Edwards, who has been employed at UK since 1891, was named senior vice chancellor for academic affairs at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He will leave UK April 15.
The new job offers Edwards a higher leadership position in which he will be second in in the organizational chart only to the chancellor of the University of Nebraska.

Clinton promises balanced budget
WASHINGTON — President Clinton,
declaring that Americans "want us to be partners,
not partisans," challenged Congress in his State of
the Union address yesterday to give the nation's
schools a big spending increase while balancing
the budget by 2002.
Recycling popular ideas from his campaign,
Clinton identified education as the top priority of
his second term and said Americans should have
"the best education in the world." He challenged
communities to measure their students against
national standards to lift achievement in math and
science.

The president's proposals would boost education spending by 20 percent, to \$51 billion for fiscal 1998. The increase — including the cost of tax breaks for college — would total 40 percent by 2002.

Two weeks after his second inauguration, the president lectured the Republican-led Congress to "complete the unfinished business of our country" — balancing the budget, enacting long-stailed campaing finance reform and reopening last year's welfare law to restore benefits to legal immigrants.





Last season as a freshman, Manning shined. She started 14 times and was the only freshman to finish the regular season in the starting lineup.

Manning scored 6.3 points and grabbed four rebounds per game, averaging 25.8 minutes per game.

This year has been far different for Manning. After starting during much of the early season, Manning decided that it was in her best interest to leave UK after the season.

Mattox confirmed last night

Mattox confirmed last night that Manning expressed a desire to transfer at season's end after the LSU game Jan. 5 After the loss to LSU, Manning

lost her starting spot and did not see more than seven minutes of playing time in any game.

"After I told her, she treated me as if I had left," Manning said. "It was very hard to accept.

"It's been very difficult. The reason she gave me (for not playing me) was that I didn't fit into the lineup against our opponents. Well these were the same opponents we played last year and I thought I was successful against them."



Researcher, candidate talk hemp

UK economist says industrial hemp offers some potential

LOUISVILLE —Even if the legal ban was removed, industrial hemp production would run into obstacles that would limit its moneymaking potential for Kentucky farmers, a researcher said yesterday.

Growers would face uncertain precisolobal competition, a limited market and the lack of a domestic industry to process the roduct, UK agricultural economist Valerie Vantreese said.

Making hemp an alternative to tobacco is impractical, she said, but the plant that once was abundant in Kentucky could potentially become a supplement to barley if a processing industry gained a foothold.

"I would love for industrial hemp to be this panacea," for farmers faced with an uncertain future in tobacco production, Vantreese said in an interview.

"But I also don't want to lead people down the wrong path, either, and give them false hopes only to have them dashed."

A proponent of industrial hemp said the report seemed shortsighted.
"I would say she's describing the plastics industry of the 1930s," said Joe Hickey, executive director of the Kentucky Hemp Growers Cooperative.

Vantreese spent six months researching industrial hemp for a newly released 32-page report on the topic, which has gained increasing attention amid talk of looking for possible alternatives to tobacco.
Kentucky once led the nation in hemp production.
Hemp was widely used during World War

Hemp was widely used during World War II in the manufacture of rope, cloth, paper, oils, cosmetics and other products.

It is still legally grown in Europe, Canada and China.

Stressing that she had no position on

Stressing that she had no position on whether industrial hemp should be legalized, Vantreese said she began the study to further the public debate and counter misinformation on the topic.

She said industrial hemp production could offer "a slight margin of profitability at current prices," but that previous increases in production by other countries led to declining prices because of limited demand.

"So when you say, Yes, at current prices we can make money, well once you bump up production any flooding of the market is just

If hemp were legalized, advocates would encurage a system in which producers would enter into contracts beforehand with processors to make sure they had a reliable market, he said.

Even if Kentucky farmers could produce hemp, little of it could be turned into fiber or other products in this country, Vantreese said. Only small-scale, or experimental hemp processing now exists, she said.

"My concern right now is if we went ahead and legalized production, because we don't have current domestic processing capacity and there's really no domestic demand for the raw product, we're going to have to export," she said.

"And we're talking about a really small world market."

But Hickey said processing capacity would grow if the crop were legalized.

"It's a 'build it and they will come' kind of deal," he said.

The world market has shrunk to one fourth its size since the 1960s, Vantreese said.

The market is dominated by low-cost producers such as China.

Last year, the worldwide hemp fiber trade totaled about \$5 million and the hemp oil trade was about \$5.5 million, she said.

In 1995, the United States imported \$669,000 in value-added hemp goods, such as woren fabrics and varms, she said.

High processing costs for hemp, along with competition from synthetics for fiber and cotton seed and soybeans for oils, have lowered demand for hemp, Ms. Vantreese said.

"Hemp is a really good little niche market, to then it competes with the other niche fibers like flax, linen and silk," she said.



Academic All-American.


