Helping understand AIDS

Duo speaks tonight about how friends can help make a difference

College students are faced with a world of decisions, and a few poorly made can change one's life forever.

This is the message

Although the campus going dry has some students in an uproar, fraternity rush has actually benefited from the decision. "Most fraternities thought at first that the dry campus would have a negative impact on potential pledges because the image of fraternities includes parties and drinking," said Marc Klegg, finance marketing junior and vice-president of external affairs for Phi Kappa Psi social fraternity.

But Klegg said the opposite has occurred.

"I think that the fraternities worked even harder to get guys to rush because they assumed the dry campus would be a turn-off." Klegg said.

The number of pledges this year for fraternities, as a whole, is more than 400, compared to 342 pledges last year, said Dean of Fraternities Tony Blanton. The largest social fraternity on campus, Pi Kappa Alpha—109 members—had 39 pledges this year.

About 15 percent of UK students belong to fraternities and sould probably continue to do so in the future, Blanton said.

"The alcohol-free policy hasn't hurt," Blanton said. "I think it also eliminated some fears of parents too because more and more students talk with their parents before rushing."

During rush week, Aug. 23-28, each fraternity tried to attract new members by offering food and entertainment.

"When I rushed, I was looking for a fraternity thing ood guys who had the same goals as me... I was not concerned about the drinking issue," said Brian Baker, a new member of Kappa Sigma social fraternity and a psychology Junio said the new dry campus policy didn't affect rush activities.

"We really didn't do anything differently because rushing was dry already, but the bid party on Friday had to be held off Campus," said Brian Grote, a marketing junior and member of Kappa Sigma.

UK Hospital adds another helicopter

LEXINGTON — The UK Hospital is adding a second helicopter to its airborne medical service and will base it in the Breathitt County town of Jackson, officials said Monday.

Starting Oct. 1, a Sikorsky S-76 helicopter is to be stationed at the airport in Jackson from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily. The helicopter is to be staffed by two pilots, a nurse and a paramedic, the hospital said.

The UK Hospital is the only top-level trauma center in central, eastern and southeastern Kentucky. In a release announcing the expansion of its air service, the hospital said basing a helicopter in Jackson will cut down on the time it takes to respond to calls for help in the most remote parts of eastern and southeastern Kentucky.



Kathy Stumbo, vice president and CEO at Our Lady of the Way Hospital in Martin, Ky., said the expanded service will boost medical care in her area.

"All of the Lexington hospitals and the Huntington (W.V.) hospitals try to be very responsive to our needs when we have a patient that needs to be flown out." Stumbo said. "But by the helicopter being placed in eastern Kentucky, it can only improve service."

The new helicopter, which UK will lease for \$40,000 a month from Petroleum Helicopter Inc., is identical to the hospital's current helicopter, which is to remain on-call around the clock at the UK Hospital helipad.

Sex case rattles Utah

Police, victim seek answers in Kappa Sigma incident; DNA of all members to be tested

SALT LAKE CITY — After little cooperation from members of a University of Utah fraternity, police say they're stepping up their investigation into a probable sex assault at the fraternity house that may involve "date-rape" drugs.

"The only thing that I know at this point is that there was a group of boys locked in a room with the victim while she was naked," said Salt Lake Police bet Heather Stringfellow, who is assigned to the case. "I believe people in the fraternity know who these guys were, but are choosing not to tell."

Kappa Sigma President Jason Ellis assured Stringfellow they would cooperate fully but "that's not been the

case," she said.

"People involved have failed to return phone calls and give statements as promised," Stringfellow said. "Since these Kappa Sigma fraternity members have chosen not to cooperate, I'm left with no choice but to subpoena each member to take a blood sample and a statement."

The samples can be used to match DNA to any seminal fluids on the clothing or body of the victim. Test results will be back by the end of the week, Stringfellow said.

Police are also testing for the presence of "date rape" drugs like rohypnol (known as roofies) and gamma hydroxy butyrate, which goes by the street name "Liquid X," according to Sgt. Don Bell of the Sex Crimes Division.

The crime of rape becomes a federal offense if so-called

"date-rape" drugs are used to help impair the victim. Stringfellow said she might press charges under the state rape statute as early as this week.

The Daily Utah Chronicle reported Wednesday that an 18-year-old Utah student went to a party at the Kappa Sigma house Friday, Sept. 4, but can only remember waking up late the next morning in a car and then in the fraternity house with a stranger's clothes on.

The Chronicle published a police source' statement that a sexual assault had occurred.

The woman did not remember enough to say if she had been assaulted, Stringfellow said.

For the victim's version of events, please see her letter to readers published on this page. In the letter, the victim talks about how she mixed her own drinks and did not accept a beer from anyone at the party, as far as she remembers.
The Chronicle reported that

she had drunk the beer but Stringfellow and the letter say although she had apparently asked for one, she didn't drink it. Stringfellow said police are not charging the victim with underage drinking.

"It doesn't matter how intoxicated someone is — if she's impaired, she cannot give consent and under the statute, that's still rape." Stringfellow said.

The victim's letter talks about drinking going on upstairs 'because of the cops." One fraternity member who was at the party said there was no drinking.

Wayne State University Medical School accused of denying admission of student

"That's a novel argument." WBU Law School Dean Joan Mahoney said. "If he can prove there was a racial quota, then he would have a good suit."







Producing fake ID's needs justice

Sometimes, the system of laws and justice in America doesn't seem very just. On Aug. 27, Nicole Roy, 21, was fired from the Whitley County Circuit Clerk's Office after Circuit Clerk Gary Barton found out she had been producing fake IDs. Barton then filed a charge against Roy, first-degree official misconduct, a misdemeanor. Judge Ronald Stewart of the Whitley County Court dismissed the case Sept. 1 after Roy pleaded guilty, probating the 90-day jail term and fining her \$184.74 following a recommendation by County Attorney David Kersey.

Seem a little light for a girl who had been making some kick-ass fake IDs since October 1996? Mark Rucker, Student Government Association attorney, said if you got caught with false identification or tampering with an official document, you could be charged with second-degree forgery—a class-D felony—packing a potential one to five years in jail.

For almost two years, Nicole Roy produced these cards, and she simply got fired and fined a couple hundred bucks? Oops! We forgot to mention that Circuit Clerk Barton was not only her boss, he's also her step-father. And the county attorney who recommended probating the jail sentence has a wife that also works in the Whitley County Circuit Clerk's Office. Judge Stewart didn't see a problem with these connections, pointing out that Barton didn't have to press charges. Stewart also said he gave Roy the maximum penalty, as she had no prior criminal record.

The maximum? They must have some loose interpretations of the laws in Whitley County if producing a pile of felony offense fake IDs for your college buddies only causes you to be charged

ducing a pile of felony offense fake IDs for your college buddies only causes you to be charged with a misdemeanor.

No one involved said how many fake licenses Roy made, but to their knowledge she didn't sell them. Since she didn't sell them, that certainly makes everything all right, doesn't it? A crack dealer can say, "I was just giving the rocks away," and the courts will drop the felony trafficking charges eh?

Something needs to give. Either impose a harsher penalty on someone who produces fake IDs in an official office or ease up on people caught using fake IDs.

Some people caught with fake IDs have had to spend weeks walking to do community service so the charge won't show up on their record. Nicole Roy needs to suffer the same consequences, at least — maybe for each fake ID she produced.




