#### FOREWORD

This bulletin contains a list of the educational and training institutions in an approved status as of January 31, 1949, for the education and training of veterans under the provisions of Public Law 346, 78th Congress. This bulletin supplements and supersedes the bulletin dated August 1945, Vol. XII, No. 6, published by the State Department of Education.

This bulletin has been revised to bring up to date the list of currently approved institutions and flying services so that it will be of more service to the various persons and agencies, in Kentucky and other states, requesting information concerning the program of education for veterans.

The Veterans Administration will be notified by the State Department of Education immediately upon approval of other educational and training institutions, as well as withdrawal for any reason of approval of institutions contained herein.

This bulletin was prepared by the Bureau of Vocational Education, State Department of Education. For further information concerning the educational offerings and other matters, such as living conditions, housing and the like, veterans should make inquiries of the respective institution.

# Procedure for Entering Training Under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 (G. I. Bill)

- I. The veteran makes application on VA Form 7-1950 (June 1948) to the Veterans Administration Regional Office, 1405 West Broadway, Louisville 3, Kentucky. This form may be obtained from any Veterans Administration Office. It must be accompanied by acceptable documentary evidence of active service; i.e., a certified or photostatic copy of the official certificate of service.
- II. Upon receipt of application and documentary evidence, the Veterans Administration will determine the eligibility of the veteran for education and training, and, if eligible, issue VA Form 7–1953 (June 1948), "Certificate of Eligibility and Entitlement." This certificate will show total period of eligibility in terms of years, months and days. The eligibility is determined by adding one calendar year to the number of months of active service, other than dishonorable, on or after September 16, 1940, and prior to July 26, 1947, with a maximum of four calendar years. It will take approximately three weeks for the Veterans Administration to issue a Certificate of Eligibility and Entitlement; therefore, it is advisable for the veteran to make application approximately thirty days in advance of the date he contemplates entrance into training.

III. Upon receipt of the Certificate of Eligibility and Entitlement, the veteran will endorse the original and the copy of the certificate by completing Part II of VA Form 7-1953 (June 1948), and will present the original and the copy of the certificate so endorsed to the school or training establishment at the time he begins his course of education and training. The Veterans Administration will not be responsible for a period of training pursued prior to the effective date of the certificate.

# Action by School or Training Establishment

- 1. Determine that the veteran has completed Part II, VA Form 7-1953 (June 1948).
- 2. Endorse certificate by completing the appropriate section of Part III, giving all requested information concerning the veteran's course of education and training.
- 3. Execute VA Form 7-1921, "Application for Course of Institutional On-Farm Training," on all institutional onthe-farm cases, rather than VA Form 7-1953 (June 1948).

- 4. Forward all required forms to the Veterans Administration Regional Office, 1405 West Broadway, Louisville 3, Kentucky, promptly after the veteran begins his course, retaining the copy of the certificate marked "Copy for School or Training Establishment." In order to insure that enclosures will not be detached, all documents should be securely stapled together before forwarding to the Veterans Administration.
- IV. In all cases the school or establishment will be responsible for assuring itself that the veteran has not previously received education or training under Public Law 346 or Public Law 16. If veteran has had previous training he must have approval of the Veterans Administration before he can change his course and/or place of training. A Supplemental Certificate of Eligibility and Entitlement, clearly marked as such, may be accepted by the school or training establishment in full faith, provided it is issued for the exact course, since its issuance by the Veterans Administration was in consideration of any prior periods during which the veteran pursued education or training under the law.
  - V. When an institution or establishment in which a veteran is pursuing a course of education or training under Public Law 346 recommends a related course of instruction at another institution as part of the veteran's present course, the veteran's enrollment may be approved, but the Veterans Administration will not issue a Supplemental Certificate of Eligibility and Entitlement for this purpose. Procedure in lieu of the certificate is as follows:
    - 1. VA Form Letter FL 7-14, "Request for Related Instruction," must be executed by the principal institution or establishment and sent to the Veterans Administration Office having jurisdiction over the territory in which such institution is located.
    - 2. The Education and Training Section approves or disapproves the request for related instruction, and, if disapproved, so advises the principal institution, stating the reason therefor.
    - 3. If approved, the Registration and Research Section, Veterans Administration Regional Office, will execute and distribute VA Form Letter FL 7-15, "Authorization for Related Instruction," to the principal institution or establishment.



When the veteran commences related instruction, the institution providing such instruction will execute and distribute VA Form Letter FL 7-16, "Notice of Entrance into Related Instruction," and forward it to the Veterans Administration Regional Office, 1405 West Broadway, Louisville 3, Kentucky.



# SENIOR COLLEGES

#### ASBURY COLLEGE Coeducational

1. Location: Wilmore, Kentucky

2. President: Z. T. Johnson

3. Person Veteran is to Contact; J. B. Kenyon, Dean

4. Accreditation:

This college is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools; a member of the Association of American Colleges; and a member of the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

5. Admission Requirements:

Students who are graduates of a four-year accredited high school or students who present 15 standard units and pass the prescribed entrance tests may be admitted to the college as candidates for the Bachelor of Arts degree. No transfer students accepted at present.

6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts (A.B.)

7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

This college offers general or cultural courses, courses in preparation for the mission field, courses in preparation for teaching, courses in preparation for the practice of medicine, and courses in the preparation for law.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

No provisions for giving such credit are in effect.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

The college operates on a four quarter basis with quarters opening September, January, March, and June. Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by enrolling for more than the normal number of hours.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

None are in effect.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

Counseling and guidance services are maintained under the supervision of the President, the Dean of the College, the Dean of Men, and the Dean of Women.

#### 12. Living Facilities:

Dormitories are available.

#### 13. Health Services:

The college uses hospital service in Lexington and maintains at least two full-time nurses on duty on the campus at all times.

#### 14. Recreational Services:

Basketball, softball, volleyball, tennis, hiking, and other supervised physical activities, and class entertainments are provided by the college.

#### BEREA COLLEGE Coeducational

- 1. Location: Berea, Kentucky
- 2. President: Dr. Francis S. Hutchins
- 3. Person Veteran is to Contact: Dr. Kenneth H. Thompson, Director, Office of Veterans Service

#### 4. Accreditation:

Berea College has been formally approved by the Veterans Administration for the education and training of veterans. At the collegiate level, this institution is approved by the Association of American Universities, and is a member of the Association of American Colleges, the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

#### 5. Admission:

Admission is on a selective basis, in general, open to students with a normal pattern of high school work and a diploma. Exceptions possible, however. Remedial, non-credit courses required first year if orientation testing reveals deficiencies. Veterans meeting other qualifications may be considered on the basis of G. E. D. tests in place of a certain number of high school units. Other criteria for admission: (a) 90% must come from homes in the "mountain" counties of the eight Southern Appalachian states, (b) character qualifications, and (c) economic need.

#### 6. Degrees Conferred:

The B. A. degree and the B. S. degree in agriculture, business administration and home economics.

#### 7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

a. Curricula leading to elementary and high school teaching certificates; the specialized Agriculture and Home Economics Smith-Hughes curricula leading to teaching in those fields; and curricula for teaching commercial subjects.

 b. Curricula in Agriculture leading to County Agent work or graduate school; and in Home Economics for positions as Home Demonstration Agent, or in Dietetics or Textiles.

c. The liberal arts program, leading to the B. A. degree with majors in the natural sciences, in the humanities, or in the social sciences.

d. The business department with courses in secretarial science, accounting and general business.

e. The School of Nursing, maintained in connection with the Berea College Hospital.

f. Courses in handicrafts and in vocational arts, combined with actual job experience in connection with some of the Berea College industries.

# 8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

- a. Students of unusually high scholarship may accelerate by taking slightly more than the ordinary 15 semester hour course load.
- b. A summer session is planned for each year. This will enable some to progress more rapidly.

# 10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

All dormitory students are required to carry assigned labor.

# 11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

There are adequate guidance and counseling services offered veterans at Berea College.

- a. The Guidance Office administers many psychological tests to new veterans entering the institution; these are supplemented by various other tests as the need arises. These measure such things as interests, aptitudes, achievements, intelligence, personality, etc.
- b. The Office of Veterans Service has special facilities for counseling veterans on various problems which may be of a personal, vocational, educational, or social nature.
- c. The Department of Psychology is always available with trained personnel to assist whenever needed.
- d. The Medical Staff of the Berea College Hospital works in close cooperation with the Office of Veterans Service on the health problems of veterans.

#### 12. Living Facilities:

Dormitories are provided for unmarried veterans. For married veterans and their families, there are prefabricated houses with one, two, or three furnished rooms, a bath, and a kitchenette.

The houses are pleasantly located in an area near the campus and are connected with the community water, sewer, and electric lines.

#### 13. Health Services:

Berea College has its own hospital and medical staff. Complete check is made on the physical condition of all students, and remedial services are provided at low cost.

#### 14. Recreational Services:

A full recreational program is provided for all students.

#### 4. Accreditation:

The College of Commerce is accredited by the University of Kentucky as an A-grade senior college and by the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The Commercial Department (non-college) is accredited by the State Department of Education.

# 5. Admission Requirements:

College of Commerce—Regular college entrance requirements—high school graduation and 15 acceptable high school units. Commercial (High School) Department—No entrance requirements.

#### 6. Degrees Conferred:

- B. S. degree in higher accounting
- B. S. degree in business administration
- A. B. degree in commercial education

# 7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

The College of Commerce offers:

- a. The B. S. degree in higher accounting. The courses covered include:
  - accounting, economics, business administration, business law, English, mathematics, science, secretarial science, and typewriting.
- b. The B. S. degree in business administration. The courses covered include:

business administration, natural science, social science, mathematics, business law, accounting, English, and typewriting.

c. The B. S. degree in commercial education. Some of the courses offered are:

accounting, secretarial science, business administration, economics, business law, natural science, mathematics, English, education, health, physical education, and safety education.

Note.—The two-year courses in all of the above meet the requirements for the A. C. A. Certificate.

The Non-College Department offers such courses as:
secretarial science, shorthand, typewriting, office practice,
filing, bookkeeping and accounting, machine work, English, mathematics, spelling, rapid calculation, penmanship,
business correspondence, business law, salesmanship, and
economics.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

This college will follow the standards adopted by other colleges. A committee is now at work on the details of a plan for giving such credit.

9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

All courses are set up on either the 36 or 48 week basis, providing an opportunity for the veteran to complete four years of work in three years, if it is desired to do so.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

This problem has not arisen in this college, but provisions will be made for such students, if the demand justifies it.

11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

J. R. Meany, Veterans Counselor, occupied a similar responsibility in connection with Navy V-1, V-5, and V-12 trainees in this school in the early stages of the war. An advisory Committee, consisting of the President, the Dean, the Registrar, and the Veterans Counselor is functioning. Weekly sessions of all teachers of veterans are held for the discussion of their problems in connection with the teaching of veterans.

The college is located in the center of the best residential section of the city. Students live in approved private homes near the school. All students live within easy walking distance of the campus. Living expenses are reasonable.

13. Health Services:

All students in the College of Commerce are required to submit to periodic physical examinations at Graves Clinic located near the campus. The college has a permanent working arrangement with this excellent clinic.

14. Recreational Services:

Tennis, golf, swimming, picnics in nearby parks, and frequent trips to Mammoth Cave National Park are sponsored by the

college. School-promoted and supervised parties and dances are held. Five clubs, fraternities, and sororities, the members of which are selected on the basis of scholarship, personality, and general standing with faculty and students, are organized on the campus.

#### 4. Accreditation:

Centre College is fully accredited by all the accrediting agencies in this region, including the Association of American Universities, the American Association of University Women, the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

# 5. Admission Requirements:

Admission may be granted:

- a. To graduates of accredited high schools, whose scholastic average placed them in the upper two-thirds of their graduating class.
- b. Graduates of accredited high schools who graduated in the lower third of the class but not in the lowest quarter, providing they make satisfactory scores on an entrance examination
- c. Any veteran, not necessarily a graduate of an accredited high school, who has completed 15 approved units of Preparatory School work and who successfully passes the entrance examination.

#### 6. Degrees Offered:

Bachelor of Arts (B. A.) Bachelor of Science (B. S.)

#### 7. Programs:

Have been established for those who plan to enter Graduate Schools or Professional Schools of Law, Journalism, Business Administration, Dentistry, Medicine, Religious Education, Social Service, the Ministry, Library Science, and Engineering. Also, for those who wish to enter certain fields of Business, Teaching, and Secondary School, Social Work, Nursing, Public Health, Laboratory work, Dietetics, and Home Economics. Majors are offered in the following fields: Biology, Chemistry, Economics and Business Administration, English, Spanish, French, German, Latin, History and Political Science, Mathematics, Philosophy, Psychology, Religion, Sociology, Music, Art, and Home Economics.

8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

Credit will be allowed veterans for such studies pursued in the Service as may be properly accepted by a Libearl Arts college in granting such credit. - a. Centre College has adopted the semester system so that veterans may regularly enter at the beginning of each semester and for the summer session. They should be able to do four years' work in three calendar years.
- b. Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by enrolling for more than the normal number of courses.

10. Special Class Arrangements for Employed Students:

Special classes will be arranged for veterans who are employed while they are in college or their schedules will be so arranged that they can meet their classes and still carry on their employment.

11. Counseling and Guidance Service:

- a. The Counseling and Guidance Program operates mainly through the offices of the Dean of the College, the Dean of Men, and the Dean of Women, with the special cooperation of the Department of Psychology.
- b. The Dean of Men operates the Placement Bureau and counsels veterans concerning opportunities for employment.
- c. Every student has a faculty adviser.

12. Living Facilities:

The college provides dormitory facilities for single men and apartments for married veterans and also operates a dining room and refreshment building.

13. Health Services:

Medical service is provided by the college physician for minor illnesses but does not include hospitalization. An infirmary is operated by the college for minor confinement. A Medical Reimbursement Insurance Plan is in operation for serious illnesses and injuries. Local hospital facilities are available in Danville at the Ephraim McDowell Memorial Hospital, the Darnall Government Hospital, located a few miles outside of Danville, and the Veterans Hospital, located at Lexington.

14. Recreational Services:

An organized recreational program is planned with trained faculty people in charge. The college participates in all collegiate athletics. Thirty extra-curricular organizations include

six national social fraternities, three national forensic fraternities, hobby clubs, organizations for religious activities and clubs of major interests.

# EASTERN KENTUCKY STATE COLLEGE

#### Coeducational

- 1. Location: Richmond, Kentucky

#### 4. Accreditation:

This college is approved by the Kentucky Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the American Association of Teachers Colleges, the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the American Association of University Women, and the American Council on Education.

# 5. Admission Requirements:

- a. Graduation from an accredited high school with two majors, one of which shall be English, and a minor.
- b. Veterans who have not graduated from high school may be regularly classified provided the work which they had in high school plus the training which they had in service, when evaluated according to recommendations in the Handbook published by the American Council on Education, amounts to the minimum requirements for admission.
- c. Veterans who cannot be classified under either of the above provisions will be admitted as special students. Deficiencies in entrance requirements may be made up after admission to the institution.

#### 6. Degrees Conferred:

Bachelor of Arts (B. A.)
Bachelor of Science (B. S.)
Master of Arts in Education (M. A.)

# 7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

- a. Professional courses to qualify teachers, supervisors and administrators for work in public schools and colleges.
- b. Pre-professional courses needed by students who are preparing to enter medical and dental schools, colleges of law, and colleges of engineering.
- c. Commerce: accounting, general business, secretarial work.
- d. Regular liberal arts courses with majors in arts, biology, chemistry, English, French, geography and geology, health and physical education, history, home economics, industrial arts, Latin, mathematics, music, physics and social science.

#### 8. Credit for War Service Educational Attainment:

If the educational attainment is similar to that required for the completion of the college courses, then credit is given for:

- a. Completion of correspondence courses in approved colleges and universities.
- b. Completion of college level courses given under the direction of the Armed Forces Institute.
- c. Completion of courses in the various schools of the Armed Forces.
- d. Completion of courses taught by the Armed Forces on various college and university campuses.

#### 9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

- a. Students who have demonstrated competence may accelerate by enrolling for more than the normal number of courses.
- b. Students may accelerate by attending, in addition to the regular college, a summer session of 12 weeks.

# 10. Special Features for Employed Students:

Students who wish to attend college while regularly employed may elect to take a reduced load in college.

#### 11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

- a. The Coordinator of Veterans' Programs directs the induction of the veteran into the college.
- b. The Dean of the College advises the veteran concerning his schedule of courses.
- c. The Director of Personnel arranges special examinations to meet educational, vocational, or personal needs of the veteran. He also renders consultant services related to such problems.

# 13. Health Services:

The college has a full-time physician and a nurse. No charge is made for their services to students.

#### 14. Recreational Services:

The center of social life at Eastern is the Student Union. The college is represented in intercollegiate athletics by teams in football, baseball, basketball, swimming, tennis, and golf. A strong intramural program of competitive sports is sponsored.

#### 4. Accreditation:

This college is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and is a member of the Association of American Colleges.

#### 5. Admission Requirements:

Admission is based on the presentation of fifteen units or a certificate of graduation from an approved high school, provided that ten units are in English, Social Science, Mathematics, Science and Language. Where students cannot offer fifteen units of credit but show equivalent preparation they may be admitted by taking examinations in such subjects as the college may select. Students above twenty years of age and unable to present fifteen units may be admitted as "special" students.

Students taking less than the minimum normal load may be admitted as "non-matriculates."

#### 6. Degrees Conferred:

#### 7. Curricular Offerings of Interest to Veterans:

Majors in art and music.

No credit allowed for work done anywhere except in residence in an accredited or acceptable seminary or Bible school. Correspondence work or extension courses are not accepted for credit.

# 9. Opportunities for Accelerated Study:

The ministerial course covers three years' work. Arrangements for acceleration are not provided.

#### 10. Special Arrangements for Employed Students:

Most of the basic classes come in the mornings, Tuesday through Saturday. Students may work afternoons or evenings.

#### 11. Counseling and Guidance Services:

The seminary employs a full-time counselor whose fields is the orientation and guidance of all students and especially of incoming men.

#### 12. Living Facilities:

# SECONDARY SCHOOLS

Veterans may want to return to high school to prepare for college entrance, or to increase their civic and vocational efficiency. Interested veterans should get in touch with the principal of the school they plan to attend. The principal should then assist the veteran in planning his educational program.

The need for giving high school credit for educational experiences while in the Armed Forces has been recognized by the State Board of Education in the regulations passed on September 15, 1944. A summary of these regulations follows:

# A Summary of Regulations Regarding High School Credit for Educational Experience in Military Service

- 1. Credit toward high school graduation may be allowed for educational experience in military service on the basis of recommendations made by the United States Armed Forces Institute, Madison 3, Wisconsin.
- 2. The pupil desiring such credit should request the Armed Forces Institute to send a complete record of his educational training and experience to the high school which he designates.
- 3. The local school should give special attention to the following items in evaluating the Institute's reports regarding Specialized Training Courses:
  - (a) the name of each course successfully completed.
  - (b) the grade made in each course successfully completed.
  - (c) the number of clock hours spent in each course successfully completed.
  - (d) in such courses 180 clock hours is the minimum time allotment for one unit of credit; 90 clock hours is the minimum time allotment for one-half unit of credit.
- 4. Off-duty educational courses such as correspondence courses should be evaluated by the local school on the basis of information furnished by the Institute.
- 5. Before a pupil may receive a diploma from an accredited high school under these regulations, the following conditions must be met:

(a) At least twelve (12) units of high school work in regular attendance during the regular term must be completed. Variations from this standard must be approved by the State Director of Supervision.

- (b) The regular subject requirements of the school granting the diploma must be met.
- (c) The educational experience and achievement reported by the Armed Forces Institute should be evaluated in terms of units and must bring the total amount of credit up to sixteen units in order to qualify the pupil for graduation.
- (d) Not more than two units of credit may be given for the completion of the various Basic or Recruit Training Programs.
- 6. Veterans who wish high school credit for educational or training experiences while in the Armed Forces should use the application blank, "Application for Educational Achievement During Military Service", USAFI Form 47, Revised Sept. 1944. Complete page one and mail to the Armed Forces Institute, Madison 3, Wisconsin. The Institute will complete and return to the principal of the high school designated by the veteran.
- 7. To assist him in the evaluation of the military training of the application as certified by the Institute, the principal should:
  - (a) read very carefully the instructions accompanying the completed Form 47.
  - (b) consult the handbook, "A Guide to the Evaluation of Educational Experience in the Armed Forces", published by the American Council on Education, 1201 Sixteenth Street, Washington, D. C.
  - (c) consult the pamphlet, "Earning Secondary School Credit in The Armed Forces," published by the National Association of Secondary School Principals, 363 Administration Building, Urbana, Ill

# TRAINING FACILITIES AVAILABLE IN KENTUCKY'S VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS

Kentucky has twelve Area Vocational Schools for white persons. Each school serves several districts. For the most part these schools are operated by the local boards of education in cooperation with the State Department of Education, Division of Vocational Education. One similar school is operated for the benefit of Negroes. Facilities are available in each of these vocational school centers for training in many trades. Training in retail occupations is available in or under the direction of each Area Vocational School. The objectives of each course in all of these schools are to make persons employable in a specific occupation.

The vocational schools are so located throughout the state that those discharged veterans whose interests, needs, and aptitudes indicate the desirability of vocational trade training will find it convenient to enroll.

The facilities available for vocational training in trades and industries and retail occupations are described below. For the convenience of interested persons, the name and address of the superintendent of schools or other persons in charge of the local school unit is given, as well as that of the coordinator in charge of the various Area Vocational Schools. Contact with any particular school should be made through the superintendent or coordinator.

Discharged members of the Armed Forces who desire refresher training in an occupation, or who wish to prepare themselves for a specific occupation, should get in touch with the school nearest them which offers the desired training.

# Courses Offered in Trades and Industrial and Retail Occupations in Area Vocational Schools

Each of these schools has facilities available for training in some or most of the occupations listed below.

Trades and Industries: Auto Mechanics, Barbering, Chef Training, Electrical Wiring, Foundry, Industrial Electricity, Machine Shop Practice, Masonry, Plumbing and Heating, Printing (hand composition), Printing (press work), Linotype Operation, Radio Service, Refrigeration Service, Sheet Metal, Welding, Woodworking (carpentery), Woodworking (cabinet making), and other building trades.

Retail Occupations: Sales Training for—department, variety, shoe, hardware and grocery stores, restaurants and similar businesses. Merchandise Training including—men's and women's wear, textiles, groceries, hardware and similar lines of merchandise. Business Promotion including—advertising, showcard writing and window and interior display. Management Training including—starting a small business, record keeping, employer-employee relations, business speech, business arithmetic, how to train an employee, and other similar supervisory training courses.

There are two types of trade and industrial training programs which returning veterans may want to enter besides full-time inschool training.

Apprentice Training: This training program is controlled by the State Department of Industrial Relations, Frankfort, Kentucky, and carried on through the cooperation of industry, labor, the vocational schools and the apprentice in recognized trades or occupations requiring 4,000 hours or more of on-the-job experience plus a minimum of 144 hours a year of supplementary technical instruction in a school.

Establishments eligible for approval have either submitted a written program of apprenticeship or they are participants in such a program.

The apprenticeship agreement specifies the schedule of processes, the approximate amount of time to be spent in each process, and the wage scale throughout the program of indenture. The wage scale must average at least 50 per cent of the journeyman's wage during the period of indenture.

On-the-Job Training: Establishments wishing to offer On-the-Job training (for two years or less) are approved for this type of training on the basis of a written program. The written program is specific in regard to such factors as: the quality of the instruction and supervision provided by the establishment; the provision of adequate facilities for training; a well organized sequence of job-experiences with provision made for the proper time allotment for each experience; keeping adequate progress records, and the payment of a progressive wage scale for the period of training, leading to a trained worker's salary.

Detailed information may be secured from the local coordinators of the Area Vocational Schools. Mr. Watson Armstrong, Chief of the Bureau of Vocational Education, Frankfort, Kentucky, or Mr. Harold G. Wilson, Director of Trade and Industrial Educa-

tion, Frankfort, Kentucky, can also be contacted with regard to the question of trade and industrial or distributive education.

Plan of Operation: All Area Vocational Schools in Kentucky operate in accordance with the State Plans for Vocational Education which assure a sound program of instruction in mechanical skills, supplementary instruction for young workers in trades and distributive occupations and extension training for adult workers.

Admission Requirements: Because of the technical requirements for a person to become a highly skilled mechanic in a modern trade, it is desirable that trainees be high school graduates when enrolling in specific trade courses. However, students will be admitted if found to have enough general educational background to benefit by the instruction.

School Terms: Full-time day trade courses in specific trades are scheduled for 22 months in most cases. Some courses are operated for 11 months. The schools are closed during the month of August for summer vacation. Students may enter courses at any time during the year to pursue the complete course of 22 months or 11 months, as the case may be. However, a trainee may complete his training with recognition from the school at the end of 12 weeks if the instructor is assured that he has employment in the trade for which he is in training and has acquired sufficient skills to perform the duties in the situation.

**Employment:** The Area Vocational Schools are not employment agencies, however, the names of trainees who are finishing training are turned over to the State Employment Service for placement. Many employers contact the school direct and take the trainees as they complete training.

# INSTITUTIONAL ON-FARM TRAINING

Institutional on-farm training in Kentucky is offered by public high schools having departments of vocational agriculture, in cooperation with the Bureau of Vocational Education, State Department of Education, Frankfort.

An eligible veteran may elect to pursue institutional on-farm training either as a self-employed farmer or as a farm-employee, in accordance with the provisions set forth in this publication.

This training program shall consist of two integrated parts and shall be a full-time training program for those in training.

1. Instruction

- a. Class instruction in agriculture at the high school where the veteran is enrolled. This instruction shall be of at least 200 class hours per year, given as the course of study outlined herein.
- b. On-farm instruction
  - (1) At least 100 hours per year for self-employed veterans, 50 hours of which must be individual instruction, on the veteran's home farm, provided through at least two instructional visits each month (24 per year).
  - (2) At least 50 hours per year for farm-employee veterans, 25 hours of which must be individual instruction, on the farm on which the veteran is employed, provided through at least one instructional visit each month (12 per year).
- 2. Practice in the Use of Improved Farming Practices
  - a. Each self-employed veteran shall have a farming program on a farm under his own control, of sufficient scope to use all of his time not taken up in class or individual instruction. He shall put into use in his farming program those improved farming practices in which he has had class or individual instruction and that are applicable to his situation.
  - b. Each farm-employee veteran shall spend all of his time not taken up in class or individual instruction in performing those jobs and improved farming practices agreed upon in his training schedule, under the immediate instruction of his employer in cooperation with his teacher.

# AIMS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE TRAINING

1. For Self-Employed Farmers

The aim is to provide full-time training in farming that will better enable the veteran to make a good living through farming and live

well on his farm. The following objectives should be reached, insofar as possible, by each man enrolled in the training:

a. Have a good, well-balanced farming program that can grow toward good size of farm business.

- b. Become progressively well established in farming as a farm-owner, or in some other favorable farming situation.
- c. Use good farm-management practices.
- d. Use good practices in producing and marketing his livestock and crops.
- e. Plan and get into operation a good program of soil use and improvement.
- f. Plan and get into operation a good program for improving the farm home, buildings, fences, water supply, and the like.
- g. Construct and repair farm equipment, and care for and repair farm machinery.
- h. Produce and properly conserve much of the family food supply. The degree to which a man may reach these objectives will depend on his status and ability at the beginning of the training, his ability to make progress, and the length of time he may pursue the training. It is assumed that few men will be able to reach high attainment in all of these objectives in less than four years in training.

# 2. For Farm-Employees

The aim is to provide full-time training in some skilled farming occupation (such as farm manager, livestock herdsman, shepherd, poultryman, truck gardener, or orchardist) that will enable the veteran to become a skilled farm employee.

The following objectives should be reached, insofar as possible, by each man enrolled in the training:

- a. Become progressively well established as an employee in a favorable farming situation in the farming occupation for which he is training.
- b. Have the ability to use the improved farming practices in his farming occupation.
- c. Produce and properly conserve much of the family food supply. It is assumed that a man should reach a satisfactory degree of attainment in these objectives with two years of training.

Local boards of education, through their administrative officers, have local administration of institutional on-farm training. The Bureau of Vocational Education has state administration of the program through a contract with the Veterans Administration. The Bureau of Vocational Education contracts with local boards of education to provide the training and administer the program locally.
