MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY MAY 12, 1947

The University Faculty met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall Monday, May 12, 1947. President Donovan presided. Members absent were Louis Clifton, Lyle R. Dawson, N. R. Elliott, W. A. Heinz, G. C. Knight, C. G. Latimer, A. U. Lawrence, and Irwin T. Sanders.

The minutes of April 14 were read and approved.

Dean Terrell presented a request from the College of Engineering for approval of the following new courses:

Courses to be dropped:

Mechanical Engineering 103, Elements of Heat-Power Engineering. 3 qtr. hrs.

New Courses to be added:

Applied Mechanics 6, Mechanisms. 2 qtr. hrs.

This course is designed for Electrical Engineers.. Movement of machine parts such as crank and link motions, cams, gears, straight line and quick return motions. Lecture and recitation, two hours a week. Prerequisites: Phys. 3a and Eng. Draw. 18.

Mechanical Engineering 133, Tool Design. 4 qtr. hrs.

An introduction to Tool Engineering which embodies the fundamental principles of designing jigs, fixtures, cams gages, punches, dies, and automatic machine tools. Lecture, two hours a week, drawing room, six hours a week. Prerequisite: Mech. Eng. 100b.

Mechanical Engineering 134, Elements of Engineering Thermodynamics. 4 qtr. hrs.

Brief course for Civil, Electrical and Mining Engineers covering the general energy equations, mixtures of gases and vapors, flow of fluids, vapor power cycles, internal combustion cycles, gas compression, and refrigeration cycles. Recitation, four hours a week. Prerequisites: Phys. 3c and Math. 20b.

Mechanical Engineering 211 a, b, c, Advanced Engineering Thermodynamics. 4 qtr. hrs. each.

Critical treatment of the laws of thermodynamics, properties of gases and vapors, temperature scales; application of theory to compressors and internal combustion engines; frequent reference to researchpapers. Lecture, four hours a week. Prerequisite: Mech. Eng. 104c or consent of the instructor.

Mechanical Engineering 212 a, b, c, Advanced Fluid Mechanics. 4 qtr. hrs. each. Fundamentals of hydro- and aero-mechanics

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treated by the use of vector and tensor calculus. Theorems in vector and tensor analysis will be developed and applied to the flow of fluids. Lecture, four hours a week. Prerequisite: Mech. Eng. 107 or consent of the instructor.

Mechanical Engineering 213 a, b, c, advanced Heat Transfer.
4 qtr. hrs. each. Application of mathematics to heat transfer, transfer of heat in heat exchangers and furnaces, heat transmission and pressure drop, discussion of research papers. Lecture, four hours a week. Prerequisites: Mech. Eng. 107 and Mech. Eng. 129 or the equivalent.

The courses were approved by the University Faculty as presented.

Dean Wiest read the following recommendations from the College of Commerce which were approved by the University Faculty:

1. That Salesmanship as a requirement in the Industrial Administration Curriculum be dropped, and
2. That the title of Commerce 149, Market Analysis, be changed to Market Research.

A request from the Student Government Association for a change in the By-Laws was presented by Dr. Beers. This request had been mimeographed and distributed to the Faculty for consideration prior to the meeting. Upon motion, duly seconded, the Faculty approved the changes, which are as follows:

REPORT TO THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY.

RE: CHANGES AND ADDITIONS TO THE BY-LAWS OF THE CONSTITUTION OF SGA.

- 1.) Art. 7 has been changed to include ex-officio members of the Assembly in the group required to submit reports in written form to the Assembly.
- 2.) Art. 8, Sec. A has been changed to read: "Ten seats shall be filled in the fall quarter and nineteen seats shall be filled in the spring quarter." Previously, this Article stated that one-third of the seats shall be filled in the fall quarter and two-thirds shall be filled in the spring quarter.
- 3.) Art. 8, Sec. B concerning election classes has been changed from two upper class men being elected in the spring quarter, in the Engineering College, to one upper class man and one representative at large.
- 4.) Sections (c.) and (d.) have been added to Article 8. They are as follows:

(c.) The President and Vice-President of the Student Government Association shall be elected at the spring quarter election. The Secretary and the Treasurer shall be elected from the Assembly at

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the next regular meeting following the spring quarter election.

(d.) The Faculty members of the Assembly shall be elected by the University Faculty at its first regular meeting following the spring quarter election.

5.) Art. 9, an addition. "The President of the Student Government Association, with the approval of the Assembly, shall have the power to direct any student to appear before the Assembly of the Student Government Association or the appropriate committee of the Assembly for an explanation of any act deemed contrary or conflicting with the Constitution, By-Laws, or legislation of the Student Government Association. The student receiving this direction shall appear before the Assembly or the appropriate committee thereof at the next regular meeting after receipt of such notice."

Dr. Beers called to the attention of the Faculty the expiration of the terms of Professors Lunde, Sanders, and Ward, who were elected last year to serve as non-voting members of the Student Government Association, with Professor Ward acting as Faculty Adviser to the Association. Upon motion, duly seconded, the Faculty voted to ask these men to serve again in the same capacities during 1947-48.

Howard Stephenson, President of the Student Government Association, introduced to the Faculty the President Elect of that Association, Claude S. Sprowles. President Donovan welcomed Mr. Sprowles and expressed the hope that he would attend meetings of the Faculty regularly.

Prof. E. B. Penrod, Head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering, presented a petition from students in that department to organize a chapter of Phi Tau Sigma, a recognition society for Mechanical Engineering students. After some discussion the Faculty voted to approve the organization.

Dean Holmes, as chairman of the Committee on Student Organizations, presented a request from Chi Delta Phi (Literary - Women) now classed as a recognition society, to change the requirement for admission to a minimum standing of 2.0. This request was approved by the University Faculty.

Dean Holmes stated that she had received from a group of Harlan County students a request that they be allowed to form the Harlan County Club of the University of Kentucky, but that an examination of their constitution and by-laws showed a need for revision. President Donovan stated that he considered it highly desirable that new organizations be passed upon by the Committee on Student Organizations before coming before the University Faculty. The petition from the Harlan County group was returned to the group for revision and for action by the Committee on Student Organizations.

Dr. Chamberlain announced the Honors Day Convocation to be held at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, May 14, and urged that Faculty members attend and promote attendance by students and staff members.

There was some discussion of the desirability of closing all classes during convocations, in view of the fact that Memorial Hall will not accommodate all the students and faculty. The Faculty approved a motion, which was duly seconded, that a Committee be appointed to make a study of convocations and to make recommendations to the University Faculty.

Colonel MacKenzie announced the annual Inspection of the R.O.T.C. and asked the indulgence of the Faculty. He stated that only about one-fifth of the students would be involved at various hours, and that the Department of Military Science would issue excuses to the students to take to their instructors.
