World AIDS Day

With a focus on stigma and discrimination, World AIDS Day 2002 will encourage people to break the silence and the barriers to effective HIV/AIDS prevention and care. Please join AIDS Volunteers, Inc. and the Episcopal Diocese of Lexington AIDS Ministry for these activities.

On Sunday, Dec 1, at 3pm, "Belinda", an Appalshop documentary about Belinda Mason will be shown at the downtown Public Library theater. Funny, down-to-earth, and never self-pitying, Belinda speaks of our need for a collective response to AIDS which is not crippled by racism, homophobia, fear or ignorance Following the film, we will have a panel presentation, discussion and reception.

Later that evening there will be an ecumenical worship service in Remembrance and Hope for persons with AIDS, their family and friends, and for all those who have been affected by HIV. The service will begin at 5:30 pm at the Woodland Christian Church, 530 East High St.

A candlelight processional and vigil will take place immediately following the service, at approximately 6:30 pm. The vigil will be held at the Pavilion in Woodland Park. For those not attending the Worship Service, there will be another staging area for a processional at Common Grounds Coffeehouse, 343 East High Street, beginning at 5:30.



Trembling Before G-d

On Thursday, November 7, Trembling Before G-d will be shown at the Central Public Library Theater at 6:30 PM and again at 8:30 PM. Though there is no charge, admission to the film is by advanced reservation only. Call Temple Adath Israel at 269-2979 to reserve your free seats.

Trembling Before G-d is an unprecedented feature documentary that shatters assumptions about faith, sexuality, and religious fundamentalism. Built around intimately told personal stories of Hasidic and Orthodox Jews who are gay and lesbian, the film portrays a group of people who face a profound dilemma—how to reconcile their passionate love of Judaism and the Divine with the biblical prohibitions that are interpreted by the more Orthodox branches of the Jewish faith to mean that homosexuality is forbidden.

Many of the individuals featured have been rejected by their religious community and their pain is raw. Yet with irony, humor, and resilience, they love, struggle, and debate with a thousands-year old tradition. Ultimately, they are forced to question how they can pursue truth and faith in their lives.

GLBT HISTORY

Part 1: Rosawinkel Pink Triangle

The universal symbol of Gay Pride, the Pink Triangle was originally a badge designed by Nazi concentration camp officials to designate men incarcerated as homosexuals. A three-sided cloth badge sewn to the left shoulder and right trouser leg of uniforms, the pink triangle or Rosawinkel was part of an eight-color coding system: yellow for Jews, brown for gypsies, violet for Jehovah's Witnesses, red for political prisoners, blue for emigres, green for criminals, and black for "antisocial" detainees.

The color pink was chosen for male homosexuals as a sign of effeminacy. Prior to the pink triangle, homosexual men were identified by a black dot on their armband, or a yellow band with an A, for Arschficker. Although sex between women was not against the law in Nazi Germany, many lesbians were incarcerated as socialists (red triangles), antisocial "perverts" and "prostitutes" (black triangles), and along with large numbers of gay men, as Jews (two yellow triangles to make a Star of David).

In the 1970's lesbians and gay men began wearing pink triangles as a symbol of pride and solidarity in the face of oppression. For example, in 1975, the emblem was used by a "coalition of conscience" study group within the New York Civil Liberties Union to stress opposition to bigotry while fighting for municipal civil rights legislation. Starting in 1986, AIDS activists plastered New York City with stickers with pink triangles and the caption "Silence = Death". ACT UP adopted both the symbol and the slogan in 1987.

After the war, Rosawinkel became the name of a German group that campaigned to get compensation for gay concentration

camp survivors. The West German government agreed to this group's demands in 1982, 30 years after compensation had been granted to other persecuted group.



Part 2: Book Burnings by mary crone

Another interesting intersection of GLBT History and the Holocaust was the first Nazi book burning on May 6 1933. German students from the Berlin School of Physical Education attacked and demolished the Institute of Sexual Science, one of the first scholarly groups to study homosexuality. The students hung a bust of the founder of the institute and burned twelve thousand books that day.

This undoubtedly intentional choice of burning books that were connected to the study of homosexuality as the starting point for more wide spread burning seems to have served ...continued on next

the Nazis well and the practice spread. Four days later, the Nazi German Student Association set up more bonfires, this time to burn books by Jewish and other "undesirable" authors.

Of all the events that took place in Germany in 1933, it was these book burnings that drew that most reactions from people in Europe and America. Helen Keller wrote a letter to the organizers saying in part: "History has taught you nothing if you think you can kill ideas. You can burn my books and the books of the best minds in Europe, but the ideas in them have seeped through a million channels and will continue to quicken other minds."

A quotation from the German Jewish poet Heinrich Heine that referred to book burnings in the nineteenth century was often used in editorials and conversations of that time. "Where they burn books, they will soon burn people." But even those who quoted Heine, did not conceive of the horrors of the "final solution" that were to

come in the following years.

Note: Our lives are beginning to be reflected in school text books. This information is from Facing History and Ourselves, the Holocaust and Human Behavior a curriculum resource book that is now being used in some public schools in our area. The questions for students to consider includes: Why do you think books about homosexuality were targeted for the first book burning? Thanks goes to The Humanitarium: Center for Culture & Diversity for bringing this to Lexington.

National Coming Out **Again** Day by Tom Collins

I remember the first time I heard of National Coming Out Day. I was working for a Veterinarian and was given the responsibility of hiring a person to take care of the kennels. I hired a lovely young lady who announced, on her third day of work, that she was a Lesbian and that she made it a practice to tell people every October 11th (National Coming Out Day). She did not make the announcement directly to me, but a gossiping co-worker felt it her obligation to tell me.

I was so inspired by this young lady's courage that I went out on my lunch break and bought her a teddy bear dressed in a leather jacket. In those days I knew very little about Lesbians. The gossiping coworker almost exploded with anger at my gesture.

Since those days of ancient history I, myself, have kicked open those closet doors and invited the world to see me as the proud queer that I am. I am so open about my orientation that I sometimes forget that other people do not see me for who/what I am.

I was recently reminded of this while on a business trip to North Carolina. The hotel where I was staying provided a continental breakfast each morning. The lady responsible for preparing and overseeing the meal greeted us each morning with hymns and proclamations of her faith and love of mankind. This did not bother me, but others in my group were put off a bit by it.

On the last morning of my trip I entered the breakfast nook to overhear the morning songbird talking to another hotel employee about a foster child that her sister had "taken in" who had turned her nephew gay. I was moved to say something but held my tongue. As I poured orange juice she con-

tinued to refer to the foster child as an "evil seed that had to be removed from their family".

I could stay silent no more. I loudly announced that I was gay and did not appreciate the conversation that was being served with my breakfast. The lady listening to Miss Songbird said to me that they were not talking about gay people, but were instead talking about child molesters.

At this point all that registered in my head was the stereotype of all gay men being considered child molesters. I angrily proclaimed that I had heard exactly what they had been talking about and so could anyone else in the room. I said that God had created me just as he had created them and that no mistakes had been made. I said that gay people are just people, not evil seeds that need to be removed from anywhere. After several apologies, the ladies left me to try to swallow yogurt that seemed to boil as it reached my stomach.

It only dawned on me later when I wrote the date on a sheet of paper that it was National Coming Out Day. No matter how many times October 11th passes and no matter how many people that you tell that you are gay, there is always one more person that needs to know.

Thank you Melanie, you are truly one of the bravest people I have ever met.

World AIDS Day 2002 Are You HIV Prejudiced?

Stigma and discrimination are the major obstacles to effective HIV/AIDS prevention and care. Fear of discrimination may prevent people from seeking treatment for AIDS or from acknowledging their HIV status publicly. People with, or suspected of having, HIV may be turned away from health care services, denied housing and employment, shunned by their friends and colleagues, turned down for insurance coverage or refused entry into foreign countries. In some cases, they may be evicted from home by their families, divorced by their spouses, and suffer physical violence or even murder.

Only by confronting stigma and discrimination will the fight against HIV/AIDS be won. Belinda Mason spent the last years of her life confronting the stigma and discrimination. Belinda, who lived her life in Eastern Kentucky, became infected with the HIV virus in 1987. She decided to go public with her condition and became a powerful advocate for AIDS prevention, education, treatment, and human rights.

In a documentary about her work, Belinda talks about her own experiences dealing with AIDS and the support of her pastor to members of the Southern Baptist Convention. Join us for this film at the downtown public library theater at 3 pm, Sunday, Dec. 1. A worship service and candlelight vigil are also planned. See page 1 for details.
