so by Special Leg. act 1852. Many instances have occurred of  
conflict of Patents & of two Patents for entire tract, same land,  
& the facts justify the Comr's of Land Office to do issue as her may  
have got them from Land Office to say, a colony met thus. [ ] This some other  
Locator of the other, was in error as to beginning, & crossed on to colony  
on the ground, but don't find fields notes which showed no conflict there  
Patent issued otherwise would not. Had I known owner of Spanish  
would have given you at first, otherwise sometimes tedious & trouble to learn  
and little voluntary description which has cost money to know & give  
+ in this country would take half of ones time to do so, when  
to answer man what one in such business doing Casually  
learn makes a long list of gratuity, Mrs. Wilson now is  
quite a distance West of Archer City - a cow man. his Rd  
is Archer City, Indigo & Co. - Supervisor Archer City &  
he likely will try & get & give you information of the Spanish owners  
same as to colony owners.

Dear sir, your letter to L. Wilson  
of Oct 9<sup>th</sup> was by him this day handed to me, with  
request that I answer your questions, which  
I shall be pleasure in doing;

This is a very healthy climate, dry  
rainy, sheep do well here, but the country is mostly  
occupied by cattle men in large pastures,  
your tract 1862 is high rolling prairie land  
no timber or water, except one good spring  
which furnishes permanent water enough  
for more than beasts. Post Oak timber is  
3 to 4 miles away, fencing is mostly with  
wire, the quality of your land is a dryish red  
marl, covered with native sage & mesquite  
grasses, good for cattle & sheep, no tame or  
cultivated grasses have yet been tried,  
nothing done. Some raising a little  
millet for feed in winter and a few bunch  
grasses, the nearest Rail Road station is  
at Henrietta. is about 35 miles  
away, & building material is pine shipped

from eastern Texas, that is the wood material. We  
have a natural ~~Limestone~~<sup>limestone</sup> in great abundance  
which is used for building, and is excellent.  
The general belief is that this Country is only  
suitable for grazing, for cattle principally, but  
Sheep & horses do as well, but cattle  
men have bought the land in so large  
quantities & fenced it that it retards  
immigration & population from coming  
here. Your track has a fence on the north  
side 4 miles good fence, & there is enclosed  
75,000 acres in one pasture, north of that  
is an enclosure of 140,000 acres, on the  
west end of 75 to 80,000 acres and there  
are 2 others of like dimensions in  
the rear being roughly fenced, the whole  
population of the County (30 miles square)  
will not exceed 600,000 inhabitants, the  
less than about 100 inhabitants, we have  
been organized only two years; the price  
of land varies from \$100 to 150 per acre.  
South of your land there are no enclosures  
as the County was surveyed and sold in 1/2 sections.  
The south fork of the river is rough &  
covered with Scrubby Post Oak good for fence  
& firewood -

In the vicinity of your track you can make a  
good sheep ranch but you need more land  
should be glad to hear from you & answer any

Dear Sir:

I received your letter several days ago, but have neglected to ans. until now, as I have had to make some inquiry to be able to give you any of the information you want, and can not give you much yet. I have been here seven years, and one would think that a person ought to be pretty well posted in regard to general matters, But I am not, from the fact that I have been right here in one place all the time, and most of the time at work on a farm,

just you want to know in  
regard to Archer Co I have  
never been there but have saw  
persons that have been there  
and from what I can find  
out It is well adapted to  
Stock raising of all kinds  
But not to farming only  
in valleys along rivers. There  
is not timber here of account,  
fencing is all of stone, which  
you will find in abundance  
as It is rather mountainous.  
The R. R. you speak of runs  
to Henrietta Clay Co, and  
probably farther I don't know  
though that it does. There is  
also a road running N. W.  
from Dallas to Denison But  
don't run any farther by  
making inquiry at Dallas when  
you get there you can find out.  
But I believe the best way

for you to come would be  
by Denison and then down  
to Sherman and there take  
the route leading west to  
Gainesville in Cooke Co,  
I think this would be your  
best route. Now as to what  
Sheep are worth I have very  
little idea, as there are very  
few in our Co I think though  
men that have Sheep here  
hold them at from \$2.60 to \$3.10  
per head good Bucks I expect  
would find ready sale, at good  
figures, as there are very few  
Blooded Sheep here in Texas  
as to the number It would  
take to supply the demand  
If you go to the Sheep ranches  
in the West and South, you  
need not be afraid of  
over stocking the market  
I hear of Bucks being sold  
for as much as \$100.00
