Campaign starts with students

Why you should care: Money raised will be used to increase scholarship funds, attract new faculties

UK is issuing a call to the nation. A call for greatness, prominence, innovation, service and achievement. A call for more than \$400 million. The University will embark this week on the most ambitious public fund-raising campaign in Kentucky's history, beginning Thursday with a lunch picnic for students, faculty and staff on the Student Center patio and Botanical Gardens.

President Charles Wethington and Campaign National Chair James W. Stuckert will announce the public fund-raising goal Friday on the

Administration lawn.

The goal will be to raise over \$400 million by 2003, Wethington said. This money will help UK attract and retain world-class faculty, increase the undergraduate and graduate student scholarship fund, improve the library system and upgrade undergraduate and graduate academic programs, Wethington said.

Each college and department is creating a list of priorities for fund-raising, Wethington said. "This historic fund-raising effort will generate much of the money needed to put UK on the path to becoming a top-20 public research institution," Wethington said.

The private fund-raising phase of the campaign over the past two years has resulted in many developments. The festivities this week will celebrate the progress and prepare for the public phase.

The campaign affects students in every aspect, he said.

"When we improve the whole university," he said, "we improve the opportunities students have at the same time."

The President's picnic lunch for students, faculty and staff begins the five-day kick-off for the campaign.

"The picnic symbolically indicates the University should start the fund-raiser with the faculty, students and staff because it benefits them," Wethington said.

Colleges and departments will present academic showcases Friday and Saturday.

Another part of the campaign kick-off is a special half-time show at the UK vs. Indiana football game Saturday. UK vocal groups, Stuckert, a UK alumni and the president, chairman and CEO of J.B. Hillard, W.L. Lyons, Inc., a full-service brokerage company in Louisville, heads the National Steering Committee, a 10-person committee that will guide the campaign.

Committee chairs include William T. Young, businessman and philanthropist, Paul Chellgren, Ashland Oil, Inc. CEO and Chris T. Sullivan, 1972 UK graduate and founder of Outback Steakhouse restaurant company.

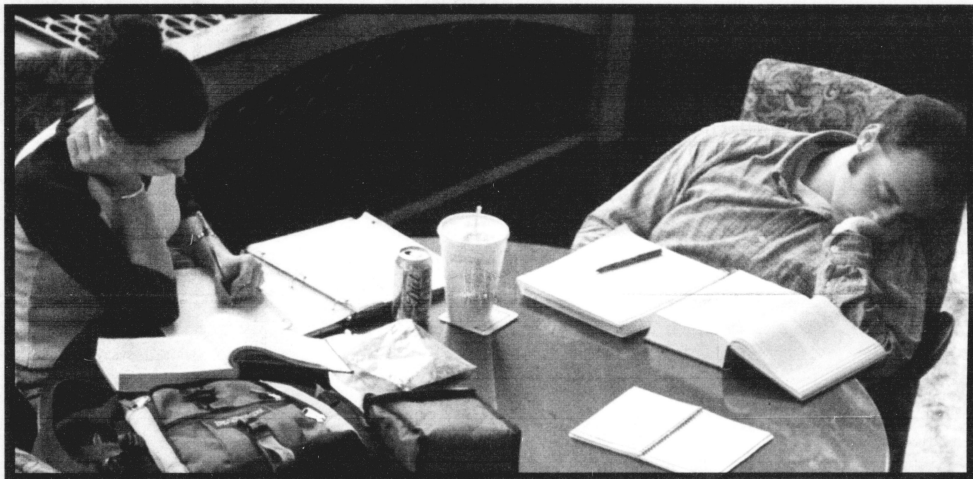
Stuckert calls the campaign one of the most crucial and challenging feats UK has faced.

"The people of Kentucky deserve and support the greatness that UK can attain as a result of this campaign," Stuckert said.

Cost, location halt plans

Space jam: Forum called to hear different opinions on site for proposed building

A proposal for the new Biomedical/Biological Sciences Research Building has temporarily hit a roadblock: lack of on-campus building sites.

Dr. Fitzgerald Bramwell, vice president for research and graduate studies, was appointed by President Charles Wethington to chair the BBSRB planning committee.

According to the letter from Wethington to Bramwell, the planning committee was to recommend a building site for the BBSRB.

"(The planning committee was to) recommend the academic space program for a flexible, state of the art biomedical/biological sciences research building," Wethington said.

The Bramwell Committee proposed University Drive as the site location for the future BBSRB, so that (the building) could remain in close proximity to the existing medical, biological and agricultural sciences facilities on Lexington's campus.

Wethington then asked a group of independent architects to look into prospective sites for the BBSRB.

A.M. Kinney, Inc., Venturi, Scott Brown and Associates, Inc., Health Education and Research Associates, Inc. and ZBA, Inc. were among the selected architects.

The report released by the architects Aug. 22 recommended the corner of Lime-stone and Virginia Avenues as the best location for the new building.

The architects thought the Virginia Avenue location was better than the University Drive site because of financial matters involved.

According to the architect's report, construction at University Drive would add \$10 million to the cost of the project because the Kelley Medical Center/Physical Plant Building and the Animal Pathology Building would have to be demolished.

Even though the recommendation by the independent architects seemed feasible, concerns among many faculty, staff and students arose.

Professor Bill Fortune, chair of the University Senate Council, said the calculations were incorrect.

"The contention by some people is that the \$10 million was calculated incorrectly, not taking into account of possible relocation with very low cost," he said.

"While others believe that the as-

sumed requirement of the destruction of two buildings is not necessary."

Lexington-Fayette Urban County Councilman Dick DeCamp is concerned with the proposed site for the BBSRB, which would be located at Virginia Avenue.

He questioned the location because of sewer and sanitation run-off in the area.

"If they do choose this site then there certainly has to be cooperation between the city and the University," Decamp, a member of the third district, said.

The architects that recommended the Virginia Avenue site in conjunction with the University Senate Council will be holding an open forum to discuss their recommendation over the Bramwell committee's.

Temporary advisers for student media

Looking: Search for adviser will renew in spring

The search for UK's next "great" media adviser for student media continues.

In the meantime, interim advisers for the Kernel, WRFL and the Kentuckian were named last week.

Buck Ryan, director of the School of Journalism and Telecommunications, has agreed to serve as interim media adviser for the Kernel. Larry Crouch, director of student services, has agreed to serve as the interim adviser for WRFL. Crouch said the two have agreed to work together on advising the Kentuckian.

The search for a new media adviser began in June when Mike Agin, former media adviser, announced that he would be leaving the University to take a position as a communications coordinator with Cypress Semiconductor, a computer parts company. Agin worked as media adviser at UK for 11 years.

Crouch said Agin's skills made him hard to replace.

"He had the computer skills, the business background and the newspaper back-

Bush dismisses 'Rat' allegation

WASHINGTON — A GOP commercial that subtly flashes the word "RATS" across the screen is coming off the air amid allegations the Republicans were trying to send a subliminal message about Al Gore. George W. Bush called the notion "bizarre and weird," and his campaign made light of it all. The GOP admaker said he was just trying to make the spot visually interesting. But Gore's campaign and experts in political advertising said the word choice — as an announcer was denouncing Gore's Medicare plan — could hardly have been an accident.

Bush promises better medicare

ORLANDO, Fla. — Texas Gov. George W. Bush promised a cancer patient yesterday that he will expand Medicare coverage for her and millions of other older Americans suffering from budget-busting illnesses. Trying to put a human face on his public policies, the Republican presidential nominee visited Florida Hospital to hear an emotional plea from an ovarian cancer patient whose private insurance is set to lapse. Bush is using the stories of real Americans at every campaign stop to better sell his tax, education and health care plans as polls show Democrat Al Gore gaining the lead on those issues.

MIDDLETOWN, Ohio — Al Gore and Joe Lieberman let their limos trail behind as they boarded bright yellow school buses yesterday to persuade voters their \$170 billion education package tops presidential rival George W. Bush's ideas for schools. Seeking to underscore the breadth of their plan, the Democratic running mates motored across southern Ohio in cramped buses, holding town meetings on the road and stopping at three schools. "Both Governor Bush and I have an emphasis on new accountability and local control. The difference is my plan will start with accountability, but doesn't end there."

Broad powers for safety inspectors

WASHINGTON — Transportation Secretary Rodney Slater yesterday urged Congress to give federal safety inspectors broad new powers because of the Firestone tire case, including access to overseas product data, manufacturer warranty claims and insurance claim information. "We must look to the future and guard against any repetition of tragedy caused by defective vehicles or equipment," said Slater, whose agency includes the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, which has been criticized for not

New section of space station opened

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Space shuttle Atlantis' astronauts flung open the brand-new living quarters of the international space station yesterday and began furnishing it for the first permanent crew. The first permanent residents, an American and two Russians, are scheduled to move in early November. The brightly lit, roomy crew quarters, called Zvezda, Russian for Star, had languished on Earth for two years because of Russia's economic crisis. It was hitched up to the space station in July, but it wasn't until Atlantis' arrival that anyone got a chance to see how it looked in orbit.

Dutch approve gay marriages

THE HAGUE, Netherlands — The Netherlands enacted a bill converting the country's "registered same-sex partnerships" into full-fledged marriages, complete with divorce guidelines and wider adoption rights for gays. Proponents say the legislation will give Dutch gays rights beyond those offered in any other country. Lawmakers thumped their desks in approval when the vote passed 109-33, and some of the scores of witnesses in the packed public gallery applauded and embraced.

OPEC earns of energy crisis

VIENNA, Austria — OPEC President Ali Rodriguez warned that the world is facing a possible energy crisis similar to that of the 1970s when high oil prices hurt demand and fueled inflation. Rodriguez said yesterday "it remains to be seen" whether the 800,000 barrels a day by which the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries agreed Sunday to raise its output will be enough to push prices lower. He called for joint action between producers and consumers to bring the price down.

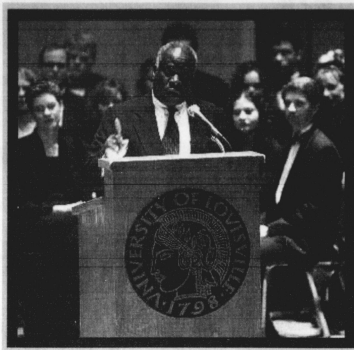
Dow ends up 38; Nasdaq falls 54

NEW YORK — Blue chip stocks drifted higher while technology issues gave up early gains yesterday. The Dow Jones industrial average closed up 37.74 at 11,233.23, according to preliminary calculations. The Nasdaq composite index fell 53.62 to 3,842.73. On the NYSE, declining issues outnumbered advancers by a 6-to-5 margin.

Ewing trade talks lose steam

NEW YORK — Patrick Ewing's chances of being in New York when training camp opens look better after another trade scenario appears to have fallen apart. A proposed three-way deal reportedly was all but over because the Knicks do not want to make a trade without receiving a quality power forward or center.

ground — plus the online experience too," Crouch said.

Over the summer a search committee for the position of student media adviser was formed. The search committee consists of Kernel Board members, Kernel staff members, Crouch and students involved with the Kernel, WRFL and the Kentuckian. The late Raj Chawla also served on the board but he died of a heart attack in July.

Crouch said the committee

had offered the job to an applicant but the applicant could not accept because of personal reasons.

Ryan stressed the importance of the search, and of finding a qualified replacement.

"This is a wonderful and important period in the Kernel's history, having been a Paememaker finalist for two years and having won the Pulitzer Prize of college journalism last year," he said. "I will do everything I can to help students in this golden era."

Crouch said the committee planned to start the search again in the spring.

"I am confident we will find a really good person in the spring," he said.

Cheerleaders' trespassing charges dismissed in court

'A little fun never hurt no one': Seven UK cheerleaders cool off at park, considered trespassing

Charges against the seven UK male cheerleaders, who took a dip in a fountain at Kings Island Amusement Park Sept. 3, were dropped yesterday at a Municipal Court in Mason, Ohio.

T. Lynn Johnson, UK's cheerleading adviser, is relieved that the criminal trespassing charges were dropped.

"The charges were dismissed in court," he

said. "I think the dismissal reaffirms my position (that this didn't amount to much of anything)." Johnson questioned the charges from the beginning because he believes that nothing inappropriate happened. He said the men merely got in the fountain for a few moments when they were leaving the park. He said this issue isn't a big deal, since the charges were dismissed.

Johnson still stands by his position that the charges were unwarranted because no "trespassing" signs were visible, contrary to what a spokeswoman for the park told the Lexington Herald-Leader. She said the cheerleaders ignored the signs, as well as a rope to get to the fountain.

The cheerleaders faced a maximum penalty of \$250 and up to 30 days in jail if found guilty of criminal trespassing.

New Orleans, city shaped by a song

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The man in the red wheelchair blows gently, guiding breath through his saxophone and into the world. Six feet away, his lanky partner's fingers massage an electric guitar in a mournful strum.

The sidewalk musicians do not sing. But passing couples, lubricated and listing, know the words. A few add lyrics, and the ballad takes shape: a prostitute's dirge in a minor key, an old lament about a wayward girl. "There is a house in New Orleans..."

"People come around that corner, from any country, they know it," says Reid Nettekville, the 34-year-old guitarist who has played with saxophonist Milton Martin for 11 years right at this intersection. "It's so deep in the heart of this culture."

Not surprising, for New Orleans is the home of the House of the Rising Sun — the legend at least, and maybe — once, long ago — the reality.

The song that launched the myth of a brothel where Southern girls met ruinous ends is known by all in New Orleans, though there is little indication it originated here. It probably

arose from the city's 19th-century reputation as the Mississippi Delta's hub of vice and cons.

The city's Storyville section was indeed notorious for its ample, open offerings of female flesh for sale. Madams used monikers like Gypsy Schaefer and Countess Willie Flaxza, and in-house piano players called "professors" set sins to song.

More than that, though, this is a perfect locale for a song that has crossed genres with glee. For New Orleans, like the song itself, is a cultural, racial gumbo — a Creole city where races and cultures and traditions mingled to form something entirely new. Ragtime rose to prominence here, and of course Dixieland Jazz owes its origins to the Crescent City.

What's more, there actually is a house in New Orleans they call the Rising Sun. But it's not a brothel; it's a bed and breakfast run by Kevin and Wendy Herridge, Brit and Louisianan respectively, who love the legend and have collected more than 40 versions of the song.

Their hostel features ample brothelabilia. "Street girls bringing in sailors must pay for room in advance," advises one

old sign. Admonishes another: "Ladies — kindly do your soliciting discreetly." An entire bedroom is adorned as if it were an Asian prostitute's, well, office.

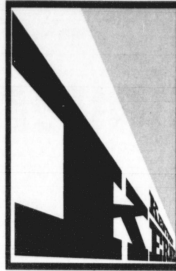
Eric Burdon, the lead singer of The Animals, the group that popularized "House of the Rising Sun" for good in 1964, visits New Orleans often — and wonders what people here think of him for turning their city into a prostitute's legend.

"They're trying to build up tourism, and here's this Brit singing about a whorehouse," he says, chuckling.

When he visits, everyone has a story — a notion about where the "real" house is or was.

"People would come up to me and say, 'You want to know where the real House of the Rising Sun is? And I'd say, 'I've heard that one before.'"

"Then I started going along for the ride." But the St. Louis Street building — well, let's just say Burdon connected with it at once when the owner invited him over. She made him sing "House of the Rising Sun" a capella for 40 minutes, he jokes. "What can I tell you?" he says. "The house was talking to me."

'Note'able singers perform at UK

One sings jazz, one rhythm and blues and the other Broadway. All support education in America, and all are certainly noteworthy ladies.

Nnenna Freelon, Lanie Kazan and Melba Moore will perform Thursday night in the Concert Hall of the UK Singletary Center for the Arts in a world premiere jazz concert, appropriately titled, Ladies of Note.

The concert is the spotlight event of a weekend in which the University will start its most ambitious fund-raising campaign in the history of Kentucky.

Kazan, who received an

Emmy Award nomination for her role in "St. Elsewhere," has also made appearances on "Beverly Hills 90210" and "The Nanny." Her most recent credit is an appearance in the new Burt Reynolds' movie, *The Crew*.

Also performing in the concert is Melba Moore. Moore has performed in various Broadway musicals including *HAIR*, *Les Misérables* and *Purlie*. For her performance of *Lutie* in *Lutie Bellerin*, Moore won a Tony Award as best supporting actress in a musical.

Freelon has been nominated three times for the Grammy Award, twice for the "Lady of Soul" Soul Train Awards and won the Billy Holiday Award

from the Academie du Jazz in France.

She said this concert was the first time the singers had worked together.

"Coming together like this is a real special treat for us," Freelon said.

A native of Boston, Mass., Freelon said she began singing in the church when she was a little girl. She later obtained a degree in health care administration from Simmons College in Boston, and worked in the health profession for a short time.

But it turned out her true calling dealt with a different type of administration — music administration.

"It didn't light me up in, inside, it wasn't really what I

wanted to do," she said.

Freelon said her music kept resurfacing but because of lack of support, she didn't think a career was possible.

Six CDs and many awards later, Freelon realizes the reality of her dreams. While she does admit that being an artist is a challenge, she said she loves what she does.

"It is a wonderful experience to try to put your emotions and feelings out there — things that you believe in."

One thing that all the performers believe in is education. Freelon is the national spokesperson for Partners in Education, an organization dedicated to enhancing the delivery of education services to

children and their families. She said her main interest deals with getting the arts more fully integrated into the schools.

Along with getting the arts integrated into schools, Freelon's interests also lie in making herself and others happy through her work.

She stressed the importance of getting the message out to young people to follow their dreams.

"When you do what you love, really what you love, it feeds you in ways you couldn't even imagine."

Freelon had the courage to imagine, and it happened.

"It's all good as they say."

For Freelon, it is really good.

Over half of the eight-member cast has some affiliation with UK, and the musical director of the show, Tara Anderson, has worked closely with members of the UK Opera.

Avenue X was written in the mid-'90s, but is set in 1963 Brooklyn. The action centers around Pasquale, a hopeful singing star whose passion for music confronts the barriers of racism placed on him by society. Former UK student Johnathan Watson, who plays Pasquale, said *Avenue X* takes a good look at racism.

Shoss agrees that the play is about racial intolerance and its consequences.

"This is a play about racial intolerance and what it leads to," Shoss said. "Before that, it's a play about music."

The widely diverse music styles of this a cappella show range from doo-wop to gospel to Italian. With a small cast, powerful voices are needed to bring together such a musically fascinating show.

"The music conveys the reality of delving into one's inner souls and how it can transcend petty differences and fear of people," UK student Earl Hazell said, who portrays the character Roscoe in the play.

Avenue X takes a fresh look at many timeless issues, including gender roles.

Part-time UK student Jeanne Lucas, who plays one of the two female characters in the play, puts it simply. "These issues don't go away."

But maybe bringing awareness to these issues is a good beginning. The play's opening line is, "You goin' to Avenue X?"

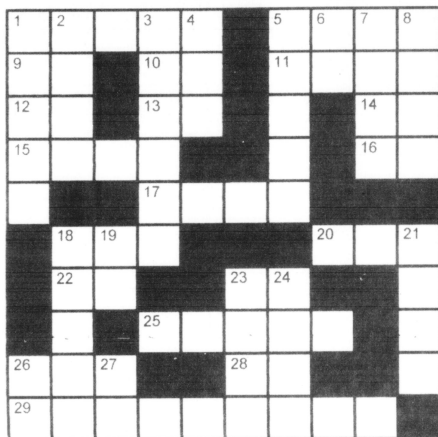
My answer is yes.

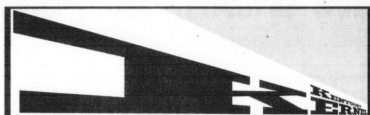

Newly renovated theater: Worsham Theater shows first of many sneak previews tonight

Students eager to see sneak previews of movies can do it for free beginning this semester thanks to the efforts of the Student Activities Board.

Beginning this year, the Student Activities Board has teamed up with a company called Network Entertainment Theater to bring UK a variety of sneak-preview movies to campus. SAB sponsors and runs ticket distribution by handing out special advance-screening passes at the Student Center.

"NET approached us about being a part of the program," SAB President Marrisra Fugate said. "We decided to do it."

NET is a nationwide orga-

"The beauty of the whole program is that it's free," Fugate said.

These advanced screenings benefit both the universities and the movie industry by bringing new activities and involvement to campus as well as using the best advertising method in the business: word of mouth.

In addition these screenings allow for corporate sponsors, which allows them to distribute free products to the student body who attend these events.

Small modifications had to be made to the Worsham Theater in the Student Center where all the movies will be shown in order to accommodate to the new media.

According to Fugate NET provided UK with new speakers for better sound and a satellite and projection system through which the movie is shown. This means that 75 other schools including UK, watch the movie at the same time via satellite.

The first movie, *Almost Famous*, premieres tonight at 9:00 p.m. in the Worsham Theater.

This movie, about a coming of age 15 year-old journalist, gives viewers an inside glimpse at what life as a writer with *Rolling Stone* might be like. Touring with a band and becoming more a part of them than an objective journalist, this young teen finds himself right at home with a "family" he never imaged.

Yet another perk of being a satellite school is that after the show, the director of this film will be discussing the movie and taking questions from all the schools via phone/satellite.

This live interactive portion is a special feature only available to schools participating in the NET programming. This will try to be a regular conclusion to each feature but not all schedules will be able to accommodate the live interviews with each screening.

The next movie that will be showing is entitled *Girl Fight*, winner of the grand prize at this year's Sundance Film Festival. *Girl Fight* premieres in two weeks on Sept. 27.

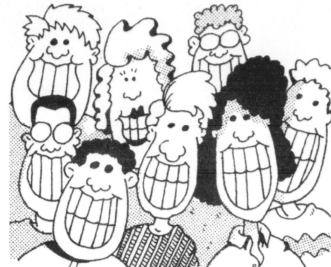
A full movie schedule has not been released. Each movie will be advertised a few weeks in advance in order to give students a chance to pick up passes and get interested in participating in this new campus event.

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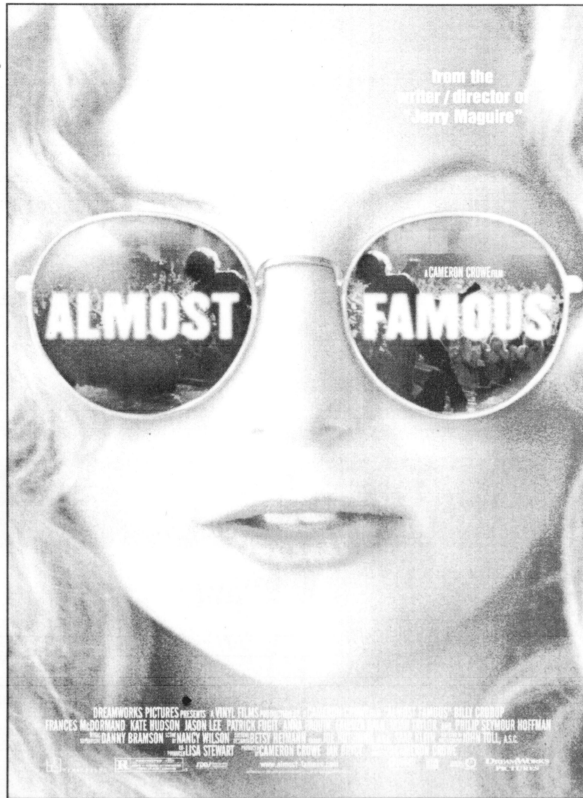

Gore creeps ahead in weekend polls

In the lead

Democratic candidate Al Gore leads in the CNN-USA Today-Gallup tracking poll for voter preference over Republican George W. Bush, but barely.

White House race: Bush favorite with men and married couples, Gore takes the rest. Experts say Gore "pushes the right issues."



WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrat Al Gore has gained an edge in several presidential polls, though George W. Bush's strength with men and with married voters is helping him keep things close.

"Is the glass half full or half empty?" asked nonpartisan political analyst Stuart Rothenberg. "Gore is a better candidate than he was and Bush is on the defensive."

Some might expect Gore would have a more substantial lead based on recent developments, he said.

Gore led 49-42 among likely voters in a CNN-USA Today-Gallup tracking poll, 49-41 among likely voters in a Newsweek poll over the weekend and 47-38 among likely voters in a poll by ICR of Media, Pa.

An NBC-Wall Street Journal poll out Monday and a Voter.com Battleground tracking poll out Tuesday showed the race virtually even, which has been the consensus of most of the national polls taken since the Democratic convention in Los Angeles.

"We see the race remains as dead even and voters can look forward to a close contest all fall in which Governor Bush

will prevail," said Bush campaign spokesman Ari Fleischer.

Gore spokesman Doug Hattaway had a different view. "We hope more voters are following the race and seeing that Al Gore is fighting for them," he said.

Gore's standing in the state-by-state contest for electoral votes has been steadily improving as well.

"The really significant movement came from the days following the Republican convention until the end of the Democratic convention," said Thomas Mann, a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution.

David Rohde, a political scientist at Michigan State University, said: "What Gore did was have an excellent convention and then he followed it up with a whole bunch of activities that reinforced that gain ... pushing the right issues" such as health care and the economy.

Many political analysts believe underlying forces such as the economy and the public mood shape the election more than the daily campaign. But the campaign can have an effect.

"There tends to be a self-reinforcing effect," Mann said. "Candidate behavior" on the stump and press coverage are shaped by the poll reports. Just

as Gore got dreadful press coverage for months, having to answer all those horse-race questions ... Now the situation is reversed.

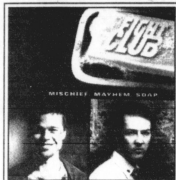
For months, Bush banked on his advantage on personal qualities like trust and likability. But Gore and Bush are roughly even on those qualities in polls now, and Gore retains an advantage on many issues.

"Gore repositioned himself in a way I don't completely understand," said Rothenberg. "He kisses his wife, and his daughter says he's a great dad. I still can't figure out how he turned things around."

Bush retains some advantages in the demographic picture, polls show. The Voter.com Battleground tracking poll suggested the candidates still have a gender gap, with Gore doing 9 points better among women and Bush doing 9 points better among men. Bush and Gore were even among white women.

They also still have a marriage gap, with Bush doing 9 points better among married voters, 46-37, and Gore doing 14 points better among single voters, 47-33. Both Gore and Bush were viewed favorably by almost six in 10 voters.

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Hi-tech huntin'

Digital deer call created by tech-savvy hunters

HAMPDEN, Maine — Deer calls have gone high-tech. Two hunters-turned-entrepreneurs have tapped technology to create a better way for deer hunters to attract their prey. They've created what they describe as a digital deer call.

The Phantom Whitetail Deer Call is a touch pad the size of a TV remote control that transmits to a bullhorn-style loudspeaker. The device can make 12 different deer sounds, including a buck snorting and a deer bleating.

Bill Gardner hatched the idea for the device, but it was nothing more than an idea until his wife, Tasha, pushed him to develop a product.

He enlisted a hunting buddy to start Extreme Dimension Wildlife Calls. A neighbor, who is an audio engineer for the Maine Public Broadcasting Corp., helped create a prototype.

The invention was innovative enough to be listed as one of Deer and Deer Hunting magazine's "50 Hot Items for 2000."

Men Girl Scouts?

Girl Scouts recruit male troop leaders

SEATTLE — The Girl Scouts are looking for a few good men.

Faced with a shortage of troop leaders in the Puget Sound area, especially in the suburbs south of the city, scout officials are recruiting fathers, women without children and college students to fill the gap.

"We do have a need for leaders," said Tina Johnson, spokeswoman for the Totem Girl Scout Council. "Last year we had girls on waiting lists that never did get in a troop."

More than 300 girls in King County are still waiting and a new wave of signups is expected with the start of school, said Sharon Cupp, the county's regional scouting director. Johnson said she encountered waiting lists when she went to work for the council nine years ago, but the lists have grown, adding to the pressure to find new troop leaders.

A dad can't do the job alone, though. Male Girl Scout leaders must have a female co-leader. If the man is married, the co-leader must be someone other than his wife.

Has anyone besides me noticed that, in recent years, America has suffered from a bout of crappy movie-itis? Gone are the days of *Forrest Gump*, *Titanic* and *Saving Private Ryan*. No more movies like *Sixth Sense*, *Boogie Nights* or *Being John Malkovich*. 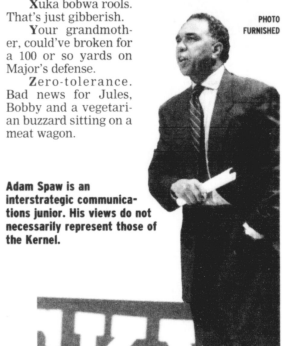
Valuable information for the (basketball) Cats to look up: fast break, 231-TAXI.
