large Leghorn males (White Rose Comb) for him, and you can try the cross I suggested. Cockerels weigh 4 to 5 lbs.

Am more than sorry to hear of cholera in your Berkshire herd.
