He is a member of the Executive Committee of the World Baptist Alliance, which responsibility brings him to this country at this time. 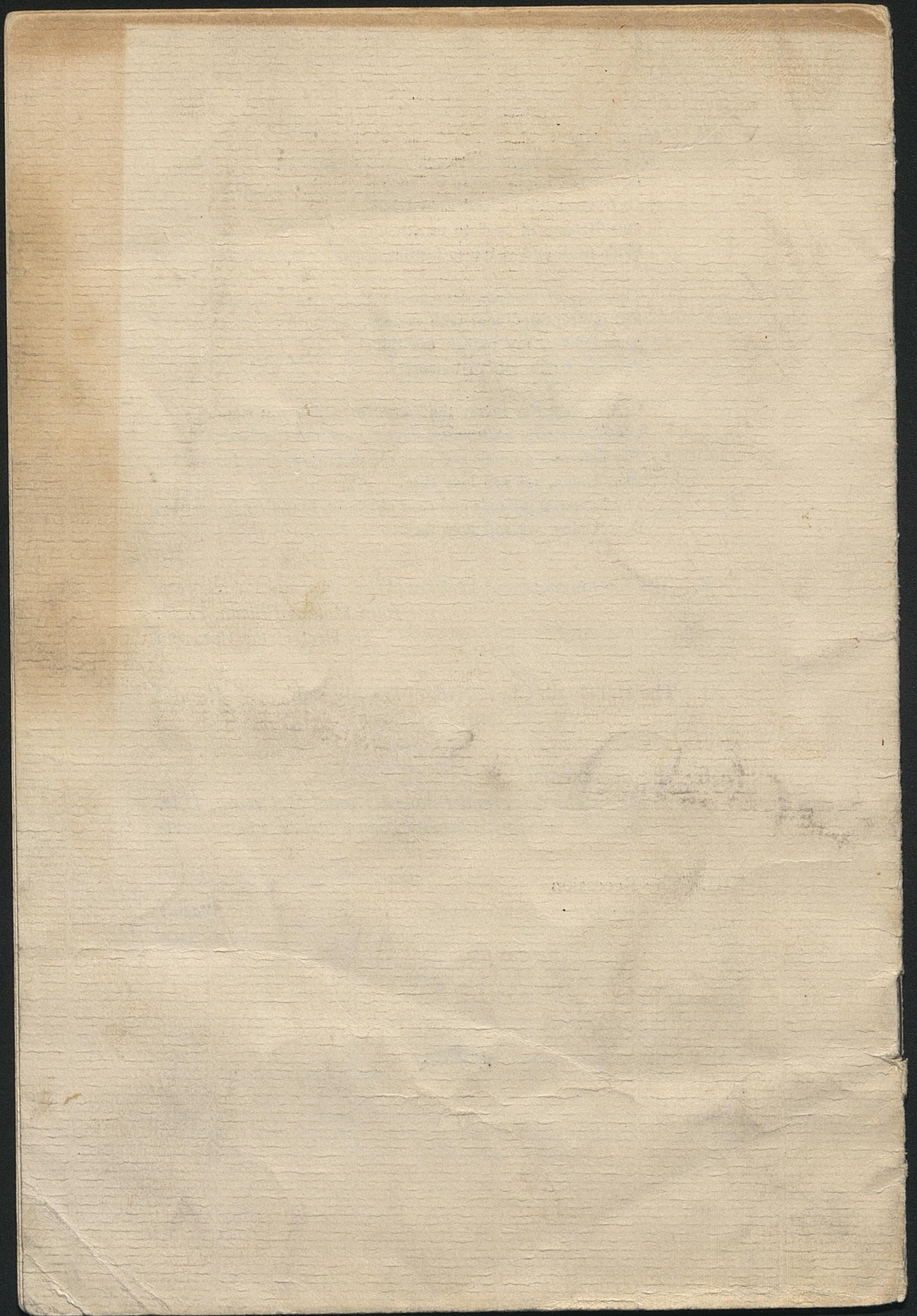
