





Governor of Kentucky

Kentucky's 57th governor was a prime mover, as lieutenant governor and a member of the State Property and Buildings Commission last year, of the drive to provide a new football stadium for the University of Kentucky. A native of Owensboro, he is a veteran of World War II and attended the University of Kentucky before graduating from the Maryland School of Insurance. He has been a member of the President's Council on Youth Fitness, National Council for Religion in American Life, Kentucky Council of Education and the Second Army Advisory Committee. An active Jaycee in his earlier years, he was director, vice president and president of the Owensboro Jaycees and vice president and president of the National Jaycees and vice president of the North American Jaycees. He has represented the Eighth District in the Kentucky Senate and was chief assistant to Gov. Bert Combs in 1959-61.

### NORTH CAROLINA

At Lexington, October 13, 1973, 8:00 p.m.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA—Chapel Hill, N. C. Carolina Blue and white. Campus enrollment—19,400. Chancellor—N. Ferebee Taylor. Athletic Director—Homer Rice. Head football coach—Bill Dooley. Sports Information Director—Jack Williams.

**SERIES HISTORY:** The Wildcat-Tar Heel series started way back in 1910, but the two teams have met only five times. After the Wildcats won, 11-0, in the opening game in Lexington, 24 years passed before the Tar Heels won, 6-0, in Chapel Hill. Thirty-two more years passed before Kentucky won, 10-0, in 1966. North Carolina evened the series at 2-2 in 1970 and went ahead last year.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 14, 1972 (Chapel Hill) NC 31, UK 20—A fiery second-half rally failed as the Wildcats bowed before 42,500 homecoming fans in Kenan Stadium. Tar Heel tailback Ike Oglesby (126 yards in 21 carries), and fullbacks Tim Kirkpatrick and Sammy Johnson (combined 117 yards in 19 attempts) trampled the UK defense throughout the game, gaining 354 yards rushing. UK moved the opening kickoff 78 yards in 12 plays for a 6-0 lead, but the Tar Heels scrambled to a 17-6 halftime margin as they capitalized on a 15-yard punt and a fumble for 10 of their points. Another UK fumble early in the third quarter helped put another seven on the board and it was 24-6. Still another fumble led to a quick N.C. touchdown for the final margin with 8:50 left.

**TONIGHT'S GAME:** After a two-point loss to arch rival North Carolina State, the Tar Heels of Bill Dooley have extra incentive as they try for a second victory in five outings tonight in Commonwealth Stadium.

Ranked high nationally before falling to Maryland, Missouri and State, the Tar Heels, champions of the ACC for two consecutive years, feel a victory tonight is a "must" if their victory express is to keep rolling this year.

One of the problems has been injuries to key players. At the start of the season, Chris Kupac and Nick Vicnovic

were listed one-two at quarterback. Due to the injury situation, Bill Paschall is now the starting QB, backed by freshman Carl Hoffman.

Paschall has carried 32 times for 105 yards and three TDs and completed 21 of 31 passes for 255 yards and two TDs. He has thrown two interceptions.

Tight end Charles Waddell is Carolina's leading receiver with 11 catches for 109 yards and two TDs. Wingback Jimmy Jerome has nine catches for 90 yards and two TDs.

The Wildcats will match up with sensational sophomore running back Alfred (Sonny) Collins, who gained 229 yards in 19 carries and scored four touchdowns in a 42-14 U.K. victory over previously undefeated Mississippi State Saturday at Jackson.


The performance brought Collins' total to 61 carries for 468 yards, best in the SEC. He now has six touchdowns rushing.

The 42 points were the highest scored by a U.K. team since a 49-0 victory over Xavier Nov. 12, 1960. The victory margin was the highest since a 35-0 win over Vanderbilt in 1965.

The Wildcat record for the most yards rushing in a season is held by Rodger Bird, who gained 671 yards in 10 games in 1964. Collins' current rate of 117 yards per game is well ahead of Bird's 67.1 yards per game.

Collins took over the Conference lead from State's Wayne Jones and moved into the national leaders list.

The U.K. record for most net yards gained in a game is 267, set by Bob Davis vs. Washington & Lee in 1937. Bob Kosid gained 18.6 yards per carry against Detroit in 1963 but he only carried the ball five times. Collins' 12.1 yards per carry Saturday eclipsed the record of 10.8 (minimum of 10 carries) held by Darrell Cov vs. Miami in 1963 and 7.6 (minimum of 20 carries) held by Bobby Cravens vs. Georgia Tech in 1958.



### STADIUM INFORMATION

FIRST AID—The University of Kentucky provides, for your convenience and welfare, First Aid Stations on the ground level on both sides of the stadium. On the West side is Room 156, the East side Room 172. An ambulance is available at each corner of the stadium. Twenty doctors on duty are spotted in each section of the stadium and are easily accessible to Boy Scouts and ushers. Two golf cart ambulances are equipped for immediate aid and located on the second level on each side of the stadium. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at either First Aid station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to the nearest Boy Scout or usher.

**CARDIAC CARE**—In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program.

**LOST AND FOUND**—Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of public safety (305 Euclid Avenue) and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

**CROWD NOISE PENALTY**—Uncontrolled crowd noise can result in a five yard penalty against your team. Please observe quarterback and official's signals for quiet

NO HORNS—Horns are not permitted in Commonwealth Stadium and will be picked up at gates. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

**GATE INFORMATION**—All gates are open two hours before game time. Parking lots are open three hours before game time. All stadium exits will be opened after the game. Please do not leave the stadium during the game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Pass-out" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

**FIELD REGULATIONS**—Spectators must keep off the playing field at all times and after the game. Spectators must use the stadium ramps for exits.

**LIQUORS**—Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the stadium as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Gate personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS—Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at the Press Box.

**SIGNS**—Signs and barriers are restricted for Commonwealth Stadium in accordance with University regulations and policies established by the Public Safety Division.

PARKING—More than 5,000 parking spaces are located in four lots around the stadium, along with a bus-camper lot. Some areas are set aside for Blue & White Fund members, handicapped persons, staff and the press. Located nearby on the campus are many free parking spaces in University lots. Shuttle buses carry passengers to and from the campus lots and the stadium.

- All persons must have a ticket
- No pass out checks permitted at any gate
- All sales fina
- Tickets cannot be refunded or replaced if lost, stolen or destroyed
- The University of Kentucky Athletic Association reserves the right to revoke tickets by refund of purchase price
- Holder of tickets to University of Kentucky athletic events agrees to abide by stadium and University Policies
- Tickets may not be sold on University of Kentucky premises (parking lots, stadium grounds, etc.) except by authorized personnel



## DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY University President

President of the University since 1969 has been Dr. Otis A. Singletary, who came from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs. He earlier had been director of the Job Corps program for the Office of Economic Opportunity, and chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

He is the eighth president of the University. Unique recognition of his service to the institution came recently from the UK Alumni Association, which presented him its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

### HARRY C. LANCASTER Director of Athletics

Named athletic director in 1968, Harry C. Lancaster has been connected with UK athletics since 1942, when he was a full-time instructor in physical education and part-time basketball coach. A native of Paris, Ky., he lettered in football, basketball and baseball at Paris High. He was an All-Conference halfback three years and captain two years at Georgetown College. He also won three All-Conference nominations and was twice captain of Tiger basketball teams.

He served as an assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High (1933-34); head basketball coach at Bagdad High (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High (1936-42). He was assistant basketball coach at U.K. 22 years and baseball coach 16 years.





## FRAN GURGI

### Head Football Coach

Fran Curci brings to the University of Kentucky a new dynamic look that has resulted in a winning atmosphere throughout his playing and coaching career. Known as one of the most imaginative and exciting young football coaches in the country, he has proved that he has the tools, the spirit and the desire to conquer seemingly impossible griding situations.

He came to U.K. in December 1972 from his alma mater, the University of Miami, Fla., where he was head coach two years. He started his career as freshman coach there in 1962 after making All-America and playing as a 5-foot-9, 153 lb. quarterback for the old Dallas Texans of the AFL.

In four years, his Hurricane freshman teams won 12 and lost two games. He then served as a varsity assistant two years (1966-1967), and the Hurricanes participated in bowl games both those years.

Curci was tapped by the University of Tampa in 1968 to see what he could do about a faltering football program; in three campaigns, he wrote one of the most amazing success stories in college football.

In his first year, he put together a 7-3 season, including victories over Mississippi State and Tulane. That earned him the Florida Sports Writers Association "Coach of the Year" award, a recognition repeated in 1970.

His 10-1 record in 1970 also included a 31-14 triumph over Miami and brought the Tampans the nation's No. 1 College Division ranking as well as bringing Curci College Division "Coach of the Year" runner-up honors.

Curci has been selected four times to coach in all-star games. He assisted Bear Bryant with the South team in Tampa's first annual American Bowl game three years ago, then served as South head coach the next year. He helped Charley McClendon of LSU and Alex Agase of Northwestern direct the East in the Coaches All-America football game at Lubbock, Texas, two summers ago and was co-South coach with Bill Battle of Tennessee in Miami's Shrine North-South game last year.

Curci took over as Miami grid boss Dec. 19, 1970, and left the program there in good shape for his successor, Pete Elliott.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Curci played his high school ball in Miami, where he lettered three years as a quarterback at Archbishop Curley High and was All-City, All-Conference, Catholic All-State and his team's Most Valuable Player.

At the University of Miami, he was known as the "Mite-y Magician." Playing at 152 pounds, he par-

layed intelligence and desire to become All-America as a senior in 1959 after receiving honorable mention All-America and winning acclaim as one of the foremost sophomore football stars in the country in 1957.

His record-shattering feats at Miami included breaking of seasonal and career marks for total offense, most passes thrown, most passes completed and most yards gained on passing. He also was co-holder of the record for most TD passes thrown.

He rolled up 2,767 yards rushing and passing during his varsity career, breaking a total offense record that had stood for more than two decades.

As a senior, he captained Miami and climaxed his career by engineering a stunning upset (18-23) over Big Ten champion Michigan State.

After graduation in 1960 with a degree in marketing, he played one year with the Dallas Texans and then served as a lieutenant in the Army, coaching and playing football for the Fort Eustis team, which won the National Service championship in the Missile Bowl.

He is married to the former Miss Patricia Ann Taylor of Louisville. They have four children, Angela 12, Frankie 10, Mary Teresa 9 and Jimmie 7.







### NCAA Reorganizes Itself into Three Divisions

Some folks think the National Collegiate Athletic Association's reorganization into three divisions is much like ordering from a menu in a Chinese restaurant—with One you get football; or with Two you may choose one from Division I.

Actually, the NCAA remains the same—only the names have been changed.

The Constitution remains a single document, applicable to all members. The reorganization allows for each division to adopt amendments to the Bylaws applicable only to that specific division without the approval of any other division.

Each NCAA member institution will select its division through self-determination, except in the sport of football, in which Division I membership will consist of those 126 institutions currently classified as "major" by the Football Statistics and Classification Committee.

Self-determination is a key phrase. Many think that Division I membership is restricted to those 126 "major" teams. However, an institution may classify itself Division I in all sports other than football. Fordham University would be a prime example. Its program, except football, is Division I. Its football team is classified Division III.

### To Each His Own

The members of each division may establish criteria for membership in that division subsequent to self-determination.

An institution in Division II or III may elect to participate in Division I in one sport, other than football or basketball, and must abide by the Division I Bylaws which govern the sport in question, even though the institution's membership rests in another division. An example could be Pan American University, which could have an overall Division II program, but could elect to participate in Division I in baseball, its strongest program.

There are numerous other examples, also, and it's possible that some institutions could compete in all three divisions in different sports. An institution's football team could be classified Division III, it could self-determine Division II for its overall program, and still choose Division I for one sport

No matter what division an institution competes in, it will have a much better opportunity to compete in a National Collegiate Championship event.

The NCAA will sponsor a minimum of 39 National Championships by the 1975-76 year with at least 10 Championships in each of the three divisions.

Only one National Championship will be conducted in the sports of fencing, hockey, skiing, indoor track, volleyball and water polo. All member institutions are eligible to compete in the above Championships under eligibility rules of the division they elect for their overall program through 1975-76. After that, the member institution and its individual athletes must be eligible under the governing legislation for the division conducting the championship.

In addition, Divisions II and III will have a National Championship tournament in football.

ment in football.

Gymnastics and lacrosse championships will be sponsored in Divisions I and II and members of Division II will be eligible for the Division II championship in these sports.

In individual events, certain place winners from Division II and III championships who meet the qualifying standards will be eligible to compete in Division I competition, providing such individuals have met all academic and eligibility requirements of Division I, including academic standards for initial participation. For example, the top five finishers in the Division II and Division III cross country championships will be eligible to compete in the Division I championship.

#### **Movement Possible**

An institution may change its division membership by petitioning the NCAA Council if it meets the established criteria for membership in the division it wishes to be transferred to.

The Council itself will be restructured to give each division representation.

The Council will retain its 16-member make-up, but each NCAA District shall have a vice-president and eight vice-presidents will be elected at-large.

Among the 16 vice-presidents, eight will be from Division I members and four each will come from Divisions II and III. The president and secretary-treasurer will be ex officio members of the Council, as they currently are, and they may be elected from any division.

The Executive Committee will also be restructured with five members being elected from Division I and three from Divisions II and III with each division being represented by at least one member.

All standing committees of the NCAA will be evaluated with a view towards providing representation to each division where appropriate. Specifically, each of the three divisions shall be represented on all rules committees. This will be accomplished after the Association's 68th annual Convention in January in San Francisco, where the implementing legislation will be presented.


The reorganization plan was considered to be a vital course of action for the NCAA. "It will enable our members to enact rules which pertain to their own competition," said NCAA President Alan J. Chapman. "It will make the NCAA an even more valuable force in intercollegiate athletics."





### \* \* \* \* ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

### Model Moyes to Microphone

From "Coach Friday," a petite model who forecast college football games as a gimmick, Jane Chastain has evolved into the nation's foremost female television sportscaster.

She's still a novelty, but no longer a

Jane brought far more than beauty and a "Southern Belle" charm to her work as a sports reporter for WTVJ-TV, Channel 4, in Miami five years ago.

In interviews with personalities ranging from Bob Griese to Jackie Stewart— and encompassing the likes of Muham-mad Ali, Brooks Robinson, Arnold Pal-mer and Rod Laver—she exhibited knowledge of her subjects and their livelihoods.

Now she's branching out. A nationally syndicated "Jane Chastain Show"— a series of bright, informative 90-second spots for insertion into nightly sportscasts—began this fall in most of the nation's major TV markets.

Little did the five-foot two-inch brunette anticipate the direction her life has taken, though.

Born in Knoxville, Tenn., and raised in Atlanta, Jane admits that "going to Georgia Tech football games as a kid was the highlight of my early life." The only drawback was her embarrassment when her dad and uncle became overly vociferous in their verbal support.

But she "didn't grow up always wanting to be a sportscaster." In fact, she knew little more about sports than most sports-conscious teenage boys know about verome of feshione without where the red.

sports-conscious teenage boys know about women's fashions when she auditioned for a job at WAGA-TV in At-

The idea was a female "Coach Friday" counterpart for sportscaster Ed Thilenius, and Jane's "girl-next-door" appeal filled the bill.

filled the bill.

"Initially, Ed made my picks for me; and then he'd challenge me on one, with the loser taking a consequence," the pretty brunette explained.

"My most embarrassing consequence was doing 20 push-ups on a traffic isle at Five Points in downtown Atlanta at high noon," she laughed. "Some poor policeman didn't know whether to help me or man didn't know whether to help me or arrest me.

But eventually, Thilenius threw the challenge of the entire list of games at her; and when—with "unbelievable beginner's luck"—she had a perfect week, Thilenius left her on her own.
"I reled a 12 tip between Aukurn

"I picked a 13-13 tie between Auburn and Tennessee one time, and it happened," she recalled proudly.

"And the more I got into sports, the more I loved it and the more I tried to

learn—from sports encyclopedias, the sports pages, Sports Illustrated, sports books. . . But the more I learned, and this in the truth the truth of the sports. this is the truth, the tougher it was to predict.

Jane's fame spread; and when no less than Slippery Rock College offered her honorary letters in all sports and an honorary coaching position, it led to her first on-camera interview—and first dilemma.

"I was invited up to work out with the

team and to do the interview with the coach, Charles Godlasky; and all the way up I worried," she explained, grin-

"The obvious question was, 'What do you think about being the butt of all the football jokes all over the country?'

"But I thought, 'What if they don't know they are?

#### **Never Fear**

Her fear was alleviated when she saw a campus crest with the inscription, "Yes, there is a Slippery Rock."

Marriage to Roger Chastain—an industrial designer and a Georgia Tech grad—took Jane to Raleigh, N. C., where she broadened her sports and television sportscaster backgrounds as a

WRAL-TV.

"I did the noon sports show, a daily five-minute sports feature for the evening show, and produced and co-hosted a weekly 30-minute sports special that was always on college football through the fall.

"We had Duke Wake Forest North

the fall.

"We had Duke, Wake Forest, North Carolina, North Carolina State and East Carolina all within a two-hour drive; and we'd tape interviews with the college coaches whose teams were on the nationally televised Game of the Week."

College football players from the Carolinas to Florida have been the subject of Jane's interviews, and she says

ject of Jane's interviews, and she says the results cover a wide range.

"College players aren't used to such attention; and they can be so overly shy and modest that they're dull on the and modest that they're dull, or the exact opposite. You never know what to expect. Your interviews can turn out super-good or super-bad."

Somehow, it is difficult to imagine "Coach Friday" being anything but "super-good" in the sports television "super-good"





## Seaton Center

One For All






Once it opened in the fall of 1972, the new \$2.5 million Seaton Center instantly became the most popular building on the UK campus. Day and night its bright interior bristles with activity—handball, basketball wrestling, volleyball, fencing, gymnastics, squash—and the playing fields around it, in season, are alive with the sounds of flag football, hockey, soccer, softball and tennis.

The building has two uses: academic and recreational. Some 1,700 students are enrolled in classes of-

fered by the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation whose chairman is Dr. G. Alan Stull; thousands more, as well as faculty and staff people, use the building for recreation. There is a fitness and conditioning program for staff members

As many as 1,100 men and women use the building on a winter Saturday or Sunday. During its first semester of operation, Bernard "Skeeter" Johnson, director of Campus Recreation, calculated that



77,000 student recreation hours were spent there. Weekdays Seaton is open from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m.

Upstairs from the gyms and courts are offices and research laboratories. There is a lab for exercise physiology, one for psycho-motor experiment, and one for driver safety.

Built near the Kirwan-Blanding Complex, where thousands of students live, the Seaton Center is convenient and, because it is air-conditioned, comfortable. The University considers the present structure Phase I—the academic one—in a 3-phase building project. Phases II and III will, it is hoped, add more recreational facilities and at least one swimming pool.

The Seaton Center is named for Dr. Don Cash Seaton, for many years chairman of the physical education department, who continues to teach there.





## Seaton Center

#### KENTUCKY BASKETBALL OUTLOOK, 1973-74

Kentucky's 1973 Southeastern Conference champions return four starters, including SEC Player of the Year Kevin Grevey, and six other lettermen, but filling the shoes of Jim Andrews, a 6-foot-11 two-time All-SEC center, is a major concern of coach Joe B. Hall, who won 1973 SEC Coach of the Year honors in his rookie year.

Larry Stamper, a 6-6 part-time starter at forward, is the only other loss from the team, which ran up a 20-8 overall and 14-4 SEC record and advanced to the finals of the NCAA Mideast Re-

gional.

Expected to man the center post vacated by Andrews are Bob Guyette, a 6-8, 220 lb. junior who played forward last year, and Steve Lochmueller, a 6-7, 220 lb. junior battler who saw relief duty

Guyette started nine games early last year, and performed well in clutch situations, but he is happy to return to the position he has played throughout his career. He averaged 5.9 points and 4.7 rebounds while playing only 16 minutes per game in 27 contests.

Lochmueller, a competitive, physical type player, had a great effort against Alabama when he scored 18 points in a crucial lateseason game. The strongboy, who can hook consistently with either hand, averaged 3.3 points and hit 53.1 per cent from the field. He led the team with 86.8 per cent from the charity line.

With either man, though, he Wildcats will face an imposing

height deficiency.

'We will be a small team this year," said Hall. "We'll have to rely on speed, outside shooting and a pressure defense to carry us through a tough schedule.

Much of the scoring load will fall on the muscular shoulders of Grevey, a southpaw whose scoring binge in the last six games of the season lifted the Wildcats off the ropes to the conference

Grevey averaged over 30 points a game during that stretch, including a 40 point effort against Georgia, the high individual performance of the year in the SEC. Despite shooting mainly from the outside, Grevey's percentage zoomed to 53.5 at season's end.

For his pressure performance, Grevey won first team All-SEC and SEC Sophomore-of-the-Year honors and led voting on both Alabama's and Tennessee's All-Opponent teams. The 6-5 junior was second leading Wildcat scorer with an 18.7 average.

Other starters are Jimmy Dan Conner, a 6-4 junior forward-guard who showed flashes of brilliance (11.2), Ronnie Lyons, a 5-10 senior who excels as a playmaker (9.2), and Mike Flynn, a 6-3 junior guard, who regained a starting slot the last 14 games and won defensive honors as well as scoring at a 13 point clip during that stretch

Joe B. Hall, the first rookie coach in the history of the Southeastern Conference to win Coach-of-the-Year honors, begins his second year as Wildcat coach with a group which lacks a great deal of size, but one he terms as "lean and mean."

"We should get a good offensive punch from Grevey, who played great the last part of the season," said Hall. "But we feel we'll still be a balanced scoring team. Lyons, who had a somewhat off season last year, and Conner showed they have scoring ability, and so does Flynn, who emerged as a top defensive player.


The Wildcats should benefit from an experienced bench with all players seeing a considerable amount of playing time. Back from reserve roles, in addition to Guyette and Lochmueller, are seniors Ray Edelman (started one game), a 6-2 guard, and Rich Drewitz, a 6-7 forward, and juniors Jerry Hale, a 6-1 guard, and G. J. Smith, a 6-7 forward who missed much of the season with a knee injury.

"We hope to be improved from an experience standpoint," said Hall. "We feel we have 10 players returning who all gave good accounts of themselves at one time or another last year, and we look for this to offset the loss of our only big man, Jim Andrews." Up from the freshman team are sophomores Reggie Warford, a 6-1 guard who led the frosh with 17.5 points, David Miller, a 6-6 forward who averaged 15.5 points and 12.8 rebounds, and Roger Wood, a 6-11 center, who although was sick much of the season, averaged 12.8 points and 8.8 rebounds.

Incoming freshmen are Robert Mayhall, 6-8, of Middlesboro; Ernie Whitus, 6-8, Louisville; Gary Utz, 6-3, New Salisbury, Ind.; Larry Johnson, 6-3, Morganfield; Merion Haskins, 6-4, Campbellsville, and Joey Holland, 6-3, Charleston, W. Va.

Offensively, Hall will employ the single post and fast break as basics, but will include the stack and high-low post also. The basic defense will be man-to-man, with the 1-3-1 and pressure defense also utilized.

Hall feels the December schedule, which will severely test the Wildcats physically with a number of back-to-back away games against some of the nation's top teams, is a good one "which should get us ready for the conference schedule."


