That's the way it goes: Former UK Spanish professor carries on after retirement with his work, his pet turtle and memories of teaching

More than three decades ago, John Keller finished finals week at UK.

But the completion of his undergraduate and master's degrees in Spanish wasn't the end of h. Was Just the beginning.

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

The UK men's soccer team overcame the loss of 10 letter-winners to earn its second consecutive and second all-time NCAA Tournament bid.

UK coach Tubby Smith and senior point guard Saul Smith never frenzied, though. Saul Smith, the team's lone senior, had the best season of his career and finished his career in the top 10 all-time at UK in assists with 354, ninth all-time. He also ranks 11th in steals with 151—just two behind Jamal Mashburn.
Smith and Wooden All-American junior Tayshaun Prince let Cats to a Southeastern Conference regular season title, an SEC Tournament Championship in Nashville, Tenn., and a 24-10 record.
The Cats started the NCAA Tournament off well with tough wins over Holy Cross and lowa in New York behind a 29 point average from Prince. But in the third round the Southern California Trojans held Prince to six points and handed the Cats a 80-76 loss in the Sweet 16.
