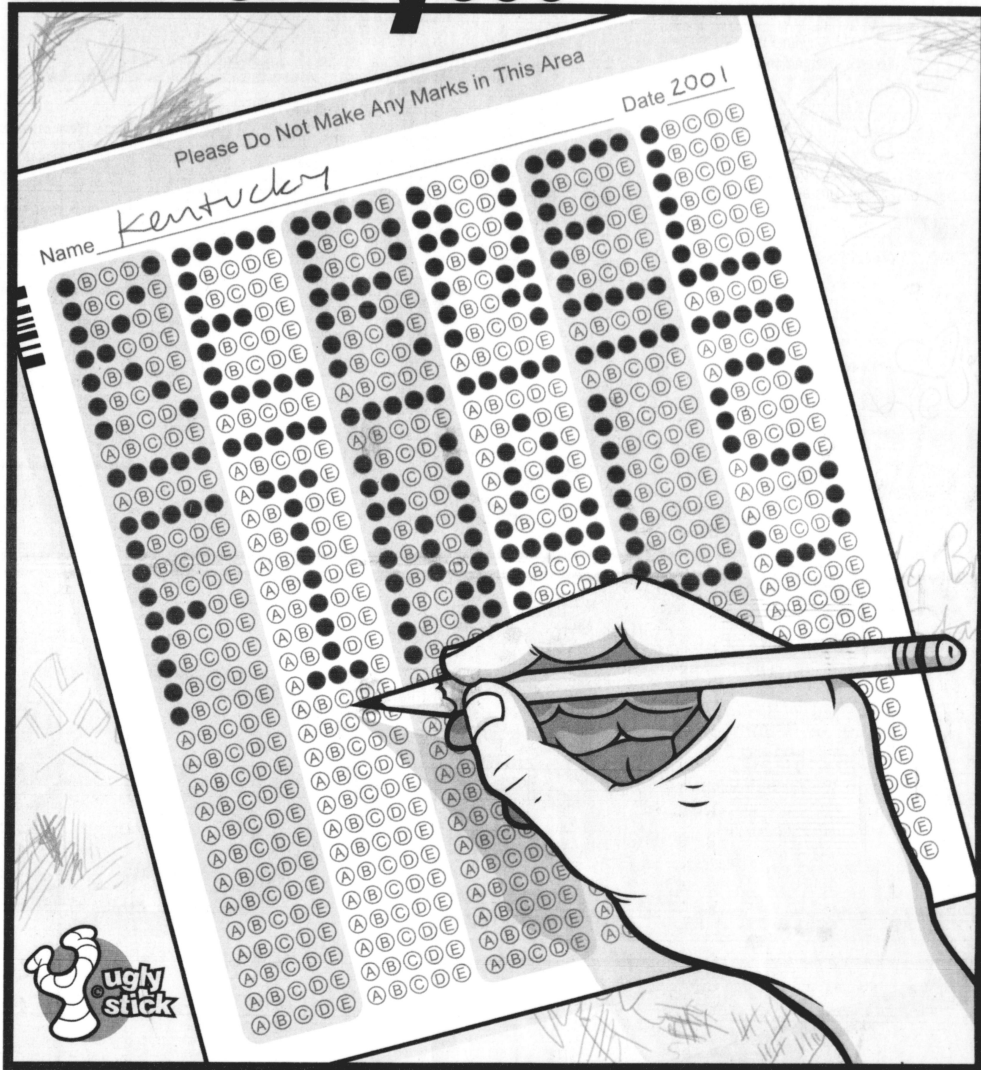

Networking important for job market

Get a job: Finding the perfect place to work no easy task

As the school year draws to a close, many students will finally earn their degrees, end their college careers and enter the job market.

These students will be confronted with interviews and bombarded with questions about resumes, practical experience and marketable skills.

Through the course of a short interview, many students will have to showcase their skills.

Sharon Childs, a career counselor at the UK Career Center, said one of these skills is communication.

"Certainly, with so much emphasis on scientific technology, we forget that students need interpersonal skills," Childs said. "Interpersonal communication skills are

still very much valued by all employers, oral and written."

Childs said part of this is the ability to work with others in accomplishing goals.

"Students should be able to give specific examples about how they were able to work as a team, as part of a class project or in a work setting," Childs said.

While most students have a specific job in mind, some students leave college with a degree in a field that offers few jobs.

Peter Berres, the assistant dean of Allied Health Professions and a teacher of UK 101, said these students should concentrate on enhancing their skills.

"There's a certain set of skills you can apply to a number of different jobs."

For students still looking for a job, Childs advised establishing a networking system.

"Networking is letting everyone know out there that you're looking for a job," Childs said. "It takes a lot of ... persistence and patience, delving into all kinds of possible leads."

While networking will help many graduating seniors, some are planning to return to classrooms in the fall.

Krista Metzger, an accounting senior, will graduate with a bachelor's degree in less than two weeks but plans to attend graduate school at Ohio State University.

Some may question her decision, but for Metzger, attending school is not an option.

"It's a requirement of my major that I have to have five years of school," she said. Metzger plans to work toward a master's degree.

Other UK graduating seniors will also earn degrees but are choosing to put them aside for the moment to look at other options.

Kerry Lewis, a marketing senior, is planning to attend a seminary in Texas but said his marketing degree will still help him.

"I'll have to work some kind of job so hopefully it will help me with that but it's not something I'm going to focus on," he said.

FALL:

Ground breaks for Seaton Center

Officials broke ground Sept. 1 for the expansion of the Seaton Center, which will be open for student use by spring 2002.

The new addition will triple the size of the existing Seaton Center. It will also increase the capacity by 1,500 students.

Police arrest Camara for DUI

The UK men's basketball team got dealt another blow Sept. 3 when police arrested UK junior forward Souleyman "Jules" Camara for driving under the influence. Camara was speeding in a Chrysler Concorde and nearly hit a parked car before being pulled over, Lexington police said. Camara pleaded innocent at his arraignment Sept. 8. He was found guilty Oct. 10 in Fayette District Court by a jury of five women and one man.

Faculty, Wethington at odds

The controversy over where to build the new Biomedical/Biological Science Research Building reached an all-time high Sept. 14 when UK President Charles Wethington allegedly gave two faculty members, who were open about their disagreement with his preferred building site, an ultimatum.

The ultimatum posed two choices: The faculty members could affirm Wethington's preferred building site at Virginia Avenue and Limestone Street or turn in their letters of resignation.

Wethington denied making the allegations and issued an apology to the faculty members.

The controversy over who had won Florida. After many recounts and lawsuits, Bush was once again declared the winner.

Bassett admits NCAA violations

On Mar. 6, UK's Board of Trustees voted for various fee increases for students, including increases in student housing, technology and student recreation fees.

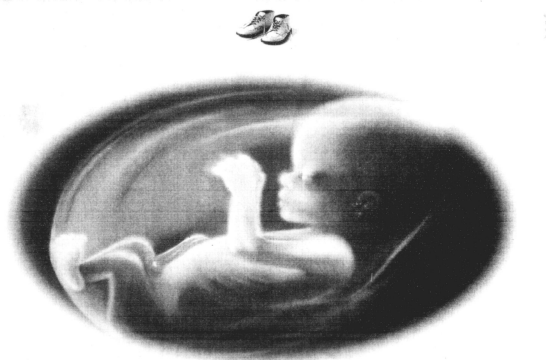
Robinson charged with overspending

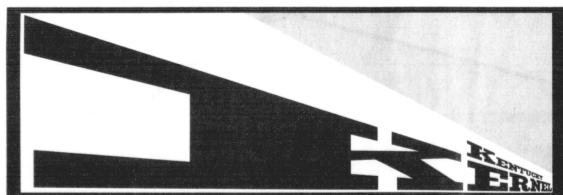

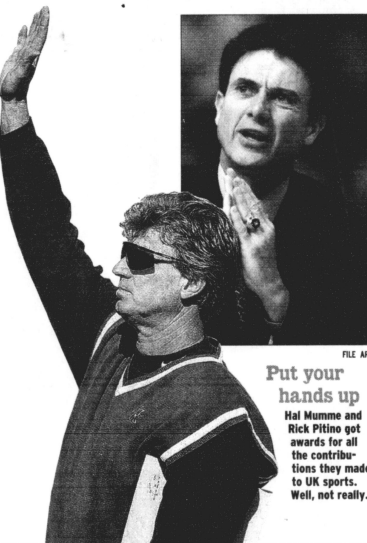

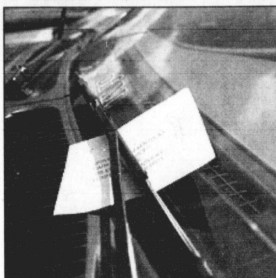

BE AWARE

Students must pay up or pay the consequences

What's the buzz? If you owe money for late books, tickets your diploma could be delayed

If paying for a cap and gown is all seniors are worrying about when it comes to graduating, they need to think again. The times they parked illegally at the dorms, or that library copy of Moby Dick that has been in the back seat of their car since sophomore year could come back to haunt them. Any kind of fees owed to the University can keep an excited senior from receiving their diploma.

There are several fee holds that can be placed on a student's graduation, but the four most pertinent to graduation are fees to the dean of students, financial aid, parking and library, said Cleo Price, associate registrar at UK.

"There is no universal deadline set by the University for the payment of these fees," he said. "But each department probably has its

own deadlines."

Should a student not pay their fees at the appropriate deadline, there is still a way to get some use out of that cap and gown. Even if the checking account is empty by graduation day, a senior can still walk with their classmates. Since diplomas are not given out on graduation day, a prospective graduate has a four to six week period after graduation in which to pay off their fees before the diploma is ordered. Price said. There is no policy stating that a student in debt to the University cannot walk with their class, they just will not receive their diploma until all has been paid.

This discrepancy bothered some students.

"I would hope that people who can't pay their fees would still receive their diploma sometime," said Stephanie Martin, a business sophomore. "But I don't think that they should walk with

the class if there is any doubt that they won't see that diploma."

Stuffing those parking tickets into a glove compartment doesn't seem like such a good idea anymore when students realize that one parking ticket could keep them from graduating.

Any outstanding parking violations can stop a diploma, said Don Thornton, director of parking at UK.

Thornton said he hoped, however, that one unpaid parking ticket would not keep a student from graduating. "That six week period between walking and actual graduation is plenty of time to get the money in," Thornton said.

At least an overdue fee of twenty-five cents won't keep anyone from graduating. The library has a policy that only the accumulation of \$20 in fees will prevent the reception of a diploma, said Diana Steinberg, the overdue supervisor at William T. Young Library.

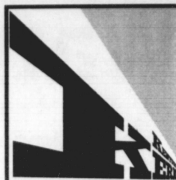
The library has a deadline for payment of fees, but the first indication that a hold might be placed on a student's graduation is usually at registration time.

"If a student does not have a hold placed on their registration, they are usually OK by the time graduation comes around," Steinberg said, stressing the word "usually."

Of course, for many students, getting rid of debts before they get close to graduating is not a bad idea.

"I am glad that I found out about this now," says Marsha Barhorst, an education junior. "It's going to take some time to pay off all my parking tickets."

That's the way it goes: Former UK Spanish professor carries on after retirement with his work, his pet turtle and memories of teaching

For some students, finals week culminates the end of a semester. For graduating seniors, it is the end of a journey.

More than three decades ago, John Keller finished finals week at UK.

But the completion of his undergraduate and master's degrees in Spanish wasn't the end of his journey.

It was just the beginning.

After UK, Keller went to the University of North Carolina to get his Ph.D. He taught there until 1967. One day that year, then UK President John Oswald called Keller to offer him a job as the director of the School of Letters and Languages, as well as the chairman for the Department of Spanish. Oswald also asked Keller to bring a staff with him. And he did. Keller said he recruited five professors and 25 graduate students to serve as teaching assistants at UK.

According to Keller, when he first came to UK the Department of Spanish was suffering. By the early '70s it ranked among the

top-20 programs in the nation. "I used to lie awake at night and think of what I've done and I think of that," Keller said.

He taught at UK until he was 70 years old. If it had been up to Keller, he would have continued teaching. But UK has an age policy that mandates professors retire at that age.

"It makes sense," he laughed. "But professors should be able to go on."

That's the way it goes, he said.

Today, the 83-year-old spends most of his days at his home writing and researching in his study. Currently, he is writing two books simultaneously, *If I Were Tarzan* and *The Wandering Jew*. Keller said he writes two books concurrently in order to keep his mind fresh. He also serves as editor-in-chief of the University Press's *Studies in Romance Languages*.

"This is the only official position I have," he said.

Despite an "early retirement" as he calls it, Keller's memories of the University will never fade. He says his Uncle John would have paid for him to attend any college in the United

States, but he chose to stay in Lexington and attend UK.

He still keeps in touch with the University by reading the *Kernel*. He has read the newspaper since he was a student. He even had his mother send it to him when he was serving in the army during World War I.

"I'm glad I stayed. I'm afraid I would have gotten lonely."

Loneliness is an unknown concept to Keller. His research keeps him company. Surrounded by hundreds of books and the pet turtle he found 10 years ago on the highway somewhere between Richmond and Lexington, Keller's mind stays busy pondering questions and thoughts. It doesn't seem that he has forgotten anything.

Like the debate over Christopher Columbus' ethnicity, Keller swears that Columbus is a Spaniard, not an Italian.

In one of his most recent books, *Isabella and the Sailor*, he explains Columbus' nativity. Keller said he wrote the book because Americans have a negative image about Isabella and he hopes to offer the nation a different perspective of her. The book

will publish in Madrid soon.

Being a published writer is only one of Keller's many accomplishments. One that stands out fondly in his mind was when King Juan Carlos knighted him in the Order of Queen Isabella in 1984, as a result of authoring more than 40 books about Spanish literature.

For his efforts, Keller acquired a very expensive book — and he keeps it close. The book, *Book of the Knights Zifar*, is a facsimile valued at several thousand dollars. It is a replica of the original owned by French Emperor Napoleon. Keller said it was most likely stolen from a library in Madrid.

But what will never be stolen from him are his accomplishments and memories.

"Most people hate to be forgotten, so perhaps my new career will keep my memory alive," Keller said in his study, which houses shelves of books about romantic languages and classical literature. The pet turtle sits in an aquarium among the books looking ahead dreamily. Perhaps remembering the time Keller rescued him from the perils of a highway and nursed him back to health with tomatoes.

The two keep each other company on their journey through life.

The pros and cons of graduate school

More school?

Some students say they are heading straight into graduate school after graduation. Others say they will wait a year or two before hitting the books one more time.

On the horizon: Students opinions vary but officials say graduate school doesn't hurt

Finally! After four years (or more), the class of 2001 has reached the end of the proverbial road known as graduation day. Graduates are getting ready to embark on that long journey so affectionately known as "The Real World." Their educational experience is forever ended ... or is it?

"I plan on going to school for at least three more years after I graduate," said political science junior Paul Ivie. "With the growing number of people attending college today, I feel that I am going to need a graduate school degree in order to make myself more attractive in the future job market."

Ivie is not alone in this line of thinking. There are many UK students, as well as students around the country, that have made the same decision, causing increases all around the nation in graduate school enrollment.

According to Douglass Kalika, dean of graduate admissions at UK, there were 5,063 graduate students enrolled in UK graduate schools for the Fall 2000

school year. This was an increase of nearly 12 percent from the 1990 enrollment numbers.

And this is a trend not confined to Kentucky. Nationally, the rise in graduate school enrollment has been even more rapid. According to the U.S. Department of Education's web site the number of students in graduate schools nationwide has increased 29 percent from 1985 to 1998, growing from an estimated 1.376 million to 1.77 million students in that time.

Then there is the question of what jobs really need students to go the extra mile and do graduate work in order to do. Sharon Childs, the associate director of the UK Career Center, says there is no definite answer.

"In general, for almost any career that you choose, having a graduate degree can be beneficial to you. The more education that one has the better off they are," she said.

Education sophomore Ken Cates agreed with Childs' last point. He said he felt that not only would a graduate degree help him in his search for a job, but also might improve his life in other ways.

"I think graduate school would be great for me because I could continue to learn more about my field and become a better teacher than I might have been without going to graduate school," he said.

Yet even with more people attending graduate schools than ever, not every student says graduate school is such a good or needed part of their education.

Mechanical engineering senior Jesse Wright said he is not sure if going to graduate school is the best thing for him when he can go out into the workforce immediately and make good money on his undergraduate degree.

Telecommunications junior Jennifer Burnette agreed, saying "I just see it as more work that you might not really need. I'm not sure if the possible economic gain from a graduate degree is really worth the extra years and money you would have to put into it. And there is no guarantee that you would even be in a better financial situation after you did it."

Still, the overall view from most students appears to be that graduate school could not hurt and would probably be helpful in the long run.

Perhaps Ivie said it best for students looking into possibly attending graduate school when he jokingly said, "Even if it doesn't make that much of a difference in the job market, at least it puts off work for a few more years."

Year in review

Men's soccer

The UK men's soccer team overcame the loss of 10 letter-winners to earn its second consecutive and second all-time NCAA Tournament bid.

The Cats won their second consecutive Midwestern Athletic Conference Tournament by defeating Bowling Green 1-0.

UK lost to perennial power Indiana in the NCAA Tournament in 1999, but this season the Cats secured the program's first ever NCAA Tournament win with a victory over St. Louis. UK was able to beat the Billikens 4-2 on penalty kicks after a scoreless match.

The Cats lost to SMU the following weekend, but have built a program that continues to progress.

Football

The UK football season started with a disastrous loss to Louisville, and after consecutive wins against South Florida and Indiana the Cats lost eight straight conference games to finish 2-9.

The troubles did not end with the team's final play, however. UK coach Hal Mumme fired four coaches, including recruiting coordinator Claude Basset, after the season. One month later Basset admitted to recruiting violations that included payments to Memphis, Tenn., high school coaches.

On Feb. 7 the "Air Raid" era ended when Mumme resigned and offensive line coach Guy Morriss took over the duties of head coach.

Men's basketball

The UK men's basketball team started the season 3-5 and fans began to panic and blame the Smith nobility.

UK coach Tubby Smith and senior point guard Saul Smith never frenzied, though. Saul Smith, the team's lone senior, had the best season of his career and finished his career in the top 10 all-time at UK in assists with 354, ninth all-time. He also ranks 11th in steals with 151 — just two behind Jamal Mashburn.

Smith and Wooden All-American Junior Tayshaun Prince led the Cats to a Southeastern Conference regular season title, an SEC Tournament Championship in Nashville, Tenn., and a 24-10 record.

The Cats started the NCAA Tournament off well with tough wins over Holy Cross and Iowa in New York behind a 29 point average from Prince. But in the third round the Southern California Trojans held Prince to six points and handed the Cats a 90-76 loss in the Sweet 16.
